3-2 Vote Turns Down Loraine's Fire Request

A split vote in Commissioners Court Tuesday denied Loraine its request for a \$75 per call rural firefighting contract with the county.

The 3 to 2 turn down of Loraine's proposal came after three Loraine city officials conferred for almost 2 hours with commissioners.

Their appeal had been for "the same as Colorado City", which the night before had approved to a new 5-year, \$74 per call firefighting offer from the county.

But Commissioners Paul B. Hunter, Marcus Vest and Drew Cawthron voted against the request. Loraine Commissioners Moody Richardson was joined in his "for" vote by County Judge Bill Carter.

The action places a question mark on prospects for a new contract between Loraine and the county.

Earlier, Loraine City Council had rejected by unanimous vote Commissioners Court proposal to sign a new 5-year contract paying Loraine Volunteer Fire Department \$40 per fire call in rural areas outside of Loraine plus a lump sum payment of \$2,500.

At the same time the county offered Colorado City a similar 5-year pact with a \$5,000 lump payment and \$74 per rural fire call.

Westbrook was offered \$25 per fire call and a lump payment of \$2,500.

Both the county and Colorado City have signed their contract, and Westbrook has accepted.

Hall, who is an instructor on the staff of Texas A&M's annual firefighting school, pointed to his own competence and that of his volunteer department and emphasized that "nobody from Colorado City" has served on the A&M staff.

His department has the know-how, the equipment, training and dedication, he said, and "we think we should be treated as such."

"For Loraine we are interested in our people and want what they deserve."

Hall said he had originally submitted a \$50 per call rate for all rural fires.

"But here you come again with this difference in pay raise," he stated. "We'd like to have it the same as Colorado City. We want to be equal with anybody."

Judge Carter said reason Commissioners Court proposed a \$15 across-the-board increase for all 3 fire departments (thus keeping a graduated level of payments) is because there is "a vast difference in the annual budget of Colorado City" and Loraine and Westbrook.

The higher overall fire operation for Colorado City is necessary, he explained, because it has 82 per cent of the county's population within its immediate area and 75 per cent of the county's structures.

"The impression we get from that," Hall countered, "is that you are going into city fire protection. Is that right?"

"No," replied the judge, "but actually more than one-half of your (Loraine) firefighting budget is for rural and I guess if you put it that way we are helping you."

Commissioners Hunter said "we don't want the City of Loraine" doing anything for Mitchell County that will cost your city any money.

"For fires in the rural areas, this offer (\$40 per call for Loraine) more than pays for those rural calls," Hunter continued, "And we don't want Loraine asking to make money off the county."

"Fire fighting is the most hazardous occupation in the U.S.," Hall said.

"But you don't have as many firemen on call (as Colorado City)," added Hunter.

"But it is just as dangerous," Hall claimed.

In the discussion it was revealed that Colorado City pays its firemen \$4 per call and Loraine pays \$1, that Colorado City has paid drivers on duty 24-hours per day while Loraine does not have paid drivers, that Colorado City usually has about 20 firemen on a call, Loraine has 10 to 12 and Westbrook sometimes 2.

"I think \$75 is too much for Colorado City and too much for us," Hall commented. "We want to be treated equal. We See REQUEST Page 9"

Board To Consider Letter To TESCO Urges Exchange

Colorado City school trustees notified Texas Electric Service Company officials Wednesday they favored continuous communication toward an equitable solution of their tax problem.

The school position was stated in a letter from board president Tom Rees, to TESCO's Local Manager Don Benson, Division Manager Bill Brown of Sweetwater and Company Secretary - Treasurer Dave Kelch of Fort Worth. Trustees had authorized the letter Monday night after a lengthy parley with representatives of Pritchard & Abbott, evaluation engineers, who were strongly criticized by Brown and Kelch in a meeting with trustees last week.

In that earlier meeting, the TESCO trio had requested a \$132,000 reduction in the company's school tax payment and a \$14,182,000 reduction in the company's assessed property evaluations at Morgan Creek Power Plant.

The letter Wednesday, although assuring Texas Electric their tax proposals would continue to be considered, it did rule out the possibility of a tax cut on the 1971 roll.

Rees' letter referred to "careful consideration" of TESCO's request. But it definitely stated that "no allowance can be given" in a reduction for 1971 and emphasized the fact that Colorado City schools already were in the third month of operation within the 1971-72 budget and 1971 tax.

Aguilar To Prison

Almost a year ago Jesse Louie Aguilera received a chance to avoid prison.

Wednesday he had "cashed in" his chance and was headed for a 4-year term in the state penitentiary.

Judge Wayland Holt of Snyder, on the bench in place of 32nd District Court Judge Weldon Kirk who prosecuted Aguilera last November, revoked the 20-year-old youth's probation from a 4-year term.

Aguilar, married and father of 2 small children, pleaded guilty here last Nov. 20 to burglary of radiators from Forbes Garage. The loot was traced and Aguilera arrested almost immediately by sheriff's officers.

The judge revoked the probation Thursday when evidence revealed that Aguilera was delinquent in his \$10 monthly probation fees, had dropped behind in restitution, offered false affidavit in another court and had not reported as prescribed to his probation officer.

A felony driving while intoxicated charge was filed in Precinct 1 Justice of Peace Leonard Henderson's Court against Nicolas Rodriguez. He was arrested Oct. 30 for DWI by State Patrolman Kent Cearley after allegedly being convicted of misdemeanor DWI here Aug. 23.

Newspaper's Role McKinnon Talks To Kiwanians

"All newspapers are alike, regardless of what size they are or what size city they serve," Mac McKinnon, Colorado City Record co-publisher told the Colorado City Kiwanis Club Tuesday.

"There's just a little difference in scale and scope between the New York Times, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram and the Colorado City Record."

McKinnon added that newspapers all have the same goal: to inform, entertain and educate, to protect and further the causes of the city and area that newspaper serves.

"There was a great deal of concern for the future of the newspaper in the 1950's with the growing popularity of radio and the advent of television," McKinnon recalled.

"Newspaper owners, subscribers and advertisers soon discovered that there is no substitute for what the newspaper has to offer: clarity through details in news and advertising, details for which there is no time on television and radio, details that are there until an individual has time for them."

Although a number of daily papers are sold here, McKinnon pointed out that they do not serve Colorado City and Mitchell County. These daily papers seek to pull money out of this community and away from businessmen here.

It is up to the small town newspaper, working in cooperation with businesses and community leaders, to serve the small town by fair presentation of all news events, by giving recognition, and by helping businesses advertise in such a way to keep dollars at home, McKinnon said.

The main difference between the newspaper in the metropolitan area and the newspaper of the small town, said McKinnon, is that the paper in the small town is more "personal".

The small town newspaper does not deal with a "faceless" public as does the metropolitan newspapers. It is dealing with its friends and neighbors in a united effort to help each other and the town. The Record co-publisher concluded.

New Deputy Barrera Is Employed

The addition of Simon Barrera to Sheriff Lewis Claxton's staff became official Tuesday.

Commissioners Court approved the third male deputy sheriff under contract with the Employment Under Emergency Act through the regional Council of Governments.

Barrera, a graduate of Colorado High and the father of two children, was hired for the effective date of Nov. 15.

However, he already has been working voluntarily with Sheriff Claxton and other deputies to gain knowledge about law enforcement and assignments within the department.

Barrera, highly recommended as the first Mexican-American ever to serve in county law enforcement, joins Chief Deputy Forrest Smith, Deputy Bill McGuire and Office Deputy Mrs. Bill Martin on the sheriff's staff.

A total of \$4,695 is set under the federal employment program, with the county paying only a small per cent.

18 Nominated In Communities

Eighteen nominees have been named for community committee positions in Mitchell County's Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service program.

Election within the 3 county communities' is December 1, according to Don Stewart, executive director here for ASCS.

Nominees for Community A (west) are A. Preston Morris, Rex McKeeney, Harry Dockrey, Tom C. Moore, J. B. (Jake) Autry and Cecil Erwin.

For Community B (central) A. K. McCarley Jr., Henry Hoyle, Hubert Meadows, A. M. Beights, Jr., Everett Haggerton and J. C. Munoz are nominated.

On the ballot in Community C (east) are Tommy Fuller, A. J. Barron, Tillie Mitchell, Thomas Vest, LeRoy Cornutt and Alfred Hackfeld.

Three regular community committeemen and two alternates will be elected for each community. The one with the largest number of votes within his community becomes chairman. Next highest will be vice chairman, third highest will be regular community committee member. Alternates will be fourth and fifth in number of votes.

Ballots will be mailed to voters 12 days before the Dec. 1 election and ballots must be returned to the ASCS Office or postmarked by the Dec. 1 deadline.

Death Damage Suit Settled

A \$10,000 settlement has been entered in a damage suit here in connection with a traffic death and injury of 2 children.

The agreed judgement was awarded for the plaintiffs in the case filed in 32nd District Court by Roy W. Iglehart and wife, Viola, as next of kin of their son, DaWayne Iglehart.

Defendant was Madeline L. McIntosh, driver of a car that struck and killed the Iglehart's daughter, LaWayne Dee, and seriously injured her brother, DaWayne, while the children were in the backyard of their home at corner of East 7th and Hickory Aug. 8, 1970.

The decision awarded \$4,815.57 to the mother and father, \$1,500 to their son, DaWayne, and \$3,684.43 to their attorneys, George Street of Dallas and Richard M. Price of Abilene.

The judgement entered in 32nd District Court by Judge Weldon Kirk, was in full settlement of all claims and court costs.

Plaintiffs had asked in their original petition a total of \$50,000 in damages.

Mrs. McIntosh, defendant in the suit, is on probation from a 3-year prison term received in connection with the accident.

Wolves Want Out Of Cellar

The Colorado City Wolves will travel to Brownfield Friday night to take on the Cubs in a game the Wolves need to win in order to get out of the District 3-AAA cellar.

Kick-off time is 7:30 p.m. Friday.

A win against Brownfield would boost the Wolves' district standings to one win, one tie and four losses and would drop the Cubs into the cellar.

The Wolves shared the cellar until last week with Lake View. The Chiefs last week defeated Dunbar. Brownfield is now only one notch out of the cellar with a district record of one victory and four defeats.

The record of the Brownfield Cubs, says Wolves Coach Weldon Brevard is not a true indicator of Brownfield's potential. They have played good games against Snyder and Dunbar, losing by only a few points.

They run from the wishbone and they have a lot of size and ability, says Brevard.

Last week, the Cubs were crushed to the tune of 40-0 by Estacado. Only once did the Cubs get past the midfield stripe in the game.

For the Wolves, the game will offer a chance to see if they can continue what they started last week in the game against Sweetwater where they moved the ball consistently.

It will also be a time to see if the Wolves can hang onto the ball. During the game against Sweetwater, numerous Colorado City fumbles played a large part in deciding the winner.

Colorado City lost last year's game against Brownfield 21-6.

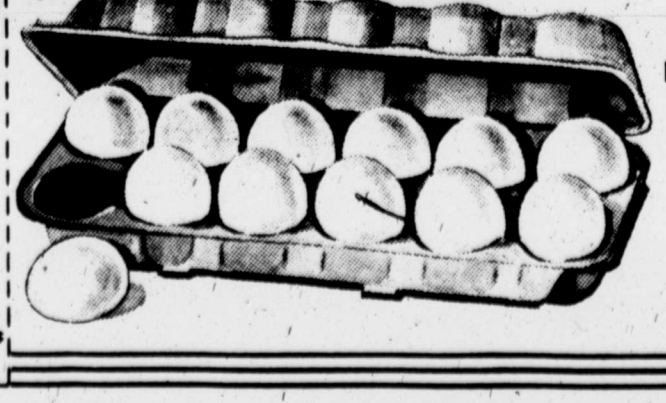

CONVERSATION CORNER



NOT MAD at anybody about anything and certainly bear no grudge against anybody who saw fit to celebrate Monday, October 25, as Veterans Day, not even against City National Bank.

All this shuffling around of holidays was done by Congressional decree but there is nothing in the law which forbids any citizen's mounting the soap box to object to the complete obliteration of Armistice Day on November 11.

It still is in hearts old enough to remember November 11, 1918, Armistice Day, when hostilities of World War I ceased.

The name of the day was changed years and years ago to Veterans Day. Find no fault with that because hostilities of war have had a way of beginning again... and again... and again.

STILL, there are some things even Congress can not accom-

plish with its statutes. Congress can't take Armistice Day away from me on any November 11, of any year. There will always be one little candle lighted in this heart every November 11 in memory of that first Armistice Day, so long ago now.

Though America really stopped keeping it as a truly patriotic holiday long ago, too, there are memories to keep it alive. It was, at the time it took place, the most important, the most special, and the most beautiful day ever lived up until then.

The old T&V round house whistles blew, church bells rang, school bells filled the air, as all the school children marched on the double to town. Every store and business place in town shut its doors, women turned off their home ovens and rode or ran to the little old main street, in Teague, Texas.

The little street was a throng of people shouting, laughing, singing... though there were tears on many faces, too.

REMEMBER, all you older ones, the remarkably tender songs of World War I? "Long Long Trail... Somewhere in France... Long Way to Tipperary... Keep the Home Fires Burning."

It was the era of some of this country's finest music... "Just a Baby's Prayer at Twilight... Little Blue Star in My Window... For Your Boy and My Boy... Laddie in Khaki." Many of the songs America sang then were funny and gay "Where Do We Go From Here Boys... Keep Your Head Down Fritz! Boy... How You Gonna Deep 'em Down on the Farm." Most of us loved the sentimental variety best, though.

IT WAS also the era when children believed with all their trusting little hearts that Armistice Day with its flags and band music and speeches and no school, meant the end of war forever for this land. If their conduct was any criterion, most of their parents and teachers seemed to believe it, too.

Having to let that childish belief and faith go, as years came and went and World War II came, was the hardest of human blows. The reality of war again... and again... and now again was the worst adult cruel disillusionment ever endured so far.

THAT IS WHY, maybe, nobody can take Armistice Day on November 11 away from me. Because I believed every sound, sign, symbol, and promise of it. And that is sweet to remember. Sweet and sad.

A child can take knowing the Santa Claus bit is a loving fable and that the tooth fairy is really Mother and Daddy, too.

But having to learn that war

here early this week on a brief business visit, Johnnie was looking well and happy in a becoming purple knit suit when she was down town with Mrs. Ollie C. Reid. The Tartts moved from here to Center, Colorado, which like Tipperary is "A long way to go."

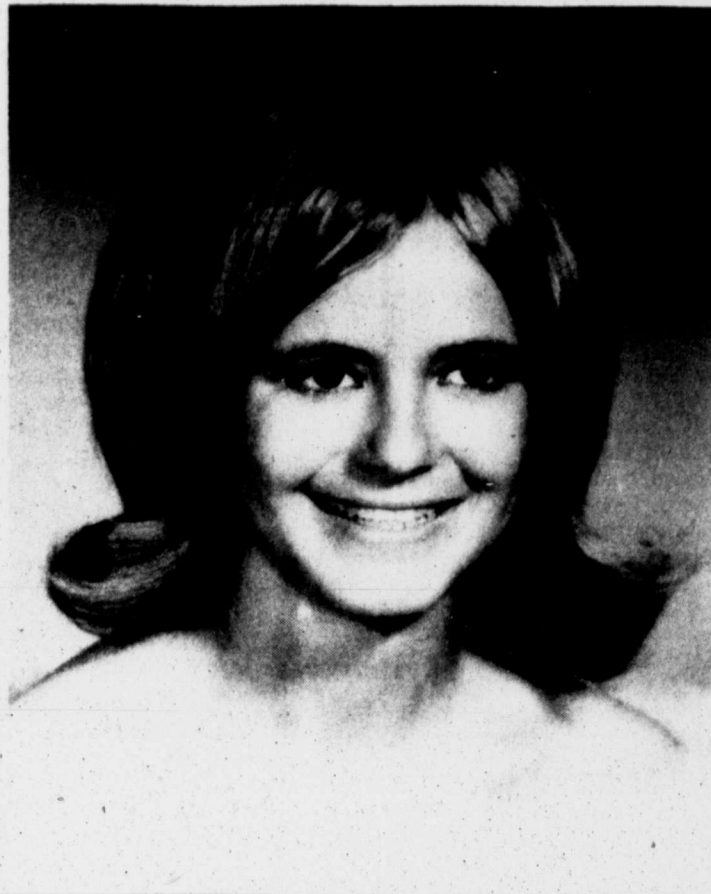

funds already have been committed to the school's operation.

"The board will definitely continue to consider the proposals presented and any additional information that may arise for future consideration in this matter," Rees wrote.

"The board will also continue to work with the firm Pritchard & Abbott in their appraisal of Texas Electric Service Company in consideration of any future changes that may occur in taxation.

"The board," Rees' letter concluded, "feels the need and

expresses the desire the continuously keep the lines of communication open between all interested parties. Through communication and understanding the board feels that an equitable and agreeable solution can be reached between Colorado Independent School District and Texas Electric Service Company."

Kelch, the company executive from Fort Worth, had walked out of an earlier conference

ed out of an earlier conference with school board members. But he told the Record last week that "he was wrong". And, Division Manager Brown declared last week that TESCO did not have to work with Pritchard & Abbott despite the fact the firm is hired by the district as tax consultants.

However, the board called Pritchard & Abbott to meet with trustees at their regular monthly meeting Monday night.

Wilson Hunt and Bill Monk, representing the consultant firm, told the board Monday that the claim by TESCO for a \$132,000 reduction in tax payments were "new figures" that Pritchard & Abbott had not seen before.

They reported, that to the best of their knowledge, the figures

TESCO's proposal for a new reduction appears to be a change from the lifetime 62 1/2 per cent valuation assessment to a depreciation factor, Hunt said.

"If had given the depreciation factor from year to year," Hunt said, "we would get more now than we are assessing Texas Electric."

The consultant said his firm's recommendation was to establish a policy and use it throughout the life of the property.

"What they bring now are things that should have been brought to attention on the first year the property went on the tax roll," Hunt said.

Hunt said he doubted if a solution would ever be arrived at "this way" -- with the board hearing one side at a time. He suggested that TESCO and the tax consultant meet in Colorado City "next spring and come to agreement."

He is also survived by his wife, three sons; a sister, Estha Lee; two brothers, Jim Snowden of California and Bo Snowden of Oregon.

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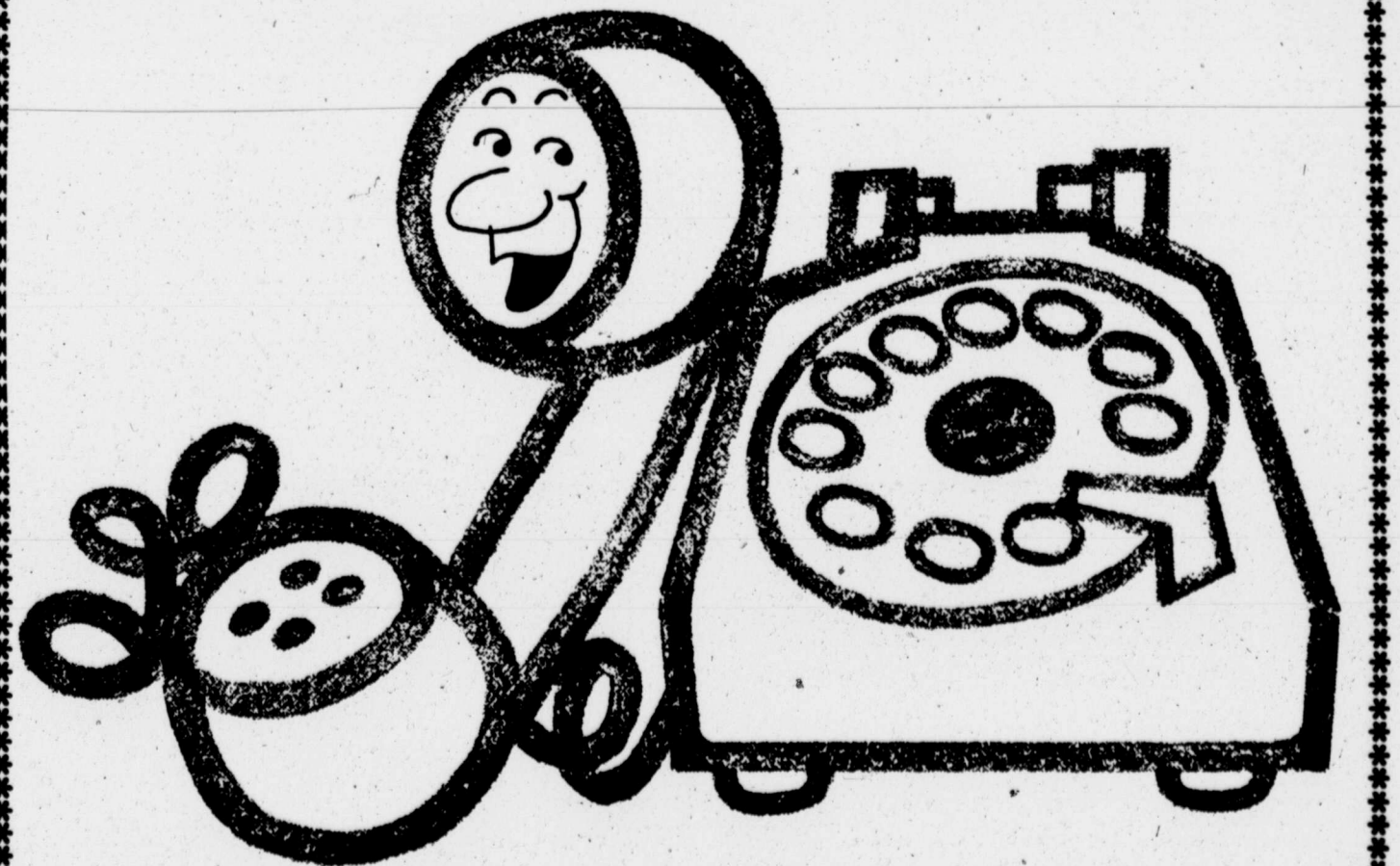

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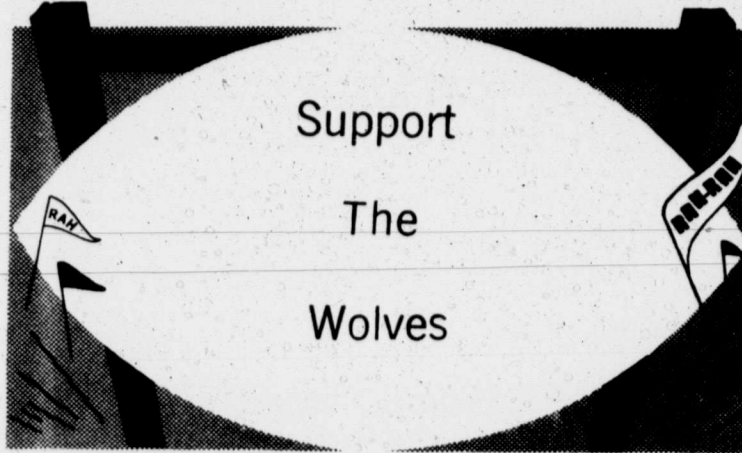

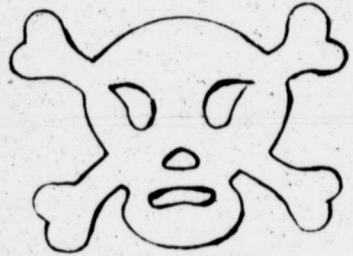

"You would be making money at \$75 per call," Hunter and Judge Carter said almost in unison.

Commissioner Richardson said he thought there had been a "little too much difference in the amount paid per call" ever since the county first contracted for rural fires.

"I have to admit that we don't have the people or the values of Colorado City, but our fire department deserves a lot of consideration. . . and it's an asset to our city and county. It should be compensated."

"If Colorado City gets \$75, we want \$75," Hall concluded.

The 3-2 vote denying Loraine equal per call pay with Colorado City came after the 3 Loraine leaders left the courthouse.

Judge Carter, who voted with Richardson for Loraine's request, said the higher level would amount to only a few hundred dollars a year.

But the judge also came up with figures Wednesday that are project averages over a 5-year contract period.

With Colorado City averaging 60 rural calls per year for 5 years under its new contract (\$75 per call and \$5,000 one-time payment), the entire county payment would average \$90 per rural call.

Loraine, with its rejected \$40 per call contract and \$2,500 lump payment, with an average to 20 rural calls per year would receive an average per call payment of \$65.

With a yearly average of 30 calls, the Westbrook per call payment would compute at \$41 under its new contract.

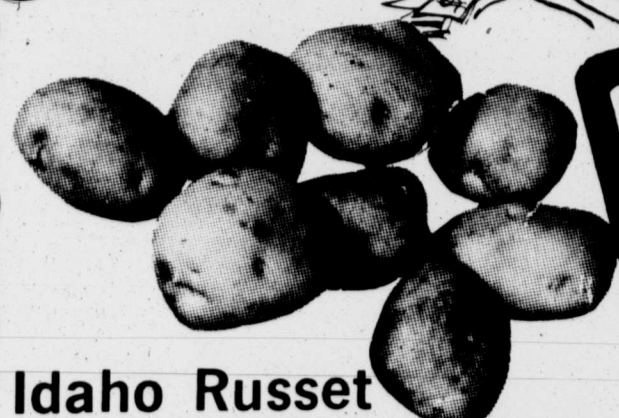

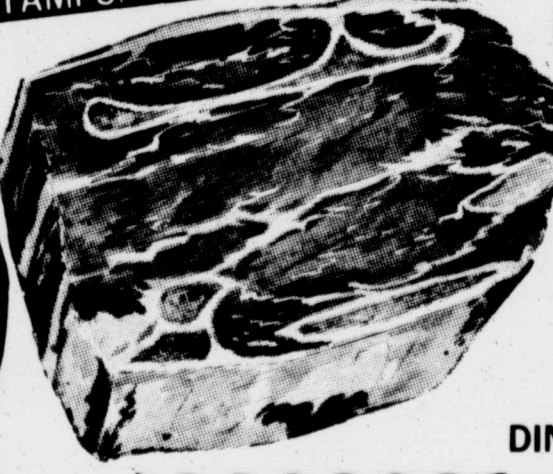
