HERRING RANCH HAS HEAVY FIRE LOSS

Fire of unknown origin destroy-
ed a large barn on the Robert Her-
ring ranch ten miles East of Bal-
linger about eleven o'clock Tues-
day night.

The barn was a large one and
well filled with feed, implements,
etc., including 5,000 bushels of
oats, 500 pounds of wool, a tractor,
plows, saddles, etc.

One of the boys was at the
ranch but did not discover the
fire until it was well underway.
The loss will amount to seven or
eight thousand dollars and no in-
surance was carried on the prop-
erty.

SCHOOL BOARD

HAS BIG JOB TO DO

The school board was in session
for a couple of hours Tuesday
night discussing the work for the
1920-21 term.

The board is facing a problem
in working out details and finan-
cing the school next term. The
big increase in scholastics will
call for additional teachers, and
at least four teachers and prob-
ably as many as six will have to
be added to the present number.

The board also realizes that in
order to get competent teachers
for the next term higher salaries
must be paid. In making up the
budget for the next term, it will
be necessary to raise at least
twenty-five per cent more money
than was collected for the pres-
ent term, and just how to do this
is no easy task.

The board will meet again at
an early date and take up the
question of enrolling teachers
and fixing salaries.

NORTON MAN GETS

62c FOR COTTON

SCHOOL TAG DAY

HERE SATURDAY

C. J. Jennings of Norton, was
here Tuesday, and while in the
city received a telegram from a
cotton firm in Houston notifying
the Norton man that cotton he
shipped to Houston had just sold
for 62 cents per pound.

Mr. Jennings shipped eight
bales of his crop to Houston some
time ago and had authorized the
Houston commission firm to
sell it, and the telegram came in
reply to his instructions.

So far as The Ledger can learn
this is the highest price ever paid
for cotton in the market, and on
a basis of 500 round bales, brings
Mr. Jennings \$310 per bale, plus
freight, which will make the total
amount due to him \$350 per bale.

Mr. Jennings is a resident of
Norton, and his cotton was raised
on the Norton place. The cotton
was shipped to Houston by the
Norton Cotton Co., of that city.

The cotton was shipped in two
lots, the first lot being shipped
on the 15th inst. and the second
lot on the 20th inst.

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EL PASO, April 28.—Representatives of
the Obregonistas here claim that Chihuahua
City has been captured by the Obregon army
without bloodshed. The Carranza troops with-
drew without offering any resistance.

The report received here today that fight-
ing was in progress in the city was not com-
mented on either by the Carrancistas or the Ob-
regonistas.

SAN ANTONIO, April 28.—Cuautla, one of
the largest towns in the state of Morelos, has
been captured by the Obregonistas under the
personal command of Gen. Obregon, according
to information received here.

Other advices received here state that one
thousand troops under General Urquiza, who
proceeded against Cuautla, revolted before the
Obregon troop train reached the city and are oc-
cupying the city, and that Gen. Urquiza left his
army after they revolted and returned to Mex-
ico City.

U. S. ASKS REHEARING IN TRUST CASE

WASHINGTON, April 28.—
The government has asked the
Supreme Court for a rehearing in
the anti-trust case against the
United States Steel Corporation.

The court rendered a decision
recently declaring that the steel
corporation was not in a trust

and had not violated the anti-
trust laws. The United States
government brought suit against
the steel corporation charging it
to be a trust, and in a petition
just filed asked for a rehearing.

SAFETY FIRST STARTS RIGGING UP AGAIN

The new derrick at the Safety
First test has been completed and
the drillers are rigging up and
getting ready to resume drilling.
It will be remembered that the
derrick at this well collapsed ab-
out two weeks ago while a
heavy string of casing was being
pulled to permit underreaming.

Two men narrowly escaped
death when the derrick gave way,
one of the men experiencing an
escape from being crushed to
death which was miraculous. The
name, "Safety First" made good
when the derrick fell.

Drilling will be resumed at this
well by the first of next week at a
depth of about 2,000 feet, and
without another accident the out-
come of the deep test near Bal-
linger will soon be determined.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—
The capture of two towns and two
federal military trains is claimed
by General Alvarado, revolution-
ary representative here.

The Mexican embassy contin-
ued to view the situation calmly,
and officials expressed confidence
that Carranza's control is un-
shaken. The embassy has been
without advices for several days
however.

The rebels claim the towns of
Mier and Guerrero in Tamaulipas
have been captured, according to
Alvarado.

The troop trains captured were
reported to be part of the com-
mand of General Pablo Gonzales,
a presidential candidate. They
were seized between Cervernaca
and Iguala, near Mexico City.

AGUA PRIETA, April 28.—
Over fifty thousand soldiers in
Mexico are in revolt against the
Carranza government, it was an-
nounced at military headquarters
today. Nearly half of this num-
ber is said to have joined revo-
lutionary forces in Sonora.

The first decisive engagement
of the revolution is expected at
Mazatlan, Sinaloa, possession of
which will give the rebels the key
to practically all the west coast
of Mexico, it is said. Another re-
bel force working farther south is
expected to soon attack Mazatlan.

J. D. Jones, who recently sold
his interest in the Maeroy Theatre
to his partner, Mr. Wood, and L.
Cohen, who sold the Queen Thea-
tre to Wood & Jones a month ago,
left for Abilene Wednesday
morning. Both of these gentle-
men are on the look out for an op-
portunity to engage in the show busi-
ness. Mr. Cohen thinks he will
finally land in San Benito, as he
has a proposition pending there
for a building.

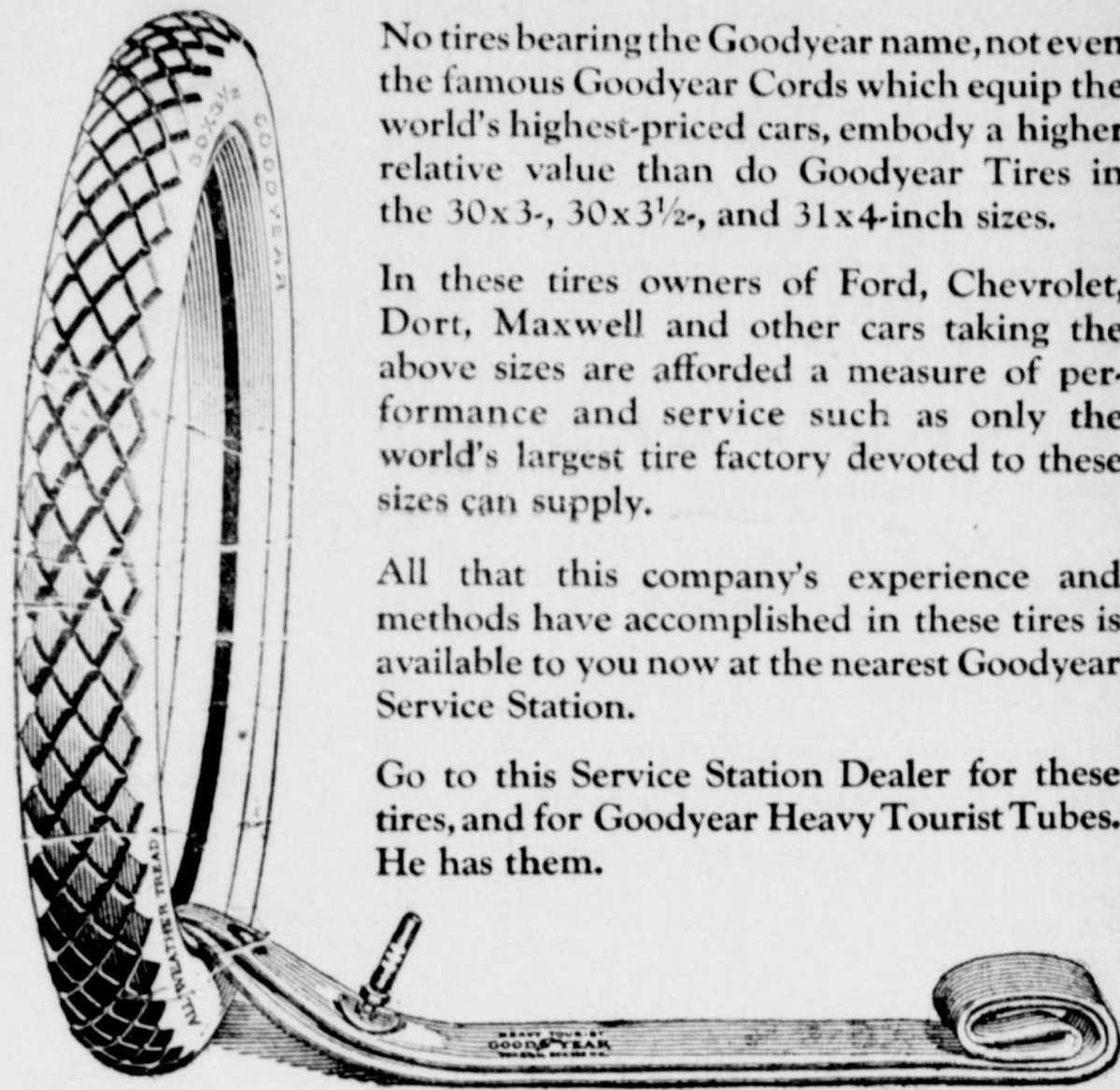

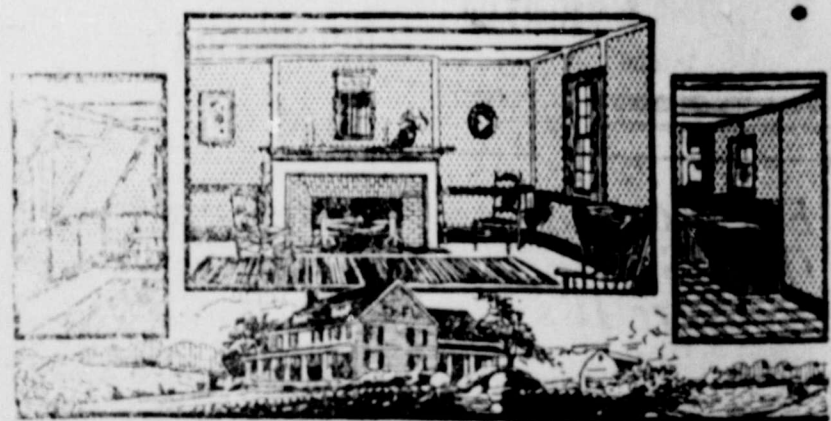

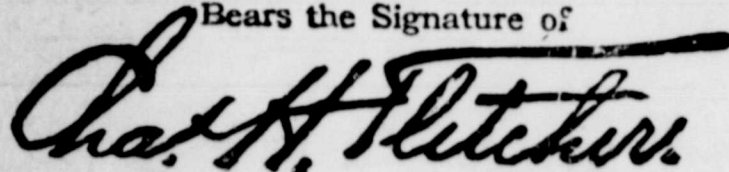

PAPER SHORTAGE
GROWS SERIOUS

The Ledger has been hoping seemingly against hope, and fighting against an enforced increase in subscription rates. The print paper situation is serious with no hopes for relief. We are paying 10.50 for paper today which only cost 2.85 before the war, and which was as low as 2.60 not many years ago.

The American Newspaper Publishers' Association met in New York last week to discuss the paper situation and take steps to curtail the paper consumption. All publishers have been appeal-

ed to in an effort to reduce the size of papers and cut out "dead-ends," and print only a sufficient number of papers for regular subscribers.

Many papers of the smaller class are unable to get paper in anything like satisfactory quantities, and are told that prices will yet increase.

But, after all, perhaps it is for the best, for the American people need a lesson in paper economy. We waste too much paper.

CITY IS PLANNING
WATER IMPROVEMENTS

The city commission has under consideration valuable improvements in the municipal water plant. If the plans are adopted it will call for the replacing of four inch mains with six inch mains and the replacing of some two inch mains with four inch mains.

At present the water consumers on North Broadway are experiencing a water famine. A two inch main supplies the consumers for several blocks on Broadway, and the main is too small for the number of consumers, so that those who are depending on the small main for their water supply are running dry for a greater part of the time.

The mains on Hutchins Avenue from the corner of the Dooze building to the compress are only four inches, and the compress is forced to pay a higher rate of insurance on this account.

A proposition is pending where by the compress may assist the city in financing the laying of a six inch main to take the place of the smaller main along this street, and in that event the four inch piping will be used where two inch stuff is failing to furnish the water supply demanded.

Ballinger has a good water plant, and maintains same at a very low rate. The water is the only necessity that has not been boosted to a higher price in this city. Consumers are paying the same old price they paid before the war.

GOT OVER THE DIFFICULTY

Chaplain Evidently Found Some Way to Get Around the Regulations of the Navy

In June, 1911, writes Dr. Maurice F. Egan in his book, "Ten Years Near the German Frontier," the Atlantic squadron stopped at Denmark on its way to Germany. One day the querry who had been appointed to look after the admiral and his immediate suite came to me in great perplexity. It was shortly after one of the receptions given by the American officers. He held in his hand a little box.

"I am in difficulty," he said, "and I have come to ask you to help me. His majesty has received several letters from the American sailors, and there is one that especially amused him. It seems that he pleased the men by asking for the Scandinavians in your navy. A sailor who addresses him as 'Dear King' thanks him for this and declares that the men like Copenhagen so much that they beg his majesty to induce the admiral to stay a few days longer. Of course his majesty cannot do that, but he has asked me to give the little medal in this box to the sailor. I am told that it is against the rules, which seem to be very strict, yet I really cannot tell the king that I have not given the medal to the worthy sailor. You know the king's kindness of heart. I am at my wit's end, so I appeal to you."

"It is easy enough," I said. "When in a querry of this kind call in the chaplain."

We found the chaplain, and Frederick VIII received a grateful note, addressed, "Dear King."

BIG SPIDER WRONGLY NAMED

Insect Found in the Southwestern States and in Mexico Not Really a Tarantula.

The famous tarantula, sometimes represented as one of the terrors of the arid portions of the Southwestern states and northern Mexico, is not really, it seems, the tarantula of history and of fable.

An eminent authority in such matters, in remarking that the tarantula is a spider, says that that terrifying creature that it is the Lycosa Tarantula, a species of spider found in some of the warmer parts of Italy and Spain. When full grown it is about the size of a chestnut and of a brown color, its bite was at one time supposed to be dangerous and to induce a kind of "dancing disease," but now it is known not to be worse than the sting of a common wasp.

It is an old fable, extending to remotest times, that the bite of this spider would produce epilepsy or a strange dancing mania in its victims, and that this epilepsy or madness could be relieved only by a particular kind of music. The tarantula of Italy and Spain—and it is found in those countries today—has hairy legs with black markings on them.

It is very likely that when the early Spanish explorers came upon the great spider of the Southwest, and seeing a good deal of resemblance to the tarantula of the Old World, those explorers, not being entomologists, called the new spider a tarantula. And the name has persisted.

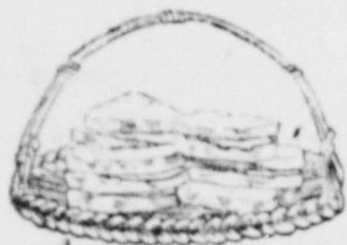

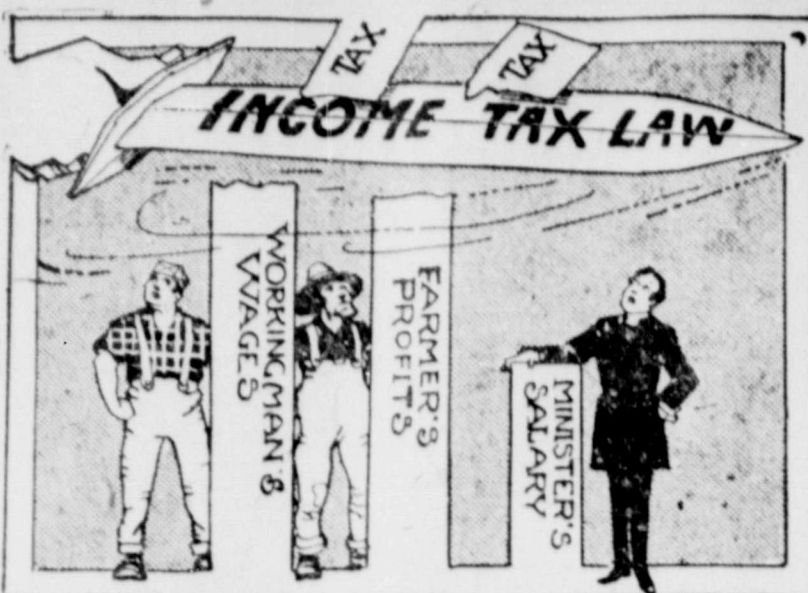

Only 1671 Out of 170,000 Ministers Pay Income Tax



Ministers are exempt from the
operation of the income tax law—
not through any specific exemption
in the law itself but because they
do not earn enough money to come
within the law's minimum require-
ment. Out of a total of 170,000
ministers in the United States, but
1,671 receive a big enough salary
to be required to pay any income
tax.

These incomes were not only pay
from churches but included priv-
ate earnings too. Hundreds of
ministers have been forced to en-
gage in some occupation outside of
the ministry such as poultry rais-
ing, barbering, market gardening,
etc., to earn enough to feed and
clothe their families. These figures
show vividly why the interchurch

World Movement has included in-
creased pay for ministers as one
of the chief planks in its forward-
looking, five-year program for the
expansion of Protestantism
throughout the world.

The average salary of the col-
lege trained preacher is \$237 ac-
cording to established figures—
several hundred dollars less than
the average annual earnings of the
uneducated worker in some of the
leading industries of the country.

A worker in the rubber industry
averages \$1,526.20 a year. The av-
erage for the boot and shoe work-
er is \$1,316; for the chemical
worker \$1,326.40; the silk work-
er, \$1,179.88; for the paper work-
er \$1,164; and for the wool work-
er \$962.72.

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Late Spring Finds Country Basking In Prosperity

The first of May finds Runnels county in better condition financially than for many years.

The lingering low temperature, with an occasional filling of the air with dust, and a cloudless sky fails to fan discontent in the breast of even the new-comer, who grins and says "great country—I like it."

Looking back a space of two

years, we recall conditions which, mildly speaking, were deplorable, and put many of the tender-footed on the run.

There was nothing—in lieu of subsistence, and many farmers even gathered up their chickens and shipped them out to keep the feathered tribe from starving to death.

At that time there was a two

year's drouth behind, the horrors of which were added to by the war and the daily departure of from one to a hundred brave Americans for over there.

Looking ahead two years ago, one could only see a dusty road leading to what we were often told was a poor man's paradise, and many took the trail and followed the rainbow which for quite a few led back to Runnels county.

Farmers lingered and looked, keeping an eager eye to the sky in hope of finding a thunder-head which might develop into a season giving rain. The thunder

head failed to materialize, and there was not enough feed made in this county to keep life in the body of a mountain billy goat alive twenty-four hours.

It is different today—in this good year 1920.

The country has been re-stocked with a better grade of livestock than the breed which gave way to the drouth. The poultry yards are filled with high-grade poultry, as evidenced by the shipping of \$50,000 worth of eggs within counts.

The high cost of living is a much discussed and cursed question. There is grass and weeds in abundance and livestock are fat. No

feeding is necessary, while practically every farmer has a year's supply of feed stored away, and many of them have almost as much cotton on hand as they ever made in any one year before.

Bank deposits are larger than ever before in the history of the country at this particular season of the year, and demand for farm loans is making things little dull around the banks. Farmers don't need the cash—they have bank accounts.

The average family seems to be getting along about as well as

when it did not cost half so much to live, and are living higher, therefore are entitled to pay the bill.

The charity committee is without a job, and the fellow who is leaving here is going visiting because he has the cash to pay railroad fare and foot the bill of seeing things along the way.

There is more joy riding today than ever known before. Autos are multiplying as fast as the factories can get their trade mark on the joy wagons.

Picture shows are showing to crowds, doubling the fans who watched the movies two years ago, and at almost doubled price. It is true that there is not a seed sprouting in the country, but why hurry and worry?

It only requires three months farming in this country to raise more than several thousand negroes can harvest in the same length of time, and the game is young yet.

It may not rain in time to make a frizzling spring of anything. Such a thing is possible, but not probable, and if it did, the country would still be in better shape than other sections of the state.
