OUR FOURTH OF July, with its parades, brass bands, bunting, orations, fireworks, is a symbol. It celebrates the wresting of power from a privileged few and investing it in "We, the people —."

The world is troubled today. How to get the most out of life? Ways and means. It naturally involves social compacts, such as communism, socialism, fascism, totalitarianism. And Americanism.

Two opinions are in deadly conflict.

In man's pursuit of happiness, is it better for him to permit a small group to plan and order his daily life? By compulsion, to mould him into subordination to a plan? Or, to exhort him, through an inquiring mind, to think and act for himself, with confidence that he himself is competent and willing to do what should be done?

The first depends upon arbitrary power, which, too often, becomes despotic. The second depends upon encouragement of the individual, by precept and example. The first ideology is communism or socialism. The second is the American Way.

As we observe the Fourth of July, 1953, take note that it is not compulsory. You can fall in line with any official celebration, or you can go fishing. The other system has its parades, too. But under the disciplinary eye of their leaders, you can't go fishing.

As American, we still have the freedom to choose... That's why we celebrate.

The above little speech was written by W. Alton Jones, chairman of the board of the Cities Service Oil Company. We thought you'd like it as a little special message for Independence Day.

MISS SIMMONS DISCUSSES TOUR OF EUROPE AT ROTARY MEETING

Former Frogman Enjoys Swim At Lake Cisco Pool

The Cisco Swimming pool had an interesting visitor Thursday when L. E. Boykin, Scranton High School graduate of 1942, paid us a visit. His thrilling exploits in Korea are literally "out of this world." After nearly eight years service in both the U. S. Army and U. S. Navy, he last was one of those supermen, a member of the famous U. S. Army Underwater Demolition Team technically called Frogmen Unit No. 1.

The Korean battlefield and fortified harbors such as Wonsong, Hangnam, etc., that we hear daily in Korean news dispatches, were places where Boykin did dangerous under-water tactics either as a Frogman or a Navy Salvage Diver.

At the pool he came equipped with feet flippers, special goggles and a snorkel device to facilitate underwater swimming. Since he had to get to work on a late afternoon tower for the Fred Poole Drilling Co., he had to leave the pool early. Boykin is a senior Red Cross lifeguard, and we informed him that he can swim free at any time. The Frogmen unit to which he belonged has been written up in feature articles in many leading magazines. These men are all volunteers, and only the most expert and huskiest volunteers are chosen for this very dangerous underwater work.

Darlene Farmer, Cisco's petite representative at the beauty pageant at Coleman on the Fourth, got in some swimming and sun-tanning at the pool Friday, preparatory to her quest for the Miss Texas title. She is a former Lobo and McMurray drum major-ette.

For the convenience of those who wish to make long-distance calls at the lake, the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. has installed a pay phone booth at the northeast corner of the bath-house building.

The swimming pool will open at 9 a. m. both July 4th and 5th — from Monday through Fridays, the pool opening hours is 1 p. m., before which time practically no one has manifested any desire to swim in the big pool. Excepting the July Fourth week-end, the pool closes at 9 p. m.

Gay-Nineties bathing suits are coming out of mothballs with which they were stored in grandma's old trunks. Swimmers are getting ready for the Lake Cisco July 4th oldest-bathing-suit contest, in which the winner gets a prize.

In the top half of the seventh the Indians staged a rally of their own and scored three runs to go ahead 7-4. Gilbert got on first when Pruitt, Ranger pitcher, served up four balls. Emsley got on an error and Gilbert advanced to second. Weiser fanned and Jackson, leading Indian batter, came to the plate. He bagged out a single to center field to score Gilbert and Emsley. Fireworks Show Will Be Climax Of Day's Program

Lake Cisco Park is expecting a large crowd of July the Fourth visitors Saturday and the program for the day has been completed, officials of the John William Butts Post 123 of the American Legion announced today. The Legion Post operates the park swimming pool and other attractions.

The Lake Cisco program will be this area's only formal July the Fourth event. Virtually all Cisco business firms and offices have announced plans to be closed for the day, giving their employees a long weekend for celebration and short vacation trips.

At the park, officials are expecting visitors to "come early and stay late." Facilities for family picnics were ready for several hundred on a "first come, first served" basis. The swimming pool will open at 9 a. m. on both Saturday and Sunday.

Manager W. P. Knight of the swimming pool said that an afternoon program will include swimming races at 2:30 p. m. The races will be run in three classes — junior high, high school and open — under the direction of Lifeguard Paul Mosley. Prizes will be awarded the winners.

The climax of the day's program will be a 40-minute fireworks display at 9 p. m. Saturday. The fireworks will be handled by Joe Comingle and H. V. Kirby. There will be no admission charges for the fireworks program.

Mr. Knight said the pool will give a prize for the adult swimmer who guesses closest to the total number of tickets sold during the day. Another prize has been offered to the swimmer coming the greatest distance to Cisco, and the swimmer with the oldest bathing suit will receive a reward.

In addition to the swimming program, other park attractions for the holiday weekend include a carnival, miniature golf, skating and other features. Several thousand people are expected to spend all or part of the day at Lake Cisco.

Independence Day tolls are not inevitable. They can be prevented. Police departments and other officials all over the country will be alert to prevent as many accidents as possible. But as always the size of the toll depends chiefly on the good sense of every American. Take it easy on the Fourth. Don't let Independence Day make you a dependent!

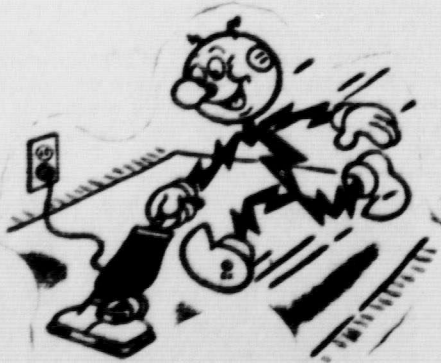

HEALTH TALKS

"Shall we allow our children to be exposed to measles and mumps?"

Doctors usually take a dim view of needlessly causing red measles (rubeola), especially in young or sickly children, because even though the disease may be mild, complications can be serious, even death-dealing. Although children aren't deliberately exposed, however, they stand a good chance of catching both measles and mumps before growing up.

Usually one attack of mumps or rubella gives life-long immunity, but second attacks have been seen. Mumps on one side is as good as on both to prevent a second attack.

Sometimes it is desirable that rubella be completely headed off. One way is to give by hypodermic injection, part of the liquid of blood which gives immunity for about six weeks. Sometimes a smaller dose is given or the full dose is delayed to allow a light case, which usually assures immunity throughout life.

Measles sweep through cities every two or three years but many epidemics skip small towns. In grownups rubella may be very serious. Furthermore, another

kind of measles, German measles or rubella, during the first three months of pregnancy may lead to miscarriage, or if the baby lives, it may be born with defects of the eye, ear, heart, or teeth. For this reason doctors make an exception to the rule of not exposing children to disease. They advise that girls be allowed to catch German measles before the childbearing period.

Mumps may affect the sex glands of the adult male, but sterility is not likely to follow if the patient goes to bed and receives medical treatment.

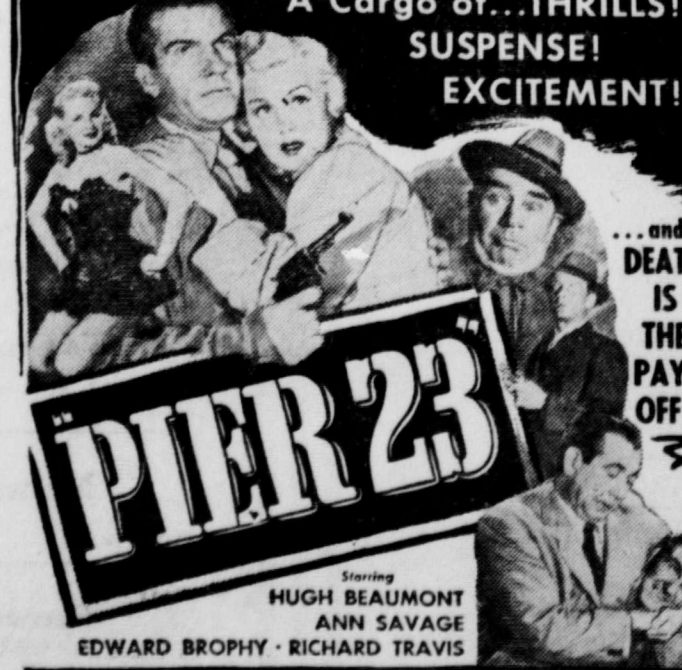
