EUROPE'S WAR AFFECTS GAS UTILITY BUSINESS

The scourge of war, lashing at the foundation of European civilization, is already affecting the gas utilities of the Southwest, D. A. Hulcy, executive vice-president of Lone Star Gas Company, told more than 400 managerial employees in Dallas where they attended the annual Lone Star Gas System meeting from which Earl Heath, local gas company manager, has just returned.

"The Company is already paying advanced prices for metals used in war materials, particularly steel, which is the principal material used by gas companies for long distance transportation and local distribution systems," Mr. Hulcy told the assembled gas men. "This naturally boosts operating costs. Other materials rapidly consumed by war are swinging up and we anticipate advanced taxes as direct and indirect result of war.

"While the war affects everyone in rising prices, the gas utility, only utility under Tex. state regulation, cannot voluntarily meet this increased operating cost by increasing prices of its product as do other businesses," Mr. Hulcy said. "To make our fixed revenue stretch to increased operating costs, we must practice even greater economy than ever before, short of injury to customer service.

"While it is true that we may benefit from increased industrial and agricultural activity, this increase in business will fall far short of balancing the added costs; and our company will not benefit to any degree near that of similar companies in highly industrialized centers of the east."

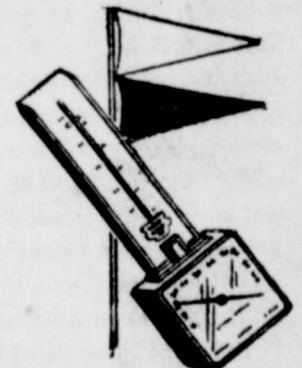

RUSSIA AND GERMANY

When the world first learned of the "nonaggression" pact between Germany and Russia, diplomatic experts explained Russia's action as a move by Josef Stalin to secure his western frontier from at-

tack by the Nazis.

Stalin, it was said, was primarily interested in expansion in Asia and, freed of the menace of German attack in the west, would withdraw from active participation in European affairs.

With the partition of Poland, however, it is evident that Russia is more involved in central and eastern Europe than at any time since the advent of the Bolshevik government. Far from withdrawing from Europe, Russia today shares a common frontier with Nazi Germany, which rules over Slavs in Czecho and Slovakia and with Hungary and Rumania.

Delineation of the new German-Russian border, resulting from the Polish partition, is definitely advantageous to the spread of Russian political and racial doctrines in the Slavic states of Central Europe, including Hungary, Rumania and what was formerly Czecho-Slovakia.

The new border begins on the north at the East Prussian frontier and continues southwest to the eastern suburbs of Warsaw. From Warsaw the line runs southeast to the point where the river San crosses what was once the frontier of the Czech-Slovak republic.

A glance at the map of Eastern Europe will reveal these results as accruing to Russia from the establishment of the new frontier: First, Russian armies are now in a position to prevent German penetration of the Baltic states, which belonged to Russia in pre-war days; second, Russian armies are in a strategic position to cut Hitler off from Hungary, which succumbed to Communism for a brief period under Bela Kun after the collapse of the old Austro-Hungarian Empire and which is peopled by fellow Slavs; fourth, Stalin now may assist the Slavs of Czecho-Slovakia in an uprising if he desires to embarrass Hitler.

Thus, it may be seen that Hitler and Stalin have in reality divided central and eastern Europe between them, with the partition of Poland and the destruction of Czecho-Slovakia as mere parts of a general plan of division. The Baltic states are likely to fall to Russia in the near future, and Hungary and Rumania may be partitioned as was Poland.

Geographically and racially, German and Russian hegemony in central and eastern Europe is natural. East of the Rhine and north of the Brenner Pass lie the hordes of Teutons who stormed the strongholds of ancient Rome and the equally numerous Slavs who marched in centuries ago from the broad steppes of Asia.

This hegemony would not be challenged by Great Britain and France now if the Germans had been content to establish a Teutonic state made up only of Germans.

If Hitler and Stalin succeed in establishing their dominion over all of central and eastern Europe, what then? Can two great empires, each with territorial and ideological expansion as a prime political principle, each ethnically and historically antagonistic to the other, live side by side in peace?

History reveals that in the case of the Teutons and the Slavs they can not. The Teutons have struggled for centuries to gain mastery over the Slavs, whom they consider an inferior people.

Germany and Russia will inevitably clash over trade, the question of racial supremacy and their opposing political ideologies. Russia's friendship with Turkey, plus her new western frontier contacts, will aid her in counteracting German expansion in the Balkans, peopled by Slavs whom the late Russian Czar championed as brothers of the "great" White Rus-

sian race.

If Russia succeeds in again awakening the race consciousness of the Slavs of central and south-eastern Europe, Germany will be challenged in her domination over the provinces of Czecho-Slovakia.

Thus the problem of establishing a lasting peace in Europe is not one of concern only to Great Britain and France, which seek among other war objectives to reconstitute Poland as a political entity. But the problem of peace in this region is also one for Germany and Russia to solve if they are to live peaceably side by side and digest the spoils of the Polish conquest and partition.

Central Europe is a hodgepodge of conglomerate peoples with Teutons and Slavs inextricably mixed and with animosities often existing among fellow races, as, for example, the Poles and Ukrainians.

Poland itself was a synthetic state with minorities which were persecuted as harshly as the Jews in Germany. Ukrainians in Poland were subject to terrorism and persecution equal to that imposed upon the Poles in pre-war days by the Czar's Cossacks.

The Allies will not make the diplomatic blunder of parring Germany and Russia against one another while the two dictators are still on friendly terms. As long as Russia and Germany are working in conjunction, they constitute a serious menace to the empires of Great Britain and France.

Possibility of a concerted attack by Russia, Germany, Italy

and Japan against territories of the democracies on three continents—Europe, Africa and Asia—is a nightmare which haunts the statesmen of both the Allied powers.

Who knows but that the partition of Poland was but a prelude to a Russian attack upon India, seizure of Australia and New Zealand by the Japanese, and a joint German-Italian attack upon North Africa and the Suez Canal?

After the "rapprochement" between Russia and Germany, will anyone say that this eventuality is an impossibility?

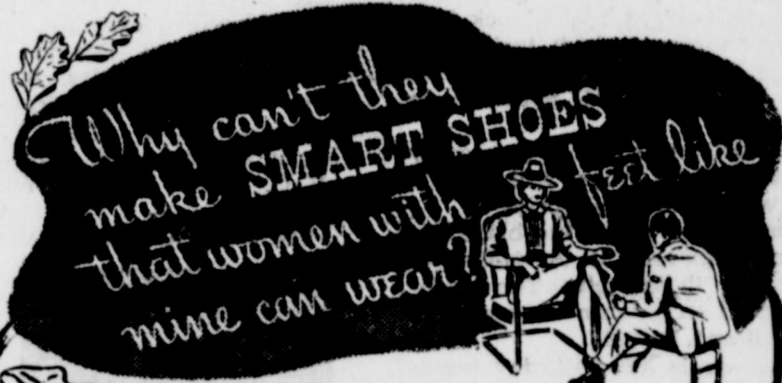

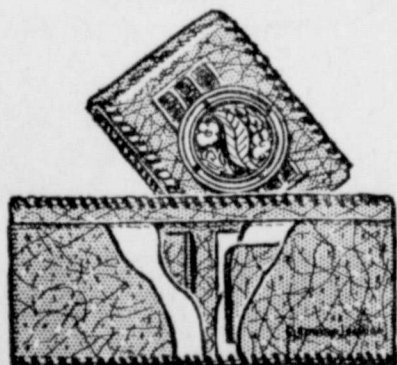

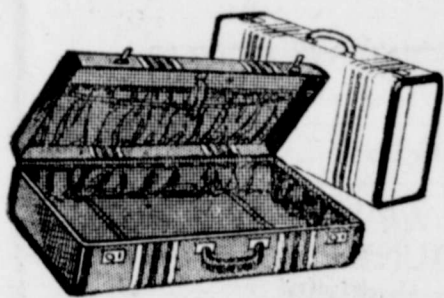

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SPECTACULAR OIL WELL FIRES IN "BLACKMAIL" HAIR-RAISING CLIMAX

Something new in screen thrills is presented in the spectacular oil well fire sequence of "Blackmail," thrill-packed drama of a man's revenge, which opens Thursday on the Palace screen with Edward G. Robinson starred.

Declared to be the first time an oil well fire has ever been used to supply background thrills for a dramatic screen climax, the sequence in "Blackmail" presented such a spectacular sight at night that hundreds watched it from

opposite direction.

In each instance gasoline was piped from compression tanks five hundred feet underground to the huge pit that was to be the oil well fire. Here it was controlled by a valve, and a pilot light was used to ignite the gasoline whenever Director H. C. Potter was ready to shoot. It worked just like a gas stove at home.

With a rear the fire would leap skyward, one hundred and fifty feet into the air. It could be seen for miles around. Devouring gasoline at the rate of three hundred gallons a minute, the two oil well fires in "Blackmail" used a total

their homes and from the fields and hills back of the studio property. Many rushed up in motor cars in the belief that one of the three hundred working wells in a nearby oil field had caught fire.

Four "wells" were constructed for the first fire, with some three hundred Baldwin Hills oilfield derricks serving as "extras" in the background. The second fire was to be a "wildcat" oil well, so no oilfield background was required and construction took place several hundred yards away with the cameras this time pointing in the

of more than 12,000 gallons.

More than five hundred explosions sent gushers of dirt rock and dense black smoke into the air, while within the glow of the fire the experienced oil well shooters from Santa Fe Springs worked with Edward G. Robinson and Guinn Williams in asbestos suits, special helmets and shoes in their perilous work of dynamiting the fire. A little farther away two engine companies from the Los Angeles and Culver City fire departments played six streams of water over the "fire eaters".

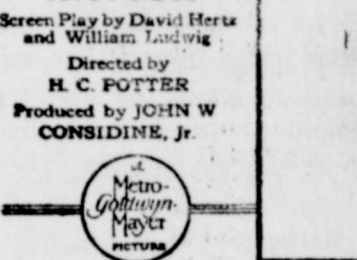

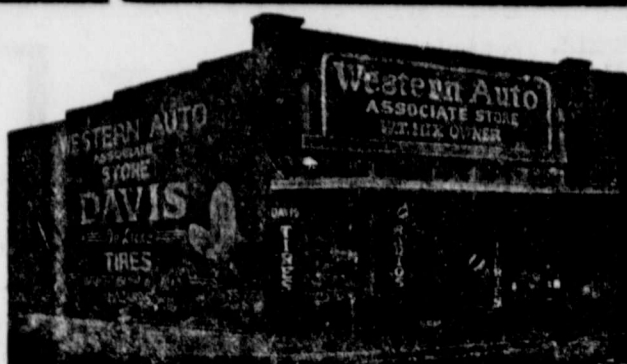

STATE FINANCES

The next regular session of the Legislature will be faced with a general revenue fund deficit of \$38,000,000, in addition to obligations to the teachers' retirement and other social security funds amounting to an additional \$20,000,000. This will bring the total to \$58,000,000, for which the Legislature should find revenue after it has made routine appropriations for the state departments and eleemosynary and educational institutions. Of course, the Legislature could pass up the issue again as the last several sessions have done, but the total of overdue obligations is becoming so great that the time is not far distant when the credit and reputation of the state will be impaired unless facts are faced. That is the point made by Alonzo Wasson, correspondent of The News, in his review of the situation.

Hitherto, the deficit has been passed up each year on the plea that, after all, Texas is a large and rich state amply able to take care of the deficit. But \$58,000,000 amounts to \$9.80 per capita, or about \$40 per family. This begins to be a telling obligation, especially in view of the numerous other state, local and national demands for revenue. If the next Legislature ignores this deficit and attempts to play politics by increasing the appropriations for routine purposes, as has been done in recent years, the following regular session will be faced by a deficit of \$65,000,000 or \$75,000,000.

Annual state expenditures have jumped from \$33,498,724.83 in 1920, when the index of cost of living was very high, to approximately \$175,000,000 for the current year, with the cost of living not much more than 50 per cent of the index of 1920. With a record increase in annual expenditures like this, and with the prospect of a rapid increase in the index of cost of living, which will be reflected promptly in rising government costs, it is no time to neglect deficits of the order of \$60,000,000. Straightening out the situation should be the principal issue before the next session of the Legislature.—The Dallas Morning News.

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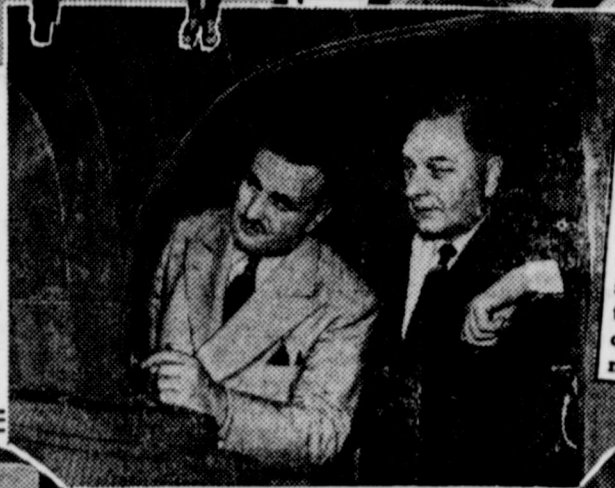

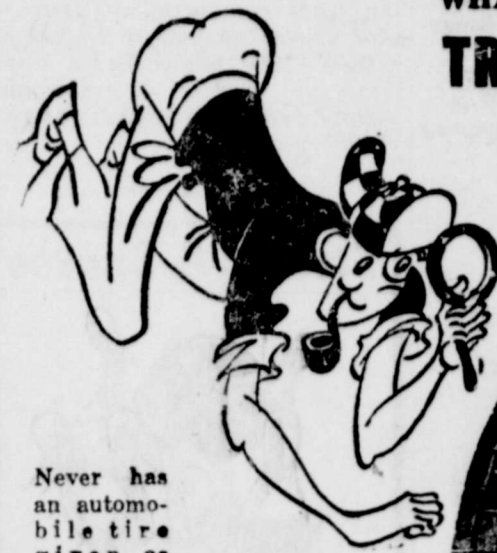

M. E. Home 13, Hornets 0, In Opening Of 1939 Football

HOME SCORES TWO IN FINAL PERIOD: ONE IS RETURNED PUNT

Those hardworking, properly timed, "jabbing" punches by the dandy little Methodist Home 1939 Football Squad won another battle Friday night, from the non-synchronized, but heavier Gatesville Hornets, to the tune of 13 to 0.

One of the best parts of the game is that it was a "non-conference" game, and gives Coach Earle Worley a chance to "plug" some of the cracks, and, gives the hometown boys a taste of the real thing, which many of them didn't have before the opening whistle, Friday night. About 1,000 saw the opener.

Outstanding for the Hornets, were Sexton, center, Jackson, and the other nine. There was nothing the matter with them. Two places, which probably most fans were worrying, the ends, Moore and Hodges, showed well at times, and were better on offense than on defense. Reserves, Sydow and Oldham, replaced Ward, who started, but who did well, anyway. Wittie, Gribble, other linemen played headup. Worley used Culberson and Foster as substitutes in the backfield, but the Hornet running plays, without proper blocking didn't do so hot. Jones, was not consistent in punting, but lacked support, and the hard charging Home line made his work more ineffective. Kirkpatrick and Whigham, looked good, but coordination will make them all look better. Fans generally, should be pleased with the Hornets debut.

Now for the Home. The team played so much as a unit, there were no outstanding stars, with the probably exception of Compton, Terry and Foster in the backfield. "The Kids" did all that was expected of them, in the usual efficient manner, which makes these boys take home, many scalps that they should not, otherwise, due to their light weight. It is a great little team.

Now, here's the play-by-play:

Hornets kicked, Jackson holding, Jones kicking, ball goes to 15 yard line, and is advanced to 32, Terry carrying. Terry carried, picked up 2 stopped by left side of line. Terry carries ball, is downed by Whigham, after making 4 yds. On punt formation, a high kick goes to Jackson on 15 and he returns to the 21 yard line, taken in by Gann. The punt went 40 yards.

Kent tore his pants, and time was taken out. Hornets ball. Jackson, on wide end run, picked up 2 losing 2 yards, stopped Parks, Jones, on next play, punted to Terry to the Home 40, and was stopped by Jackson.

Gribble, center, stops next play for no gain. Smith, with whole line in front of him, made 1 yard, stopped by Rt. side of line. Next play, fake spinner, picks up 1 yard. Foster, of Home, kicked nicely from 50 to 20 yd. line out of bounds.

Spinner, with Kirk carrying, makes half yard around left side. Jackson, on cross play thru center picked up 2 yards. Jones, punts, from 10 to 20, and is stopped on 30. Smith carried, stopped by Whigham. Terry carried on a fake thru C. and made a yard. Next play, Foster, carrying, makes one half yard. Next play is stopped by Hodges, after play on his end. Foster punts and is killed on 28 by Bennett for Home.

Jones, thru guard, makes 3 yards Whigham picked up a half on next play over Rt. guard. Jones punts from 20, ball is fumbled,

and recovered by Home, after losing 8 yards, ball going to the 15 yard. Pool goes in for Parks at L.G. Terry is stopped by Ward, for 1 yard loss. Compton, on Rt. end play is stopped by Ward, and Wittie. Terry, attempting to go over LS is stopped after 1 yd. Kicks high to Jackson, who is downed by Bennett on 37 yard line.

Jackson, makes 9 yards over left tackle, Jackson over rt. tackle make 2, stopped by Poole. Kirk makes 1 yard and first down, the first one of the game.

With Jackson back, fumbles, recovered by Woods, J, on Hornets 41 yard line.

Terry, fails to gain, stopped by Wittie. Foster, met the Hornets iron wall, for a 6 inch gain. Terry, is taken in by Ward, after a half yard gain. Foster, punts, Jackson takes on the 10 and returns to the 17. The kick went 25 yards.

Jones, punts to the 45, Moore takes Foster in for only a 2 yard gain. Terry, on a long end run, is stopped by Kirk after gaining about a half yard. Wittie stops Compton in tracks for no gain. Terry fumbles momentarily, and recovers for five yard loss. Foster punts to Jackson, who is given protection by Kirk, and picks up 3 yards to the 31 yard line.

Jackson shovels, to Whigham who picks up 4. Jackson passes to Kirk, who picks up only two yards, as quarter ends. Hornets 0, Home 0.

Second Quarter

Jones punts to the 25 yard line where the ball is killed by Moore. Penalty for clipping, gives ball to Hornets after 15 yard penalty. Foster drops 2 on left end sweep. Jackson hits rt. tackle for no gain. Foster drops 2 yards thru center. Jones, punts out on 5 yard line. Gann goes back in.

Foster punts a low wobbly punt to the 45, and Jackson picks up 5 to the 40. Foster fails on a rt end run. Jackson, spins, turns, and plunges, making 2. Jackson completes bullet pass to Moore, over C. making 1st down on the 28 yard line. Jackson, passes, again, ball is knocked down incomplete. Shovel pass by Jackson is blocked. Jackson passes incomplete to Moore, with 4th coming up. Jackson, durnit, passes again and is blocked by Gann, ball goes to Home on 27.

Foster fakes kick, makes 3 around R end, stopped by Gribble. Terry, fails to gain but 1 yd. around rt. end. Compton is topped at rt. end for no gain. Foster punts to Jackson and rolls over the goal, and is brought out to the 20 yd. line.

On a fake punt, Jones made 1 yard over rt tackle. Jones punts sideways out on the 35. Culberson for Foster. Sexton really stops Terry, for no gain, Terry getting the wind knocked out of him. Home is penalized 5 yards, too much time. Terry passes to Smith, who drops the ball. Hornets lose 5, off side. Terry, attempting to pass is smothered for an 8 yard loss. Terry, on another fake pass, is stopped by Moore and Gribble. Foster punts, ball going over goal. Hornets ball on the 20.

Whigham, the short man, picks up 7 thru line. Foster, faking punt. Kirk back, goes over rt. tackle for 2 yards. Another fake kick, Jones makes 2 more. Jones punts nicely from 15, and JONES kills ball on the 47 yard line, Home's.

Foster picked up 5 to his own 45. Terry, faking to Foster, makes a half. Terry passes, is nearly complete, but Whigham won't let him catch it. Home coach says interference. Foster punts short, but out of bounds on the 3 yard line.

Now, we won't predict yet, we missed our first one, so what's the use!

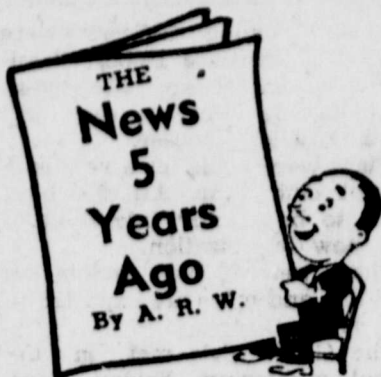

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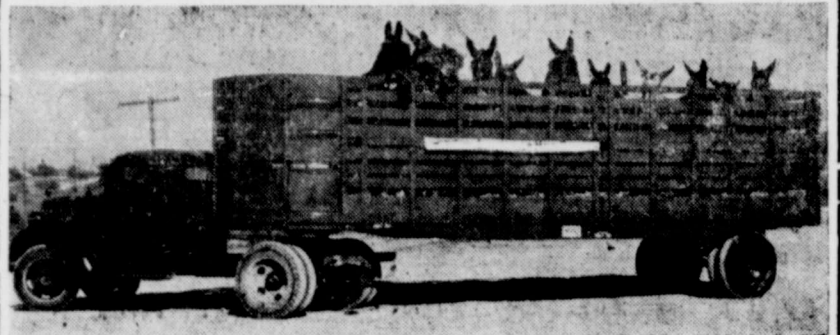
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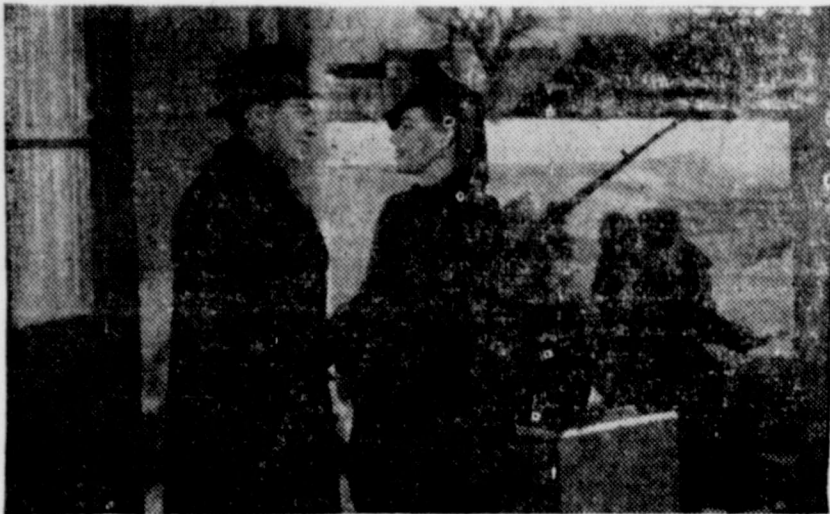
