Cross country team headed for state

The Lockney Longhorn Varsity boys cross country team will travel to Georgetown this Saturday for the state Cross Country meet. This is the sixth year that Lockney has been represented at the state meet and by the boys varsity team.

Members of the Lockney team will be trying to bring home the first place title which eluded them last year. The team won state in 1984 and 1986. They placed fifth in 1983, third in 1984, and fourth in 1987. Jorge Bernal and Mark Gatica were members of the 1986 state winning team. Henry Ruiz and Kip Holt were

members of the 1987 cross country team.

REGIONAL MEET

This past weekend the boys team competed in the regional meet at Mae Simmons Park in Lubbock and placed third as a team. This qualifies the Longhorns to attend the state meet. First place finisher was Boys Ranch with a score of 25. Second place was Abernathy with a score of 79 and Lockney's score was an even 100.

Placing for the Lockney team were Mark Gatica, seventh, with a time of 17:14; Jorge Bernal, 13th, 17:47; Juan

Vargas, 20th, 18:13; Henry Ruiz, 26th, 18:44; Andy Rodriguez, 34th, 18:58; Augustine Pena, 40th, 19:18, and Chris Villa, 77th, 21:41.

Three members of last year's team bettered their performance at the regional meet Saturday and hope to improve these times even more at the state meet. In 1987 Mark Gatica placed 18th, Jorge Bernal, 32nd, and Henry Ruiz, 75th.

Eighty-seven participants from 17 schools took part in the regional meet.

Coach Robin Bowden was very pleased with the team's performance and she thinks they have a very good

chance to bring home a win from the state meet.

The team will leave for Georgetown Friday morning at 7 a.m. from the bus lot north of the high school. Everyone is encouraged to see the team off and to wish them good luck.

The team would like to invite everyone to come to Georgetown, on the Southwestern University campus, and see them run. The cross country run will begin at 12:10 p.m.

The best wishes of the Beacon staff and the entire city of Lockney will be with the Lockney team as they attempt to bring home another state title.

Lockney landfill to be open three days a week

In a regular meeting Thursday, city councilmen further discussed the city dump ground and the new policies that will need to be put in effect for the new system of trash disposal.

The council voted unanimously to keep the landfill open only three days a week, Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday. This will become effective January 1 when Triple C Wastes takes over waste disposal in the city. The city will start taking applications immediately for anyone interested in operating the landfill, as Mr. Hubert Davis is resigning effective Jan. 1.

Since Triple C will be hauling city trash to a land fill in Crosbyton, the city will leave the local landfill open on those days for area county residents and city residents with trash that cannot go in the dumpsters. Triple C will provide residents with a list of waste that should not be put in the dumpsters. All council-

men, except Ronnie Aston, voted therefore to raise residential rates for citizens to \$8.50, effective Jan. 1. Residents are currently paying \$6.00. Commercial and industrial charges will be decided on later. Triple C will have to check with each business to see what their needs will be before rates are set up.

Councilman Ronnie Aston dissented on the vote because of his fear that the charges may be too much, and expressed his concern that the city residents may be paying to dispose of county trash. The rest of the council, after discussion, felt the need for this rate hike because of the cost to keep on maintaining the landfill for three days a week. The councilmen felt that with an uncertain future of how the new arrangements would work out that it was best to have enough money to operate the dump in compliance with health department rulings. They felt that the rates could always be reduced if it was shown in the future that

lower rates were acceptable.

The raised rates will cover the costs of the city keeping the landfill open three days a week, burying and packing the trash, rodent control, weed spraying, and any equipment necessary to keep the land fill in compliance with the health department. Mayor Dan Smith explained to the councilmen that at this time it was estimated that it will cost the city approximately \$6,000 a year to maintain the dump three days a week. The figures are subject to go up or down.

The council also voted unanimously to move the gate at the landfill to as close to the pavement as possible.

The council then discussed provisions for proposed ordinances regulating landfill waste service and burning in the city limits. Some of the provisions discussed were: doing away with the burning of trash in the city limits with the exception of medical wastes at the hospital, or under supervision by the fire

department; setting a fine of \$1,000 to anyone dumping trash at the dump-ground gate; and rules pertaining to what can and cannot go in the dumpsters. Councilmen also felt that every Lockney resident should have to pay for the new service regardless of whether they use the dumpsters or not. These opinions were turned over to the city attorney who will research the matter and draw up ordinances for the councilmen to study and vote on at the next meeting.

In other matters the council voted unanimously to purchase and install mini blinds on all the windows in the Fire Hall.

D. and J. Gin is one of the most modern gins in the area. It has a module feeder system.

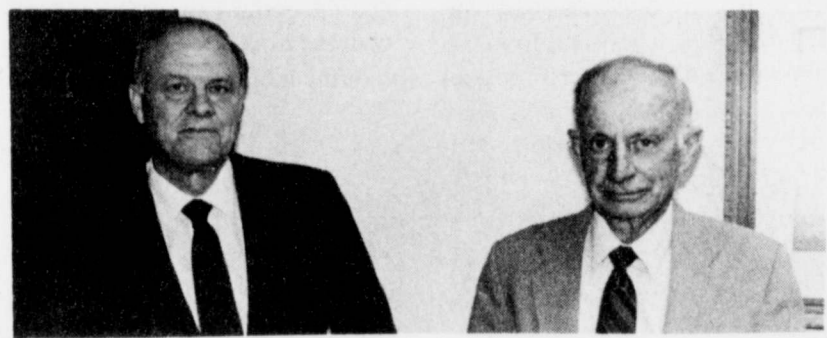
David and Jody both acknowledged that they enjoyed doing

Police continue investigation of vandalisms

"DARN GOOD CHILI"

Food Demonstration by Wynon Mayes
2 lbs. coarse ground round
1 large onion (chopped)
1 green pepper (chopped)
1-8 oz. can tomato sauce
1-8 oz. can water
1 tablespoon chili powder
1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
1 teaspoon ground cumin
2 cloves garlic (finely chopped)
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon oregano

1-16 oz. can Ranch Style beans (drained and rinsed) - oregano and beans (optional)

Heat presto pressure cooker and brown meat, onions and green pepper. Add remaining ingredients except beans, close cover securely, place pressure regulator on vent pipe. Cook 5 minutes. Let pressure drop on its own accord. Add beans and heat through.

For hotter chili increase cayenne or chili powder.

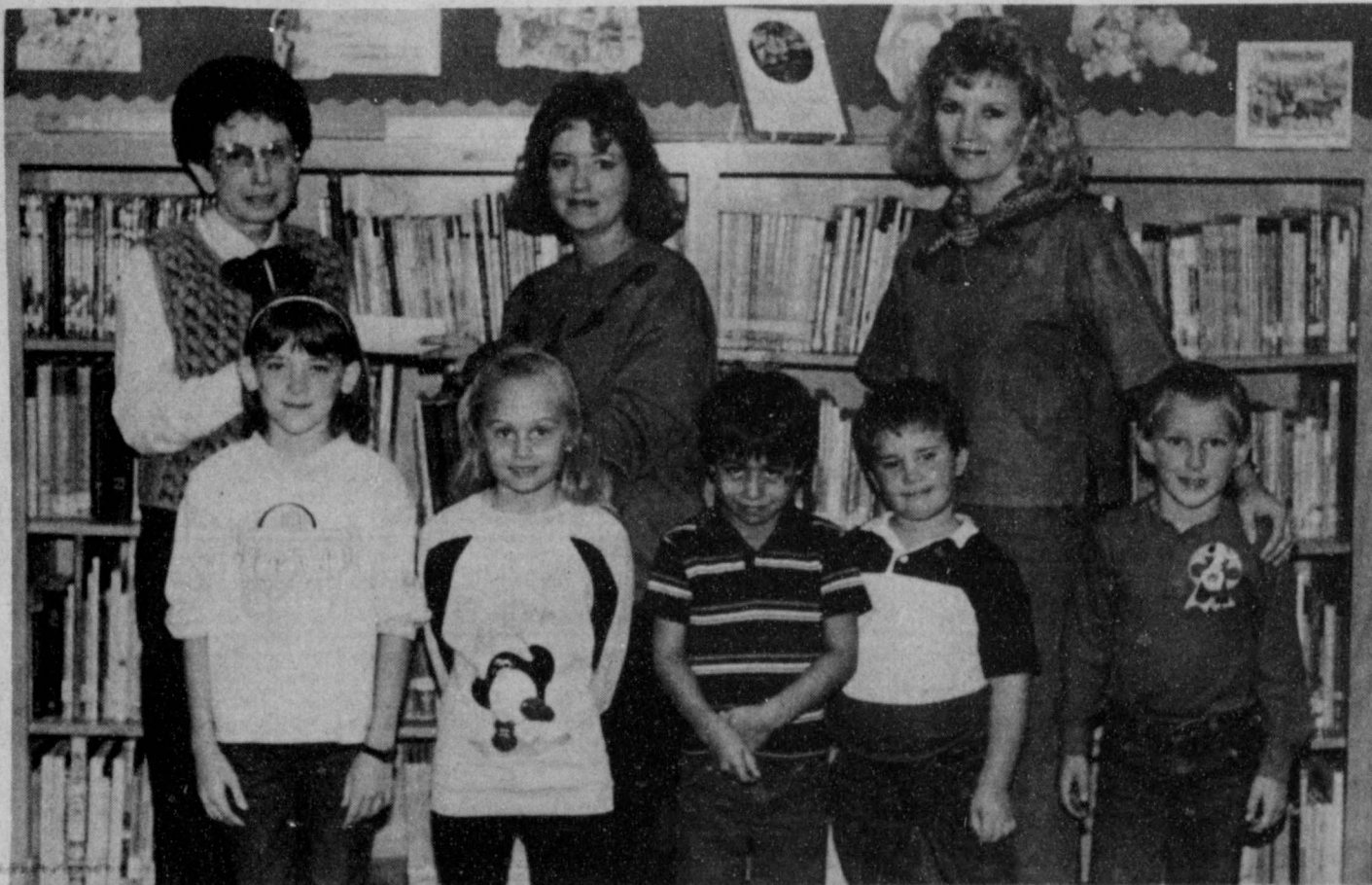
Fish fry hosted by Hartmans

Parents teach children most

Research has proved that children's chances for success in school are much better when their parents get involved in their education.

So important is parental involvement to education, that the State Board of Education made improved parental and community involvement a major goal of its Long-Range Plan for Texas Public School Education.

To what extent a parent chooses to get involved makes little difference to a child's school success as long as the parent shows an interest, according to Joe Lopez, program director at the Texas Education Agency.

"There is some evidence that shows that it doesn't matter what level of involvement a parent takes as long as he or she supports what the school is doing," Lopez says.

Much of the assistance parents can give their children at home is developmental, says Lopez, and includes such tasks as teaching a child to count by using pots and pans or helping a child learn to read by selecting books at the library and reading them aloud together.

Lopez says that even parents who may be undereducated themselves can still find many things they can do to help their children.

"These parents make a difference when they encourage their children to finish their homework, make sure they have a good breakfast and that they get

to school on time and attend regularly," Lopez says.

In addition, the staff of the Texas Education Agency has prepared a list of some simple, everyday things parents can do to help their children succeed in school. These include:

*Speak to your child about the importance of a good education. Children should learn to respect school.

*Get to know your child's teacher and the school principal.

*Help your child's teacher by reinforcing the importance of following school rules to your child. Talk about discipline, especially self-discipline.

*See that homework is done every day.

*Parents can also help their children become better readers. Become an example for your child by reading newspapers, magazines, or books from time to time.

*Take your children to the library. Schedule trips regularly to get books for your child to read.

*Talk to your child often. Make your child a partner in all your conversations and encourage and praise your child often.

*Ask teachers to help choose books that are on your child's reading level. Read to your child and encourage your child to read aloud.

*Encourage your child to write. Writing is important to reading. Have pens, pencils, crayons and paper available.

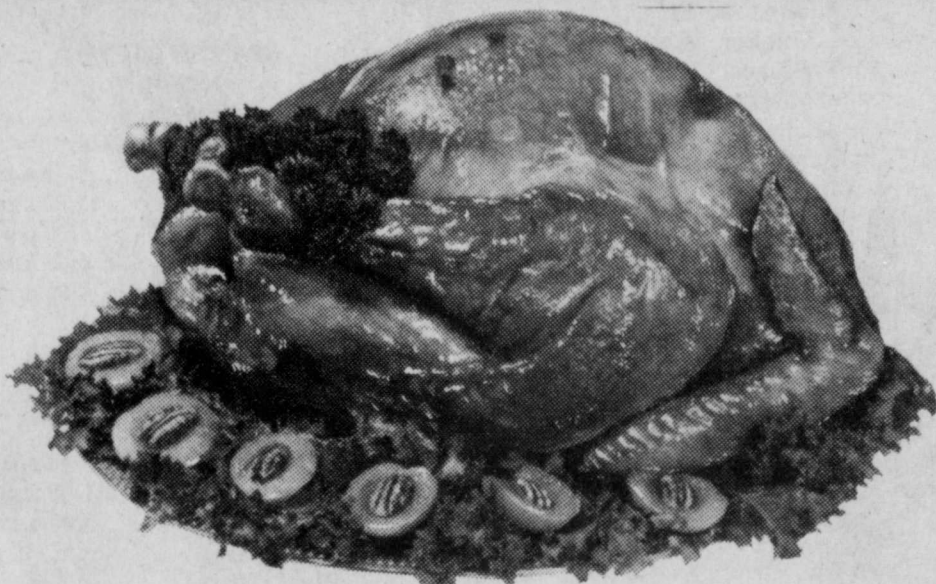
