

WASH FLUIDS BLAZE; MOTHER IS TORCH AS BABY PLAYS CALMLY

Gasoline Used in Solution Ignites in Flames of Gas Stove. Woman is Fatally Burned. Child Has Miraculous Escape

Mrs. A. P. Blackwell, 29, is dead, and Miss Lola Coldison, and Mrs. J. Harris, are painfully burned, as a result of a gas explosion at the Blackwell home in Ross City, Howard county oil town, at 10 o'clock yesterday morning. Mrs. Blackwell died twelve hours after the accident as a result of the burns sustained. Mrs. Harris is burned about the face, arms and shoulders. Miss Coldison is painfully burned about the face, arms and shoulders, according to Dr. McKee Caton, of the Fortan emergency hospital.

It was yesterday at the Blackwell home, and Mrs. Blackwell, who had soaked the clothes in a gasoline and water solution was taking them from the solution, putting them into an electric washing machine on the porch of her home. Mrs. Blackwell was also cooking on a gas stove in the kitchen. The fumes from the clothes caught fire from the gas range, and formed a stream of fire from the gas range in the kitchen to the electric washing machine on the back porch. Mrs. Blackwell was enveloped in the flames and fatally burned. Her small child, 8-months-old, was playing on the floor near the door, and seated beside him was a small puppy. The fire as it flamed over the head of the baby and dog, did not injure the child, but singed the dog slightly.

Hearing the screams of Mrs. Blackwell, the two neighbors, Mrs. Harris and Miss Coldison, rushed to her assistance. Immediate medical attention was given the injured ones, but Mrs. Blackwell's injuries were of such a serious nature that she never rallied from the effects.

Funeral services will be conducted in this city at the East Third Street Baptist church at 10:20 o'clock in the morning, by Rev. H. G. Riehlberg. The Order of Eastern Star will conclude the services at the graveside.

Deceased is survived by her husband, A. P. Blackwell, five children, Olive, Edward, Edward, Daniel, and Kirby, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carrill of Kress, three brothers and sisters, Mrs. Beha-Guest, Mrs. Geraldine Rivercomb.

Monroe Carroll, Hubert Carroll and Genella Carroll, all of Kress, will be here to attend the funeral services.

2693 Students Are Enrolled at A. and M.

COLLEGE STATION, Texas Nov. 6.—Summary of enrollment at the A. and M. College of Texas for the 1928-29 session, just issued from the office of the registrar, shows total registration to date of 2693, the largest for any one regular session in the history of the college.

Increase in enrollment over the two preceding years is shown by comparing this year's total of 2693 with 2444 for 1927-28 and 2330 for 1926-27, all completions being as of Oct. 10.

Of the 2693 students enrolled this year, 1128 are new students representing the largest freshman class in the history of the college. Enrollment by schools is divided as follows: Agriculture 681, engineering 1567, arts and sciences 258, vocational teaching 70, veterinary medicine 17, special courses 20.

SAVING TO SHIPPERS OBTAINED IN EL PASO

EL PASO, Tex. Nov. 6.—Substantial saving to shippers in El Paso has been secured during the last three months according to a report of E. R. Tanner, traffic manager of the El Paso Freight bureau of the Chamber of Commerce.

Of cantaloupes and lettuce shipped from California and Arizona to El Paso and points east, a saving of \$15 a car was secured.

At the request of the bureau the A. T. and P. F. reduced the rate on fabricated at El Paso and shipped to the Silver City district from 19 cents to 5 cents a hundred pounds making a saving of \$30 a car.

Storage in transit on beans shipped from New Mexico points was granted at El Paso. Beans may now be shipped here, stored and reshipped to Texas points on a through rate basis. A like request for storage in transit on hay shipped from Arizona points was granted.

There should be a companion picture about the importance of the teeth; for on the soundness of the teeth depends the health of the body. Certain families make it a practice to ask "Did you drink your milk Mary?" "Have you eaten your cereal?" But the "Have you brushed your teeth?" is too frequently neglected. The only way definitely to retain and improve the teeth and therefore, the health of all the people in a whole generation is to keep the matter of cleaning the teeth overliantly and eternally emphasized, and to have the trouble remedied every time in every individual case where there is need for dental care.

Parents and teachers must be on guard for children often will endure a hurting tooth rather than have it pulled or treated by a dentist.

Teeth are as much of the digestive system as are the glands of the stomach. Neglected teeth mean old age or senility for who does not look old when he has lost his teeth? Dental repair and prophylaxis are the only practical means to save the teeth. Make complete and efficient mastication a habit. See a dentist at regular intervals.

Faiths and False

"This above all things, to thine own teeth be true.

Or it must follow as the night the day

They will sometimes be false to you."

It is a stride forward in health improvement to note the great advance made in preventive dental education. A reliable authority gives this invaluable information about tooth decay that all school children should know. "Decay of the teeth is due chiefly to uncleanness. A tooth consists largely of limestone which is dissolved by acids. There are about a dozen different kinds of bacteria in the mouth and these feed on food left there after eating. Some bacteria form acids from the carbohydrates of the food. The enamel is not one solid piece, but consists of many prisms cemented together. The acids dissolve the cement and the bacteria get between the prisms. This decay may start in the enamel. The bacteria are assisted by tartar, a dark hard substance that collects on neglected teeth and covers the bacteria so that they cannot be cleaned off with a tooth brush. Tartar is caused by bacteria and acids acting on the mucus in saliva. Since decay, once started, spreads rapidly, a decaying spot should be repaired without delay. It is a good plan to go once or twice a year to a dentist to have tartar removed and look for unsound teeth.

Often after bacteria find lodgment where teeth and gums join, they travel down along the membrane around the roots and cause painful abscesses deep down at the roots. These abscesses are not harmful and disappear but they injure the entire body, since the bacteria may be carried to distant points by the blood. The germs may be carried by the blood to the joints, causing rheumatism of the joints; or to the valves of the heart causing permanent heart disease. Such germs may come from pus in pyorrhea, from diseased tonsils, or from other parts infected but old abscesses at the roots of the teeth are very often the cause of general ill health.

A further argument for mouth hygiene is the effect of germs on the stomach. Many of the germs of the mouth are swallowed and infect the stomach. An unhealthy mouth opens up before it can be seen.

Poorly chewed and digested foods are likely to decay in the stomach and intestines. When the products of such decay are absorbed by the blood, they cause general harm to the body and indirectly affect the teeth causing decay.

MAKING OF FRIENDS MEANS HAPPINESS

Would you be happy? Make friends. "Friendship is the highest degree of perfection in society," says Montaigne. Thomas Hughes once said "Blessed are they who have the gift of making friends, for it is one of God's best gifts. It involves many things, but above all the power of going out of one's self, and appreciating whatever is noble and loving in another."

And most of the happiness of having friends is in making them, and in keeping them, for there is nothing lasting about friendship if strained by too strong dependence.

"Fine as friendship is, there is nothing irrevocable about it," Randolph S. Bourne has said. "The bonds of friendship are not iron bonds, proof against the strongest of strains and the heaviest of assaults. . . . We will 'take less' from a friend than we will from one who is indifferent to us."

George Washington has somewhat the same idea when he wrote his nephew in 1783 to "be courteous to all, but intimate with few; and let those few be well tried before you give them your confidence. True friendship is a plant of slow growth, and must undergo and withstand the shocks of adversity before it is entitled to the appellation."

But don't depend too much on friends. It is vitally worth while to have friends, but they should not be asked to go too far because they will not, and failure will cause disappointment. Loyalty is limited, friends are to be enjoyed but not imposed on.

A definition which is a favorite is that a friend is one who loves you, sees your faults and loves you still. That is better than the other definition that a friend is one who loves you so dearly that he does not see your faults.

A man was to die in the Texas electric chair. He had friends, but with his crime revealed they deserted him. Some stayed with him for a time, but before the time for his death came all deserted him—except one—his mother. She stayed on the job, pleading for him—and won. The man lives.

But that, merely shows that there is a degree of friendship. Friends are not made to be used, however, and those who enjoy their friends are those who serve, rather than those who ask service. And those who ask too much of friendship are doomed to disappointment.

A SIGN OF THE TIMES

Matthew Patterson received word in his cell in the Philadelphia county jail Wednesday that he had been reelected a member of the House of Representatives of the State General Assembly on the Republican ticket. Patterson received a five year sentence for graft disclosed in the recent police and political investigation. William B. Smith, another member of the Philadelphia Republican delegation to the lower branch of the general assembly who is under indictment on similar charges also was reelected.

THRILLS

There seems to be another thrill-murder case, this time in Atlanta. Two college students, both sons of wealthy parents, were accused of robbing and killing for fun. They are naturally compared with Loeb and Leopold, the Chicago youths, now in prison for their misdeeds. These, it must be remembered, are very exceptional cases. Fortunately there are very few, even in this age of topsy-turvy morals, who kill for amusement. Yet there is enough crime and vice entered upon by young people nowadays, by way of relief from boredom, to arouse serious reflection. What is the trouble? Evidently a lack of high ideals and wholesome interests. Young people sunk in materialism, purposeless and faded, drift easily into evil and tend to sink deeper.—Cisco News.

HIRED THINKING

A frank columnist, speaking from his own experience, declares that much reading keeps one from thinking, just as dope keeps one from feeling. "I myself read too much," he admits, "but I do so with the full knowledge of the consequences. The fact is that I prefer reading to thinking." The man who wishes to keep his muscles and lungs and liver in good condition mows his lawn and digs his own garden. If he prefers loafing to keeping fit, he hires those things done. So we who read constantly may be said to have hired our thinking done. We let the author do the thinking. "Intelligent persons addicted to reading may take umbrage at this, but it is the truth. We have all seen people with minds dulled by much reading. We have also seen persons whose conversation consists almost entirely of highbrow discussion and repetition of the ideas of authors, with never an idea they have arrived at themselves through original thinking. Lincoln read little. Herbert Spencer, the great English philosopher, wasn't much of a reader. Neither is Thomas A. Edison. One settled great political issues, one clarified philosophy and one made unprecedented contributions to mechanical knowledge and progress. They used their brains.

GETTING RID OF GARBAGE

Keeping our city clean and sanitary will be the most economical health insurance we can provide. All should cooperate with the City Inspector and the firm which has the contract to cart away the rubbish. There is to be a real effort put forth to enforce necessary sanitary measures in our city and this garbage disposal plan is one of the most important. Rubbish is to be carted away from the business houses daily. This service to be paid for by the businessmen so served. Rubbish is to be carted away from residences every two weeks. For this service a charge of fifty cents per month is made and will be collected at the office of the City Secretary.

All are expected to pay this charge if they are residents of the city.

The service is to start just as soon as the firm which has been given the garbage disposal contract secures the necessary equipment.

PUNISHMENT FOR CRIME MUST BE CERTAIN

Entirely too many convicts are taking "French leave" from the State prison farms. Looks like it is about time for the State of Texas to go out of the farming business, anyway. When you make it too soft for criminals, too easy for them to evade punishment you are naturally encouraging crime. Not until criminals convicted of crime are certain of serving the sentences imposed on them by juries will respect for law be established.

The pardoning of criminals, the ease with which they can make their escape and soft-hearted juries are all combining to encourage law-breaking. Offenders figure the chances of punishment for their crimes are slight, and officers are inclined to become discouraged at the meagre cooperation they are being accorded all down the line. If we hope to slow up this crime wave before it engulfs our nation we need to let crooks know they are going to serve time in the penitentiary and without hope of escape or pardon.

THE PROBLEM OF PRISON REFORM

"Condemned to Devil's Island," a recent book by Blair Niles, is one of the most depressing books you could find. It tells the whole tale of the French prison colony in French Guiana, and when you finish reading it you are oppressed by the thought of the deadly, soul-killing monotony inflicted on the convicts there.

Instinctively, you feel that "something ought to be done about it." But, instantly, you remind yourself that after all there is not much choice between prisons, that a prison must, in the very nature of things, be a highly unpleasant place, exercising very bad influences on the men confined in it; that the prison, in addition, is absolutely necessary to modern society.

So you find yourself bang up against the old problem of prison reform, which has aroused bitter controversy for centuries, and which seems nearly as far from a solution as ever.

Doubtless we are all agreed that convicts should not be mistreated. They should be decently housed and fed, freed from brutality on the part of their guards, handled as humanely as possible; and some effort should be made to reform them, so that on their release they will not again become menaces to order and decency.

But this matter of reforming the prisoner is a subject on which volumes might be written. Herd together, in close confinement, one or two thousand law-breakers, and you inevitably will have a condition that tends to make criminals instead of curing them. What, in the name of Heaven, is the solution?

Possibly we attack the whole problem wrong end to. It may be that prison reform should begin outside the prison. The time to try reformation is before a man becomes a law-breaker, not after. Society, as it exists today, breeds a certain number of criminals. This number is augmented by the fact that our police and court systems are often woefully inefficient and graft-ridden. Under such circumstances there is bound to be crime.

A detailed study by competent sociologists and psychologists might tell us. Definitely some of the major causes of crime. Then, if we had the courage and the intelligence to remove these causes, our prison problem would go far toward solving itself. You might bear that in mind when the subject of prison reform is raised.

NO REASON TO WORRY

Dr. Joseph Collins, noted nerve specialist, proclaims that there is no reason why normal men and women shouldn't love each other after marriage.

Sounds like informing that water is wet, until doubt enters upon observation of many of the most brilliant weddings displayed by the newspapers and their aftermath. A divorce lawyer or a nerve specialist has as good grounds for following close on the marriage of many people of "our best social strata" as a lawyer has for chasing an ambulance in hopes of a suit for damages. The instances in which marriages are based on something else than love are conspicuous and seem to be increasing in number. Still, they are but the exceptions made conspicuous by publicity. The vast majority of the married do love each other and the proportion of marital trouble is no bigger than ever.—Ft. Worth Press.

FIVE REASONS FOR DEMOCRATIC DEFEAT

The national election is over as far as the majority of us is concerned, and every fellow can figure it out to suit himself. There were five main reasons for the success of the Republican party and all five of them were; they had the most votes. The victory might not have been so overwhelming had not the Democrats been split into two factions. We doubt if the Democrats could have won this year had there been no disagreements in the party as the Republican doctrine seems to have too strong a hold on such a large percent of the population of our nation.

This is the time of the year for setting out shade trees about your premises. Trees A Poor Roost For Hens

Three days after placing his poultry flock in a good type hen house planned by the county agent last winter, Ed Boswell of Comanche county reported getting six eggs daily instead of the usual two or three and by the end of January production had passed the fifty per cent mark. "This illustrates what good housing will do for a poultry flock," says E. N. Holmgren, Poultry Specialist in the A. and M. College Extension service. "The idea of letting hens roost in the trees and lay all over the place is all wrong if profits are desired. A small investment in a well planned house will enable the average farm flock to do its stuff and will bring good substantial returns to the owner."

"Houses may be of several types but they should embody the same general principles such as protection from cold and heat, good ventilation, dryness and cleanliness. The last point cannot be overemphasized for losses in egg production and often of birds are very frequently due to colds, roup, lice worms and bluebugs, which can usually be traced to unsanitary houses and premises."

It is possible to overdo the housing proposition by constructing an unnecessarily expensive house. The mild Texas climate does not call for such well constructed or commodious houses as are used in the North. A floor space of 2 to 3 square feet per bird is enough for average conditions here. In no case should the investment in buildings exceed \$1.00 per hen.

"A bulletin giving several different plans of suitable poultry houses for Texas conditions has been prepared by the A. and M. Extension Service and is available thru county or home demonstration agents or by writing directly to the Extension Service, College Station, Texas. This bulletin is known as "Poultry Houses for Texas," and is free for the asking."

Rix who beat Mr. Reagan to this particular section of Texas by a score or more of years corroborated much of Mr. Reagan's remarks but told of the vast herds of buffalo they had to kill off before they could find room enough to build our city. They say the buffaloes were thicker than fleas on a hound dog and they used to kill them just to market their hides. They told of one of our pioneer citizens selling \$4000 worth of bones, the remains of the buffaloes they slaughtered. District Attorney George Mahan made an interesting talk.

West Texas Oil Production Drops 7,450 Barrels Daily

Though 14 new wells were completed during the week that ended Saturday, November 3, total daily production of West Texas fields dropped 7,450 barrels from the daily average of the previous week, according to the official survey of the Oil Weekly, Houston.

Caused primarily by a decrease of 11,655 barrels per day in Winkler county, production in the entire area dropped from 242,135 to 234,685 barrels per day, the survey discloses.

While Winkler dropped materially Crane picked up 175 barrels daily, Pecos increased 2,655 barrels a day and Howard county added 915 barrels a day.

Phillips Test Below 700 Feet

The Phillips Petroleum Co.'s test in the Moore community eight miles northwest of Big Spring is now drilling below the 700 foot mark.

This test is in the southeast corner of section 13, block 23 township 1 North. A slight oil showing is said to have been struck near the 500 foot depth.

Majority Does Not Always Rule

Instances in which presidents elected by a majority vote in the Electoral College received less than a majority of the popular vote for candidates receiving electoral votes.

In 1824 John Quincy Adams received 84 electoral votes and 103,321 popular votes. His three opponents received 246,741 popular votes. Adams was elected by the House of Representatives.

In 1896 James Buchanan received 174 electoral and 1,288,129 popular votes and his two opponents secured 2,215,798 popular votes.

Lincoln received 180 electoral and 1,598,452 popular vote while his three opponents received 2,783,741 electoral votes.

R. H. Hayes secured 185 electoral and 4,048,228 popular votes while Samuel J. Tilden received 184 electoral and 4,299,908 popular votes.

In 1912 Woodrow Wilson received 435 electoral and 6,292,670 popular votes while Roosevelt and Taft secured 761,050 popular votes.

Late Development In The Oil Field South Of This City

NEW DRUMRIGHT Glasscock County, Texas Nov. 6.—Yesterday afternoon the Louisiana Oil and Refining company and Glasscock Bros. in their test location in section 3, a half mile north of the Tylor-Link well, picked up an oil showing in a tight sandy lime formation at a depth of 2445 to 2465 ft. A core was taken and the hole bailed during the night of the mud and water; this test is being made with rotary tools. This morning a production test of the formation was made and the showing was for less than a five barrel well. This hole will now be deepened and a core taken every five feet.

The Andrews McCamey test in section 17 Big Spring water property, drilling below 2500 feet today in a red shale formation. The Henshaw Oil Corporation's test in the southwest quarter of section 135, on the Settles property, drilling below 2770 feet. This location is more than a half mile west of the Sun Company's No. 1 Settles, and is attracting a great deal of attention. The deep Roberts pay at this location should be picked up around a depth of 2933 feet.

AN ORDINANCE

to amend and supplement the ordinance relating to the collection and disposal of trash, garbage and other material of a household and the City of Big Spring, Texas, and providing for the enforcement of the regulations thereof, and providing a penalty.

Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Big Spring:

SECTION ONE

(a) Duties of Owners in Residential Section of the City of Big Spring.

It shall be the duty of every owner, agent, lessee, tenant or occupant of any house, building, flat, apartment or tenement in the City of Big Spring, where persons reside or board or lodge; or where salubrious or vegetable food is prepared or served, or any private residence to provide for such house, building, flat, apartment or tenement, and at all times to maintain in good order and repair in the Residential Section of the City of Big Spring (Residential Section that portion of the City outside the fire limits), a suitable receptacle for garbage, rubbish and miscellaneous waste.

(b) Duties of Owners in the Fire Limits of the City of Big Spring: It shall be the duty of every owner, agent, lessee, tenant or occupant of any house, building, flat, apartment or tenement in the City of Big Spring, where persons reside or board or lodge; or where animal or vegetable food is prepared or served, or any private residence to provide for such house, building, flat, apartment or tenement, and at all times to maintain in good order and repair, a separate vessel or vessels for garbage and a separate vessel or vessels for rubbish and miscellaneous waste of the material, construction and capacity prescribed as follows: "For garbage shall be metal or metal lined vessel with close fitting top; size not less than five (5) gallons. For such rubbish and miscellaneous waste a receptacle of not less than five (5) gallons with a tight fitting top."

(c) It shall be the duty of every such occupant, tenant or person in possession or control of any premises to cause to be deposited in said garbage or refuse vessel or vessels (as described under subdivisions "a" and "b" of section 1), all garbage or refuse produced in or brought into or upon the premises of said house, building, flat, apartment, tenement, or dwelling place as soon as the same is produced or brought therein or upon.

(d) It shall be the duty of every such occupant or tenant of any such house, building, flat, apartment, tenement or dwelling place in the City of Big Spring where a vessel or vessels for garbage, and a vessel for waste, or any of them, have been provided, to place or cause to be placed such vessel or vessels in the rear of lots, inside of property lines for the removal of contents of such vessel or vessels at such time or times and in such manner as the proper officer empowered by the City Commission of the City of Big Spring to administer the provisions of this ordinance may direct.

SECTION TWO

Refuse and garbage to be deposited in vessels particularly provided therefor.

It shall be unlawful for any person to deposit in vessel or vessels used for garbage, any rubbish or miscellaneous waste, and it shall be unlawful for any person to deposit any garbage in any vessel or vessels provided for rubbish or miscellaneous waste and said person's name within the classification set out in Section 1, Subdivision "b."

SECTION THREE

Removal Permit

Any person, firm or corporation engaged in the removal of garbage, ashes, rubbish, waste paper, rags, refuse matter, manure or waste material of any kind within the jurisdiction of the City of Big Spring shall, before engaging in such work, obtain a permit from the City Commission of the City of Big Spring, or from the officer appointed by the said Commission to grant such permit, which permit if granted, shall be issued by the City Secretary for such period of time as may be designated by the City Commission or by the officer duly appointed by them to issue such permit as the case may be, but the board may refuse to grant any such permit; and it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation who has not first secured such permit, to engage, in such business or to remove from any vessel provided for the disposal of garbage or other waste material, any garbage, ashes, rubbish, waste paper, rags, refuse matter, manure or waste material of any kind; or to in any manner interfere with such receptacle; provided however, that the provisions of this section shall not apply to the owner of such receptacle or to the owner or occupant of the premises on which the same is located, provided further however, that no license which may be issued to any junk dealer by the City of Big Spring for the operation of any junk wagon in the City of Big Spring, shall authorize any person to whom such license is issued to remove any such waste material from any such receptacle or to in any manner interfere with any such receptacle.

It is further provided, however, that should the City Commission of the City of Big Spring, deem it advantageous to the City of Big Spring, to enter into a contract with any person, firm or corporation to remove the garbage and other waste material from all or any part of the territory comprising

ing the said city, they shall be empowered under the provisions of this ordinance to enter into such a contract and they shall be further empowered to make what conditions they deem fit and proper governing the removal of such garbage and waste material where the same are not otherwise provided for in this or other existing ordinance.

SECTION FOUR

Disposition of Garbage, Etc.

All persons engaged in the removal of garbage or other waste material shall dispose of the same by removal to the City of Big Spring Dumping Ground, or to such other place as designated by the officer of the City of Big Spring appointed to administer this ordinance.

SECTION FIVE

All containers employed for the removal of garbage to the City of Big Spring Dumping Ground or to such other place or places as may be designated under the provisions of Section Four hereof, shall be thoroughly disinfected before the same is removed from said dumping ground and returned to the City of Big Spring. The officer appointed to administer this ordinance shall be the sole judge as to the proper disinfecting of such containers and the same must be done to his satisfaction.

SECTION SIX

The City Commission of the City of Big Spring reserve the right to demand from any person engaging in the business of garbage removal in the City of Big Spring, a good and sufficient bond in an amount fixed by the City Commission of the City of Big Spring to guarantee to the said City of Big Spring that all of the provisions of this ordinance shall be complied with and this provision shall apply whether the City of Big Spring shall let a contract with one or more persons, firms or corporations or shall grant permits as allowed under the provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION SEVEN

Rates to be charged as herein set out shall be due and payable to the Secretary of the City of Big Spring on the first day of each month:

1. Service per month for night waste \$1.00.
2. Service per month outside fire limits for residential trash \$0.50 per month.
3. Daily service in the fire limits to be agreed upon by persons, firms or corporations removing said garbage and person, firm or corporation, or their agent in charge of the property to be serviced.

SECTION EIGHT

Penalty. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars.

SECTION NINE

Unconstitutionality Clause. Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, article or phrase of this ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason the remainder of said ordinance shall not be affected thereby. Each and every violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION TEN

Due to the fact that the health of the citizenship of the City of Big Spring is menaced by the unsanitary manner in which the garbage and rubbish of the city is handled at present, which condition demands immediate action, an emergency is hereby declared, and the rule requiring an ordinance to be read at three meetings of the city commission is hereby dispensed with, and this ordinance shall become immediately effective upon its passage at one meeting of said commission, and its publication as by law required.

AN ORDINANCE

Defining "milk" and certain "milk products," "milk producer," "pasteurization," etc., prohibiting the sale of adulterated and misbranded milk and milk products, requiring permits for the sale of milk and milk products, regulating the inspection of dairy farms and milk plants, the testing, grading, labeling, placarding, regrading, distribution, sale and denaturing of milk and milk products, providing for the publishing of milk grades, the construction of future dairies and milk plants, the enforcement of this ordinance, the fixing of penalties and punishments, and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF BIG SPRING:

SECTION ONE

DEFINITION: The following definitions shall apply in the interpretation and the enforcement of this ordinance:

(a) MILK: is hereby defined to be the whole, fresh, clean, lacteal secretion obtained by the complete milk of one or more healthy cows, properly fed and kept, excluding that obtained within fifteen days before and five days after calving, or such longer period as may be necessary to render the milk practically colostrum free; which contains not less than eight per cent of solids not fat and not less than three and one-fourth per cent (3 1/4) per cent of milk fat.

(b) MILK FAT OR BUTTER FAT: is the fat of milk and has a Reichert-Meisner number of not less than twenty-four (24) and a specific gravity of not less than 0.905 (400-400).

(c) CREAM: sweet cream, is that portion of milk rich in milk fat which rises to the surface of milk on standing or is separated from it by centrifugal force.

Fresh and clean, and which contains not less than eighteen per cent (18) per cent of milk fat; provided that cream having less than 18 per cent milk fat shall be known as SUB-STANDARD CREAM.

Cream having less than thirty per cent (30) per cent milk fat shall be known as LIGHT CREAM.

Cream having more than thirty per cent (30) per cent and less than forty per cent (40) milk fat shall be known as HEAVY CREAM and cream having more than forty (40) per cent milk fat shall be known as EXTRA HEAVY CREAM.

WHIPPING CREAM AND MANUFACTURING CREAM: are creams intended for whipping or manufacturing purposes, and the grades of the same shall not be based on bacterial count.

(d) SKIMMED MILK: is from which substantially all the milk fat has been removed.

(e) ADJUSTED MILK: is milk in which the percentage of milk fat has been adjusted by the addition or removal of cream or skimmed milk.

(f) BUTTER MILK: is the product which remains when milk fat is removed from milk or cream, sweet or sour, in the process of churning. It contains not less than eight and five-tenths percent (8 5/10) of milk solids not fat.

(g) CULTURED BUTTER MILK: is the product resulting from the souring or treatment by a lactic acid culture of milk or milk products.

(h) EVAPORATED MILK: Unsweetened—is milk from which a considerable portion of water has been evaporated and which contains not less than twenty-five and five-tenths (25 5/10) of milk solids and not less than seven and eight-tenths per cent (7 8/10) milk fat.

(i) CONDENSED MILK: unsweetened—is milk from which a considerable portion of water has been evaporated to which sugar has been added, and which contains not less than twenty-eight percent (28) of milk solids and not less than eight percent (8) milk fat.

(j) CONDENSED SKIMMED MILK: is skimmed milk from which a considerable portion of water has been evaporated, and which contains not less than twenty percent (20) of milk solids.

(k) POWDERED (dried) WHOLE MILK: is milk from which substantially all of the water has been removed, and which contains not less than twenty-six percent (26) of milk fat, and not more than five percent (5) of moisture.

(l) POWDERED SKIMMED MILK: is skimmed milk from which substantially all of the water has been removed, and which contains not more than five percent (5) of moisture.

(m) RE-COMBINED MILK: is a substance produced by re-combining whole milk, powdered skimmed milk, condensed or evaporated whole milk or skimmed milk, and milk fat with water and shall conform in milk fat percentage and bacterial counts to the provisions of this ordinance relating to milk.

(n) MILK PRODUCTS: shall be taken to mean and include cream, skimmed milk, adjusted milk, butter milk, cultured butter milk, evaporated milk, (unsweetened) condensed milk, unsweetened condensed skimmed milk, powdered whole milk, powdered skimmed milk and re-combined milk.

(o) PASTEURIZATION: the terms "pasteurization," "pasteurized," "pasteurize," and similar terms shall be taken to refer to the process of heating milk or milk products to a temperature of not less than one hundred and forty-two degrees (142 degrees) Fahrenheit, and holding at such temperature (not less than 30 minutes) and temperature and time being automatically recorded by a temperature and time recording device approved by the health officer.

(p) ADULTERATED MILK AND MILK PRODUCTS: are milk and milk products defined in this ordinance which do not conform with the definitions contained in this ordinance.

(q) MILK PRODUCER: a milk producer is any person, firm or corporation who owns or controls one or more cows, a part or all of the milk from which is for sale, or sold or delivered to another person, firm or corporation.

(r) MILK DISTRIBUTOR: a milk distributor is any person, firm or corporation which has in possession, offers for sale, sells or delivers to another, any milk or milk products for consumption or manufacturing purposes.

(s) DAIRY OR DAIRY FARM: is any place or premises where one or more cows are kept, a part or all of the milk or milk products from which is sold or delivered to any person, firm or corporation.

(t) MILK PLANT: a milk plant is any place, or premises or establishment where milk or milk products are collected, handled, processed, stored, bottled, pasteurized, or prepared for distribution.

(u) HEALTH OFFICER: the health officer shall be taken to mean the health officer of the City of Big Spring, Texas, in person or his authorized representative.

(v) AVERAGE BACTERIAL COUNT: shall be taken to mean the average bacterial count of all samples taken during the grading period, including at least five samples taken upon separate days.

(w) GRADING PERIOD: The grading period shall be such period of time as shall be determined by the health officer, but shall not exceed thirty (30) days.

(x) GRADE: The grade of milk shall be determined by the health officer, and shall be based upon the following standard: the grading of cream being identical with the grading of milk except that the permissible bacterial

MISBRANDED MILK OR MILK PRODUCTS PROHIBITED

No person, firm, association or corporation shall within the City of Big Spring, Texas, produce, sell, offer or expose for sale, or have in possession with intent to sell, any milk or milk products which is adulterated, misbranded, or unbranded.

SECTION THREE

Permits

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation, to bring into or receive into the City of Big Spring, Texas, for sale, or to sell or offer for sale, therein or to have on hand any milk or milk product, excepting evaporated milk, condensed milk, condensed skimmed milk, powdered whole milk, powdered skimmed milk, who has not paid his license fee in advance and who does not possess an unrevoked permit from the health officer of the City of Big Spring, Texas, and on whose vehicle or in whose place of business there does not appear in a conspicuous place a placard showing the permit number in figures at least three inches high and one and one-half inches wide.

Such a permit may be revoked by the health officer upon the violation by the holder of any of the terms of this or any other health ordinance of the City of Big Spring, Texas, providing that the holder of said permit shall, after complying with such revocation have the right of appeal to the board of health.

SECTION FOUR

LABELING AND PLACARDING: All bottles, cans, packages and other containers enclosing milk or any milk product defined in this ordinance and sold or served shall be plainly labeled or marked with: (1) the name of the contents as given in the definitions in this ordinance; (2) the grade of the contents if said contents are graded, under the provisions of this ordinance; (3) the word "pasteurized" if the contents have been pasteurized; (4) the word "raw" if the contents are raw; (5) the percentage of milk fat if the packages or other container encloses adjusted milk.

Every grocery store, restaurant, cafe, soda fountain or similar establishment selling or serving milk shall display in a place designated by the health officer a card furnished by the health officer, stating the grade of the milk at the time when delivered and whether same is raw or pasteurized.

SECTION FIVE

INSPECTION OF DAIRY FARMS AND MILK PLANTS FOR THE PURPOSE OF GRADING OR REGRADING: at least once during each grading period the health officer shall inspect every dairy farm producing milk or cream for consumption within the City of Big Spring, Texas, and all milk plants whose milk or cream is intended for consumption within the City of Big Spring, Texas.

In case the health officer discovers the violation of any item of sanitation, he shall make a second inspection after a lapse of such time as he deems necessary for the defect to be remedied but not before the lapse of three days, and the second inspection shall be used in determining the grade of milk or cream.

One copy of the inspection report shall be posted by the health officer in a conspicuous place upon an inside wall of one of the dairy farms or milk plant buildings, and said inspection report shall not be removed by any person except the health officer. Another copy of the inspection report shall be filed with the records of the health department. In addition, a written notice shall be mailed to or left with the owner or manager in the case of violations.

SECTION SIX

THE TESTING OF MILK AND MILK PRODUCTS: During each grading period at least four samples of milk or cream from each dairy farm and each milk plant shall be tested by the health officer. Samples of milk and cream from stores, cafes, soda fountains, restaurants, and other places where milk products are sold shall be tested as often as the health officer shall require. Said tests shall include the determination of the bacterial count made in conformity with the standard methods recommended by the American Public Health Association and may include such other chemical and physical determinations as the health officer may deem necessary for the detection of adulteration.

Notices of bacterial counts shall be given to the producer or distributor concerned as soon as made or to any interested person on request. Samples may be taken by the health officer at any time prior to the final delivery of the milk or milk products.

All stores, cafes, restaurants, soda fountains and other similar places shall furnish the health officer, upon receipt, the name of the milk distributor from whom their milk is obtained.

Should the market value of any single sample exceed twenty-five cents the City of Big Spring, Texas, shall pay the distributor therefor.

SECTION SEVEN

THE GRADING OF MILK AND MILK PRODUCTS: At least once every six months the health officer shall announce through the daily press the grades of all milk and cream samples followed by all producers or distributors and ultimately consumed within the City of Big Spring, Texas, said grades shall be based upon the following standard: the grading of cream being identical with the grading of milk except that the permissible bacterial

CERTIFIED MILK: In milk which conforms with the requirements of the American Association of Medical Milk Commissioners, and produced under the supervision of the Medical Milk Commission of the Medical Society of Howard County, Texas.

GRADE "A" RAW MILK: is milk the average bacterial count of which as determined under Section 6, of the ordinance does not exceed 50,000 per cubic centimeter and which is produced upon dairy farms conforming with all of the following items of sanitation:

COWS: (1) A physical examination and tuberculosis test of all cows shall be made at the owner's expense before any milk therefrom is sold and at least once every twelve months thereafter by a veterinarian who is a graduate of a veterinary college recognized by the B. A. L. and who is approved by the health officer. A certificate signed by the veterinarian, and filed with the health officer shall be the only valid evidence of the above test. Every diseased animal shall be removed from the herd at once and no milk from diseased cows shall be offered for sale. All rectal animals shall be isolated at once and immediately excluded from the premises. All animals failing to pass the tuberculosis test shall be branded with the letters "T" or "T. B." on the shoulder, hip, or jaw and removed at once and slaughtered under the direction of the health officer. Each letter in the brand shall be not less than two inches and one and one-half inches wide.

LIGHTING: (2) All dairy barns shall have at least three square feet of window space for each animal.

AIR SPACE: (3) All dairy barns shall have at least five hundred (500) cubic feet of air space per cow.

FLOORS: (4) Floors and gutters of all dairy barns shall be constructed of concrete or other impervious and easily cleaned material approved by the health officer and shall be graded to drain properly and shall be kept clean and in good repair.

WALLS AND CEILINGS: (5) The walls and ceilings of all dairy barns shall be whitewashed once each year or painted once every two years, or finished in a manner approved by the health officer, and shall be kept in good repair. In case hay or other feed stuffs are stored above the barn the buildings shall be tight.

COW YARD: (6) All cow yards shall be graded and drained as well as practical, and kept clean.

MANURE DISPOSAL: (7) All manure shall be removed and stored or disposed of in such manner as best to prevent the breeding of flies.

MILK HOUSE OR ROOM: (8) "Construction." There shall be provided a separate milk house or milk room for the handling and storage of milk, provided with a tight floor constructed of cement or other impervious material and graded to provide proper drainage. The walls and ceilings of the milk house or room shall be of such construction as to permit easy cleaning and shall be painted at least once each year or finished in a manner approved by the health officer. The milk house or room shall be well lighted and all openings effectively screened to prevent the entrance of flies and shall be used for no other purpose than the handling and storage of milk or milk products and other operations incident thereto. The cleaning and other operations shall be so located and conducted as to prevent any contamination one to the other. The milk room shall not open directly into the barn or into any room used for sleeping or domestic purpose.

CLEANLINESS: (9) The floors, walls, ceilings and equipment of the milk house or room shall be kept clean at all times.

TOILET: (10) Every dairy farm shall be provided with a sanitary toilet constructed and operated in accordance with the ordinances of the City of Big Spring, Texas. No outside sanitary privy shall be located within 150 feet of any milk house or source of water supply.

(11) The water supply shall be easily accessible, adequate and of a safe sanitary quality.

UTENSILS: (12) (constructed) All containers or utensils used in the handling or storage of milk or milk products must be of such construction as to be easily cleaned and must be in good repair. Joints and seams shall be soldered flush. All milk pails shall be of narrow mouth design, approved by the health officer.

(13) CLEANING: All containers and other utensils used in the handling and storage or transportation of milk products must be thoroughly cleaned up by rinsing with clean water after each use, scrubbing in a caustic solution, and rinsing with clean water.

(14) STERILIZATION: All containers and other utensils used in the handling, storage, or transportation of milk or milk products shall be between usage be sterilized with steam.

(15) STORAGE: All containers and other utensils used in the handling, storage or transportation of milk or milk products shall be stored in such a manner as to be protected from contamination and shall be kept in a clean condition, and good repair, and well ventilated. In case pails or other vessels are permitted and used, they shall be located at least 100 feet from the building and shall be of sanitary type constructed and operated in conformity with the ordinances of the City of Big Spring, Texas.

(16) WATER SUPPLY: The water supply shall be easily accessible and adequate, and of a safe sanitary quality.

(17) WARE ROOM: A ware room shall be provided with hot running water, soap, and sanitary towels of a type approved by the health officer. The use of common towels is prohibited.

(18) MILK PIPING: Any "milk" milk piping of a type which can be easily cleaned with a brush shall be used.

(19) CONTAMINATION OF EQUIPMENT: All equipment which comes in contact with milk or milk products shall be kept clean and in good repair.

(20) HANDLING: After sterilization no container or other utensil shall be used for any other purpose than the handling of milk or milk products.

(21) HANDLING: After sterilization no container or other utensil shall be used for any other purpose than the handling of milk or milk products.

For surface with which milk or milk products come in contact.

(24) UDDERS AND TEATS: The udders and teats of all milking cows shall be cleaned and sprayed with water containing chloride of lime or any other approved disinfectant and dried with a disinfectant cloth immediately before milking.

(25) FLANKS: The flanks of all milking cows shall be kept free of visible dirt at the time for milking.

(26) MILKERS' HANDS: Shall be clean and washed with water containing chloride of lime or any other approved disinfectant and dried with a clean towel immediately before milking. Should the milking operation be interrupted the milker's hands must be re-disinfected.

(27) CLEAN CLOTHING: Milk-ers shall wear clean outer garments during milking.

(28) MILK STOOLS shall be kept clean.

(29) REMOVAL OF MILK: Each pail of milk shall be removed immediately to the milkhouse. No milk shall be strained in the dairy barn.

(30) COOLING: Milk must be cooled within one hour after milking to 50 degrees Fahrenheit or less and maintained at or below that temperature until delivery unless it is delivered to a milk plant for pasteurization or separation in which case it must be cooled or pasteurized within two hours of the time of production.

BOTTLING AND CAPPING: Capping shall preferably be done by machine. In case capping is done by hand, the hands shall be disinfected in a manner approved by the health officer before the process of capping has begun and after each interruption. Caps not purchased in sanitary containers and kept therein until used shall be kept in dust-proof containers and shall be immersed in an approved disinfectant solution immediately before use.

(31) HEALTH CERTIFICATES: Every person whose work brings him or her in regular contact with the production handling storage, or transportation of milk or milk products shall hold a certificate from the health officer certifying to the fact that within twelve months laboratory and other examinations have been made indicating that said person is free of tuberculosis, that said person is not a carrier of typhoid fever and that said person is free of any disease capable of being spread through milk supplies.

(32) NOTIFICATION OF DISEASE: Notice shall be sent to the health officer within twenty-four hours by any milk producer or distributor upon whose dairy farm any case of sickness or any infectious, contagious or communicable disease occurs.

Grade "B" Raw Milk: Is milk the average bacterial count of which at no time prior to delivery exceeds 200,000 per cubic centimeter and which is produced upon dairy farms conforming with all of the items of sanitation required for Grade "A" Raw Milk except (3), (13), (14), (15), and (16), provided the cleanliness of the barn and cow yard shall in no case be omitted. Item (23) shall apply except that the cooling temperature shall be changed to sixty (60) degrees Fahrenheit. Item (18) shall apply except that boiling water may be substituted for steam.

Section 17. Every person, firm or corporation selling or transporting milk or milk products in the City of Big Spring shall be subject to inspection and before selling or delivering milk or milk products in the City of Big Spring shall apply to and secure from the City Health Officer a written permit to engage in such business in the City of Big Spring for a period of one year thereafter provided there be paid to the City of Big Spring in advance for such permit for each year a license fee graduated as follows:

Annual license fee for the sale or delivery of milk or milk products acquired from or distributed by milk plant, \$30.00.

Annual license fee for sale or delivery of milk or milk products acquired from or produced or delivered by each dairy a minimum fee of \$3.00 plus \$2.00 per cow, heifer or bull up to and including ten head, and plus \$1.00 per head for each animal in addition to said ten head provided that in no case shall the maximum fee exceed \$30.00 for any one dairy.

Section 18. No unclean or unsanitary milk bottle or container used for milk or milk products shall be deposited or collected outside of a fly proof inclosure; it being the intention of this provision to avoid among other things the spread of diseases by placing or collection such bottles or containers where flies may be attracted.

Section 19. PROHIBITED MILK—Milk or milk products which do not conform with any one of the grades described in this Ordinance shall not be sold in the City of Big Spring, Texas.

Section 20. PENALTY—Any person, firm, association, or corporation who shall violate any provision of this Ordinance shall be fined not more than one hundred and no-100 Dollars (\$100.00).

Section 21. REPEAL AND DATE OF EFFECT—All Ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed; and this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its adoption and its publication as provided by law.

Section 22. Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remainder of said Ordinance shall not be affected thereby. Each and every violation of the provisions of this Ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 23. EMERGENCY—The health and welfare of the citizenship of the City of Big Spring is being menaced daily by the type and character of milk and milk products sold in said city; said conditions demand immediate action, and due to these facts an emergency is hereby declared, and the rule requiring an ordinance of resolution to be read at three meetings of the City Commission is hereby dispensed with, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage at one meeting of the City Commission, its approval by the Mayor, and its publication as by law required.

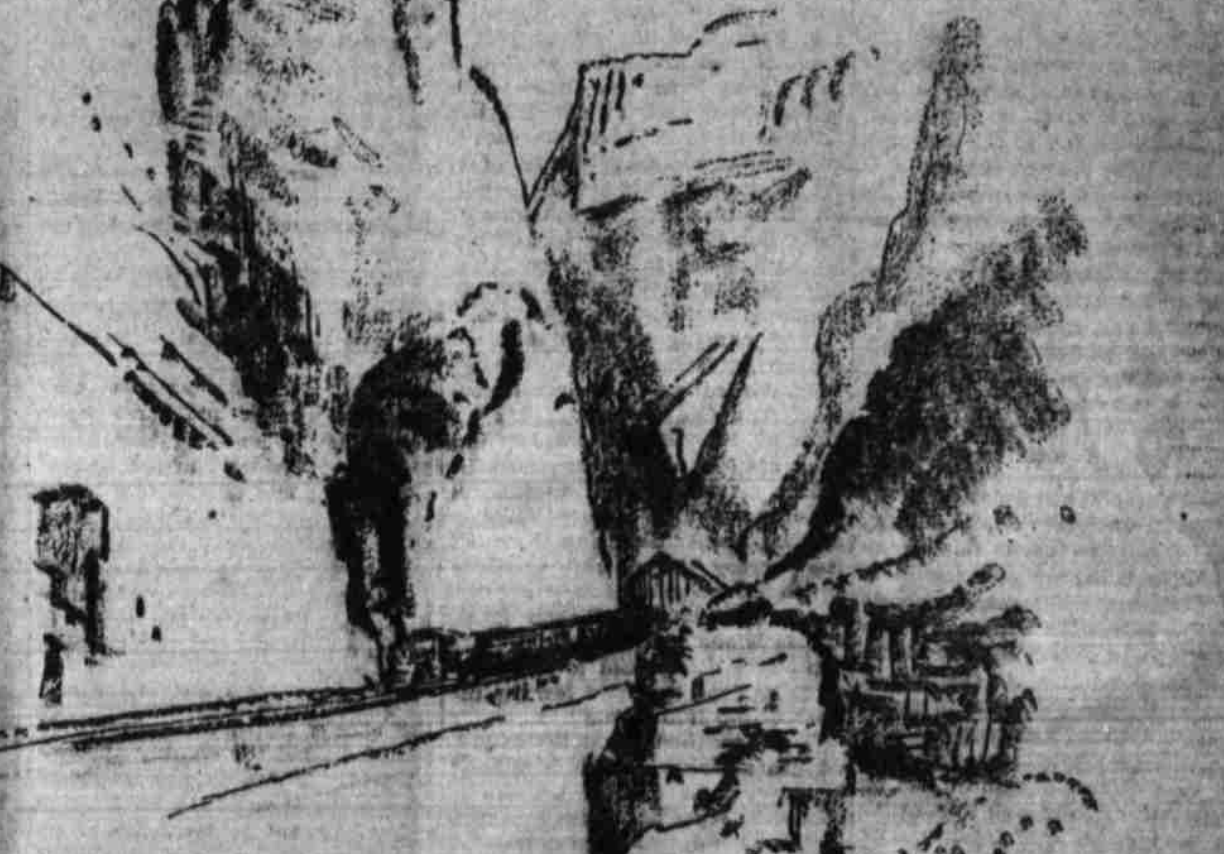
