## Trash pickup list forming

It's still not too early to get your name on the list for trash pick-up during the city's annual cleanup week set for May 3-8.

You must inform the city and get on the list for excess trash to be picked up during this special week. The city will haul off old appliances - washers, dryers, televisions, refrigerators - anything too bulky to haul off yourself.

However, if you can haul your own large trash accumulations, fees will be waived for this week only at the dump ground.

Materials that are normally not acceptable at the dump will not be accepted during this time either.

## Westbrook ISD again petitions Education Agency

Westbrook ISD -through the law firm of George, Donaldson & Ford of Austin - has again petitioned the Commissioner of Education for a hearing on some \$73,000 in disputed Mitchell County Education District (MCED) funds that they say is owed them by the MCED.

Commissioner of Education, Skip Meno ruled in January that Westbrook was not entitled to that amount of funds for this school year due to the fact they were overpaid during the 1991-92 school year. The overpayment came as a result of a drop in enrollment in the Westbrook school district.

When Meno made the ruling in January, a hearing for a temporary injunction against the MCED was cancelled in the 32nd District Court here.

In Westbrook's earlier filings only the MCED was listed as a party but in the latest petition, attorney R. James George also lists the Colorado ISD and the Loraine ISD. Westbrook ISD had filed a Motion for Rehearing after Meno ruled against them but they are asking the Commissioner to withdraw that Motion at the time the present matter is accepted and docketed for hearing.

Karen Crumbling, administrative secretary in the Office of Legal Services said Tuesday that the latest motion had not been docketed. She said the Texas Education Agency had not received a response from the Colorado ISD or Loraine ISD on the latest petition.

Each of the districts had 30 days from the filing of the petition on March 11 to respond.

Crumbling said if the responses are received in the next couple of weeks, then it would be sometime in July when the hearing would be scheduled due to a full calendar until then.

George - in his petition to the Commissioner - said "the issue which must be resolved is whether the Mitchell County Education

District can make a claim upon WISD current year available school funds for an alleged indebtedness from the preceding school year. Article III of the Texas Constitution prohibits the trustees and the school district from paying or authorizing payment of any claim made without authority of law."

The petition also stated that "a long line of cases and other authorities apply this restriction to school districts by prohibiting payment of debts incurred in one school year from funds of the following year."

The relief sought by WISD includes the Commissioner of Education waiving any requirement that WISD pay the alleged "overpayment," and order the Mitchell County Education District, and any other party, to cease efforts to collect funds from current school revenues of Westbrook ISD in satisfaction of the disputed debt from a prior school year and the Commissioner order the MCED to pay the full amount of the accrued funds, together with any other funds to which WISD is entitled.

In a letter to Crumbling dated March 16, attorney George said the TEA should not docket the upcoming appeal "as an appeal from a decision regarding a funding formula as it is our position that the funding formulas for the 1991-92 school year and the 1992-93 school years were set appropriately by the MCED but that the MCED attempted to recoup overpayment for the '91-92 school years in an illegal manner by an offset for the '92-93 school year."

George stated this is a violation of the Constitution of the State of Texas and other applicable authorities.

George's letter to Crumbling went on to say that "this is simply a dispute about an alleged debt and the method of collecting it."

## Grants available for homeowners

People for Progress, Inc. (PPI) of Sweetwater has been awarded a HOPE 3-Homeownership of Single Family Homes grant. This is in conjunction with the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs from the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

This program is intended to assist first-time home buyers to purchase houses previously owned or held by all federal agencies including HUD, VA, FmHA and RTC and to make these houses available at affordable monthly payments. First-time buyers are defined as persons who have never owned a home, persons who have not owned a home in the past three years and divorced parents who do not own a home.

The HOPE 3 program follows the HUD income eligibility guidelines for low-income individuals.

PPI will assist eligible home buyers with one-half of the down payment, all of the closing costs and provide home buyer counseling and training. All buyers are required to maintain HUD housing quality standards and occupy the home as their principal residence for a period of fifteen years or until they sell their home- whichever comes first. And the homeowner may sell their home at any time.

All available homes will be rehabilitated to meet HUD specifications and financing will be available for eligible persons through conventional lending

institutions. Each applicant must undergo strict eligibility certification, be reviewed by the Affordable Housing Program committee and be approved for the loan prior to purchase of the home.

A daily meal will be served at the First Baptist Church sponsored by area churches. Lunch will be served from 11:30 until noon and then from 12:30 until 1 p.m.

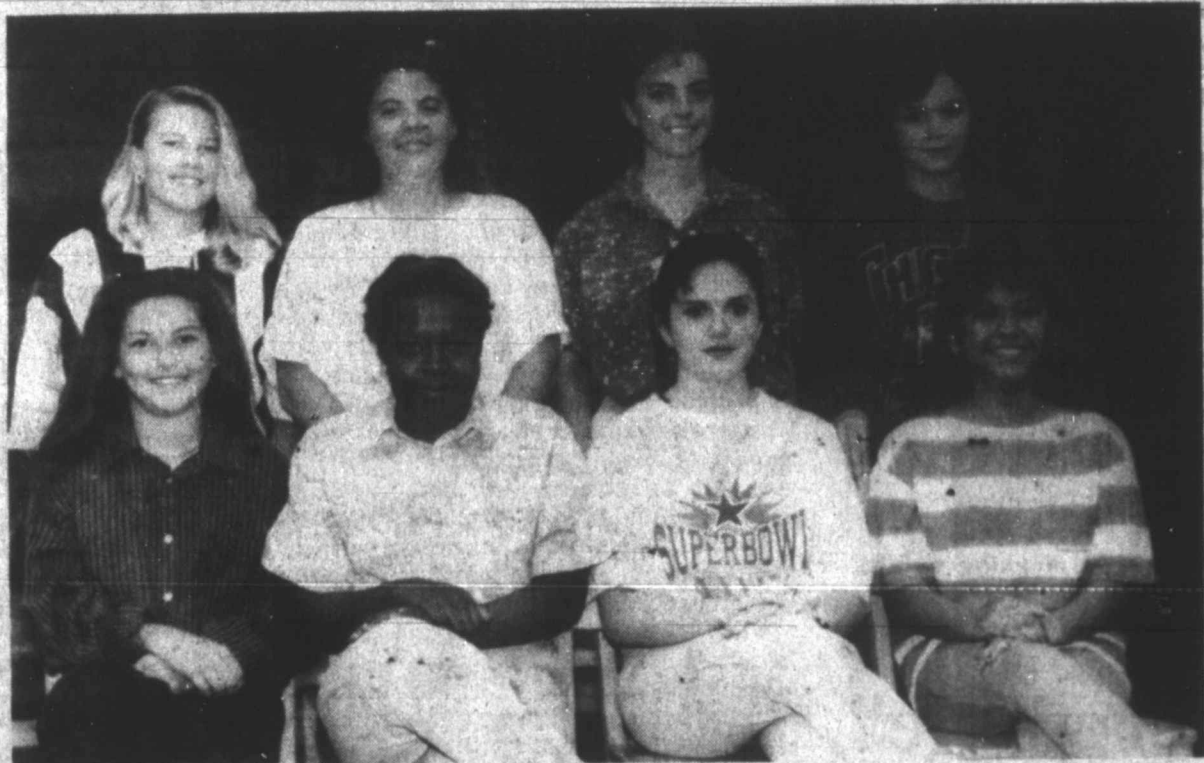

# COOK'S CORNER



Ina Finch

This week in cook's corner we will feature Ina Finch. Ina was born at her home 5 miles west of Cuthbert, March 18, 1931. She was raised at that same home and attended the Rogers school for three years. The country school was closed down due to low attendance, which was how she began to attend Colorado City schools. She graduated from Colorado High School in 1948.

The first she ever knew of Lloyd Finch (a Loraine boy) was when he started dating her best friend. She met him again three years later, and they began to date. They soon fell in love and were married January 7, 1950. The couple lived in Loraine until 1959 when they moved to Crane. In Crane, Ina worked for the Doctor's office as an LVN. Lloyd worked as

the Water Superintendent. They returned to Colorado City in 1974. They soon planted pecan trees on the land they had bought and that is what we all know as Nutty Acres! Upon her return, Ina began to work at our local MHMR clinic. She worked there for 10 years before Lloyd decided she needed to retire! She did just that in November of 1983. He was the parts manager for Key Brothers Implement until his retirement 7 years ago. They also harvest and sell pecans from their grove.

They have one son, Clayton Finch of Colorado City, he is employed with the Snyder prison. He has a lovely wife Sharlyn and one son Drew, a freshman.

Ina discovered a wonderful hobby since retiring, making porcelain dolls. These beauties are

not for sale, they are keepsakes being handed down to her special daughter-in-law, of whom Ina speaks highly. She also likes to sew and collect recipe books.

She says she enjoys cooking as long as it is what she wants to cook, not necessarily balanced meals! She learned to cook from her husband, who taught her out of self preservation!! Ina enjoys her pecan trees because they let her be extravagant in her cooking. She has one recipe that calls for 3/4 cup of pecans, she uses 4 cups!

She recalled a goof that took place many years ago before recipes included instructions with the ingredients. She was preparing vanilla pudding. The recipe didn't tell how to make it, so she just put everything in together. It called for eggs, so she just put them in without beating them first. She said after it cooked there were big chunks of cooked egg in the pudding. It ended up in the alley!

Ina's Helpful Hint: Since Lloyd is on a fat free diet she has to watch what she seasons and cooks with. She has found that seasoning vegetables with chicken broth is delicious.

### Oatmeal Crispies

- 1 c. shortening
- 1 c. brown sugar
- 1 c. granulated sugar
- 2 well beaten eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 1/2 c. flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. soda
- 3 c. Quick Cooking Oatmeal
- 1 c. raisins or chocolate chips or pecans.

Thoroughly cream shortening and sugar. Add eggs and vanilla, beat well. Add dry ingredients. Add oatmeal and raisins, chocolate chips or pecans; mix well. Shape in rolls, wrap in Saran Wrap or waxed paper and chill thoroughly or overnight. Slice 1/4" thick; bake on ungreased cookie sheet in moderate oven 350 degrees 10 minutes. Makes 5 dozen.

### Fresh Apple Cake

- 3 c. flour
- 2 c. sugar

- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. soda
- 1 1/2 c. cooking oil
- 1 c. pecans or more (I usually put 4 cups)
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 1/2 c. apples (coarsley) chopped
- 3 eggs

Mix and sift together flour, sugar, salt and soda. Peel and core apples. Mix with pecans. Add to dry ingredients. Pour in oil and well beaten eggs. Thoroughly mix and add vanilla.

Bake in a greased and floured tube pan for 1 hour at 350 degrees.

The third grade contestants competed in Story Telling Ready Writing and Spelling. Fourth grade competed in Ready Writing, Oral Reading, Maps-graphs-charts, Listening Skills, Spelling, Dictionary Skills, Music Memory, Picture Memory and Number Sense. Let me describe these events for you. Story Telling consists of listening to a basic "skeleton" story, then embellishing on that story as one retells it. In Creative Writing, the student would be shown several picture prompts and asked to make up a story using a picture or several pictures. In ready writing the student would receive a topic and must write about that subject. Spelling is just that, spelling. The student is given a word list consisting of 900 words. The kids are asked to spell 90 words and 30 tie breakers. 20% of the words may not even be in the spelling word list they studied. In Oral reading a contestant must choose a piece of poetry to read and interpret with their voice and body language. Picture memory is the skill of knowing the artist, name of the painting and artists nationality. They must also spell correctly and punctuate correctly. Number Sense consists of taking a 10 minute timed test on math problems ranging from fractions, squares, decimals to additions. There may be no marks on the test other than the answer and no scratch paper! In Maps-graphs-charts the contestants must look at any or all and be able to interpret information about it. Dictionary skills is not just looking up words. The student

may have to find word roots, or picture of a selected item and more. Listening skills is listening to a story, taking notes on the story, then taking a test, using your notes. In Music Memory the student must listen to a selection of 16 classical songs for 5-7 minutes. Then they must listen to a 30 second spot and be able to identify the song!

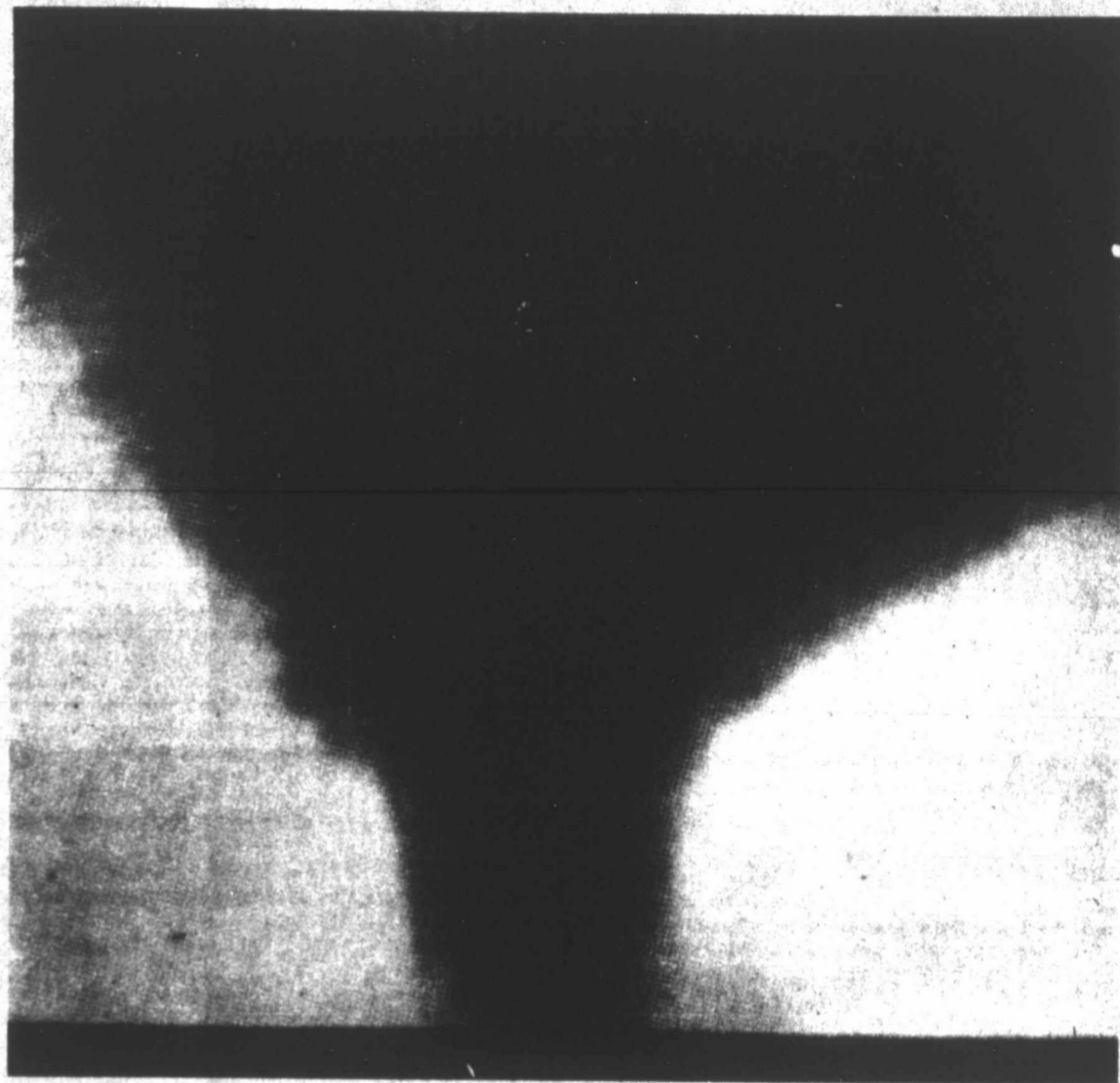

Tornadoes travel at an average speed of 30 miles an hour, but speeds ranging from stationary to 70 miles an hour have been reported. While most tornadoes move from the southwest to the northeast, their direction of travel can be erratic and may change.

While hail may or may not precede a tornado, the portion of a thunderstorm adjacent to large hail is often the area where strong to violent tornadoes are most likely to occur. The tornado's atmospheric pressure drop plays, at most, a minor role in the damage process.



While most tornado damage is caused by the violent winds, most tornado injuries and deaths result from flying debris.

Tornado wind speeds increase with height within the tornado.

Although most tornadoes occur during the mid-afternoon or early evening (3 p.m. - 7 p.m.) they can occur at any time; often with little or no warning.

## COUNTY OIL & GAS NEWS

B.T.A. Oil Producers of Midland has revealed plans to drill a 7,350 ft. new pool wildcat well in Mitchell County's Bull Creek Field. The operator has 200 acres leased, with drillsite in the Lavaca Navigation Survey. It has designated the venture as the No. 1 9214 JV-P Bull. Drillsite is 21 miles northwest of Colorado City.

A new pool wildcat well has been brought on line in Mitchell County's Southeast Vincent Field, with Trend Exploration Co. as the operator.

Located 3.5 miles northwest of Vincent, the well is in a 320-acre lease in the H&TCRR Co. Survey A-17. It is designated as the No. 3301 Sterling Family Trust.

On a 14/64 choke, the well pumped 158 barrels of oil per day, plus 302,000 CF gas and 150 barrels of water. Flowing tubing pressure registered 720 PSI.

The well bottomed at 7,850

feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Strawn Formation, 7,756 to 7,760 feet into the hole.

Showing ability to produce a combined 77 barrels of oil per day, plus 259 barrels of water, two new producers have been completed in Mitchell County's Westbrook Field, six miles west of Westbrook. Meridian Oil Inc. of Houston is the operator.

The wells are designated as the No. 117 and No. 513 Southwest Westbrook Unit and are in a 3,768-acre lease in the T&PRR Co. Survey A-1450 and A-572, respectively.

They came in pumping 45 and 32 barrels of oil per day, plus 76 and 183 barrels of water, respectively. Production will be in the Clear Fork Formation, ranging from 2,930 to 3,296 feet into the hole.

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# CHIEF LONE WOLF

BY JIM BAUM

Some of the best stories passed along to us don't always get included in the column due to space limitations. Likewise, sometimes we run across updates, written or verbal, or material we've previously covered.

For instance, remember the "Welcome to Colorado" sign, downtown? After the election of 1939, which changed the town's name to Colorado City, the sign came down. But not immediately.

In fact, it would be more than ten months before a decision was reached on the sign's future.

"The Main Street sign has been proclaiming 'We Welcome You to Colorado' with growing feebleness," stated the Colorado Record on February 16, 1940. "(It) is no longer even correct since Colorado became Colorado City, (and) it is to be taken down following a vote Tuesday night of the chamber of commerce directors.

"Plans are to replace the out-of-date sign with a modern neonized sign sometime in the near future."

The chamber did consider possible repairs to the sign, "but the cost would be nearly equal to that of a new sign. Keeping the sign supplied with bulbs that would burn has been an increasing problem recently. It was pointed out that the frequency of burned out bulbs has often rendered the sign ludicrous, instead of welcoming," the Record concluded.

And so, like the walls of Jericho, the sign came tumbling down. Well, maybe not tumbling, but down.

Going back to 1923, and the story of the first Colorado High annual, Fannie Bess Earnest Sivals told us about the humble beginning of football in Colorado (City). The activity was not school sponsored, however.

"My husband-to-be (Don Sivals) had come to Colorado and he was in the oil supply business," Mrs. Sivals recalled. "He and Johnny Prude decided they would work out with the boys and get up an unofficial football team. And that's how they got some interest started."

Enough interest that on December 15, 1922, Colorado played Sweetwater in an "unofficial" high school game. Sweetwater edged the Colorado boys, 13-7. In 1924, Colorado High fielded its own team (see Lone Wolf October 4, 1990).

Then there was the story Pansy Hines Northcutt shared with us. It concerned a flood in 1922. You'll recall Colorado High was near Lone Wolf Creek.

"I remember when the flood came and Mr. (C.D.) Foster went to every room in the school and told us not to try to cross Lone Wolf Creek," Mrs. Northcutt said.

Consequently, to get to her home south of Colorado, she had to walk down to Second Street and cross the Lone Wolf Creek bridge there.

"I crossed over and when I got to the Dulaney bridge (south of town on the old Seven Wells Road), it was out. Well, I thought I'd come back to town and walk to the Barcroft Hotel, and when I got back to Second Street, the Lone Wolf Bridge was gone."

So, she went up on a nearby hill (East Hill) and "I met a lady up there and I asked her if I could stay all night." (How's that for small town friendliness?)

Turns out the woman who was more than agreeable to put Pansy up for the night was Lula (Mrs. William S.) Justice. Naturally the girls' parents were worried about her, but it would be the next day before her father could get to town to look for her.

"Daddy came early to hunt for me," Mrs. Northcutt remembers. "I saw him going to town and I ran out and talked to him."

"He was pretty glad to see me," she said in an obvious understatement.

# OUTDOORS

Pleasure boating as a family sport is growing in popularity every year. The U.S. Coast Guard estimates the current number of pleasure boats to be around 16 million and unfortunately over 7000 boats are involved in accidents annually.

Texas has over 600,000 registered motorboats and an untold number of canoes, sailboats, and rowboats. We also have our fair share of boating accidents.

A couple of weeks ago in Florida a tragic boating accident took the lives of two pro baseball players and severely injured a third. These men were boating at night at very high speeds (which can be extremely dangerous, especially on an unfamiliar lake) when they struck a pier. Anyone who has boated at night can verify its perils and that your senses have to be at full attention. The scary thing about an accident on the water is that you not only have to contend

with injuries sustained in the wreck but also the possibility of drowning.

Another interesting note about the Florida accident is that a large amount of alcohol was found in the boat.

Coast Guard studies indicate that as many as 50 percent of all boating accidents may be alcohol related. To learn how drinking affects boating, we must first look at how alcohol affects people.

MYTH: Beer is less intoxicating than other alcoholic beverages.

FACT: One 12 ounce can of beer, one 6 ounce glass of wine, or one shot of 80 proof liquor all contain the same amount of alcohol and have the same effect.

MYTH: A cold shower, a walk in the fresh air, or black coffee will sober you up.

FACT: Once you have consumed alcohol, nothing will sober you up except time. Your

body will metabolize about one ounce of alcohol per hour. If you are legally drunk it will take about seven hours to sober up.

MYTH: It's easy to tell if someone is too drunk to drive.

FACT: Many experienced drinkers have learned to compensate for alcohol's outwardly visual effects and can hide their intoxicated condition.

MYTH: You are the best person to judge whether you are fit to drive.

FACT: One of the first things you lose when drinking is your judgement.

Some of the effects of alcohol on boaters are: **BALANCE.** Most people who die in boating accidents either fall out of their boat or capsize their boat and end up in the water. Balance is one of the first things you lose when you consume alcohol. The problem is that you may not notice the reduction in ability and a small unstable boat is

very unforgiving.

**COORDINATION.** A drunk boater will have great difficulty trying to swim to a life saving device, let alone put it on, despite his ability when he is sober.

**VISION.** Since vision provides about 90 percent of the information we use in traffic or boating, it is important to understand how it is affected by alcohol. As you drink alcohol, the pupil's ability to control the amount of light entering the eye is diminished, which reduces your ability to see, particularly at night.

Alcohol is a depressant and affects the small eye muscles that control your focusing. The result may be fuzzy vision, double vision and loss of depth perception.

Alcohol reduces peripheral vision, the ability to see objects to your side. As speed increases, our ability to see to the side decreases, with the final results being tunnel vision, the ability to see and react to only those objects directly ahead of you.

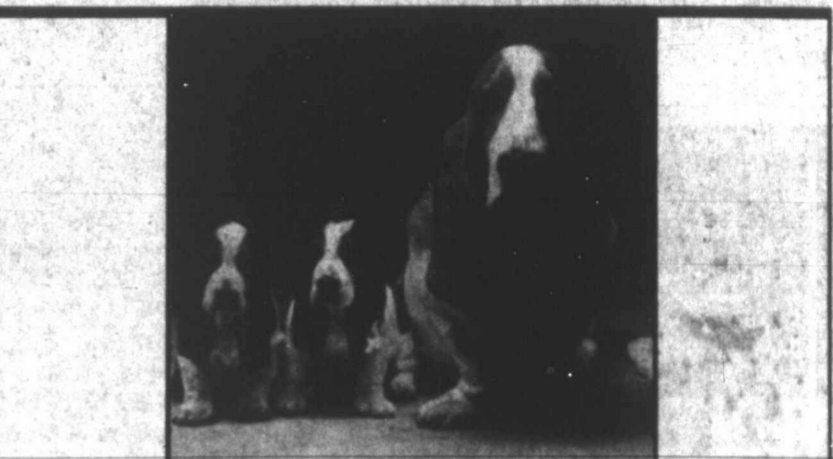

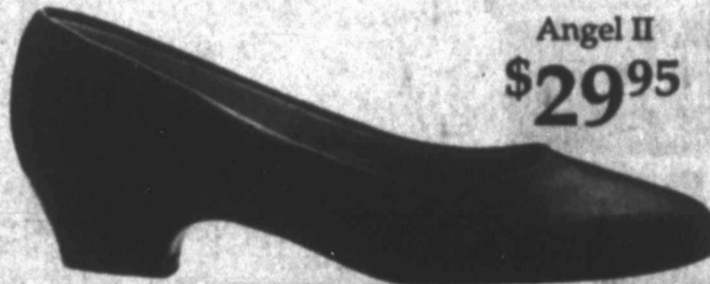


