

13 Bodies Taken From Mine Wrecked By Blast Georgia Dam Collapses As Flood Menace Heightens

Creek Sent From Banks as Lowland Residents Escape

Area Below Dam Sparsely Settled and No Lives Are Known Lost; Warning Is Given of Break.

ONE DEATH REPORTED FROM OTHER SECTION

Millidgeville and Macon Face Acute Situations With No Trains Running To Outside World.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Aug. 15.—G. A. Clayton, Chief of Police at Quitman, Ga., told the Associated Press here in a long distance telephone message tonight that the bridge dam, 17 miles north of that city, broke in three places about 2 o'clock this morning, sending Georgia creek out of its banks all the way down its course to the Withlacoochee river. Residents living in the sparsely settled lowlands in the flood path had been warned in ample time to move to higher ground, Clayton said, and no loss of life was expected.

Flood Conditions In Georgia Are Critical

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 15.—(P)—Serious flood conditions were widespread over Georgia tonight as the tropical storm which hit the state last night blew itself out in a torrent of rain over the upper watersheds of Georgia and Alabama. Only one death was reported but estimates gave enormous damage to crops, highways and were communications with several towns virtually isolated and inhabitants of lowlands along the rivers warned of rising waters. Most acute situations appeared to be at Millidgeville and Macon, Ga., where flood waters menaced residential sections. Water works out of commission, people of Millidgeville were restricted to use of a small supply of drinking water in a half filled standpipe. Macon had no trains to Savannah, Athens or Augusta and a main line

Risken, vice-president and member of the board, in supporting Governor Smith for the presidency.

Hassell, Cramer Plan Hop Today On Sweden Jaunt

Ontario Is First Goal On Proposed Atlantic Jump With Ideal Weather On Route Reported.

(By Associated Press) ROCKFORD, Ill., Aug. 15.—Bert Hassell and Parker Cramer, pilot and navigator of the monoplane "Gremlin Rockford," will hop off at 6 a. m. Thursday on the first leg of their proposed flight to Sweden, it was announced tonight. They plan to arrive at Gothenburg, Oct. eight hours after their take off. Hassell intends to spend Friday night there, refuel and hop again Saturday morning for Mt. Erasin, Greenland, 1,800 miles beyond. His first attempt two weeks ago ended in forced landing. The plane was repaired, and was ready to take off this morning, but adverse weather report forced postponement. "This time," said Hassell, "we're going to make it."

Weather conditions were pronounced ideal.

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—(P)—Superior court today set August 24 as date for the entering of a plea by David Shanks, the negro bootblack, who police said confessed slaying Miss Jennie M. Constance, of Peoria, Northwestern University graduate student, the night of August 7. Shanks was arraigned on a charge of first degree murder but was granted a continuance.

RATES ON COTTON

Brownsville Is New Point On Motor Truck Rate

AUSTIN, Aug. 15.—(P)—Brownsville was added today by order of the State railroad commission to the list of South Texas points from which motor truck rates on cotton shipped to Corpus Christi will be calculated under the new rate schedule by railroads to meet motor truck competition. The rate from Brownsville on round bale cotton will be \$1.50 a bale, including 7-1/2 cents a bale compress allowance.

AUSTIN, Aug. 15.—(P)—An increase of about 20,000 in the number of public school children of Texas will be estimated by the state department of education to the board of education meeting Thursday to make the per capita appropriation for the school year beginning in September.

Control of Tech By Utilities Is Charged In Meet

Investigation Sought By Public Ownership League When Amarillo Man Make Accusation.

PROBE IS WELCOMED COLLEGE HEAD SAYS

Horn Explains Situation As Result of Contract With Power Firm Here To Supply Electricity.

DALLAS, Aug. 15.—With the avowed purpose of obtaining an investigation of the charge that "corporation utilities" control Texas Technological college at Lubbock, the Texas Public Ownership league today concluded its two-day convention here. The league also purposes to foster an inquiry by the federal trade commission into reported activities of a utility company in trying to obtain an option on a municipal light plant in Sanger, Texas. Among officers elected was E. P. Scarborough, Coleman, mayor, first vice-president. The charge concerning Texas Tech was made by C. M. Thompson, Amarillo engineer.

Horn Says Probe Will Be Welcomed

Commenting on charges made by an Amarillo engineer at a session Wednesday of the Texas Public Ownership league that "corporation utilities" control Texas Technological college here, Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of the college said last night that "Texas Tech will welcome any investigation of the charges made by any competent authority."

Details of the charge and definite plan of procedure in connection with the charge were not available here last night but it was explained by Dr. Horn that the accusation probably grew out of a contract between the college and Texas Utilities company whereby the light and power firm supplies electricity for the college plant. This contract, Dr. Horn said, was signed by college authorities after bids were received in regular order from the Texas Utilities and the City of Lubbock, and was entered into on a purely business basis, with full approval of the entire board of directors. Various general comment has been made in the Texas press recently regarding the nature of contracts held by various state and private institutions, with power companies, resulting from a meeting several months ago of the National Electric Light association in New Orleans when representatives from approximately 40 higher educational institutions in Texas appeared before the gathering. The Tech charge, however, is the first specific accusation made on any institution.

Dr. Horn was the representative from Texas Tech at the meeting, attending at the request of the board of regents, and explained the Tech situation, particularly as regards teaching of engineering in the college. Other than a blanket denial through his statement that any investigation will be welcomed, Dr. Horn would not comment further on the situation.

WANT MORE MONEY

State Health Department Asks Additional Funds

Old Settlers Of Plains Meet In Annual Reunion

Record Breaking Crowd Is In Attendance At Big Jubilee Near Crosbyton As Pioneers Mingle.

BASKET DINNER ONE OF DAY'S FEATURES

Thursday Is Free Barbecue Day With 9000 Pounds Of Meat Being Fixed For Second Day Crowd.

CROSBYTON, Aug. 15.—The West Texas Old Settlers association started off with a record-breaking attendance for the first day, there being more old settlers on the ground than at any previous meeting. The crowd is estimated to reach seven thousand people before the day is passed. The program committee is planning to feed ten thousand people a free barbecue tomorrow. The first day was basket dinner today and many old timers spread their dinner with friends, when they had not seen for years. Music for the reunion is being furnished by the Floyd band under the direction of band master A. L. Ludgren of Floyd.

Bob Smith, president of the association and the oldest white native of Crosby county, has charge of the program and is being assisted by Judge Fink L. Parrish of Lubbock. Judge Parrish was the first president of the West Texas Old Settlers association. Many of the old timers were on the ground last evening and went through again the experience of "camping out" as the custom is in the olden days. They are here to live over again the days when the cow was king of the South Plains.

Jack Armstrong, of Floyd, is putting on one of the best rodeos that has ever been put on in this section of the country in order that the olden days may be more forcibly brought home to the old timers.

Free Barbecue Thursday. Thursday and the last day will be free barbecue day for everyone present. The chuck wagon crew is barbecuing 9000 pounds of beef, pork, mutton and chicken for the old timers and their friends. This reunion is being held on the most historical spot in all West Texas. It is held on the old McKenzie trail which led from old Fort McKensie to Palo Duro canyon and the site of one of their camps along that old trail.

An American flag is hoisted over the remains of the old dug out in a small hill where the soldiers and civilians would take refuge in time of attack from the Indians. Near this spot Uncle Hank Smith built his home in 1877, the first to be built in Crosby county and son Bob who lives in the old rock house has deeded twenty-three acres of this old spot to the state of Texas and it has been christened the Uncle Hank Smith Memorial park in memory of the early family who settled it.

RETURNS TO PRISON

Man Held In California To Waive Extradition

AUSTIN, Aug. 15.—(P)—A special dispatch from Fresno, Calif., to the Austin American says that Alvin Karpis, alias Allen, 41, identified at the Madara county jail, will waive extradition and return to Texas to re-enter the state prison, where he was serving a 99 year sentence for the killing of State Representative Charles Fields of Giddings in 1924. Tomorrow, a former deputy marshal at Georgetown, Texas, escaped from a prison farm in January, 1927. He was prosecuted by Governor Dan Moody, then district attorney at Georgetown.

TEXAS WOMEN START ANTI-SMITH DRIVE

FORT WORTH, Aug. 15.—(P)—Adopting as their slogan, "It is better to be right than regular," 200 Fort Worth and Tarrant county women met Wednesday and completed organization of the Tarrant county women's democratic Hoover-for-president club. B. D. Martin, Wichita Falls, vice-chairman of the State anti-Smith forces, predicted in a speech before the women's organization that Hoover would roll up a majority of 100,000 votes in Texas.

"The anti-Smith fight in Texas has grown into a crusade," Martin declared. "The women of Texas and the South who are aware of the impending danger will not vote against the security of their homes and firesides and for the return of the open saloon."

One Killed When Plane Falls Into Gulf of Mexico

Another Injured But Three Passengers Unhurt When Havana To Key West Ship Is Forced Down.

(By Associated Press) ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Aug. 15.—One man was killed and another injured, when the tri-motored plane of the Pan-American Airways Inc. enroute from Havana to Key West was forced down in the Gulf of Mexico at 3 o'clock tonight according to a wireless from the steamer Ligonier to the coast guard station here. The Ligonier reported to the coast guard that three other passengers of the plane were unhurt. The name of the dead man was given as Egerton. That of the injured passenger was not given. The ship reported that she was putting about to Tampa bar, off St. Petersburg with the rescued party, where a launch would pick them up.

HOG PRICE IS UP

25 Cents Advance Is Made In Chicago Trading

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—(P)—Hog prices advanced 25 cents on the Chicago market today to a top of \$12.50. The highest level since Nov. 1926. Only 10,000 hogs were supplied to the market during the day, while 5,000 were held over from the day before. Top prices applied mainly to light and medium weight butchers, while mixed and heavy packing sows were not in such heavy demand. J. Edward Wynne, Chicago authority, says the advance is owing to continued light receipts.

CURTIS CEREMONY

Plans Near Completion As Notification Is Near

TOPEKA, Aug. 15.—(P)—Details of the notification ceremony here Saturday for Sen. Charles Curtis moved toward completion tonight as the republican vice-presidential nominee's home town prepared to witness formal inauguration of his campaign. One hour has been allotted for the radio broadcast, opening at 5 p. m. Central Standard Time. Twenty-six broadcasting stations will be included in the hookup. While he can read his speech in 25 minutes, with no allowance for interruptions, Curtis is expected to take at least one-half of the allotted time and Sen. Simon D. Fess, of Ohio, most of the remainder for his speech of notification.

MURDER CLUE HELD

Woman Is Feared Victim Of Intended Oil Fire

NACOGDOCHES, Aug. 15.—(P)—A bit of elastic, saturated with kerosene, was the clue which Nacogoches county officers today thought might establish the theory that Miss Bertie Mae Spencer, 26, burned near Nacogoches, August 7, was murdered. The elastic, found near Miss Spencer's home, and thought to have been a part of her garter, indicated kerosene had been poured on her clothing before the flames enveloped her, officers said. They added, however, that they had as many circumstances supporting suicide as supporting murder, but that they would make a thorough investigation.

ASK DEATH STAY

Many Pleas Made On Behalf Of Silver, Condemned

AUSTIN, Aug. 15.—(P)—Governor Moody's office received numerous letters asking that J. R. Silver be saved from the electric chair. Silver is scheduled to die September 3 for alleged participation in robbery of a Fort Worth theatre in which the cashier, Roscoe Wilson, was killed. A companion of Silver, serving a life penitentiary term recently shouldered the blame for the killing of Wilson.

Senators Asked To Line Up Against Demo Nominee

When Miss Jenkins took the bird store back in 1913 in lieu of payment of a loan, her lawyer advised sale.

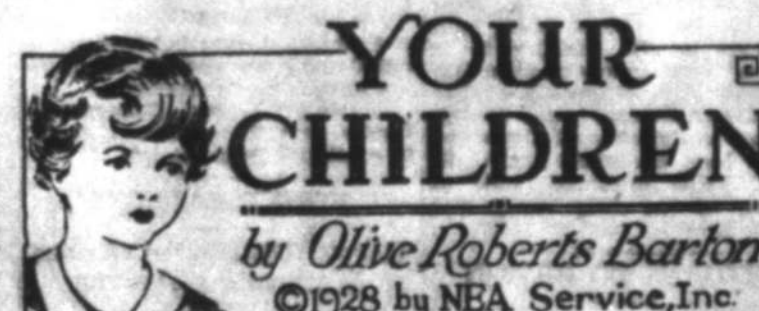

BREAKFAST — Blackberries, cereal, cream, fried dried beef, rye meal muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Minced lamb on lettuce, feed cocoa.

DINNER — Vegetable plate dinner, molded egg salad, watermelon sherbet, nutmeg food cake, milk, coffee.

Both hot tea and coffee are at their best when served hot over cracked ice and cured at once. Of course both the beverages must be made double strength since the melting of the ice dilutes the infusion.

Watermelon Sherbet

Four cups chopped watermelon, 1 cup sugar, whites 2 eggs. Sprinkle sugar through melon while chopping. If a wooden chopping bowl is not at hand cut in very small pieces with a sharp knife. Use juice and pulp. Turn into freezer, and pack in six parts of ice to one part salt. Let stand until frozen to a "rough," stirring frequently to equally distribute liquid and pulp. Stir in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry and let stand two hours longer. Serve in chilled glasses. This is an unusually pretty ice and deliciously refreshing to the taste.

BRIDGE MADE EASY

by W. W. Wentworth

UNBLOCKING—3

The principle of unblocking also applies to the declarer's opponents. Its use by them is not quite so obvious however, because they do not see each other's hand; whereas the declarer does see his partner's hand, which is the dummy.

Examine the following illustration: in which the declaration is no trump:

East holds the spade King. West leads the spade Queen. In all probability, west holds teaching honors for he would otherwise lead the fourth from the top of his longest and strongest suit. The spade Ace is almost certain to be either in the dummy or in the declarer's hand. East should play the spade King regardless of what card is played from the dummy. Otherwise the spade suit is blocked and east cannot return the lead thereafter.

Added illustrations with the declaration no trump follow:

East should play the heart Ace. Otherwise he will block partner's suit. The opening lead of an Ace at no trump calls for partner's highest card. It indicates that east holds other honors.

West leads the diamond King, then the diamond Ace, next the diamond Queen.

East holds the Jack 9 7 3 of diamonds.

The first lead of the diamond King indicates that west also holds the diamond Ace. East should play the diamond 7, an encouraging card. The second lead of the diamond Ace indicates that west holds additional cards in the diamond suit. East should play the diamond 9. On the third lead of the diamond Queen, east should play the diamond Jack. Otherwise he will block the suit.

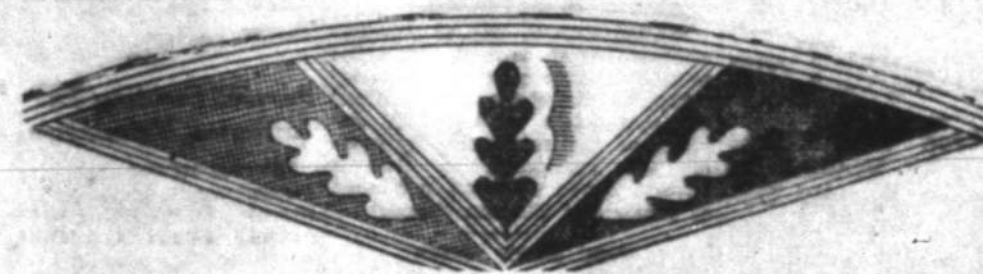

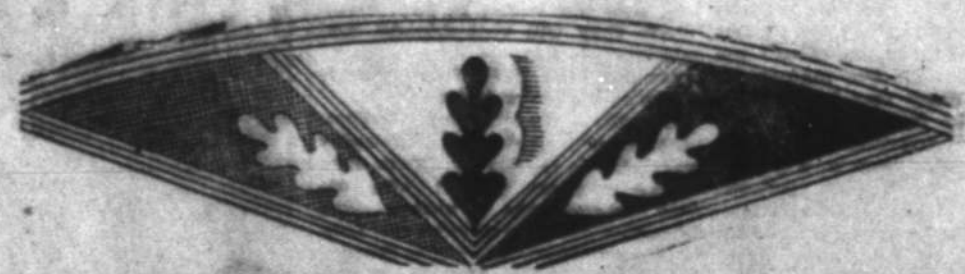

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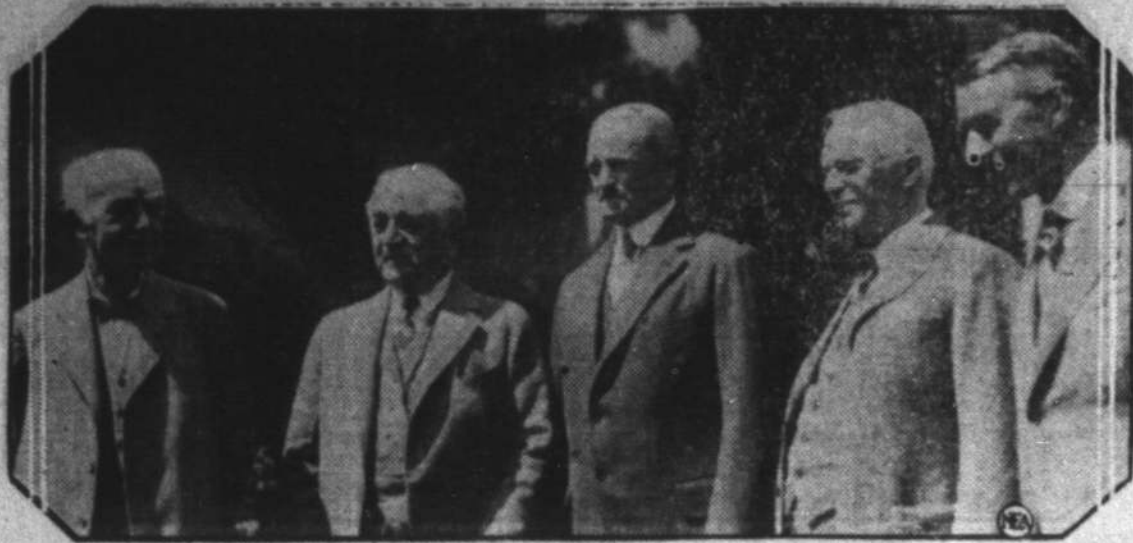

Bond Election By City And County Is Proposed Here

Construction of Subways
And Surfacing Highways
Would Be Provided For
In October Election.

The possibility of a joint city-county bond issue to care for construction of two subways under the Santa Fe tracks on Broadway and Avenue H, and for surfacing highways in the county, loomed here Wednesday with the announcement from the city officials that the county court is being asked to co-operate in calling simultaneous elections for the issues with the city.

The announcement also carried word of delay in the calling of a city bond election of \$126,000 for the city, part in construction of the subways, pending action by county officials on the request. This election had been called for September 22, and the county court had been asked to call a vote on \$104,000 in bonds to include highway surfacing bonds in connection. The election, under suggestion of city officials would be held some time in October.

The order for the bond election grew out of a petition circulated by W. A. Myrick, Jr., which was signed by more than fifty local tax payers.

Prospects Bright In Scurry County For Bumper Crop

Cotton Three Weeks Late
But Heavily Fruited As
Feed Grows Rapidly Due
To Recent Rains.

SNYDER, Aug. 15.—According to Weather Observer William Wilford, Scurry county has enjoyed approximately eight inches of rain since the middle of July and the trade territory adjacent to Snyder has the most prosperous outlook in years.

County Agent C. C. Willis says cotton is about three weeks late and in very few instances high winds blew it out of the ground. Worms and bugs are not molesting the crop as yet, but a few fleas have been found. Cotton is growing rapidly and bolls filling nicely according to every estimate. Scurry stands to raise between 25,000 and 40,000 bales of cotton this year.

Feed crops got a slow start on account of the drought but with the liberal rains and hot sunshines have grown rapidly. According to Hugh Taylor, local merchant, who made a complete survey of the county last week, the county's feed crop has never looked better in the more than twenty-five years he has lived here. Mr. Taylor placed especial emphasis on the manner in which fine Jersey cow herds have been added to farms in this section this year, together with more hogs and chickens than in any previous year. Mr. Taylor believes that a greater part of this propaganda has been added through the untiring efforts of the county agent and home demonstration agents, with cooperative efforts of the 4-H club boys. Home economics and farm work that are already established in many county rural schools with ten additional rural schools taking on the work with the start of the fall term.

The peanut crop will not be as heavy this year as last, owing to the heavy rains coming, farmers planted grain sorghums as the time was too short for peanuts to mature.

Livestock men are jubilant as the grass on the range could hardly be better. Bob Gray who owns large ranches in Scurry and Borden counties says that beef cattle are in fine condition and with an average winter very little feeding will have to be done.

Hogs are in good condition and will be ready for the fall market in the very best of shape. Emmett Trevey of the Sharron community who is trying a milk diet on runt pigs, believes it to be very profitable. Mr. Trevey said: "I sell the cream and by feeding skimmed milk to my pigs, I not only save the milk but it pays my wife and I a good profit."

Plans are rapidly formulating for the annual Scurry county fair and this year night meetings are to be held with much entertainment, in-

Smith Continues His Conferences Over Dry Plank

Daniels Predicts South To
Remain Democratic With
Much Depending On
Smith Acceptance Speech

(By Associated Press)

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 15.—Continuing conferences with prominent party dry leaders Governor Smith late today received Josephus Daniels, North Carolina publisher, who predicted the South would remain solidly in the Democratic column in November.

Daniels, who supported the Glass dry plant at Houston was the second of the candidate's callers in two days railing from Southern dry ranks. Senator Glass, Virginia, conferring with him yesterday.

Daniels, navy secretary under Wilson, submitted to press questioning just before entering conference with Smith.

Unrest Over Smith.
In a discussion, Daniels declared while there was unrest in the South over Smith's prohibition views, and as much depended upon what he would say on the subject in his acceptance speech next Wednesday night, he believed the people would take him at his word when he said he would enforce faithfully the law.

"I think Smith will enforce the law," he said. He added that he did not believe Smith had repudiated the party's platform by his message to the Houston convention declaring for liberalization of the enforcement laws, and saw little comfort in references to law enforcement in Hoover's acceptance speech for Southerners opposed to Smith on wet grounds.

Reaction to the Republican nominee's speech in North Carolina was unfavorable, he said, because Hoover "has given no assurance of promised better things except to say he would not nullify the Eighteenth amendment."

He thought the Democratic pledges more specific.

Big Injustice Done.
Denying reports opposition to Smith in North Carolina was based on his religious affiliations, Daniels said these were "doing a great injustice to the people there."

Daniels supporting Smith, predicted if Smith's acceptance speech "is not any moister" than his previous declarations on prohibition he would carry North Carolina by a hundred thousand majority. Daniels denounced "corruption at Washington ever since Harding went into office," and declared the "same corruption with regards to the leasing of naval oil reserves has been going on in the enforcement of prohibition."

AUSTIN, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Appointment of J. A. Five still were at liberty tonight.

EVANGELIZATION

Most of us who hear frequent discussions of missions by the leaders of our churches are apt to regard it as principally a financial problem, due to the fact that the missionary activities of the various churches are more extensive than are their treasuries. The committees and bureaus controlling the missionary activities of the churches see such an immense field for work, and become so interested in the gigantic undertaking of winning the world to Christianity, that they may be excused if they sometimes outline more work than can comfortably be financed. This has not always been so, for until recent years the missionary appeal was primarily for workers rather than for money. In every church the ministers and other leaders were appealing to the people to send preachers and teachers and physicians into the foreign lands, where they could assist in carrying on the great missionary work and are ready and eager to go wherever they can be of service, but comparatively few of them can be added to the foreign mission staffs because of lack of funds for financing extensions of the work. Foreign missions, moreover, is not the only field in which missionary work can be done. Not more than half of Christian America has actually been Christianized, and there are some regions in which even the English language is almost unknown. In the South there are great opportunities for missionary work among the negroes, the Mexicans and other races which are to be found in large numbers. Half a million Mexican are in Texas alone, and present one of the most interesting fields that the missionary worker can find anywhere. In many of the industrial sections of America there are hordes of aliens, few of them Christians and fewer still claiming citizenship in the United States. In some sections where living conditions are poor and industrial and educational development retarded, there is dense ignorance, poor sanitary customs and practically no Christianity. All these fields ought to be covered by the Christian churches interested in the task of evangelizing the world. Missions is but another name for the great task that has been given to the Christian church. Evangelization is a better name for it, and home and foreign missions merely indicate the fields of evangelistic endeavor. Evangelization requires a great deal of money, for the mission workers must have financial substance, and it requires a great deal of man power, because it is a difficult task and wears out its workers rapidly. The more difficult it seems, however, the more zealously the Christian church should undertake it, remembering that the same purposes which actuated Paul in his marvelous missionary enterprises should direct every follower of Jesus Christ today. He said, "For so hath the Lord commanded us, saying, I have set thee to be a light unto the Gentiles, that thou shouldst be for salvation unto the ends of the earth." Organization in the direction of missionary work is necessary, but the individual is an integral part of the great evangelistic enterprise that covers the earth today, and upon the individual rests responsibility for its success.

SCHOOL FUNDS FROM THE GASOLINE TAX

In annual session at Austin, Friday, the State Board of Education will be able to fix the apportionment to the public schools at \$15 for each pupil, without touching the one and one-half million dollars which the legislature voted for that purpose last year. This legal maximum was granted for the scholastic year just past. During the several years preceding, the expenditure for the common schools ranged from \$10 to \$14 per capita. As 1,400,000 educable children are counted in Texas now, this outlay will total 21 million dollars. To that sum must be added \$1,600,000 rural school aid and \$312,000 for vocational training under the Smith-Hughes Act; so that the state will spend 23 millions on its schools next year. Nearly 8 1-2 mil-

lions have been voted for institutions of higher learning, also. The state textbook commission, that will meet in October, will disburse probably another three millions. Few state governments are more generous in their support of public education, which fact is occasion for pride. That record is long and consistent, as the Texas educational survey observed in its final report to the legislature. If the local units would do proportionately as well—and many of them do—this state's school system would be exceedingly prosperous and accordingly progressive. The present affluence, which sharply contrasts to the poverty of two years ago—when the legislature was called in special session to assure the rural schools a full term—is attributable principally to the gasoline tax. That has yielded revenue beyond the most optimistic calculations. Of the 18 million dollars derived from this source in the current fiscal year, 4 1-2 millions went to the schools. The drop to the two-cent rate on September 1—if continued—would cost the school system 1 1-2 millions or more annually; but the new legislature doubtless will restore the three-cent tax, which has been paid cheerfully. In that event the supplemental appropriation from the general fund, for schools—running about one and one-half millions annually—could be dispensed with; or the money profitably could be used in providing the poorer rural schools with much-needed buildings and equipment.

These fellows who are always trying to modernize religion, are certainly catching the mischief if they hear Dr. Frank S. Onderdonk speak in the First Methodist church revival. Mr. Onderdonk is one of the best informed Bible students in the South. He is nobody's simpleton, and he knows the Scripture, and has no better sense than to believe that when it says hell it means something awful, and does not mean that it is a mere matter of having to live here in this old world forever. He believes it is a real hot place with plenty of torment, and he also believes and preaches that people have no right to belong to any church and allow the devil to lead them around by the nose, and do everything that he wants them to do. He believes that the stories in the Bible are true and that when the reporter wrote the story of Jonah and the whale he didn't write a fairy tale, but it was an actual fact. Some of our modern smart Ales would have us believe that it was not a true story, and that there never was a whale big enough to swallow a man, but we notice the Washington Post of a few days ago says:

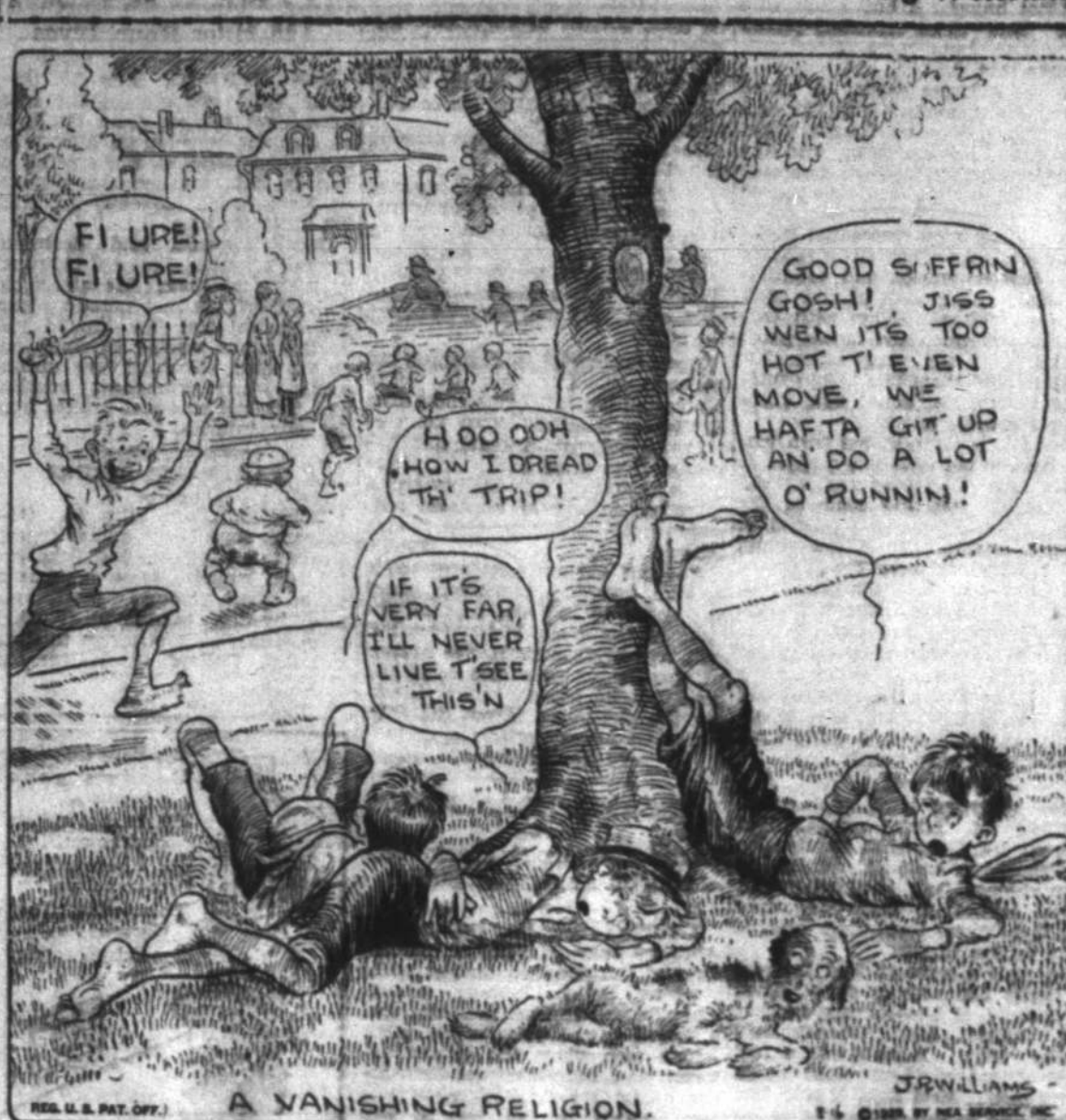
"Although the story of Jonah has been treated very generally as a literary hoax that found embalmment in the scriptures, it is certainly not so regarded by many who are both competent in opinion and careful of their information. As the narrative says nothing about a whale but ties up the occurrence with a great fish, the matter of accrediting the story is simplified out of the objection that the formation of the mouth of a whale does not admit of the creature being successfully turned into a passenger vehicle. Photographs were made of a sea monster cast up dead upon the Florida coast, so big that a man could stand up within its jaws and still leave several feet of altitude unaccounted for."

Credulity is a very serviceable frame of mind at times, as the thing about which centers the most doubt is the thing which often turns out to be liberal fact. This, doubtless, was the spirit in which Mr. Wilson, an alumnus of Oxford and clergyman of the Church of England, undertook a fresh study of the Jonah story, with the result that he has revamped the old narrative of James Barley, a mariner of the whaler Star, who was swallowed by a whale back in 1891, and a similar story from the Boston Post in 1771. Whatever the merits of the story of Jonah from the point of view of the whale, it stands out as one of the most important human narratives drawn from the Old Testament, as shown by the fact that among the carvings of the chapels of the Washington cathedral the story of Jonah is to be provided for, because it furnished the founder of Christianity a theme for one of his most searching sermons. There are matters which pass wholly beyond their literality for their importance and the story of Jonah is one such, even if everybody shall not be as satisfied as Mr. Wilson, with the result of his investigation into whether or not a man could actually go through the marine experience of the prophet of Nineveh and survive to tell the tale.

A democratic daily remarks that there is unanimity in the demand for a national clean-up, but that there is a difference of opinion as to whether the job should be wet or dry. We would add that also there is wide objection on the part of regular democrats to making the job both "wet" and "dry," and turning it over to Tammany Hall for execution. Judge Olmeyer may still indulge in his little pleasantries about Tammany being "purely" a "patriotic society," but he has yet to qualify her as a political laundry.

Whitney Warren, the American architect of the Louvain library, who has been standing out bitterly for the original inscriptions, which would set war passions in marble, is a regrettable figure. The Belgians who suffered the tragedy are generally of a better spirit. The Rector of the University is right. He declares that the phrase "Destroyed by German fury" is in bad taste and tends needlessly to perpetuate race hatreds.

As it is expected the Newfoundlanders suffer largely on such a diet with deficiency diseases. Scurvy, due to the absence of vitamin C, is not so common among these people as are beriberi which is associated with an absence of vitamin B, and disturbances of the eyes associated with a deficiency of vitamin A. The most common deficiency of the eye to be found is called by the physician "functional hemeralopia." The common name for this condition is night-blindness. In this disease the person is unable to see by night. Incidentally the night-blindness is associated with other disturbances of the eyes in the form of inflammations which are easily produced in animals by putting them on diets which are deficient in vitamin A. These disturbances are readily cured by adding vitamin A to the diet.

Apparently the Newfoundlanders have found that the condition they are suffering by eating fish liver, cod liver, or raw, rabbit's liver, cod liver, and cod liver oil. All of these substances contain vitamin A in considerable amounts. Strangely enough the natives have the custom of steeping the fish over the smoking liver, which is then eaten. French surgeons, as long ago as 1811 described a similar method of treatment for sailors with night blindness. Most of the cases of night blindness clear up in a few days after a few meals of liver.

NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, Aug. 15. (P)—After reacting from an opening advance, the cotton market firmed up again today on reports of eastern belt rains and increasing boll weevil activity in various parts of the South.

December contracts, which had sold off from 18.93 to 18.54 in earlier trading, advanced to 19.00 in late afternoon, or 27 points net higher and 88 points above the low level of Monday, and closed at 18.93.

The general market closed firm, at net advances of 20 to 33 points.

The market opened very steady, up 12 to 18 points in response to relatively firm Liverpool cables and reports of rains in the eastern belt.

Initial demand was supplied by realizing of recent buyers for a rally, coupled with southern selling and probably some local selling for a recovery of about 80 points from the recent lows.

Offerings subsided, and the market firmed up again in the afternoon when buying seemed to be stimulated by the official weather details showing heavy rains in Georgia and some other sections of the eastern belt. There were also reports of boll weevil infestation or increasing insect activity, and the market developed considerable strength. Some early sellers were covering or re-buying and there appeared to be broadening of commission house demand on the advance to 18.98 for October and 18.96 for January, net gains of 26 to 29 points on active months. The close was a

few points off from the best under profit taking.

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ELECTION CONTEST

Fort Worth Man Asks Vote In Boxes Thrown Out

FORT WORTH, Aug. 15. (P)—An election contest suit was filed in district court today by District Attorney Jesse E. Martin asking he be certified as the nominee of the democratic party for Terrant county district attorney instead of state Senator R. A. Stuart, his opponent in the recent primary.

Martin asks the vote in three boxes, two of which returned heavy majorities for Stuart, be declared void.

The petition alleges 1,177 illegal votes were cast for Stuart.

Two Killed When Wind Wrecks Town In North Carolina

Score or More Hurt Near Aberdeen As Other Parts Of State Isolated From Hurricane Floods.

TEN DEATHS RESULT IN FLOODED SECTION

Situation Acute In Many Places As Flood Waters Rush Toward Sea; Swollen Rivers Menace Dams

ABERDEEN, N. C., Aug. 16.—Two persons were killed and a score or more injured by a tornado that swept over Ashley Heights near here today. An unidentified peach picker was killed outright and John W. Jones died of injuries. The storm wrecked several buildings.

Swollen Streams In Three States Menace

ATLANTA, Aug. 16.—After wreaking destruction in foothills, waters from the latest tropical storm hurried toward the sea tonight in swollen rivers of Georgia, South Carolina, and North Carolina and added heavily to the huge damage toll. Many small towns still in peril were isolated and unofficial estimates of damage to property and crops, highways and railroads ran into millions. Ten deaths have resulted and a score have been injured.

The most acute situation appeared tonight near Lake Lure, N. C., where a dam across the lake of the name was reported buckling under the pressure of flood water behind it. The dam, 100 feet high, backs up millions of gallons of water which would be loosed into the Broad river should the structure give way.

Nearly half of the state of Georgia was affected, with one county, Wilkes, entirely isolated because of washed out highways and railroads.

Ashville, N. C., had no service and only limited traffic was moving from Macon and Thomasville, Ga., where, with the floods rapidly receding, no further damage was expected if rains cease.

The tropical storm itself, which swept up from the West Indies and hammered the west Florida coast before turning inland, was dissipating over the mountains of eastern Tennessee and western North Carolina where a low pressure area was all that remained of the hurricane blow.

Floods, which menaced the Lake Okechobee region in southern Florida this week, are not spreading over wide areas.

New River River Rise, Millersville, Ga., on the bank of the Coconee river, saw the stream rise higher than ever before, and tear out bridges and railway tracks so that transportation was paralyzed. The water supply also was cut off.

After inundating a section of East Macon last night the Coconee river fell rapidly today but bore menace to towns of Thomas, McIntyre and Irwin in Wilkeson county were isolated between the Coconee and Coconee and their numerous tributaries.

Pineh Forest, N. C., a village of 300 persons in Transylvania county was isolated, while water stood above the floors of homes in Roanoke, ten miles from New River. Damage to houses and communities reported houses damaged or swept away by floods.
