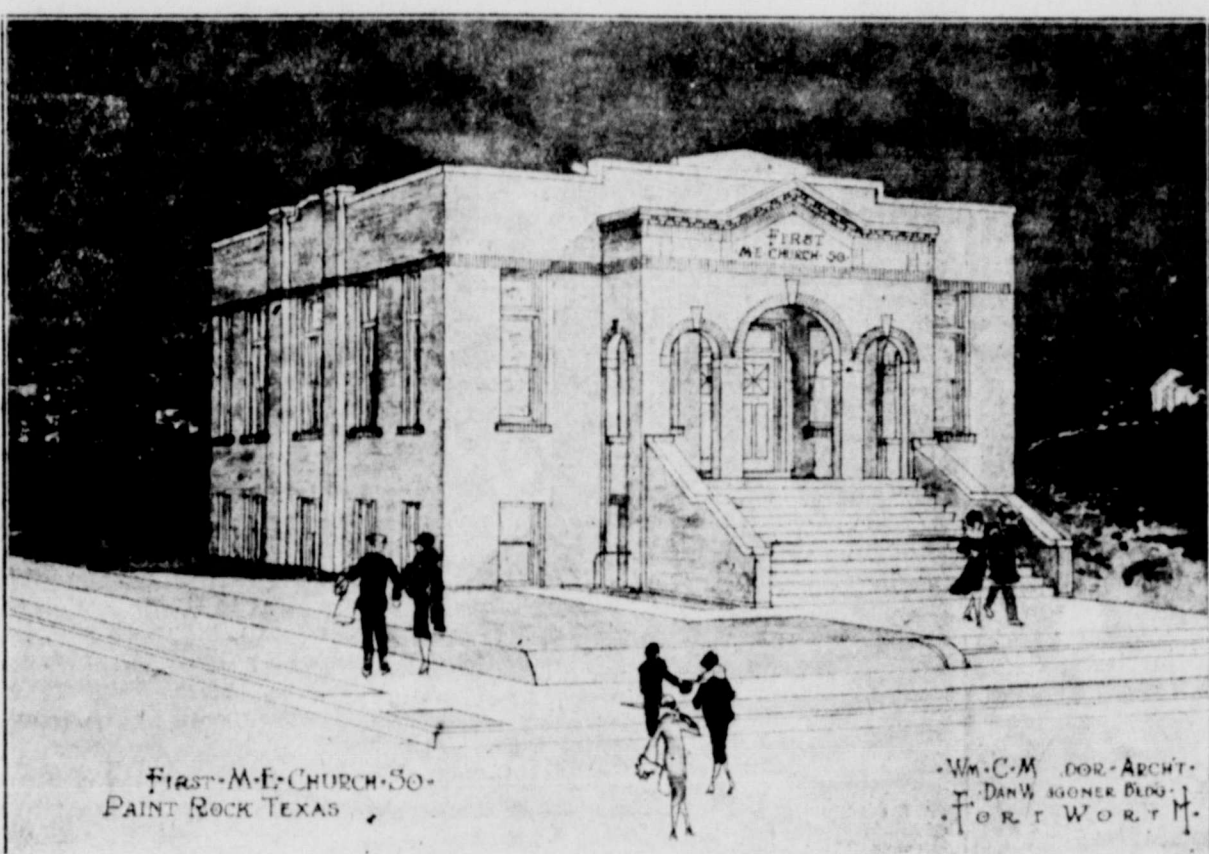
COMMISSIONERS COURT HOLDS REGULAR SESSION

Democrats Gather At Party Banquet

WASHINGTON, June 10.—Several hundred democrats will gather around the banquet table here tonight in honor of J. W. Byrnes of Kansas and Kentucky, recently chosen head of the permanent democratic organization in Washington. It will be the first democratic gathering of national importance since the general election last fall. Speeches will be made by Chairman John J. Raskob, Senator Millard Tydings of Maryland, Representative J. W. Byrnes of Tennessee and by Shouse. Raskob expected to announce the reduction of the party's deficiencies to about \$315,000 and to ask party leaders of state organizations to get busy for liquidation of the balance.

Gun Wound Proves Fatal to Dallas Man

DALLAS, June 10.—Wounds received by him Saturday proved fatal for Floyd H. Douglas, 39, who died today. Douglas was shot twice with a small gauge shotgun by his former wife, Mrs. Rena Terry, 34, who surrendered at the district attorney's office, but was released to appear before a grand jury today. She said she shot Douglas when he attempted to enter her home.

\$5000 Bond is Set for Attempt Bank Robbery

Albert Fore, who is charged with attempting to rob the Security Bank at Wingate, Saturday afternoon, waived his examining trial Monday morning. A short hearing was held in Justice C. H. Willingham's court by County Attorney Roy Hill at which time several witnesses made statements under oath. After the hearing Judge Willingham set Fore's bond at \$5,000 on the charge of attempted bank robbery with firearms. Fore had made no attempt to furnish bond Monday at noon and officers were of the opinion that he would not.

The bullet wound in Fore's left leg was giving him quite a bit of trouble and he was unable to walk to the courthouse Monday morning.

An attempt was made to rob the Security State Bank of Wingate Saturday afternoon at about 1:30. Only two people were in the bank at the time of the attempted robbery, Duncan Hensley, cashier of the bank, and Miss Leila Harter, stenographer and bookkeeper. The cashier was sitting in a small enclosed office at the front of the bank reading a paper and Miss Harter was engaged with the books behind the enclosure in the main department of the bank.

When the would-be robber entered the bank Mr. Hensley thought he was some-one wanting to cash a check and went behind the enclosure to the cashier's window. The man, upon entering, did not approach the enclosure but entered Hensley's private office and started to enter the enclosure where the two employees were. When he reached the door coming behind the bars Mr. Hensley ordered the man to stop, and he backed up a little and pulled a gun, ordering the two employees to "stick 'em up." When he gave this order Miss Harter screamed and the man became excited and ran from the building. As he ran Mr. Hensley grabbed up a small revolver and fired one shot at the fleeing man as he ran through the door and three more shots as he ran to his car. The robber jumped into a small car parked outside the bank and made his getaway. Officers in all nearby towns were notified of the attempted robbery and they started a search that ended at 5:30 Saturday afternoon when Albert Fore was arrested in a barber shop at Winters.

LONDON, June 10.—Another Hol-
lywood film magrate has come to
London convinced that the "talky
is the thing." First it was Jess
L. Lasky who told them on this
side talking films would spell doom
for the silent picture. This time it's
Samuel Goldwyn, head of United
Artists.

In London on a private business
mission and also to expedite the

tures, Goldwyn said he believes
there is no future in the film
world for anything but the talkies.
"The talkie picture will kill the
silent film as surely as the cine-
matographs displaced the magic
lantern," he added.

"We have made up our minds in
Hollywood and now we are going

is no time for delay. Nothing will
be more fatal than delay.

"It has been said that we are
taking a gamble with the talkies.
Well, in some ways it may be a
gamble, but it is not a gamble
which can be compared, for in-
stance, with a game of poker.

"If Hollywood is gambling now it
is only because we know that the
immediate future will provide the
winning stakes. I myself was late
in taking up the sound films. I
watched patiently. I studied every
angle closely. Now I know today
that there is no future for any-
thing but talkies. Hollywood knows
it.

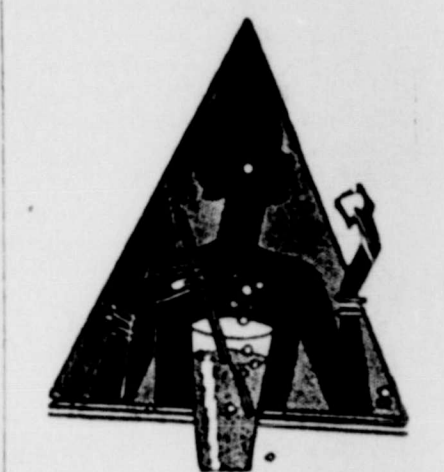
"Those who say the talky will
not succeed do not know the movie

business. Nothing can hold it back.
Every day brings absolute perfec-

Goldwyn's enthusiasm over the
talking pictures reaches at times a
positive states of ecstasy. He shares

CONGO EXPLORER BACK WITH TWO CANNIBALS

(By International News Service)

NEW YORK, June 10.—Accompanied by two cannibals, Dr. Daniel Davenport, sole white survivor of a Belgian scientific expedition that spent three years in the Belgian Congo, and northern Central Africa, has arrived in New York.

One of the cannibals is a member of the Ubangi-Shari tribe that roam the Cameroons and the other is a native of the upper Congo region.

Both bear their tribal marks. One has a crocodile's tail carved in the skin of his forehead extending half way down the nose. The other has a double row of lateral gashes on his cheek-bones.

Dr. Davenport said he found a hundred different tribes each having a distinctive carving as well as a different language. The cannibal boys with Dr. Davenport speak five tribal languages, some French and German, but no English.

Capacity House Hears Campbell

A great and enthusiastic audience attended the Sunday night services of the First Christian Church Sunday. All partitions were opened, many extra seats had been added, and everything was filled to the door.

The spiritual and lively song service was enjoyed by all, with nearly everybody taking part, following the lead of the two choirs, senior and booster.

The illustrated drawing that was skillfully completed within five minutes, was "The Old Rugged Cross." Rev. Campbell gave the story of the picture while he was finishing the drawing, explaining how, during the time he had presented the illustration, new deas had caused him to make many changes, until at last, the great cross in the foreground, the little church which represents the bride of Christ, the three stones at the foot of the cross, which are our burdens laid there, and the crown in the heavens, which is the future reward of those who serve Jesus and keep his commandments, is the finished product.

Evangelist Campbell, taking his text from Luke 23:33-34, said in part:

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. God created man in his own likeness, yet with a fear that man was to fall into sin, and would not continue in the perfect state of happiness that existed in Eden. But let man be created and if he did fall, Christ was ready to come into the world and redeem man from his sinful state. So the covenant was made, man was created, placed in the Garden of Eden, where he failed to remain, because of having sinned against the word of God. Christ had to come into the world to live and die, or else man would never have had a redemptive plan of salvation."

"Christ gave the world a wonderful ministry while living among His fellowmen. It was a life and work without equal. We see Him

as He and His disciples are partaking of the last supper. It was not a feast of joy and happiness, for the shadow of the cross was resting on Jesus. He took the bread, and breaking it, said, "This is my body broken for you," and pouring out the wine, explained, "This is my blood spilled for you; and as often as ye meet, do this in remembrance of me."

"Soon Jesus is betrayed and brought before Pilate. He is charged with high treason 1—With sedition; in inciting the people to revolution. Pilate is indifferent to this charge, for it is absurd to think an unarmed man could cause trouble for Rome. 2—With forbidding people to pay tribute to Caesar. This is a false charge based on Jesus' statement that He is a king. Had He not previously exclaimed, 'Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's and unto God the things that are God's' 3—Having claimed to be Christ, a king. This is true, yet not in the sense the Jews stated, or in a Roman sense, but spiritually, it was true. Caesar's strength was in soldiers, armies and forts; Jesus' power was found in principles, sentiments and ideals. Pilate finds no fault with Christ, yet He is taken by the mob and nailed to the tree on Calvary."

"Oh why did Jesus die for you and for me? In heaven he was a prince, the greatest of all kings, yet, he was divested of all glory when he took the form of man. Man is continually striving to ascend. Christ descended. Man seeks fame and honor; Christ gave up His all, and came without reputation. Christ took upon himself the form of man with all his sufferings and ailments. He became a servant, humbling himself before man. And last of all, He became the lamb, to be led to the slaughter."

"The testimonials of the disciples and the men who crucified Jesus all cry out that He is the Christ, the Son of God! That is what millions of people have said! What do you say? You who are out of the kingdom, refusing to follow Christ! Are you going to recrucify Jesus again? Rejecting Christ is to crucify Him anew. Oh, what will you do with Jesus? Neu-

tral you cannot be. Some day your heart will be asking, 'What will He do with me?'

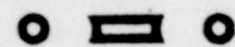
