Carbon Monoxide Is Dangerous Killer

Austin, Texas, Dec. 1.—"You can't see it—you can't smell it—you can't taste it and yet it can kill you," said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, referring to carbon monoxide. A silent enemy, it strikes its victims in closed rooms, garages and cars where wood, coal, gasoline, or natural gas is burning.

Some victims of this silent poisoner never knew their life was in danger. As others die, they may have realized that the killer was at hand, but were helpless to do anything about it. They were so benumbed that they could not get out into the fresh air; they couldn't walk or even stand up. Those who escape death, once this silent killer permeates a closed room, garage, or automobile, are rescued by someone who discovers their plight.

Carbon monoxide is given off when wood, coal, gasoline or natural gas is burning, but not all the gas is burned. Its danger is greatest in cold weather because people tend to close their houses and cars so tight that no fresh air can circulate. When this happens, carbon monoxide accumulates to a dangerous concentration. It kills because it prevents the victim from getting enough oxygen.

To help prevent such deaths all stoves should be vented, keep heated rooms ventilated, do not leave gas heaters burning while you and your family are asleep, do not entirely close all the windows in your car and do not run your car in a closed garage.

Whether your stoves, heaters and your car serve you and family usefully, safely and healthily, or whether they become enemies of death depend upon how wisely you use them. Remember, ventilate at all times.

1953 Pontiac On Display At Walkers

From an engineering standpoint, probably the most interesting technical development in the 1953 Pontiac cars is the improved steering system and suspension which enable them to handle the roughest roads and curves with ease and grace.

Describing the new development, announced as "Curve Control front suspension", Delaney pointed out that the action of the front wheels of an automobile on a turn is controlled by many practical limitations which prevent the full utilization of the principles best represented by a bicycle, where the wheels tilt or incline into the turn giving a natural banking action.

After several years of research and development, curve control front suspension is introduced on the 1953 Pontiac cars as a practical approach to the adoption of this principle of front wheel characteristics on a curve, Delaney said. The net result is a sharp reduction of wheel tilt on curves, providing improved line handling and steering characteristics. Also there is less tire noise, and tire wear longer life.

"Anyone who has ever rolled a coin or a hoop will have noticed that the coin or hoop, just like a bicycle, will turn in the direction of the tilt," Delaney said. "If it would be possible to tilt the front wheels of a car in the direction of a curve, the problem would be relatively simple. However, centrifugal force tends to make the car roll away from, rather than into, the curve. As a result, the front wheels are tilted in just the opposite direction to which they would normally be for a curve."

To overcome this counter effect, the driver exerts more steering effort than would be necessary if it did not exist. The object of the new Pontiac design is to reduce the camber change due to the roll of the car. With this accomplished, definitely improved handling results.

"In the new suspension of the 1953 Pontiacs, fundamental lengths and pivot point locations have been revised to provide a new 'curve attitude'. When taking a curve, the greater negative cambers of the geometry of the front suspension more effectively neutralize the positive roll camber of the front wheels."

"The sum total of these developments produces in the new cars better steering control on curves, a softer ride on rough roads and boulevards, less tire wear, increased front suspension durability and increased driving safety."

Mitchell County Soil Conservation News



Dr. Bruce Johnson, Lorraine physician, who is cooperating with the district on his 665 acre livestock farm in the Champion Store area, is trying to protect his cropland with cover crops, and at the same time provide some winter and spring grazing for his livestock. He has planted about 200 acres to wheat for fall and winter grazing and for land cover. He has also planted 12 acres of cropland to alfalfa. This alfalfa was sown broadcast at the rate of 20 pounds of seed per acre. He plans to use this conservation crop for soil improvement, hay, and grazing.

Are you, as a landowner or farm operator practicing conservation farming? The conservation of soil and water is not a job that you can finish at once and then forget it. It is something that you must continue to do year in and year out. It is a way of farming. The experience of thousands of farmers show that conservation farming is profitable. If you get started right, conservation farming is not difficult. If you know what your land is capable of doing, have a sound conservation plan, and start applying your conservation practices in the right way, you will find that conservation farming is just a good way of farming. It is a natural way; you work with nature, not against her. You may run into some problems while practicing conservation farming. You should be able to solve most of them if you know your land, know your plan, and have built your conservation structures right provided your land needed technical assistance from your local soil conservation district on any conservation problems that you are unable to solve yourself.

Bruce Redmann, in the Buford area, has planted 20 acres of cropland to common alfalfa. This was seeded broadcast at the rate of 20 pounds of seed per acre. This conservation crop

will help to improve the soil profile and at the same time furnish some high quality hay and grazing.

J. A. Pickens, in the Looney Church area, has started his water terracing program. A portion of his farm had been terraced for 15 or 20 years. About half of the old terraces were usable in the terrace system. The remaining old terraces will be plowed down and discarded because of excess grade in the lines causing too great a loss of water and bad gullies at the outlet ends. Mr. Pickens was fortunate in one respect in that the old lines which will be salvaged are at the top of the slope. New lines were run below the last usable old terrace. It will require about 6 miles of new lines to complete the job. This work is being done with a disc-elevator type terracing machine. This new terrace system will eliminate several severe gullies and will hold most of the rainfall on the slopes where it falls.

Lee Minor, in the Rogers school area, has sown about 40 acres of cropland to rye this fall. This good winter cover will help to hold the soil in place and furnish some timely winter and spring grazing.

The Mitchell County Soil Conservation District contains approximately 800,000 acres of land. It includes all of Mitchell County, the southwest corner of Scurry County which lies south of the Colorado River; the south west portion of Nolan County which drains into Champion and Silver Creeks; and the north portion of Sterling County which drains into Beals Creek. The district area by counties is: Mitchell 576,000 acres, Scurry 18,000 acres, Nolan 94,000 acres, and Sterling 112,000 acres. There are approximately 230,000 acres of cropland, 551,000 acres of native pasture, and 19,000 acres of roads and townships in the district.

TEXAS FARM OWNERSHIP

It is time to give credit where credit is due.

In spite of much criticism heaped on government agencies—some of it justified—some unjust, there is much to be said for the work in Texas by the Farmers Home Administration.

Few agencies can show such physical proof of their value as the FHA. The evidence is there for all to see—on every side of our Texas roads. The countryside is dotted with a greater number of sturdy, well-kept farm houses than ever before. The tended fields and neat houses reflect the pride a man takes on land and goods which are his own.

Through loans which were unavailable from any other source, the FHA became the liberator of many thousands of farmers. It removed the albatross of farm tenancy from around the farmer's neck and helped make him independent.

The record of this agency is excellent. Before it was established, only one farm in 10 was served with electricity in Texas. Today, only one farm in 10 is with

out this service.

A couple of decades ago, only 58 percent of the farms were owner operated. Today, 75 percent are in this class. Yes, this program's cost amounted to very little in the over all tax figure. Only two cents out of each tax dollar is spent on farm programs and this includes all the other grants for soil conservation and similar projects.

The evils of farm tenancy are well known to most land owners. Absentee land ownership coupled with disinterested tenants have put scars on the face of this earth which may never be healed in our lifetime—if ever. The economy of the farm tenant and the living standards of Tobacco Road are near kinfolk. The condition of farm tenancy and the practice of mining the soil are first cousins.

I realize that many tenant farmers are good farmers. But they are 100 times better farmers when they are working for themselves on their own land. The FHA has been a major factor in helping them achieve this goal.

Veterans' News

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q I hold a National Service Life Insurance policy, and I am also drawing monthly disability compensation payments from the VA. Would it be possible for VA to deduct the monthly insurance premiums from my compensation checks, so I wouldn't have to bother with the payments myself?

A Yes. You may authorize VA to deduct premium payments from your monthly compensation, provided your compensation is large enough for this purpose. VA Form 9-887, available at any VA office, should be used in authorizing the deduction. Q Assume that a veteran meets all the requirements for Korean GI Bill training. May he enroll under this Act even though he has gone back on active duty and is now in uniform?

A No. Veterans on active duty are not eligible for Korean GI Bill training, even though they meet all the law's basic requirements.

Q A veteran in my family is eligible for extra pension payments because he is so helpless that he needs the constant aid and attention of another. Is he supposed to hire an outsider to attend him, or would it be all right for a member of his immediate family to help him?

A A veteran entitled to the increased payments need not go outside his family to hire an attendant. Any member of his family may help him. He still would be entitled to the extra pay, as long as he is otherwise eligible. Q I've just been discharged from service, and I plan to apply for Korean term insurance some time within 120 days of my discharge. Is an application sufficient, or must I also pay a monthly premium?

A An application alone would not be sufficient. You also must pay the required first premium before the 120-day deadline.
