Carolyn's Corner

The recipe of the week is a great idea for Halloween treats.

The Great Pumpkin Cookie

4 cups unsifted all-purpose flour

2 cups quick or old fashioned oats, uncooked

2 teaspoons baking soda

2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

1 teaspoon salt

1½ cups butter or margarine, softened

2 cups firmly packed brown sugar

1 egg

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1 can (16) oz. solid pack pumpkin

1 cup raisins

Assorted candies, raisins or nuts, assorted icing or peanut butter.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Combine flour, oats, baking soda, cinnamon and salt; set aside.

Cream butter; gradually add sugars, beating until light and fluffy.

Add egg and vanilla; mix well.

Alternate additions of the dry ingredients and pumpkin mixing well after each addition.

Stir in raisins.

For each cookie drop ¼ cup dough onto lightly greased cookie sheet; spread into pumpkin shape using a thin metal spatula knife.

Add a bit more dough to form stem. Bake at 350 degrees F. 20-25 minutes, until cookies are firm and lightly browned.

Remove from cookie sheets; cool on racks. When cool, decorate cookies using icing or peanut butter to affix assorted candies, raisins or nuts.

Yields approximately 32 large cookies.

Variation: substitute 1 cup real semi-sweet chocolate morsels for raisins.

Dough may be frozen for later use.

Place unused dough in an airtight container in freezer.

Thaw in refrigerator and bake as directed.

The following article was submitted to this newspaper by Raymond Cross of Burkett pertaining to the Cross Plains High School. I found it quite interesting and newsworthy. The article by Mr. Cross follows.

In 1926 there were only five students who graduated from their class. They were Christine Cunningham Huchingson of Abilene, Dave Lee of Cross Plains, deceased, Orien Williams, deceased, Elder Marshall, address unknown and Raymond Cross of Burkett.

"I believe it was the smallest class ever to be graduated in Cross Plains in the last 57 years," states Mr. Cross.

The old three-story school house was located just west, across the street from the cemetery. They had classes there in 1927, one year later, then the school was moved to its present location.

The Spuders, later changed to Buffaloes, football team was organized in 1924 by Ben Featherston. He was the coach and a fine man. The town merchants

Make Direct Seeding Work In Summer For Fall Crop

It's time to start thinking about making second plantings and starting seedlings for all fall maturing crops. For certain crops, it is best to plant seed directly in your garden.

The secret to seeding directly into the garden in the midst of summer heat and having the seed germinate and produce healthy, vigorous plants is to modify the seeding area itself right in your garden.

Start by marking off the desired rows in your garden. In most areas of Texas, it is important that the soil be bedded prior to planting. This is especially true in the fall and in areas where excess rain occurs during the gardening season.

After the garden has been bedded and rows marked off, take a hoe handle or stick and make a seed "furrow." It will vary in depth, but in general it is usually ½ to 1 inch deep.

Next comes a very important step. After the seed furrow has been made, take a watering can or water hose and apply water directly into the seed furrow. Apply sufficient water to wet the loosened soil to a depth of 3 to 4 inches. In some cases, this may require that you apply water to the seed furrow several times.

After the water has soaked in, scatter the seed evenly along the furrow. Always plant more seed than needed. Soaking the seed in water overnight speeds the germination process.

Instead of covering the seed with garden soil, use a material such as compost, potting soil, peat

moss or vermiculite. By using a medium like compost as a covering material, you will provide a better environment in which the seed can germinate and grow. Problems with soil crusting and poor aeration will be eliminated. If you use a light colored material like vermiculite the seeding area will be cooler.

In a few days time, depending on the crop planted, the seed

should germinate and begin to emerge. It is especially important at this time to keep the soil from drying out. Light, frequent applications, with a sprinkler are ideal due to the cooling effect of the water.

If it is very hot once the plants have emerged, protect them from the summer sun by placing a board, cardboard or cloth on the west side of the row.

Itemized Bill For Medicare Required

Many people in the Big Country area face a longer than necessary wait to receive payment under the Medicare medical insurance program because they fail to submit an itemized bill with their request for payment form, Glyn Hammons, Social Security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

Medical insurance is that part of Medicare that helps pay for doctors' bills, outpatient hospital bills, and other items and services not covered by Medicare hospital insurance.

To receive payment under medical insurance, when the doctor doesn't accept direct payment, a person must submit a request for payment form. The doctor or other supplier completes part of the form or provides an itemized bill to send with the form.

The problem arises, Hammons said, when the bill does not provide a detailed description of the services provided and therefore, a decision cannot be made as to whether they are covered. As a result, the patient must be contacted for more information and payment is delayed.

To prevent this delay, the person should be sure that each bill shows:

A description of each service provided;

The date the service was provided;

The place the service was provided;

The charge for each service provided;

The doctor or supplier who provided the service; and

The person's name and health insurance number, exactly as they are shown on the Medicare card.

More information about claiming Medicare benefits can be found in the Medicare handbook. The people at the Abilene Social Security office will be glad to answer questions about Medicare. The office is located at 142 S. Pioneer and the telephone number is (915) 698-1360.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 8, 1983PROPOSITION NO. 1
ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment which requires a county with a population of 30,000 or more to be divided into not less than four nor more than eight precincts. A county with a population of 15,000 or more but less than 30,000 shall be divided into not less than two nor more than five precincts. A county with a population of less than 15,000 shall be designated as a single justice of the peace precinct or, upon a finding of necessity by the commissioners court, shall be divided into more than one justice of the peace precinct but not more than four. The amendment provides further, that in any precinct in which there is a city with a population of 15,000 or more, two justices of the peace shall be elected. The amendment allows a justice of the peace, constable or commissioner to continue in office until the expiration of his term, although a change in precinct boundaries results in the abolishment of the precinct or more than one justice of the peace or constable serving the precinct. Vacancies in the office of justice of the peace or constable that result from a precinct boundary change shall be filled by the commissioners court until the next general election. The amendment would take effect on January 1, 1984, and counties with populations of less than 30,000 and with more than four justices of the peace and constable precincts would have until January 1, 1987 to comply with the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing fewer justices of the peace and constable precincts in counties with a population of less than 30,000 and providing for continuous service by justices of the peace, constables, and county commissioners when precinct boundaries are changed."

PROPOSITION NO. 2
ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 20 proposes a constitutional amendment which would limit a homestead in a city, town or village to a lot or lots amounting to not more than one acre of land, together with any improvements on the land. The constitutional requirement that, at the time of

designation, an urban homestead not exceed ten thousand dollars in value without reference to the value of any improvements on the land would be eliminated.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment replacing the limitation on the value of an urban homestead with a limitation based on size."

PROPOSITION NO. 3
ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation that permits representative associations of agricultural producers to collect refundable assessments on their product sales to be used solely to finance programs of marketing, promotion, research and education relating to those products. It provides, further, that adoption of the proposed constitutional amendment will bring into effect Senate Bill 607, Acts of the 68th Legislature, Regular Session, 1983, with rejection of the amendment resulting in Senate Bill 607 having no effect.

PROPOSITION NO. 4
ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 20 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the Legislature to enact laws to provide for the succession of members of the Legislature in the event of an emergency and allows the suspension of procedural rules imposed by the Constitution in the event of, or immediate threat of, an emergency. The amendment empowers the Governor, after consultation with the Speaker of the House and the Lieutenant Governor, to suspend the constitutional requirement that the Legislature hold its sessions in Austin and allows the suspension of procedural rules by the Governor issuing a proclamation in which the House of Representatives and Senate convene by resolution approved by a majority of the members present. Suspension of the constitutional rules may not exceed a period of two years under a single proclamation; however, the Governor may renew the suspension by issuing a new proclamation incurred in by the House of Representatives and the Senate through a resolution approved by a major-

Clint Dairy Herd Has
TB Test Reactors

A herd of dairy cattle diagnosed to be infected with tuberculosis is under a Texas Animal Health Commission quarantine pending final disposition. Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, said the herd involved is the El Oro Dairy at Clint, near El Paso. Infection was discovered during a "split" post-mortem inspection in a meat packing plant in San Antonio.

"The herd was placed under quarantine August 22, 1983. Fortunately, we do not have many situations of this type any more, but it is a reminder that our cooperative state-federal program enables us to take necessary action," Dr. Holcombe said.

The herd consists of 317 head which has been tested. A total of 11 animals reacted to the tuberculosis test. They were removed from the herd, and they were sent to slaughter.

Of that number, 35 were found to have lesions, and 14 were condemned.

USDA Okays Haying
Severely Dry Crops

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block has said the U. S. Department of Agriculture has issued special provisions which allow producers in severely drought-affected counties to harvest hay and forage from their own conservation use acreage for their own livestock.

Block said these provisions are in effect immediately for the nearly 1,000 counties already approved for grazing.

"Restricting use of harvested hay and forage to the individual farmer's own livestock minimizes the adverse economic impact on commercial hay producers," Block said. "At the same time, it will provide some relief to livestock producers who are taking part in this year's acreage reduction and payment-linked program."

Block said approval for additional counties for special haying and grazing is on a county-by-county basis.

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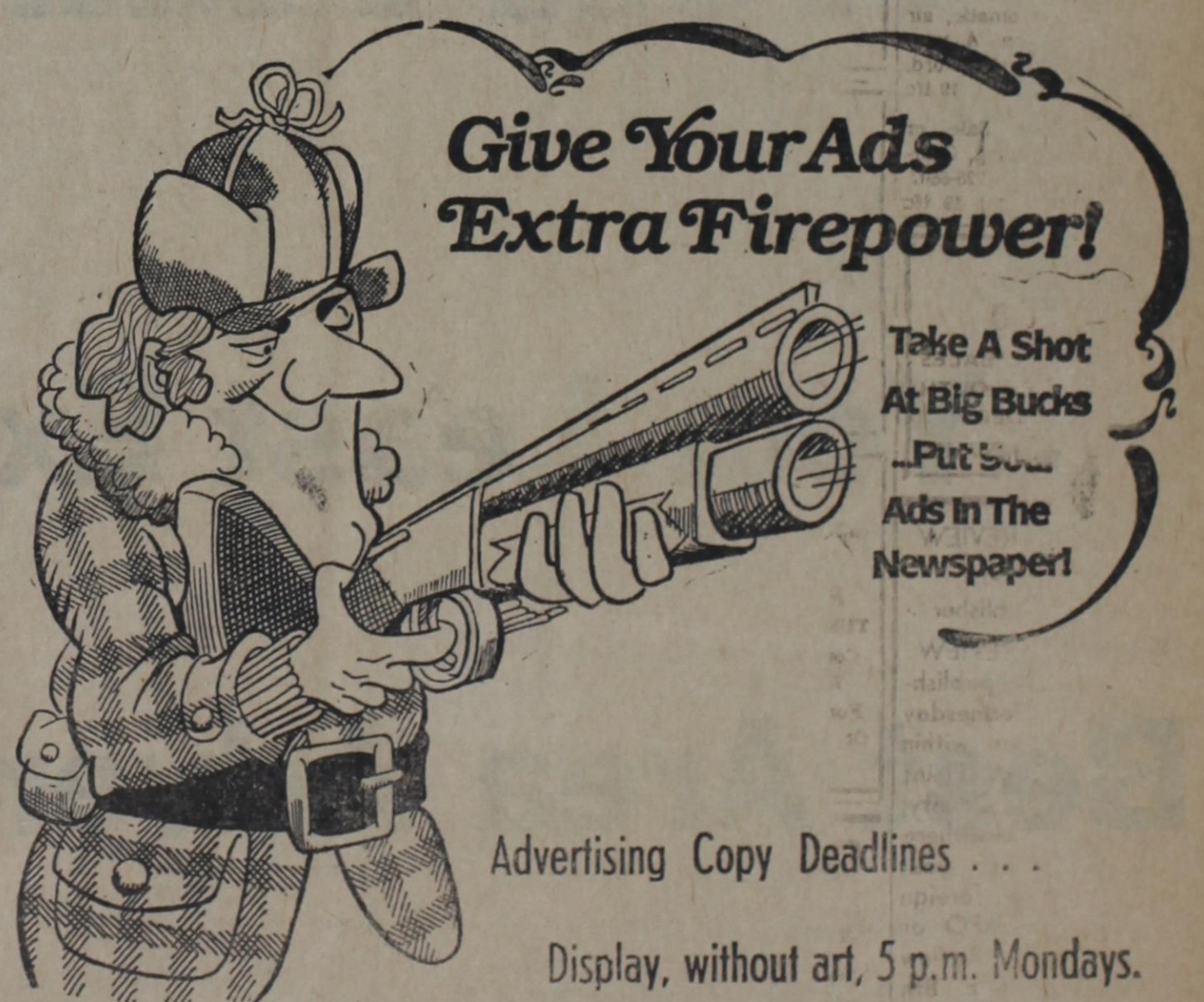

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State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

By Lyndell Williams

AUSTIN — The Travis County grand jury last week indicated Texas Atty. Gen. Jim Mattox on a felony charge of commercial bribery, leaving him more tangled than ever in a snarl of legal problems.

If he is convicted, Mattox will have to resign, but he shows no signs of stepping down or aside while he resolves his legal troubles, even while other office holders cry out that he must.

Admittedly, the persons most eager for the liberal Democrat's ouster are Republicans, and a small handful of Democrats have even flocked at his side. But a citizens group which lobbies for ethics legislation, Common Cause, has suggested Mattox simply step aside and let others fight the state's legal battles until he solves his own.

Mattox, however, is not moving aside for anyone. On the day of his indictment, he told reporters he was set up by "Big Oil," more specifically Mobil Oil, and that he expects to be a hero when the smoke clears after he is found innocent.

To underscore his point, Mattox last week filed lawsuits and restraining orders against five Houston companies alleged to have price-gouged victims of Hurricane Alicia. Mattox said the hourly fee charged in the alleged gougings amounted to \$1,800 an hour in some cases.

Legal Snarls

The gouging lawsuits are small potatoes compared to some of the legal battles which Mattox must expect to fight as the state's lawyer, among them the massive lawsuit involving the state, Clinton Manges and Mobil Oil for disputed oil lease payments. In fact, coming on the heels of Mattox's unpopular ban on some beachfront construction in hurricane-torn lawsuits are simply good press for Mattox in that region.

Mattox thinks he can beat the charge in time to clear up the state's legal docket. Other political skeptics believe that Mattox, whether he is the victim of big oil or his own big mouth, has shown mainly a proclivity for getting snarled deeper and deeper since he took office, and is likely to remain snarled for months to come.

Questions still unresolved are whether Mattox properly reported a \$125,000 campaign loan, whether he illegally intervened in a lawsuit of a Galveston financier and in the awarding of an artificial turf contract by Texas Southern University, and whether he used state workers to conduct personal legal research.

Commercial Bribery

The commercial bribery indictment is unusual, but is explained by the district attorney this way: "Mattox threatened to put Philbright and Jaworski (Houston law firm) out of the bond business unless the firm stopped trying to question his sister."

Mattox responded in his usual tough guy manner: he hopes the DA has the guts to try the flimsy case himself.

Brisco Out

In the race for U.S. Senate, former Gov. Dolph Briscoe announced he would not run because of extended drought problems on his large ranching operation, but would support the entire Democratic ticket. The door is open for a Briscoe endorsement.

His departure brought sighs of relief from the two conservatives in the fray, Bob Krueger and Kent Hance, who didn't want to split that block with the influential Briscoe.

Gramm In?

Congressman Phil Gramm, the Democratic-turned-Republican boll weevil who credited much of the White House's budget bill, is on the brink of entering the race. Gramm unveiled a finance committee list last week that read like a GOP Who's Who, including former Gov. Bill Clements, Eddie Chiles, Ray Hunt, Boone Pickens, Dan Bright, Bob Perry and Kay Bailey Hutchison. Talk is that with a list like that, Gramm has to go for it.

Meanwhile, a young Houston oilman, Robert Mosbacher Jr., formally announced as a Republican for that seat. Mosbacher, 32, is a former aide to Senate Majority Leader Howard Baker with ties to the Gerald Ford and George Bush factions.

Bob Bullock

Meanwhile, Comptroller Bob Bullock, who wants to run against

Gov. Mark White in '86, says he will oust DPS director Col. Jim Adams if he is elected. "I don't think he's (Adams) doing anything. Have you seen crime go down?"

Bullock, also announced that legalized bingo has produced \$2 million in revenue for local governments, according to his collection records.

Anniversary

Last Thursday marked the 50th anniversary of the repeal of prohibition on beer in Texas. Today, Texas is second only to Wisconsin in the production of beer, producing 16.7 million barrels a year.

Excise taxes collected in 1982 on the production, distribution and sale of beer in Texas amounted to \$78 million in state revenues. In addition, \$45 million is collected from a special gross receipts tax on some retailers and \$100 million from the general sales tax.

Although state-wide repeal of beer prohibition is half-a-century-old, 74 counties are still totally "dry." In general, the southern half of the state is mostly "wet" while the northern and Panhandle regions are predominantly "dry."

Texas breweries are located in Houston, Fort Worth, Longview, San Antonio and Shiner.

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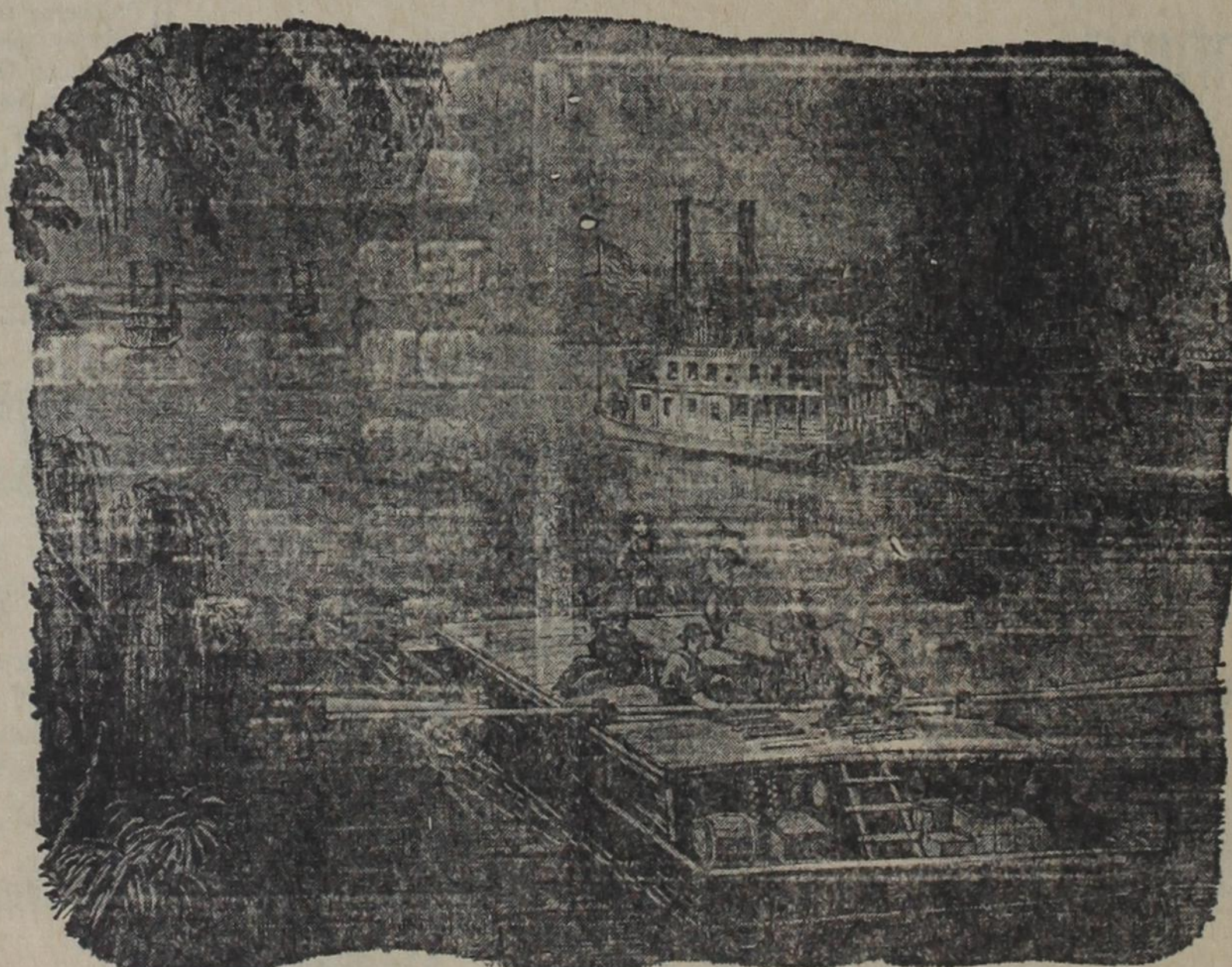
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
