Ice Breaker Wins Long Battle With Frigid Northland

Rescue of Group Left When Cabin Wrecked Follows Finding of Two Men On Floating Piece of Ice.

MEN HAD BEEN GIVEN UP, BELIEVED LOST

Russian Ship Plods Through Wastes To Site Where Men Lost In Wrecking Of Italia Were Marooned.

ROME, July 12.—The Clita D. Milano sent a radio message tonight saying that at 9 p. m. the Russian ice breaker, Krasin, had taken aboard the Viaggi group of refugees from the Italia ship, the of the rescue was made.

In the "Viaggi" group of refugees from the polar ship Italia were five men. Their rescue brings to eight the number of the Italian crew of six men, and the Italian when General Umberto Nobis steered the big dirigible for the North Pole on May 23.

Of the other two, Dr. Finn Malmgren and Vincenzo Pomella, are known to be dead. Six have been missing since the balloon part of the ship sailed away from the wrecked gondola on May 23 and are supposed to be lost.

Radio Television Is Much Improved

Practical Demonstration Of New Principle Shows Soon Set Owners Will See As Well As Hear Artists.

NEW YORK, July 12.—The day when radio owners will be able to tune in on sporting events and other happenings of interest in any part of the country and see them instead of merely hearing an announcer's description has moved one step closer.

The Bell Telephone Laboratories today demonstrated their improved television apparatus which shows several full length figures as they moved about on a screen roughly the size of a boxing ring. Previously television had been restricted to recording no more than a head and shoulders.

At today's demonstration a man served tennis balls, drove a golf ball, boxed with a companion, and went through other motions on the laboratory roof, and on another floor every action was shown in perfect detail on a screen about two inches by three.

The television images were as clear as the average movie and were marred only by an appearance of being under a paper-thin sheet of water moving slowly upward across the picture. This defect engineers attributed to the fact that the electric eye of the television scans its field through holes in a revolving disc. Increases in the number of these holes or adjustment of their position, they believed, would eliminate the trouble.

Ticket Placed In Field By National Prohibition Party

New York Man Named As Third Party Presidential Nominee; Hoover's Name Was Considered.

CHICAGO, July 12. (P)—William F. Varney, Rockville Center, New York, was tonight nominated by the prohibition party as its candidate for the presidency.

Varney was declared nominated on the second ballot with 66 votes out of 121 cast. Hoover was second in a field of six with 45 votes.

James A. Edgerton, Alexandria, Va., was nominated for vice-president with 66 votes. Other votes were for E. S. Reagan of Rockford, Ill.; Dr. R. E. Prugh, Harrisburg, Pa., chairman of the convention; J. J. R. Buck, Norris, Wis.; and Jesse Jones of Houston, Texas.

Varney's nomination was declared unanimous by a majority vote of the delegates, despite a demonstration by the minority.

On the first ballot, in which Varney received 33 votes, lacking seven of a majority for nomination, and Hoover 42, Governor Alfred E. Smith received two.

The Democratic candidate's nomination and his subsequent poll of votes precipitated a one-man parade by Delegate Clinton N. Howard, Rochester, N. Y., Howard marched up and down for four minutes in front of the speaker's platform, shouting, "This is a burlesque! Such sections as this make."

Thursday Rain Is Limited To Area Close To Lubbock

Downpour of Semi-Cloud-burst Proportions Follows Sandstorm, Milling Gutters To the Brim.

EXTENDED ONLY SHORT DISTANCE FROM CITY

Crops In Small Area Touches Were Benefitted; Estimates of Amount Received Show Variance.

Following on the heels of a typical West Texas sandstorm, a heavy driving rain, accompanied by a violent electrical display swept Lubbock and environs starting at about 7 o'clock last evening.

The rain was not general over the South Plains, reports over the section last night indicated, Lubbock being the only town showing any material amount of precipitation.

Official estimates of the amount of precipitation was impossible due to the spotted nature of the downpour. The experiment station gauge, located on the eastern rim of the section which received rainfall, showed only .28 inches.

Rainfall Extent Uncertain.

In Lubbock, however, the downpour was of almost cloud-burst proportions. Gutters were full in many parts of town and some streets resembled rivers, with water running curb-high.

Unofficial estimates here placed the downpour at from one to two inches.

A heavy, disagreeable sandstorm, which could be seen approaching in large rolling banks, swept through the city shortly after 8 o'clock. The sand was settled by the rain which continued to fall in sheets for almost an hour.

Light showers at Abilene and Hale Center were the only other rains reported here last night. Crops in the narrow strip hit by the rains were thought to have

The explosion occurred when a pipe burst as an employee was attempting to start an engine.

Democratic Leaders Leave to Put Local Party Machinery Into Speedy Operation

Methodist Bishop Will Vote Against Smith, He Asserts

Declares Majority of Church Leaders Throughout The South Will Use Influence Opposing Nominee.

DALLAS, Tex., July 12. (P)—Impetus to the fight to carry Texas into the republican camp in November for the first time since the civil war was added today by announcement of Bishop John M. Moore of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, that he would vote for Herbert Hoover for president.

Bishop Moore declared that although he had been a democrat for 40 years his views with regard to prohibition would not allow him to support Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York, he added, however, that he had no thought of deserting the democratic party.

"I will vote for Mr. Hoover," Bishop Moore said, "to avert a moral disaster to this country and to save the democratic party from the power of a man who is despising it."

Bishop Moore said he had come in contact recently with church leaders in Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Tennessee and Kentucky, despite the fact that most had been democrats all their lives without exception they had declared themselves "against Governor Smith and usually for Mr. Hoover."

Love Case on Appeal. Meanwhile, activities of leaders of the anti-Smith democrats were held up for the time being while action of the Court of Civil Appeals at San Antonio was had on a mandamus proceeding brought by Thomas B. Love, candidate for lieutenant governor, to determine whether county executive committees have the authority to bar the name of certain candidates and demand primary tickets. The court's decision is expected tomorrow or Saturday.

Mr. Love sought a court order to compel the county committee of Cameron county to place his name on the ballot to be used in the State primary of July 28, after that committee had barred it on grounds that Mr. Love had said he would not support the national democratic ticket.

Fire Department Kept On Jump By Lightning, Fires

Three Calls Answered In Thirty Minutes As Local Firefighters Pass Stormy Evening.

CHIEF'S CAR TURNS OVER WHILE ON CALL

Truck Smashes Into Light Sedan and Careens It Across Street; 2 Places Hit By Bolts.

It was a wild night for the fire department.

Two buildings struck by lightning, three fire calls within thirty minutes during the driving rain and thunder storms, one fire car overturned in a ditch, a smash-up of a small car by one of the big trucks and another truck stuck in the mud constituted the excitement for the department within a short time last night.

Little damage resulted from the fires. The Palace Theatre and the Lubbock Cotton Oil company each were struck by lightning at about 7 and 7:30 o'clock respectively last evening. Partial damage to the smoke stack of the theatre and fire damage to the oil mill constituted the whole loss.

Amariello Furniture Fire. Fire originating from a trash fire broke out in the Amariello Furniture company on Broadway at about 7 o'clock. Aided by the strong wind the flames were swept through the entire length of the building, but rapid work of firemen prevented material loss.

Before the trucks could return to the station the Palace Theatre had placed a fire call. About four feet of the brick chimney were destroyed by the bolt of lightning. Immediately after the third fire of the evening was reported.

Enroute to the last fire the chief's car slipped into a ditch and overturned, forcing Chief Twigg to abandon it and go on to the fire. A light sedan was almost completely demolished when it was struck by one of the large trucks at the corner of Broadway and Avenue H.

Owner of this car reported at the fire station later in a vile humor to take one of the smash-ups. Chief Twigg said. The car owner thought the first truck had stopped at the stop signal on the corner.

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Olive Roberts Barton Says:

Companionship Allows Child To Train Self

Suppose two babies are playing together—babies a year or so old.

One picks up a patent leather cat. Instantly the other throws down his woolly dog and grabs for the cat. Number One holds on and shouts with rage. Number Two straightens up, looks frightened for a minute, whimpers a little and then, without warning, reaches out a chubby fist and scratches One on the face.

I have seen children at this age bite furiously if they were excited or crossed. Elemental as two young pups—indeed babies can show a fierceness more worthy of tigers, at times.

His Act Is Instinctive

Now it may not be pure rage on the part of Number Two. He may be frightened into doing the scratching. He has met a will as strong as his own, a new sensation, and besides, the other baby's scream has aroused his instinct of self-protection.

What is to be done? Certainly not to pick them up and pet them, and certainly not to slap any hands either. If the storm is not too terrible do not rush in and add to the turmoil by losing your own temper.

Take the hand of the offender and gently stroke the face of the offender. "Poor Tommy; Billy doesn't hurt poor Tommy." And then pick up the woolly dog and the patent leather cat and hand them to their original owners, respectively. After while make the trade.

Now this may not make peace.

And of course there may be complications, but it goes to show that, only by examples of good conduct can tiny children learn. Here is a lesson in individual rights and also in sympathy.

Suppose Tommy, the party of the first part, is devoted to his cat and refuses flatly and absolutely ever to let Billy have a look. Now is the time to separate him from his shiny affliction by clever and patient effort. He must learn that no matter how much he wants it, he must give it up cheerfully on occasion.

Teach By Example

Take the cat, but once he has many things, and quickly hand it over to the enemy. But be careful not to arouse jealousy. Your own attitude will have something to do with this.

While you are taking it don't call Tommy a bad boy or a selfish little rascal. And don't inflict your voice with nervousness for the outsider. Just take the cat and hand it over as though that settled it. You may carry Tommy off to look at a horse going down the street, or otherwise divert him for a few minutes. He may look over his shoulder a few times, but he won't mind what he has lost. After Billy has had the cat for awhile, let Tommy have it again. Later on take it away from him every little while and for longer periods.

If you think all this maneuvering foolish and a lot of trouble for nothing, we should like to insist that the little affair of the patent leather cat and like episodes are the great rocks on which the house of character is built.

stated.

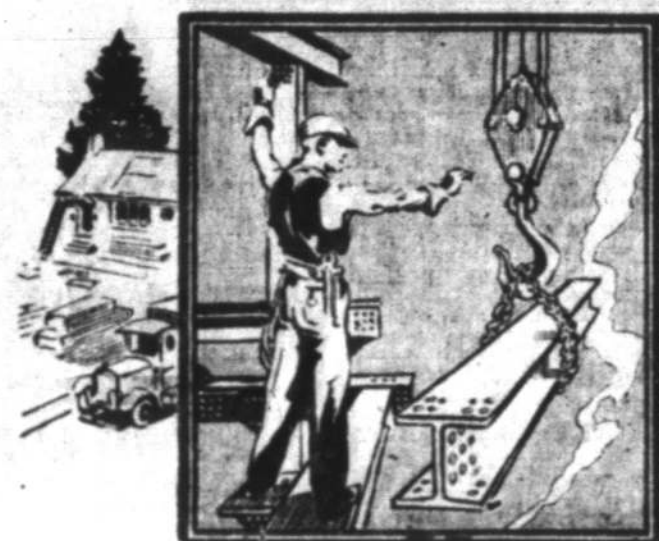
Mr. Jones will lead a discussion

Airtight Fielding of Locals Behind Wee Willie's Mound Work Is Big Factor In Hubber Victory.

Homer Burch's Ruthian crash that sailed over the left field barrier in the seventh inning with Homer Kyle, new Hubber outfielder, and Ray Robinson on the bags ahead of him broke into a hurling duel in the opening exhibition with San Angelo Snappers and enabled the South Plains entry to ring up a 6 to 2 victory over the boys from down the Concho.

Wee Willie Gregory, Hubber southpaw, and Hokey Garcia engaged in a mound battle for seven innings and up until the time Burch's four base knock came the local had touched the leading pitcher of Red Snappers' staff for only three clean safeties. Gregory, while wobbly at times, managed to pull through close quarters, for behind him was an airtight fielding combination, that had cut off possible Snapper counters all along the route in fashionable performance.

Hubbers Star in Field. The very first inning was enough for Gregory to realize that he was backed by a formidable fielding machine. Comeaux, flashy key-stoner for the guests, singled, but it was only the making of a double killing for "Little Big" Higginbotham rapped a hot grounder to Storti who cut Comeaux off at second, to Scalling, and Higginbotham was retired as Sam relayed the signal to Bill Bean, Cy Williams was hit by a pitched ball and, on his attempt to puffer the second, Homer Burch's bullet-like delivery was waiting for him.

But that wasn't all of it. The Hubbers continued to cut the guests off, and in the third session Comeaux was retired in a similar manner as Cy Williams in the first, trying to steal second on Burch, and for the second time in the early hours of the exhibition Burch's arm was too good for the Snappers. The ball was there waiting for the little key-stone star. In that same eventful frame Higginbotham drew a base on balls. Williams singled to push Higginbotham to second. Mike Wiley clouted out a two-base blow to centerfield, scoring Higginbotham, but Cy Williams misjudged the strength of the Hubber's newly acquired outfielder, Homer Kyle, who relayed the ball in to catch the rangy Snapper outfielder at the platter.

Had Substitute Umpires. When the game was called the league arbitrator, Johnson, did not show up and Raymond Hill, Hubber shucker, and Rufus Hall, Snapper triller, were chosen by the managers as umpires for the game. They didn't complete the opening inning, however, for Johnson paraded in shortly after the two clubs had engaged in a confab over a drive Lin Storti rapped down the first base line, which would have scored Lynch, as the hit was apparently for two bases—but after the storm had ceased the game called off and Storti came back to the plate, only to be eventually called out on strikes.

The Hubbers in the first round after they had executed a double play, Storti to Scalling, and Cy Williams was caught out stealing after he was hit by pitched ball. Burch to Scalling. The Hubber caught, came without a bunt, as Garcia passed Danny Lynch: Bean and Storti struck out; Lynch stole the key-stone base and scored when Doty failed to cover Scalling's ground ball.

In the third session Comeaux buntfisted Scalling with a steaming grounder, but was caught soon afterwards attempting to puffer second base, Burch to Lynch: Higginbotham waited Gregory out; J. Williams singled to advance Higginbotham to second; Mike Wiley clouted out a double to score Higginbotham, but when Kyle relayed the signal to Lynch Williams was caught out at the plate as Homer Burch made a dive for him.

In the sixth session, after both the Hubbers and Snappers had gone through the fourth and fifth without additional counting, Mike Wiley figured for the guests' second tally, which put the Red Snappers in the lead tripling against the right center boards, he came in on Cy Williams' grounded ball. Scalling to Bean. Tuck and Hank Doty singled after Wiley had scored but failed to advance farther than the second platter.

Garcia Gets In Trouble. The sixth left the homebats nervous, but the mighty seventh relief around and Hokey Garcia plenty of trouble. Goddard struck out, Kyle reached first on Comeaux's miff of a ground ball; Ray Robinson was given a free pass, and Homer Burch rapped a typical Ruthian drive, the signal ascending high over the left field barrier just a few feet within fair territory to put over three runs, practically assuring the Hubbers a win.

Intervention In House of David Colony Row Looms

State Is Definitely Concerned Over Damage To Property Resulting From The Clashes.

BENTON HARBOR, Mich., July 12.—Possibility of state intervention in the dispute between factions warring for control of the House of David colony here presented itself today. Rival groups headed by Mary Purnell and H. T. Dewhurst had a fight yesterday.

K. V. Clardy, assistant attorney general, said the state is definitely concerned over property damage resulting from clashes of the belligerents. A receiver for the colony has been appointed by the state and action looking to liquidation of its real assets is being held up pending a hearing on a restraining order.

Some 60 of the colonists were involved in the fighting according to authorities who were called to quell the disturbance. The trouble, officials said, arose over seizure of 14 crates of cherries by followers of Mary Purnell in an orchard managed by Ray Hornbeck who is identified with the Dewhurst faction.

After the invaders ignored his order to vacate the orchard, Hornbeck is alleged to have struck Max Blume, one of the group, and the fight was on. Local deputies were called and after restoring order took Hornbeck to jail, where he furnished bond and was released.

Returning to the colony, Hornbeck is said to have engaged Paul Perrott, another follower of Mary, in a dispute while rival factions gathered around and shortly afterwards were resumed on a free for all basis. A second call sent police hurrying to the colony and after they had quelled the disturbance, men and women apart, Perrott and Hornbeck were taken to jail.

Colony Is Divided
Ill feeling between Mary and Dewhurst, the latter chief of the organization's legal staff, manifested itself shortly after the death of Benjamin Purnell and reached a climax about a month ago when Mary ordered the income from colony enterprises turned over to her instead of the colony depository. Dewhurst, officials learned, issued contradictory orders and the colony since has been divided into hostile camps.

Fireman's Heroism Prevents Wreck

Climbs to Top of Speeding Locomotive and Releases Valve Leading to Boilers

PLAINFIELD, N. J., July 12.—While two broken driving rods were tearing up the roadbed, a fireman of a Baltimore and Ohio locomotive today climbed to the top of the engine and released the exhaust valves to prevent an explosion should the careening locomotive leave the rails.

The west bound express was traveling more than 60 miles an hour when the rods snapped near the Plainfield station. Engineer Mark S. Goodright applied airbrakes, but they did not function, he said later.

A rushing clang from the crippled engine struck the upright of a small passenger shelter and caused it to collapse. Edgar Smith, Plainfield, who was sitting in the shelter was unhurt.

Arthur Bien, fireman of the engine, finding the engine continued to run badly on under its momentum, feared that the boiler would explode if it left the rails. He climbed to the top of the locomotive and clung there amid clouds of steam while he emptied the boilers through the valves. Half a mile from where the rods broke the train stopped. It was only then that passengers learned what had happened.

of ice today of Captain Alberto Mariani, pilot of the Italia, and Captain Filippo Zappi, Italian navy navigator. This in one day the big Russian vessel had saved seven for whom aviators and mariners had been searching and seeking to relieve for more than six weeks. The fact that the ship reached the camp here, out the predictions of aviators who had flown over it, particularly that of Lieutenant Einar Paul Lundborg, a Swed, who rescued General Noble on June 24.

The Russian aviator Chukhnovsky, operating from the Krasnaya, sighted the little group on the ice by radio he reported that there were three men, two able to wave flags to attract his attention, and the other lying prostrate.

The aviator himself had to make a forced landing, but from his isolated position sent instructions to the Krasnaya which enabled him to reach the castaways.

Professor Samoilovich, head of the Russian expedition aboard the Krasnaya, in his official report sent to Moscow, described the finding of the two men by Chukhnovsky. Testifying in a session called hurriedly after the committee had arrived in Washington on a noon train from Atlanta, the Postmaster General said that in sixty-two per cent of the postmaster appointments made in Georgia since he took charge of the department, either the senators or the representatives were consulted.

TWO HOOVER GROUPS

Texas Organization To Boost GOP Nominee

SAN ANTONIO, July 12 (AP)—Two separate organizations in Texas to work for the election of Herbert Hoover, republican presidential candidate, seemed likely after a meeting of the Republican state executive committee here today.

The first Hoover-Curtis club in the state was organized here recently by members of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, the majority of whom are Democrats. The consensus at today's meeting seemed to be that the Republicans should organize their own Hoover clubs throughout the state to work among Republicans, but should encourage independent Hoover clubs such as the one organized here.

MOODY IN DEL RIO

800 People Hear Governor In Address

DEL RIO, Texas, July 12 (AP)—Approximately eight hundred people heard an open air address delivered here tonight in the interest of his candidacy for re-election by Governor Dan Moody.

GERMANY ACCEPTS

Unqualified Approval Sent Secretary Kellogg

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—Germany's unqualified acceptance of the revised draft of the American multi-lateral treaty for renunciation of war was communicated to Secretary Kellogg today in a brief note signed by acting foreign minister Schubert in Berlin. It announces Germany's readiness to sign the pact forthwith in the form in which it was submitted to fourteen countries by Mr. Kellogg on June 25.

RADIO BOARD RAPPED

Abolition Predicted By Irate Solon

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—The Federal Radio Commission, hearing protests from stations ordered to cease broadcasting on August 1, today was termed "reactionary" and its abolition predicted by Representative Victor Berger, socialist, Wisconsin, while Representative Celler, democrat, New York, said the commission was without jurisdiction in revoking the licenses.

Mr. Berger, in a demand that the socialist station WEDD at New York and station WIBA, Madison, Wis., be retained, wrote the commission that the procedure was "unjust and high handed," which "means a private monopoly constructed for the radio trust, a \$2,000,000,000 combination."

CHICAGO WHEAT

CHICAGO, July 12. (AP)—Wheat, corn and oats all took a decided swing upward in price today. Reports were current that Russia had bought 1,000,000 bushels of Canadian wheat, and that prevalence of leaf rust in Saskatchewan was confirmed. Talk was heard also that a good many stock market operators were turning more actively to dealings in grain.

Wheat values closed firm, 1 5-8c to 2 1-4c net higher, corn 5-8c to 2 1-4c up, oats 5-8c to 2c gain, and provisions showing 2c to 30c advance.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, July 12. (AP)—The cotton market was quiet today except for a spurt of activity in final trading when unconfirmed reports of rains in the western drought section brought out selling and some liquidation which carried October down to 21.25 compared with 21.41, the day's high, and 21.67 at yesterday's close. The delivery closed one point above the low with the general market steady at net losses of 21 to 32 points.

Liverpool cables were 12 to 14 penny points lower than due and the market here opened easier in sympathy. First trades showed losses of 12 to 18 points and prices continued to ease after the start on favorable weather in the western belt until October traded at 21.41 and December at 21.38, or 26 points under the previous close.

In the second half of the morning the market strengthened under buying induced by an official forecast for rain in the eastern portion of the belt where moisture is not needed. October advanced to 21.61 and December 21.58, or 20 points up from the lows.

NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, July 12. (AP)—More favorable reports as to crop progress in some parts of the south and relatively easy Liverpool cables seemed responsible for declines of about 32 a bale in the cotton market today. October contracts, after selling off to 21.86 early, rallied to 22.18, but broke to 21.91 in late trading and closed at the figure. The general market closed barely steady at net declines of 33 to 42 points.

The opening was easy at declines of 20 to 27 points in response to lower cables. Some buying on reports of further showers in the eastern belt and absence of moisture in sections of Texas which have been complaining of dry weather, was supplied on bulges of a few points, and the market eased off during midday.

July sold down to 21.75 and December to 21.78, net declines of about 30 to 35 points, but these prices seemed to bring in considerable covering combined with local and Wall Street buying. Demand became slightly more active after publication of the detailed weather reports showing somewhat more rain than expected in eastern belt sections and the market recovered a good part of its earlier losses.

PORT WORTH LIVESTOCK

PORT WORTH, July 12. (AP)—The cattle market here today was generally steady. Steers sold from \$9.00 to \$12.75, cows \$7.00 to \$9.25 and calves \$11.75 to \$12.00.

Hogs were 3 to 15 cents higher. The top price paid was \$10.95. Bulk of the receipts sold from \$8.70 to \$10.75. Sows brought from \$8.50 to \$9.00 and pigs \$7.75 to \$8.25.

The sheep trade was steady. Fat lambs sold from \$13.50 to \$14.00 and yearlings at \$9.75.

NEW YORK STOCKS

NEW YORK, July 12. (AP)—The line of least resistance in today's stock market was again downward. Marking up of the call money rate from the renewal figure of 7 to 8 percent brought a flood of offerings into the market, sending many issues down 1 to 12 points, several attempts were made during the course of the day to rally the general list but most of them fell flat, although U. S. Steel common, general electric and a few other industrial favorites showed stubborn resistance to selling pressure.

Selling was based largely on fears that stiff money rates were likely for the rest of the summer. Fixing of the call money renewal rate at 7 percent, as against 6 yesterday, was somewhat of a surprise. The higher rate, however, failed to attract any appreciable amount of loanable funds, and the rate was raised to 7 1-2 and thence to 8 as banks called more than \$15,000,000 loans in.

Directors of the New York federal reserve bank met after the close of the market, and followed the action of the Chicago federal reserve bank in raising the discount rate from 4 1-2 to 5 percent.

The weekly statement of brokers' loans showed a decrease of \$64,377,000 as compared with an increase of nearly \$148,000,000 a week ago.
