Tax Reform To Cost Taxpayers

Castro County taxing units met Aug. 30 in Amarillo in an educational seminar on state tax reform legislation. As required by state law, the establishment of countywide tax appraisal districts will not be money saving.

Single appraisal districts in each Texas county were mandated by Senate Bill 621 (passed during the last legislative session as "tax reform").

Aim of the legislation is to determine a single value to each piece of property in a county, rather than the system which presently exists - where different taxing units may list the same property at different values.

"Most tax rolls are not equitable and not up-to-date," said Russell Graham, general counsel of the School Tax

Assessment Practices Board. To have uniform, consistent tax rolls, he said, "will cost more than what you're spending now."

Creation of a single appraisal district, he added, will be less expensive than each taxing authority individually "doing what needs to be done."

Although the bill does not take full effect until Jan. 1, 1982, many provisions of the bill must be implemented in prior years.

One of the first provisions is the election of a board of directors for the appraisal district, scheduled to occur by Nov. 15. How well boards are able to prepare for full implementation of the bill can depend, Graham said, on the financial support taxing entities are

willing to voluntarily contribute.

"Next year will be the planning year for the district," he said, and urges government officials to contribute money, staff or office space to the board.

The only certain funds available to the district will be a "minimal contribution from the state." The board needs to begin next year assessing what appraisal records are available for use by the district and how appraisals for the district should

be handled.

Taxing entities are not required to help pay the district's expenses until 1981, when each government's contribution will be based on its share of the district's tax levy.

Four Year Olds To Be Screened

An Early Childhood Screening program is scheduled for Hart from 9 to 11 a.m. and 1 to 3 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 11 for children aged four.

This program is planned to help identify children who may have learning problems. After they are identified, the parent may decide as to whether they will be enrolled in the school at Hart. Screening will be done in the Early Childhood room just north of the Hart Elementary Building.

Defects, which may be slight, in hearing, seeing, muscular action and behavior are those the screening program seeks to discover. The program's aim is to find children who have problems that will hinder learning when they are in school.

Letter To The Editor

TO THE FARMERS OF HART:

The Family Farm may have a new look but farm life is still the "good life." Most of you involved in the agricultural production process of the past four years have become so intent upon trying to balance the debit and credit columns that you seem to have declared a moratorium on counting your blessings, or at any rate on articulating them. By so doing, you are allowing the pressures of our economic society to lead you down a road of fear and distrust rather than the pathway of faith, confidence, and contentment.

I am not suggesting that you take a nostalgic look at "the good old days" of growing up on the farm, although I would not want to deprive anyone of reliving that satisfying experience. But rather, I am suggesting that you need to "accentuate the positive" lest you allow the negative to destroy you.

This "good life" still means long hours and hard work for the entire family, but do not overlook the fact that your children are learning many skills and are accepting responsibility at an early age. Do not overlook the fact that this makes for a tighter, more closely-knit family. Also, as a result, farm parents usually have a better opportunity to pass their values on to their children, whether they be religious or whether they be personal feelings about life. I think this is healthy.

With the dry spells, wet spells, hail storms, early frosts and invasion of insects and diseases, there is ample opportunity for the farm family to feel a dependence upon an a closeness to Almighty God and a sense of partnership with nature. Out of this process of theologizing there comes a renewed sense of order and faith that

you can weather the hardships of the bad years as well as exult in a year of ample yield and profit. Also, there comes an awareness that your business is to feed the world and that your business is indispensable.

There is also a close analogy between cultivation of the soil and cultivation of the soul. Abundance of the Spirit does not just happen. It comes as you experience the destructive storms of nature, the droughts, and prices for your products that will not pay the cost of productions, not to mention the physical sustenance for the family which is loved. It really tries your faith to see the crops that cost you sweat and tears literally destroyed by a violent storm...Abundance of the Spirit comes when your young son experiences the death of a prize animal that he has nurtured and fed for months. In his mind and heart there comes a realization that death brings separation and sadness, but life goes on. That helps prepare him for the realities of life. Abundance of Spirit comes when you see a beautiful field of corn that is approaching maturity suddenly wiped out in a few minutes by hail. There is sadness, frustration, and disappointment, but there is also a spiritual maturing process which takes place that cannot be projected or measured.

You are very fortunate because you have nature all around you. You do not have to drive great distances to find open spaces and fresh air. All you have to do is step outside to experience quiet solitude. You live in a setting ideally suited to be "alone with God," to shut the door of your "prayer closet," and to whisper or cry out to God about whatever the situation may call for. You enjoy the freedom to weep openly or rejoice vocally at any time of the day. To sing the praises of God out on a tractor is truly a worship experience."

Through all of these experiences you develop a sense of self-confidence and you learn the value of work. Not just as it relates to production, but the part it plays in building self-esteem, character, dependability, leadership, and self-reliance.

Yes, farming is a way of life all right. Those of us in the community not directly involved in farming salute you and support you. We know that you carry the awesome responsibility of feeding the world upon your shoulders,

and there is the haunting fear among us that unless the world becomes more sensitive to your needs for a fair profit over and above the cost of production, we may go to the market one day and find no food to buy. Then they will believe the problems are real, but it will be too late. We want to help. Tell us what to do, but in the meantime, be thankful for your "way of life" and 'be

positive!

A photographer travels with the carnival and will make poster sized photos "on the spot". Other attractions include derby races, black light posters and various booths.

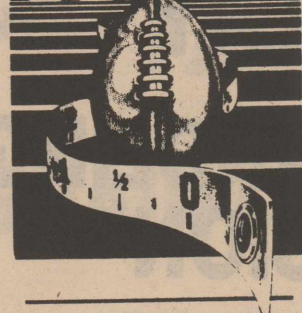

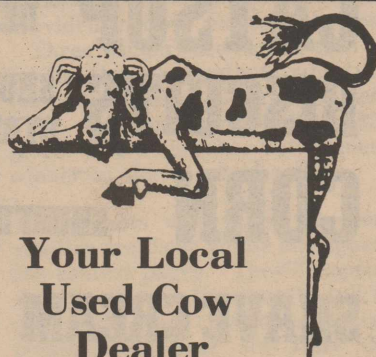
