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Jessie Mae Sheppard Seriously Injured By Gunshot Wound

Jessie Mae Sheppard, 17, is in a critical condition at Sealy Hospital in Santa Anna and her father Amos I. Sheppard, 44, Big Valley farmer, is in the Mills county jail awaiting trial on a charge of lunacy as a result of a shooting in the Sheppard home early Thursday morning.

Sheriff J. H. Harris, Deputy Fred Reynolds and Dr. J. M. Campbell were called to the Oglesby place, eight miles from Goldthwaite at 7 a. m. They found Jessie Mae had been shot in the left hip-joint with a 12-gauge shotgun from a distance of seven or eight feet. The gun was found twisted and broken in the grass near the house.

Interviewed at the jail, Sheppard said that his daughter and her 15-year-old brother, Ira, were quarreling, and he was attempting to stop them when he had what he calls "an idiotic spell" and is unable to say what happened afterwards.

According to L. B. Porter, Sheppard was rejected at the Brownwood CCC Veterans camp on Oct. 13 because of a physical disability which he claims he received while a soldier in the World War. He has been unable to establish that the disability was service connected and has been brooding over his inability to qualify for a pension.

The charge of lunacy was filed by J. W. Sheppard, father of the defendant, Thursday afternoon upon his return from Santa Anna. Judge R. J. Gerald has set the hearing for Friday morning if Mrs. Sheppard can leave her daughter to testify. If the court adjudges Sheppard insane, Sheriff Harris states that application will be made to commit him to the veteran's hospital at Waco.

Jessie Mae has for some time been the Eagle's capable correspondent, from Bull's Creek, and her letter this week appears on page 3. She is a bright, attractive girl, and The Eagle joins her many friends in wishing her a speedy recovery.

Her grandfather stated that she stood the trip to Santa Anna well and was resting when he left.

At 4:20 Thursday afternoon Dr. Campbell talked to Dr. Sealy at Santa Anna who said that they were preparing to give Miss Sheppard a blood transfusion then. The X-ray showed that several No. 4 shot had gone all the way through her body and were lodged in the right hip.

Work Progresses on Colorado Bridge

The long, dry spell has hurt the county in many ways, but it has proved a blessing to workers on the Colorado river bridge who have been able to work uninterrupted for nearly three months.

Concrete is being poured steadily and the relief bridges on each side of the river are practically complete. One of the big concrete piers is due to be finished within a few days. No piers will have to be built in the bed of the river.

War on Bats

Rain Falls Thursday

Rain amounting to .4 inch on Fairman Co.'s gauge started falling at 3 a. m. Thursday. Somewhat more than this is reported to have fallen around Star and in Big Valley.

A dispatch to The Eagle from the Rural Electrification Administration at Washington states that it has just allotted \$286,000 to the Hamilton County Electric Co-operative Association for the purpose of constructing about 350 miles of electric distribution line to serve 867 customers in Coryell, Mills, Hamilton Comanche and Lampasas counties. Smaller allotments were made to Navarro, Bailey and Erath counties, and the total for 30 projects in 15 states is \$4,942,000. This brings the total REA allotments since it was established in 1935 to \$153,283,910.

Connection for Mills county with the main distribution line will be made at Star from Evans. W. J. Marwitz, Priddy, Director of the Hamilton Cooperative Electric Association advises that home owners along the lines already designated, who have not made application for membership should do so at once. Blanks are available at the County Agent's office.

An effort will be made at once to extend the Star-Goldthwaite line to Big Valley, and another line from Goldthwaite to Democrat and still another to Pleasant Grove.

All interested are cautioned to file applications at once before work begins on the lines.

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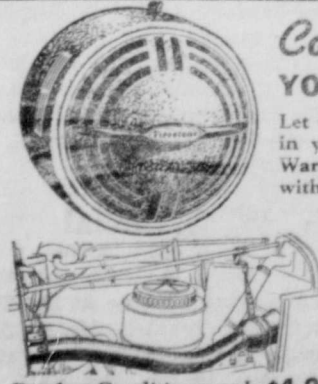

**Dr. John C. Hardy Died Sunday, Oct. 30**

With the death of Dr. Hardy goes a phrase which he immortalized on Mary Hardin-Baylor campus—"Happy? Glad you're living?" His philosophy was, "We are here to serve—not to be served."

Funeral services for Dr. Hardy, were conducted at 2:00 o'clock Monday afternoon in Alma Reeves Chapel at the college.

Services for Dr. Hardy were in charge of the Rev. A. C. Miller, pastor of the First Baptist Church, and Dr. E. G. Townsend, long-time friend and associate of Dr. Hardy. They were assisted by Dr. W. H. McKenzie, pastor of the University Baptist Church, Austin, and a member of the Board of Trustees; and Dr. George W. Truett, president of the Baptist World Alliance. Dr. Gordon G. Singleton, who succeeded Dr. Hardy as president of Mary Hardin-Baylor in 1937, presided.

NEW PUBLISHERS IN BROWNWOOD

News of the change of ownership of Brownwood's newspapers evokes a feeling of surprise and regret from all who have been acquainted, either personally or through their columns, with Messrs. Mayes and White.

With the still more intimate knowledge gained as a former competitor of The Brownwood Bulletin, it is a pleasure to say that their paper has been clean both editorially and in its business management. It has been both a credit and an asset to Brownwood and Brown county and the surrounding counties as well.

It is our impression that the people of Brownwood generally have failed to recognize the measure of public spirited service performed by their newspapers, but this is a very general fault of human nature. Business men will cheerfully donate to a variety of public organizations, will subsidize a chamber of commerce, will contribute to the expense of securing conventions and other assemblies. They will expect the newspaper not only to support these enterprises day in and day out in its columns, but will ask that it pay a prorata share of the expenses incurred, and on top of that will grudgingly if at all patronize that paper. Men who are quick to criticize the paper for omitting mention of some event in which they are personally interested, intentionally omit to advertise in it their own business in which they should be still more interested.

In the long run it is these short-sighted businesses and the town itself that suffers most from such one-sidedness. In Brownwood, for example, it is plain to observe that those business institutions which are most liberal and intelligent in their use of newspaper advertising are those which are forging ahead. And this will continue to be true no matter who owns and operates the newspapers there.

The EAGLE does not know the plans of H. F. Mayes who has been identified with the ownership and management of The Bulletin since its beginning. With the sale of this valuable property he is in position to retire to a life of ease, but we predict that he will be unwilling to do so. We trust that Brownwood will not lose the benefit of his sound counsel and public spiritedness.

Jim White we are glad to welcome into the ranks of weekly newspaper publishers, the real aristocrats of the newspaper profession. As owner and publisher of the Brownwood Banner, we anticipate that he will produce a weekly newspaper in which Brown county will take pride and which will be a credit to Texas newspaperdom. We will miss his good-natured banter in the daily column, "Around the Supper Table," which has been a feature of the Bulletin for so long, but will await its counterpart in the Banner with interest.

The EAGLE extends a cordial welcome to Mr. and Mrs. J. S. McBeath of Dallas, the new owners of The Brownwood Bulletin. Having shown such good judgment in selecting a paper and section of Texas, we confidently expect them to maintain the high standards which have characterized the paper previously.

WHY NOT STREAMLINE IT?

Another effort to modernize the Constitution of Texas piecemeal is to be seen in the lone constitutional amendment that is to be voted upon at the general election in November. The momentous issue this time is to eliminate the famous duelling clause from the oath of office.

The reason given for its elimination is that nobody fights duels any more so there is no need of the office holder swearing to that effect.

We regret to see this clause eliminated. It harks back to a day when a man's honor was a very real and vital possession, worthy of defending with his life if need be. It dates back to the days when a gentleman's womenfolk were sacred. It even recalls the time when great men ran for office in Texas not on issues of the benefits they would give one class of people by taxing other classes, but on platforms that dealt with vital issues worthy of enlightening debate. Is it any harm to recall to this generation that officeholders once thought of the state and not primarily of their own advancement?

Another clause in the present oath of office declares that the officer has not given or offered any valuable consideration to anyone for supporting his candidacy. Perhaps this clause will be the next to go since in spirit it is already out of date. Of course it is merely a remarkable coincidence that the chief supporters of elected state officers are usually appointed to juicy jobs on the state pay roll. Naturally their appointments come as a complete surprise, but have you ever heard of one being refused?

While we are at this business of modernizing the oath of office, why not follow the examples of popular orchestra leaders and really swing it? Say something like this for a starter: "I solemnly swear that I will true and faithfully perform the duties of this office so far as they do not interfere with my own advancement or desires. I have promised no valuable consideration to any of my supporters except those who really deserve it. I have fought no duel except with words, and I didn't mean half of them. I promise to conduct myself and the affairs of this office so as to insure my re-election or my advancement to a better job. So help me."

Isn't that up-to-date enough for the modern politician?

WHO BUT HOOVER?

"The Republicans keep looking back to Hoover and forward to—they don't quite know what. They hold a 'grass roots conference' and eat boiled corn and barbecued beef. "Herbert Hoover may rave and rant but he will never convince the people that he or his party is a better friend of America than Roosevelt. He and the Old Guard had their chance over a long period of years. Invariably they muffed the opportunity."—Augusta Herald. (Ind. Dem.)

IT'S WORRY that chise's the lines in a man's face," says Sir Henri Deterding. "And there is, in most cases, only one cause for worry: We do not worry so much about the difficult problems we have; the thing that makes us worry is the feeling that we have not done all that we should have done to meet a situation. Most real heart-eating worry comes from self-reproach. I try to avoid that.

"If, during the day, I look squarely at every problem and do the very best that is in me to meet it, why, at night when I go to bed I can feel friendly with myself and sleep soundly.

"If there is in my mind a feeling that I neglected something or did not meet some issue squarely or that I tried to escape it or did not give the job my very best, I feel very unfriendly with myself and I am worried and my sleep is slow to come. And so I try to keep friends with myself."—The Silver Lining.

Flu Warning

DENTON, Texas, Nov.—Precipitated by the first spell of cold, wet weather that strikes Texas this fall, the annual spell of "flu" is due in this section of the country within the next ten days. Dr. Jay Waddell, instructor in physical education and member of the college hospital medical staff, warned students at the North Texas State Teachers College this week.

Not only will the nation get its usual spell of "flu" this winter, but it may be scheduled for an epidemic of influenza which will rival the one that killed enlisted men like flies during the World War, Dr. Waddell said.

"Influenza epidemics," he explained, "seem to come in pretty definite cycles about 20 years apart. It is just 20 years since the World War epidemic and this winter or next should see the recurrence of another serious epidemic.

Flu strikes about this time of year because the throat and nose membranes of sufferers have been sensitized by the large quantities of pollen in the air. Dr. Waddell declared. An individual in such a condition gets chilled, overdoes or overindulges, catches cold, and is a first-rate influenza prospect.

Physicians know very little about the cure for influenza, even though scientists have been working on the problem ever since the World War epidemic. The Teachers College medical staff member stated. About all your doctor can do for you is to give precautionary measures and warnings: Avoid drafts, stay away from crowds, don't overindulge.

Experiments have indicated, however, that small quantities of chlorine gas are beneficial.

If given reasonable time, would stop deficit financing, would begin to liquidate the public debt, as it did after the World War, would decentralize relief, would re-establish confidence, would put a stop to government dictation to agriculture and business, would take the government out of competition with business." In other words, they'd get us back in exactly the same shape we were in the day Hoover went out of office."—Lexington Herald. (Dem.)

"When I first met this rising tide of men and women, I was a bundle of self-conceit and inferiority," she says. "I was an undiscovered genius! Ever since I was six years old, I pinned my hopes of 'being something' on my being a painter.

"It was my one excuse for being. What I considered my great talent excused my other faults of untidiness, self-centeredness and temper. All these traits I admitted.

"There were others I wasn't quite as quick to admit as faults—intolerance of certain schools of art, dislike of numbers of people and a deep fear of life and of failure.

"These things multiplied and destroyed my enjoyment of relationship with people, my own family included, whom I thought never understood me. As a result I was thrown deeper and deeper into the narrow and misleading road called 'Art for Art's Sake.'

"I had wanted a larger goal than self-aggrandisement, but I had found no other force vital enough to propel me forward with the same speed that the world was moving around me.

"I remember my teacher in art school asking me if there was anything I cared about more than art. I said 'no' then, even though I felt there had to be something that was bigger than the method of expression itself.

"If wasn't until a year later that I found that the disillusionment that had overcome me was because the God to whom I had given my hopes, energies, mind and love was not big enough to satisfy the hunger within.

"Now I know that a personality is only developed to the fullest when poured into God's creative plan. I feel that what is done in every line of endeavor can only be great when the man creating it is so lost in the development of the thing created that he is unconscious of his medium. In this realization art can find its place of greatest value and beauty in the progress of the world."

Does Belief in God Make A Difference

We need not worry about the religion of our children and our young people, if we do not neglect our own. They cannot help being unkindled, if we ourselves radiate in our lives the joyful sense of adventure and the courageous spirit of service to which God impels those who believe in Him.

"Something has been happening to our young people and young adults. They have been fed up on the frivolities of the world and its program. A note of moral earnestness is evident everywhere.
