Farm Performances To Be Reported By Aug. 15 To Community Committeemen

Dawson County Community Committeemen met this morning (Thursday, July 27) in the local AAA office to receive instructions regarding farm performances.

All farmers in the county are asked to contact their community committeemen by August 15, as they must report all farm practices which they have completed by August 1, if they are to be eligible for payments for carrying through the farm practices designated in the program. These reports must be made by August 15.

Copies of performance records are being mailed this week to producers in Dawson County.

Farm performances included in the program in which farmers will be eligible for payments include the carrying out of contour farming, listing, stubble practices, terracing, planting of peas, and protected summer fallow.

There are 36 community committeemen in Dawson County, whom farmers may contact in regard to the farm performance program. These committeemen are responsible for accepting performance records, and all farmers should be sure to contact them prior to the deadline date of August 15, in order to receive their payments.

Community committeemen and the communities which they serve are as follows: J. H. Bridges, George Hardesty, and Ed Hatch are committeemen for community A, which includes the Lamesa area. In community B, which includes the Shumake district, Harvey Weir, Spurgeon Motley and C. W. Shafer are committeemen. Community C, which includes the Key area has R. H. Strickland, Stuart Thomas, and Earl Emond listed as committeemen.

The Harmony district comprises community D, and committeemen for that area are Jesse Gillespie, J. C. Isaac, and Cleo Pierce. Community E, which includes the Hancock area, has Paul Boggan, Shelby Dalmont, and W. M. Buccannan as committeemen. The O. K. district, which comprises community F, has Earl Greenlee, W. F. Snellgrove, and Glen Clark as committeemen.

In the Welch district, which is community G, J. A. Johnson, J. B. Roberts, and Fred T. Rainey serve as committeemen. Committeemen for community H, which includes Munger are R. A. Pounds, George Cooper, and J. W. Franklin. Committeemen for community I, which includes Union are Lewis Atterbury, Carl Williams, and T. H. Calhoun. Pvt. E. Scott's Unit Commended For Its Service

WITH THE DIXIE DIVISION IN MINDANAO — Pvt. Ewell K. Scott of Lamesa, is a member of the first regimental detachment of the 31st Infantry Division to receive the Meritorious Service Unit Plaque for outstanding devotion to duty in three Pacific campaigns.

In New Guinea, on Morotai, and in Mindanao, where the division is now engaged in mopping up operations, Scott's detachment overcame rugged mountains, treacherous swamps and jungles, a scorching sun, and tropic rains to give medical aid and treatment during eleven months of almost continuous contact with the Japs. Supplies were moved to the front by native carriers, river boats and by air drops. In New Guinea, the detachment treated and evacuated the casualties of six attached battalions of friendly troops besides those of their own outfit. Often the wounded were rescued in the face of enemy fire.

When casualties in Mindanao cut the detachment's strength in half, it continued to maintain highest standards of medical aid. Medical Corporal Scott is the son of Mrs. Anna P. Scott, Star Route 2, Lamesa.

Pupils Asked To Transfer From Woody, Liberty

P. K. Humes, county superintendent, reminds parents to see that their children are transferred by August 1, and requests that all high school pupils from Liberty and Woody transfer sometime during the month of July. He states that high school pupils from the above mentioned schools should transfer as their grades will not be taught in their home district, and by transferring to the Lamesa schools at this time, the school apportionment payments will be received earlier.

Thus far County Superintendent Humes has received transfer applications from 35 pupils. He reports that last year a total of 165 transfers were made here, but further stated that he expected the number to decrease this year as most schools will transfer by contract.

Any child lawfully enrolled in any district may transfer to another upon written application of the parent or guardian or person having lawful control of such child. The applications are to be made to the county superintendent. Pupils may transfer from one school district to another within the same county, as well as transfer from one district in the county to an adjoining district of another county.

Sgt. E. V. Dunn Jr. A Gunner And Engineer, Killed

Sgt. Eric V. Dunn, Jr., also the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. V. Dunn, was killed in action over Germany, August 3, 1944, while on his fourth mission. The War Department listed him as officially dead December 23, 1944.

Sgt. Dunn was born in this county December 10, 1923 and lived here until 1941, during which time he was prominent in 4-H Club work, having served as president of his club and having won several prizes and prizes for his Hereford calves. In 1941 he went to Los Angeles, California, where he attended mechanic's school prior to his employment at Douglas Aircraft Plant.

On September 13, 1942 he was married to Miss Bobbie Reynolds, also of this city, and they made their home in Dallas before he entered the Air Corps on March 29, 1943.

Sgt. Dunn received his basic training in the Air Corps at Sheppard Field; his airplane mechanic training at Amarillo Army Air Field; and his aerial gunnery instruction in Kingman, Arizona. From there he was sent to Salt Lake City, Utah, a replacement center where he was assigned to a combat crew. He was then transferred to Alexandria, Louisiana, for combat training.

The young sergeant left for overseas service in July, 1944, and was engineer and top turret gunner on a Flying Fortress with the Eighth Air Force at a station in England. Sgt. Dunn's wife and little son, Glenn Eric, are currently making their home in Grand Prairie, Texas.

Mrs. J. H. Adkins, general chairman of the paper collection committee and Mrs. C. F. Gowen, paper collection chairman of the Central Club, make the following announcements regarding the paper collection project:

Community chairmen are asked to please take paper to the first building inside the Fair Grounds. Mrs. Claid Gowen will keep the building open on Tuesdays and Fridays of each week from 5:30 to 6:00 p. m. and on Saturdays from 2:00 to 6:00 p. m.

There will be a trailer on the south side of the courthouse lawn on Saturdays from 10:00 a. m. to 6:00 p. m. Bundles of paper can be left there.

When preparing paper be sure and separate it in four assortments, including packages for waste basket paper, newspapers, magazines and books; and brown wrapping paper, paper sacks, and paste board boxes.

Waste basket paper can be put in boxes, or tied in small bundles. Newspapers should be folded once and tied in bundles about 12 inches high. Be sure to tie them tightly, twice lengthwise and twice crosswise. Tie the books and magazines in bundles about 10 inches high. Do the same with boxes, after they have been flattened out.

Don't throw loose paper on the courthouse lawn, or leave paper on the courthouse lawn unless the trailer is there. Don't leave paper at the Fair Grounds unless the house is open.

Be sure to save all waste paper. If you live in the country, leave your collections where your community chairman asks you to, or bring it to town. If you live in town take paper to the courthouse lawn or to the Fair Grounds at the stated times. Separate and tie your paper if at all possible.

The council has contracted with the American Paper Stock Company, Inc., in Dallas to buy the paper in carload lots up to September 15 because the U. S. Government is beginning so hard for all scrap paper to be salvaged, the women have set as their goal at least one load and perhaps two by September 15.

BIG SPRING, Texas — The most extensive open house for the public since the establishment of the Big Spring Bombardier School will be held at the air base August 1, in celebration of Air Force Day. The public is invited to inspect the base any time from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. Nissley, commanding officer, announced.

THE Army Answers
Your Personal War Problems
Your questions on allotments, insurance, legal problems or other matter as they relate to Army personnel and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters, Eighth Service Command, Dallas 2, Texas.

Q: My son was listed as missing in action nearly a year ago. He went down in a plane over Germany. Now that the war in Europe is over, what action can I, as next of kin, take to determine if he was taken prisoner?

A: You are at liberty to write The Adjutant General concerning your son's status at any time. However, the first action of the War Department, on receiving information which changes the status of a soldier missing in action is to notify immediately his next of kin.

Q: My husband, who is in the Army, borrowed some money six months ago from a loan company. He is behind in his payments and the loan company is bothering us for the money. Since my husband is in the Army, can't he wait until he is discharged to pay the loan?

A: If your husband borrowed the money before he entered the service, he could claim protection under the Soldiers and Sailors Civil Relief Act of 1940, under which a court could suspend payment of the loan until six months after his discharge. However, the Act may not be invoked to cover contracts made by service personnel after they enter the service.

Q: Does the combat infantryman's badge count as points for discharge under the Army's demobilization program?

A: No points are given for the combat infantryman's badge.

Whey From Milk Makes A Good Syrup Or Punch

"Don't waste the whey that is left in the process of making cottage and neufchatel cheese with your excess milk," says Miss Gladys Martin, dairy specialist for the Extension Service of Texas A. and M. College.

Many persons consider the whey from skimmed and whole milk as a waste product after the curd is removed. "However," says Miss Martin, "while only 1 per cent of the fat is left in the whey, the milk sugar remains without material change."

In these days when sugar is such a precious item, whey can be used as a welcome substitute in the making of a delicious syrup that is good on hotcakes, waffles, puddings and vanilla ice cream.

"The recipe for this syrup and its preparation are simple," Miss Martin says. "The only ingredients needed are one cup whey, one-third cup honey, and one-half cup white corn syrup. Simply boil this mixture until fairly thick."

Another use for whey, one which requires a little sugar this time, is the making of whey punch, recipe as follows:
5 cups whey
1 cup sugar
1 cup shredded pineapple
2 lemons

Boil the sugar and 1 cup of whey together for five minutes. Cool the mixture, and add the remaining whey, the juice of the lemons and the shredded pineapple. Serve the punch with cracked ice or very cold. Mint may be added. Any fruit juice or fruit may be used instead of the pineapple.

Because of lack of transportation facilities, shortages of food and housing and unrest in occupied areas, War Department restrictions against dependents of Army personnel joining their relatives in Europe still stand. Only exceptions are dependents who are also members of the Women's Army Corps, Army Nurse Corps, American Red Cross or United States Organizations, who may be ordered to the same theaters as relatives in the service, but only on the basis of military necessity.

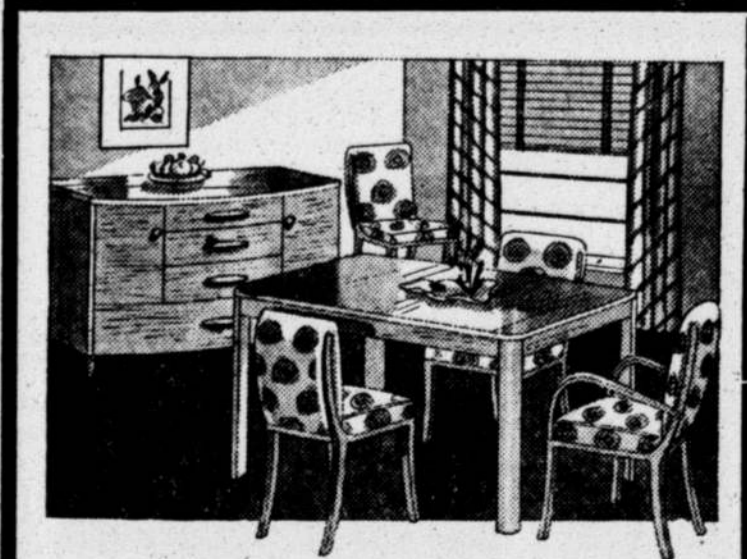

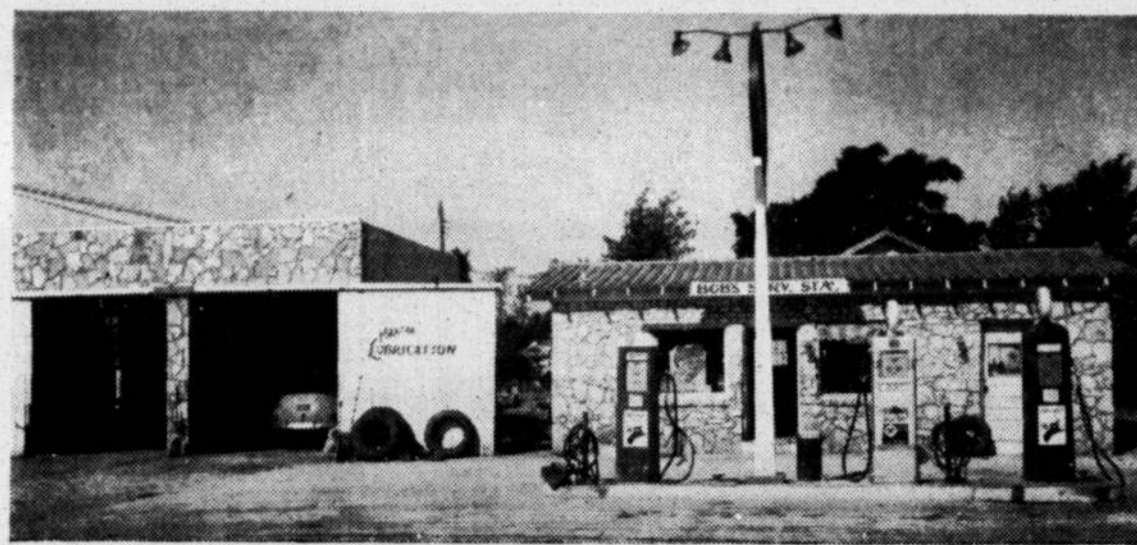

Subscribers Are Asked To Check Expiration Date

Courier readers are asked to watch the expiration dates on their paper in order that they may not miss a single issue of the Dawson County Courier, your home town newspaper.

In other words, if the number following your name on the paper reads 8-45 that means that your subscription will expire August 1, 1945 and that unless your subscription is renewed your paper will be stopped at that time.

The subscription price of the Courier is \$3.00 a year in Dawson, Martin, Gaines, Borden and Lynn Counties, and \$2.00 for six months. For a limited time only a 2 year subscription will be offered for \$5.00, or you can save one dollar by taking a two year subscription. The subscription price outside this territory is \$4.00 a year, except for men in the armed services which remains at \$3.00 a year.

ply to the Federal Housing Administration of the National Housing Agency for authorization to purchase lumber needed for emergency repair. WPB and NHA announced. The home owner may now certify his own purchase order and buy the lumber directly from a distributor.

LABOR ON MOVE CAN GET TIRES

Passenger car owners using their automobiles for bona fide change of residence for which they were issued special gasoline rations will be eligible beginning July 16, 1945, for Grade 1 passenger tire purchase certificates, subject to quota and other restrictions. OPA announced. This extension of eligibility is particularly needed now that increasing numbers of persons are moving from one city to another. OPA explained. It will allow the following groups to apply for new tires if they have a tire failure while making a permanent change of residence:

1. War workers moving from one city to another as production shifts from one type of war goods to another and to civilian commodities.
2. Members of the armed forces moving to a new post.
3. Discharged war veterans returning home or moving to another city to accept a job.

CIVILIANS CAN GET ANTIMALARIAL DRUGS

An adequate supply of effective antimalarial medication is available for civilian medication needs. WPB reported. The military services have notified WPB that a small percentage of veterans now being discharged from the service will require some form of antimalarial treatment during periods of relapse of this disease. WPB has assured the military that such medication is available through normal trade channels for civilians needs.

Quinacrine hydrochloride (atabrine) is readily available in adequate supply to meet civilian requests for both oral and parenteral use. WPB said. Quinine may be obtained in ampoule form for parenteral use when required, but is not available for oral use. However total alkaloids of Cinchona bark, is available for oral use in quantities sufficient to meet all requests for natural antimalarials.

MEN AND BOYS TO GET MORE WORK CLOTHING

New fabric controls to insure increased production of 15 items of men's and boys' work clothing are announced by WPB. The 15 items include men's and boys' overalls; men's and boys' jumper or coats and blanket lined overall jumpers and coats; men's and boys' dungarees and waistband overalls; one piece coveralls; cossack jackets; work aprons; work and shop caps; men's and boys' work pants and breeches; men's and boys' work shirts and washable service material including gowns, suits or coats for doctors, dentists, internes, orderlies, druggists, and coats and apron sets for bakers, butchers, fish handlers and workers.

VETERANS' FAMILIES CAN GET WAR HOUSING

Distressed families of returning veterans and of men in service have been made eligible for vacant privately-financed war housing on the same terms as in-migrant, essential civilian war workers. Administrator John B. Blandford, Jr., of the National Housing Agency, announced. Distressed families are those who cannot find suitable accommodations

Another amendment deals with providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and a fourth amendment pertains to the setting up of a system of payments of old age assistance by the Legislature, as well as a system of payments for needy blind persons over 21 years of age and needy children under 16 years of age.

World War Two Vets Of County Get Discharges

This week's list of discharged World War II veterans includes Clayton Jay Barkhurst, Allen C. Wright, and Jimmie G. Bell, all Dawson County men.

Clayton Barkhurst, the son of Mrs. Frank Barkhurst of this city, was released from the United States Marine Corps Reserve on July 18, 1945 at the M. B. Naval Air Training Base in Corpus Christi.

Serving as a private first class in the Marine Corps, Barkhurst enlisted for service in Oklahoma City on October 8, 1942. He is a veteran of the South Pacific Theatre of war having served in that area from February 20 of 1943, to February 24 of 1944.

He was wounded November 20, 1943 while participating in action against the enemy at Tarawa.

Jimmie G. Bell, who served as a private with the 253rd Armored Field Artillery Battalion, received his discharge papers at the Separation Center at Fort Sam Houston on July 4, 1945.

He possesses the E. A. M. E. Campaign Medal and the Good Conduct Medal. Bell served overseas in the European Theatre of War for eight months, leaving the States July 2, 1944 and returning on March 12, 1945.

He entered service February 13, 1943 in Lubbock, prior to which time he was a cook. His address is General Delivery.

Another Dawson County man to have been discharged is Allen C. Wright, who was released through the Army demobilization plan. He was discharged July 20, at the Separation Center at Ft. Bliss.

Bell was a member of the Army Air Forces, holding the rating of private first class. He entered the service on August 28, 1940 at Ft. Lewis, Washington. He served overseas for a period of 3 years and 7 months, leaving the States on October 18, 1940 for Panama and returning May 22, 1944.

He holds the American Theatre Ribbon and the American Defense Service Medal with 1 Bronze Star.

Bell was a farmer in civilian life.

(Tody) Morris landed in New York Thursday, July 19, and in San Antonio Tuesday, where he was met by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Will Morris. They arrived here Wednesday afternoon and Lt. While on foreign duty Lt. Morris was attached to the Fifth Cavalry serving with an armored reconnaissance troop as executive officer. He served in the European Theatre of War and was stationed in Ireland, France, Italy, Germany, Australia, and Czechoslovakia.

He entered service in August of 1941, and received part of his military training at A. & M. College, of which he is a graduate. From there he was sent to Fort Bliss in El Paso, and on to Camp Polk, Louisiana and Ft. Knox, Kentucky. He also received training in California prior to being given overseas assignment.

Lt. Morris, a Lamesa High School graduate, has one brother, Will Morris, who makes his home here, and who is a former lieutenant in the military service. A sister, Mrs. Perry Roberts, is now in Urbana, Illinois, where her husband is stationed.
