A voluntary revision of present gas rate schedule for customers in the city of Lamesa is to be made by the West Texas Gas company sometime during the summer month, according to R. F. Hinchey, vice-president of the company, who announced Friday that a study of the schedule was being made with a reduction of rates in view. Announcement of the revised schedules will be made after a survey of the company's business in Lamesa and other cities served by the company, Mr. Hinchey said. "Realizing the present conditions and endeavoring to pass something on to the customer, we are making this survey and studying possible rate schedules with a view of arriving at a rate that would be particularly beneficial during the winter months," Mr. Hinchey said. The amount of the reduction will be determined after the survey has been made, which will require some time, he said. The new schedules will likely go into effect sometime in the fall and will be applicable upon winter bills, Mr. Hinchey said.

Revision of the rates will affect the schedules in each of the 42 towns served by the company.

Work on the survey of the company's business has been started and will require most of the summer for completion, it was said.

DR. HODGES OF LUBBOCK TO HOLD T. B. TESTS HERE

Dr. Hodges, veterinarian of Lubbock, will be in Dawson County, Monday, June 22nd, to make tuberculosis tests on cattle. Dairy men and farmers have made requests on this service of 117 head of cattle. The state law requires that a veterinarian, licensed for that purpose may make official tests on dairy cattle for tuberculosis. Charges made by the veterinarian for this work are \$1.50 for single cows and in numbers up to \$5.00 per cow. If there are as many as one hundred head in the county to be tested, the charges are 50c per head. All those who desire to have these tests made, may get in touch with the county agent's office, before Monday morning, stating the number to be tested and the location of the cattle.

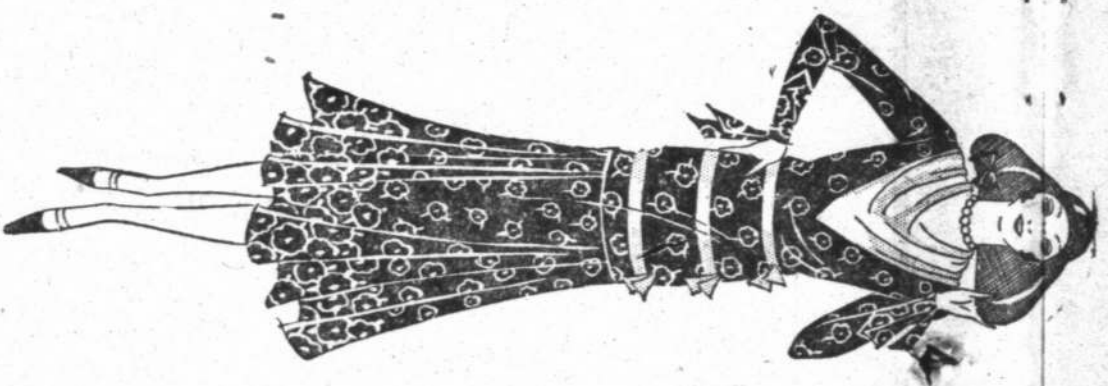
