

## WHITTLIN'

Bovina's most regularly-played and least-publicized "sport" happens five mornings a week at one of the most popular coffee-drinking places in town.

The game, which has no other name, determines who of the dozen or so participants pays for the coffee for the crowd. The player who ends up with the lucky number gets the honor of paying for all the coffee and gets his name added to the "honor roll" list which is a large piece of posterboard tacked on the wall and serves as the game's answer to a scoreboard.

The game is played like this: Whoever is "it," referred to as the quarterback by this particular crowd, secretly writes down a number between one and a hundred. He then designates another of the players to call a number. If the secret number is 25, for instance, and the first player says, "Seventy-five," the quarterback then informs the remainder of the players that the number is between one and 75. This continues around the tables clockwise as the numbers are eliminated down to where there is only one left or until one player calls out the secret number.

Aside from being allowed to pay for the coffee, the player who gets stuck one day then inherits the opportunity to be the quarterback the following day.

A bad feature of the game is that it's probably gambling. However, there is some thinking among the regular participants that the law of averages, whatever that is, "will take care of you." The implication being that all the regular players will eventually end up paying for their own coffee and that's about all over a period of time. That theory sounds like so much nonsense to the losers, of course, and a description of how the law of averages will make everything even is little consolation to the individual who is faced with paying for 12 to 15 cups of coffee at a dime a throw.

Bob Fillpot, for instance, says the averages theory is about to take all the fun out of the game for him. He's evidently been stuck more than his share of times during the past few weeks.

He tells that the situation got so bad that his coffee allowance account went in the red so much that his wife went to work to help bail it out.

The game is downright difficult to play and there's really no such thing, we've decided, as being a "good" player. Luck is 99.9 per cent of success or failure.

Simple enough it is, but it offers a tremendous amount of appeal to those who play regularly. Some, you can imagine, don't even care for coffee at that time of morning, but they wouldn't miss the session and the opportunity to "play the game."

After several days of success back in the fall, we made a little speech about how we didn't get stuck often because we worked at the game and tried not to get the costly number.

Sure enough, it wasn't long after that until they were sticking us as regularly, it seemed, as the clock rolled around to 9:20 a.m. each day.

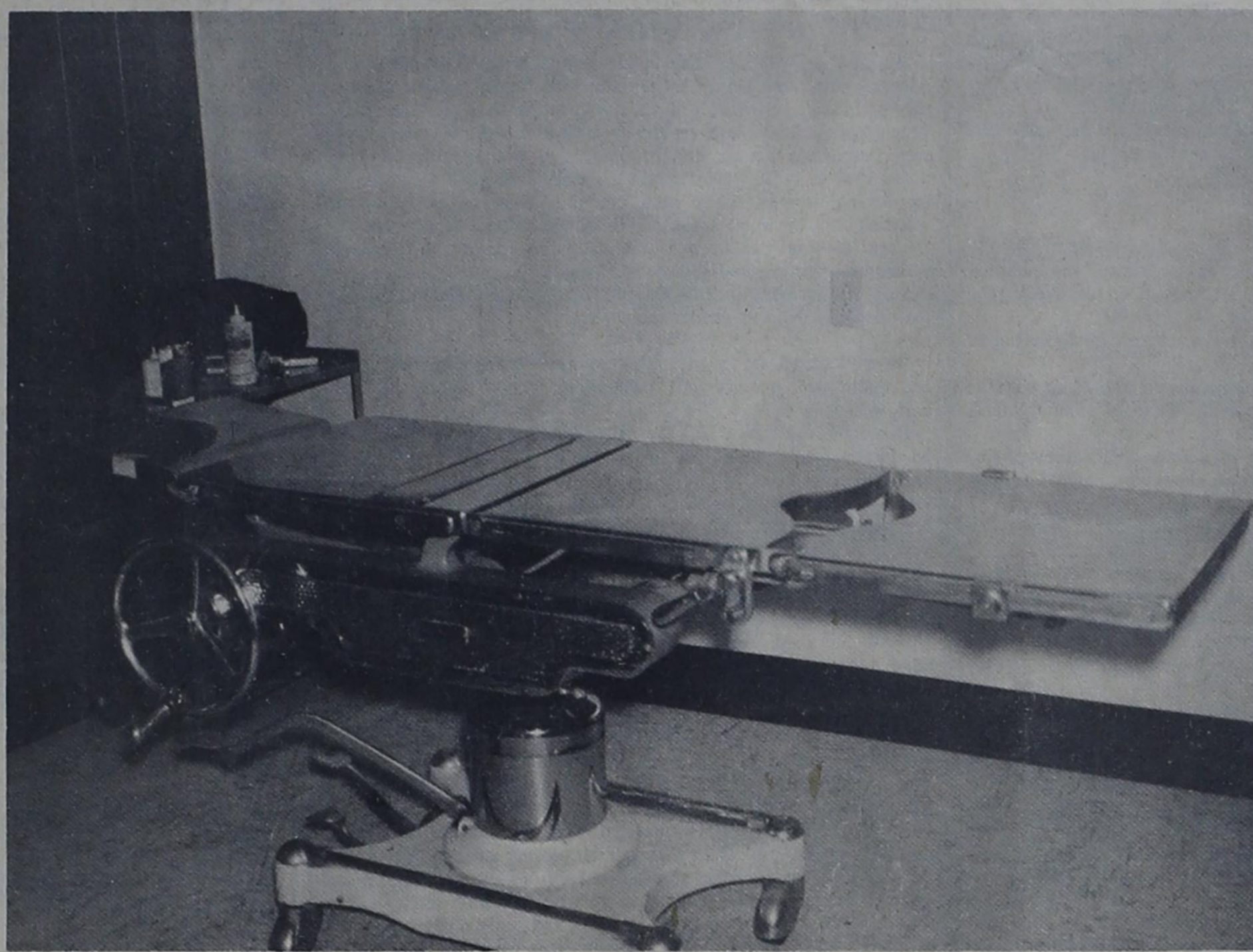
In spite of the fact that the game is played five days a week and 52 weeks out of the year, there's invariably laughing at and ribbing of the fellow who ends up with the unlucky number. Frankly, we've never really understood this.

After all, every game has a winner, or a loser, depending on how you look at it. So why the amusement when some unfortunate individual is designated to go to the pay window?

Possibly, the winners chuckle a little bit as an emotional outlet because they escaped for that particular morning.

As a player commented once after coming up with the right number, "I don't mind paying for the coffee; it's this being laughed at business that's rough."

# Clinic Opening Date First Part Of July

Dr. Cornelius Blesius, who plans to begin the practice of medicine in Bovina's new medical clinic next month, has named two assistants.

They are Mrs. Frank (Hazel) Hemke and Mrs. Billy (Sandra) Johnson. Both are wives of farmers. The Hemkes live west of town near the state line and the Johnsons reside southeast of Bovina.

Mrs. Hemke has over 20 years experience in a similar position, Dr. Blesius said.

Equipment for the new clinic continued to arrive last week and this. According to present plans, all the equipment is expected to be on hand and ready for use by the end of the month.

Dr. Blesius said this week that he plans to have the clinic open by the first part of July. Examining room tables are expected to be shipped tomorrow (Thursday) and should arrive here shortly thereafter. When these are received, the inventory of equipment is expected to be near complete.

The doctor owns or will furnish all the equipment in the clinic except the x-ray machine which is owned by Bovina Medical Clinic, Inc.

Arrangements were made last week for the corporation to provide the x-ray machine. In addition, the building and utilities will be furnished to the

doctor at no cost for a period of 12 months.

The clinic was constructed at an approximate cost of \$50,000 through donations from citizens of the community.

## Bell, Ellison Get Premiums --

# Wheat Harvest Starts Slowly

First loads of 1968 wheat arrived at Bovina's grain receiving stations last week as this year's harvest got off to a slow start.

Durward Bell, who farms west of town, brought in the premium load of wheat at Sherry Grain Co. Cut from dryland, the load has moisture content of 14.2 per cent and a test weight of 60.5 pounds per bushel. It was delivered Thursday.

The elevator awarded Bell a cash prize for the first load. Buck Ellison earned the first load premium at Bovina Wheat Growers, Inc. This load was also cut west of Bovina from a non-irrigated field and had a moisture content of 9.8 per cent. It was delivered Saturday.

Most of the irrigated wheat cut last week was too wet and harvesting was discouraged. For the most part, only sampling was done by the combines.

Rains Saturday and Sunday afternoons over parts of the area halted most harvesting operations early this week.

Harvest isn't expected to get into full swing until next week

with some fields being ready for threshing by this weekend.

The harvest won't last long once serious work begins after the wheat has sufficiently ripened and it's expected to be over prior to the July 4 holiday, weather permitting.

Price of this year's crop is expected to be approximately \$1.20 per bushel. This figure will vary slightly according to protein content. The price is about the same as the crop can be placed in the government loan for.

# Vandals Ruin Fertilizer Here

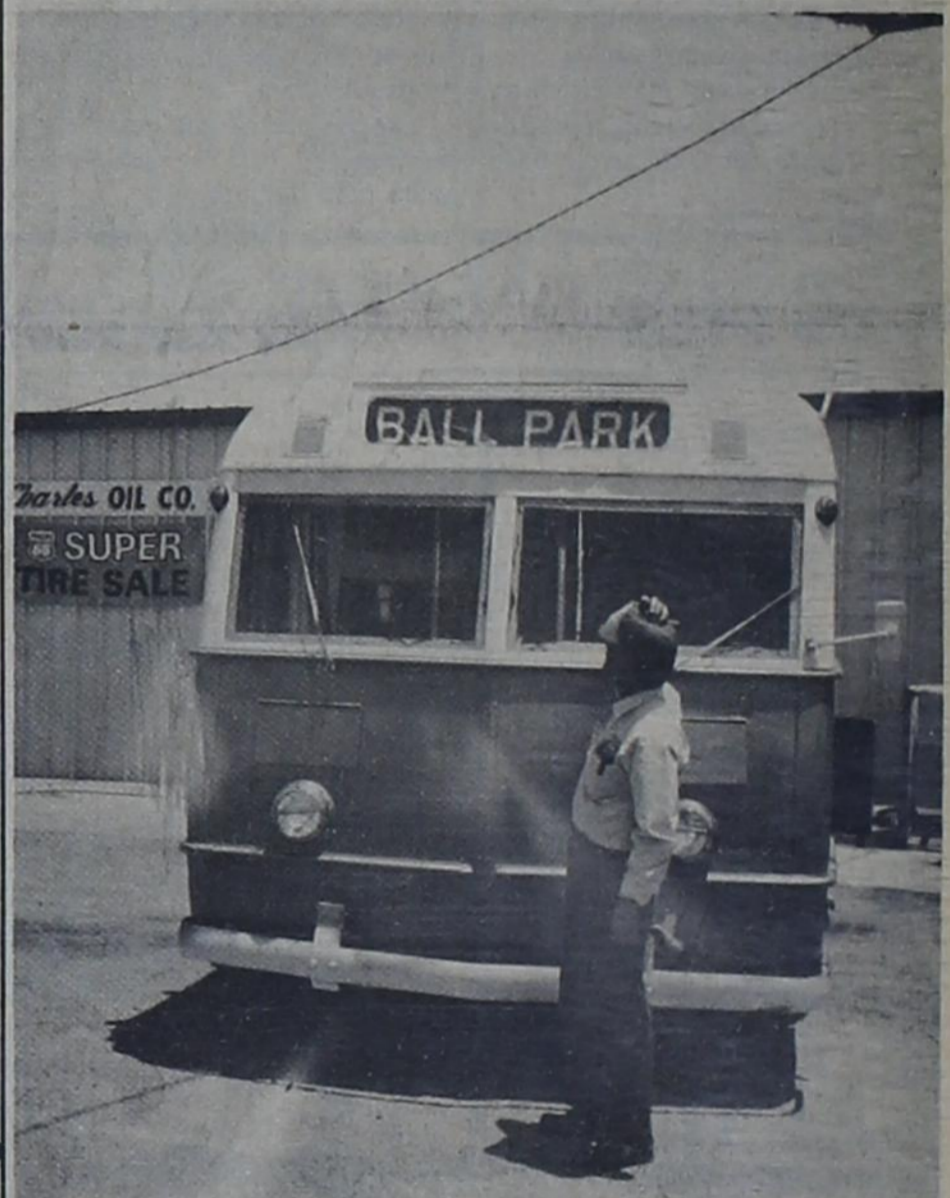
An estimated \$150 worth of dry fertilizer was ruined by vandals at Custom Farm Services over the weekend, according to City Marshal Ronald Mitchell.

The fertilizer firm is located on east Main Street. Molested were cables used to control the blending of fertilizers at the plant. The fertilizer was "mixed up," according to Mitchell, making much of it useless.

Also tampered with was the entrance to an area containing an insecticide which is considered "extremely dangerous" to humans. It was not determined if entrance to this area was obtained.

"This insecticide is highly poisonous and is certainly not to be played with," the marshal pointed out.

The vandalism occurred either Saturday night or Sunday afternoon, Mitchell estimated.

Lorenzo Granado of Friona has been named the outreach worker for the program. Granado has been employed by Missouri Beef Packers and is especially interested in the program, Rev. Giblin said.

Mrs. Cervantez and Grando attended a training school concerning the program in Amarillo recently.

The federal funds for the project are expected to become available "by the end of the month," according to Rev. Giblin and that is the reason the program is scheduled to begin at that time.

The program is set-up to operate for a period of one year here. That time will be extended indefinitely if the first year's work proves to be successful.

Total federal funds available for the year's program here are in excess of \$9000. This is approximately 90 per cent of the overall cost. The 10 per cent of the cost which must be paid locally will be through the use of buildings, office space for the program will be in The Blade Building on Third Street.

game is 18 cups of coffee at one time.

That means, of course, that if the law of averages take care of you, the player who holds that record has 17 cups coming without additional expense.

The game itself isn't so great, we'd guess, but the conversation that goes with it makes it hard to beat.

St. Ann's Parish Hall will be used for classroom space teaching of groups. Use of the buildings will not be at the expense of the federal government.

Bovina is one of four locations in the 18th Congressional District which has qualified for such an operation. Others are Tulia, Hart and Hereford.

The program is a part of the work of the Southwest Region of the Office of Economic Opportunity and, in a manner of speaking, is comparable to the Head Start program for preschool age children which has been conducted here for the past three summers except that it deals with adults.

The primary aim of the program is to have skilled employment paid a decent wage. Other aims include better health, better housing, basic education, pre-vocational training, vocational training and on-the-job training, according to Rev. Giblin, who has been a leader in making the program available here.

Exact date of the program's beginning will be announced when it is named.

# County Has 9 May Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of May, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, highway patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed, two persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$4,300.

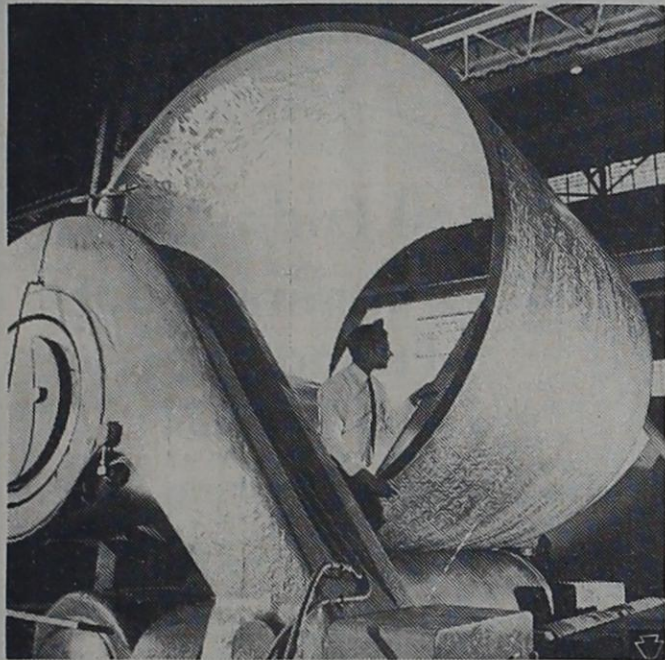
The rural traffic accident summary for Parmer county during the first five months of 1968 shows a total of 46 accidents resulting in two persons killed, 34 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$26,420.

### NURSE ESSENTIAL IN FOOT CARE OF ELDERLY

In recent months the Nebraska and Ohio Podiatry Associations, in conjunction with the U. S. Public Health Service, have sponsored special training programs in foot care of the elderly for nurses. These courses provided licensed nurses involved in the care of the aged and the chronically ill with information concerning the nature, scope and extent of podiatric problems.

They also acquainted these nurses with the incidence and prevalence of foot conditions among the elderly. The programs helped to train them to recognize particular foot problems, prior to the acute stage

of development, and to assist the podiatrist and medical doctor more effectively.

The inclusion of such podiatric services in long-term care programs will often produce dramatic benefits. Foot health is needed by the long-term patient in order to increase personal comfort, to lessen the possibility of additional medical or surgical complications, and to minimize the degree of bed confinement.

The podiatrist and the attending physician work together to insure the best possible patient care. It is through maximum cooperation between these doctors and the nurse that the residents of long-term care facilities and the community itself benefit.

It benefits the individual by affording him better health, greater self-sufficiency, and higher morale. For his family, less dependence, reduced medical costs, and fewer psychological problems. For his community, a healthier, more productive citizen with fewer social and economic disadvantages. The team approach in the management of the aged is the only logical and complete method of helping these patients to a better and longer life.

1/3 cup butter  
4 eggs separated  
1 cup sugar  
1 box lemon Jello  
1 cup pineapple juice and water  
1 cup crushed pineapple  
1/2 box vanilla wafers

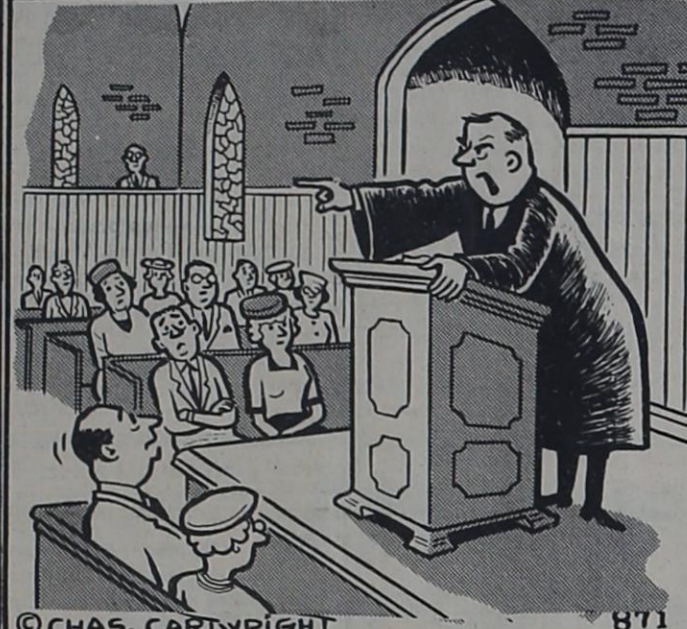

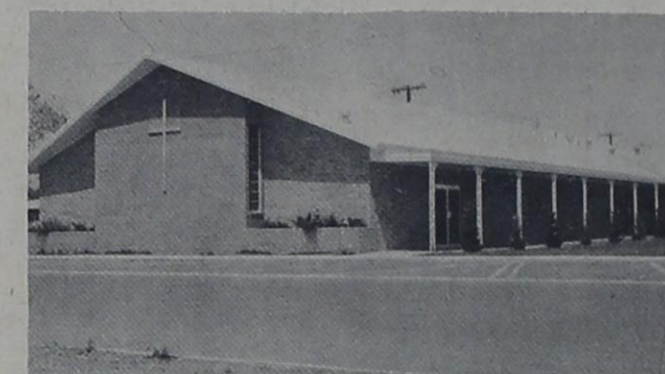

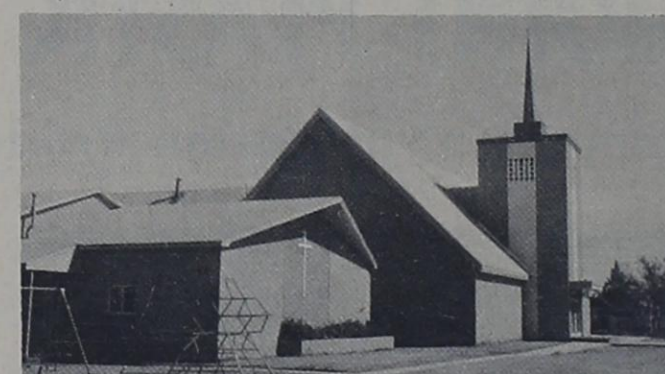

Know THE Weather

Why does a weather change so often affect the sinuses or the ears? When the weather changes, the pressure also changes, as a usual thing. When a clear spell comes to an end and rainy, low-pressure weather begins, those who experience ear or sinus trouble often experience discomfort.

This is because there are pockets of air in our head, or sinuses, which become blocked off. The pressure inside becomes greater than outside when the barometer falls (and a low-pressure system arrives overhead) and expands the pockets.

A doctor will open them up, or equalize the pressure. The eustachian tube in the ear is a natural safety valve to allow air in and out of the ear. If it is closed by a swelling or a bad cold, then you risk puncturing your ear drum if you fly at a high altitude.

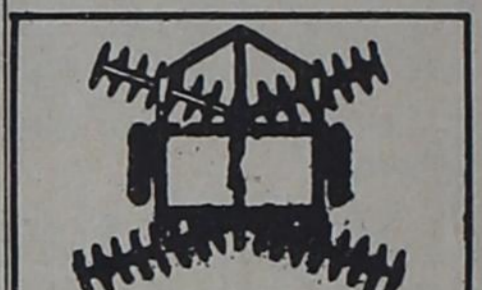

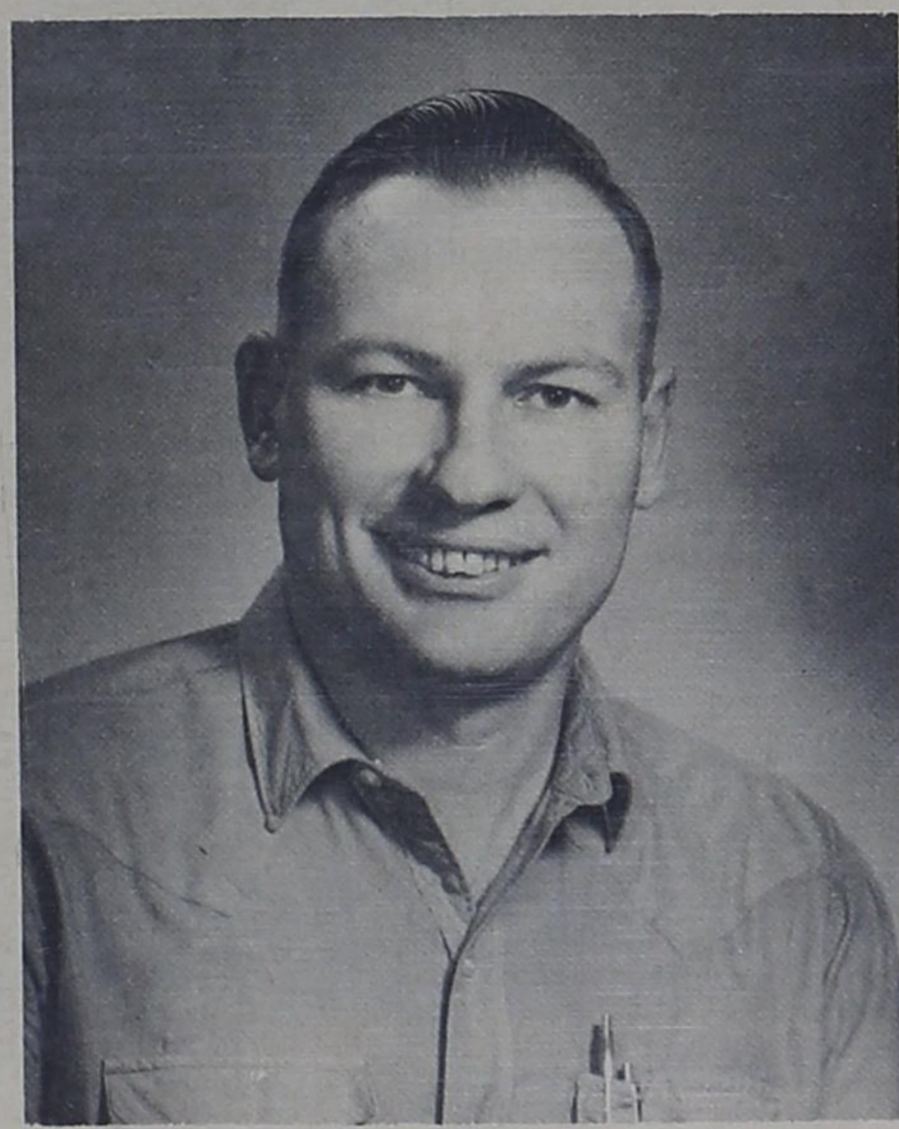

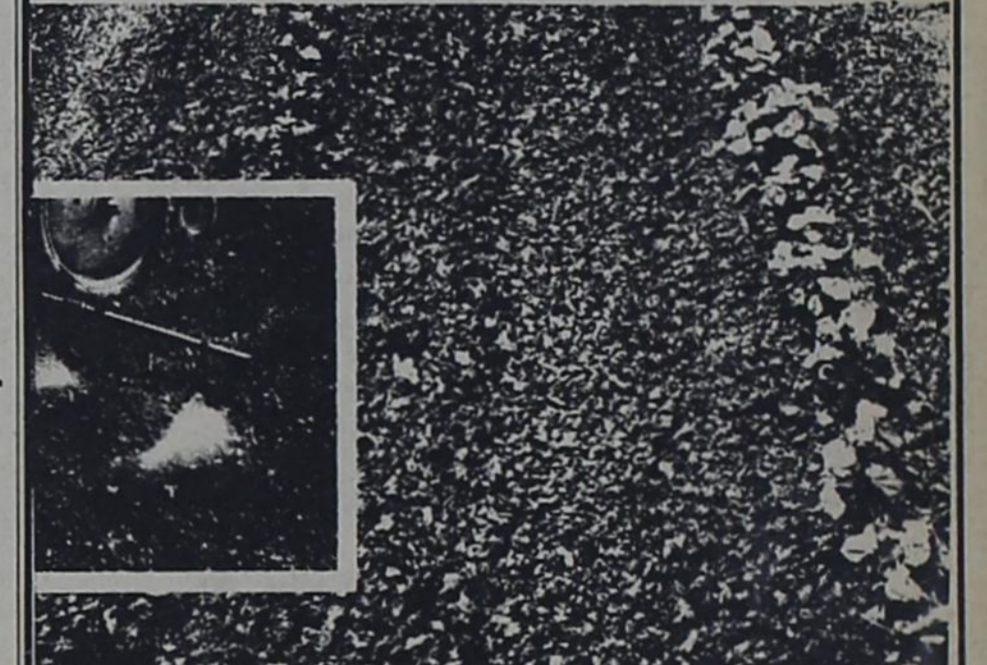
