Bush abandons Meirs Supreme Court nomination

WASHINGTON (AP) — Under withering attack from conservatives, President Bush abandoned his push to put loyalist Harriet Meirs on the Supreme Court and promised a quick replacement today.

The White House said Meirs had withdrawn because of senators' demands to see internal documents related to her role as counsel to the president.

had doubts about her ideological purity, and Democrats had little incentive to help the nominee or the embattled GOP president.

"Let's move on," said Republican Sen. Trent Lott of Mississippi. "In a month, who will remember the name Harriet Meirs?"

The withdrawal stunned Washington on a day when the capital was awaiting potential bad news for the administration on another front — the possible indictments of senior White House aides in the CIA leak case.

U.S. military death toll in Iraq hit 2,000.

Bush, who said he reluctantly accepted Meirs' decision to withdraw, must now go through the agonizing nomination process for a third time this fall.

Democrats urged Bush to nominate a moderate. "The president has an opportunity now to unite the

country. In appointing the next nominee, he must listen to all Americans, not just the far right," said Sen. Edward Kennedy of Massachusetts.

Bush, after weeks of insisting he did not want Meirs to withdraw, blamed the Senate.

"It is clear that senators would not be satisfied until they gained access to internal documents concerning advice provided during her tenure at the White House — disclosures that would undermine a president's ability

A fund has been set up for the family of a Pampa man who was killed Tuesday in Amarillo in a one-car accident.

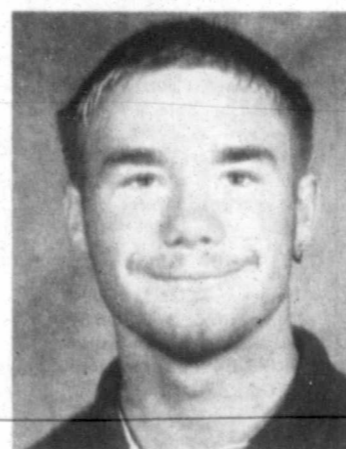
Ryan David Sells, 23, died Tuesday when the vehicle he was driving struck a house in a residential area in Amarillo.

"My friend's dad when I was growing up was a DPS narcotics agent," he said.

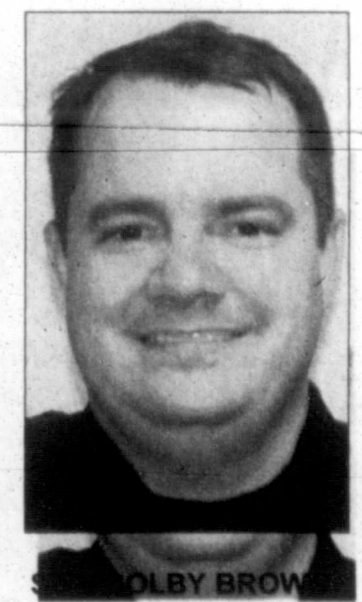
An Amarillo native, Brown worked for the police department at Amarillo International Airport for two years before coming to Pampa.

He was in the high school choir for four years, was in show choir his senior year, and he was a member of the National Honor Society.

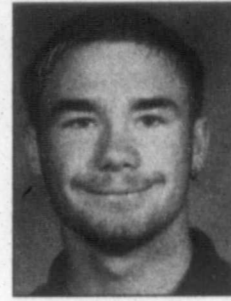
He attended Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls and DeVry University in

Officials recover stolen oilfield equipment

CARLSBAD, N.M. (AP) — Investigators have recovered more than \$240,000 worth of oilfield equipment in Texas that was reported stolen from southeastern New Mexico.

Michael Dean Sisk, 34, of Levelland, Texas, was arrested recently in connection

with the investigation.

He has been charged with larceny over \$20,000 and larceny over \$250 in Eddy County and with three counts of larceny over \$2,500 and two counts of larceny over \$250 in Lea County.

The Eddy County

Sheriff's Department said equipment taken from two New Mexico companies was found in Levelland, Sonora and Lubbock, Texas, after a tip to investigators.

The equipment had been reported stolen in July near Loco Hills near the border of Eddy and Lea counties.

Eddy County Sheriff's Lt. Jim Ballard said the equipment was being sold by a Levelland company, which had bought it.

The company sent a piece of equipment out for overhauling, and the firm doing that work checked the serial number and found the piece had been stolen, Ballard said.

The Levelland company told investigators where it bought the equipment.

Items recovered in Levelland were worth more than \$40,000, while the equipment recovered in Sonora and Lubbock was valued at more than \$200,000, investigators said.

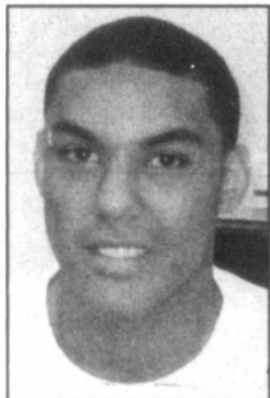

concerning a one-car fatal collision at 1927 Wisdom, according to an APD news release.

Police found Sells deceased at the scene, according to the release. He had been driving a black 1998 Ford Taurus SHO at the time of the accident.

"Evidence at the scene suggests that the victim was traveling at a high rate of speed westbound on Wolfiin Avenue when he lost control of his vehicle and struck the rear of a house at 1927 Wisdom," said APD Lt. Mike Miller in the release.

Mark Edward was renting the house at the time, but was not at home, according to APD. Edward's daughter,

Megan Wolf, 21, was asleep in a front bedroom when Sells' vehicle struck the house, but was not injured.

"Mr. Sells appears not to have been wearing a seat belt," Miller said. "The Amarillo Traffic Investigation's Unit is investigating the collision."

Sells first struck a telephone junction box after going into a broadside, according to the APD accident report. He then struck the fence, followed by the house, at 1927 Wisdom.

Sells, whose address on the accident report is listed as 604 Powell, Pampa, had moved to Amarillo in March, according to information from Carmichael-Whately Funeral Directors, where funeral services are pending.

There were few regrets on Capitol Hill, from either party. Republicans control 55 of the Senate's 100 seats, but several GOP lawmakers were wavering on Miers amid intense lobbying from conservative interest groups.

Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist spoke with White House chief of staff Andy Card Wednesday night and offered a "frank assessment

of the situation in the committee and in the full Senate," Frist spokesman Bob Stevenson said.

Sen. Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y., called Miers capable but added, "This clearly was the wrong position for her."

"The radical right wing of the Republican Party killed the Harriet Miers nomination," said Democratic leader Harry Reid of Nevada, who had recommended Miers to the president. "They want a nominee with a proven record of supporting their skewed goals."

Whomever Bush picks, a united GOP caucus holds the upper hand.

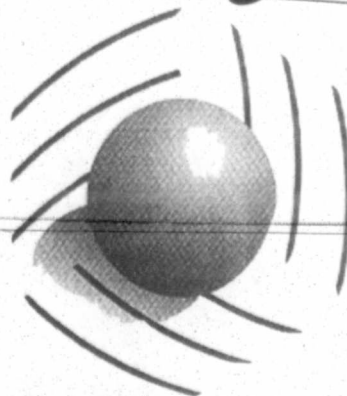

On this date:

In 1505, the Grand Duke of Moscow, Ivan III (also known as "Ivan the Great"), died; he was succeeded by his son, Vasily III. (Vasily's son, Ivan IV, later became the first czar of Russia, "Ivan the Terrible.")

In 1858, the 26th president of the United States, Theodore Roosevelt, was born in New York City.

In 1880, Theodore Roosevelt married Alice Lee.

In 1904, the first rapid transit subway, the IRT, was inaugurated in New York City.

In 1922, the first annual celebration of Navy Day took place.

In 1938, Du Pont announced a name for its new synthetic yarn: "nylon."

In 1947, "You Bet Your Life," starring Groucho Marx, premiered on ABC Radio. (It later became a television show on NBC.)

In 1967, Expo '67 closed in Montreal, Canada.

In 1978, Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin were named winners of the Nobel Peace Prize for their progress toward achieving a Middle East accord.

In 1986, the New York Mets won the World Series, coming from behind to defeat the Boston Red Sox, 8-5, in Game 7 played at Shea Stadium.

Ten years ago: A sniper killed one soldier and wounded 18 others at Fort Bragg, N.C. (Paratrooper William J. Kreutzer was later convicted in the shootings, and condemned to death; however, the death sentence was later overturned.) Thousands rallied in Montreal for national unity three days before a referendum on whether Quebec should secede.

Five years ago: Canadian authorities arrested two men they say masterminded the 1985 bombing of an Air India jumbo jet near Ireland that claimed the lives of all 329 people aboard. (However, the men were acquitted at trial in March 2005.)

One year ago: The Boston Red Sox won their first World Series since 1918, sweeping the St. Louis Cardinals in Game 4, 3-0. New York City's subway system marked its 100th anniversary.

Bandleader Lester Lanin died in New York at age 97.

Today's Birthdays: Actress Nanette Fabray is 85. Baseball Hall-of-Famer and sportscaster Ralph Kiner is 83. Actress Ruby Dee is 81. Former Secretary of State Warren M. Christopher is 80. Actor-comedian John Cleese is 66. Country singer Lee Greenwood is 63.

Learn to accessorize with your computer

Ok, men. How many of you have been shopping with your wife or girlfriend only to learn that the new dress she just picked out will NOT be the only purchase? As soon as the perfect dress is located, she proceeds to "accessorize" it with shoes, scarves, and jewelry. For the longest time, I thought the term "accessorize" meant "to spend more money."

Well, my Neanderthal assumptions got me in trouble again when I mistakenly shared that theory with my wonderful bride. She immediately proceeded to "correct my misconceptions" on the subject. As it turns out, an accessory is something that adds value to the overall package. A dress is just a dress. But add the right shoes and jewelry, and you've got an OUTFIT.

Perhaps Microsoft was thinking along those lines when they created Windows. Whether you have Windows 98, ME, 2000, or XP you'll find a little folder full of

Accessories on your system. To see those little gems, click the START button, and then PROGRAMS. Move your pointer over the ACCESSORIES submenu and you'll see the full list.

Your list may have more or less items than those of a friend, even if you have the same version of Windows. This variation is usually caused at the time of installation. Don't worry, though. You can add them back at any time as long as you have your Windows CD.

To see the full list of installed and uninstalled accessories, click on the START button, then SETTINGS. Choose CONTROL PANEL. Double-click on ADD/REMOVE PROGRAMS. By clicking the tab with the words, "Windows Components" in it, you can check to see what is installed

and what is not. Remember, if you start checking boxes, you will need your Windows CD handy.

The first accessory I want to cover is, in my opinion, the most useful: the Calculator. I can't tell you how many times I've had to do a basic computation and couldn't find my desk calculator. Since I'm in front of my computer all day, though, I just pull up the Windows version and do the math.

If that calculator is too simple, pull down the VIEW menu and choose SCIENTIFIC. Wow! The calculator works with your numeric keypad on your keyboard, so if you are any good at "10-key" you can add a lot of numbers in a hurry.

As an aside, let me share a little shortcut I've discovered. I told you that the calculator is my favorite acces-

sory. However, I hated having to click START, PROGRAMS, ACCESSORIES, CALCULATOR to pull it up all the time. So what I did was assign a shortcut key to the program. Now, all I have to do is hit Ctrl-Alt-C on my keyboard and the calculator pops up. Neat, eh?

How did I do it? Open the ACCESSORIES submenu, but instead of single-clicking on CALCULATOR, right-click on it. In the menu that appears, choose PROPERTIES. Click the SHORTCUT tab and find the field that says SHORTCUT KEY. Click in it and then hold down the Ctrl key and hit the letter "C" on your keyboard. It should put "Ctrl-Alt-C" into the blank. Hit the OK button and give it a try! Using these steps, you can assign keyboard shortcuts to all your favorite programs.

WordPad is another great accessory. Think of it as a "poor man's word processor." While it does not have

Texas Thoughts

Houston Chronicle on preparation for the flu season:

Stockpiles of antiviral flu medications that could prevent or reduce deaths from a feared human flu pandemic are woefully inadequate. The Bush administration estimates 2 million Americans could die if avian bird flu spreading across Asia and Eastern Europe mutates into a form transmittable between humans. Military-enforced quarantines might be required. Is it time to panic? The threat is from the

H5NI avian influenza that has killed millions of birds in Asia. More worrisome, 65 people died after picking up the virus from sick birds. Mutations could produce a virus that could be transmitted from human to human, setting off a global pandemic that could kill millions of people.

A New York Times report said a draft Bush administration influenza plan states the United States is grossly unprepared. It will take preparation to avert massive loss of life and fend off disaster-exacerbating hysteria. President Bush brought

renewed attention to the need for a plan when he called on vaccine makers Oct. 7 to ratchet up production. Weaknesses in flu vaccine supply channels became apparent last year when doses in the United States had to be rationed because of shortages caused by problems at a single British manufacturer. The country would have been further along if multiple suppliers had been recruited at that point to ensure an adequate vaccine stockpile in normal flu seasons and additional doses for threatened epidemics. The Bush plan also notes

that wide influenza infection should overwhelm hospitals. That news is hardly surprising. Hospitals in Houston and elsewhere are hard-pressed merely to keep up with the press of uninsured patients who use the emergency room as a substitute for access to primary care. It should not require the threat of deadly pandemic to fix the nation's ailing health system.

Well-crafted flu plans should calm the public and lessen the potential for panic. Bush's suggestion

all the bells and whistles of Microsoft Word or WordPerfect, it can be used, in a pinch, to hammer out a letter to Aunt Sue. Basic formatting, including bolding, italicizing, and underlining will help make those letters look presentable. Don't ask for mail-merge, though.

The PAINT program is a nice diversion. If you just want to sit and doodle, this program will work fine for you. Serious artists, however, will opt for Adobe Illustrator (<http://www.adobe.com/illustrator>). Enough said.

Hyperterminal is a program mainly used by computer geeks. Before the Internet came along, computer nerds like me hung out on "bulletin boards." Think of them as "websites on training wheels." Our computers would directly connect, via a phone line, to a computer somewhere else.

We could read and post messages for others to see.

Every bulletin board was separate, so reaching a board in Los Angeles meant a long distance phone call. Anyway, hyperterminal is the "type" of program we used to access those boards. Chances are, you will never use it. At least I hope you don't ever have to.

The most popular section in the Accessories folder is Games. Depending on your version of Windows, you might see Solitaire, Mine Sweeper, Pinball, and FreeCell. Of these games, Solitaire, is the program I see most often in use.

From a training standpoint, I really like Solitaire. It is an excellent way to teach basic mouse use to a new computer user. And, by the way, if you are in "three card deal" mode, you can hold down Ctrl-Alt-Shift to deal one card at a time. Some may call that cheating. I call it "anger management."

I've noticed that in the last few years, Microsoft has

avoided adding many more programs into the accessories folder. Perhaps they are a little nervous about the Justice Department. After all, if Windows offers a useful utility for free, what chance does a third party developer have in trying to sell his own? Can you say, "Anti-Competitive Practices?"

Remember, to get detailed help on any of the Accessories I've mentioned (and some I didn't), simply hit the F1 key on your keyboard while running the program.

that the military might be called on to enforce quarantines, however, needlessly raises anxiety. Experts say quarantines are useless against flu contagion because the virus spreads before people show symptoms. Calling for the military to enforce a curb on civil liberties that did nothing to fight disease would sow resentment and social unrest and reduce willingness to comply with public health recommendations.

Reasonable steps can be undertaken to head off a pandemic. The United States and other wealthy nations should contribute funds and manpower to help poorer countries monitor bird flu

and help change poultry production practices that lend themselves to human infection.

Wealthier nations might also contribute doses of common flu vaccine to enable countries where bird flu is rampant to immunize poultry workers. That, health officials say, could keep the virus from developing a strain easily transmitted between people.

And, of course, improving the nation's disaster response system will benefit Americans even if they never face a flu pandemic. If Americans know that plans for the worst are in the works, they'll be less prone to panic.

ConocoPhillips 3Q profit up 80 percent

HOUSTON (AP) ConocoPhillips, the nation's third-largest integrated oil and gas company, said Wednesday its third-quarter profit surged 89 percent, reflecting strong prices for crude oil and natural gas. Earnings for the quarter ended Sept. 30 rose to \$3.8 billion, or \$2.68 per share, topping the average Wall Street estimate of \$2.57 per share, according to a Thomson Financial survey of analysts. A year ago, the company earned \$2 billion, or \$1.43 per share.

Quarterly revenue rose 43 percent to \$49.66 billion from \$34.74 billion

"During the quarter, our U.S. Gulf Coast operations were significantly impacted by Hurricanes Katrina, Rita and Dennis," said Jim

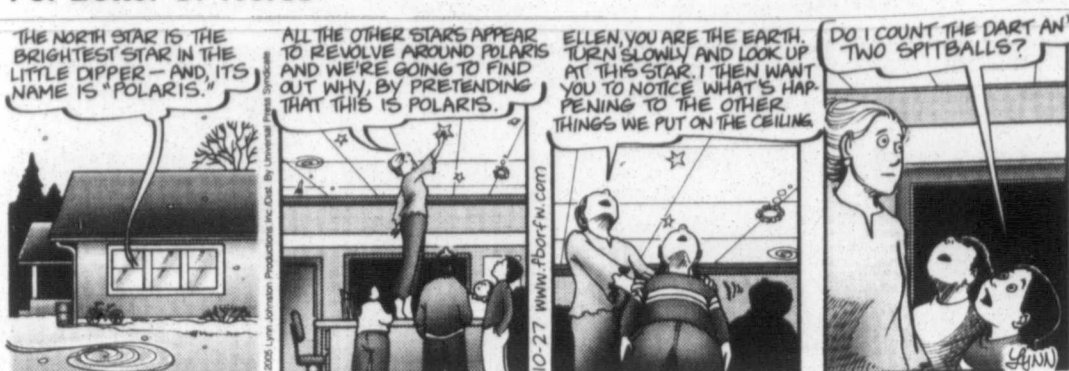
Grant's first wife swears they are still married. He says they're divorced, but he lost the divorce papers.

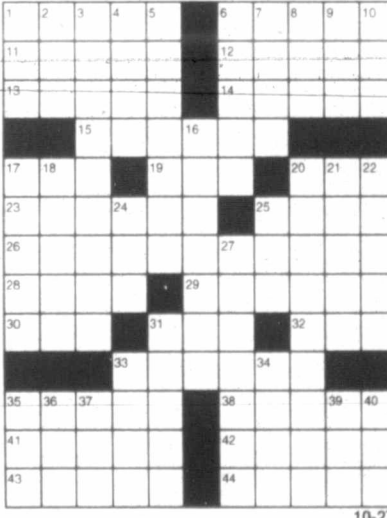

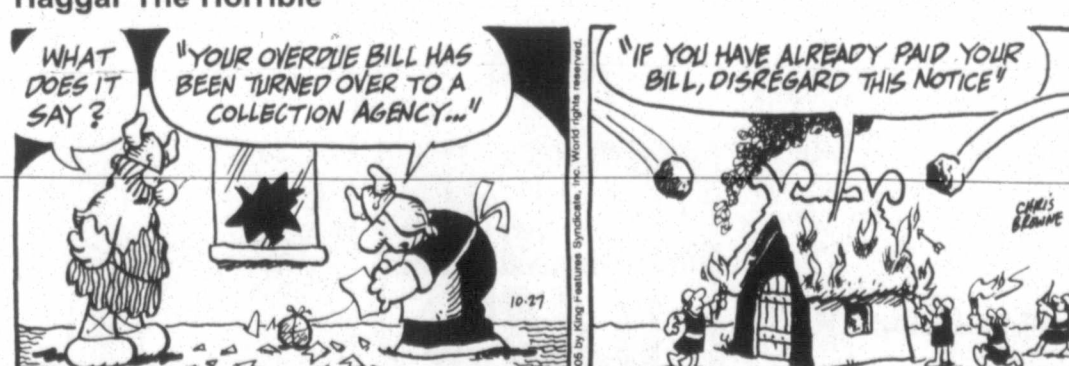

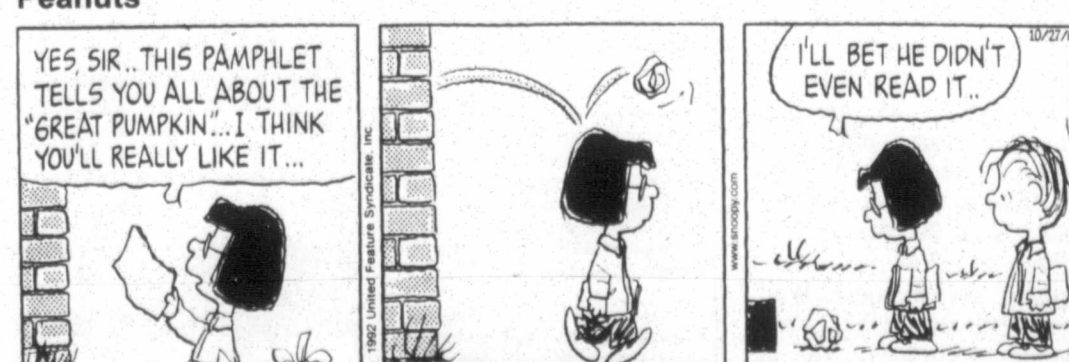

Cobb in first place; Buff wranglers end fall season on top

CANYON — Thanks to a solid fourth-place effort in its final fall action, the West Texas A&M University men's rodeo team will head into the spring season in first place in the Southwest Region of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association.

Marty Eakin, a junior general studies major from Amarillo, placed in the top three in two events as the West Texas A&M wranglers scored 360 points at the Texas Tech University rodeo Oct. 20-22 in Lubbock. The fourth-place finish enabled the Buffs to retain their grip on the top spot in the NIRA Southwest Region standings after four fall rodeos.

When the Southwest Region's six-rodeo spring schedule rolls around in March, WTAMU will have 1,518.33 points, 163.33

more than second-place Tarleton State University (1,355.00).

"We had a real solid fall season," Mark Eakin, WTAMU rodeo coach and Marty's big brother, said. "I feel good about where we are heading into the spring."

Marty Eakin won the short go in both tie-down roping and saddle-bronc riding, placing second and third, respectively, in the two events at Lubbock. With 430 points, he sits in third place in the regional men's all-around chase.

Also posting points for the WTAMU men in Lubbock was Wes Burns, a junior agricultural business and economics major from Sedan, N.M., who finished second in the average in saddle-bronc riding.

Guillen's post game remarks cast shadow on series victory

Like the snowball that gets bigger and grows more and more unstoppable as it rolls down the mountainside, so too were the Chicago White Sox in the 2005 post season. I am not sure anyone could have prevented what many felt was the inevitable.

In the span of a few minutes, Guillen tarnished the magic of the moment by placing himself ahead of the team, its ownership and management and its fans when he opined for a raise, tossed his hat into the political ring and, worst of all, raised the championship trophy and dedicated the win.

As Fox Sports maven Jeanne Zelasko wrapped her interview with an emotional Jerry Reinsdorf (White Sox chairman), who praised his team, the fans and the Houston

Astros, she called on Guillen, a man who has earned a reputation for speaking his mind.

Guillen then verbally painted the picture of a team that was focused on making the post season from the first day of training camp. He noted how his guys just "Went out and got the job done." He then proceeded to stain the fabric of what his team had woven with an ill-timed and inexplicable diatribe.

He suggested he was ready to make more money, possibly, "Four million," by way of a new contract. He boasted he was ready to run for mayor of Chicago. And, in his most shocking move of all, he held the championship trophy on high and praised his fans. Not those in Chicago who spent their money, bought the tickets, attended the games and supported their team. The same fans who have waited 88 years for this moment. No, Guillen hoisted the trophy and proudly declared, "This is for Venezuela."

In the carnage of the locker room celebration, this all seemed to have slipped by many.

Not me. Congratulations to the White Sox on what was a near perfect playoff run. Too bad your manager had to speak afterward.

White Sox fans hit the streets to celebrate World Series win

CHICAGO (AP) — It was party time for the Rev. Dan Brandt. When the White Sox won the World Series, he bolted from his office to ring the church bells.

The team's theme song for the 1959 World Series appearance — "Let's Go Go White Sox!" — already had been blaring for hours from a speaker at the Nativity of our Lord Catholic Church in the heart of the city's South Side.

"This is unreal, this is incredible, we're blessed," said Bryant, as parishioners around him, who had gathered to watch the game, hugged and smiled. Several hours after the win Wednesday night, the church's bells still clanged.

Firecrackers blasted, car horns blared and fans flooded into the streets of the Windy City to celebrate the city's first World Series championship since 1917 after the White Sox beat the Houston Astros 1-0 Wednesday night, completing the series sweep.

After seven scoreless innings, series MVP Jermaine Dye singled home Willie Harris for the game's only run in the eighth. On a night when pitching dominated, winner Freddy Garcia and Houston's Brandon Backe dueled through seven in innings of shutout ball, with Backe allowing four hits and Garcia five. They each struck out seven.

At the last out, fans who had gathered to watch together at the United Center began jumping and hugging. One man who joined the throng screamed into a cell phone with tears in his eyes: "We did it! We did it! We did it!"

Andrew Manocoho, 34, and Carrie Hixson, 31, chose the United Center party as the scene of their first date. One thing they already had discovered they had in common: They're both Cubs fans.

No matter — they still came out to support their crosstown rivals.

"It's baseball history and it's Chicago history," Manocoho said. "The Cubs will never win; I'm at peace with that," he said.

Even a Michael Jordan statue outside the United Center sported a White Sox jersey. Hundreds of people also gathered in a parking lot outside U.S.

Cellular Field — home of the White Sox — some smoking cigars and sharing hugs.

"This is wonderful, it's a dream come true," 31-year-old Robert Cruz said as he stood with a soggy black White Sox flag slung over his shoulder. "2005 is the best year of my life!"

Along a residential street on the city's South Side, houses displayed White Sox flags and banners next to the Halloween decorations.

DeBerry reprimanded for comments

DENVER (AP) — Air Force coach Fisher DeBerry met the academy's new superintendent for the first time Wednesday, and found himself being reprimanded, but not fired, for statements he made about black athletes and recruiting.

The 67-year-old coach, known for his folksy, disarming charm and his homespun sayings, found himself in an imbroglio over political correctness for the second time in less than 12 months.

Last time, it was about religion in the locker room. This time, it was about black football players — or the lack of them — at the academy.

After his meeting with Lt. Gen. John Regni, DeBerry, who is suffering through a 3-5 season this year, issued an apology at a news conference.

"I realize the things I said might have

been hurtful to many people and I want everyone to understand that I never intended to offend anyone," DeBerry said.

On Tuesday, in discussing last weekend's 48-10 loss to TCU, DeBerry said it was clear TCU "had a lot more Afro-American players than we did and they ran a lot faster than we did."

"It just seems to me to be that way," he said. "Afro-American kids can run very well. That doesn't mean that Caucasian kids and other descents can't run, but it's very obvious to me that they run extremely well."

DeBerry first discussed the topic Monday, telling The Gazette of Colorado Springs the academy needed to recruit faster players and noting, "you don't see many minority athletes in our program."

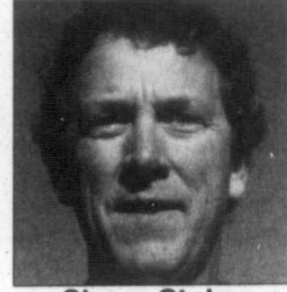

Saints linebacker arrested

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — New Orleans Saints linebacker Courtney Watson was booked on a charge of drunken driving by San Antonio police early Wednesday. Watson, 25, was driving a BMW on Interstate 10 when an officer reported pulling him over for erratic driving at 2:35 a.m. An open bottle of beer was found in the front cup holder of the car, according to the police report. He was "combative" and failed a field sobriety test but refused a breathalyzer sample, the police report said. He was released Wednesday on a \$1,000 bond. An arraignment hearing is set for Dec. 5. The DWI charge is his first offense, according to the police report. Watson, the starting middle linebacker, was a second-round pick out of Notre Dame in 2004. He said he realized he had erred as he was driving back to campus from his weekly luncheon with the media Tuesday. "I have made a mistake and I ask for everyone's forgiveness," he said. "I regret these statements and I sincerely hope they will not reflect negatively toward the academy or our coaches or our players and I thank the administration for the opportunity to make this apology." DeBerry said he had no plans on stepping down after this latest public embarrassment. Athletic director Hans Mueh, who took DeBerry to Regni's house, said the academy "has a zero-tolerance policy for any racial or ethnic discrimination or discrimination of any kind." Nonetheless, Mueh said the coach would not lose his job. "It was a seriously, seriously inappropriate comment," Mueh said. "This was a great first step. This was not Fisher DeBerry, not the man I've known for 25 years. I'd like for us to all just move on from there." Air Force made two seniors, one white and one black, available after practice. Both said they were not offended by the coach's statement. "We, as a team, didn't think he meant anything by it," said receiver Jason Brown, who is black. "He's not that kind of person. I personally wasn't offended. I think people saw today how sincere he was and he didn't mean anything by it." Center John Wilson, who is white,

said last week's loss had nothing to do with the ethnic makeup of the team. "There are 250 guys on the team and there is not one player that was offended," by DeBerry's statements, Wilson said. *"It was a seriously, seriously inappropriate comment. This was a great first step. This was not Fisher DeBerry, not the man I've known for 25 years. I'd like for us to all just move on from there."* — Hans Mueh Athletic Director, USAFA

DeBerry took a few questions at the news conference after making his initial apology. At times, it wasn't quite clear whether he was apologizing for what he said, and the ideas they conveyed, or merely for his word choice. "I feel like maybe a couple of terms I used should not have been used in any remarks I made to anybody," he said. "If I offended anyone by using the term 'Afro-American,' or 'minorities,' then I certainly did it not to offend anyone. I think people know me well enough. I think people know my heart. I think my players know me and how I care about people. I used a couple of terms that don't reflect the standards and expectations and direction in our recruiting." Asked what, exactly, was wrong with saying that blacks run very well,

DeBerry replied: "I don't think there is anything wrong with that. We have some Caucasian players that run very, very well, also. My choice of words, I probably should have said 'players,' rather than expressing a particular ethnic group." Mueh made it clear that the entire idea DeBerry was discussing was inappropriate. "Fisher's already apologized for that statement," Mueh said. "What we're talking about is speed. There's speed that cuts across black, white, gray, blue, whatever. It was just an inappropriate comment and you all know it was an inappropriate comment." This episode comes about a year after DeBerry was asked to remove a banner from the locker room that displayed the "Competitor's Creed," including the lines "I am a Christian first and last ... I am a member of Team Jesus Christ." DeBerry's misstep came as the academy deals with allegations of religious intolerance. The Air Force issued new guidelines directing leaders to be more sensitive to diversity after evangelical Christians were accused of harassing cadets who hold other beliefs. Mueh said DeBerry, who has won 164 games in his 22 years as head coach at Air Force, shouldn't be remembered for his latest mistake. The AD credited DeBerry for wanting to make a public apology. "This is a great man, a great American," Mueh said. "For him to come forward and admit he made this mistake — it was a serious, serious inappropriate comment — it was a great first step."

Pittman emerges as Horns' big receiver

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Billy Pittman woke from a nap unable to move the left side of his face. He couldn't smile and could barely talk. The Texas freshman was shocked when he was diagnosed with Bell's palsy, a nerve condition that paralyzed the left side of his face for about month. It was perhaps the scariest time in two long, frustrating years for the receiver who battled through painful injuries and a difficult position change that had him thinking about quitting football. But Pittman is smiling again. Finally healthy, Pittman has emerged as one of the top deep threats in the country for the No. 2 Longhorns (7-0, 4-0 Big 12) heading into Saturday night's matchup with Oklahoma State (3-4, 0-4). He's averaging 28.8 yards per catch and has five touchdowns. Five of his 19 receptions have covered 48 yards or more. "It's the most amazing thing for a guy who didn't play any for two years," said Longhorns coach Mack Brown. "I don't know where he came from." "I've come through a lot," Pittman said. "What don't kill you will make you stronger." In high school, Pittman was an option quarterback good enough to be recruited by Nebraska when the Cornhuskers still ran the run-oriented offense. But Pittman instead signed with Texas, where Brown made it clear

he would be catching passes. The change wasn't easy and at times was downright intimidating. During Pittman's freshman season in 2003, the Texas senior-receiving trio of Roy Williams, Sloan Thomas and B.J. Johnson was considered the best group in the country. "You're like 'Whoa!'" Pittman said. "You're asking yourself if you can do what they do." Then he got hurt. A torn quadriceps muscle meant he couldn't run and limited his practice time during a redshirt season. Then came the Bell's palsy, a non-fatal condition that can cause weakness or paralysis in the face. The doctor told him it could have long-lasting effects. "She told me there was a chance I might never move my face again," he said. "I almost cried." Embarrassed by how the condition affected his ability to talk, he was mortified when a professor told him he still must come to a speech class and deliver a presentation. "He was like, 'Can you talk? OK, come to class,'" Pittman said. To his relief, the paralysis ended about a month later and he made a full recovery. But other troubles continued. He tore another leg muscle, then separated his shoulder. That's when he thought the most about leaving. "I told my mom I didn't know if I even wanted to play," he said. "First, she told me I'd better be

making good grades. And she said she'd been praying for me." Texas quarterback Vince Young recognized Pittman's talent and told him to keep working. Young and the receivers ran daily passing drills last summer, and the quarterback told Brown he liked what he saw. "He said Pittman's the most improved player, you're not going to believe it," Brown said. "I basically said 'I'll believe it when I see it,' and he was." Pittman burst onto the scene in a win over Ohio State when he caught Texas' first touchdown and had a 63-yard catch. He also got some ribbing from his teammates when he was caught from behind on the long pass. He got another earful when he fell down before the goal line on another long pass at Missouri. His teammates teased him about tripping on the artificial turf. "We asked him if he wanted us to mow the grass for him next time," said tight end David Thomas. Pittman has figured out how to stay on his feet ever since. He caught a 64-yard TD against Oklahoma and went 75 yards for a score last week against Texas Tech. "I got tired (against Ohio State)," Pittman said with a smile. "No, I got caught. When I caught that pass, against Tech, I was like, 'I'm not getting caught. I'm not hearing it any more.'"

Emmitt Smith set to enter Texas Sports Hall of Fame

WACO, Texas (AP) — Former Dallas Cowboys running back Emmitt Smith has been named as an inductee into the Texas Sports Hall of Fame — again. Smith initially was to have been inducted into the 2003 class, but he declined because of a commitment to attend his daughter's music recital. Hall of Fame rules require honorees to attend the induction ceremony. In addition to Smith, those chosen by the selection committee for induction on Feb. 15 are former Oakland Raider receiver Tim Brown; former Texas A&M football coach R.C. Slocum; Texas baseball coach Augie Garrido; 1990 Wimbledon runner-up Zina Garrison; Olympics gymnastics coaches Bela and Martha Karolyi; longtime baseball player, coach and manager Bobby Bragan; and former Odessa Junior College track coach Jack Segrest. Smith, who was inducted into the Cowboys' Ring of Honor along with former teammates Troy Aikman and Michael Irvin in September, ran for 18,355 yards and 164 touchdowns in his career, both NFL records. He spent 13 of his 15 seasons with the Cowboys and played the other two with the Arizona Cardinals. Brown, the Heisman Trophy winner at Notre Dame in 1987, spent his first 16 seasons with the

Raiders in Los Angeles and Oakland. He played one season with Tampa Bay before retiring in July as a Raider. He had 1,094 receptions for 14,934 yards and 100 touchdowns. Slocum had a 123-47-2 record with the Aggies from 1989 to 2002. The team won the Big 12 title in 1998 and also won three Southwest Conference titles. Garrido, whose Longhorns won the College World Series this year, has 1,542 victories and five national championships. He was the first coach to win national titles at two schools — Cal State-Fullerton and Texas. Garrison played professional tennis from 1982 to 1983. She won a gold medal in doubles and a bronze medal in singles in the 1988 Olympics. The Karolyis have served as team coordinators for the 2000 and 2004 U.S. Olympic teams. Bela Karolyi coached Olympic champion Mary Lou Retton. Bragan was president of the Texas League from 1969 to 1975. On Aug. 15, he became the oldest manager in baseball history when he suited up for the Fort Worth Cats to break a record that had been held by Connie Mack. Segrest was a member of the 440-yard and 880-yard relay teams at Abilene Christian that set five world records. His teams won 11 national junior college titles.

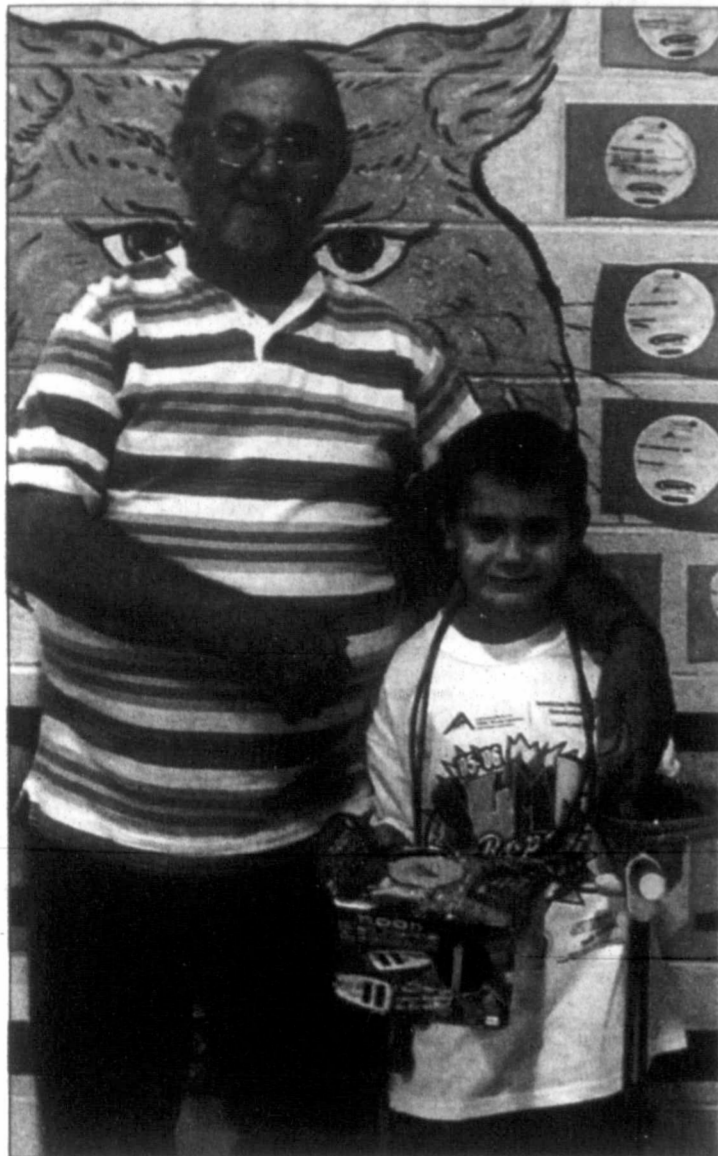

Mulva, chairman and chief executive. "Despite these impacts, our overall operating performance for the quarter was good, and we continued to benefit from the strong commodity price environment." The Houston-based company produced 1.79 million barrels of oil equivalent, or BOE, per day, including 1.52 million BOE per day from the exploration and production segment and an estimated 270,000 BOE per day from its Lukoil Investment segment.

Unfortunately, the command center of the body can be affected by disease.
