## Crop Loan Bill Compromise Reached

\$90,000,000 Available to Nation's Farmers

When this issue of the paper is in the hands of our readers, Federal crop loans for the benefit of farmers of the nation will probably have been enacted into a law.

The bill, which provides \$90,000,000 capital for the production of the 1933 crop, passed the House and Senate compromise committee Tuesday and was sent immediately to the White House for the signature of President Hoover. The Senate originally voted the entire unexpended balance of \$200,000,000 fund employed for the same purpose last year but the house cut the sum to \$75,000,000 and in conference the final figure of \$90,000,000 was set upon.

The bill also retained the House provision which would permit the Secretary of Agriculture to require a borrower to curtail his production up to thirty percent but would not force him to do so.

Likewise retained was the Senate provision permitting funds to be loaned for feed for livestock in drouth and storm stricken areas, but a \$1,000,000 limit was placed upon the sum used for that purpose.

Passage of this bill will be of inestimable benefit to farmers and breeders of this section, many of whom otherwise would be unable to finance crop production. Regional managers and local men are unanimous in the opinion that those borrowers who paid last year's loans will receive first consideration. Just how much will be asked for in this county can hardly be estimated at this date, but it seems that the sum will be greater than last year.

### R. F. C. FUNDS USED TO BUILD SCHOOL SIDE WALKS

The local R. F. C. committee has outlined a plan to build 1200 feet of cement sidewalks at the Lamesa High school and grammar school buildings. The walks will range in width from four to six feet. The plan calls for a connection between the two buildings and a line of walk on the east side of the campus on Bryan Street.

In doing this work the committee secured permission of the school board in order that it might be able to show more work in the expenditure of its funds as permanent projects in the community. It is estimated that this job will cost the R. F. C. around \$600.00.

The school board has agreed to supervise the job.

Congratulations to the committee for planning such permanent work and work that will serve to a good cause the entire community as well as add to the attractiveness of the school grounds.

### THIEVES GET MONEY FROM PHILLIPS SERVICE STATION

Some time between noon Sunday and early Sunday night thieves took from the Phillips "66" service station some \$67 in cash and checks from the company safe.

The manager stated this week that the money was found missing when they opened the safe at closing time Sunday night. The money was in a cash box in the safe, but the door was not locked. A crowd being in the station during the afternoon, the employees have no idea who could have taken the money. Members of the sheriff's department are investigating the case.

The tailor shop recently built at his residence by Leonard Scott was destroyed by fire last Friday afternoon.

The fire started from a boiler explosion. The building was practically afire all over before the alarm was sounded. The loss was not covered by insurance.

## Why Begrudge Him?

But Tommy ain't a bloomin' fool—you bet That Tommy sees!"

Nineteen Hundred Seventeen! America's young manhood were following their peaceful pursuits; planning for the future was the most serious of their troubles.

Playing a game where death is trumps; they had not contemplated or qualified for.

Their ambitions were varied, divided among the professions, trades, agriculture, stock raising and commercial adventures, but to slay or be slain was not of their dreams.

Suddenly, black clouds enveloped the land and the war dogs were unchained and in the twinkling of an eye a feeling of security and hope, became one of uncertainty and doubt; to be finally determined by the fortunes of war. President Wilson arose to the occasion and in proclaiming a state of war, said, "To the cause of humanity we dedicate our lives and our treasure."

Some of that same treasure is now being spent on propaganda to the effect that the nation has done the impossible thing; that it has displayed too much gratitude to its physical defenders.

Patriotic people have never been penurious with their heroes. The Jews made David king and gave him a fortune in appreciation of a few minutes service with a sling shot.

At least four of our presidents have been chosen because of their army service, and their service was no greater than that of the humble private who did his duty.

Leading citizen and a million dollars, was the reward for a young man who spent about thirty hours piloting an airplane across the Atlantic. Our champion fishermen invariably get a million and the public have many other millions for its heroes who can best strike, throw or scuffle over a ball; and there is no way to estimate the great treasure in store for "Movie Stars."

Inspector L. C. Cole, site agent for the new Federal building, which is to be built in Lamesa in the near future, is due to arrive in Lamesa today (Thursday).

The inspector will look over the 13 lots which have been submitted as favorable locations for the new post office. Postmaster J. D. Dyer, stated Wednesday, that the site would be selected from Inspector Cole's recommendations.

It is absolutely a sure fact that Lamesa will get this building, and as soon as the lot is selected, the building contracts will be let, and in due time work will be started. At present it is not known just when this will be.

In a letter received by J. E. Barrow, from Congressman Marvin Jones, Mr. Jones stated: "After the site is selected, plans must be drawn after that the specifications must be written; after that construction bids are advertised for. I do not know just how long it will be until construction can be begun but you may rest assured that I shall continue my efforts to get this building under way at the earliest possible date."

### OWNERS OF CARS MUST REGISTER IN HOME COUNTY

Automobile and truck owners of Texas and all county tax collectors have been warned by L. G. Phares, chief of the Texas State Highway Patrol of the State Highway Department that automobile registration for 1933 must be handled through the office of county tax collector of the county in which the registering person resides.

Following is an opinion handed down in 1930 by the attorney general concerning the registration:

"By expressly providing that an owner of a motor vehicle shall register the same in the county of his residence, the act by necessary implication prohibits the registration of any vehicle in any other county, and, therefore, any person who registers his vehicle in a county other than his residence, or any tax collector who knowingly permits or aids in the registration of such a vehicle in a county other than the owner's residence, it seems would be flagrantly violating section 2 of said act, and since there is no specific penalty prescribed for such violation that Section 14 would apply and any such person would be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction would be fined in any sum not exceeding two hundred dollars."

### COTTON GINNINGS TOTAL 12,418,310

Washington, Jan. 23.—Cotton of the 1932 crop ginned prior to January 16 was reported by the Census Bureau Monday to have totaled 12,418,310 running bales, including 666,003, round bales, counted as half bales, and 7,402 bales of American Egyptian.

Ginnings to January 16, a year ago totaled 15,996,382 bales, including 589,483 round bales and 10,868 of American-Egyptian.

Texas has ginned 4,166,715 bales up to January 16, 1933.
