Patsy worked with the Recreation Action group whose task was to plan, decorate, and conduct the parties which were held.

The action groups also had leaders and apprentice leaders assigned who were there to involve the group members in the particular function of that committee. Bobby was the Apprentice Leader for the Group Living action group and was presented with the problem of involving the rest of the 14-member committee in planning and conducting the flag raising ceremonies, refreshments during the breaks, and free time activities such as horseshoes and washers.

National Guard Units to Depart Sunday for Drill

The Eastland and Stephens County units of the Texas National Guard will leave from the Armory in Cisco at 9 a. m. Sunday, June 23, for North Fort Hood to spend two weeks on active duty for training.

The two units compose Battery B of the 2nd Battalion, 131st Artillery, 36th Infantry Division with Captain Winford Hogan of Clyde as the commanding officer with his headquarters at Breckenridge. First Lt. Richard R. Cook of Abilene is Armory commander in Cisco.

Plans call for the Breckenridge unit to rendezvous at the Cisco Armory at 8:30 a. m. Sunday and for the two to leave in formation 30 minutes later. Arrangements for the local unit's departure are in charge of S/Sgt. William S. Kendall, administrative officer.

It has been announced that a feature of the 14-day active duty tour this year will be 32 hours of Riot Control Training in addition to the normal training on crew serve weapons, howitzer section training, care and handling of ammunition, communications, and fire direction control.

The battery will draw six new M-109 155mm Howitzers and 1,000 rounds of ammunition from the regular Army for field training the second week of their stay at North Fort Hood. Sgt. Kendall reported.
