

Balloonists delay celebration for sleep after historic flight

SAVANNAH, Ga. (AP) — Their Super Chicken III roosting on a coastal island, the two men who made the first non-stop balloon trip across the United States chose sleep over celebration at the end of their 2,500-mile flight.

"We're all about in the same tired state," co-pilot Fred Gorrell, 40, said Sunday night in a telephone interview. He and John Shoecraft, 38, breezed across the country in two days.

The Phoenix, Ariz. businessmen were saving the champagne for today when they planned to retrieve the polyethylene balloon and egg-shaped gondola — for which the craft was named — from Blackbeard Island just south of Savannah, Gorrell said. They spent the night at a motel.

Shoecraft and Gorrell fought off oxygen starvation and sub-freezing temperatures, flying as high as 28,000 feet at speeds that at times exceeded 50 mph, said Chris

Van Elk, who officially monitored the flight from Scottsdale, Ariz.

Shoecraft, who said he felt "on top of the world" after the journey, said he and Gorrell were concerned about whether they would be able to land close enough to shore, "or if we landed in the ocean with the fog, if we would have a serious problem getting rescued or whatever."

"We were able to bring the balloon right in on the beach so we were very happy," he said.

The gondola fell several feet and landed with a jolt after the pilots released it from the balloon "to keep from flying off into the ocean at that point," Shoecraft said.

Shortly thereafter, we just went on and walked up and down the beach and enjoyed ourselves," he said. A Coast Guard vessel took them off the island.

Gorrell said he had been "confident we were going to

complete our goal. There was never any doubt."

Two earlier versions of the Super Chicken failed in attempts to float across the country.

Super Chicken I ended Sept. 22, 1980 when Shoecraft and co-pilot Ron Ripps bailed out at Columbus, Ohio, in thunderstorms. Super Chicken II failed after only 30 hours aloft, forced down by turbulence in Liberal, Kan., on Dec. 5, 1980.

Another team, New Mexico mining company executive Maxie Anderson and his son, Kris, flew the helium balloon Kitty Hawk from San Francisco to the East Coast last year, but the craft was blown off course and drifted to a landing in Canada.

The 10-story-high Super Chicken III touched down at 11:07 a.m. EDT on the island, said Robert Nevins of the Federal Aviation Administration's Jacksonville, Fla. Regional Control Center.

"The first time we let down (through the clouds) we

found out we were 20 miles inland," Gorrell said. The second landing attempt failed when stiff ocean breezes forced them to ascend and try again.

"They were in the air 55 hours, 25 minutes and they traveled 2,515 miles," Van Elk said.

Shoecraft and Gorrell began their flight Friday morning from Costa Mesa, Calif., and crossed the Continental Divide without difficulty later that night.

Crossing the Rocky Mountains was the most dangerous part of the flight because of possibly hazardous wind currents, Gorrell said, adding that the pair wore parachutes until they cleared the mountains.

They sailed over Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas, then over the Mississippi River to Alabama and Georgia.

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Haig reaffirms Egypt support

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States will conduct large-scale military exercises in Egypt next month, possibly including the use of B-52 bombers, and is considering accelerated arms aid to both Egypt and neighboring Sudan, the Reagan administration says.

"We're going to have to contribute to the security of threatened nations by the provision of economic and military support," Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. said Sunday before leaving Cairo, where he headed the U.S. delegation to the funeral of assassinated Egyptian President Anwar Sadat. "We're going to have to show our presence here from time to time."

That is necessary, Haig said, to demonstrate "that it is not fatal to be an ally of the United States."

Haig returned to Washington early today, saying that U.S. officials had been "able to affirm unequivocally continuing American support for the government of Egypt" and that he was "very reassured" that Sadat's successor will follow the same policies.

Interviewed Sunday on NBC's "Meet the Press," Haig said the "very extensive" military exercise will involve forces from the United States, Egypt and some Persian Gulf countries. One U.S. official, who asked not to be identified, said Oman also would participate.

"We are looking at a number of options to reinforce the area with B-52s and other aircraft in an American military presence in a live exercise," Haig said.

A SENIOR administration official said the exercise, known as "Bright Star," may involve practice bombing runs by B-52s on an Egyptian target range. The bombers might fly non-stop from bases in the United States and return with mid-air refueling, said the official, who did not want to be identified.

U.S. and Egyptian forces conducted a joint desert exercise last year, without B-52s.

Haig also said American officials are in the Middle East to assess increased arms aid to Egypt and its southern neighbor, Sudan, "as a concrete manifestation" of support in the wake of Sadat's assassination.

He said one American team is going to Sudan, which he said has been threatened by internal subversion

and growing tension with Libya.

"We are looking for a step-up of deliveries of American equipment to this threatened nation," Haig said.

White House national security adviser Richard V. Allen said on CBS' "Face the Nation" that Haig is examining ways to accelerate delivery of "\$200 million in the pipeline for the Sudan."

With Egyptian Vice President Hosni Mubarak, Sadat's hand-picked successor, at his side earlier Sunday, Haig told reporters that Egypt was "foremost" among America's friends in the Middle East.

Asked later if his remark reflected a downgrading of the U.S. relationship with Israel, Haig said: "No, not at all. Our commitment (to Israel) is clear, unequivocal and unchallengeable."

Presidential counselor Edwin Meese III said on ABC's "Issues and Answers" that Haig probably was referring to Egypt as the nation's foremost friend among Arab nations. Upon his arrival in Washington, Haig said the statement took into account the role of Egypt in the Arab world and its large population. Asked if he was putting Egypt ahead of Israel among U.S. friends, he replied: "That's your interpretation, not mine."

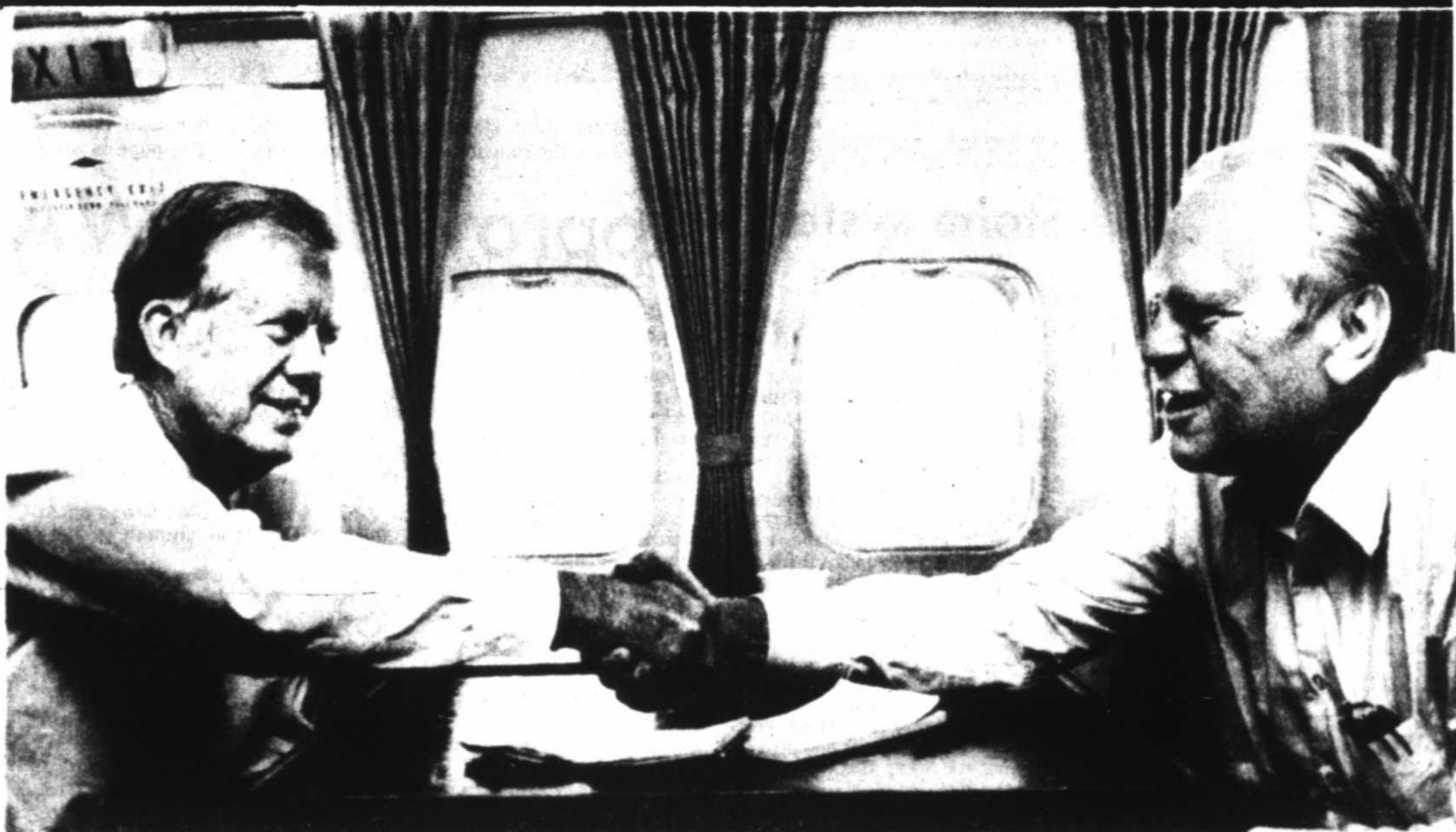
A senior State Department official on the flight home, who asked to remain anonymous, told reporters separately that Haig's statement may have been "rhetorical overkill for the occasion, but legitimate."

THE OFFICIAL also said President Reagan's Mideast envoy, Philip C. Habib, may return to the region next month in an effort to expand and strengthen the ceasefire that ended fighting between Israel and Palestinian forces in Lebanon in late July.

Haig called on Israel and Egypt on Sunday to "strip aside some of the inflexibilities of the past" and rapidly conclude an agreement on autonomy for Palestinians in the Israeli-occupied West Bank and Gaza strip.

He said the administration has made clear to Israel that it does not want any enlargement of Israeli West Bank settlements during the autonomy negotiating period. The next round of talks is scheduled for Oct. 21-22 in Cairo.

On another subject, the secretary said Egypt and Saudi Arabia may take steps in the next few weeks to improve relations, something the administration would welcome.

Carter, Ford say U.S. must deal directly with PLO

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gerald R. Ford and Jimmy Carter, who were instrumental in bringing Israel and Egypt together, say the United States eventually must deal directly with the Palestine Liberation Organization to gain a comprehensive Middle East peace.

In an unprecedented joint interview, the 38th and 39th presidents also agreed that many moderate Arab leaders support the Camp David peace process but are afraid to speak up.

Ford and Carter, frequently calling each other "Jerry" and "Jimmy," spoke on the flight back from Saturday's funeral of slain Egyptian President Anwar Sadat. The White House released the text Sunday.

Sadat had urged that the United States talk with the PLO.

"At some point that has to happen," said Ford, who was president when then-Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger employed shuttle diplomacy leading to the separation of Israeli and Egyptian forces in the Sinai.

"That is the kind of development that I think has to take place if you're going to get the negotiations for the future off dead center," he added. "I would not want to pick the date today ... but as you go down the road at some point, that dialogue has to take place, and I think that will happen."

IT WAS Ford who promised Israel that the United States would not deal with the PLO until it recognized Israel's right to exist.

Carter, who personally supervised the 1978 summit at his Camp David, Md., retreat that led to a peace

treaty between Egypt and Israel, said: "There is no way for Israel ever to have an assured permanent peace without resolving the Palestinian issue. ... So I think Jerry is certainly right in saying these discussions have to be done."

The problem, Carter said, is U.S. recognition of the PLO before PLO recognition of Israel.

"We can't speak for Israel, but I think a simultaneous acknowledgement of the PLO that Israel has a right to exist, and our dealing with the PLO, would certainly be something that I would favor," Carter said.

Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. said upon his return to Washington early today that U.S. policy hasn't changed — not to negotiate with the PLO until it has recognized Israel's right to exist within secure borders.

Both former presidents said dealings with the PLO would not necessarily have to be with the present leadership under Yasser Arafat.

"It can be responsible business and other leaders," Carter said.

"There may well be other leaders that in time will either in conjunction with Arafat or independently have an opportunity to represent them in these eventual negotiations," Ford added.

Carter said "the greatest thing the Palestinians could do for themselves is for the Palestinian mayors to say, 'We will negotiate even this limited self-government or full autonomy,' and then consolidate their position."

Ford agreed, saying, "If I were in the shoes of the PLO, I would, rather than fight it, accept whatever can be negotiated between Egypt and Israel."

Ford also suggested that returning the rest of the Sinai to Egypt before next April's deadline would be "a great step forward."

"Once the Camp David process is finalized, if the pressure is on from the United States and other sources, there can be another step that will appeal to the moderate Arab nations," Ford said. "And if they're given the opportunity they will disengage themselves from the radicals."

Carter said, "If there was a mistake made in Camp David it was not involving more deeply the Saudis and at least the Jordanians. Following that, Sadat became in public at least a pariah among the Arabs."

Among moderate Arabs, Carter said, "the Saudis in particular ... were hoping that the peace process would succeed. But it's almost impossible for an Arab to step forward because of a threat of assassination or violence within their own fragile government."

FORD AGREED. "They cannot say what they tell me and tell President Carter or tell others," he said.

"They don't have the stability of a Sadat," Carter said. "Jordan has a weak nation. (King Hussein) is a weak leader and the same with (Syrian President Hafez) Assad, who has a minority position in his own country. And, of course, the Saudi Arabians also have a fragile country with a tiny population, no great military strength and enormous wealth. So they don't have the courage of Sadat, and they don't have the solid foundation that Sadat had of support by his people."

Report faults prison for inmate deaths

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Deficient medical care, untrained personnel and poor conditions may have contributed to the deaths of prisoners at the Texas Department of Corrections hospital at Huntsville, according to a physician's report.

The study, prepared by Dr. Robert Cohen for a legal expert monitoring the department under a federal court order, said records of 11 of 33 deaths at the facility "demonstrate serious shortcomings in the medical care these prisoner patients received."

In one death, Cohen named a prison doctor who had "significant responsibility for the outcome of this patient." Another prisoner died of a "potentially treatable, easily diagnosed condition," while a third died after "grossly deficient care," he wrote.

Hospital officials could not be reached for comment.

Cohen, associate medical director of Rikers Island Health Services, Montefiore Hospital in New York City, toured the hospital in August. He prepared the study for a special court master picked by U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice.

Justice has ruled the department violates inmates' rights and has ordered the five-story hospital downgraded to an infirmary. He also or-

dered sweeping reforms in Texas prisons earlier this year after an inmate filed suit against the system on behalf of the state's prisoners.

PRISON OFFICIALS have appealed, hoping to keep their hospital open until a facility in Galveston opens next year.

Dr. Ralph Gray, assistant director of health services for the prison system, said no hospital has been found that will accept prisoners as patients.

Cohen's report says one man at the prison who is not licensed to practice medicine in Texas calls himself a doctor, signs reports as an M.D. and is not familiar with patient conditions in his ward.

Cohen also criticized the extensive use of inmate nurses and says parts of the hospital are unsanitary.

Of the inmates whose deaths Cohen detailed, Freddie Ramsey was the victim of "grossly deficient care," the report said.

Ramsey, 63, was admitted to the prison hospital Dec. 8, 1980 with a serious liver disease, possibly cancer. On Dec. 10, officials at the Huntsville facility wrote to John Sealey Hospital in Galveston, where more serious inmate health problems are treated on

a contract basis, asking that Ramsey be seen on a "Priority I basis." Ramsey died Dec. 15 in his Huntsville hospital bed. John Sealey Hospital received the letter after Ramsey died.

"There was serious misassessment of Mr. Ramsey's condition," Cohen said. "His condition was obviously so serious that to write a letter to John Sealey ... was to condemn him to inadequate treatment."

THE REPORT SAID Billy Joe Tutt, 37, who died of heart failure June 9, 1981, "did not receive any of the medications that were ordered."

A 50-year-old patient who died of a perforated stomach and peritonitis, had "a potentially treatable, easily diagnosable condition, requiring emergency surgery which was not done," he said.

The man in question was unfamiliar with the condition of the patients on his ward, according to the report.

Cohen was highly critical of HUH's dependence on inmate nurses. He also reported that portions of the hospital are unsanitary.

"Handwashing facilities for staff and inmates are inadequate or nonexistent."

After flash flood warnings, Midland can expect more rain

Flash flood warnings were in effect for the Permian Basin for most of Sunday night and early today, and Midlanders can expect to see still more rain.

According to the National Weather Service at Midland Regional Airport, it will be cloudy with a chance of showers and thunderstorms through Tuesday. The chance of rain is 30 percent for tonight and Tuesday.

The NWS recorded 1.38 inches of rainfall in Midland overnight, Big Spring reported 1.05 inches, and Lamesa reported 1.5 inches in town and an excess of five inches in the northern part of Dawson County. Most of the area towns, with the exception of Rankin, reported good rains.

As of this morning, the rains in Midland have brought the monthly total to 3.73 inches and the yearly total to 15.75 inches.

Temperatures should fall into the lower 60s tonight and climb back into the middle 80s on Tuesday.

Winds will be from the southeast 10-15 mph through Tuesday.

Sunday's high of 82 was 12 degrees cooler than the record high of 94 set for that date in 1979. The overnight

low of 66 was 26 degrees warmer than the record low of 40 set in 1946.

Heavy, slow moving thunderstorms dumped more than seven inches of rain over a portion of North Central Texas early today, prompting the National Weather Service to issue flash flood warnings for several Texas counties.

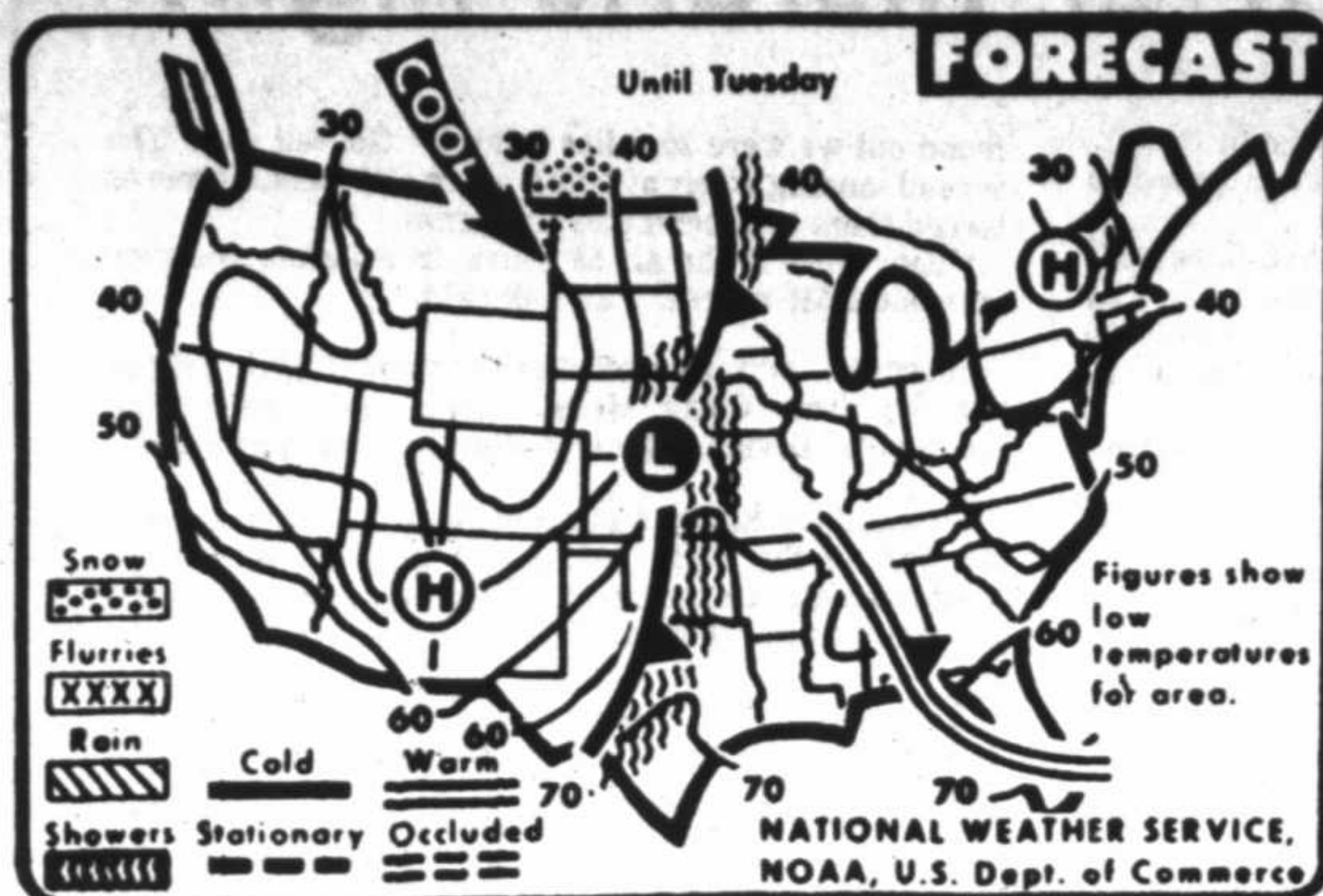
Mineral Wells reported 7.3 inches of rainfall by 6:30 a.m. and rain was continuing to fall. More than six inches of rain fell near Whitt and in the Springtown area of Parker County. Breckenridge had received 4.4 inches before dawn.

Lt. Kenneth Gillilan of the Mineral Wells Police Department said several families were evacuated from their homes in southwest and southeast sections of the city because of extensive flooding.

Several streets were closed and some motorists had to be rescued from their stranded automobiles, Gillilan said.

"It's still raining hard here now and we have the potential for more flooding," Gillilan added.

Storm system widespread

A large storm system brought showers and thunderstorms to the Great Plains, while rain and snow were over the Rocky Mountains and the plateau.

Approval of AWACS sale forecast

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two top-level advisers to President Reagan are predicting the administration will prevail in the Senate on the proposed sale of AWACS radar planes to Saudi Arabia, although acknowledging it is an uphill battle.

Richard V. Allen, Reagan's national security adviser, said Sunday on CBS' "Face the Nation" that the administration is making "steady progress" on this issue.

"I believe that we are steadily gaining adherents to the president's position, and I think that when the final vote is taken the sale would, in fact, be approved," said Allen.

Likewise, presidential counselor Edwin Meese III, interviewed on ABC's "Issues and Answers," said "I think that we will ultimately find that when the Senate votes they will not disapprove the plan."

Meese acknowledged, however, "There's no question that it's still an uphill fight. We by no means have this vote in the bag."

Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr., meanwhile, appearing on NBC's "Meet the Press" via satellite from Cairo before returning to Washington early today, said Egyptian and other Arab leaders he spoke with while in Egypt for Anwar Sadat's funeral are vitally interested in the proposed \$8.5 billion arms sale.

"All have expressed their grave concern that the United States Congress may not support the president in this important issue," said Haig.

Simple majority vetoes from both the House and Senate would be needed to halt the sale of the five Airborne Warning and Control Systems planes and equipment to enhance the firepower of Saudi F-15 jets.

The House is expected to veto the sale Wednesday. A Senate vote is scheduled Oct. 20. The latest Associated Press count shows the Senate lined up 57-31 against it.

Haig said Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin remains opposed to the sale. "He has a right and indeed an obligation to express concern when any additional sophisticated military equipment is provided to an Arab state."

"But his responsibilities are not American responsibility. Ours are broader. And we must address it from a purely American point of view," Haig said.

And, said Allen, whom Reagan has designated to coordinate the AWACS sale effort, "...we find increasing recognition on the part of those members of Congress with whom we are discussing the matter that the United States' national interest is clearly served by the sale."

"They are going to Saudi Arabia for the protection of Saudi Arabia's oil fields. In that sense, it undergirds our own vital national security interest there, and I think it contributes in large measure to the stability of the entire developed world," said Allen.

Report says Southern poor will become poorer

ATLANTA (AP) — President Reagan has launched "a war on the poor" with new welfare policies that will cause more suffering in the South than any federal action this century, a non-profit research group charged today.

Forty percent of Southern recipients of Aid to Families with Dependent Children will be cut from the rolls by mid-1982 and 20 percent more will have their benefits slashed if all of Reagan's proposals to alter the nation's welfare system are adopted, according to a report released by the Atlanta-based Southern Regional Council.

As the home of a third of the nation's poor and half of the country's poor blacks, the South will be hit hard by changes in AFDC and programs such as Medicaid, food stamps and the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act, the report said.

The report said one-tenth of the more than 2.1 million AFDC recipients in an 11-state Southern region will lose their benefits in the next five months because of new federal eligibility regulations.

Another 20 percent of AFDC recipients could be removed if requirements to report income on a monthly basis are strictly enforced, while another 10 percent could be removed by Reagan's proposed 1982 budget cuts, the report said.

The 11 states in the region covered by the report are Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia.

"These numbers for the basic programs affecting the poor add up like a casualty list in wartime," said the report, written by Steve Suits, the council's executive director, and Richard Lyle, its former research director.

"Indeed the numbers suggest that the national government has now transferred the war on poverty of 15 years ago to a war on the poor today," they wrote.

"The fact is that not since the eras surrounding the Civil War has the national government instituted deliberate policies and practices that will likely cause so many human casualties among blacks and whites on Southern soil."

Sadat's Arab foes bidding their time

BEIRUT (AP) — President Anwar Sadat's Arab foes are observing a de facto cease-fire toward his successor, hoping he will pull back from the peace process with Israel and alliance with the United States.

The Kuwaiti newspaper Al Qabas said President-designate Hosni Mubarak "will begin his reign with his ability to be fresh and unsoiled and his ability to shake off the responsibility for the mistakes and provocations of his predecessor."

"Mubarak is not likely to hear an ugly word from the Arabs as long as he only utters nice words about them," Syrian officials in Damascus said that, despite Mubarak's pledge to

continue Sadat's policies, "things can never be the same" and Mubarak may change them after consolidating power.

Syrian President Hafez Assad met Sunday with Libyan Foreign Minister Ali Triki "concerning the situation in Egypt," the Syrian news agency said. It said they were concerned by U.S. attempts to "contain Hosni Mubarak and besiege him in order to force him

to continue Anwar Sadat's peace policies."

Officials in Damascus said Syria and Libya were also concerned about the movements of the U.S. 6th Fleet in the Mediterranean, and Libya claimed the fleet was staging "provocative maneuvers" off its coast.

Arab League representative Clovis Maksoud said Sadat's assassination "immensely improved" the chances of reconciliation between Egypt and the Arab nations that broke relations with Cairo because of Sadat's separate peace treaty with Egypt, the Beirut magazine Monday Morning reported.

Maksoud predicted a battle "for the soul of Egypt" between the United States and Arab nations opposed to Israel. "And I think the Arab world has a much, much better edge within the Egyptian body politic," he said.

But the independent Beirut newspaper An Nahar said the "Arabs have no alternative to Camp David to offer Egypt." It suggested an "Arab strategic summit" that would endorse Saudi Arabia's recent peace proposal offering implicit recognition of Israel in exchange for creation of a Palestinian state.

Israel rejected the proposal when it was made by Saudi Crown Prince Fahd last August. But Sadat favored creating a Palestinian homeland out of territories Israel occupied in the 1967 Mideast War, and Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. predicted Sunday that Egypt under Mubarak would move closer to Saudi Arabia.

Echoing this thought, the English-language Kuwait Times urged Mubarak to bring Egypt's Middle East policy closer to those of other moderate Arab states.

"It need not swing from one extreme to another," the government newspaper said. "Instead, it can carry with it the bulk of the Arab world in finding a realistic solution to the Middle East problem, a possibility which is quite feasible now in the context of the Saudi blueprint."

However, exiled opposition leader Michel Kamel of the outlawed Egyptian National Front said he expected no changes in Egyptian policies.

Security increased at minister's home

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Heavy security surrounded Interior Minister Nabawy Ismail's home today, where police sources claimed Moslem extremists launched an armed attack over the weekend.

Ismail on Sunday denied his home was attacked, calling the story a "lie" and advising reporters not to believe

rumors. Sharpshooters huddled in the rear of trucks on either side of his house in the Cairo suburb of Mohandissin, just across the Nile River from the Egyptian capital.

There was one sharpshooter and an observer in each truck, parked 50 yards on either side of the house.

40-year-old Odessa builder killed in fall from roof under construction

ODESSA — A 40-year-old Odessa builder was killed Saturday when he fell from the roof of a building under construction.

ODESSA — Odessa police were reporting no developments early today in the stabbing death of an Odessa man whose body was found early Saturday in a pool of blood behind a south Odessa bar.

Lt. Kenneth Jones said no arrests have been made. There are apparently no suspects in the case.

Segovia, believed to be in his late teens or early 20s, was found at 3:26 a.m. behind Mil Amores Bar in south Odessa. Investigating officers said the man had been stabbed nine times with a large blade knife.

Police had received a report of a wounded man at 2:12 a.m. Saturday. When emergency medical personnel found Segovia he was dead.

According to one officer, police are investigating whether Segovia was in the United States legally.

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Security guards surround Palestine Liberation Organization leader Yasser Arafat following his arrival in Tokyo today for a three-day tour of Japan. Japanese authorities have committed up to 17,000 police officers to insure Arafat's safety during a schedule that includes talks with Japanese leaders.

More Iranian leftists killed; Peacekeeping force rejected

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's Moslem fundamentalist regime sent 82 more leftist opponents to their deaths before firing squads over the weekend, Iran's state-run radio reported today.

Parliament speaker Ali-Akbar Rafsanjani, meanwhile, rejected an offer by the 42-nation Islamic Conference Organization to station a multinational peacekeeping force along the Persian nation's warfront with Iraq, Tehran Radio said.

The radio said 73 guerrillas from the Islamic-Marxist Mujahedeen Khalq underground group were executed in the capital and nine in four other cities in northern and western Iran.

All 82 executed leftists were convicted by Islamic revolutionary courts of armed insurrection, street violence, bank robbery and illegal possession of weapons and explosives.

The latest deaths brought to 1,328 the total number of publicly announced executions in Iran since the June 22 ouster of moderate President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr. Bani-Sadr's dismissal triggered a Mujahedeen Khalq urban guerrilla campaign of bombings and assassinations to overthrow Khomeini's regime.

Mujahedeen Khalq leader Massoud Rajavi said in a statement from his exile headquarters in Paris that nearly 100 students supporters of his movement injured in recent street demonstrations in Tehran "were taken last week from their hospital beds to (Tehran's) Evin prison, where they were executed."

Tehran Radio said Rafsanjani had rejected as nothing new the latest proposals submitted by Tunisia's Habib Chatti, secretary-general of the 42-nation Islamic Conference Organization, to resolve the nearly 13-month-old Iran-Iraq war at the northern tip of the Persian Gulf.

Nixon in Saudi Arabia

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Former President Richard Nixon is in Saudi Arabia for a surprise meeting with King Khaled and Crown Prince Fahd.

Nixon "is not here in any official U.S. government capacity," a U.S. Embassy official said Sunday in the Red Sea port of Jidda. American diplomats in Jidda and Cairo were unable to say what the purpose of Nixon's visit might be.

Nixon flew to Saudi Arabia from Cairo on Saturday night after attending the funeral of slain Egyptian President Anwar Sadat. Reports from Cairo suggested Nixon would discuss the controversial proposed U.S. sale of AWACS radar planes to the kingdom — perhaps at the behest of President Reagan.

Soviet who entered embassy in custody

MOSCOW (AP) — A man who entered the U.S. Embassy here with a loaded shotgun and told reporters he planned to shoot himself if he didn't get political asylum was in Soviet custody today.

The man, who identified himself as Boris V. Lesnov, a 42-year-old mechanic, drove a Soviet-made Moskvich past Soviet guards Sunday.

He surrendered the shotgun to a U.S. Marine guard and talked for several hours with consular officials.

Soviet plantclothesmen took him into custody when he left the embassy five hours later. Authorities said he was arrested "for disturbing public order."

U.S. official would not comment on details of Lesnov's conversation, but embassy sources described him as excited.

Lesnov, talking to reporters before he was led away, said he spent four years in a mental hospital in the city of Kaza, 500 miles east of Moscow.

"This is not Communism," he said. "We have problems everytime we try to do something different. Life is terrible."

A Soviet police officer said Lesnov has "a record of

mental illness." Soviet dissidents claim authorities over lock up dissidents in mental hospitals.

Plainclothesmen tried to stop Western television crews and reporters from covering Lesnov's departure from the embassy. One Western correspondent was knocked to the ground and a television camera was damaged.

Uniformed police prevented another television crew and a reporter from photographing the scene.

It was the third time in six weeks that Soviets have eluded guards and driven into the compound to talk with U.S. Embassy officials. Soviet citizens have also entered the Belgian and French embassies.

Dominicans protest Bush's visit

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) — Rock-hurling demonstrators protested the visit of Vice President George Bush, who later praised "the example the Dominican Republic offers in strengthening democracy in the world."

Riot police arrested 43 anti-American protesters in downtown Santo Domingo Sunday after they began burning tires and attacking police. One reporter at the scene said a young man was injured, but officials did not report any casualties.

The clash erupted as Bush arrived in this Caribbean nation for a 48-hour visit on his way to Colombia and Brazil.

President Antonio Guzman, toasting Bush at a banquet Sunday night, noted the "spectacle of rapidly deteriorating respect for authority and the enthroning of terrorism as a habitual political weapon."

"This situation demands the closest international cooperation in order to avoid that these social conflicts, at times generated by economic pressures, become general and lead to the crumbling of societies and governments," Guzman said.

In his response, Bush said his conversations with Guzman and other Dominican officials had given him "a new and better understanding of the needs of your beautiful country and of the example the Dominican Republic offers in the strengthening of democ-

racy in the new world."

Bush is scheduled to address the national legislature today and hold talks on possible financial aid to the Dominican Republic, whose main trading partner is the United States.

Prior to Bush's arrival, Dominican legislators approved a resolution opposing a proposal in the U.S. House of Representatives to increase domestic sugar price supports from 15 to 18 cents per pound.

There is concern here that higher price supports for domestic sugar in the United States — the biggest buyer of this nation's main export crop — could cut the demand for Dominican sugar.

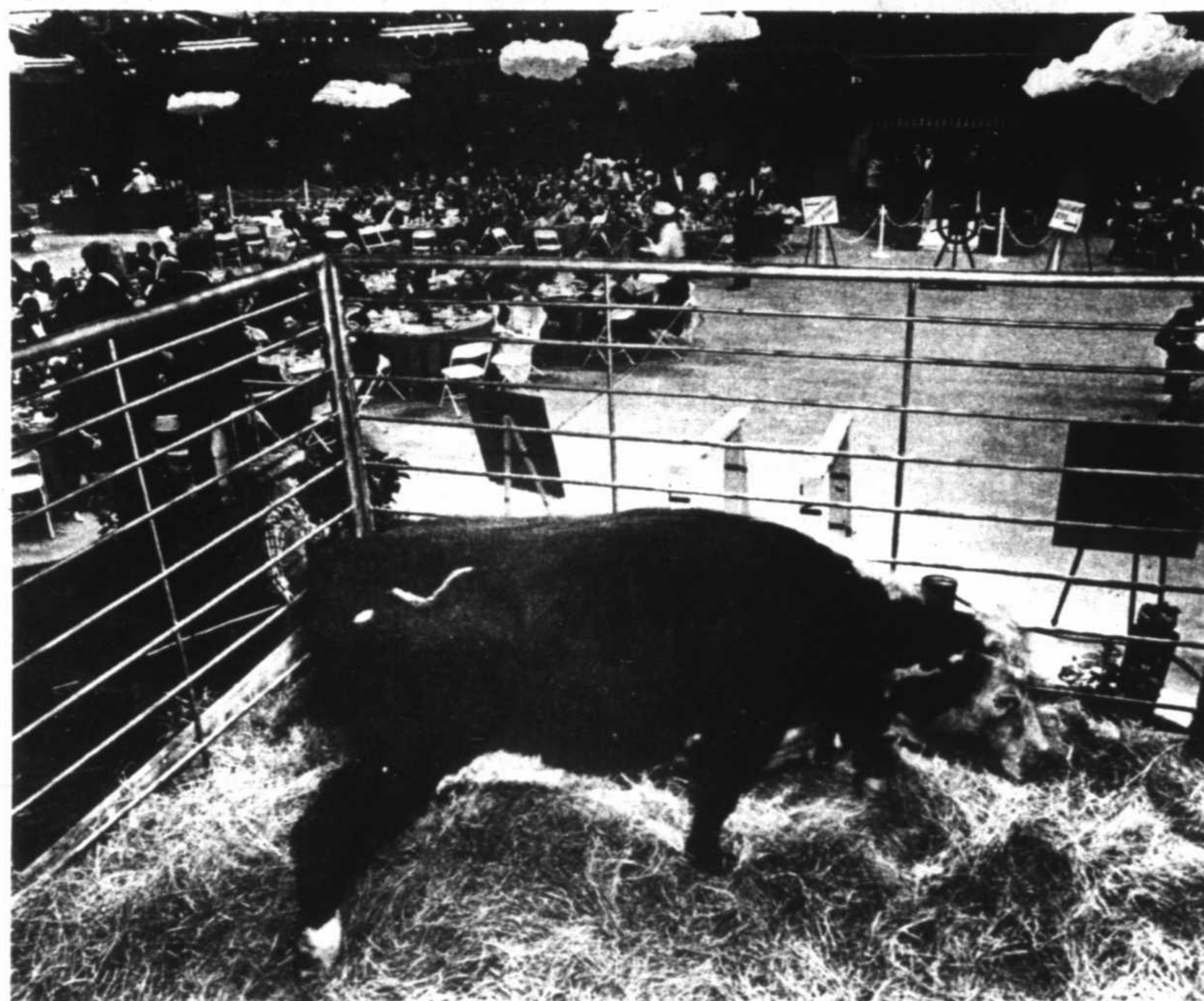

Tarr beats Gondolfo for Penn Circuit net title

Derek Tarr of East London, South Africa, was a double winner Sunday in the 21st annual Midland Fall Classic Tennis Tournament (part of the USTA Penn Circuit) when he won the single's title in straight sets followed by a doubles come from behind victory with partner Rand Evett of Grand Junction, Colo.

Playing a patient ground stroke game with occasional net charges, Tarr was able to overcome the dynamic serve of Mike Gondolfo, Lakeland, Fla., to post a 6-4, 6-4 victory. Gondolfo's serve, which is reportedly in the 120 miles per hour neighborhood, was good for 15 aces in the match to Tarr's zero, but it wasn't enough to overcome the South African's consistent play.

TEAMING UP with Evett in the doubles finals, the two spotted Mike Bauer and Jeff Simpson the first set, 3-6, and came back to win the next two, 6-3, 7-6. The 12-point tie breaker for the doubles title was won 7-4 by Tarr-Evett after posting a quick 6-0 lead, a strong finish for what had been an exciting match.

Tarr, 21, is a newcomer to the professional tennis scene. He got his start in June after graduating from Auburn where he was an All-American his senior year and seeded

10th in the NCAA tournament. From college he went to Europe where he played "in some \$25,000 tournaments, a little bigger than this (Midland Fall Classic) in Italy, and managed to get to the quarterfinals of two," he said. "After that I went to Switzerland which is very similar to the Penn Circuit in the United States and won three of five matches on a six-week circuit."

When Tarr returned to the United States he played in the qualifying rounds of this year's U.S. Open and survived long enough to face Harold Solomon in the first round.

"I lost to Harold Solomon in the first round," said Tarr. "It was a pretty tough draw. From there I came on this circuit."

IN HIS singles final against Gondolfo, Tarr had problems returning serve, even when he got his racket on the ball.

"His serves were coming so fast that I could only try and get my racket on the ball," he said. "I was lucky he let up a slight bit in the second set. I pulled out some returns in the second that I didn't think I could make. He served great throughout. I think his serve is as good as Roscoe Tanner's and his second serve is a little better because Tanner lets up a bit and Mike goes all out."

The two finalists in Sunday's matches had completely different starts in their tennis careers. Tarr began playing

when he was eight years old while Gondolfo was a relative late-comer to the sport, not starting until he was 15.

"My parents played tennis socially, not competitively," said Tarr. "I was lucky to start so early. I think that's important. I played all the way through junior tennis until I got a tennis scholarship at Auburn."

Gondolfo, 23, got his start in tennis at the end of a pair of baseball mishaps.

"I started on my 15th birthday," he said. "I played baseball before I played tennis. The summer before I turned 15 I was hit twice in the eye and on my next birthday my father gave me two tennis rackets and told me to quit baseball and Florida you can play tennis year round."

GONDOLFO went to college at Clemson where he received All-American honors in both his junior and senior years while also being named Atlantic Coast Conference Most Valuable Player. He's been playing Satellite pro tennis since February and last year he competed in the U.S. Open. Like Tarr, he qualified for the tournament and was defeated in the first round by Peter Rennett.

The player who teamed up with Tarr to win the doubles competition is older than most of the players he goes up against, 27. Evett graduated from Arizona in 1975 and

has played off and on since then in the pros, not full time. He considers this time through could be his last if he doesn't make it onto the Grand Prix Circuit.

"It's kind of a last shot for me at the circuit," he said. "I'm getting to the age where it's now or never. I think I can do it or I wouldn't be out here. My goal is to be ranked among the top 200 in the world and I think I can do it by the end of this year."

Evett and Tarr have been doubles partners since the second week of this five-week tour and so far they are the only players to beat top seeded Bauer and Simpson. They've done it twice.

"We met the second week of the circuit," he said. "During the first tournament, his partner got sick and mine went home and we were both looking for partners so we just got together. Right away we clicked. He's got a good ground stroke and I'm more of a streak player. Derek is stronger off the ground and I like the net."

Whether they are playing singles or doubles, tennis is the life of these players and the others who are struggling to make it big on the Grand Prix Circuit. Some will make, and others won't. Still, they are giving it the best they have to offer and in most cases are getting little (money) in return.

Switzer must count blessings

Oklahoma's Barry Switzer owns the best winning percentage of any coach in college football. If he had to play Texas every weekend, he might be pounding the pavement.

Switzer is 1-4 against Fred Akers-coached Texas teams and the way things have been going he couldn't be blamed if he were pulling for Texas' influential alums to become impatient.

Going into the season, Fred's job was supposed to be in jeopardy after a 7-5 season, a year in which even a win over Oklahoma was forgotten. The word was out that this was it for Fred.

But after a 4-0 start and his most emphatic win thus far over the Sooners, 34-14, that presumably is ancient history. After the game, Fred had to ask the score during his interview.

HOWEVER, at halftime it looked as though Texas and Fred were in trouble. The Sooners led 14-3 and to many it looked like the game was not only over, but the second half was only a question of how bad it might get. It got bad, all right.

As the clock wound down, the Cotton Bowl presented a curious scene. You could tell where the Texas fans were, they were still a solid block of orange, savoring every last minute. You could also tell where the Oklahoma fans had been. They were only a few isolated pockets of red scattered where once there had been a solid mass of humanity.

YOU HAD to wonder what Akers had told the Longhorns at half to create the stampede. He said essentially nothing. "You're all right, hold the ball, settle down and keep going."

And looking back, it was good advice. Oklahoma's two touchdowns were the result of two unseemly Texas fumbles that set up easy scores. The Longhorns defense, which had yielded a paltry 1.1 yards per carry going into the game, had blunted the vaunted Sooner running attack. Except for a brief flash here and there, it had been contained more effectively than USC had been able to do in a 28-21 win a few weeks earlier.

Still, Texas hadn't been any ball of fire offensively. Quarterback Rick McIvor looked harried and indecisive and was the culprit on two of those three lost fumbles.

In the second half, he suddenly started picking the Sooner defense apart. If there was a change, McIvor confirmed. It was in the passing attack. "In the first half, I was dropping straight back and couldn't see the Oklahoma linebackers. They were dropping back in a zone and with the line rushing, I couldn't see where they were. In the second half, we started running sweeps." He continued and "we went to the play action passes and they were taking the fakes."

It forced the OU secondary to commit when Rick scrambled out of the pass rush and opened up some big gains.

BASED ON Texas and USC showings against Oklahoma, it seemed the Longhorns were the only logical choice to move into No. 1 this week, but that was before the Trojans went from No. 1 in the nation to perhaps No. 2 in Los Angeles.

That throws this week's poll up for grabs. No. 4 Pitt and No. 2 Penn State are unbeaten. Penn State beat off-whipped Boston College but the Panthers probably picked up more prestige points with a win over previously unbeaten West Virginia.

No. 5 North Carolina just might be the best of all. The Tar Heel point margins have been awesome and event without Kelvin Bryant, won big again Saturday.

It really doesn't matter this early. However, the Cotton Bowl people have to be pulling for all four to keep it up, because it could set up a national championship match for their New Year's Day Classic, and they haven't had one of those since Notre Dame foiled Texas in 1978.

Pitt and Penn State are independents and North Carolina belongs to the Atlantic Coast Conference, which has no binding bowl obligations. All three are free to go where they please. If just one of the three make it unbeaten and Texas, which still has SMU, Houston, Texas A&M, not to mention Arkansas, left, makes it...well, you can't blame the Cotton Bowl fathers for dreaming, can you?

Mr. October strikes again

When the weather turns cool, Reggie Jackson gets hot.

The aptly named "Mr. October" lived up to his title with a clutch two-run homer that helped the New York Yankees beat the Milwaukee Brewers 7-3 Sunday night in the final game of the American League East playoffs.

That put the Yankees into the AL championship series against the West-winning Oakland A's starting Tuesday night in New York and completed the playoff picture for the two league titles.

Earlier Sunday, the Los Angeles Dodgers defeated the Houston Astros 4-0 for the National League West championship and the Montreal Expos blanked the Philadelphia Phillies 3-0 in the East. They'll start their five-game series Tuesday night in Los Angeles.

JACKSON, WHO has hit 16 post-season homers, smashed his second of the Milwaukee series in the fourth inning to wipe out a 2-0 Brewer lead. Oscar Gamble followed with another homer to give New York a 3-2 lead and the Yankees were off and running.

"There was a lot of pressure on us," said Jackson after owner George Steinbrenner branded his players "overpriced fat cats" and threatened wholesale changes if the team lost to the Brewers.

"George said yesterday that we would embarrass the New York Yankees if we lost three straight," said Jackson. "That really hurt. If I don't play for them any more, I don't want to leave with that on me. That was paramount."

Jackson is eligible for free agency at the end of the season.

"This team is not going to play three bad games in a row," added Jackson. "The talent is too good. I didn't want to be part of a club that lost three in a row. What he (Steinbrenner) said didn't have to be said. The pressure was on us anyway."

Cowboys get lost in 'fog'

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The San Francisco 49ers found themselves in another one-sided game, but this time they enjoyed the experience.

"It was the greatest victory we've had," said Bill Walsh, the third-year coach whose first two San Francisco teams went 2-14 and 6-10.

Exactly one year after losing 59-14 to the Dallas Cowboys, the 49ers raced to an early 24-0 lead and dealt the Cowboys an embarrassing 45-14 defeat Sunday.

"It was obvious what happened. We had a total breakdown," said Danny White, the Dallas quarterback who left the game after San Francisco took a 38-7 lead on rookie cornerback Ronnie Lott's 41-yard interception return for a touchdown in the third period.

LOTT'S touchdown, his second as a pro, came 35 seconds after the 49ers' Joe Montana connected with Dwight Clark on a 78-yard touchdown pass play.

"We played like we were in a fog out there," said Coach Tom Landry.

But, in their worst loss since the 1970 National Football League season, the Cowboys couldn't blame the weather. It was sunny and warm at Candlestick Park, the often foggy stadium by San Francisco Bay, and a sellout crowd of 57,574 home fans basked in joy.

MONTANA hit Freddie Solomon on five passes for 74 yards and a touchdown in the first period, when everything went the 49ers' way.

On one key play, a Dallas fumble rolling toward the sidelines hit a referee's foot, stayed in bounds and was recovered by Lott.

"It was gratifying to have everything going our way for a change. As you know, it hasn't been that way for us in recent years," said Walsh.

Tony Dorsett, the NFL's leading rusher going into the game, managed only 21 yards against a San Francisco defense strengthened by the addition of Fred Dean, the former San Diego star who had three sacks in his 49ers' debut.

But Walsh said, no doubt hopefully, "Next week Dorsett could get 200 yards."

Dallas, 4-2 after a second straight loss, will be home next Sunday against the Los Angeles Rams, tied with the 49ers for the NFC West lead.

Ken Stabler finds Snake bite remedy

HOUSTON (AP) — Seattle coach Jack Patera expected his underdog Seahawks to get pounded by Houston running back Earl Campbell but he never anticipated being knocked out by quarterback Ken Stabler.

Stabler, who completed only one pass a week ago, resurrected the Oilers passing attack Sunday with three touchdown throws in the 35-17 victory.

Campbell chipped in with 186 yards and two touchdowns on 39 carries, the third-highest number of carries for one game in National Football League history.

"Even with all the yardage that Campbell gets, if Stabler hadn't hit those passes we'd have been in good shape," said Patera, whose team lost for the 14th time in 15 games. "I thought Kenny played his best game of the year."

THE SEAHAWKS, who upset the Oilers the past two seasons, jumped to a 10-0 lead on Efron Herrera's 41-yard field goal and Jim Zorn's 17-yard TD pass to David Hughes before Stabler ignited the Oilers.

The 11-year veteran hit Ken Burrough on a 31-yard touchdown toss in the first quarter and Campbell ran 1 yard for the go-ahead TD in the second period.

Stabler, who completed 12 of 18 passes for 156 yards, then came back with touchdown shots of 32 yards to tight end Dave Casper and 24 yards to Burrough. Campbell added a 4-yarder in the fourth quarter for the clincher.

Seattle dropped to a 1-5 record and the Oilers, who play their next three games on the road, improved to 4-2.

"Our offense has been taking a licking from the media and we really needed a day like today to lift our confidence for the upcoming road trip," said Stabler. "I've said all along that we were much better offensively than we have shown."

CAMPBELL, meanwhile, continued to prosper in the Oilers' new heavy use of the I-formation.

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Bar claims early closing came too early

HUGO, Okla. (AP) — One of the largest "after-hours" nightclubs in Oklahoma was ordered by law officers to close for the night at 2 a.m. Saturday, but the owner and some state officials claim it was nine days too early.

The "Party Place," on the Texas border south of Hugo became during the weekend the apparent first victim of a new state law requiring private clubs to close between 2 a.m. and 6 a.m.

Choctaw County Sheriff Bill Hall ordered the "after hours" club closed at the new time this weekend because the district attorney told him the new law went into effect Oct. 1.

The clerk's office at the state House of Representatives said although the language of the bill gave it an Oct. 1 effective date, the Legislature failed to attach an emergency clause.

Article 5, Section 58 of the state constitution, states that bills without emergency clauses are effective until 90 days after adjournment of the session.

The Legislature adjourned the 1981 session on July

20 after a three-week recess. Therefore, Oct. 19 would be the effective date following the 90-day waiting period.

"That could change the situation," said Don Shaw, Choctaw County district attorney. Shaw said he could see a "potential mess" ahead of all laws passed by the last regular legislative session.

Jerry Pierce, owner of the "Party Place," said the difference between an Oct. 1 and an Oct. 19 effective date might mean as much as \$10,000 profit for his 5,000-square-foot club, which seats 250 but which Pierce claims sometimes holds as many as 800.

"There's 15 clubs in Paris (Texas) that close at midnight on Friday and 1 o'clock on Saturday," Pierce said. "They all support our place. They even announce on the loudspeaker that they're headin' for the river."

"If we enforced the law to the letter, he's operating illegally now," Hall said. "But he tries to run a nice club. There's several places out there. We're quite concerned with it. We have a lot of problems after 2 o'clock."

He strives for realism in training shuttle pilots

EL PASO, Texas (AP)

When the space shuttle Columbia nears the end of its second mission early next month, the 200,000-pound craft will be dropping toward Earth at a rate of 12,000 to 15,000 feet per minute.

Landing the behemoth is a delicate task. Roger Zweig knows.

Zweig is one of three National Aeronautics and Space Administration research pilots who train astronauts to fly the shuttle during descent.

The shuttle is kind of a cross between the Concorde and a Mack truck," Zweig said. "Some parts of it are very streamlined and others are very bulky."

"We're trying to provide realistic training for the orbiter. In the spacecraft, there is no second attempt."

Zweig, 39, spends several days a week with shuttle astronauts and backup crews, flying with them in the Shuttle Training Aircraft, which is designed to handle and feel like the shuttle.

The airplane is a Grumman Gulfstream II jet modified with a computer system that can simulate operations of the shuttle.

"We've tried to make it as close to flying the real thing as we can make it," Zweig said. "We try to make it handle and feel as much like the real spacecraft in real weather conditions at real times of the day."

Astronauts prepare for the tricky landing by

training first in a ground simulator, then in small T-38 jets then in the shuttle simulator.

Zweig believes the flying simulator is the best training. "There are advocates of ground-based simulators who say, 'Couldn't you do it better some other way?' We don't think so. It's just not the same."

"The problem with training in a room on the ground is that your head is not really on the line. But if you're in the air and you fall apart at the seams, it's your tail."

The astronauts fly the simulator for a couple of hours a week, getting more than a dozen chances to "land" in each session, Zweig said. The simulator's cockpit has been designed so the left side is similar to the cockpit in the real shuttle, with a stick instead of a steering wheel and various dials and switches. The right side, where the instructor sits, is basically unchanged.

"We fly them up to 35,000 feet and then let them take it down," Zweig said. "We take it up and then switch on the computer."

The computer operates on a pattern from a magnetic tape and is controlled by commands from the astronaut's stick.

Because the shuttle is bulkier than the training plane, the computer throws on the plane's reverse thrusters and lowers the main landing gear to get more resistance.

"It's like a skier with a parachute," Zweig said. "If we cut the engines off, we would glide too

well. Reverse thrust gives us an even poorer glide."

In striving for realism, NASA researchers even designed "window blinds" that reduce the pilots' vision.

"If the field of vision in the simulator was larger, then you would get negative training," he said. "We don't want it to be easier to fly. In fact, we wish it were harder to fly."

Zweig said the simulator is so "high fidelity" that pilots virtually can't tell the difference between landing in the simulator and landing the real thing.

"Sitting in the cockpit, we wouldn't know the difference," he said. "We feel it slowing down, but we can't see why. It handles the same. It feels the same."

Zweig said there are rarely any surprises on the training flights.

"There have been times when the computer guidance has made it take some sharp turns near the ground."

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
