A SURVEY OF Taxation in Texas is the title of a booklet that has just reached our desk. It shows that Texans paid \$443,388,96 into the state treasury during 1952. Cigarette and tobacco users paid over 35 million, and the liquor interests shelled out around 18 million.

Auto owners paid about 108 million in the form of license plates, gas taxes and the like.

Taxpayers paid over 6 million in taxes on properties they inherited through the death of relatives during the year. The poll tax gave the state a little over two and a half million bucks.

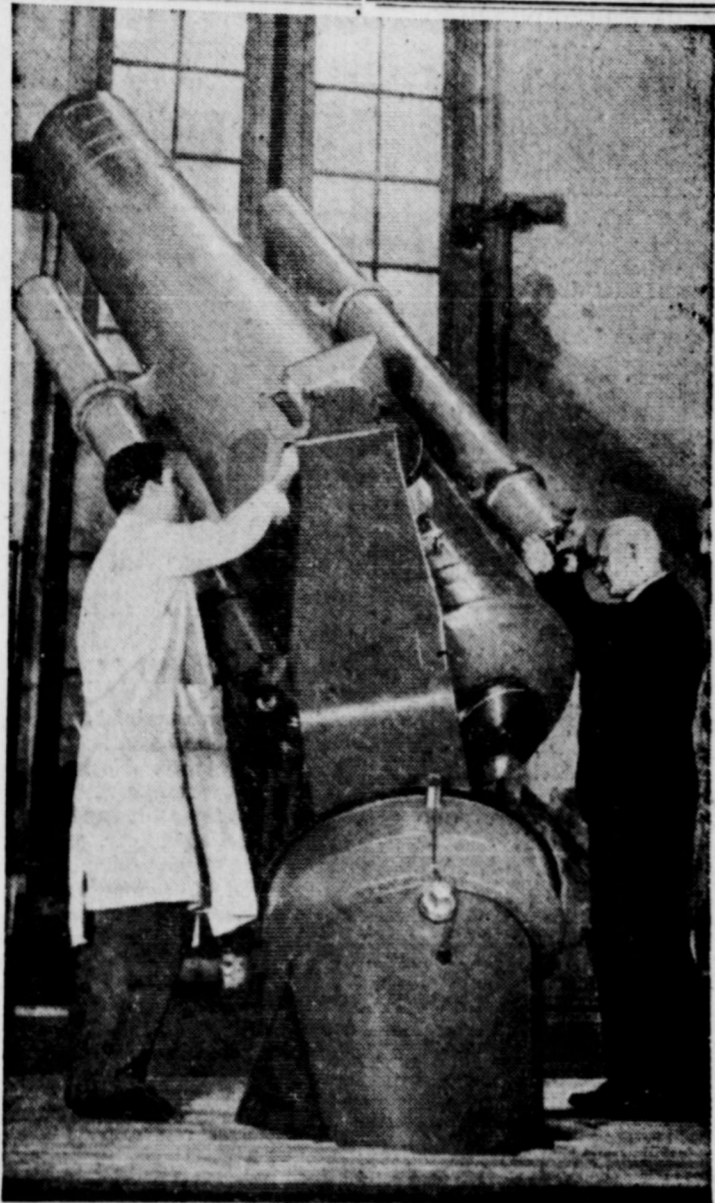

## Farmers Busy As Planting Season Begins In State

Field work was pushed early and late over the eastern two-thirds of the state during the past week. Summer-like temperatures stimulated rapid growth of spring crops, grass and weeds which along with strong winds was depleting surface moisture. An abrupt temperature change at the end of the period, however, brought freezing temperatures into northeastern counties. Damage, if any, was expected to be very light. Rainfall is needed badly in northwestern, western, and southern sections, and would be welcome over most of the rest of the State.

Wheat condition continued variable, with prospects in east central north high plains counties brightened by moderate to heavy showers late last week. In most other high plains counties, wheat was deteriorating and moisture was badly needed to keep the crop alive. Small grain in most eastern and northern counties in the low rolling plains were in fair to good condition, but the rest of the area was needing rain.

North Texas small grains continued to develop satisfactorily, but in the Edwards Plateau most areas were again needing rain. Some small grain crops in these areas and in the Low Rolling Plains were beginning to head. Cotton in south Texas was making fair to good growth, although surface moisture was short in many sections. Cotton planting was becoming active in central Blacklands counties, but in the north and northeast, start of planting was being delayed by wet fields. Corn planting was 1-3 to 1-2 done in the northern and northeastern counties, with moisture ample to excessive.

Crops farther south were making good growth. Sorghums and sudan were being planted in most areas except the Plains districts. Grain sorghums in the Coastal Bend were beginning to need surface moisture. Rice planting was proceeding rapidly. South Texas flax was maturing, with harvest starting in the Coastal Bend. Alfalfa along the Red River was nearly ready for first cutting.

Conditions were favorable in most commercial vegetable areas. Harvest of the few remaining winter crops, mainly carrots and lettuce, was active. Onion harvest also continued active in all early spring areas except Eagle Pass and Wilson-Karnes, but the unfavorable market resulted in some acreage abandonment the past week. Carrot loading of tomatoes from the Lower Valley was started in fair volume and a light loading of sweet corn was underway.

Surplus grass, clovers and small grains were available over most of the eastern half of the State where livestock were making good gains. The heavy growth, along with high temperatures and strong winds, has reduced moisture reserves and new growth was being slowed. In northwest, western and southern counties, grass has started, but was generally too short for cattle and supplemental feeding was necessarily continued. Some ranchmen were rounding up cattle preparatory to shipping to Flint Hills and Osage Pastures.

## Increase Reported In Production Of Good Grade Milk

Reports of eleven handlers subject to the Central West Texas Marketing Order showed receipts of 8,890,208 pounds of milk from Grade A producers during the month of March, Byford W. Bain, Market Administrator, announced today. This is an increase of 7.24% in the average daily production for March over February. Daily receipts of milk from producers was 286,781 pounds in March as compared with 267,427 pounds in February. The increase was the result of more milk sold per farm in March than for the month of February. The average production per farm was 521 pounds in March as compared with 484 pounds in February. Of the 8,890,208 pounds of milk received from producers, 7,462,580 pounds were classified as Class I (fluid milk, skim milk, buttermilk, flavored milk drinks, and cream) while 1,427,628 pounds were classified as Class II milk, or that used in manufactured products.

The average daily Class I sales decreased 2.07% in March from February. The total daily Class I sales were 261,264 pounds in March as compared with 266,780 pounds in February and 274,723 pounds in January. Producer receipts were 109.8% of the Class I sales in March, an increase of 8.6% over February and 17.8% over January. There were 550 producers delivering milk to handlers in the market in March, which is a decrease of 3 producers from February.

The minimum uniform price to be paid producers for March deliveries is \$6.17 per hundredweight, a decrease of 51 cents. This decrease is the result of a 34-cent drop in the Class I price, and more milk utilized in Class II products during March.

Handlers received 1,389,238 pounds of milk, skim milk, cream and other products from sources other than producers in March. This compares with 1,085,893 pounds in February and 1,500,509 pounds in January.

## West Texas Will Have Special Day

ABILENE, April 11. — Sunday, April 19, has been designated West Texas Day in the Southwestern Sports and Vacation Show at Fair Park in Dallas.

A feature of this largest annual sports show will be an all-West Texas exhibit presented by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

The Dallas show and display will mark inauguration of a permanent WTCC-sponsored program to publicize the attractions in West Texas to vacationers, hunters, fishermen and week-end trippers.

Ready for distribution at the show will be a special magazine, "West Texas," containing photographs of the major attractions of the 132-county area. This magazine will be used indefinitely to answer with requests for information about the region's interesting places. The WTCC headquarters here will relay inquiries to local chambers of commerce, touring services and other agencies.

Local chambers of commerce and other organizations that are sponsors of the program in its first season have been invited to have representatives at the West Texas exhibit from day to day.

The schedule of special days is: April 18, Big Bend National Park and Davis Mountains; April 20, the Hill Country and the Highland Lakes; April 21, Albany Fort Griffin Fandangle, El Paso and Monahans Sand Hills; April 22, Fort Worth Day; April 23, Lake Brownwood; April 24, Possum Kingdom Lake; April 25, Palo Duro Canyon, Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum and Ruidoso, New Mexico; April 26, Del Rio-Villa Acuna.

Twenty-seven local chambers and business organizations are sponsors.

## Action Approved At City Council Meeting Tuesday

G. C. Rosenthal was formally declared re-elected as mayor of Cisco by the City Commission at a meeting Tuesday night after Police Commissioner Joe Britain asked that his name be withdrawn from consideration in a runoff election scheduled for April 28.

In a statement made at the commission meeting, Mr. Britain said that his action was being taken because an attractive business proposition made him this week would not allow him to devote sufficient time to the duties of the mayor's office in the event he won the post.

"When I entered the race for mayor," Mr. Britain said, "I had expected to enter business for myself in Cisco. But I have just been offered a proposition by the Cen-Tex Supply Company that is too attractive to turn down."

"By accepting this position, I would be unable to be in Cisco except at night and I don't believe it would be fair to the citizens of our city for me to continue in the race when I could not devote the proper time to the office if elected. I expect to continue to make my home in Cisco."

"I expect to continue to serve as a member of the city commission to the best of my ability, and I pledge my wholehearted support to Mayor Rosenthal and the Commission in the management of the affairs of our community. Mr. Rosenthal has my best wishes for success in the office of mayor."

"Those who have supported me can be sure that I genuinely appreciate their encouragement."

Mr. Britain's action came after the Commission had completed its formal canvass of the returns of the April 7 election in which Mr. Rosenthal and Mr. Britain each received 401 votes for the mayor's office. Ace Lucas and Albert A. Hansen were declared elected to fill vacancies on the city commission.

After making his statement, Mr. Britain filed a formal request that his name be removed from consideration and that Mr. Rosenthal be declared elected. This was approved by the commission and an order calling the runoff election on April 28 was cancelled by unanimous vote.

The new commissioners and Mr. Rosenthal will take the oaths of office for the new terms of office at the April 28 regular meeting of the city commission.

After he was declared re-elected, Mr. Rosenthal pledged himself "to do everything I can for the best interests of our city. I appreciate the type of campaign that Mr. Britain made in the mayor's race, and he has my sincere best wishes for success. We are pleased that we can continue to have him as a member of the commission where he has served with distinction."

"I am grateful for the support given me in the mayor's race, and our people can be sure that I will continue to devote my entire time to the office."

## THIEVES CART OFF SAFE FROM WESTERN UNION OFFICE HERE

Local, county and precinct officers were busy Wednesday morning investigating the theft of a safe at the Western Union office in the 100 block of West Eighth in which some \$200 and a large number of blank drafts were taken.

# Ordinance Restricting Water Usage Passes First Reading

An emergency ordinance, regulating and restricting the use of Lake Cisco water to essential uses, was passed on first reading Tuesday night at a semi-monthly meeting of the City Commission at the city hall.

Final action on the ordinance will be taken Tuesday night, April 28. Plans call for the ordinance to become effective early in May unless replenishing rains fall during the next two weeks on the Lake Cisco watershed. A recent survey showed that the city water reservoir has a supply for about ten months without

the use of city water for "the washing of business and residential buildings, houses, out-houses, garages, sheds, sidewalks and driveways; the use of water for washing automobiles, trucks, motorcycles or any motor vehicle of any type; the use of water for watering any ground, lawn, shrubs, flowers or tree, and the use of water for any purpose not essential."

Violations of the ordinance would be punishable by fine of \$10 to \$100 for each offense. The ordinance would prohibit

ordinance provides that water already used for one lawful purpose is exempted from the regulations. For example, bath water could be used on lawns and flowers.

It would be unlawful under the ordinance to use evaporative air-conditioners without circulating pumps.

Meanwhile, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal called on residents of the city to continue to practice strict conservation. He noted that due to the cooperation of volunteers the daily drain from Lake Cisco is comparatively low.

## HORTICULTURE CLASS DETAILS GIVEN FOR CITY FLOWER SHOW

The horticulture class in the annual Cisco Garden Club Flower Show scheduled for Saturday April 18, was attracting much comment, it was reported Wednesday by Mrs. Don Choate, general chairman. The show will be held in the Reynolds Building Saturday from 2 p. m. to 8:30 p. m.

The horticulture class is divided into 14 sections designed to include most of the specimens in season at this time of year. The following is a complete list of the sections:

Roses — (blooms should be 1/2 to 3/4 open), Pink, red, white, yellow, multi-color, single (any color), polyantha (one spray), climbing rose (one spray), red, pink, lavender, purple, white, cream, yellow, plicata, bicolor, amoena, collection of five.

Other iris, nor bearded — any color. Corms — any color. Bulbous plants — any color. Amaryllis — white, red, pink, salmon, striped and outdoor grown red. Daylilies — light yellow, deep yellow, orange, bicolor, red, purple and double. Pot plants — foliage plants, blooming plants, planter box of two or more plants and dish garden. Miscellaneous — any or all specimens for which there is no other place on the schedule.

It was stressed that the entry of flowers in the show was confined to local and area garden club members, but that the public was invited to the show.

THE OLD-FASHIONED VIRTUES

In today's atmosphere of pseudo-intellectualism, President Eisenhower's profoundest beliefs perhaps seem "corny" to many. His occasional emphasis on the "extraordinary virtues" of his parents, on the fact that they were "thrifty, economical and honest," and on the "lusty influence of the Bible in their lives," is doubtless corny, by current smart standards. Examining this presidential "corniness," in the lead article of the April Reader's Digest, Stanley High states: "The extent to which such homely virtues are out of date is Eisenhower's proof of what is wrong with this country. What has been wrong with the American government he sees as symptomatic of things gone wrong with the American people." The President hopes with all his heart for a renewal of religious faith that will produce a re-dedication to religious values and conduct. That is the substance of what Eisenhower has called his "long thoughts" about America. That is the substance of his one consuming ambition as the chosen leader of the American people. Politically, he had no ambition for the Presidency; now that he is in the White House he has no wish in the political sense, simply to go through four or eight years as the 34th President of the United States. But he is determined, Mr. High writes, "to use his influence and

drilling of a third test well in Lake Cisco park. Two wells have been sunk and the water from them now is being analyzed to its content for possible use as drinking water. Mr. Rosenthal pointed out that in drilling the test wells "we are seeking to learn all we can about our underground resources against the time when we might have to hunt a new source of supply." Cisco has never before faced a water shortage since Lake Cisco was built some 30 years ago. Three years of comparatively dry weather has left the lake water level at its lowest point since the reservoir was created. In other action, the commission approved an extension of a request for rights to water from the Battle Creek watershed for a period of 18 months. Possible crea-

tion of a new reservoir there with a pipe line to Cisco has been under study for some months. Regular monthly accounts were ordered paid. Present for the meeting were Mayor Rosenthal, Commissioners James McCracken, J. W. Slaughter, Joe Britain, and J. W. Sitton, City Attorney Edward Brown and City Secretary Hal Lavery.

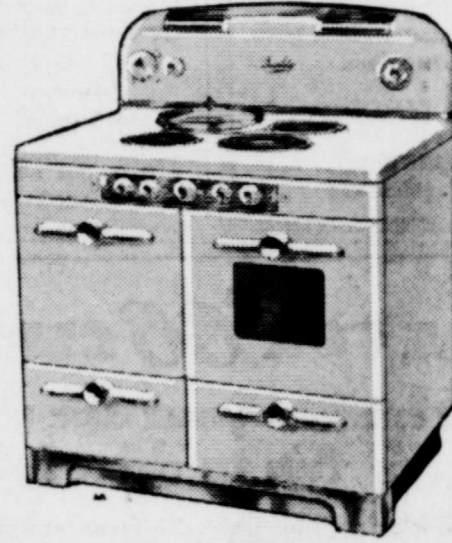

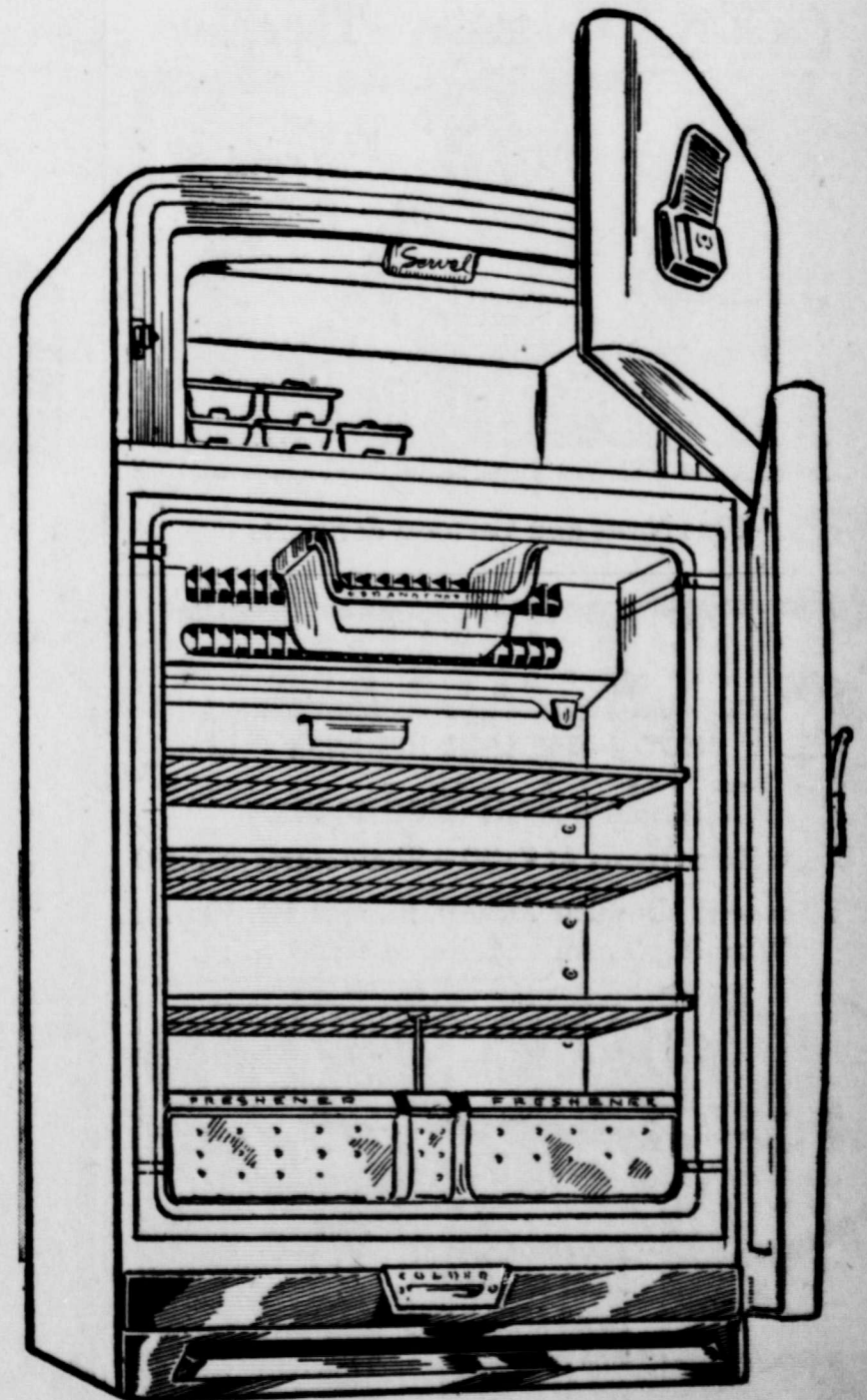

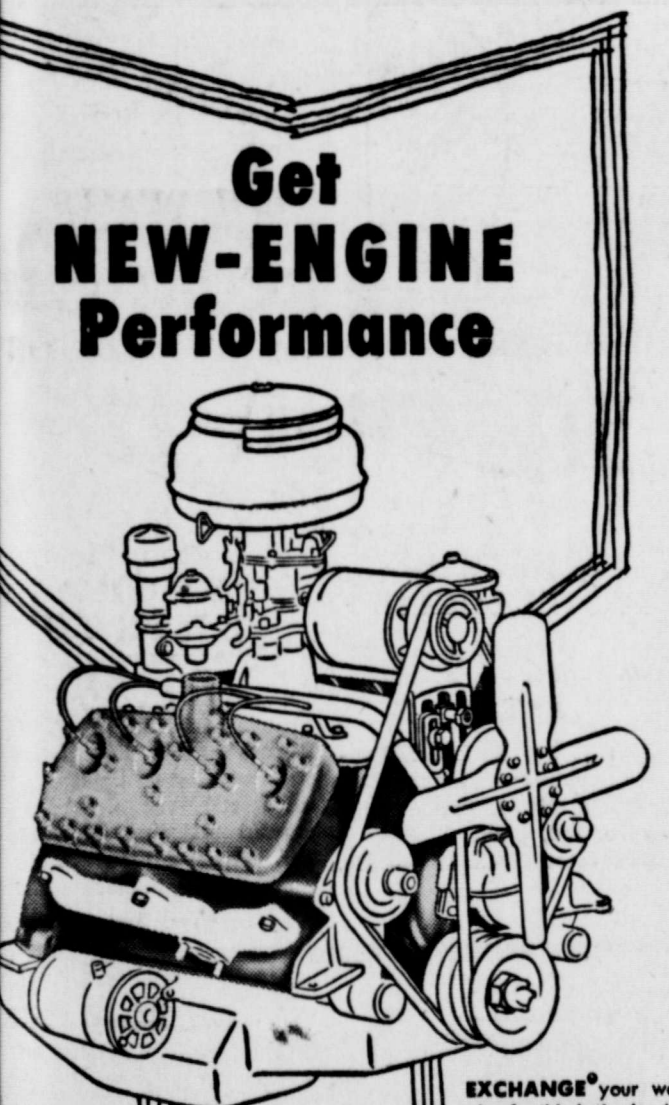
