Regents Are Given Authority by Bill Introduced in Senate Monday by Sen. Pink L. Parrish

Senate Unanimous

Similar Bill Affecting C. I. A. Is Sanctioned by House in First Session; No Action Taken by Moody

AUSTIN, June 10.—Regents of the State Board of Education today authorized the use of rent revenues from the construction of dormitories for the West Texas State Normal School, which passed unanimously by the senate today.

A similar bill affecting the College of Industrial Arts was sanctioned by both houses during the first special session. The bill was not signed by the governor.

Although Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of the institution here, or H. T. Kimbro, local member of the board of regents could not be reached for a statement last night, it is understood that this plan for constructing dormitories was discussed several weeks ago when members of the senate made an inspection visit here.

The plan, as discussed by senators and college officials at that time, was to build a dormitory for the college.

Robberies During Week-end Unsolved

Burglars Fail To Gather Much Loot In Series Of Thefts Here; No Clues Found by Police

Robberies over the week-end, while not so profitable to the would-be lawbreakers, were somewhat numerous and accomplished in such ways that officers have been unable to make any arrests. Three, which have been reported, are still without solution.

As the result of a small robbery late Saturday night Campbell's Grocery, 2116 16th street, is lower to the amount of 50 cents in silver, \$1 in pennies and seven packages of cigarettes.

Entrance into the store was gained by forcing the iron bars on the rear door. The sheriff's department, while having no definite clue as to the identity of the robbers, advanced the theory that young boys were responsible.

All efforts to locate the house-breaker who boldly walked into the home of G. H. Reeves, manager of Piggy-Wiggy No. 4 Sunday morning have failed.

The burglary was frustrated when the screams of Reeves' young child frightened the man away. Escape was made through a window of Mrs. Reeves' bedroom and then an automobile parked near the house.

Upon discovering a man in her home Mrs. Reeves screamed for help and the man placed his hand over her mouth. The child, who was sleeping with his mother, dreamed for his father who was nearby.

Swedish Aviators Stop For Banquet

REYKJAVIK, Iceland, June 10. (AP)—Captain Albin Ahrensberg tonight expressed his intention of continuing his flight to New York immediately after a banquet tendered him and his two companions here. The reports of unfavorable weather over Greenland this morning had been supplemented by others showing improvement in conditions.

After a broken fuel pipe had nearly brought disaster to the fliers and the plane had reached Vestmanna Island, off the south coast of Iceland, in tow by one of several government rescue boats, it was refueled at 7:48 p. m. local time. The plane was virtually undamaged.

Impeachment Hearing Preliminaries Against Robison Are Started Monday

First Witnesses To Appear In Case Thursday

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, June 10.—Preliminaries incident to hearing testimony on charges against J. T. Robison, commissioner of the general land office, accusing him of wrong doing in office and proposing impeachment, were taken late today by the house of representatives and the first witnesses will appear Thursday.

The house sustained a ruling by Representative Ed R. Sinks of Oldenburg, appointed by Speaker W. S. Barron to pass on admissibility of testimony that the transcript of the joint committee which investigated the general land office during the regular session could be used in lieu of witnesses in person.

Transcript Testimony Opposed
Attorneys for Mr. Robison opposed use of any part of the transcript testimony and Dayton Moses of Fort Worth leading counsel for the veteran official, pleaded for "witnesses in the flesh, so you can look into his face and see the white of his eyes."

Col. Robert B. Allen sr. of Dallas, chief attorney for the house, said that unless the transcript testimony could be used, start of the hearing would be delayed indefinitely and that he did not believe proponents of the charges should be compelled to bring every witness here "at vast expense."

300 Witnesses Subpoenaed
About 300 witnesses, subpoenaed by attorneys for Mr. Robison Saturday, were here today awaiting a call to the witness chair.

Representative Polk G. Hornaday of Huntington, applied for a ruling by Judge Sinks that the transcript of the testimony in the committee investigation could be used, but the veteran attorney and former district judge of Oldenburg was sustained, 69 to 44.

During the hearing, Mr. Robison, 48 years old and frail of body, sat with his attorneys. His cheeks were hollow and his thick white hair slightly disheveled. He wore gold-rimmed spectacles. He was a small string tie of blue with pin stripes. He was silent throughout the proceedings.

Advocate Witnesses In Person
Prefacing his appeal to the house to insist on bringing witnesses in person, rather than depend on the transcript of the investigating committee, Mr. Sinks recalled that 30 years ago, he (Sinks) was a clerk in the land office.

"I first became acquainted with Mr. Robison in 1893 when he was a member of the legislature from East Texas," he said. "During his first five months tenure in the land office, in 1893, I worked as a clerk by his side. He was my friend then, he has been my friend throughout those years, and I am his friend now."

"We are ready to go with this."

Rascob Denies He Is To Resign As Demo Chairman

Party Leaders Gather For Banquet Monday Night At Honor Of Jettett House, New Executive Official

WASHINGTON, June 10.—John J. Rascob, chairman of the democratic national committee, told the party leaders gathered here tonight at a banquet honoring Jettett House, the new chairman of the executive committee that he had no intention of resigning.

"I hope my remarks tonight will set at rest all doubts about my continuing," he said, diverging from his prepared address, as the men and women attending the dinner arose applauding and cheering.

He added that when he took the chairmanship he did so because he believed in the principles of the democratic party.

The chairman announced that Mrs. Nellie Taylor Ross of Wyoming would be a member of the executive committee with Mr. Shouse and in charge of women's activities. He also stated that Charles Greenhouse of Indiana would continue as secretary of the committee and James W. Gerard as treasurer.

G. O. P. Policies Denounced
Those at the dinner, which marked the first big gathering of party leaders since the disastrous 1928 campaign, heard Rascob denounce republican policies, and Shouse outline plans for strengthening the ranks for the next campaign.

James L. Brabham Is Given 3 Years In Penitentiary

Former Idalou Banker Is Found Guilty Of Misapplication Of Bank Funds By Jury Here

Held By Marshal

Judge James C. Wilson In Federal District Court Here Sets Aside Previous Sentence On Defendant

JAMES L. Brabham, former active vice-president of the First State Bank at Idalou, must serve a three year sentence in the Federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, according to a sentence handed down Monday by Judge J. C. Wilson in the Lubbock division of the Federal district court.

Brabham was being tried on a charge of misapplication of the bank funds and was found guilty by a jury. Judge Wilson set aside his former sentence in the case, given some time ago when Brabham was first arraigned, and imposed the sentence of three years. Brabham is now in hands of a marshal and will be taken to the penitentiary in the near future, Judge Wilson said.

In the previous case Brabham was freed on the condition that no other criminal charges would be brought against him. But, according to Judge Wilson's statement, funds continued to disappear from the bank and the giving of drafts was continued.

Buddy Crowder Is Found Not Guilty

A verdict of not guilty was handed down late last night by the jury in the case of the State of Texas vs. Buddy Crowder being tried in the 72nd district court with Judge Homer L. Pharr presiding.

Arguments in the case were begun at the night session and a verdict was reached about 10:45. Crowder was charged with violation of the prohibition law.

Five cases were disposed of in the Lubbock division of the Federal district court Monday, presided over by Judge James C. Wilson. Three fines, each of \$500 were assessed for violations of the national prohibition act, one youth drew the reformatory while another case was

Penitentiary Bill Vetoed By Moody

AUSTIN, June 10. (AP)—Contending that a compromise bill affecting relocation of the penitentiary system which was passed during the first special session with "simply prolonging the controversy concerning concentration," Gov. Moody today vetoed it.

Instead of a commission of nine to be appointed by the governor to determine a suitable site for relocation, as proposed by the bill, the chief executive recommended that authority to move the system be specifically delegated to a group.

"The legislature, however, desires to retain control over the transaction and I think this bill will merely prolong the matter as a political issue," the governor said in commenting on his refusal.

MAIL RECORDS BROKEN

WASHINGTON, June 10. (AP)—Air mail lines in the United States during May broke all previous records, carrying 587,471 pounds of mail over a scheduled daily mileage of 34,334 miles for a daily average of 18,900 pounds.

The postoffice department announced today that the mail poundage for May surpassed even that carried last December, when the Christmas mails reached the total of 577,000 pounds. The May total surpassed the figure for April by 78,790 pounds.

Six Large Papers Of West Texas In New Organization

Lindsay Nunn Heads Group Of Dailies In Lubbock, Amarillo, El Paso; Will Continue Same Policies

The formation of a new West Texas newspaper organization, including six papers in Lubbock, El Paso and Amarillo and operating under the ownership of J. Lindsay Nunn, Amarillo, and associates, was made public Monday in the cities effected and on the news wires of the Associated Press and United Press.

Three evening papers and a like number of morning publications are included in the new organization, member papers being the Lubbock Morning Avalanche, Lubbock Daily Journal, Amarillo Daily News, Amarillo Globe, El Paso Herald and the El Paso Times.

No changes in policies or in management of the individual papers will be made as a result of the organization, Mr. Nunn announced. Charles A. Guy, editor, and L. H. Quinn, publisher, will continue to operate the Avalanche-Journal publications, serve as directors of the organization and will retain their financial interests in the business. The Amarillo papers will continue under the direction of Editor Gene A. Howe and General Manager Wilbur

Fred Anton Dies Following Crash

Former Railroad Official At Slaton Succumbs At Clovis; Military Funeral Will Be Held Wednesday

CLOVIS, N. M., June 10.—Injuries suffered a week ago in an automobile accident proved fatal today for J. Fred Anton, prominent southwest railroad man.

Mr. Anton was superintendent of the New Mexico division of the Santa Fe railroad. Prior to coming to Las Vegas, the New Mexico headquarters for the company, he served the railway as superintendent of the Slaton division at Slaton, Texas.

Mr. Anton, who was 44, is survived by his widow and two daughters. Anton will be given a military funeral Wednesday afternoon. The

Ravaging Storm In Two States Claims Two Lives And Injures Many; Entire Half-Mile Of Buildings Is Levelled

Numerous Homes Demolished In Minnesota and Wisconsin Communities Monday; Reports Meagre

Rescue Parties Are Sent To Stricken Areas To Repair Power Lines And Aid Injured Victims

KINGSTON, Minn., June 10.—Two persons were killed, farm homes were demolished and livestock wiped out in a tornado which struck here tonight.

ASHLAND, Wis., June 10. (AP)—A tornado tonight ravaged Ladysmith, Wis., and other communities in the northern part of the state, according to meagre advices reaching here over the private wire of the Lake Superior District Power Co., the only means of communication open with the stricken area.

The storm levelled homes for half a mile along South street in Ladysmith. At least six persons were taken to hospitals there. It was believed that none was seriously hurt. Property damage, however, was said to be great.

The storm also struck Bruce and Prentice, Wis., according to power officials. A rescue party was sent from

Launch Clean-Up Campaign Monday

City Health Authorities Ask That Weeds And Trash Be Cleared From Alleys And Vacant Lots Here

With only a ten-day time limit before drastic action will be taken, Dr. J. W. Rollo and Y. J. Aiken, city health authorities, yesterday launched an intensive city-wide clean-up and sanitary campaign.

Complaints will be filed against every property owner in the city who fails to cut the weeds and clean the trash from their alleys. Dr. Rollo said yesterday afternoon in a statement to the Avalanche-Journal.

"The weeds and trash in the alleys and on the vacant lots are a disgrace," he said. "All trash must be collected immediately and tops must be furnished for all garbage cans."

The older person usually gets less exercise and has less opportunity to relax completely, so that the blood can flow normally through the skin, as it does when exercise sends it pumping through the veins or when rest in a reclining position makes it possible.

Whatever interferes with the free circulation of the blood through the skin tissues interferes with the health and beauty of the skin. For the blood is the skin's first feeder. Hence it is necessary to stimulate whenever a skin looks anything less than its best, to make that blood come up and do its work as it should.

There are cream stimulants and liquid stimulants. A beautifying skin food is one of the most remarkable creams, because, through its stimulating powers, it enables the skin to be fed. This cream has marvelous clearing effects as well. Left on the skin overnight it acts

as a mild bleach would do. It freshens the color and gives the skin a healthy glow.

The liquid stimulants act more powerfully still upon the circulation. These are applied after a cleansing cream, when the skin is completely clean. They sting like fire and make the face grow rosy-red by the force with which they act in the skin's circulatory system. One swift application of any one of these freshens a skin remarkably, and gives it the glow and color that a child's face has after a day of skipping about in the open air. Why not use hot or cold water or ice to bring up the blood and stimulate, you may ask? Any one of them will do the trick and give a skin a nice fresh color quickly. Yes, but there is a drawback here. The element of extreme heat and cold furnishes a disagreeable shock to the skin. Heat relaxes the muscles and ice is likely to paralyze the tiny blood vessels so that they look broken and purple.

The cream of liquid stimulants do the necessary work without the dangers attendant upon stimulation by very hot water or by ice. Although cold water, especially distilled water or rain water, makes a good skin stimulant.

"And that's just one of the many questions we run into every day," one of the boys declared.

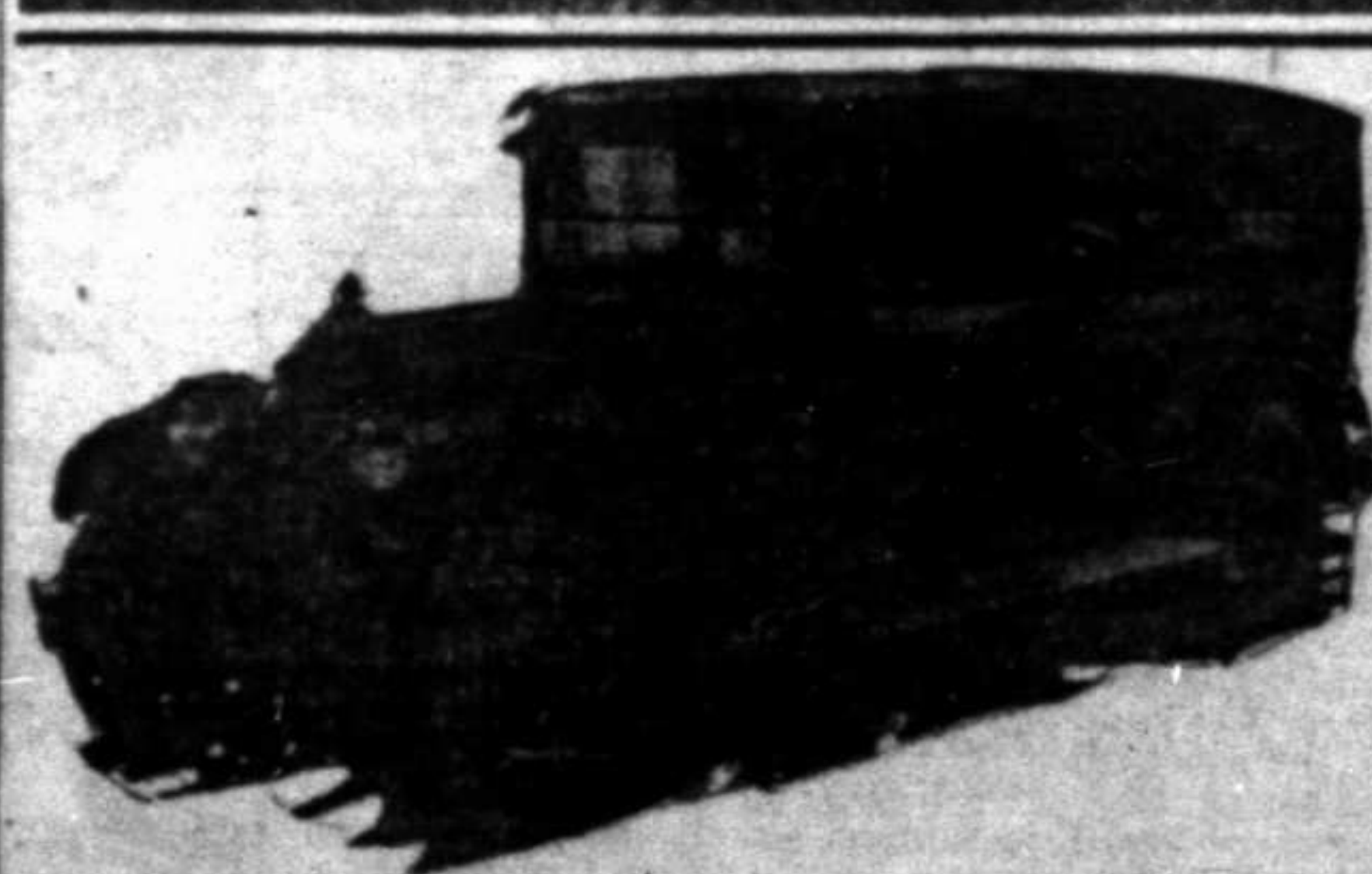

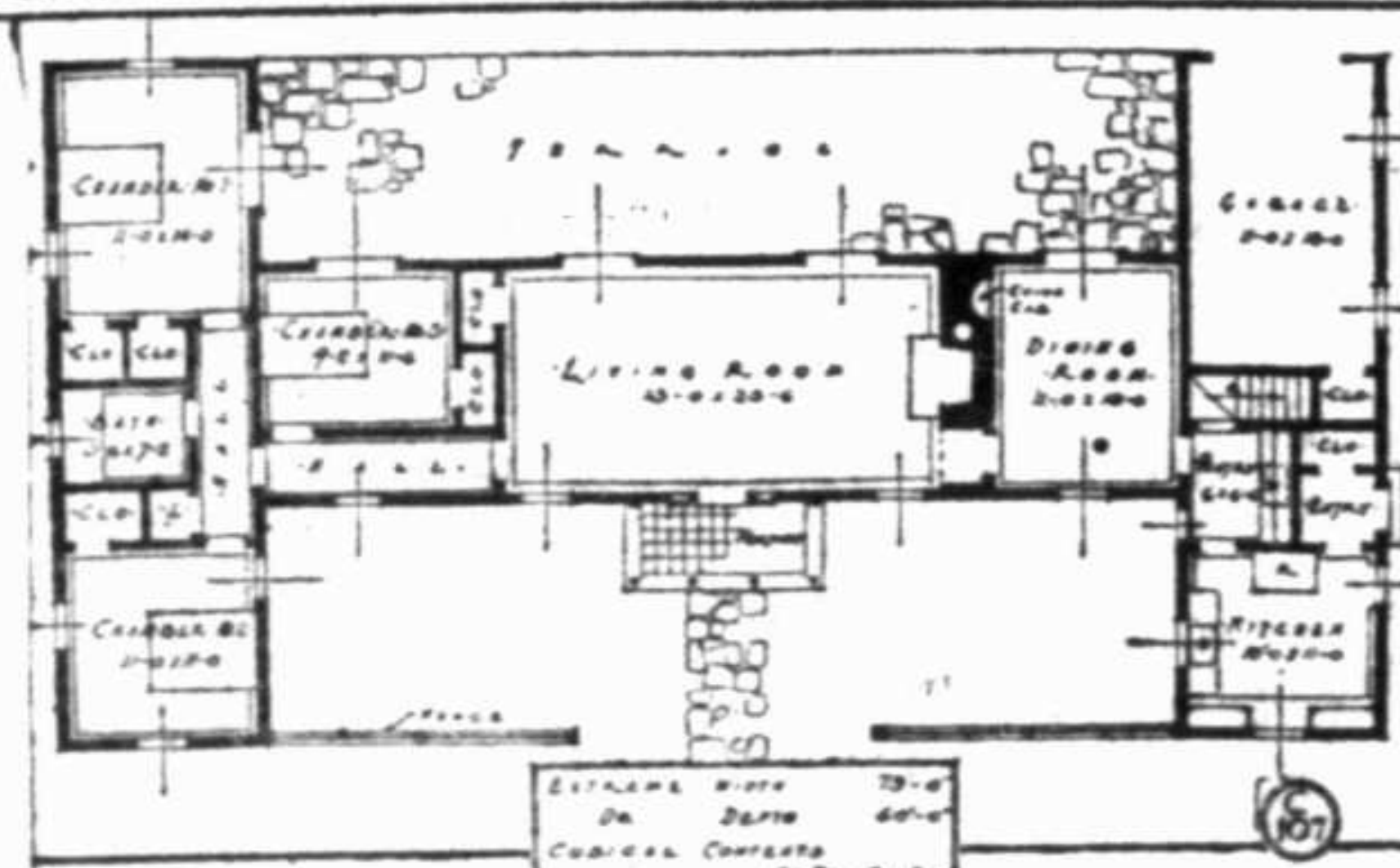
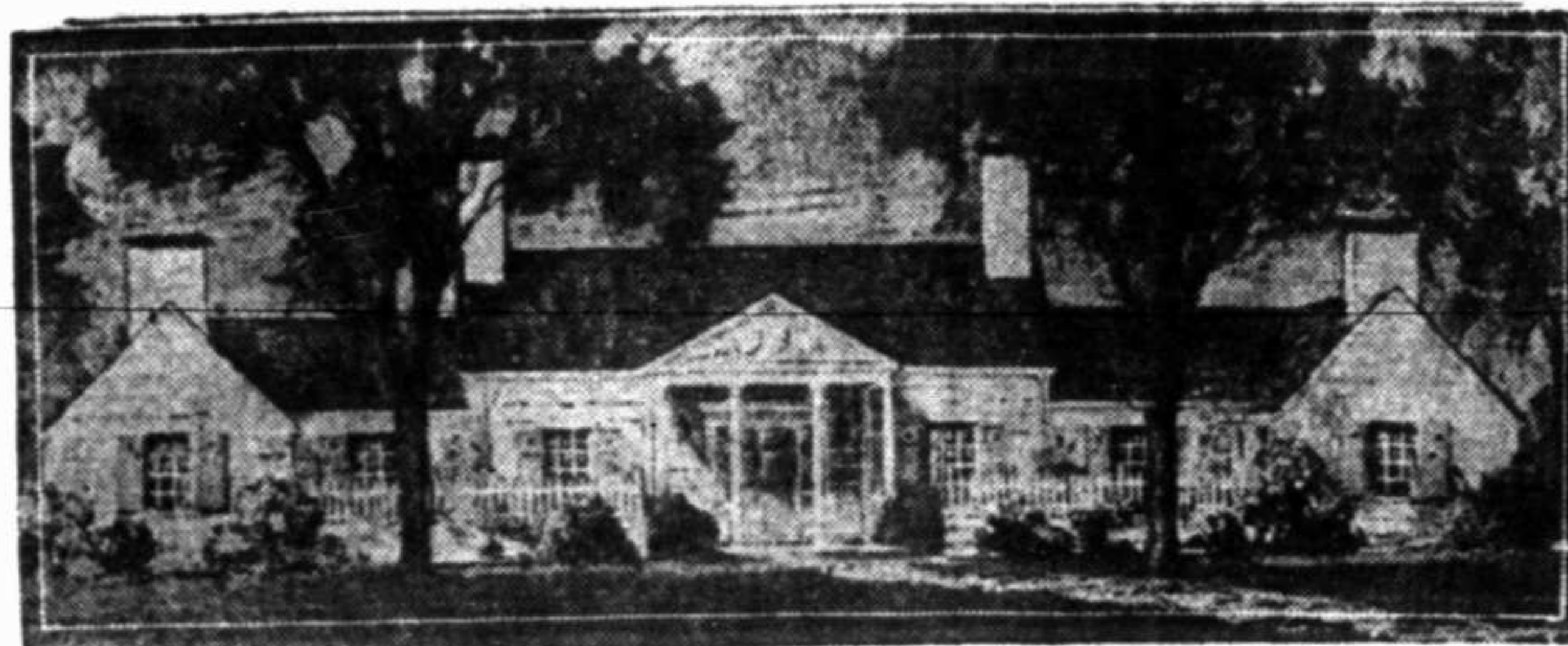

HOUSE PLANS

A HOUSE THAT LUMBER BUILT - AS A COLONIAL BUNGALOW

THE majority of houses in America are lumber built. Custom alone is not responsible for this. When lumber is properly used, it successfully meets varying climatic conditions, it is more universally obtainable than any other material, it is suited to nearly every style of architecture, it is economical and it is the material most quickly applied. In addition, the lumber-built house can be enlarged and remodeled at comparatively small expense.

This house pictured here is of wood construction throughout. Colonial in design, it is built of shingles with a shingle roof. The chimneys are of white stucco. Inside, beamed ceilings and rough plastered walls set the stage for the heavy colonial furniture. Mass, weight and a crude vigor of ornament characterize the furnishings throughout the whole house.

It's Ideal Bungalow

The structure is low and long and all the rooms are on one floor, making it an ideal bungalow. There are 79 feet of house, so one must have at least a hundred feet lot to build it on.

There is a living room over twenty-five feet long, with a real colonial fireplace. From the almost square dining room, one enters the pantry and through swinging doors passes into the kitchen. The kitchen has cross current ventilation and looks out on the front garden. In back of the pantry is the garage.

On the left of the living room,

separated by a small hall, is a bed room. On the other wing are two more bed rooms separated by a hall in which there is a modern bath room. Each bed room has two closets.

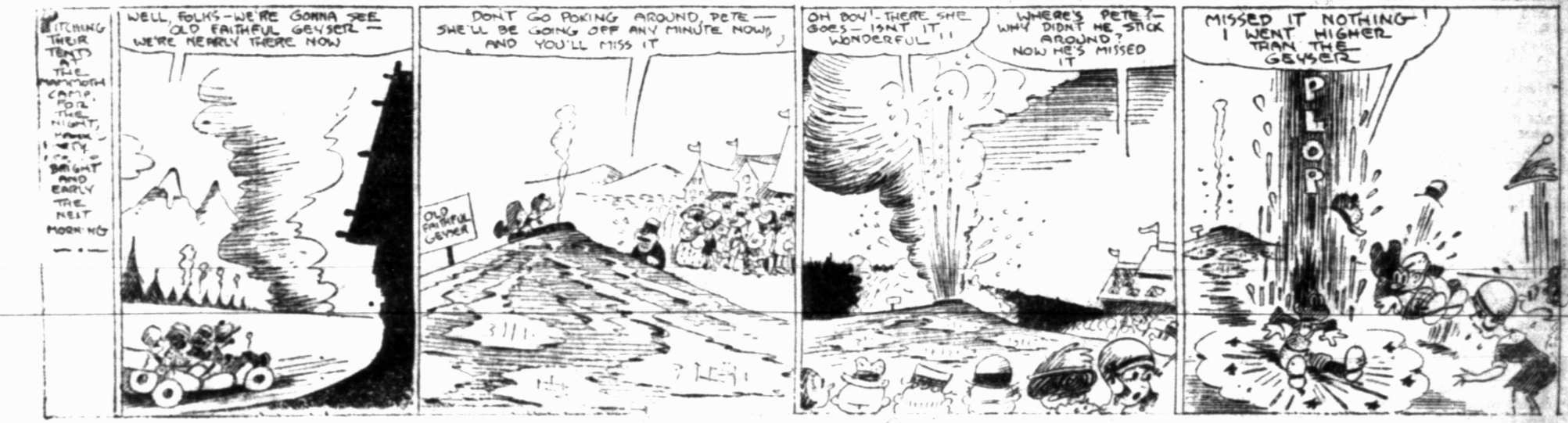
