Johnson Hospital Commended For No Cigarette Sales on Premises

The Johnson Hospital of Loraine has been commended by Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education (TANE) for not allowing sales of cigarettes on the hospital premises.

A certificate of commendation and recognition says the award is given "for the decision not to allow sale of cigarettes on the premises, thereby making the people more aware of the health hazards of cigarette smoking. This action contributes to the saving of lives, to which cause both Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education and this institution are dedicated." It is signed by Wallace J. Shelton, President, and Albert F. Tucker, Executive Director.

TANE recently completed a survey of Texas hospitals in which it was found that 205 of 582 hospitals replying to the questionnaire did not allow the sales of cigarettes. Among those replying was one hospital that had removed cigarettes because of their link with cancer and other diseases, but allowed cigarettes machines back because of "pressure."

"We believe these courageous hospitals are setting a trend. It is incongruous for an institution that treats cancer to allow a cancer cause to be sold on the premises. We sincerely hope the remaining hospitals will follow the example set by this institution," said Mr. Tucker, TANE Executive Director.

TANE is a non-profit, educational organization, supported financially by Texas churches of some 19 denominations. Its programs of education include public school assembly programs, publishing books, producing film strips, a free film lending library, a speakers bureau of more than 100 men, research, television, public service, legislative information, and an annual seminar on alcohol and drug problems jointly sponsored with Baylor University each February.

Though TANE is a Texas organization, and its programs are aimed at Texas people, the organization's books and film strips are in demand nationally.

Some have been translated into other languages.

One of TANE's publications is entitled, "Smoking . . . or Health?" cartoon - illustrated and written by Lindsay R. Curtis, M. D. A film strip has been

produced, based on the book. "Most of our efforts are directed at alcohol and other dangerous drugs. Smoking cigarettes is often overlooked because it kills much more slowly. But it still kills," Tucker said.
