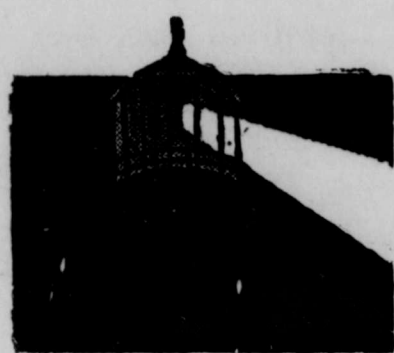

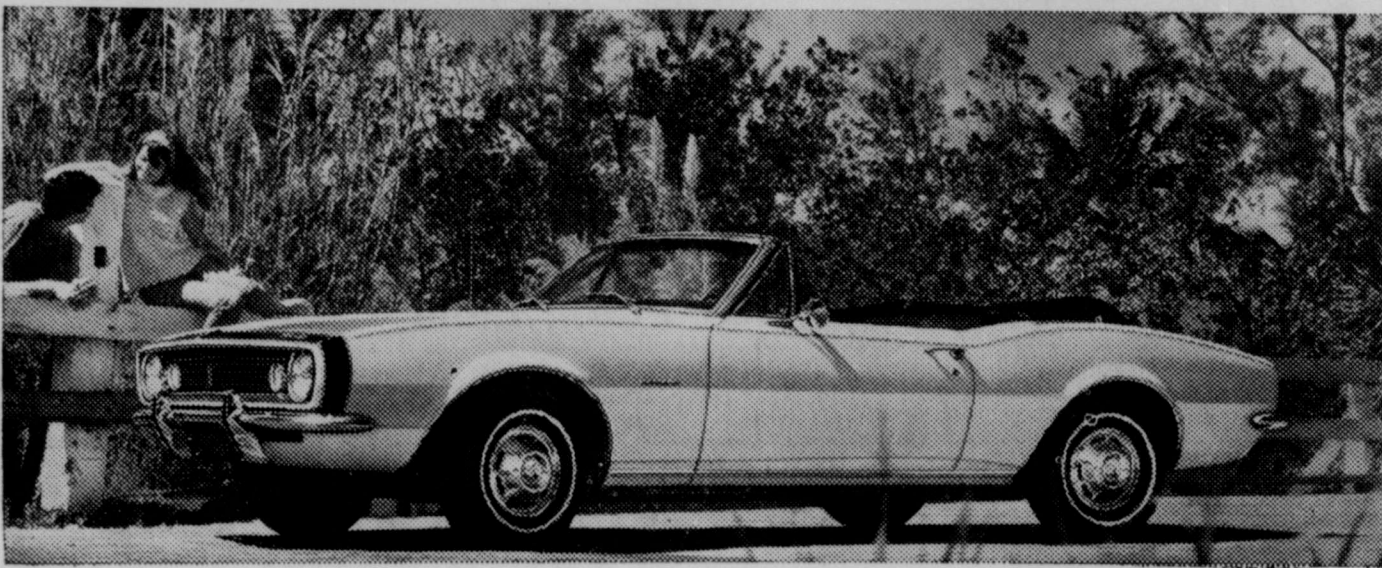

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First Cotton Buyer to Collect Research and Promotion Funds

Proposed legislation designating the first buyer as collecting handler of a \$1 bale assessment to finance a cotton research and promotion program have been approved by the Cotton Board, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The Cotton Board will administer the program with the assistance of USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service.

The rules will not be final until interested persons have an opportunity to file views and comments and until approved by the Secretary of Agriculture. Comments may be filed up to April 24.

The first buyer who will collect the assessment from producers would include persons, firms, or associations who assume the producer's interest in a bale of cotton through outright purchase, an advance or loan, or by crediting a producer's account with the value of his cotton.

The regulations adopted by the Board also cover such matters as reports and records required of collectors and reporting handlers, and refunds of assessments to producers who

do not desire to participate in the Research and Promotion Program.

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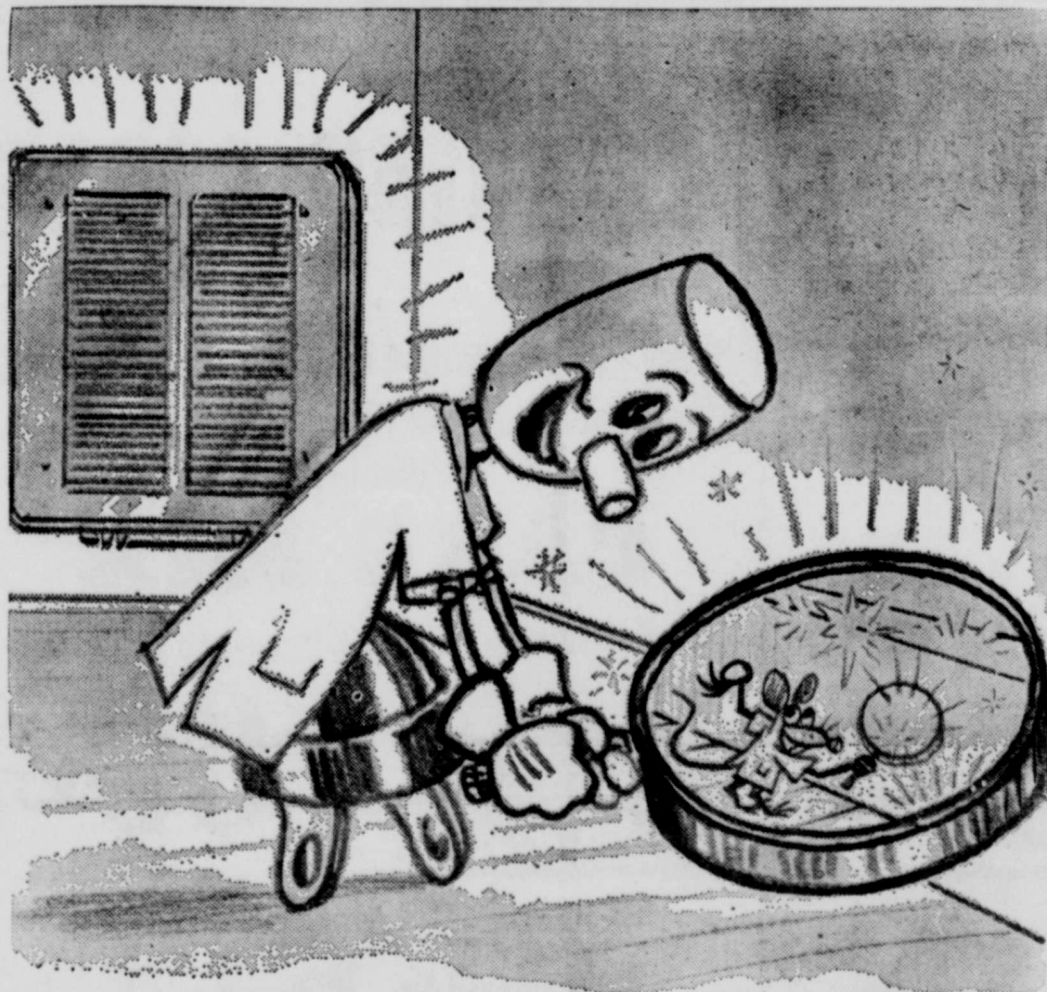
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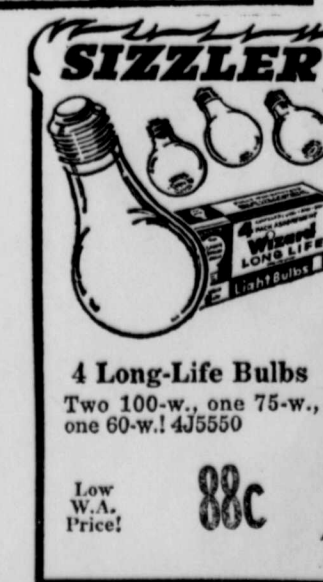
