FLIERS OFF ON A TEST FLIGHT

Government Standards Insure That New Brooms Sweep Clean

WICHITA, Kans., June 10.—"A new broom sweeps clean" was an adage which circulated widely and was accepted without question until the government began an investigation and found that some new brooms did not sweep clean. The result was the establishment of a system of grades for broom corn and after being in operation a year, the system makes it possible for one to quote the adage with more assurance.

Seven grades were established by the government to fill a long felt need for standardization in the industry. Classification is based on the weight of seed and the color, texture and length of the straw. Since the grading was begun thousands of carloads of broom corn have been inspected and graded.

Although a broom is found in almost every home in the country, production of broom corn is centralized in small areas. Eighty per cent of the broom corn in the United States is raised in a circle 150 miles in diameter which has Elkhart, Kansas, as its center. This circle extends into Oklahoma, Colorado, New Mexico and Kansas. About 15 per cent of the crop is raised in three Illinois counties around Mattoon and the balance is found in Texas, Arizona and Missouri.

There are two kinds of broom corn—the standard and the dwarf. It is planted in rows and cultivated just as corn or any other cultivated crop. The crop is harvested while the stalks are green and before the seeds have ripened, and allowed to dry out either in racks or in the field under a shed.

By running through a thresher the straw is freed from seed and packed in 300 to 400 pound bales and shipped to terminal markets to be sold by the ton.

More than 60 per cent of the nation's crop of about 60,000 tons is handled through Wichita, making it by far the largest terminal market in the country.

WILL DEMAND COTTON PRICE

DALLAS, June 17.—An agreement to demand a price for cotton designated by the association has been made by members of the Farmers' Marketing Association of America, T. W. Davidson, of Dallas, general counselor of that body, announced today.

Members of the association have pledged themselves to store their cotton in warehouses until they can secure the price they demand, according to plans of the association.

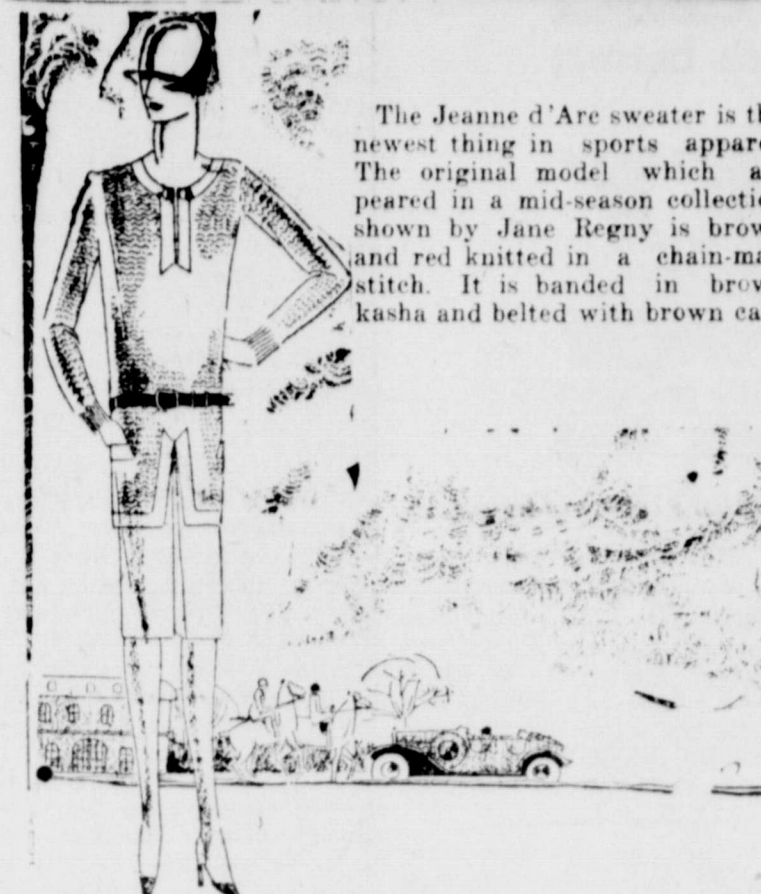

WASHINGTON, June 17.—Farm women and those in cities with available ground are encouraged by the department of agriculture to raise flowers, both for home decoration and for sale. The extension bureau offers abundant advice concerning desirable varieties and their cultivation. It suggests a flower club in each community so that by exchanging bulbs, cuttings, shrubs, and seeds each member may profit by the success of the others. In South Carolina flower club work has been successfully commercialized and many women report substantial returns through selling flowers to restaurants, hotels, tea-rooms, clubs and private customers. The sale of bulbs, plants and shrubs also has been profitable. The home demonstration agents of the department have stimulated production by devoting special days to particular varieties, with the result that dahlias, chrysanthemums, lilies and roses have been sold extensively.

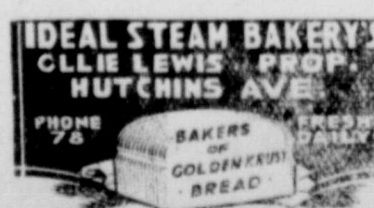

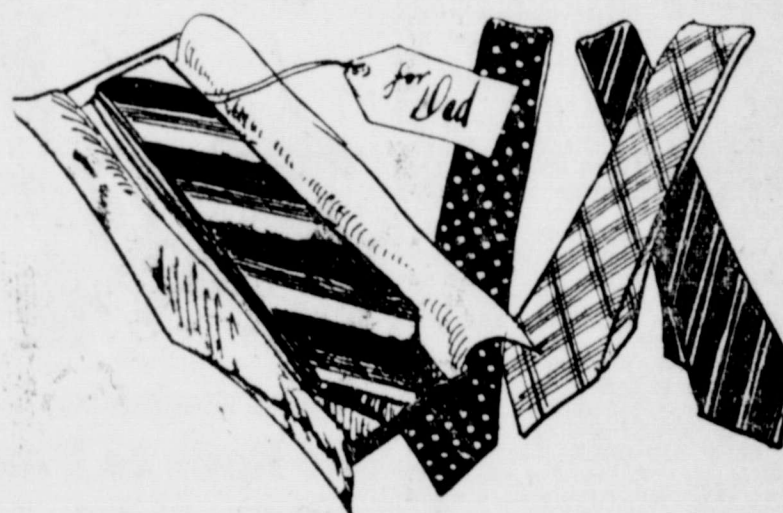
