# Moody Commutes Silver's Sentence To Life Term Yankee Doodle Sets New East-West Continent Mark

## Fliers Make Safe Hop Across States To Better Record

Landing Made At Los Angeles, 24 Hours and 51 Minutes After Takeoff In New York.

## Cut Time 2 Hours

Report Plans for Return Trip Eastward; Flight Was Tacker's 4th Time To Hop Continent.

(By Associated Press)  
LOS ANGELES, Oct. 25.—Setting a new record for a non-stop airplane flight from the Atlantic coast to the Pacific, the monoplane Yankee Doodle arrived here at 7:12 p. m. today from Roosevelt Field, New York.

The official time of the record-breaking flight was announced as 34 hours, 51 minutes by an official of the National Aeronautical association, cutting the old record by practically two hours. The best previous time for the westward flight was 26 hours and 50 minutes, made in 1923 by Louis G. Bledsoe, flying a biplane from New York to Los Angeles.

The Yankee Doodle hopped off at Roosevelt Field at 4:18:35 p. m. Eastern Standard time, yesterday. The westward flight covered approximately the course flown over by Colonel Arthur T. Wigglesworth in his plane to a new west-east non-stop trans-continental record of 18 hours and 55 minutes several weeks ago. This course lay over McKeesport, Pa., Columbus, Ohio, Indianapolis, Torr., Haute., Ind.

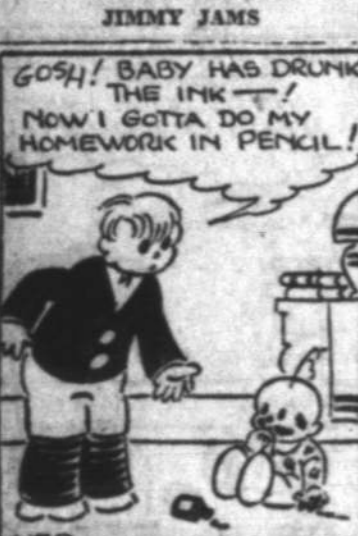

**How to Achieve Beauty**

Two exercises recommended by Mme. Rubinstein for keeping the muscles flexible: Left, stand erect with hands locked behind your head. At the mountains, you have taken long hikes, crossed brooks and generally allowed the muscles of your body to relax. It has been a wonderful exercise for you, and is much to be credited to your generally improved condition.

Now that your vacation is over, determine not to go back to the old sedentary ways. Keep up your exercises. Don't get too much into the street car or the taxi habit. Walk all short distances and remember while you are walking to breathe deeply and to stride along at a good, brisk pace.

The average woman will never see that a poor complexion, wrinkles and general listlessness is often directly traceable to a lack of proper exercise, bad posture, and insufficient supply of fresh air. It is proverbial truth that health and natural beauty is dependent upon proper circulation of the blood.

Exercise may be divided into many different classes. There are exercises for developing or reducing, or for maintaining the health and beauty of the body. Trunk bendings and twistings are of the type which provide the internal massage most necessary to the health. All of you who are engaged in sedentary occupations need this kind of exercise far more than you need muscle building calisthenics. Setting up exercises which everyone needs will bring all the principal muscles of your body into play.

Here are three splendid exercises for keeping the muscles flexible and useful.

Stand erect with hands locked behind your head. Raise the left knee obliquely to the right, twist the trunk to the left and touch the right elbow with the left knee. This exercise is difficult but it is easy to do. Do it ten times. Those who cannot do it should learn to do it.

Cities and states are energetic these days in trying to protect children from careless motorists.

As one director of public safety puts it: "The time is past when accidents among children can be treated as merely unusual and unfortunate. The matter of child safety is now being taken up as one of our most important traffic problems, and as such is being given consideration in every possible way."

Most cities now have school traffic, that is, stationing policemen at the entrance of school buildings or at street corners near to the schools. We are all familiar with the blue-coated figure waving back impatient trucks while he conveys a little bevy of trusting youngsters safely to the opposite curb.

Majority Are Careful.

But in order to make any good system work, there must be cooperation. There are careless and unscrupulous drivers, of course, but they are a very small percentage of drivers in general. It is necessary for the rest of us to learn that particular alertness that has come in with the motor age, and teach it to our children. If we wish to keep ourselves and them alive. Few drivers would deliberately endanger the lives of children, or of grown-ups either, but parents with children who have to walk distances to school along much traveled highways should warn them daily.

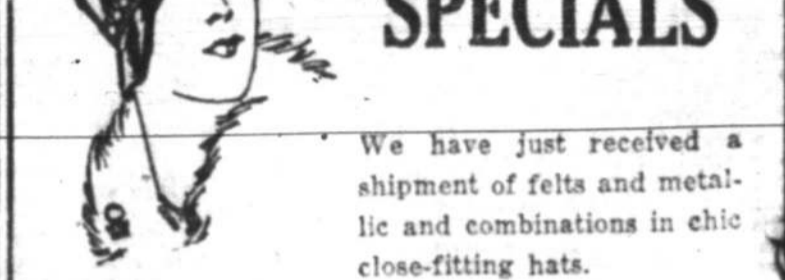

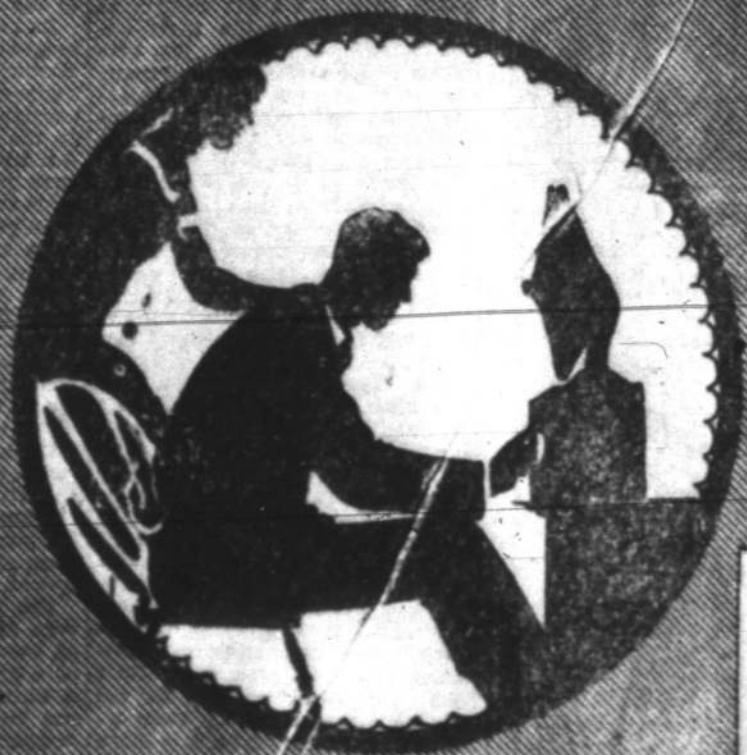

Joe Robinson is entitled to patent rights. He first used it in a campaign speech. Since then, however, it has been adopted into the campaign vocabulary extensively and bids fair to be the chief catch phrase of the 1928 presidential election contest.

In most of the campaigns of the last two or three decades—and no doubt before that—although the Bystander has no personal knowledge dating more than 30 years back—there have been undercurrents of gossip about the respective presidential candidates. They were in all truth whispering campaigns and when Senator Robinson swung into action to attack this undercurrent character on Governor Smith this observer, at least, supposed that was what he meant by the phrase "whispering campaign."

XXIV-ELECTION RETURNS WASHINGTON, D. C. Oct. 25.—By midnight of November sixth it is possible, and indeed probable, that fully half of the people of the United States will know who is to be the next president and the next vice-president.

Difference In Time Figures Oregon, however, will know the Maine result much sooner than Maine hears from the Pacific coast because of the difference in time. Indeed the west coast will have heard the returns from many of the precincts in states using voting machines even before the polls close in the western states.

More than half our population is in cities, and most of this half will have access to newspaper bulletin boards, but many of this half, and most of the rural population will get its returns this year by wireless.

Early election returns have often been misleading, the last instance of this being in 1916, when Mr. Hughes went to bed believing that the republican had been elected, and woke up first to doubt and then to know he had lost.

Where voting is done on voting machines, the election judges will be able to open the polls in a special way, and the machines will add totals within a few minutes after the polls close.

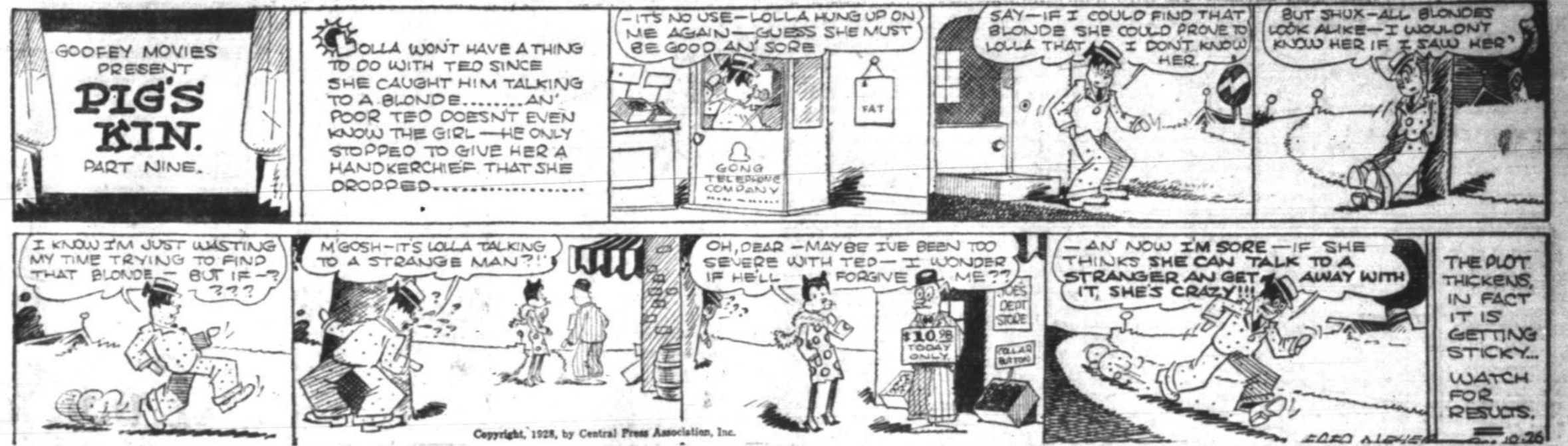

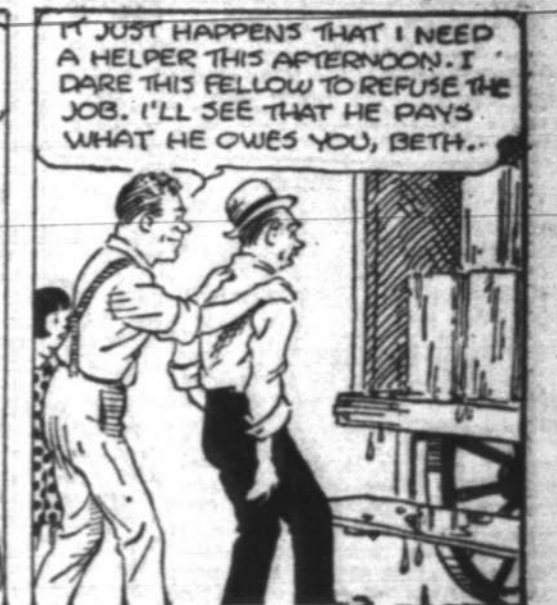

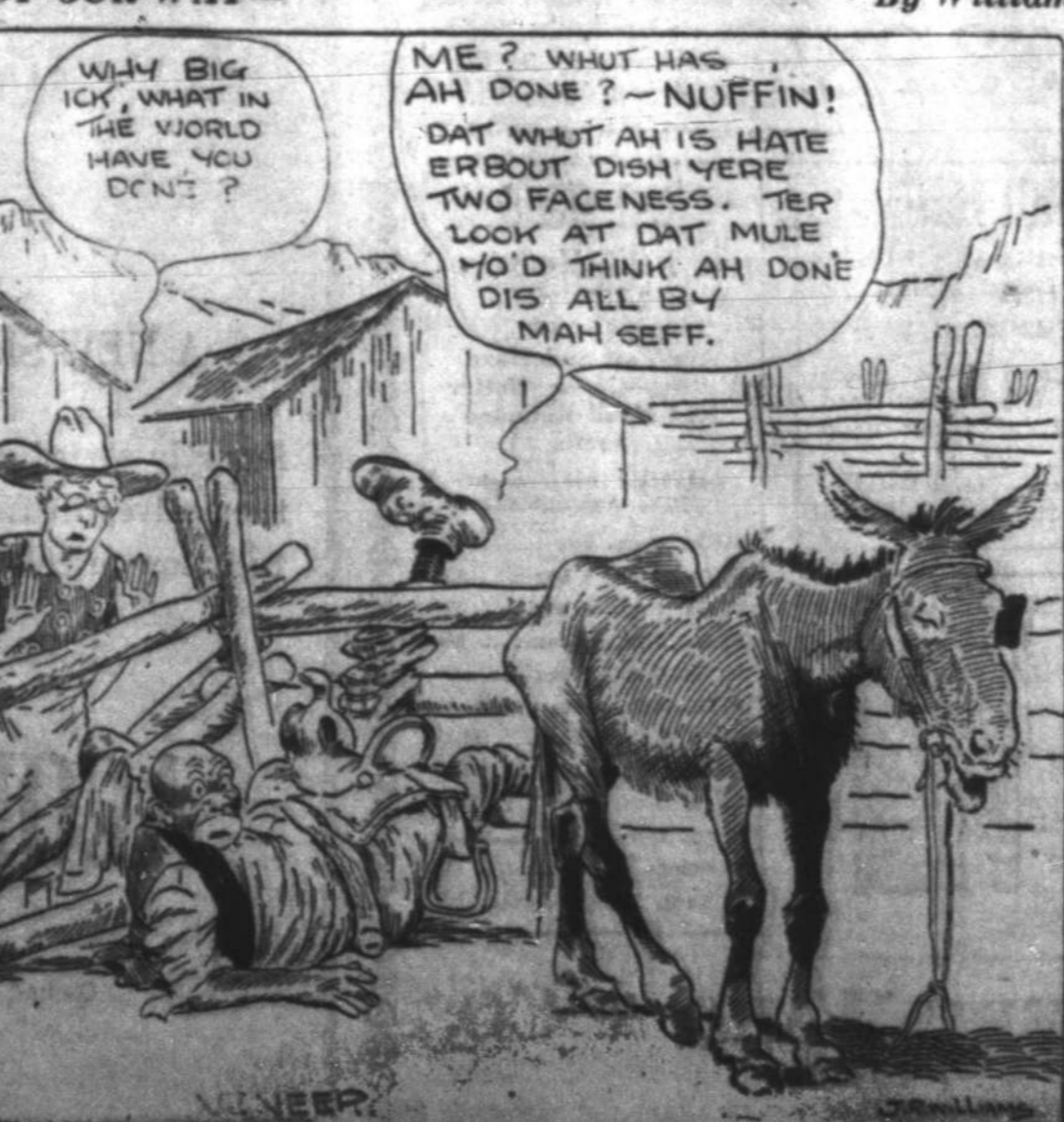

The government spinning figures of \$147,201 bales were issued at the opening and prices opened up 14 points on December New York contracts and five points on December New Orleans contracts, and then went nine and 13 points higher respectively. Selling was met at this level and the market settled down with little trading until the last hour of the session when further selling forced quotations down to new lows for the day on the close. Norman-Mayer and Company, wired: "Ginning figures rather full. Market faces much uncertainty next few weeks. Prefer buying only on good breaks."

In its report the census bureau showed that Texas had ginned 3,335,846 bales to October 18. On Oct. 3 the government set the total yield for the state at 5,080,000 bales which means that there are 1,744,154 bales yet to be ginned. According to newspaper reports the state ginning figures and the indicated yield figures of Oct. 3, Alabama has yet to gin 310,734 bales, Arizona, 87,740, Arkansas, 892,773, Georgia, 482,784, Louisiana, 63,780, Mississippi 419,109, Missouri 125,475, North Carolina 626,427, Oklahoma 635,864, South Carolina 425,549, Tennessee, 224,473, Virginia 23,610, California 93,820.

Eight Will Pay With Lives In Jugoslavia

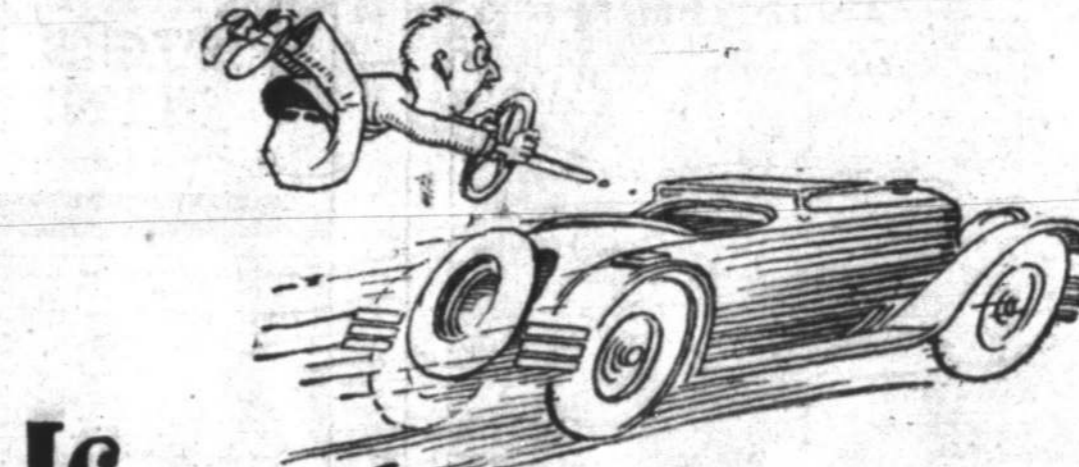

### 'Alimony Sam' Reed is Freed From Jail After Battle of Four Year

WILLOWS, Calif. Oct. 25.—October 19 years ago saw the 363rd infantry fighting, plodding, dying through the mud, muck and morasses of the Argonne and the Ypres-Lys salient.

And the present October finds the remnants of the 363rd still shoulder to shoulder, winning objectives with the regimental treasury suffering the casualties.

The regiment's latest victory is winning the four-year "alimony war," which has almost divided this country, while the "alimony martyrdom" of Sam W. Reed gained nationwide prominence and brought threats of everything from appeals to the governor to storming the legislature.

Reid fought in the 363rd during the World War. After the war he married. A few years later, his wife sued for divorce here. She was granted a decree, custody of their baby daughter, \$20 a month alimony and \$20 a month for the child's support.

Reid refused to pay. "As long as the child remains in the keeping of her maternal grandparents, I'll not pay a cent," was Sam's deft.

"You'll pay or you'll go to jail until you do pay," in substance was the decree of the court.

Reid chose to defy this edict. And he was adjudged in contempt of court by Judge Claude F. Purkitt here, and placed in jail.

That was in July, 1923. Reid, defending his position as he saw it, "dug in" at the jail, prepared for a long stay. The court, equally determined, stood its ground. The case became widely discussed—and hopelessly deadlocked.

Someone brought an insanity charge against Reid. A insanity trial found him normal.

For more than three years he ate and slept as the guest of Glenn county. There seemed no way of breaking the impasse.

War-time buddies of Reid decided that a visit by the "alimony martyr" to the tenth annual reunion of the old outfit might take his mind off his domestic troubles and instill in "Alimony Sam," a desire to get back into the world again.

Sheriff Roy Heard, tall and popular, had become friendly with Reid during the years of the latter's voluntary imprisonment. He, too, felt that a new viewpoint was Sam's greatest need. And although he knew he laid himself liable to serious charges, Sheriff Heard took the prisoner to San Francisco to the reunion. Sam had a wonderful time, he told Heard, as they returned to jail.

Then the Glenn County Bar Association formally charged Heard with contempt of court in taking the prisoner from the county. A date was set for the hearing.

The 363rd felt that it was losing ground in its fight to rehabilitate Reid. Its officers summoned an attorney, and rushed here from San Francisco to assist Heard, for hours, the veterans argued with Reid, attacking his stubborn fight for a principal, telling of the sheriff's plight through working in Reid's behalf. They pledged the support of the old outfit in getting Sam started again, and in
