In letter to counsel...

Injunction denied

Judge Weldon Kirk has denied the temporary injunction requested by 25 Mitchell County residents of the Westbrook area in a letter received by counsel on Friday.

Westbrook Superintendent Sonny Hollis said that he was disappointed in the Judge's ruling and that the case would be appealed.

Peter Kennedy of the firm Graves, Dougherty, Hearon and Moody of Austin, the firm that represented the 25 residents of the Westbrook area, said that the case

will be appealed directly to the Texas Supreme Court and that he expects the case to be heard by the Court sometime this fall.

Judge Weldon Kirk presided over the hearing on the case which was held in the 32nd Judicial District Court.

Due to the letter being sent to counsel, it is predicted that Judge Kirk will enter his official decision into the Court records sometime this next week.

School prayer halted in Colorado schools

The once a week moment of prayer -- traditionally led by the Chaplain of the Student Council -- following announcements at the Colorado High School has been halted on the advice of the Texas Association of School Boards (TASB).

Colorado Independent School District Superintendent, Don Nimmo, said that the practise of offering a prayer -- because it can be considered 'compulsory' -- is against the law, according to legal

advice of the TASB.

The ruling in the Supreme Court case of Wallace versus Jaffree declared that "... endorsement of prayer activities at the beginning of each school day is not consistent with the established principle that the government must pursue a course of complete neutrality toward religion."

This ruling has now affected the Colorado High School.

Ishmael Jaffree, the parent of

Coahoma man charged with DWI

Charges were filed Friday against a Coahoma man who was intoxicated and travelling east in the westbound traffic lane of interstate 20.

County Attorney Clay Strange said that charges have been filed against Marlon Wayne Hays, 62, for driving while under the influence of alcohol.

Department of Public Safety (DPS) reports indicate that officers were called to a site approximately 7 miles west of Westbrook -- in the area known as Rattlesnake Gap -- at approximately 1:45 a.m. on July 16.

Three eighteen wheeler trucks had surrounded the Hays vehicle and forced him to stop.

One of the tractor-trailer operators had taken away the keys to the Hays vehicle while they waited for DPS officers to arrive on the scene.

Hays was arrested and

"Focus Survey" grant could aid development

Senator Temple Dickson's 'Strike Force' team of state agency representatives returned Thursday to Colorado City to meet with community leaders concerning a grant to fund a focus survey for Mitchell County.

Ted Sellers, administrative assistant to Senator Temple Dickson, served as team leader for the state agency visit and as moderator for the meeting.

"I want you [Mitchell County] to win and come out as a vibrant community," Sellers said.

"I don't have anything else to do but see that economic development in Mitchell County succeeds," he said.

"Senator Dickson sent me to Colorado City because of his

support for economic growth in Mitchell County," Sellers said, "and State Representative Rob Junell feels the same way, he sent two members of his staff because of the support he has for economic growth in Mitchell County."

"We're here to decide whether you want to pursue an application to access state funds for the purpose of going forward with a planning grant," Sellers told the community leaders.

"This is an important time for Mitchell County," Sellers said. "What takes place in the next 12 months will take a lot of work, but it could have an effect on the next 30 to 40 years."

The application for a planning survey will try to access a grant

which could be for up to \$30,000 for the use of funding a planning document to be used by Mitchell County as an aide in building up economic development.

"The end result is a tool which can challenge and provide an instrument for growth and development in Mitchell County," Sellers said.

"If we don't do something about bringing some of the business that goes to the big cities," he noted, "Mitchell County will die."

"We're excited to see you excited," Kathy Mayfield, Texas Department of Commerce, told those in attendance.

Mayfield said that one of the top

Budget workshop held

An effective tax rate of \$1.08 was presented to the trustees of the Colorado Independent School District as budget workshops for the school systems began.

Geneva Findley, business manager, presented the trustees with the calculations necessary to arrive at the effective rate -- the rate which would result in the same amount of tax dollars being collected as last year with a tax base that declined.

She noted that the rollback amount of \$1.11 is the amount that Colorado ISD taxes could rise to without a required public hearing on

the tax rate. These figures, however, are of little significance with the recent changes to the Texas system of school finance.

Findley said that the Colorado ISD rollback amount under the County Education District (CED) plan will be 46 cents.

The Mitchell CED board will be in charge of setting a tax rate to meet the state funding requirement -- an amount established for next year by multiplying last year's tax roll times 72 cents.

The Mitchell CED and Colorado

ISD rates, when combined will equate to school tax.

Board members began to go through the school administrators proposals by line item at the meeting.

The trustees will meet at 7 p.m. on Monday, August 26 for another budget workshop.

School board president Dwayne Harris and trustees Dr. Billy Bruce Bridgford, Kathy Bassham, Floyd Lee Ritchey, Anita Biggers, Yolanda Molina and Larry Blasingame were all in attendance at the called meeting.

The other 6 indictments returned by the Grand Jury were sealed.

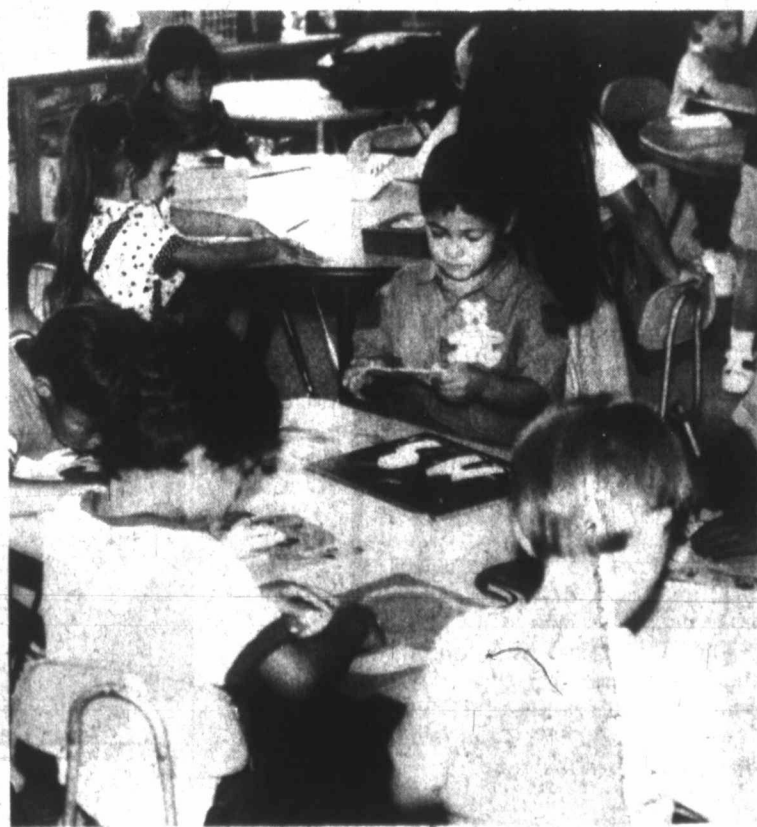

Dallas was indicted for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. He had been arrested in connection with the disappearance of a pickup on July 23 that was later discovered in Scurry County.

Dist Jury Cancelled

The jury called to appear in District Court on Monday, August 26 has been cancelled.

INJUNCTION

The suit filed by the 25 Mitchell County residents of the Westbrook area claimed that Senate Bill 351, which set forth the guidelines and establishment of the County Education Districts (CED), to be unconstitutional.

Kennedy, in an interview Friday evening, said that the letter sent to counsel by Judge Weldon Kirk is not as specific as the order that he will present sometime within the next week.

Judge Kirk denied the request for a temporary injunction, Kennedy said.

The letter to counsel also denied the plea and abatement that was requested by the Attorney General's office, Kennedy noted.

The decision that will be given to the Court will include the reasoning behind the decision that Judge Kirk used in deciding the case, Kennedy noted.

Jim George, Jr. of the firm Graves, Dougherty, Heaton and Moody of Austin, told Judge Kirk during the case that "taxpayer rights have been taken away" and asked the court to place a temporary injunction on the assessing, levying and collecting functions of the Mitchell County Education District in regards to the 25

taxpayers who are participating in the suit.

"It's a state tax," George said. "It uses disguises, but it is a state tax. The local government [Mitchell County Education District] has no functions, no schools, no teachers, no pupils."

George told the Court that it should be considered a state tax since the legislature was the one who said that their will be a tax, set the amount on the tax and decided how the funds are to be distributed.

The local government has no function except to collect taxes, George said.

Attorney's Toni Hunter, assistant Attorney General from Austin and Stephen Suttle, of McMahon, Suroviksuttle, Buhmann, Cobb and Hicks of Abilene, contested the points made in George's arguments.

"If it were a state tax," Suttle said, "it would be for the state and by the state."

He noted that the tax is constitutional and that the Texas Supreme Court has already said so.

Hunter said that "no one in Austin will come to collect the tax, that the money will not go to Austin and that the funds are paying for education in Mitchell County."

"The money is raised in Mitchell County, stays in Mitchell County and is used for education in Mitchell County," Hunter said. "And it has been proven constitutional."

Hunter said that Mitchell County students would be the ones harmed if an injunction were placed on the taxing authority of the Mitchell CED.

Every child should be guaranteed equal access to education funding, Hunter said. "What is unconstitutional is that Westbrook with a tax rate of 69 cents can raise almost \$7000 per student while Loraine has to tax at a rate of \$1.37 to raise approximately \$4000 per student."

Hunter and Suttle told Judge Kirk that the case before the Court has similar claims and an identity of issues with pending litigation in the Court system.

Hunter urged Judge Kirk to abate the case, noting that Senate Bill 351 has already been tested in Court, and will likely be heard by the Texas Supreme Court.

She added that action by the

32nd Judicial District could interfere with the actions of the Travis County Court.

"This suit isn't just about 24 people who pay approximately \$5000 in property tax," Hunter said, "and if it is, why should 24 people be able to effect the Texas Education System?"

George argued that the "people should be allowed to vote" as they have been guaranteed the right since the mid 1920's.

"An election is necessary before local taxes are imposed," George said. "Judge McCowan has fallen into error."

George also cited court cases of 1898 which set precedent that a taxpayer must begin to challenge an unconstitutional tax before it is levied -- "you must say that the scheme of taxation is unconstitutional" -- before it goes into effect.

George said that the case is not a class action suit trying to shut down the school systems, but that 25 taxpayers were "telling the Legislature that they did it wrong."

He had urged Judge Kirk to issue an injunction and use the "political courage" necessary to tell the Legislature that they did it wrong.

Hunter said that the suit brought against the Mitchell CED involves Senate Bill 351 and the House version, House Bill 2885.

She indicated that suits challenging the constitutionality of the Texas education system have been in court since the Edgewood litigation began in 1984.

On August 7, the Court ruled and found Senate Bill 351 constitutional, Hunter said.

Ruth Hollis, Westbrook Tax Collector, was called as a witness and provided information on the amount of tax change -- possibly from 67 cents last year to \$1.15 this year -- for taxpayers in the Westbrook ISD jurisdiction.

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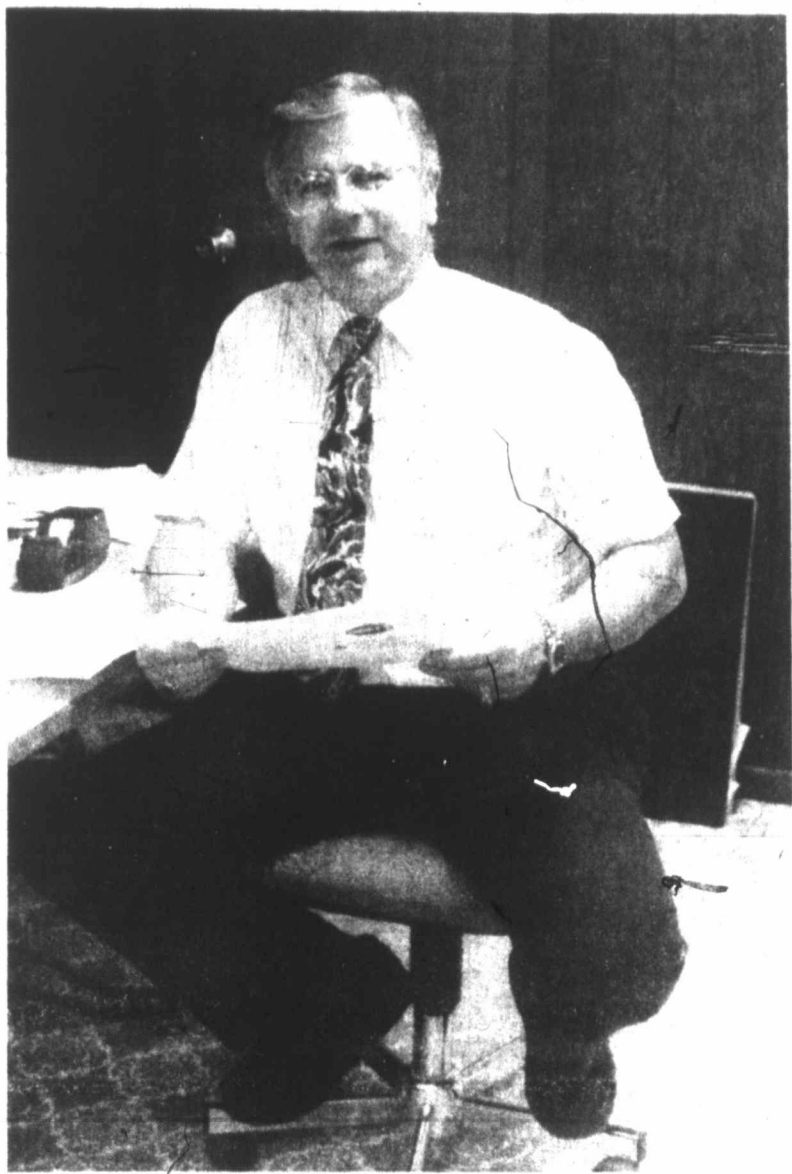

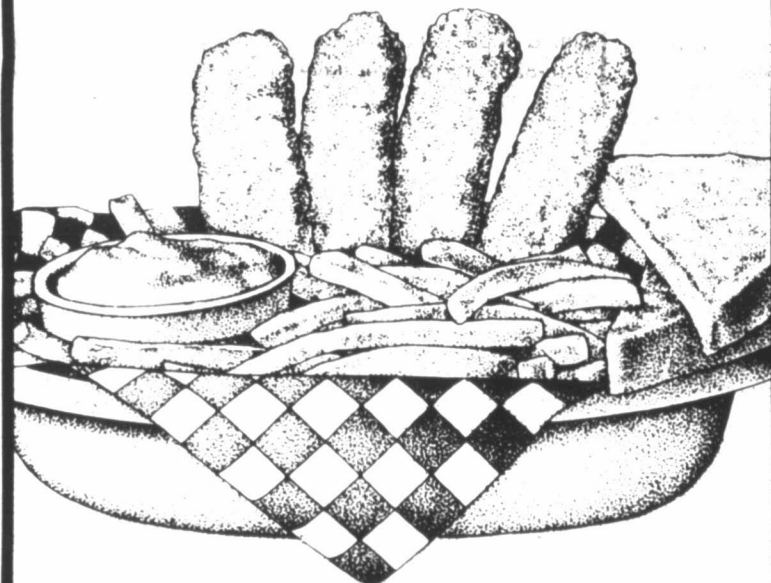

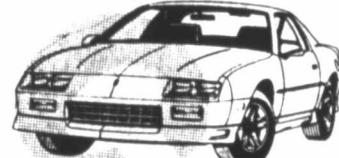

FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK

People must be more susceptible to buying things at night. That's bound to be the reason that advertising has changed and after midnight you can watch thirty minute commercials -- as if you haven't seen enough of them any other time.

I was up late one night a couple of weeks ago and I turned on the television while eating a late supper.

There wasn't anything on at the late hour, so I started to play a game with the remote control -- I try to change channels and keep from landing on commercials.

That night I lost in a hurry, I landed on a couple of the late night advertising shows. Then I found that there was nothing else on.

I watched a multitude of uses for a food processor being explained on one channel, magic soap on another, speed reading, drafting devices, power tools, kitchen knife sets, stock analyst systems and miracle diets all being explained to those who stayed up late enough to watch the show.

None of those attracted my attention enough to even keep me from changing channels, but I stopped on a commercial of a fitness machine that was guaranteed to get you in better shape than you've ever been in.

I sat watching as they showed how one machine -- that was supposed to be as portable as a briefcase -- could be changed with a few levers to provide a total body workout.

The toll free number kept appearing in the scroll at the bottom of the screen and I finally wrote it down as the presentation continued to explain the health benefits that just three twenty-minute workouts a week with the fitness equipment would provide.

I broke down -- I'm usually not taken in by television toll free numbers -- and called for the free brochure after they guaranteed that no salesman would be calling.

By the time it arrived in the mail I had almost forgotten about the late night call to the 24 hour operator.

I read through the glossy magazine they sent me which illustrated the machine being used in various positions to accommodate the various exercises.

The pictures were fabulous: the people working out on the equipment in the pamphlet were all built with gymnast proportions and were shown using the machine in what appeared to be a mansion.

I read the material and put it down. I knew everything about the machine; how effectively it worked, how compactly it stored, how easily it could be set up and how much more healthier and happier I would be if I bought one.

I decided that my life wouldn't be complete without one.

goals at the Commerce Department is economic development and noted that companies are looking to locate in Texas.

Don Cook, General Land Office, told of the land office's attitude of fostering economic development that is environmentally sound.

"The new term is -- sustainable development -- which relates to economic development that is well suited to the natural and human resources of the area," he said.

Cook noted that North America in the 20th century has focused on industrialized areas and wildlife areas and that development in the middle area is vague.

"Planning on this middle ground is now a priority at the land office," Cook said.

David Guarino, Texas Department of Agriculture, said that companies are interested in located in the southwest, especially the area from here to Los Angeles in the next decade because of the free trade agreement with Mexico.

He noted that the urban areas with the economic infrastructure are going to disproportionately receive the influx, but there are options for economic development in rural Texas.

Sellers told the group that two public meetings needed to be held as part of the application process for the grant.

City manager Buddy Foster was appointed to go to Austin with Ardis Gaiter of Sweetwater, to gather more information on the bid process from the Department of Commerce before Saturday's meeting.

"Economic development means business: either creating new or building up existing business," he said.

Foster said that he had seen plans which were just compilations of statistics and that he wanted the County to aim for detailed plans, specific recommendations and a structure that can be used to influence economic growth in Mitchell County.

The task force that came to Colorado City was composed of Sellers, Mayfield, Cook, Guarino, Gaiter, Robert Lemons and Dorothy Shertleff representing Representative Rob Junell, George Harrell representing Representative David Counts, Jennifer Thompson of the General Land Office and Tony Ferlet and Gary Spaulding of Texas State Technical College.
