The Czar's Farewell to Eng- land—Scenes at Gravesend.

The details of the embarkment of
the Czar at Gravesend reach us by
the late foreign mails. The London
Telegraph of the 23d ult. says: "The
barge with the Emperor, his
children, and the Prince and Prin-
cess of Wales, put off first to the
Russian corvette, which flew Admi-
ral Popoff's flag at the fore, and the
blue crossed Russian ensign at the
peak. The crews of the vessels
around burst into a tremendous
cheer as the imperial and royal visi-
tors went up the Vitiaz's gangway.
The river was now in a state of
great agitation; it was a most excit-
ing spectacle. The nor'easter ruf-
fled the water into white wavelets
upon which the small boats danced,
and into which the yachts pitched.
The thousands of flags by which
the ships and cutters were dressed
flattered impatiently. The Lower
Hope was full of wind-bound ves-
sels, some of them fine merchant-
men of different nations. On land
and water the yellow flag shook its
self boldly out that we might look
once for all upon the black imperial
eagle. Barges and tugs, too eager
to finish their voyages to stop, were
running up with the tide, and the
excursion steamers from London,
laden in one or two instances to the
water's edge, plodded on against
both wind and tide, till they were
abreast of the imperial yachts; and
upon all the sun shone most wel-
come.

There were more salutes when
the Emperor and his party, leaving
the Vitiaz, inspected the Livadia,
and when leaving the Livadia they
were towed to the Derjava. The
jack tarts of both nations put land-
men to shame in lungpower. The
Imperial and Royal family had
found it cold on the water, and ser-
vants in scarlet livery were running
hither and thither for cloaks and
coats. The spectators on shore and
the excursionists waited with praise-
worthy patience for more than an
hour while the English princes and
princesses partook of luncheon in
the Derjava's saloon. At 3:05 the
field glass revealed a movement on
board the Derjava, and stragglers
from and on the pier hastily returned
to their places. Bagles from the
Triumph's forecastle sounded, and
orders were shouted. The yards of
the Vitiaz were again manned.

The Duchess, with her compan-
ions, had taken farewell of her father,
and were being conducted down the
steps into the barge. The Em-
peror leaned over the rail looking
intently at the descending party.
They took their seats in the boat,
the guns thundered, the people
cheered, and the Emperor waved
his hat and kissed his hand as the
Royal Highnesses were swiftly pul-
led to the Terrace landing steps.
Without stopping to see the depart-
ure of the Imperial yachts, the royal
party drove to the railway station
and returned to London. The ex-
cursion boats, not burdened with
too much modesty, snorted and
plunged close to the Emperor's
ships. At 3:30 the boatwain's
whistle sounded shrill from the Der-
java; the little flags which had look-
ed so gay from stem to stern of the
Triumph disappeared as if by magic;
the steam blew off defiantly. The
spring slackened at the Derjava's
bow and fell into the water, and the
yacht was free on the Thames tide-
way. Her paddles slowly revolved,
and in a moment she had begun her
voyage. The crews and passengers
of all the ships far and near, the
spectators everywhere, even the
shrimpers sorting shrimps on the
foreshore, now joined in a long
cheer, and a cheer altogether for the
last. Very pretty, too, it was to
watch the Derjava making head-
way, the huge ironclads gliding ei-
lently after her, the Trinity yacht
Galatea following on the Derjava's
quarter, and the Livadia, with the
servants and luggage and part of
the suite, bringing up the rear.
Upon the paddle box, as the Der-
java steamed by the Terrace Pier,
stood a tall gentleman who had just
come up from below, in a rough
overcoat and the broad, flat cap pec-
uliar to the Russian army. This
was the final glimpse caught by the
spectators at Gravesend of the Im-
perial Highness the Emperor of Rus-
sia.

Judge A. B. Phillips, who heard
from the *Freeman* of the 11th, had
returned from Bay St. Louis, having
been released on \$1000 bonds to ap-
pear before the Hancock County
Court next November. He reports

having been handsomely and cor-
teously treated by Sheriff S. J. Miller
and Judge Chandler; and yet Judge
Chandler has frankly intimated to the
Grand Jury that Mr. Phillips
ought to be hanged for killing
Bienvenu.

A DELIGHTFUL RAIN fell in this city last night. It was not a heavy rain, nor by any means what is called a season, but it rained gently for several hours, and the gardens, crops, and grass will do very well for a good while. The clouds gathered in the South, and it rained South, West, and North of San Antonio, and then the wind changed and drove the clouds back over the city, giving us the rain mentioned. The wind was very high. The rain, from appearances, must have extended over a wide scope of country. Very fair crops may now be relied on throughout Western Texas.

CITY IMPROVEMENTS.—Substantial stone buildings are going up all over the city. But other improvements are needed. We have written very earnestly in behalf of the establishment of a Hygienic Institution, and now we hear that it is going to be established. We now want to see free bath-houses established on the river for the health and comfort of the masses of the people. We also wish to see our plazas, which are like burning furnaces during the heat of summer, shaded by trees and beautified by fountains. The San Pedro Canal now brings the water through the Main Plaza, and makes it pass close by the Military Plaza. What is to hinder the establishment of fountains? On the West side of Main Plaza trees have been planted by Wright & Co., and by Altgelt and Fortis, and the shade is grateful and refreshing. Why not plant them all round the Plaza? It is cruel that the hack-drivers are compelled to stand during these burning days exposed on this Plaza.

THE HUBBARD AND BORMAN murder case is assuming strange shape and huge proportions. It will be recollected that about a month since, a German stranger, Mr. Bliker, a well educated man, was working with Mr. Fred. Borman, cutting hay. The horses ran away with the mower and broke it. Mr. Borman insisted on deducting the damage from Mr. Bliker's wages, to which the latter declined to yield. Bliker left while Borman was absent, and, as Borman alleges, took with him some money and some articles of clothing belonging to the latter. Borman, with Mr. Frank Huebner, deputy sheriff, pursued Bliker, and arrested him at Leon Springs, without a warrant, we believe. They tied his hands behind him in a very brutal manner, which called forth remonstrances from a by-stander, and started back with him. Since then he has never been heard from.

During last week, the Grand Jury found a true bill against them for murder, and they were lodged in jail, bail having been refused. They were to have had a hearing this morning on *habeas corpus* before Judge Noonan, but the case was tried, Andreas Garza, living sixteen miles from the city, came in and made affidavit that at two o'clock of this morning, Huebner, who was supposed to be in jail, came to his house, accompanied by Wm. Tepperwein, and P. C. Anderson, constable of the Presiding Justice, and acting deputy sheriff. He says that they were very drunk, and said they had an attachment for him as a witness in the case of the State vs. Huebner, and insisted on his going out to hunt up his horse, and on his going with them immediately.

Andreas Garza says that he was in great fear for his life, and that the conduct of the men greatly frightened his family. The fact that the prisoner, who could not get bail, was abroad, in the night, armed, drunk, accompanied by an acting deputy sheriff, also drunk and armed, and that they were proceeding to summon a witness against the prisoner, and that they insisted on his going in the night, looked very much like preparations might have been made for his disappearance similar to those which preceded the disappearance of Bliker. He refused to come until day light, and then he came armed and went into court and made affidavit to the above statement.

Judge Noonan suspended the jurors, and District Attorney Green made a motion for contempt against Anderson. The habeas corpus will not be heard until Saturday.
