**TEXAS FARM VALUES GAIN \$1,000,000,000**

**Population on Farms Increases Nearly Half a Million.**

We have on the tax assessors' rolls of Texas 156,946,934 acres of land, leaving approximately 11,900,000 acres of land not on the tax rolls which is owned by the State, exempt from taxation, or assessed as town and city lots. The assessed value of land has increased from \$3.92 per acre in 1900 to \$6.51 per acre in 1910, making a total increase of \$250,000,000 in assessed land values and when we consider that land is assessed at probably less than 50 per cent of its true value, we find an actual increase in farm land alone of \$1,100,000,000. The Federal Census reports verify this estimate by crediting us with a net gain of \$1,130,939,000 or 163 per cent during the past decade.

According to the reports of our Railroad Commission we have built 3952 miles of railroad during the past decade and it is estimated that a mile of railroad will add \$64,000 per mile to adjoining property. Railroad construction alone has added a quarter of a billion dollars to land values. The facilities on all roads have been increased, enabling the products to reach the market earlier and in better condition, thereby increasing the value of production. The improvement of our public highways has had its effect in increasing values and the immigration agents are entitled to a large share of credit for our development.

Our rural population in 1900 was 2,488,838 and in 1910 the census reports give us 2,958,838, making an increase of 469,992 people on our farms. The wealth per capita of farm lands and buildings of our rural population in 1900 was \$160 and in 1910 it was \$347 per capita, making an increase of \$187 per capita or 117 per cent, which measures, in a way, the prosperity of the Texas farmer. We have opened up during the past decade 64,187 farms and now have a total of 416,477 farms in operation and the average size of our farms shows a decrease of from 377 acres in 1900 to 262 acres in 1910, or an average of 26.95 acres per farm, all of which has undoubtedly had a strong influence in increasing the wealth per capita of the Texas farmer.

**From Denver in an Auto**

an Antonian Made the Run of 998 Miles in 48 Hours 50 Minutes

John W. Warren, of San Antonio, presents an interesting one made from Colorado, to San Antonio. He traveled 998 miles in 48 hours and 50 minutes. Speaking of the trip, he said: "Having made this run over several different routes, I consider this by far the best. The road had that I encountered was between Kerrville and Junction, eight or ten miles of this is very rough. With exception of about five miles of sand between Harlingen and Springfield, the rest of this road is all fairly good, and the sandy stretch I have referred to I pulled on and with a heavily loaded car. Every town named on this has garage supplies and accommodations, except here, Oklahoma. This is only a mile and postoffice. I have given the distance from town to the next and exact timing time I consumed between each place. The time covered will give you a very good idea of road conditions. We were days on the road. I expect a delegation of Colorado people probably twenty cars—make the trip to San Antonio in this route in the next sixty days in the interest of San Antonio-Denver highway."

"We give one cultivation before the potatoes come up. The second follows between July 4 and July 10, the third between July 18 and July 21. The cost of cultivation will be from \$1 to \$1.25 per acre.

At the time of the third cultivation we ditch out every row, using plow-shaped implement for this purpose, and flood ditches. Then we ditch out the remaining rows, and the second irrigation the water run down the row. The cost of ditching is cents per acre. Some seasons attempt to ditch twice to deepen the trench, but this is only possible on account of the growth of the vines.

"We begin irrigating July 25, water weekly until the first of September. The first watering is but succeeding waterings in volume. The spread of the water retards the advance of the vines. We shut off the water Sept. 1st to aid in maturing the tubers and to get a better quality."

Harvesting the Crop.

While the crop is maturing the field the potato farmer makes preparations for harvesting. Ranges, usually, with a contractor who makes a business of making labor for work in the best field at a stated price, say 4 to 5 cents a sack, the contractor agrees to furnish labor and to pick the potatoes. The grower himself does the grading. Before the advent of the industry in Colorado most of harvesting was done by itinerant labor—tramps and professional pickers who had started in the west and worked their way northward the season advanced. But since the same Germans, Japs and Russians who recruit the best field labor needed in the gathering of the potato crop.

By the first of October the potatoes have matured and filled out until the skins are firm. The digging is done by machinery. The potatoes are pulled from the vines by hand labor and carried to a grader, which sorts them according to size. Then they are sacked, loaded on wagons and carried either to town for immediate use or they are hauled to the farmers' cellar and stored to wait a rise in the market. The cost of harvesting the crop will run from \$4 to \$6 per picking and sacking and \$1 per acre for grading. The sacks cost from \$50 to \$70 per thousand. The cost of hauling the potatoes to market is \$3.25 per acre based on a short haul of about three miles and a crop of 100 sacks.

As to the cost of growing an acre of potatoes in the irrigated sections of the west estimates vary. L. A. Moorhouse of the division of farm management investigations of the United States department of agriculture secured the following estimates from a well known farmer:

The average yield on the farm of this man during the last ten years has been 163.7 bushels per acre. The average farm price for his potatoes during the same period has been 12.5 cents per bushel. Another estimate given by J. W. Working, co-worker with Dr. Moorhouse, places the actual cost to the grower at very close to \$30 per acre.

Overcoming Obstacles to Successful Irrigated Potato Growing.

The general farm problem in the irrigated districts of Colorado is the control of the Russian thistle and extermination of grasshoppers, which annually do much damage to all farm crops. Farmers unite and employ community methods to affect both of these. The method of fighting is for a number of farmers to petition to the board of county commissioners to appoint a supervisor of the work. The general plan is to tear up the surface of the ground, to use poisons and to burn all tumble weeds in sight. The individual farmer also employs a grasshopper catcher, which is pulled over the ground by horses and is the means of catching thousands of the pest. When caught the grasshoppers are burned.

I have called attention to the Fusarium fungus, which is by far the most dangerous enemy the potato farmers of Colorado have to meet. This is evidently caused by a condition of the soil. When new land is used to grow potatoes, the first year the potatoes are of excellent quality, and the second year, also they do well, but after three or four crops have been taken from the soil it is less vigorous, and an examination will show approaching fungus troubles. The Fusarium makes its appearance in this way, according to Mr. Fitch, who has made a

## BLACK HAND ROCKEFELLER

and Property of Richest Man Threatened—Estate is Under Heavy Guard.

NEW YORK.—The secret of the recent agitation and alarm at John Rockefeller's estate in Pocantico Hills, where for weeks disorder and time have been frequent, has been unraveled. An investigator says the Black Hand gang, which has levied tribute on the 400 or so Italian laborers on the Rockefeller estate has come so emboldened as to threaten the lives and property of Rockefeller and of his son and his grandchildren, demanding heavy ransom and threatening death if their demands are ignored or if the authorities are called in.

They have threatened murder and snapping against the persons of John magnate and his son, John Rockefeller Jr., and the latter's youngest children, who are now of measles at the Kent house. They have also threatened murder against Frederick A. Briggs, the superintendent of the estate, and a man named Dunson, who bosses the teamsters and other gangs of Italian laborers on the grounds. The estate is under heavy guard.

## FLIRTING COUNT JAILED

Yankee Police Mete Drastic Punishment for Annoying Girls.

Count Charles Edda of Sweden has learned that flirting is a dangerous pastime in America. He was sentenced to one month in jail in Yankee police court for forcing his attention upon girls on the street.

He was arrested on South Broadway by Police Chief Daniel Wolf and Lieut. Peter McGowan. He was fashionably dressed at the time and carried a riot of money when Miss Beal, a girl, about 18 years old, as she was about to board a trolley car. The policeman asked her if she was acquainted with the man. She said he was a stranger.

The count was then arrested. He said he was a Swedish nobility and gave his address as Orange street, Brooklyn. When first arraigned in court he fell to the floor. The marshal had to pick him up bodily and carry him into a cell.

When arraigned before Judge Beal he said he had merely been flirting and saw no harm in that. It was shown that he had carried his flirtations so far as to take girls he was unacquainted with by the arm. He was then sentenced—New York American.

## DEFENDS PRISON BOARD

Walthall Will Be Assisted by Crawford and Mead.

AUSTIN, Tex.—In the suits pending against the Penitentiary Commission, and brought in its behalf, in which several hundred thousand dollars are involved, the Attorney General's department will be represented by Attorney General Walthall, First Assistant R. E. Crawford and Assistant C. E. Mead. It was originally announced that Mr. Walthall alone would represent the commission from the department. W. L. Hill the commission's attorney in Huntsville, will be special counsel. The opposing litigants are represented by Lane, Wolters & Storey of Houston, Keberg & Neethe of Galveston and other well known attorneys and the State has a hard legal battle ahead in the Fort Bend and Walker Counties district courts this term.

Besides being of big financial importance, there are numerous questions involved in these suits as to contracts.

## PARCELS POST JANUARY 1

The parcels post system authorized by Congress at the last session will be in readiness for operation by January 1, as announced by Postmaster General Hitchcock. The business will extend over more than a million miles of rural delivery. The government will have the advantage over the express companies in the smallest parcels, as the rate will only be a cent an ounce up to four ounces for all distances and 2 cents for the first pound or fraction thereof up to the limit of eleven pounds on the first zone of fifty miles. The difference between present express rates and the proposed postage will not be much, and above eight pounds the advantage will be on the side of the express companies. The government does not aim to get any profit from the service, or in the language of the statute, the business must "insure the receipt of revenue from such service adequate to pay the cost thereof."

# The Gambler

(By Elbert Hubbard)

Of the "morality" of gambling nothing need be said. All I affirm is that it is simply absurd to enter on a habit where success is defeat and to win is calamity.

The successful amateur gambler graduates into a professional—he has to, for business men shun him.

No man who plays cards for money can keep his position long. The fact is, none of us have a surplus of brains, and if we are going to succeed in business all the power we have to our credit is demanded. The man who can play cards at night and do business in the day time hasn't yet been born.

Life is a bank account with so much divine energy at your disposal. What are you going to do with it? If you draw your checks for this, you cannot draw for that. Take your choice. And above all, do not draw on the Bank of Futurity by breathing bad air, keeping bad hours and bad company.

The man who succeeds in business is the one who goes to bed before 10 at night; and only one thing is the jealous of, and that is outdoor exercise.

Gambling robs a man of rest, and the keen edge of life is lost in shuffling the pasteboards. All he gives to his employer or the world is the discard. Outside of his play he is weak, indifferent person, and his weakness is very apt to manifest itself in burdening his friends.

The curse of gambling does not fall on the gambler alone, any more than the drunkard alone suffers for his fault. Suffering falls upon every one within the radius of the gambler.

If your gambler is on a salary he very often comes around for his wages before payday; then he gets to discounting his salary to a money shark; then, if he can, he will borrow his pay before he earns it, without first consulting you. He intends to pay it back—oh, yes!

He wins and pays it back. This encourages him to borrow more the next time. He takes more in order to win more. He is now obliged to pay

heavily because his debts are accumulating. It is an old story, and dozens of men in Sing Sing can tell you all about it.

To do business with gamblers leads, as a rule, to disappointment, because with gamblers the idea of reciprocity, mutuality and co-operation, except to skin somebody, does not exist.

From betting to begardom is only a step. No man can play the pasteboards or the races continually and win. Mathematically, he is bound to lose at last. And of all the fools the biggest is the man who bets on "a sure thing."

John Madden has followed the business for a quarter of a century, and says: "It quit betting years ago, and if I ever bet again it will be because the disease has gotten the better of my business judgment."

The bookmaker gets it all—he has but to wait, and the whole thing is his. It is just like the game where the dealer takes care of all the bets and gives the first booster in new in the hole. If the booster does not get the "live one's" money, the dealer will. He gets all the others have, as sure as death, if they continue to play.

Do not imagine that all gambling is done in the cities. "Man made the cities, God the country," he said, and made the small towns. Hardly a village in America is free from the scourge.

Gambling means blurred vision, weak muscles, shrunken nerves, loss of sleep, lack of physical exercise, irregular meals, bad air, excitement, a devil's monopoly of the bad one within the radius of the gambler.

I am not a member of the Christian Endeavor Society, the Epworth League, the Y. M. C. A., the Knights of Columbus or the Society for the Suppression of Vice, and all I say here is simply a little plain talk by one who has done it, and to others, with all soft sentiment omitted.

Boys, we need all the brains we have in our work.

## PORT ARANSAS TO THE FRONT

Exportation of Cotton From the Texas Port Is Extremely Heavy.

The exportation of between 300,000 and 500,000 bales of cotton is what is looked forward to by Port Aransas during the coming season as the result of the securing of deep water. Fully 300,000 bales are said to be in sight, and those in a position to know state that the new port can handle upwards of half a million bales if the business is offering.

Preparations are well advanced for taking care of a large business during the season now approaching. Fully twenty feet of water throughout the harbor has been provided by the government, extensive terminal facilities are being completed, and a number of vessels have already been arranged for in anticipation of an early and large movement of cotton for foreign ports. Significance may be attached to the fact that the J. H. W. Steele Company of Galveston will open a branch office at the new port on September 1 for the booking of cotton and other freight, while the fact that over \$500,000 have been expended by the Alexander Brown syndicate in providing for ocean terminals may be taken as meaning that the future of Port Aransas was foreseen by Y. Van Den Burg, representative of the Aransas Pass Channel and Dock Company, has just been in Galveston on matters connected with the opening of the new port.

Mr. Van Den Burg is enthusiastic concerning the outlook for business. "The prospects are very bright for a big showing during the first year of deep water at Harbor Island, where the terminals are located," says Mr. Van Den Burg. "The territory from Port Aransas to Brownsville, which covers the bar of Aransas Pass there is now twenty-three feet. We have plenty of water on which to do business, and it is a matter of time before we will have a big showing during the coming season. Our terminal railroad is seven miles long, extending from railroad connection at the town of Aransas Pass to the harbor and the Gulf of Mexico, and has a storage capacity for 20,000 bales of cotton. The terminals are protected by a complete system of water mains and the supply from a 100-foot tower 100 feet above the ground, with a capacity of 100,000 gallons. We are now having built a twin-engine tug for towing as well as fire-fighting purposes. The company has secured a number of barges and will operate a barge line to Rockport and Corpus Christi.

"Galveston will not feel the effects of the diversion of business to Port Aransas, for the reason that the Southwest is developing so rapidly that new business is being created that it lost through the opening of the new port. Nevertheless, Port Aransas is going to do a large business and grow with the country that back of it. This section of the State, as you are aware, is developing marvelously. The production of cotton this year is 50 per cent greater than last season, and with new acreage brought under cultivation each year it will not be many years until Southwest Texas will be a big factor in the production of cotton. There is a wonderful future for the country and Port Aransas, as the nearest port, will profit by the development."

The work of giving deep water to the Aransas Pass district will advance. Several months ago David M. Pletton & Co. completed the breakwater constructed on St. Joseph's Island, and are now completing the dike is of rock construction, 1000 feet in length, extending in an easterly direction in about the center of the island, and connecting with the east jetty at the western end. The work cost \$200,000 and required the placing of 50,000 tons of rock.

The work is well advanced on the dredging of the upper end of Harbor Island. This contract is held by the Bowers Southern Dredging Company. The contract calls for the removal of material in dredging a roadstead twenty feet deep, 1200 feet wide and 5000 feet long, and a channel extending from the upper end of the roadstead twenty feet deep, 400 feet wide and 5420 feet long. The contract price is approximately \$143,000.

WILL HELP FARMERS. SENATE IS TO ACT ON BILL NEXT WINTER.

Provides for Government Aid, Placing of an Agricultural Expert in Every Community Needing Services—Report Plan to Increase Country's Yield of Crops by Many Millions.

The Lever agricultural extension bill, which provides for the placing of an agricultural expert in every agricultural community in this country, will be laid before the United States Senate as soon as Congress convenes this winter. The measure passed the House in the closing hours of the last session.

According to the provisions of the bill the Federal government will grant each State in the Union a fixed annual appropriation of \$10,000 for the purpose of establishing and maintaining a farm demonstration service.

The State, through its agricultural college, may appoint a trained agriculturalist in touch with the latest scientific advances in farming to have charge of this work.

Will Share Other Expenses. In addition to the initial \$10,000 the Federal government will share dollar for dollar with the State the expense of any further extension of the service the State may desire to make. In this way it is hoped ultimately to place an expert in each county of the United States.

This government agent will be appointed to work with the farmers of the district and explain in actual practice the most approved methods of treating land and crops.

It is believed that such work will increase the annual yield in this country by many millions of dollars, while methods now in common use are impoverishing the soil and reducing the yield per acre over large areas.

STEEL FOR ORIENT EXTENSION ARRIVES.

San Angelo, Texas—Large shipments from Girtin to Alois may be expected to arrive in San Angelo the latter part of this month. The Orient receivers in Texas are now closing contracts with graders and trucking outfits to do the work of extension just as rapidly as possible.

CHAMPION SNAKE KILLER

Kills Eight in One Day and Captures Live Rattlesnake.

Waynesboro, Pa.—Christian Callmer of Glen Furney, who hunts rattlers for their venom as an antidote cure, claiming the killing championship. In one day he killed eight and captured a monster rattler alive. He pulled part of the hide off a blacksnake that escaped him.

## SOLDIER'S CANT VOTE

HAS NO CLAIM TO THE FLAG HE FIGHTS FOR.

Sergeant Who Has Been Twenty-three Years in Army Longs for Time When He Can Stay in One Place Long Enough to Be Naturalized.

New York.—The one thing the brave heart of Sergeant Timothy J. Leary, "of the Tenth United States Infantry, your honor," pines for is to become a citizen of the nation which he has served as a soldier for more than twenty-three years.

As the rolling stone gathers no moss, neither has Sergeant Tim been able to accumulate any citizenship, for he has been ordered about from post to post so often that he never has lived in any one place for the full year, which is a prerequisite for naturalization.

Sergeant Tim, always on the move, always with the proud title of American citizen dancing before his clear, soldierly eyes, arrived in New York on the steamship Carrillo, in charge of a prisoner he was taking to Washington, D. C.

"In one year more," said Sergeant Tim, "I will be able to retire on a pension and then, believe me, I will sit down in one place and not budge till I get my papers—till I have the legal right to cast my vote and to call the flag I've fought for my flag."

Sergeant Tim was born in Ireland. He came to the United States when he was 22 years old, his broad chest covering as much patriotism and as ardent a love of freedom as ever pulsed in any man's bosom. He also loved a scrap, did Tim. So the first thing he did on his arrival was to enlist in the army.

For eleven months he was stationed at Governor's Island. But before the year was rounded out he was sent with his regiment to Alaska. More jumps followed, and then more, so that Sergeant Tim has not yet been able to call any one place his home for the requisite twelve months.

But his time is coming, and he says he can never be quite happy until he can march to the polls on election day and cast his ballot.

SCIENTIFIC PREPARATION  
"We give one cultivation before the potatoes come up. The second follows between July 4 and July 15, the third between July 15 and July 21. The cost of cultivation will be from \$1 to \$1.25 per acre."  
"At the time of the third cultivation we ditch out every row, using plow-shaped implement for this purpose, and flood ditches. Then we ditch out the remaining rows, and the second irrigation the water run down every row. The cost of ditching is 50 cents per acre. Some seasons attempt to ditch twice in order to deepen the trench, but this is as far as possible on account of the growth of the vines."  
"We begin irrigating July 25, water weekly until the first of September. The first watering is but succeeding waterings are in volume. The spread of the water retards the advance of the vines. We shut off the water September 1st to aid in maturing the tubers and to get a better quality. Harvesting the Crop.  
While the crop is maturing in the field the potato farmer makes preparations for harvesting. The arrangements, usually, with a contractor who makes a business of employing labor for work in the beet field, a stated price, say 4 to 5 cents a sack, the contractor agrees to furnish labor and to pick the potatoes. The grower himself does the grading. Before the advent of the industry in Colorado most harvesting was done by itinerant labor—tramps and professional men who had started in the season and worked their way northward. But since the same Germans, Japs and Russians who recruit the beet field laborer attend to the gathering of the potato crop.  
By the first of October the potatoes have matured and filled out until the skins are firm. The digging is done by machinery. The potatoes are pulled from the vines by hand labor and carried to a grader, which asserts them according to size. Then they are sacked, loaded on wagons and carried either to town for immediate use or they are hauled to the farmers' cellar and stored to wait a rise in the market. The cost of harvesting the crop will run from \$4 to \$6 per picking and sacking and \$1 per acre for grading. The sacks cost from \$50 to \$70 per thousand. The cost of hauling the potatoes to market is \$2.50 per acre based on a short haul of about three miles and a crop of 100 sacks. As to the cost of growing an acre of potatoes in the irrigated sections of the west estimates vary. L. A. Moorhouse of the division of farm management investigations of the United States department of agriculture secured the following estimates:

## PRIEST TO END DAYS WITH LEPERS

Man Who Has Won College Honors Will Share Hardships With Victims of Dread Disease.

ST. LOUIS, Mo.—After he completes his post graduate course in Harvard University this fall, the Rev. Charles Keller, a Catholic priest, graduated in June from the American Medical College here, will go to Molokai Island, in the Hawaiian group, and pass the rest of his life among the leprosy victims who are the only people living there. He will share their hardships and expose himself to infection from the disease, with the end in view of discovering a cure for leprosy, the goal of scientists for centuries.

Father Keller is 48 years old. He resigned his pastorate in Kahoka, Mo., because a throat trouble made it impossible for him to preach. His voice was restored by an operation in St. Louis, and then the priest entered the St. Louis University of Medicine. After a year Father Keller changed to the American Medical University.

Father Keller won the highest class honors when he was graduated from the American University last June. He studied nervous diseases six weeks in the Alexian Brothers' hospital, and then went to Harvard. He expects to depart for Honolulu November 1.

ST. PETERSBURG.—The mutiny in the Black Sea squadron of the Russian fleet has led to the arrest of the naval judge advocate at Sebastopol by the secret police, who accuse him of showing partiality toward the mutineers.

NEW MEXICO'S RICHEST MAN IS FOUND SCALDED.

Body of Solomon Luna, Maker of New State, Discovered in a Vat of Sheep Dip on His Ranch—Was He Thrown in by Enemies or Did He Fall, Overcome by a Smothering Spell?

Albuquerque, N. M.—Was Solomon Luna, father of New Mexico's statehood and the state's wealthiest man, murdered by enemies?

That is what Spanish-American friends of the millionaire banker and sheep grower are asking.

His body was found in a vat containing thousands of gallons of sheep dip on his ranch at Horse Springs, Socorro county. The vat contained manure of lime, sulphur, tobacco and water.

Camp employes saw a body floating in the vat. The boiling water had peeled the skin from hands and feet. The body was not recognized until one of the Mexican herders discovered it was that of Luna.

Luna's friends, both here and at Santa Fe, express doubt as to his death being accidental.

Those who think Luna's death was accidental deny that he had any enemies in the state and he was on cordial terms with his employees. He had complained of a weak heart for several days, and it is presumed he was seized with a smothering spell during the night and went out of some fresh air or a drink of water from a hydrant near the vat when he was overcome and pitched headlong into the open tank.

Solomon Luna for eleven years had been republican national committee man for New Mexico. After the state was admitted to the union he was the popular choice for his first United States senator, but he refused to accept the election.

## CLOUDBURST KILLS SEVEN
