3-Death Wreck Checked

Investigation continued Wednesday in the aftermath of a crushing head-on collision which killed 3 persons and critically injured a fourth.

One of the cars was reported traveling wrong-way on Interstate 20.

The two-car crash at approximately 1:45 a.m. killed Lawrence Kelly, 21 and his 17-year-old wife, Barbara, of Westbrook, and Eddie Wayne Hogue, 22, of Colorado City, driver of a 1962 Chevrolet sedan in which the trio were traveling.

Critically hurt was Alex Rocha, 18, of Colorado City, who State Highway Patrolman, Randy Wilkinson, said was alone in a 1961 Chevrolet sedan.

Impact of the crash killed Hogue and the Kelly couple instantly, trapping all 4 persons in the two cars.

City Council Still Without Candidates

A third candidate filed for a ballot place in the Colorado Independent School District April trustee election.

There was a scarcity of candidates for Colorado City Council's upcoming election which will decide 4 council positions.

Not a person had officially filed at City Hall Wednesday.

Edward Roach, well-known

farmer in the Payne area, is the third school board candidate.

He joins 2 incumbents--Dr. W. J. (Dub) Waldrip and Jeff Taylor. Both Waldrip and Taylor signed applications for ballot places immediately after the school board officially set April 6 election date.

Roach is a leader in the county's agricultural industry and serves on the Mitchell County Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service Committee which administers various farm programs at the local level.

He is a Sunday School Superintendent in Calvary Baptist Church here.

He and Mrs. Roach are the parents of two school-age children--Kelley, a daughter in Hutchinson Elementary, and Ty,

Terms for 4 City Council

places now held by Mayor Mike Burt, Councilmen J. C. Brown, J. C. Britton and Frank Brown--field expire in April.

None of the four have filed for a ballot place. One of quarter, Brownfield, was appointed to fill a vacancy created by the recent appointment of Paul B. Hunter to County Commis-

sioner, Precinct 1. If he becomes a candidate--and he indicated when accepting the appointment to Hunter's remaining term--he would seek an elective term--it will be his first election experience.

Deadline for filing for ballot places are March 3 for school board and March 6 for council.

Raymond Hackfeld has filed for re-election in Loraine school trustee election that will decide 2 places on the board.

Four places are up for voter decision on the Loraine City Council. Two of incumbents have filed for ballot places.

Candidates for re-election are the mayor, Dr. Bruce Johnson, and J. C. Hall. Terms of two other councilmen expire in April but neither of them--Bill F. Scarber and Royce Beights--have filed for re-election.

In Westbrook 2 school board members have filed for re-election.

They are David Anderson, employee of Union Texas Petroleum and life-long resident of Westbrook, and Cleburne Rich, employee of Standard Oil Company of Texas and also a life-long resident of the community.

No other candidates have filed for the 2 places which will be decided in the April voting.

Saturday's relays will open at 9:30 a.m. with finals in pole vault and discus. Preliminaries will follow at 10:10 a.m. for 120-yard high hurdles; 10:30 a.m. for 100-yard dash; 10:45 a.m. for 440-yard dash; 11 a.m. for 330 intermediate hurdles; 11:25 a.m. for 220-yard dash.

He's Top College Alumnus

A Colorado High graduate has received the 1971 Outstanding Alumnus Award at Lubbock Christian College.

F. Dale Simpson, 49, who was class favorite of his 1938 senior class, was honored during homecoming ceremonies at the Lubbock college Saturday.

A native of Colorado City, he is son of Mrs. Charles Simpson and the late Mr. Simpson.

Simpson, who lives with his family in Lubbock, enrolled in Lubbock Christian in 1958 but his work with the college development office took him out of the classrooms.

He has been in development since that time with the exception of one year of full-time preaching in Andrews. His academic study was completed at LCC in 1968.

The outstanding alumnus is the nephew of the late Ery Simpson. His mother was the former Helen Bassham.

In Colorado High he was a

guard on the Wolf football team and was assigned most of the kicking chores. He was an honor student and participated in school drama activities.

His first college study was at Abilene Christian College. However, he left college to

After military service Simpson was associated with Gorman Engineering Company of El Paso, serving as a field representative for 6 years and as vice president of the company in Albuquerque, N. M., for 7 years.

Dad Guilty * 7-Year Term 'Closes' Big Pipe Theft Case

A 7-year prison term in 32nd District Court probably has closed the case of one of Mitchell County's largest oil field thefts.

Two of the men charged in the local case are now behind bars and the third is on probation from a 5-year prison sentence.

The gang, which includes a father and son team, operated in other area of West Texas as well as the Mitchell County fields.

Jessie Byrd Davis was sentenced to 7 years in the state penitentiary by District Judge Wayland B. Holt of Snyder, who

replaced 32nd District Judge Weldon Kirk during the trial.

Kirk disqualified himself from the trial because he was district attorney when grand jury indictments were returned last year against Davis and his son, Jimmy Davis, and Clifford Boyd Raper.

The trial was a "first" for District Attorney Frank Ginzell, who took office Jan. 1--his first felony prosecution resulting in a prison sentence.

Davis, the dad, pleaded guilty to hauling away 189 joints of 2 3/8ths-inch tubing and 147 joints of new 2 7/8ths-inch tu-

bings last Jan. 22 from American Petrofina property near Westbrook.

Raper last April pleaded guilty also and received a 5-year prison term which was probated on condition of good behavior. His lesser sentence resulted when it was established he was principally a truck driver while the Davis father-son team were the leaders in the crime.

It is doubtful if the son, Jimmy Davis, will ever come to trial here in the case. He is now in Alabama under a 4-year federal sentence for transporting inter-state a stolen motor vehicle. Heavy expense invol-

ved in returning the defendant to West Texas, in lieu of the federal term, may not be practical.

Mitchell County Sheriff Department officers, Texas Rangers, other West Texas officers and Oklahoma State police combined in team work that solved the pipe theft in less than a week.

One of the Davises and Raper were apprehended first in Oklahoma when one of the trucks broke down loaded with stolen pipe. The other truck reached Oklahoma City and was unloaded. Arrest of the third defendant came later.

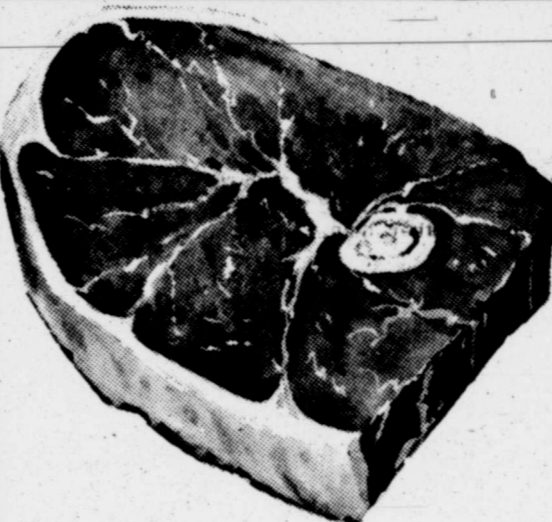

WHAT in the world makes this "World of Aggravation" to your way of thinking?

Zipperers that get stuck up have been known to drive the human race in this era of civilization to distraction. A plague on the person who first put zipperes in the back of tight-fitting dresses!

Drivers who park on the bias so that three spaces are unavailable for other would-be-parkers can aggravate the kindest heart.

People who get mad and sound cross when you answer the wrong number they have dialed can ruin a perfect day.

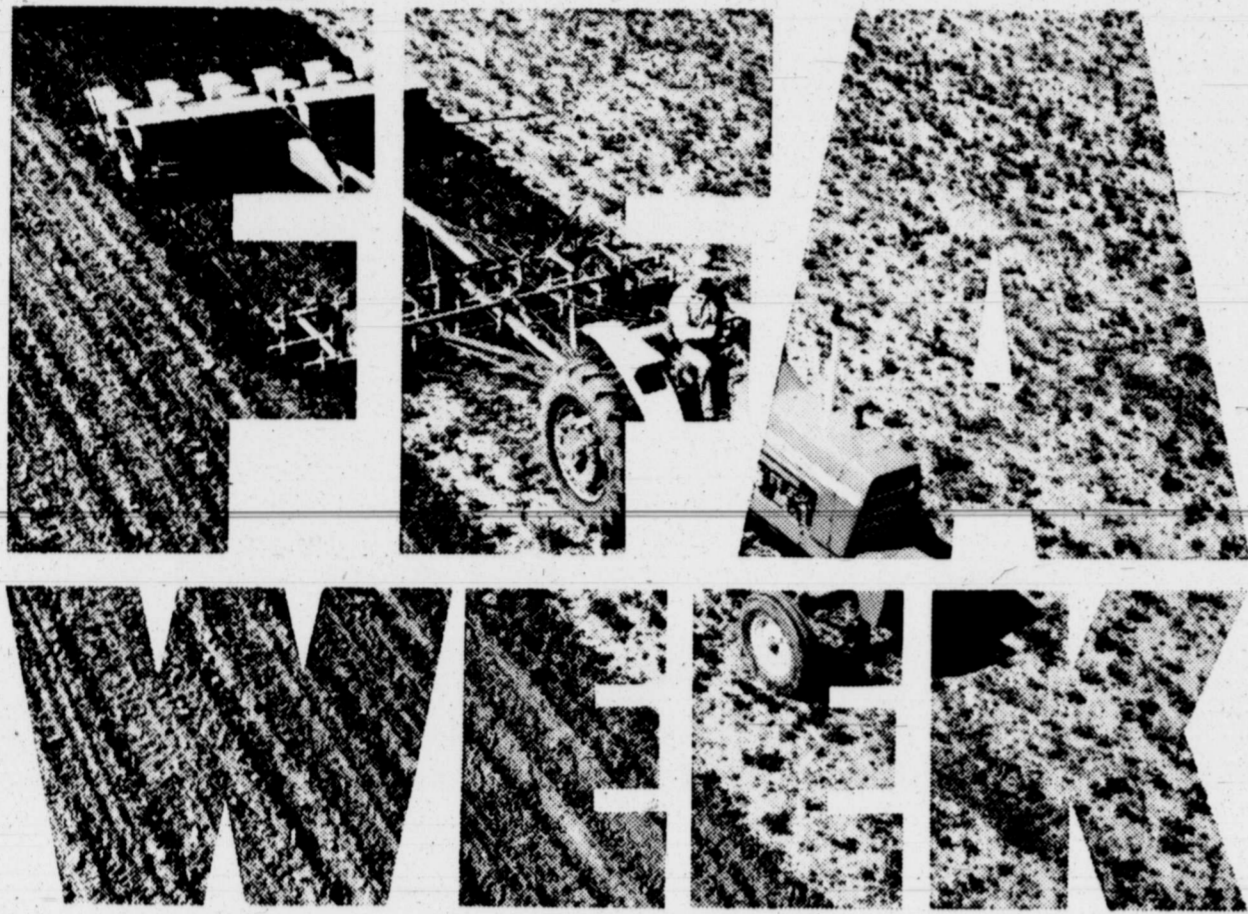
