Will Play Ralls Postponed Game October 30

Rain postponed the Ralls Jackrabbits-Floydada Whirlwind game on Wednesday night. Friday night, school officials agreeing that conditions under foot and overhead were too severe for any test of relative strength of the two teams in their interscholastic rivalry.

Rain already fallen had the ground soggy and slippery while continued downpour threatened right up to game time.

Re-sampling their schedules this week following the announcement that Paducah Dragons are dropping out of the conference competition, the Ralls and Floydada teams found they could play their game on October 30, the original date on which Floydada was scheduled to meet Paducah, and it was so agreed.

So football fans of Floydada will still get to see a home game between the Whirlwinds and the Jackrabbits on Wednesday night. Further announcements concerning the game will be made by school officials, as to hours, officials, et cetera.

Mrs. G. I. Britain, 85, Wife Of Beloved Pioneer Minister, Died Thursday In Plainview

Mrs. G. I. Britain, 85, wife of a pioneer West Texas minister, died at a Plainview hospital last Thursday night, after a serious illness of several weeks.

Funeral services were held at the Plainview First Baptist church Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Rev. L. B. Reavis, pastor and Rev. R. C. Malone, Baptist minister residing in Plainview, officiated. Frank Day and Mrs. Clinton Walter sang.

The body lay in state at the church for an hour preceding the funeral service. Burial was made in the Plainview cemetery under the direction of the W. M. Lemons Funeral home.

"Mother" Britain was born April 14, 1856, in Claiborne Parish, Louisiana, and moved to Texas with her parents when a child, settling at Nacogdoches.

Married 66 Years Ago
She and Rev. Britain were married almost 66 years ago, December 7, 1876. Five years later he entered the ministry. Since that time the couple has resided at many points between Nacogdoches and Plainview, their course leading ever westward to the Plains where Mrs. Britain took great interest in church work.

The couple pioneered along, literally building up churches where brush arbores stood when Rev. Britain came, only to move on to new fields when the work was done.

Weatherford, Jacksboro, Matador, Floydada, Perryton, Plainview and Oilton are among the places where the family resided and where Mrs. Britain did her share in the churches as well as helping rear her family.

Lived Here Several Years
Rev. Britain was pastor of the Floydada Baptist church for several years, coming here in 1909 and moving away in 1915.

Among those attending the funeral services were Mrs. E. P. Nelson, Rev. and Mrs. L. A. Doyle, Mrs. C. Surgen, Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Burrows, Mrs. Fannie Montague, A. B. Clark, Mrs. Robert Garrett and R. Fred Brown.

Besides her husband, Mrs. Britain is survived by four children, W. E. Britain, Akron, Ohio; G. M. Britain, Los Angeles, California; E. M. Britain, Plainview; and Mrs. S. W. Shaver, Fort Worth. Mrs. Shaver and the son, who resides in Plainview were at the bedside when Mrs. Britain died. Six grand children and six great grandchildren, and one sister, Mrs. Susan Berry, Nacogdoches also survive.

Trial Of Robert McEachern Set For Today

Robert McEachern, indicted by the Floyd county grand jury, last week is scheduled to be held today, and a petit jury for the purpose was ordered by District Judge Aton B. Chapman in District court.

Two indictments were returned against the Lubbock man, one indictment carrying two counts. He is alleged by the state to have stolen tires from a passenger automobile belonging to Herwin Strickland in Floydada one night last June. At the same time, according to allegations, he fraudulently took a car belonging to Robert Carter. Both cars were found stripped of tires and wheels the next morning on the Q. A. & P. right-of-way in the southeast suburbs of Floydada. Most of the tires later were recovered in Lubbock, and wheels corresponding to those belonging to the cars were recovered on the highway.

Among the cases disposed of to date at this term was that of G. L. Cardinal vs. D. L. Handley, which was dismissed by the court. Two divorces were granted last week. Decree of divorce was entered dissolving the marriage relation between Curtis Potest and Ruth Potest, and Roy Hollingsworth similarly was granted divorce from Annie Laura Hollingsworth.

Judgment favoring the plaintiff was rendered in the suit of Alliance Life Insurance company to recover title on foreclosure of vendor's lien against the estate of Cora M. Worthington and others. Title to 200 acres of land was vested in the plaintiff with an order to the sheriff to give plaintiff possession within 30 days. The land is composed of 17.8 acres of land out of Survey 70, Block G, EL & RR company, and 22.2 acres out of the southeast part of Survey 73, same block. The court found that title to an irrigation pump, gearhead, casing and appurtenances on the land was subject to a superior lien of the First National company of Lockney.

November Ninth Date Set For Registration

DALLAS, Oct. 22.—With gasoline-mileage rationing to start a month from now, interest of southwestern motorists centers in plans for registration.

The period of registering every passenger car actually starts next week when the County War Price and Rationing Board will make available at centrally located places the application forms that every car owner will have to fill out to obtain his ration book. The filled in application forms will be turned in beginning November 9 at school houses and other designated registration places. Start of rationing is set for November 22.

Between now and registration November 9, everyone has the opportunity to learn the part he is called on to play to reduce the nation's use of rubber and how to qualify for a mileage rationing book.

The first requirement to obtain a ration book will be to dispose of all tires in excess of five for each passenger car. This can be done by taking the surplus tires to the nearest Railway Express office or in cities where there is an express pickup service the express company will call for the tires if notified by telephone or mail. The tires may be contributed or sold to the government. When they are turned over to the express company, receipts will be given and in the case of sale, the government will mail a check to the owner.

The serial number of each tire will have to be given on the ration application for each car.

Between now and the start of rationing persons driving their cars to and from work should get a ride swapping club in operation as such ride sharing will be a necessary requirement to obtain supplemental gasoline for excessive mileage.

Above all, each driver should stay under 35 miles an hour.

Hits Floyd County Farmers
ODT's drastic, widespread truck order goes into effect November 15, 1942. Farmers who own trucks, including "pick-ups," and truckers who haul farm products from the farm and supplies to the farm are asked to go to their County Farm Transportation Committee October 22, 23, or 24, for assistance in filling out applications for "Certificates of War Necessity." Many of these applications are now in the mail having been mailed from Detroit, Michigan.

In Floyd County the office of the County Farm Transportation Committee is in the Agricultural Building, Floydada, Texas.

"Certificates of War Necessity" must be carried on all operating commercial vehicles including farm trucks after November 15. No gasoline, tires, or repair parts can be obtained without the certificate. This is a part of the Office of Defense Transportation's nation-wide program to enforce conservation of rubber and automobile equipment.

Direction of this conservation effort in rural areas has been placed in County Farm Transportation committees. The local committee is composed of the following members: Paul Snodgrass, South Plains, Chairman; W. Edd Brown, Floydada; Cecil Purcell, Quataque; Clement McDonald, Floydada; V. D. Turner, Floydada.

The committee urges the cooperation of every truck or pick-up owner in Floyd county in order that the present vehicles may be kept rolling. The trucks now available are carrying a tremendous volume of property. Our railroads are operating to near capacity. Our country will suffer severely, if the trucks and other commercial vehicles find themselves unable to continue to handle this essential traffic. There is grave danger that our supply of all types of commercial vehicles will be badly depleted, unless we conserve them to the utmost.

This means that these vehicles and their tires must be given the best possible care; they must be driven with equal care; and every mile of unnecessary operation must cease. Your welfare and the safety of our country demand that this be done.

Accordingly, the ODT will issue a Certificate of War Necessity which will govern the maximum mileage to be operated and the minimum loads to be carried.

EDITORIALS

Warning! Gas rationing is here or will be in a few weeks. It may have you guessing how you are going to carry on your operations, especially if you live on a farm or have farm operations that must be done. We strongly urge that you do not attempt to store against your future needs unless you can be sure that you use approved storage equipment and handle gasoline in a manner approved by the fire underwriters. Long experience has taught oil companies how to handle this extremely dangerous fluid with a minimum of danger. But your long use of it for utility purposes may have dulled your sense of the danger you are in every minute you are in the proximity of a barrel of gas. Gasoline's first flash has nearly as much explosive power as TNT itself. It is a mankiller if there ever was one when it is not handled properly. If you are not equipped to store it properly do not attempt it! The risk is too big. Doubtless there will be found a way to keep your business going, necessary as it is to the welfare of the nation. The authorities are not going to cripple industry any more than they have to, if they know it. Better to take your chances with gas rationing than with gasoline itself.

Remember your tax bill. It is going to be "too high" as all tax bills always are. But we mean new kinds of taxes that you never heard of. If you make as much as \$12 a week you'll be in on some kind of internal revenue tax beginning in January and if you make two or three thousand dollars this year your bill will range upward from \$200. Better put the money in tax certificates or something of the kind. Don't get your surplus money spent for anything but debts. The national income is going to be so much bigger than the goods available to buy that the authorities are going to "drain" your surplus into taxes to keep you from helping make a runaway market and bring on even greater ruin to the country. That is one of the things they mean when you read about heading off inflation.

Last spring when the Red Cross made its war drive for fifty million dollars the people of the United States responded with a subscription of \$70,500,000, enough to run the organization until away into March of next year, officials say. Accordingly there will be no membership drive this fall and no more funds are contemplated being asked until next spring. At this time, an official report says that more than half of the funds of the Red Cross are going to direct services to the armed forces. In time of war the Red Cross has no difficulty getting money, all it needs, from the people, a fact which has been demonstrated again.

When you get right down to it the thoughtful live stock man will tell you that swine and cattle are selling too high on the market, their thought being especially from the viewpoint of the industry. Pendulums swing back and forth and the tremendously out-of-line prices now for live stock mean hard days some of these times for the man who raises and feeds hogs and cattle for a living. Singularly the live stock man, wherever you find him, is the least grasping as a rule of all the people. He wants to make a living, yes, and he is entirely willing for everybody else to live and live well. But he doesn't want too much for his stuff and he hopes the "government" will just leave him alone. Being broke and worse than broke is not a new experience in the life of a man who follows live-stock for his livelihood.

Lots of people's incomes are what they can't live without or within.

The Hesperian's weather department, having gone all out for a late frost, for the benefit of the country in general and because that is what nature's signs say, also for late feed growers and the women who want to get all the tomatoes they can before they pull the green ones for chow chow—having gone all out for a late first killing frost or freeze, we now turn to the winter months, foreseeing the need of a good many out-of-doors people, especially cattlemen and dairymen for plenty of warm clothes beginning probably in December and certainly not later than January. The country seriously needs a cold winter in the battle against the worm and other insects. They are spreading north from the equatorial area on account of mild winters and mankind will be helpless against them in this part of the world next year unless General Winter lends his aid. So all the signs have worked out for them who serve the Lord in this moral vineyard. And the warning is get set. To get what we need on our own home front and what the Russians need as well in the Caucasus mountains, we are going to have plenty of warm clothing and have our live stock protected against prolonged cold. We might, indeed, have a spell hitting in mid-January or early February and not see the ground for two to four weeks. Get your feed stacked so you can handle it in really cold weather and get plenty of it close to the lots, barns or fields where you keep the cattle. Don't put it off and don't sell your feed down too close.

Motion picture exhibitors are doing their utmost to get producers of cinema stories to give them something besides war pictures, but the producers, wise or not, keep on putting the war in every reel of film they send out. Even the westerns have the war in them. Exhibitors say that the people see and hear and talk war and have it banged into them from all sides practically every waking hour. If for relaxation they go to the show they would like to relax. But no, the producer says, and he gives them some more war. And the folks stay away because they want something else.

No use to worry about the abundance of rain although we will continue to do so. Too much rain last year cost Floyd county people so much money they had almost as soon have had too much dry. While cotton is not damaging so seriously the feed crop, in the shock or in the field, could and might very easily deteriorate in value. A lot of folks have stock contracted for to feed on the abundant crop. They are watching the outcome of the weather closer than most anybody else.

Last Tuesday night the black velvet of the night was broken by the street lamps near the depot in Lubbock, making bright silver pools here and there, catching like bits of fire on the brass buttons of army officers, the train conductor and the rows of waiting milk cans. Steam hissed from the train that was being boarded by silent, sober-faced men and boys, dressed in Uncle Sam's uniforms. Groups with strained faces stood here and there, tears choked back, heads high. My husband and I stood with the little family of our son as we saw him off. How handsome he looked in his new officer's uniform! Our minds ran back to the soldier's suit a little boy wore so proudly in the last war. No, we never thought then that one day he would wear the real thing. Our hearts seemed to burst as we saw him tell his wife and children good-bye. How can children understand that daddy has to go away from them! But it is for his own children a man has to do his duty to his country. To keep them from being slaves to inhuman masters. The conductor said, "all aboard," the train pulled out with bell ringing and whistle blowing. The rails began to clack, "he is gone, he is gone" but far stronger from our son, "Why of course I am coming back." Some how the blackness of the night being dispelled by the pools of silver light comforted us. The train, heavily loaded creeping along with its cars of soldiers, was taking part of an army to bring light to a world, darkened with terror and death and our dearly beloved son was taking the skill of his trained doctor's hands to do his part in bringing the light.

Dr. Peterson, Minnesota College of Agriculture has rigged up a mechanical cow in his laboratory "It consists of a set of glass tubes, rubber hose, an air pump, a motor, a synthetic heart which he asserts is less famous but more practical than the Charles A. Wish I could trade places with the professor for this winter and sit in a warm room on a padded stool and milk the mechanical cow and tell farmers what they have known from time immemorial. "Felix, how many times have I told you not to run the cows in from the pasture. Nettie makes the children stop their crying. Old Dribblet will not give a drop of milk. Steve you know that cow does not like you. No need to try to get her milk." Thus grandmother warned years ago before she knew about any mechanical cows or what professors said. I cannot explain why but perhaps the professor could why the freezing winds of winter come in at even the tiniest crack in the barn while even the stiffest summer wind cannot enter the wide open doors. So, so, bossy, bossy. You know I like you. Why are you suspicious of me. Good old cow, now, you be still. Why you old heathenish critter, I will knock your leg off, if you do not keep it on the ground.

As I was a little older I tried to see after her, not that she needed it, but it seemed as necessary to me as did the silk string with pendant of assofoetida she wore around her plump white neck. All through the years we have been friends. Her pleasant smile and friendly ways have been help to many as they have come and gone through the years, she on one side of a drygoods counter, and they on the other. Here is wishing her a quick return to health and to the work she loves and to the friends who love her.

Miss Blanche Groves, sister of Mrs. E. R. Borum and missionary in China the past 22 years, was guest speaker Monday afternoon at a tea held at the First Baptist church by the women of the Woman's Missionary union of the church. She is in the employ of the Southern Baptist Mission board.

Miss Groves returned to America recently from the occupied city of Soochow, China. She left there under military orders in April and was detained in Shanghai until June 29, when she boarded a repatriation boat that arrived in Rio de Janeiro two months later.

"No words are adequate to express the privilege and joy of being here," the speaker said. She brought great interest from women in China, who through the influence and prayers of America have been freed from slavery and paganism. "During recent years, footbinding has been eliminated," she said. She voiced gratitude from hundreds, who have escaped death because of God's protecting power and prayer.

News Not Exaggerated

"I doubt if the things you have read about the horrors of war in Japan have been exaggerated," Miss Groves said. "Ten years ago parents of Soochow, Shanghai, and all the cities of China were giving up their sons, husbands, fathers and daughters for military service and training."

"The war has brought to the peoples of China a series of horrors, wholesale rapings, black lists, assassinations and revivals of opium dens. Many times the missionaries stood guard between Japanese soldiers and the young women of China," the speaker said.

Reaction To War

Missionary Groves told of first reactions to war. "Cities are deserted, the people seek a place for shelter, several families occupying the same air raid shelter for safety. As the air clears of the hum of planes and smoke, and becomes silent, people return to the city to find their homes shattered, pillaged or in ashes. Many families live together and gradually take up life anew, piecing together, as best they can, the normal life they left off."

Things Are Unimportant

"Lovely homes, beautiful furniture and furnishings and personal treasures all become secondary in thought in times of war. Chinese women, through it all have been able to maintain poise, hope, beautiful spirit, with courage and patience."

"Women have turned to duties in hospitals and clinics that are established everywhere making surgical dressings and relief."

They are carrying on the Christian work under the great Christian leader Madam Chiang Kia Shek, wife of the great generalissimo of China.

Japs Take Over Schools

"In 1937 one of the first things the Japs did was to occupy a lot of Mission property. On December 8 all property was confiscated by the Japanese government. Guards would make regular visits to every home to make inspections and inventories."

"Living costs have become exorbitant. The people of occupied China are facing a slow starvation as a result of exceedingly high prices of foods. One pound of baking powder sells at \$144.00, one chicken sells at \$60.00 Chinese currency. Shortages of necessities are evident everywhere. Foreign relief committees

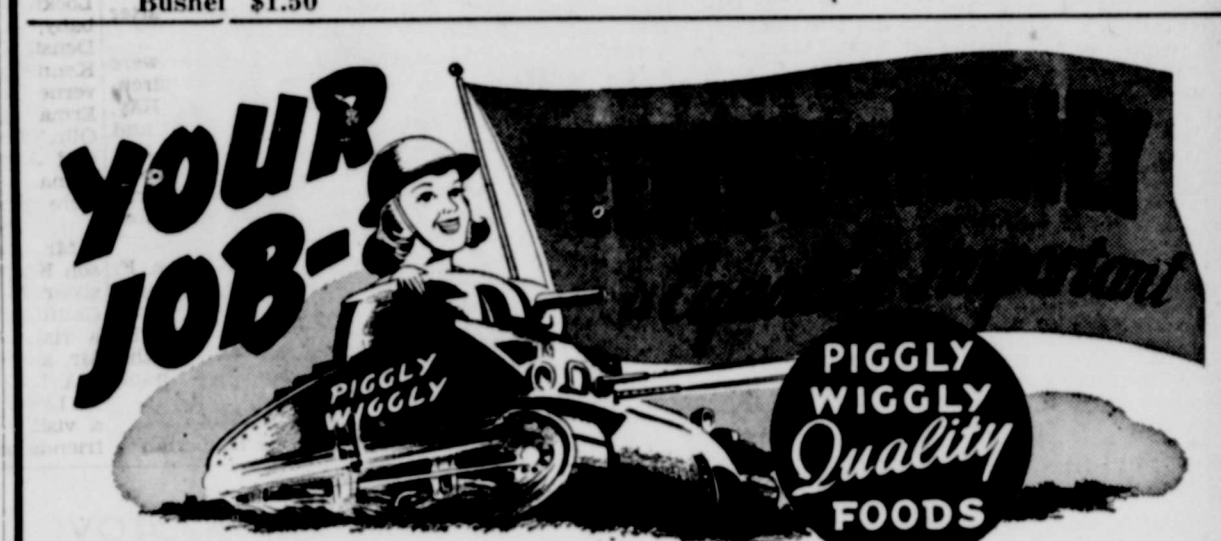
