FOOD AND LABOR ECONOMIES.

We, of necessity, do much planning to get a dollar's worth of food from the dollar expended. Now, dinners of function do not exceed five courses, while in the home a four-course dinner is sufficiently elaborate to suit the most fastidious. Many clever ideas sprang up during the press of war which are too fine to be ever given up. Among these is the plate dinner served in so many restaurants. Meat and vegetables side by side in one receptacle, which reduces the work of serving and dish washing. In the home such dishes as can be cooked and served with the main course in one dish have become very popular.

The serving table or wheeled tray now appears with three stories, so the maidless home may have served the entire dinner with very few steps.

The sonning of linen has brought us to bare tables with dollies and runners, which saves us laundry bills and much work. The oilcloth table sets have been a wonderful blessing in many families and the use of the paper napkin is not to be despised.

Living quarters have been reduced until the living room and dining room in many apartments must of necessity be one. The gate-leg table which may be pushed back against the wall when not in use or can serve as the library table when not dining; with screens to use in the room to give some privacy; a couch by day will be the sleeping quarters at night; all add to the comfort.

While we are all working to simplify our mode of living to give us more time to do the things worth while, let us at this season do away with half or more of the bric-a-brac, pictures and other things which are only a weariness to the flesh. In this way, by changing about in spring and fall, we will enjoy and appreciate each piece and picture more fully.

A home to be comfortable and home-like need not be crowded with things; the things we use and enjoy are the only necessary furnishings, and the more space around them the more comfort and enjoyment we will have.

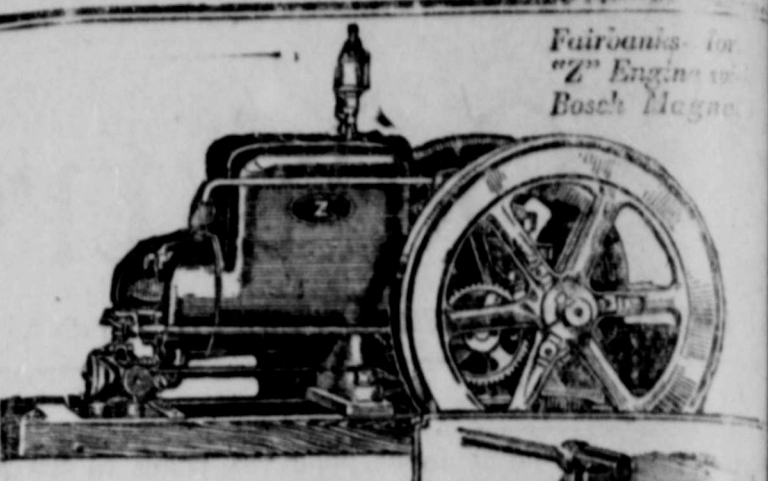

ORDINANCE NO. 34

AN ORDINANCE providing for the working of Streets, Alley and Public Grounds in the City of Perryton by able bodied males between the ages of 21 and 45 excepting Ministers of the Gospel; the furnishing of a substitute, or payment of money in lieu thereof; manner of enforcing those liable to work, and prescribing a penalty for violation of this ordinance, etc.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PERRYTON, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. WHO IS LIABLE TO ROAD DUTY: All able bodied male persons above the age of twenty-one and not over forty-five years of age, except ministers of the Gospel, shall be liable to, and it is hereby made their duty, to work on, repair and clean out the public streets, alleys and public grounds of the City of Perryton, Texas, under the provisions and regulations of this ordinance.

SECTION 2. No person who has not been a resident of the City of Perryton, Texas, for fifteen days immediately preceding the summons to work on such streets, shall be liable or compelled to work on said streets.

SECTION 3. Any person liable to street duty, and who has been summoned to do such duty, shall have the privilege to furnish an able-bodied substitute to work in his place, which substitute shall be accepted by the person in charge of such work, if he is capable of performing a reasonable amount of work; otherwise, he shall not be accepted.

SECTION 4. Every person liable to work on streets, by paying the Mayor or City Secretary of the City of Perryton, at any time before the day appointed to work the streets, the sum of \$1.00 for each day that he is summoned to work, shall be exempt

from working each day paid for, and also exempt from any penalties for failure to work for the time which he has so paid.

SECTION 5. Each person summoned to work on the streets shall take with him such tools as he shall be directed by the party summoning him for such work, provided the tools required in such summons are such as the party summoned may be able to bring, and are adapted to the work to be performed.

SECTION 6. It shall be the duty of each street hand to perform his duties in accordance with the directions of the overseer of the work being done, and a day's work, within the meaning of this ordinance, shall be eight hours efficient service, when said service is voluntarily performed.

SECTION 7. No person shall be liable for more than five days work on the public streets and alleys of said town in any one year.

SECTION 8. The word "street" wherever used in this ordinance shall be construed to include all public alleys, parks and other public grounds of said city, whether specially mentioned or not.

SECTION 9. Any person liable to street work under this ordinance, by payment of \$4.00 on or before the 15th day of July, 1921, and on or before the 31st day of January, in each and every year thereafter, shall be exempt from working the streets for the year in which the same is paid, provided, said sum may be paid to the Mayor, City Marshal or City Secretary, either of whom shall issue a receipt to the party paying showing the payment of such sum, and such receipt shall be conclusive proof of the exemption from street work of the holder thereof.

SECTION 10. The Mayor of the City of Perryton, Texas, shall have the power to summons out all persons liable to street work at any time the Mayor may deem it necessary, or when ordered by the City Council, and such hand, may be called out in detail, or the whole force at any one time, as may be deemed best, or as they may be directed, for the better improvement of the public streets, alleys and grounds of said city.

SECTION 11. It shall be the duty of the Mayor to give three days previous notice, by summons in person or in writing, to each person liable to street work, of the time and place and when and where such person is required to appear to work on the streets, and the number of days such person will be required to work, and the name of the person who will be in charge of the work for the city.

SECTION 12. If the summons be in writing it may be served by leaving a copy at the usual place of business of the person summoned, or if he has no fixed place of business, then by mailing a copy addressed to him with proper postage paid, and deposited in the Post Office at Perryton, Texas, the Mayor may serve the same by posting it on the door of the place of abode, and when so served, it may be served by the city Marshal.

SECTION 13. The Mayor shall have the power to appoint some one to summon the hands to work on the streets, and such person shall be exempt from working on the streets as many days as he was actually engaged in summoning the hands.

SECTION 14. It shall be the duty of the Mayor, or the overseer of the work, or any person by him appointed to summon hands for street work, within ten days after he has had the streets worked, to file with the City Attorney, or with the Mayor where the summons was served by his appointee, a complaint in writing and under oath against each person who has been summoned to work the streets and who has failed to work and failed to pay one dollar for each day he has failed to work or furnish a substitute, and also against each person so summoned who has refused to do a reasonable amount of work or who has refused to perform the reasonable directions of the overseer of such work, named in the summons sent him.

SECTION 15. All the money paid into the City in lieu of working on the streets, by persons liable therefor, shall be placed in the City Treasury to the credit of the Street Improvement Fund, and shall not be expended for any other purpose than for the improvement of the streets,

alleys and public grounds of such city.

SECTION 16. If any person, liable to street work upon the public streets, alleys and grounds of the City of Perryton, Texas, after being legally summoned, shall fail or refuse to attend, either in person or by able and competent substitute, or fail or refuse to bring tools at the time and place designated by the person summoning him, or to pay to such Mayor or Marshal or Secretary the sum of one dollar for each day he may have been notified to work on the streets, alleys and public grounds, or, having attended, shall fail or refuse to perform good service or any other duty required of him by this ordinance, or the person under whom he may work, or, if any one shall fail to comply with any duty required of him as provided in this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, fined in any sum not exceeding twenty-five dollars.

SECTION 17. All money collected in fines for violations of this ordinance shall be credited to the Street Improvement Fund of said City, and shall not be diverted or used for any purpose other than the improvement of the public streets, alleys and grounds of said city.

This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage and publication for the time required by law, when the same shall be signed by the Mayor and attested by the Secretary, with the seal of said City affixed.

GOOD THINGS.

A good dish to use up baked beans is the following:

Baked-Bean Soup.—Put two cupfuls of cold baked beans, four cupfuls of water, two slices of onion and a few celery leaves in a saucepan and let simmer one hour. Put through a sieve with one cupful of stewed tomatoes and two table-spoonfuls of chili sauce; season with salt and pepper, bring to the boiling point and thicken with one table-spoonful of butter cooked with one table-spoonful of flour. Serve with croutons.

Sponge Pound Cake.—Beat one-half cupful of butter to a cream, add the grated rind of a lemon and gradually beat in one-half cupful of sugar and the beaten yolks of four eggs, one cupful of flour sifted again with one table-spoonful of cornstarch and a tea-spoonful of baking powder; lastly fold in the stiffly-beaten whites and bake in a loaf thirty to forty minutes. This recipe makes a cake of sponge cake texture; for finer-grained cake use one-half tea-spoonful of baking powder.

Prune Whip Parfait.—Take one-half cupful of stewed prunes, stoned and mashed, one-half cupful of raisins, seeded and boiled in water to keep from burning, a pinch of salt, eight marshmallows cut up in a half-cupful of cream or rich milk and steamed in a double boiler until soft, then beaten smooth. Into the marshmallow mixture whip the other ingredients and set away to chill. When ready to serve heap in sherbet glasses, pour over a little whipped cream and sprinkle with broken pecan nuts.

Egg Scrambled With Ham.—Break three or four eggs into a saucepan, add a little milk, seasoning of salt and pepper and butter, then add a half cupful of chopped cooked ham; stir until well mixed and serve with buttered toast and fried potatoes.

NOTICE OF ELECTION

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Perryton, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said city for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PERRYTON, TEXAS, that an election be held on the 16th day of July, 1921, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

Shall the City Council of the City of Perryton, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of the City of Perryton, Texas, in the sum of Seven Thousand (\$7,000.00), Dollars, payable 20 years after date thereof, with option of redemption at any time after 10 years from their date, bearing interest at the rate of Six per cent per annum payable semiannually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of construction and improvement of the roads, bridges and streets, in the City of Perryton, Texas, as authorized by Chapter 1, Title 18 R. The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 18, Revised Civil Statutes, 1911, and Chapter 9, Acts 1921, Regular Session Thirty-seventh Legislature, and the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of said City, shall be allowed to vote.

All those opposed shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of Perryton, attested by the City Secretary of said City, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of the election to be posted up at the court house door, and at two other public places within the City of Perryton, for at least thirty days prior to the day of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election, published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city, and which notice shall be published once each week for four weeks, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty days prior to the date of the election.
