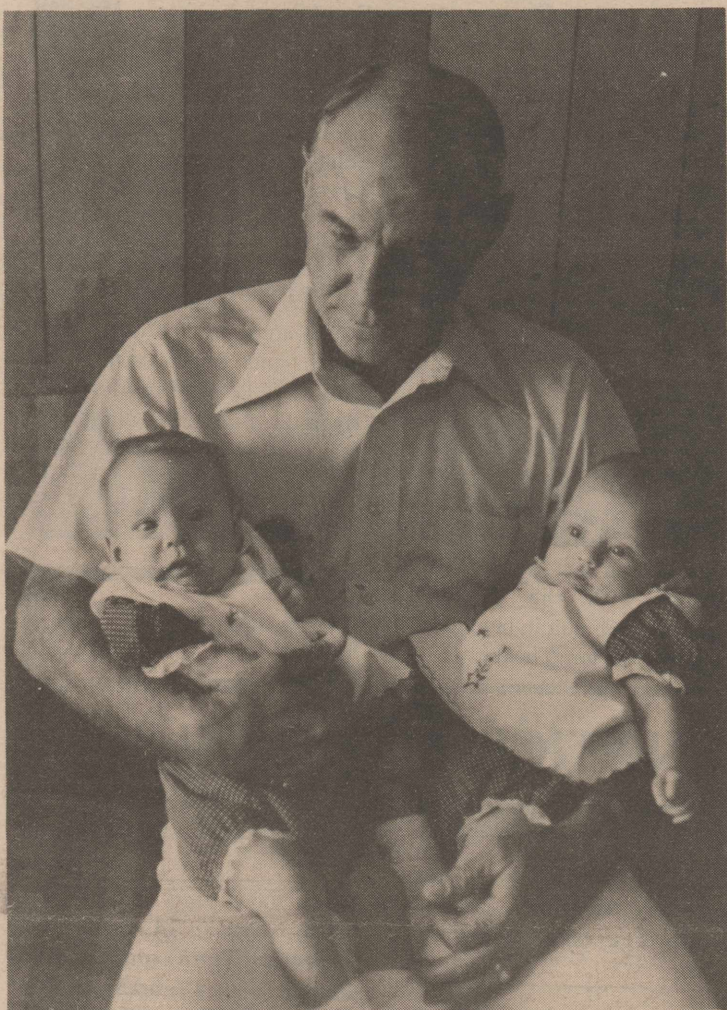

School Taxes Raised To Meet Expenses

School board members, meeting in regular session Monday evening, voted to raise the assessment ratio on taxes for Hart Independent School District from 90 percent to 100 percent of appraised value. The action stems from the new education bill recently passed which doubled the local fund assignment for Hart Schools from \$62,000 to \$92,000.

Other factors instrumental in the tax rate change were increases in utility costs and a bill passed by the legislature which requires the school to carry workmen's compensation

insurance for all employees effective July 1, 1975.

Resignations were accepted from three teachers, Dorothy Stringer, Yolanda Gonzales and Juanita Taylor and for teacher's aide, Penny Ringler.

Newly employed were Reta Upton for Plan A special education, Janet Mitchell and Margaret Ann Parker to be assigned in elementary school.

Approval was given to a band budget of \$6,200 for the 1975-76 school year. Board members also accepted a high bid of \$1,300 for the 1966 Chevrolet school bus from the Brazosport Bus Service of Clute.

Board members set July 24 for tax equalization and appointed a tax equalization board.

In other action, board members okayed an expenditure of \$6,000 for new equipment for the girls CVAE lab. Sixty percent of the cost will be paid by federal funds.

First Wheat Brought In

Wheat harvest will not get underway in earnest for another week or two but the area's first 1975 wheat has been delivered to Farmers Grain Company.

DeWayne Brown, manager, said this week that the initial load for Hart wheat growers was brought in about 5 p.m. Monday from Hill Farms. Leroy Pohlmeier cut the grain and delivered it to the elevator Monday afternoon.

The first grain was grown on dry land near B & K Grocery. Moisture count was 16½ and test weight, 60.

Hart Volunteer Fire Dept. Elect Officers For Year

Hart Volunteer Fire Department elected new officers in a meeting June 2 with Frank Barnes again named Fire Chief.

Other officers include Jerry Jansa, assistant fire chief; Quincy Hawkins, captain; Vernon Ellis, lieutenant; Bob McLain, secretary-treasurer and Bobby Reed, drill master.

Chief Barnes announced this week that the department has changed the frequency on cloud watches to channel 14 and anyone can listen. Most walkie talkie units, he said, have the same frequency and can enable persons to hear the base station.

The fire department has purchased a scanner for monitoring hail suppression planes and department of public safety and sheriff's departments as well as the inner police department.

Siren signals are explained again. Three blasts are sounded as a warning for possible tornado with one blast

indicating "take cover," a funnel cloud has been spotted.

Fire meetings are signaled by two blasts with three or more blasts indicating a fire.

Barnes said that, in the event of power failure, the fire department vehicles would travel the streets sounding the proper signals.

Terry Hill, Brad Sharp Attending Boys State

Terry Hill and Brad Sharp are attending the 35th annual American Legion Boys State sponsored by the Department of Texas and held on the campus of the University of Texas. The annual affair got underway Wednesday with 900 high school boys from all parts of Texas and two from Mexico.

Following registration, the delegates were assigned to one of two political parties-the Nationalist or Federalist. Each citizen then functions as a member of his party, attends its precinct, county and state conventions and votes in its primary.

Boys State helps to develop civic leadership and pride in American citizenship. This program arouses a keen interest in the detailed study of our government. These civic workshops stress the impor-

ance of maintaining our form of government and bring better understanding of our national traditions and beliefs to the more than 28,000 young men who are participating this year.

In Boys State, The American Legion provides the type of program where the young citizen has the opportunity to learn for himself that his government is just what he makes it. The boy "learns to do by doing."

The program takes on added significance since the vote has been extended to 18 year olds. Most Boys Staters are in the 16 to 17 age category.

Highlight of Boys State will be a trip to the Capitol on Tuesday morning where each of the elected Boys State Official will be given an opportunity to serve in his respective office for a day.

JELLY MUFFINS

Grease 12 muffin cups
Sift together:
1 3/4 c. sifted flour

1 1/2 t. salt
1/2 t. pepper
1 t. chili powder
1/4 t. garlic powder
1/4 c. butter
2/3 c. chopped onion
1 1/2 c. cooked cubed turkey
1 T. butter
8 packaged tortillas
3 c. shredded cheddar cheese

In saucepan combine tomato paste, tomato juice, salt, pepper, chili powder and garlic powder, simmer 30 minutes. In large skillet melt 1/4 c. butter, add onion and turkey. Saute until onion is tender; set aside. Melt 1 T. butter in skillet; dip tortillas in tomato sauce one at a time and fry lightly on both sides to soften. Spread each tortilla with 1 heaping T. turkey-onion mixture and 1 heaping T. shredded cheese; roll up and place in shallow baking dish, lapped side down. Sprinkle with remaining cheese; top with tomato sauce. Bake 20-25 min. in 350° oven.

1 T. baking powder
1/4 c. sugar
1 t. salt

Mix:

1 beaten egg
1/2 c. evaporated milk (pet, carnation)
1/2 c. water
1/4 c. liquid shortening

Make well in center of dry ingredients. Pour liquid mixture all at once into the well and mix quickly but thoroughly. Fill muffin cups 1/2 full of batter. Place 1 T. jelly on top, add enough batter to full cups 2/3 full. Bake in 400° oven about 10-15 minutes.

BARBECUE MEAT LOAF

1 1/2 lb. ground beef
2 8 oz cans tomato sauce
1 c. bread crumbs
1 egg
1/2 c. water
1 T. chopped onion
3 T. Brown sugar
1 1/2 t. salt
1/4 t. pepper
2 T. prepared mustard
3 T. vinegar

Mix beef, crumbs, onions, salt, pepper, egg and 1 can tomato sauce-form into a loaf. Place in shallow pan. Mix remaining ingredients and pour over loaf. Bake at 350° for 1 hour and 15 min.

2 6 oz cans tomato paste
2 1/4 c. (1 pt. 2oz can) tomato juice

Pinzgauer Farms Sponsor 'Show And Tell' Field Day

The "Show and Tell" field day sponsored recently in Dimmitt by Terra Cotta Pinzgauer Farms of Hart was considered a success by co-owners L.C. McLain and Jerry Bonsal. The special event drew approximately 65 people to view the first of this exotic breed of cattle in this area and to hear reports of statistics compiled since they were introduced to the U.S.

Conducting the program was Hiley Boyd of Lubbock and Bonsal. Executive Secretary of the American Pinzgauer Ass'n, Ben Livingston of Alamosa, Colo., told of the policies being set and activities going on within the association, and gave results of tests which have been conducted at various experiment stations. Waters Davis of Grand Prairie, owner of the League Ranch near Benjamin, gave an account of his recent trip to Austria where this breed originated approximately

1400 years ago. He also reported on the artificial breeding programming conducted in America with semen from bulls sired in Austria.

The emphasis today is on efficient beef production. Pinzgauer breeders believe they have the answer. An extremely good weight gain potential, coupled with remarkable feed conversion, has been proven in all tests conducted thus far by the Eastern Nebraska test stations and the Iowa Beef Improvement Association. Early maturity and regular cycling period of the female plus feed conversion ratio of this breed hopefully will entice many ranchers to take a second look at their operations with an eye to improving their herds by building to the Pinzgauer line.

Residents of this area will be able to see the first full blood Pinzgauers shown in the U.S. at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo in September. This stock will be brought in from Canada.
