## Attorney General Rejects Ochiltree Road Bonds Chamber Of Commerce Will Sponsor Tree Planting Campaign

### BOY SCOUTS TO CONDUCT SALE OF TREES HERE

Drive Will Open Saturday Morning With House To House Canvas; Ask Small Deposit

### Chinese Elms To Cost 30c

Local Nurseries Offer Five To Six Foot Trees; Delivery Date To Be In March

The annual tree planting campaign sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce will open on Saturday morning of this week when property owners will be offered trees in a house to house selling campaign conducted by the Boy Scouts. The trees are being supplied by the two local nurseries, the Wilson Elm Shop and the North Plains Nursery.

According to Vance Apple, head of the Chamber of Commerce committee conducting the campaign, the trees to be offered are Chinese Elms of the finest type and of extra good stock. Because of the group buying, it will be possible to distribute these trees at a cost of thirty cents each for trees of from five to six feet. A deposit of ten cents per tree will be taken with the order and delivery will be made some time in March.

The price of thirty cents a tree is considerably less than half what was asked during former campaigns and no doubt many will avail themselves of the opportunity of purchasing trees at such low cost. The tree planting campaign is not being conducted solely for residents of Perryton but is for anyone in the Perryton trade territory desiring trees. If you live outside of Perryton and are not solicited by the Boy Scouts, you may place your order at the Chamber of Commerce office at South County Agent G. R. Sheets. Purchasers will be notified when the trees are ready for delivery.

### NURSE HERE IN MARCH-APRIL

CROSS NURSE SECURED FOR EXAMINATION OF SCHOOL CHILDREN IN OCHILTREE COUNTY

Through the cooperation of the Red Cross unit, the County of Ochiltree and the Perryton Independent School district, Miss Ethlyn C. Gentry, Red Cross nurse, has been secured during the months of March and April for the examination of all school children in Ochiltree county.

During her stay here Miss Gentry will visit every school in the county and will give a free examination of all school children. The county is extended an invitation to be present at any of these examinations. Special meetings for the parents will also be held at each school in order that they may confer with Miss Gentry as to what corrective measures to use should defects be found in their children.

Miss Gentry is a registered Red Cross nurse, obtained through the Red Cross headquarters at St. Louis, Mo. The county school district and the local Red Cross unit are co-operating in the financing of this project.

### Loaded Truck Burns

Truck Blinded By Car Lights Turns Over Near Spearman; Is Destroyed By Fire

A Chevrolet truck belonging to J. R. Gray was destroyed by fire Monday night on the highway four miles east of Spearman, while returning to Perryton with a load of feed. Oris Bruner was with Mr. Gray at the time of the accident.

Mr. Gray was driving when he became blinded with the headlights of an approaching car and turned over. While on the way back to Spearman for help, the truck caught fire and was completely destroyed.

Mr. Gray and Mr. Bruner were returning from Dumas where they had gone after a load of feed. The loss was partially covered by insurance.

### ARREST THREE ROBBERY CASE

ACCUSED OUT ON BONDS OF \$1,000 EACH IN OIL STATION ROBBERY LAST WEEK

Three arrests were made during the past week in the burglarizing of the Gulf Wholesale station here on the night of January 29. Those arrested were Leo Steele and Tommy Stotts, charged with burglary and Jack Steele charged with accessory. Much of the stolen goods have been recovered.

Sheriff J. S. Talley and Officer W. J. Pottorff were called in on the investigation. On Monday word was received from Ulysses, Kans., that Leo Steele and Stotts had been arrested on a liquor charge. Officer Pottorff went to Ulysses and upon searching their car found part of the stolen goods returning them to Perryton where they were charged with the burglary. Officer Pottorff later swore out a warrant on Jack Steele as being an accessory and receiving stolen property. He was also jailed. Bond was set at \$1,000 each, this being supplied in all cases and the case is awaiting the action of the grand jury on February 15.

It is reported that Leo Steele was given a sixty day jail sentence and a fine of \$250 on the liquor charge at Ulysses, the case against Stotts being dismissed.

BRILLIANT SPEAKER BRINGS INTERESTING MESSAGE TO FARMERS HERE TUESDAY

Organization was the keynote of the message brought to the farmers of the Perryton area by C. C. Cogswell, Pretty Prairie, Kans., Grange master of that state who was the principal speaker at two farmers meetings held in Perryton on Tuesday afternoon and evening.

In his forceful and fluent manner, Mr. Cogswell told his listeners of the needs of agriculture and suggested organization as the proper remedy. He told of the powerful organizations that were in Washington to represent big business and of the small representation of agriculture, which is really the basic industry of the nation.

In this connection, Mr. Cogswell told of the work of the Grange, tracing the organization from its foundation to the present time, showing what this group is striving to accomplish.

### COURT ALLOWS REASSESSMENT

DISSOLVE RESTRAINING ORDER IN HEARING BEFORE COURT OF CIVIL APPEALS WEDNESDAY

In a hearing held Wednesday of last week before the Court of Civil Appeals, Amarillo, in the case of Jack Payne et al vs City of Perryton, the court decided for the city, dissolving the temporary restraining order granted by the court on January 24 holding up the paving reassessment order of the city.

The case involved was the validity of the city and a temporary restraining order was issued by the Court of Civil Appeals on January 24, setting the date of hearing on February 3. This is the same case that was brought before the district court last July at which time an injunction was issued but was dissolved by the court in November.

### SEEK SHARE OF FEDERAL FUNDS

REPRESENTATIVES OF CHAMBER ATTEND PANHANDLE MEETING TO OBTAIN FARM LOANS

Perryton and Ochiltree county were well represented at the meeting held in Amarillo, Tuesday, in an effort to obtain aid for the Panhandle from the \$50,000,000 agricultural relief fund provided by the Reconstruction Finance corporation. Not only will an effort be made by the Panhandle counties to obtain their just share of the fund but every effort will be made to make Amarillo a regional distribution point for the fund.

Dr. G. J. Budd, president of the Chamber of Commerce H. C. Sanford, director of the organization, County Agent G. R. Sheets, Carl Ellis, president of the First National Bank; B. L. Rogers, Farnsworth; and T. W. Gray, Gray, Okla., represented this trade territory at the Amarillo meeting.

As a result of the meeting Mayor Ernest O. Thompson, John E. Hill, general manager of the Panhandle Lumber company, and Grover B. Hill, secretary of the Panhandle Livestock association left Tuesday night to meet with Secretary of Agriculture Arthur M. Hyde who has entire charge of the distribution of the fund.

Some two hundred, fifty representative business men, farmers, bankers and Chamber of Commerce officials from almost every county in the Panhandle as well as several counties in New Mexico and Oklahoma were in attendance at the meeting. The representatives from each county were requested to present a statement regarding the needs of the county. The following is a copy of the request made for this county:

### ANOTHER BOND ELECTION MAY FOLLOW SOON

Insufficient Time Between Calling And Date Of Election Is Cause Given

### Will Present New Petition

Commissioners Court To Act On New Election Petition At March Term Court

Ochiltree county's highway paving bonds have for the second time during the past two years been rejected by the Attorney General, the reason for the recent action being given as insufficient time elapsing between the calling of the election and the date of the election.

Word was received in Perryton by Judge Oscar C. Flowers this week regarding the action of the Attorney General in rejecting the \$400,000 highway bond transcript. At the regular session of the commissioners court held Monday of this week, another petition containing over a hundred signers was presented to the court, requesting that another election be called for the same amount and same purpose. No action on the matter was taken by the commissioners, however it is stated that all necessary election orders and forms will be prepared and submitted to the Attorney General for approval and that the election will probably be ordered at the next meeting of the court which will be held on March 14.

Judge Flowers in commenting on the matter, stated that before the March meeting, all forms and election orders would be prepared and submitted for approval of the Attorney General and that this approval would be secured before the election was ordered.

### MORE ABOUT THE PER- RYTON DEER HUNTERS —WORSE AND MORE OF IT

Santa Fe N. M.  
Feb. 7, 1932.

Dear Herald:

Seed in the paper that a friend loaned me that an hombre by the name of Brillheart is running fer office down there. Spect he's the one who was with the buck last fall. If he is one of the ex service men from the battle of Black Canyon, same bein' the place where all the bucks, and does, and time was kilt last fall, he is shore goin' to be lected. He shore knows how to run. Why the day Two Belly Glasgow found the gold mine, and then changed his mind, this here Pot Brillheart came down the mountain at 22 feet per jump fer reinforcement, or the heavy artillery, or sumptin'.

The huntin season was just opened good—bout like openin' the pot on a pair of jacks. But these boys were draggin' in bucks and does, and jack rabbits, and I just had to go over and tell 'em that they must not put no more doe tags on the jack rabbits. Might get 'em in bad just like a penny-ante game in Texas. But it did look like they wanted to tag every thing that had long ears, and Lord only knows what they would have done to a roastin' ear patch.

I ambled over to their camp one evenin'. Just liked to go over there for the camp just naturally smelled good after the first day. Coonhound Barber was sittin' backed up to a tree, with his legs drawn up about like a grasshopper, and spittin' in the fire, and tellin' the gang how he killed his buck. He said his horns was so long and heavy that he got 'em caught between two big trees ten feet apart, so Barber walked up close and shot 'im in the south end while he was tryin' to push both trees down at once. The shot kind of helped to shove, and the buck broke off both horns close to his head, so he didn't have no horns when he got to camp.

That night we had a bad scare. Three of 'em came up to our camp bout midnight and said that Alibi Cudd was lost or sumptin', or a bear had dragged him off. He was plumb gone. Course we all had to be accomodatin' so we took off our overcoats and started out to find him. You see us folks ut here dont take nuthin' off at night so we just slips into an overcoat and calls it our elder down sleepin' bag. After a couple of hours we found Alibi right there in camp. He had rolled out of bed in his sleep and got hung up in some live-oaks about ten feet below, and didn't even wake up. After that they always kept him tied to his bed at night.

Next day I got better acquainted with Two Belly and Pot. In fact that was the first time that I felt that I could call them by their first names instead of Senyor Glasgow, and Primo Brillheart. They was huntin on the same baby mountain with me. This here little mountain was layin' on the breast of its mother, just like any other baby, only a whole lot quieter. Obe was afraid to go near the canyon rim for fear the wind or sumptin' would blow him off. His knees just go to knockin' together like they did the first day when five bucks came into camp and dared him to shoot. He got sore at Pot cause he wouldnt blindfold him and lead him across the narrow place where two canyons climbed up from opposite directions and almost met, makin' a jumpin' off place a thousand feet deep on each side. But it wasn't over a couple of hundred yards till it widened out again, so Obe got down on his hands and knees and crawled across.

I was up above, sittin on the rim and admirin the scenery and takin' some pictures, and the two Texans passed right by me without passin the time of day, or nuthin else. Didn't even say "howdy." Up above was fine hunting, where deer were thicker than cattle, and they knew it as they crawled ahead. Above also was the Bonanza Granda lode mining claim, and its owner, Antonio Vigil. I had forgotten to tell them about the old mine. They also did not know that Senor Vigil carried a carbine and a belt knife, and he was not hunting deer either.

It was not long till they came up to the place where there was two streaks of white rock standing on edge, with a layer of dark colored rock in between, and a drift back into the higher ridge. They stopped in front of a sign but neither of them believed in signs. Obe read "Aviso." "Thats the sign that I saw in the Harvey house at Canadian and it means not to spit on the floor."

And Pot comes in with "An' I can spit two thousand feet from here and not hit ground either." Two-Belly spied the drift. "A bear den," says he. An' they started right

After supper, while the gang planned their trips for the followin' day, Obe came out of his silence long enough to spit in the fire and say "Next time I see a mine, I'll run from it." An' Alibi comes back at his with "Pears to me like you did this time too."

An' it all happened cause Obe learned his Spanish in a Canadian eating house.

I wanted to tell you how Alibi Cudd got his buck. Some of the boys said he borrowed it from one of the camps down below, but he didnt. He got it honest all right.

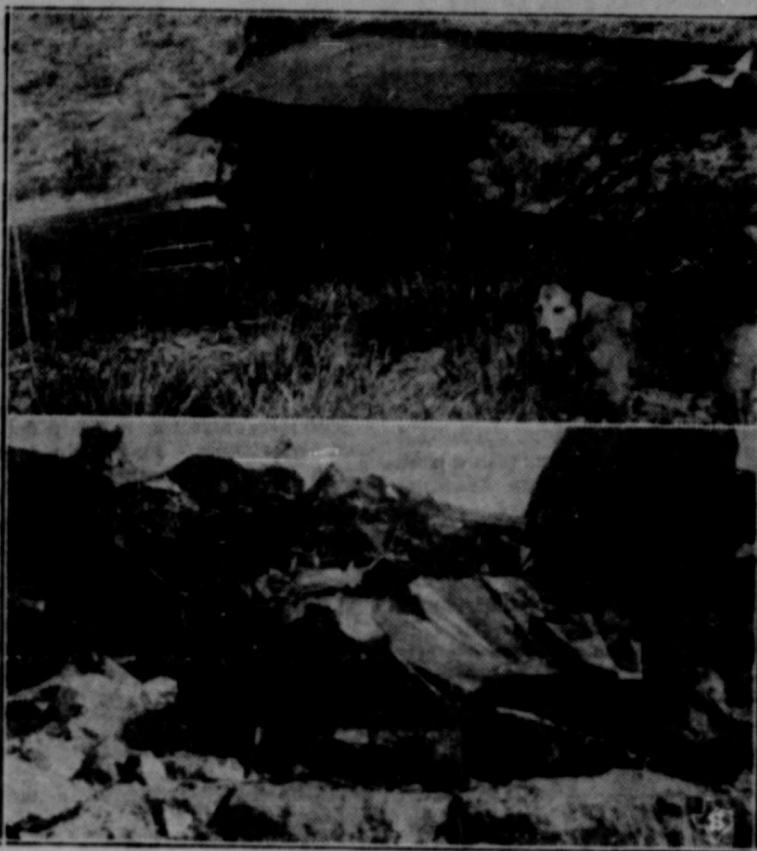

### Enroll 1932 Members

American Legion Auxiliary Had  
Over Fifty Per Cent Re-  
newal on January 1

The American Legion Auxiliary entered 1932 with more than half of its 1931 members paid up in advance for the new year, according

to Mrs. Paul Ballew, membership chairman of the local Auxiliary Unit. The January membership report from the Auxiliary's national headquarters showed that out of a total enrollment of 412,063 members for 1931, 209,890 had paid 1932 dues by January 1.

The Department of Iowa with 18,874 members enrolled for 1932, started the year with the largest numerical membership, followed by Wisconsin, with 17,761; Minnesota, with 16,170; Illinois, with 12,323; California, with 10,661; and Ohio with 10,218.

One hundred seven new Units of the American Legion Auxiliary were issued charters the first day of 1932, bringing the total number of Auxiliary Units up to 7,624. The new Units are located in 25 different states, the largest number being in Texas, where ten were chartered. Eight new Units were chartered in Michigan, seven in Ohio, five in each California, Indiana and Tennessee, and four in each Arizona, Illinois and New Jersey. The organization of the new Units has reduced the number of American Legion Posts which do not have Auxiliary Units to approximately 2,500.

## OKLA. SEEKING HIGHWAY ROUTE

ROUTE FROM GUYNOM TO OKLAHOMA CITY THROUGH PERRYTON SOUGHT BY COMMISSION

The following is a copy of a letter written by Sam R. Hawks, chairman of the Oklahoma State Highway commission to W. R. Ely, chairman of the Texas Highway commission, following a visit of the members of the highway committee of the Perryton Chamber of Commerce along with representatives from Canadian and other points along the proposed route with Mr. Hawks.

"I am enclosing you herewith a highway map of Oklahoma. I want to call your attention to the green line that follows No. 64 to Guymon, Okla., and we are now prepared to designate a new highway following the green line from Guymon to U. S. 83, at or near Gray, Okla. From this point the route to Oklahoma City that will be the shortest and most direct would be through Perryton, Texas, thence to Canadian, thence south about eight miles and then over what is called the Gem highway to the Oklahoma state line. There you will note the road will intersect with No. 33, a newly designated highway, which leads on to Clinton, Okla. At Clinton, the road intersects with No. 66, which is paved to Oklahoma City, with the exception of a twelve mile cut-off west of El Reno. A contract for which we will let next week.

"Now if your commission could see fit to take over the Gem highway which is in Hemphill county, Texas, and which I understand is all ready brought to standard grade and drainage and put state maintenance upon it, then with our building and maintaining the gap between Guymon and Gray there would be a through and continuous road from the New Mexico line through the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles to Oklahoma City and points east. This road in my opinion would draw a lot of traffic. The road from Clinton on 66 to the Texas line will be hardsurfaced this

year with oil and gravel. "I note that Federal highway 83, that runs north through Beaver county, Okla., has been designated by the Oklahoma Highway commission, but is not state maintained. However the highway commission would be willing to maintain this road and perhaps a little later on improve it. If your commission could see fit to do the same thing on the Gem highway from your highway No. 83, Federal, or state No. 4, to the Oklahoma state line. Not only have the people of Cimarron and Beaver counties become intensely interested in this road, but also the people of Hemphill, Lipscomb, Ochiltree and Hansford counties of Texas.

"I have visited both at Perryton and Canadian and the citizens there are equally as interested as are the Oklahoma people."
