Area Grain Producers Vote Opposition To Hardin Plan

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association rejected provisions of Secretary Hardin's proposed "set aside feed grain program".

The 70 GSPA board members and representatives who met in Amarillo Monday decided

that the set aside program would create a surplus production of feed, require too much diversion without diversion payments and not maintain farm income at adequate levels.

Glenn A. Weir, director of the Grain Division, USDA, Washington D.C. met with the GSPA board to explain the "set aside approach." Members of the board present covered every area of the High Plains grain producing area.

GSPA Executive Director Elbert Harp explained that "many of our farmers would have to divert over one-third of their farm, without pay, to comply with the grain, cotton, and wheat programs under Secretary Hardin's program. Even then the payments would be no more, if as much, then they are now."

It was the feeling of everyone voting that GSPA should continue its policy of pushing for a continuation of the present program with income improvements advanced payments, and no limitation of payments. GSPA is a member of the 24 organization Farm Coalition working for continuation of the present program. Under the coalition bill, minimum price supports would be set at 90 percent of parity. This would be \$2.50 per 100 pounds of grain sorghum.

HALE COUNTY CANCER UNIT HAS MEETING

Dr. T. Coe Branch addressed the Board Members of the Hale County Unit of the American Cancer Society at its meeting held February 16, 1970, at 715 Amarillo St. Prior to entering the Navy, Dr. Branch practiced medicine in Plainview for five years. He returned to practice here last July.

Mrs. D. J. Peters, Service Chairman, was in charge of the program. Prior to Dr. Branch's address and the showing of a film, Mrs. Peters related some startling and serious facts concerning the existence of cancer in residents of the Plainview area, and told of services rendered by her during January. She stated that there are 236 persons in the Plainview area now being treated for cancer, and that 12 persons suffering from cancer were admitted to the Plainview Hospital during January.

The film which was shown was entitled "Please Call Us." It emphasized the many different ways in which the Cancer Society can be of service to victims of cancer and their families.

Continuing the theme of "service", Dr. Branch described the most important way in which physicians can be of service to the public in the

fight against cancer. He stated that since most cancers are now curable if they are detected early enough, it is of vital importance that everyone have a complete and thorough physical examination annually.

Mrs. Ralph Christianson, Public Education Chairman, reported that in its efforts to inform young persons about the dangers inherent in smoking two films, "The Huffyless Puffless Dragon," and "Smoking, Past and Present," were shown to 354 elementary school children, and the film, "The Embattled Cell," had been shown to 300 high school students who are studying Health and Biology. Posters containing messages about the dangers of smoking have been placed in the Plainview High School.

Mrs. Pete McLaughlin, who attended the State Executive Board meeting in Houston, February 10-11, reported that Texas has been given a quota of \$3,000,000, to be raised this year in the Cancer Crusade. The Kick-Off Dinner for the Cancer Crusade in Hale County will be held March 16, 1970.

And crops are not the only items which suffer major hail damage. During storm periods buildings, automobiles and other personal property receives damage. During a four month period, May-August, 1969, one insurance company office in Plainview paid out over \$1 million in payments for hail damage claims. This represented \$4 in claims for every \$1 in premium payments.

It is estimated that insurance companies paid \$4.5 million in claims for hail damage to personal property following hailstorms on June 10 and 13.

What can be done?

An organization, the Plains Weather Improvement Association, has been formed to raise funds for a three-year operational applied research program to suppress hail in Hale County.

Can a hail suppression program work to an extent to be economically feasible?

There is documented scientific studies on weather modification that substantiates claims of hail suppression. One three-year study showed that hailstorms in North Dakota were stopped in one-third of instances, damage significantly reduced in a third of the storms with little or no evidence of effect on precipitation or other weather patterns.

A spokesman from Atmospherics Inc. who conducted a feasibility study for a hail program on the High Plains for the Texas Water Development Board estimated that

hail damage could be reduced 40 to 60 per cent the first year with greater success as the program developed.

The hail suppression project would provide for seeding of potential hailstorms by airplanes in a process that has proved successful in hail suppression operations elsewhere.

Who will benefit from the project?

Farmers, businessmen, city residents owning personal property, homeowners, business employees, everyone whose livelihood is effected by agriculture commodities.

How much will it cost?

It has been estimated that funds for the program could be raised if farmers voluntarily invest 32 cents per acre of land they farmed per year.

Homeowners should participate in the undertaking by investing \$25 for membership in the association. This is pretty safe insurance for just half the cost of the insurance deductible that would be paid if hail damage occurred on the house.

How soon is the money needed?

NOW! IMMEDIATELY! March 15 has been set as deadline to allow time for contracts to be signed for the suppression program to get underway in time to help this season.

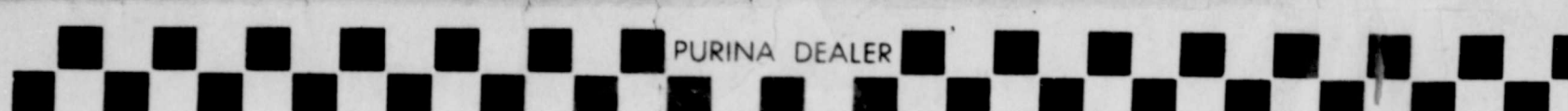
