Dear Media Executive:

I am sure that you share my concern about the traffic accident potential of the coming Christmas-New Year holiday season.

As Governor, I deem it my responsibility to do everything within the prerogatives of my office to appeal to all the citizens of Texas to reduce the tragedy and the heartbreak of traffic crashes during this period and throughout the year. I would like to say this about the war, and about our relationships with the men. It makes little difference whether or not we

approve of the war itself.

It's happening, and there are men there... OUR men. Even if we do not like the war, we can still be more encouraging to them. They're a long way from home, and they're awfully lonesome. I don't know if I'll ever know what it's like over there, but I had a brother who knew, and I read his letters. Our men in Vietnam, and everywhere in the world, need every ounce of our support, and all our prayers. And we need them.

## Get In Or Get Out

My son has given his life in this senseless war in Vietnam. Warrant Officer John David Plummer was pilot of the U. S. Army helicopter that Associated Press photographer Oliver Noonan and Battalion Commander Eli P. Howard were on.

How long are we going to send our best young men over there to die in a war that we are not trying to win?

Some people think I should be proud that my son has given his life for his country. But that would be very hard indeed for a country that is rotting from within.

A country where treason that has cost the lives of thousands of our men in Vietnam is passed off as dissent.

A land where sympathizers with the very same Communists that shot my son down over there are given positions of trust and honor here at home, like teaching in our colleges, where they are poisoning the minds of our youth. How long will the American people stand idly by while these vipers hid behind the Constitution and bore from within to destroy us and the constitution both?

A land where our government did not have the moral courage to keep order here at home, letting mob rule take over our cities and college campuses, yet led us into war trying to police the world.

A country that harbours a Supreme Court, where the criminals are turned loose, the police shackled, and before whom the Communists haven't lost a case in the last fifteen years.

A land where the nation's capitol itself can be sacked and burned, while the police stand idly by.

A land where a militant mob can murder a policeman in cold blood, and just have a friendly judge move in and turn the offenders loose. A country that holds the lives of Communist civilians to be of far greater value than that of our own boys that were sent over there to uphold our way of life.

A land where cheap politicians play politics with the lives of our men in Vietnam. No, Mr. President, all I can feel is an ever deepening sadness that my son has given his life to this land of the mob and the home of the traitors.

Just who was it that killed my son?

The Russians and Communist Vietnamese are equally to blame, but the guilt rests most heavily on the traitors here at home—the Hippies and scum in the gutter left-wing newspapers that parrot the Communist line, Communist professors and students in our colleges, churches that send material aid to the enemy, church leaders who break into draft board offices and burn and pour blood on draft board records, the Dr. Spocks and Chaplain Coffins from all across the land, on up to and including some persons high in government and political circles. These quislings are giving aid and comfort to the enemy, prolonging the war. My son's blood is on their hands.

But for these traitors and our leaders' creeping paralysis, mousie type of bombing. The riots here and the war over there (both Korea and Vietnam) are much the same; they could have all been stopped before they really got started, if our leaders had had the guts to apply the necessary force. It would have saved the lives of thousands of our own men, as well as those of the enemy.

Most people would think we would have learned in Korea that the Army can't win a war with its hands tied behind its back. But no, we learned nothing, we are doing a repeat performance in Vietnam, literally wasting the lives of thousands of our best young men, and letting the Communists from all over the world, including the United Nations, tell us how to fight the war.

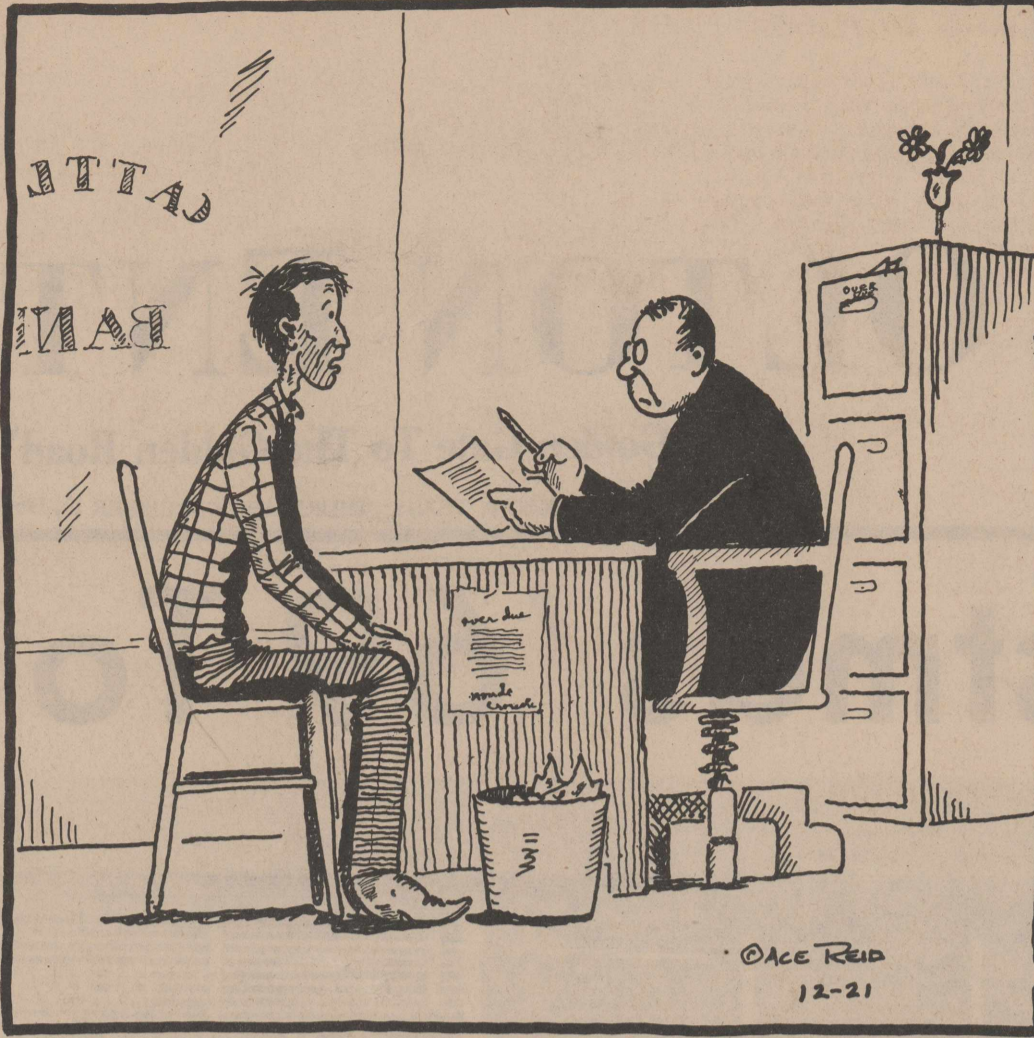
So, Mr. President, if we are scared, if we are afraid to take the shackles off of the armed forces, then for goodness sakes, let's get out of there and get out now, for there would be no need wasting the life of even one more American boy. Panty waists and cowards here at home have caused thousands of brave men to lose their lives in Vietnam.

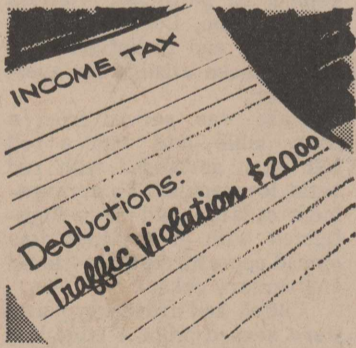

## THE FAMILY LAWYER

### Deduct Traffic Fines?

While hurrying to a business appointment, you are sired to the curb by a traffic officer and given a ticket for speeding. Could you deduct the amount of the fine on your next income tax return as a "business expense"?

No. The law does allow you to deduct the "ordinary and necessary" expenses of doing business. But as a matter of public policy, courts usually will not recognize lawbreaking as ordinary and necessary. For if such deductions were



allowed, the law would be imposing a penalty with one hand and "taking the sting" out of the penalty with the other.

However, a violation of law might involve other expenses, besides the fine itself, that would be perfectly legitimate deductions. Thus:

A businessman was found guilty of mail fraud. On his next tax return, he claimed a deduction for the legal expenses he had incurred in defending himself. Tax officials objected to the deduction, saying he never would have had those expenses if he had not broken the law in the first place. But the court felt otherwise, and allowed the deduction to be taken.

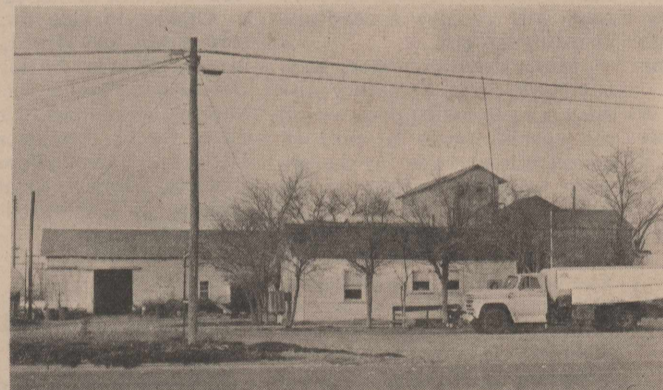
"No public policy is offended," said the court. "When a man faced with serious criminal charges employs a lawyer to help in his defense. It is his constitutional right."

Suppose you spend money on something which, while not strictly illegal, is still unethical. Consider this situation:

A manufacturer paid secret kickbacks to certain purchasing agents, in return for their giving preference to his products. Later, he tried to deduct these payments as business expenses.

But the court said such payments were not deductible even if they were within the letter of the law. Finding no evidence that kickbacks were common in this particular line of business, the judge said:

"The mores of the market place of this nation (are) not such that kickbacks, while they do occur, are an ordinary means of securing or promoting business."

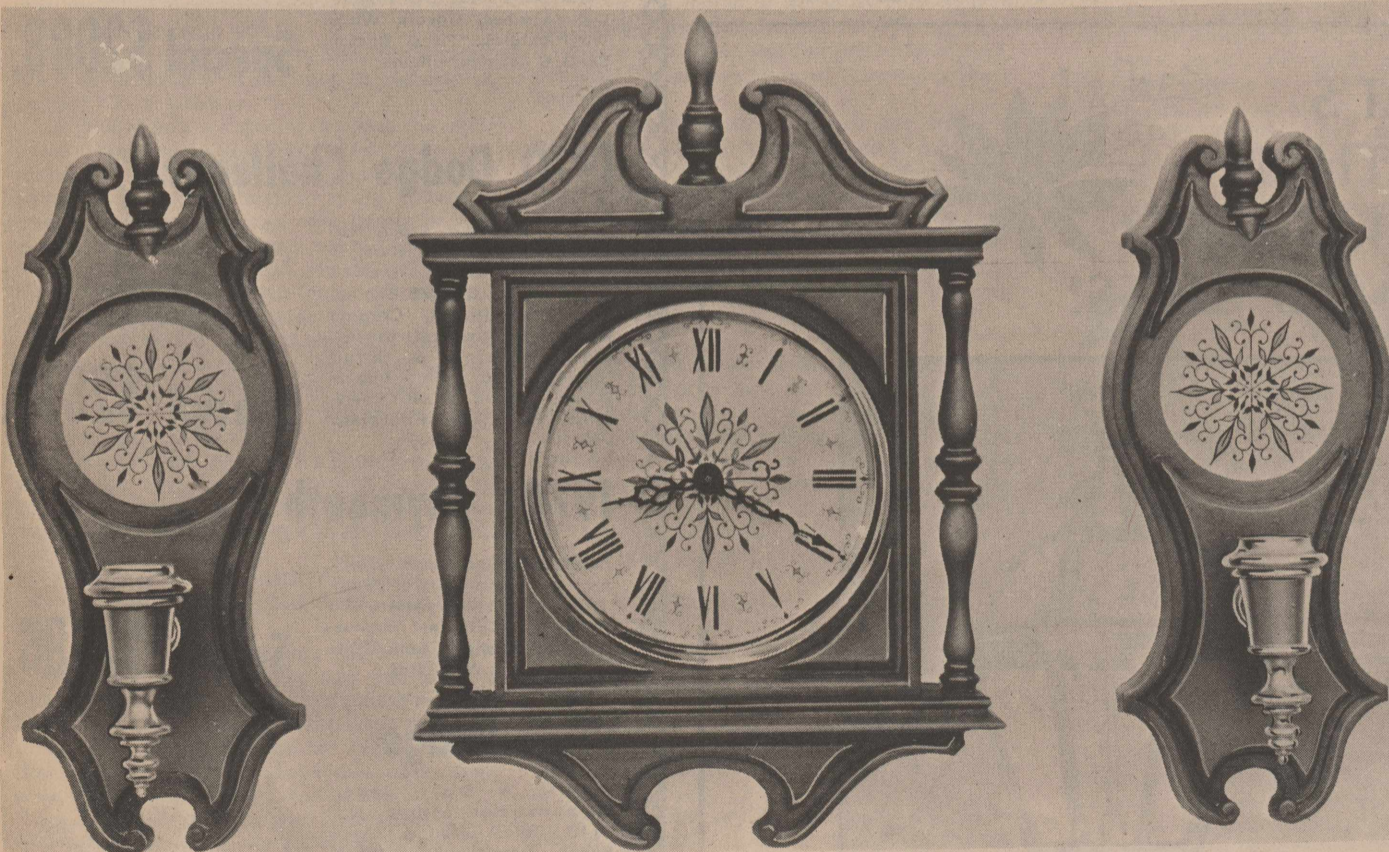

### Lamb Countians Attend National NFO Convention

Three Lamb County couples have returned home from Louisville, Ky. where they attended, as delegates, the national convention of the National Farmers Organization.

Attending were Mr. and Mrs. Larry Witten and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Lewis, all of Olton, and Mr. and Mrs. R. O. Dickson of Earth.

A record 14,000 voting delegates attended the two days of meetings, which charted the future of agriculture and strengthened the position of the family type farm in rural America.

The largest farm convention in American history, the meeting featured reports from various commodity department heads which illustrated price increases being received by NFO members for their products through the NFO collective bargaining program. Growth of the organization also was reflected by the reports of many new commodities added to the bargaining program.

Oren Lee Staley of Rea, Mo., national president, in his State of Affairs message, said, "For the first time in the history of agriculture, a coordinated bargaining program in all 48 states of the continental United States is operating or has the capability of operation, which makes the NFO structure a total collective bargaining structure."

He also pointed out the role of the small businessman in the battle for rural America survival. "In a corporate agriculture structure, small businessmen will go down the drain along with the farmer."

Delegates were told that the first two years of the 70's will decide whether the family type farms or corporate ventures will supply the nation's foods.

A "gigantic" organizational drive is planned for this winter, designed to contact every farmer who is not a member of the NFO and ask him to join.

Delegates were told that stepped-up bargaining efforts will be designed to secure more contracts and to improve the contracts the NFO already has in operation and to secure added block bargaining.

The organization believes its holding actions of various

farm commodities is a major factor in winning goals. Spot holding actions will be used as needed and are now in use on such products as grain sorghum, durum wheat and some other feed grains in various areas.

Staley was re-elected president and Erhard Pringsten of Sergeant Bluff, Iowa was re-named vice president.

Spot interviews, made at the convention, reflected the farmers' view of the necessity of collective bargaining.

An Oregon farmer said, "I'm staking everything on the NFO. If it goes down the drain, I go down the drain."

Most of the 540 acres he farms is leased, he said. He grows potatoes, peppermint oil, grain and Kentucky bluegrass seed.

"Not one of those crops," he said, "can I sell above costs."

A 61-year-old farmer from Illinois explained he has a farm and machinery representing an investment of more than \$100,000 but his income this year won't be \$5,000.

"I used to make more than that farming on the shares," he said. It's not so much what we get, it's the cost. It used to be, when you'd get \$250 for a steer, some of it was yours. Now you put that much in him."

"I like farming, it's a good life - the best in the world. But you can't do it at a loss."

High costs of operating were cited time and time again as responsible for the profit squeeze.

Now he had, "It was a dark and stormy night." In the final sketch he comes up with a bit of wisdom, "Good writing is hard work".

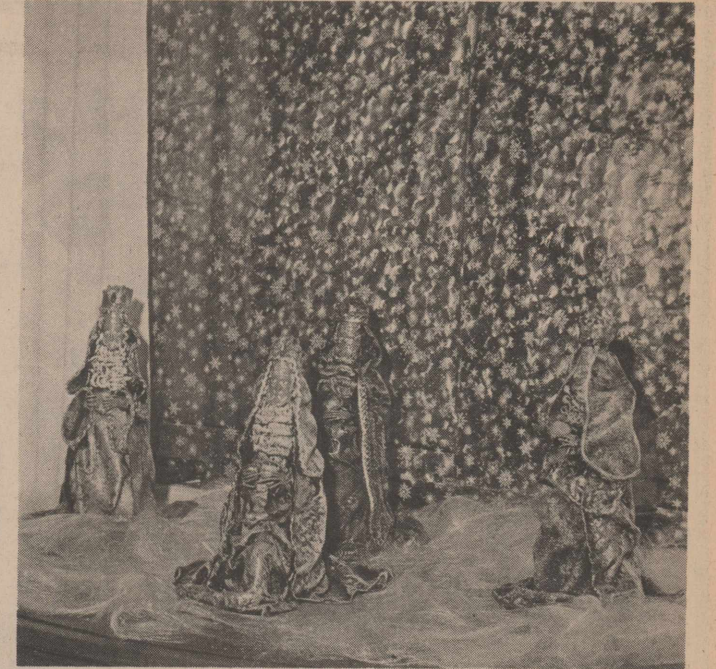
There's a dog after my own heart! I wish I had one just like him.

I came uneasy to my country. My birth was shrouded by the clouds of war.

I was far too young to have had a hand in it - - but I was, after all, born in one of the Axis nations. After living a year under Russian occupation, I had a chance of meeting the fighting men of America. And I knew that instead of bringing revenge they brought gum.

And they talked about home. They talked eternally about home.

They were strange men on a strange ground and while we, as children, looked up to them, they still scared us a little. But as the years passed, and the talk became deeds, the fear was replaced by respect. America put away bitterness, not to be forgotten, but so it wouldn't interfere with the main job of helping people.

Because of my experiences, the opportunity of living in the United States gives the words, "Peace on Earth Toward All Men of Good Will", a deeper meaning to me.

Now, as another Christmas approaches, it's my strange fighting men on another strange ground.

Now, as then, it's hard to be away from home at Christmas.

Now, as then, there's a reason it has to be done.

Occupation by Chairman Mao is no different from occupation by the Russians. Czechoslovakia wants freedom as much as America but doesn't have the means to pursue and retain it. Whereas freedom is the right, at birth, of all men, we find it our duty to answer the call and come to the assistance of freedom seeking men.

We struggle for this principle in the session halls of the United Nations.

We struggle for this principle in the

emerging nations.

We struggle for this principle in our own country.

And we struggle hardest for this principle in the unhappy swamps of Viet Nam.

So it can be the happy Christmas it should be. Our young men are standing in another part of the world. Their seats at the dinner table are empty. Their graduation suits hang empty in our closets. Their cars sit empty in the sheds. But there's no emptiness in our hearts.

We haven't asked that he stand for liberty, only to take away our support in his struggle. We haven't joined with his enemy to defeat his aim. And we won't let him down by misinforming him about our feelings.

This Christmas it's time for a moratorium. A moratorium against doubt. A moratorium against failure to speak up. A moratorium to reassure our brothers and sons that we know why they can't be with us and that we're sharing the pain of their absence.

It didn't make headlines because it was done thoughtfully and quietly, but just a few weeks ago, in thousands of smaller communities across the nation, Americans stood in chill winds in parks and on court house lawns. They heard amateur speakers give voice on Veteran's Day to the real feelings in the land. Feelings which tend to be smothered by shouting antics in Chicago court rooms. The deeper feelings which must be conveyed to the Americans who stand for us in the defense of freedom.
