30,000 BUDDIES MARCH IN PARADE AT MEETING

(By Associated Press)
NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 18.—Following the brisk business session this morning the American Legion was on parade this afternoon. There were more than thirty thousand men in the parade. With national colors and

flanked by colors of Legion posts from every state in the union, borne by men who carried them to victory in France, created an inspiring scene.

Announcement by Alvin Owsley, of Texas, that he would accept the nomination for National Commander, if it was offered him, appeared to be crystallizing the sentiment of the South. Mr. Owsley brought in the report as spokesman of the Americanization commission of the Legion.

The report declared for a deliberate effort to inject a program of the account of the World War into school text books in many parts of the United States, and it also contained a declaration in favor of total exclusion of immigrants from the United States.

The convention unanimously affirmed the report of the resolutions committee, and it was announced that the Legion will continue to fight for the adjusted compensation legislation until it is enacted.

GOVERNOR LOSES IN SENATE RACE

(By Associated Press)
ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 18.—Walter G. F. George, former supreme court justice, was overwhelmingly nominated as a successor to the late Senator Thomas E. Watson in yesterday's special democratic primary. He had a total of 304 county units. This was indicated by incomplete unofficial returns which were compiled by the Atlanta Constitution today.

The election marked the second defeat for Governor Hardwick within as many months, and according to political observers showed that the Watson block of voters, estimated at fifty thousand, remained intact. Governor Hardwick was defeated for the senate in the regular primary, and when Senator Watson died recently and it became his duty to appoint a successor, he appointed Mrs. William H. Felton, aged 88, the first woman senator, and he immediately announced his candidacy for the office.

INJUNCTION TO JURY ON ITS MERIT

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Oct. 18.—The Court of Civil Appeals had not given a decision on the motion of the defense in the Mayfield injunction case to prohibit a continuance of the Corsicana hearing at one o'clock this afternoon.

CORSICANA, Oct. 18.—The injunction suit to make permanent the temporary injunction preventing the name of Earl Mayfield from being placed on the ballot for the general election, will be tried before a jury, and the case will be heard on its merits. This means that numerous depositions of witnesses which the plaintiffs' attorneys say they have, will be used.

Judge Scarborough so announced after overruling a motion by the attorney for Mayfield to postpone the future hearing until the Court of Civil Appeals had acted on the appeal now pending.

Judge Scarborough also overruled a motion contending that his court did not have jurisdiction in the case. In selecting a jury to hear the case the questions by plaintiffs' counsel as to whether the veniremen were members of the Ku Klux Klan were answered in the negative by each venireman examined. The veniremen also replied to the defense attorneys that their political affiliation would not influence them in deciding the case.

SHERIFF IN JAIL; DEPUTY ON JOB

CORPUS CHRISTI, Oct. 18.—W. J. Cody, chief deputy sheriff of Nueces county, took the oath of office as sheriff of this county today. The county commissioners yesterday accepted the resignation of Frank G. Robinson, sheriff of the county, who is being held in jail here with three other men in connection with the fatal shooting of Fred Roberts, a land owner, who was killed following a quarrel between Robinson and Roberts. Roberts was shot to death as he ran from a store where the quarrel took place and as he was starting to leave the scene of the trouble in his car.

CONTRACT AWARDED FOR STREET PAVING

Contract for paving ten blocks of the business district of Ballinger with vitrified brick was awarded to J. B. Toomey, of Fort Worth, Tuesday afternoon, at a total consideration of \$110,017.33.

Mr. Toomey submitted the lowest bid out of five propositions considered by the city commission. The bid was accompanied by a certified check for \$5,000.00, and the contract was closed Wednesday morning, and bond executed. The work is to begin as soon as the preliminaries can be completed, the necessary red tape unreeling which will require about thirty days. The contract provides for completion of the work in eighty working days.

The plans and specifications called for bids on various characters of paving, material, etc., but the commissioners settled on offers submitted from all the bidders for a job of brick surfacing on five inch concrete base, and following are the bids and the names of the contractors submitting same on brick paving:

Plains Paving Co., of Wichita Falls, \$127,567.10.
Kaw Paving Co., of Topeka, Kansas, \$118,344.76.
Smith Brothers, of Dallas, \$116,091.32.

Jordan Construction Co., of Plainview, \$111,745.33.
J. B. Toomey, of Fort Worth, \$110,017.33.

City Engineer Pirie stated the bids were the best set of bids he ever saw offered or had anything to do with, and he feels that the city made an exceptionally good contract on the best class of paving for this city. The contract provides for three inch vertical fibre vitrified brick laid in five inch concrete base and bituminous joint filler. "This is the best possible pavement for Ballinger," said Mr. Pirie.

The blocks to be paved include Hutchings Avenue from Sixth to Tenth Street—four blocks on this avenue, including street intersections; Broadway from Hutchings to the Santa Fe right-of-way; Seventh Street from Strong Avenue to the Santa Fe depot; and Railroad Avenue from Broadway to Eighth Street. Eighth Street will be paved from Strong to the Central Hotel. This will make a total of ten blocks.

Representatives of the various companies submitting bids, and representatives of material dealers were here to meet with the City Commission, and the commission held its meeting in the court house. The representatives were loud in their praise of the splendid way in which the plans and specifications were gotten up, and they congratulated the commission on employing Engineer Pirie in handling this part of the work. The visitors asserted that the plans and specifications were so plain and worked in such accurate detail that bidding was made easy.

CARNIVAL COMES ON OWN ACCORD

"The protest against the Wortham Shows carried in a recent issue of The Ledger leaves the inference that this attraction was engaged and brought to Ballinger by some local organization and that such attractions are being encouraged to come to Ballinger.

"The show management booked this engagement of their own free will and accord for the purpose of filling in an unengaged week. They notified our office that they were coming to Ballinger the week of October 23rd. Knowing that there was a \$250.00 deficit left over from the Runnels County Fair, we induced them to give a part of their proceeds to assist us in removing that deficit. The fact of the matter is that an attraction of the size of the Wortham Shows could not be induced to come to Ballinger at any other time than during a fair week, unless as in the present case when they stop off here to fill a vacant week in their schedule.

"Our office has brought only two carnivals to this city; one during the 1921 Fair and another during the 1922 Fair. This is consistent with the practice of Fair Associations throughout the United States and Canada.

"No obligation is being assumed locally by reason of the engagement of next week. The shows give us a minimum guarantee of \$400.00.

"As to the character of entertainment which will be provided we have a distinct understanding with the County Attorney and Sheriff that no gambling devices nor immoral shows will be permitted to run.

EUROPE LOOKING TO U.S. FOR HELP

Special to The Ledger:

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—"The people of Europe can't think straight. They are starving. That is what is wrong with the world. It is sheer hard-heartedness to criticize a starving man because he is not calmly rational."

"The problems of Europe are fundamentally economic. Before political, physical and even moral conditions can improve they must be solved. They can be worked out only with the help of America. While America remains undecided conditions are rapidly growing worse. Europe will crash unless America acts soon."

This statement was made by Dr. Charles S. Macfarland, General Secretary of the Federal Council of Churches, upon returning from an extended tour of Europe, in answer to the questions: "How do the European peoples feel towards us?" and "What can America do?" Answering the second question first, he said:

"America should do one of two things:

"First, offer to sit down with the European nations and formulate a plan for economic reconstruction, or

"Second, make its own proposal. "If the American people were informed by other than mischievous propaganda they would arise and direct our government to act with good will towards the nations overseas—and light would break on darkened Europe."

"How do the European peoples feel towards us?" is the question asked. Their feeling is one of mingled disappointment that has not reached disillusionment and of hope and faith that still persist.

"They feel that we have left the field of battle without stopping to bury the dead or to help repair the devastation made by our own artillery. Recognition for our private, philanthropic help is overlooked and still gives impulses to prayers of gratitude. No

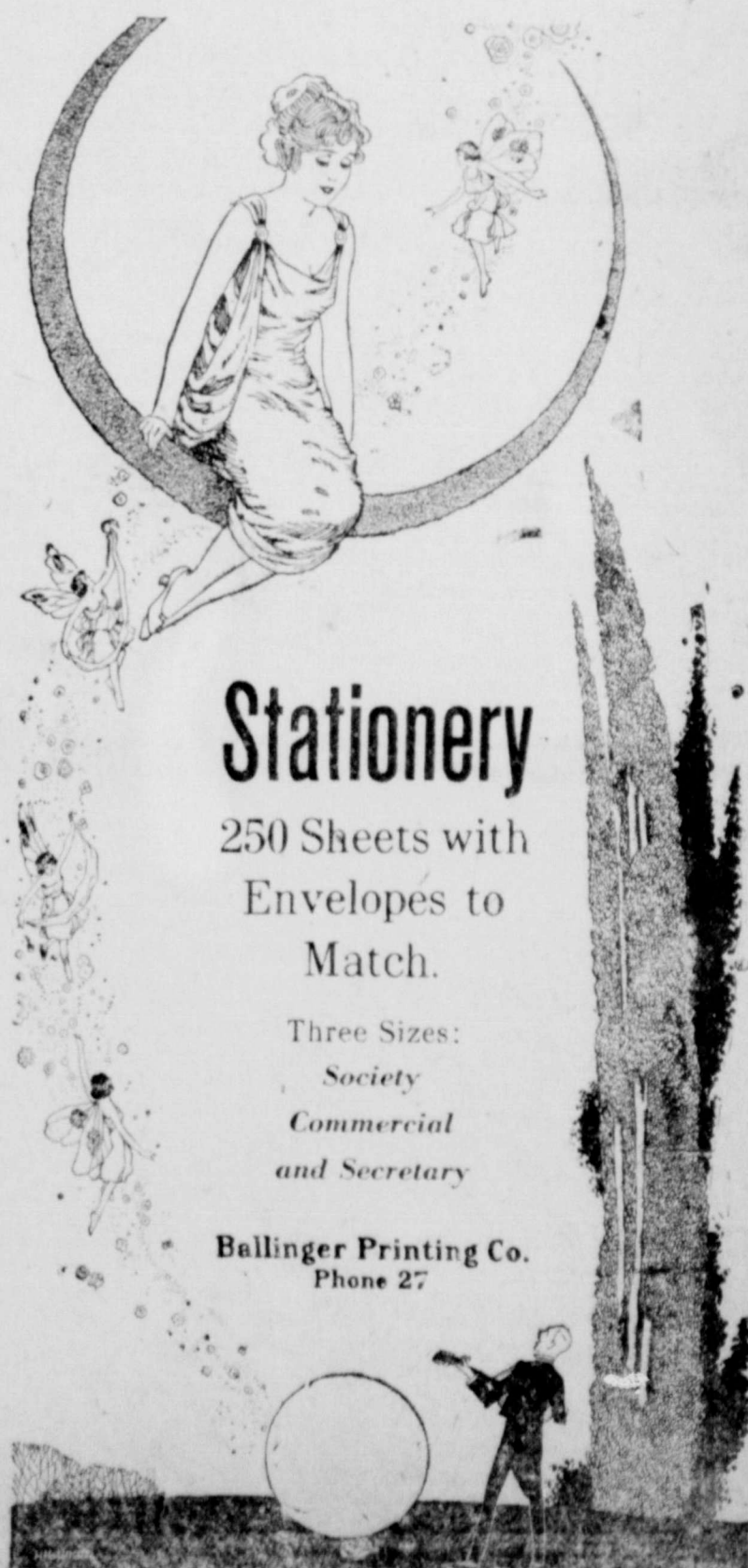

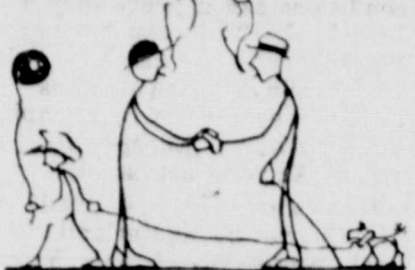
