ARREST CLEARS UP BURGLARY HERE

LOVE QUILTS RACE AGAINST MILLER

SAYS LEAD OF OPPONENT TOO MUCH FOR HIM

URGES BACKERS TO AID IN DEFEATING GOV. ALFRED E. SMITH

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Aug. 14.—State Senator Thomas B. Love, of Dallas, today announced his withdrawal from the race for Lieutenant-Governor of Texas. In announcing his withdrawal he said that he believed it improbable that he could overcome the substantial lead of his opponent, Lieut.-Governor Barry E. Miller, and obtain a majority of votes in the run-off primary.

An avowed opponent of Governor Alfred E. Smith as the Democratic Presidential nominee, Senator Love had been the storm center of a political row for several months as the result of the action of six counties in the state removing his name from the ballot in the first Democratic primary.

He Makes Statement
Senator Love's statement, in part, follows:

"Because I believe that I can best serve the cause of good government in Texas by following that course, I have withdrawn my name as a candidate for Lieutenant-Governor. Looking squarely at all phases of the situation I do believe it is impossible that I can overcome the substantial lead of my opponent and obtain a majority of the votes in the run-off primary, that to further continue the contest would serve no useful purpose but would result in a waste of time and effort and add to the part of my friends throughout the state, which might be conserved and utilized in defeating Al Smith in November. I want to see all the forces of good government consolidated and concentrated on this objective."

NEW FEDERAL COURT OPENS

FIRST SESSION DEALS WITH CASE FROM LAMB COUNTY

Opening of the first term of the Lubbock Federal court of the Northern District of Texas was held this morning in the offices of W. D. Glendon, referee in bankruptcy case of James Campbell Wicker, of Littlefield, comprised the business of the court today.

Elkins Is Trustee
Clyde Elkins, local attorney, was selected trustee. Mr. Glendon heard the testimony of several witnesses this morning and passed on the claims which were presented. All of the claims prepared in the proper manner were allowed, and additional time was given others to prepare their claims.

Bond under which the trustee is to be placed was held up by Mr. Glendon until after the examination of the bankrupt, so as to better determine the nature of the case. This is the first matter to be considered by the federal court here. Federal authorities stated here believe, however, that the federal court business will be heavy this fall.

Texas Republicans Choose Candidates

PORT WORTH, Aug. 14 (AP).—W. H. Holmes of Amarillo was nominated for governor and T. M. Kennedy of Houston was chosen as the nominee for the United States senate when the state Republican convention was held here Tuesday. Resolutions were adopted endorsing the administration of President Coolidge and pledging faith in Herbert Hoover, the Republican presidential nominee.

Mrs. Lena Moore of Cameron county was nominated for lieutenant governor and C. O. Harris of Tarrant county for attorney general. Other nominees are: Jeff N. Miller, Harris county, railroad commissioner; J. H. McBroome, El Paso associate justice, court of criminal appeals; Harvey W. Gilbert, Jefferson county, commissioner of general land office; C. P. Seale, Val Verde state treasurer; Mrs. Verna B. Adams, Tarrant county, state superintendent of public instruction; T. J. Martin, Kinney county, commissioner of agriculture, and John P. Grant, Harris county, comptroller.

Eaton Plans Short Courses Near Here

Plans to hold a farmers short course in the vicinity of Lubbock the latter part of August every year beginning next summer, were announced this morning by D. F. Eaton, Lubbock county agent. Mr. Eaton said that plans were started too late for a course this year, but that an elaborate program would be arranged by next summer. The short course will be held in the interior of the experimental station east of the city.

Two Badly Burned In Flames Of Car

DALLAS, Aug. 14 (AP).—Roy Jennings, 28, and Miss Velma Bennett, 22, were severely burned late Monday when the automobile in which they were riding caught fire as Jennings struck a match. The car was immediately enveloped in flames, gasoline having been spilled in the interior a few minutes before when the tank was filled. Firemen from a nearby station rescued occupants of the car with the aid of fire extinguishers.

TEXAS PEN SYSTEM IS TO BE PROBED AS TRICK'S RESULT

HOUSTON, Aug. 14.—One of the stickiest prison escapes ever devised by convicts anywhere would have worked perfectly, and two prisoners would soon be free men if Raymond Hall hadn't let his impatience get the better of him.

Hall couldn't wait. So, instead of being free he is confined on a charge of first degree murder, and may die in the chair.

Hall, who has a long criminal record, was sentenced to 99 years last winter for a holdup. He was tried at Wichita Falls, and was ordered confined in the farm prison at Huntsville, near Houston. Meets Another Lad
When he was sent to prison there was another convict sent with him—a young chap named Raymond Tucker, who was due to serve out his term for violating the liquor laws. On the train the two got acquainted and cooked up this scheme:

They traded names and papers. At the end of one year Hall, posing as Tucker, would be released.

Then, when Hall had had time to get out of Texas, Tucker would reveal his real identity, and while he undoubtedly would be punished for aiding in Hall's escape, the punishment would not be very heavy, and having served his year, he too would be freed shortly afterward.

It probably would have worked perfectly if Hall hadn't got impatient. Huntsville prison officials never discovered the hoax; they listed Hall as Tucker, serving a year.

Silver's Pal Says He Slew Treasurer

PORT WORTH, Aug. 14 (AP).—Assuming that and not J. R. Silver, fired the shot which killed Roscoe Wilson, Majestic theater treasurer, in a holdup here January 31, 1927, W. A. Stone, serving a life sentence in connection with the slaying, admitted Tuesday in a letter that he shot the youthful theater employee.

Stone's confession was in the form of a letter sent Will R. Parker, attorney for Silver, who was given the death penalty in the case. Silver, now in the state penitentiary, has been sentenced to die in the electric chair September 2 for the crime.

The letter will be incorporated in Silver's plea for commutation of Silver's sentence to life imprisonment.

SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 14 (AP).—Cadet Piper George Percival, of Looke, Ark., was slightly injured today when he made a practice dive at a captive balloon too realistic and was unable to level off before his plane crashed into the ground. Officers estimated that had he had an additional 20 feet of altitude when he started to level off he would have cleared the ground easily.

The plane crashed into a fence after hitting the ground and was badly wrecked. Scratches and bruises were all of the injuries the flier received.

CIVIC LEADERS TO GATHER IN REGULAR MEET

NO ACTION IN CALLING BOND ISSUE EXPECTED TONIGHT, HOWEVER

FAIR DIRECTORS PLAN BIGGEST AND BEST POULTRY SHOW IN HISTORY OF SECTION; MOWERY TO BE IN CHARGE

Officials of the Panhandle South Plains Fair are making arrangements for the biggest poultry show that has ever been held in West Texas to be held in connection with the fair this fall, October 1 to 6 inclusive.

Premiums compare favorably with the premiums of all regional fairs of Texas, totaling \$25 per class on all standard breeds in addition to special prizes and sweepstakes.

Mowery In Charge
Ray C. Mowery, professor in the school of Agriculture at the Texas Technological College has been selected as superintendent of the department and A. P. VanWinkle, editor of the Poultry News at Dallas has been named as judge for the show.

Mr. Mowery has charge of the poultry plant at the Tech and is head of the poultry department. He is a graduate of the Texas A. & M. College where he took work in poultry raising and this summer he is taking graduate work at Ames Iowa. His knowledge and contact with the poultry breeders of the Plains section will enable him to stage the biggest show that has ever been held on the Plains, fair.

DU PONT GIVES AL \$50,000

NEW YORK, Aug. 14 (AP).—Pierre S. DuPont, Wilmington, Del., who is on leave of absence as chairman of the board of the General Motors corporation and who recently declared his support of the candidacy of Governor Smith, has contributed \$50,000 to the Democratic campaign fund.

This was announced today by John J. Raskob, Chairman of the National committee. Mr. DuPont's donation is the largest contribution on record this year. The two largest donations heretofore were \$10,000 each, one by John D. Ryan and the other by John T. Smith, counsel for the General Motors corporation.

FEDERAL SITE INSPECTOR IS NOT HERE YET

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 14.—Governor Smith today notified Rev. Dr. John Roach Straton that their proposed debate on his public career must take place in Calvary Baptist church in New York city or not at all.

"If this is so, it is a clever conspiracy," Dr. Straton, who acknowledged the possibility of a conspiracy was somewhat reticent, had been informed by a reporter that the latter had bought a quart of whiskey over the hotel bar. The property passed to Dr. Straton six weeks ago and is to be used for the Greenwood Lake Christian assembly headquarters.

Cure Is Found For Infantile Paralysis

BERKELEY, Cal., Aug. 14 (AP).—Infantile paralysis may be checked with little injury to patients providing treatment with convalescent serum is given within 48 hours after symptoms are discovered, two University of California physicians reported today to the Journal of the American Medical Association. The physicians, Dr. E. B. Shaw and Dr. H. E. Thelander, reported that in 17 cases of children exhibiting marked signs of infantile paralysis serum was administered within 48 hours with no deaths or persistent "after paralysis."

Contest Filed In Ft. Worth Election

PORT WORTH, Aug. 14 (AP).—Nominations of R. A. Stuart for district attorney of Tarrant county in the Democratic primary, July 28, will be contested by Jesse E. Martin, candidate for re-election, who was defeated by 21 votes. Martin said he expected to file the contest petition some time today.

Stuart conducted his campaign on the issue that the law had not been enforced, charging that open gambling and the sale of liquor were common in Fort Worth. Martin attacked Stuart's record as an oil operator during the campaign.

WHISKEY SOLD AT BAR IN HIS HOTEL; HE DENIES KNOWING

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—A dispatch to the New York Evening Post from Greenwood Lake, New York, today quoted the Rev. John Roach Straton as saying that "liquor interests" seeking to embarrass him in his controversy with Governor Smith may have been back of the reported sale of liquor in a hotel recently acquired by the minister.

"The liquor interests may have put the proprietor of the hotel up to this because of my discussion with Governor Smith," the pastor of Calvary Baptist church was quoted.

FUNDS NEEDED TO SEND GRID BOYS TO CAMP

Ways and means of financing the proposed ten-day camp of approximately fifty members of the Lubbock high school Westerner squad of gridmen at Two Draw lake, near Post, are now being considered by Coach Henry Frnka, who is going forward with plans for the camp.

The approximate cost of the camp for the fifty boys has been placed at \$400, less than ten dollars for each man during the entire period of the camp.

Forty-five boys were present at a meeting held last night at the high school gymnasium, and much enthusiasm was displayed in the camp, which will open August 22, and last until the opening of school. According to Coach Frnka, the city of Post has offered to let the Westerners use a football field near Two Draw lake which was specially prepared for the Post high school team. Sleeping quarters will be in the large wooden building used as a tabernacle. The boys will have access to the lake for swimming, but Coach Frnka intends to limit the amount of swimming as this tends to soften the athletes.

Schedule Worked Out

The tentative daily schedule worked out by Coach Frnka includes: Rise at 6 a. m.; breakfast at 6:30; theory of football or skill practice from 7 to 8:30 a. m.; in suits and on the field for workout at 9 a. m.; lunch at 12; rest until 2 p. m.; theory of football from 2:30 to 3:30 p. m.; suits again at 4 p. m.; dinner at 7 p. m.; and in bed at 9:45 p. m.

A weight sheet which will show the weight of each player before and after practice will be kept as a record of the boys' conditioning. The athlete is expected to be in condition at the end of the camp. Meals will be served in regular army style, and cooked on an army field range.

Coach Frnka stresses the value of the camp as an opportunity for the boys to get rid of their early season stiffness, and to be in good condition for later training. It will also get the boys better conditioned as a team, and will give them an opportunity to rest, as there will be no lessons or classes.

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MAN PARDONED BY FERGUSONS HELD IN JAIL

Mystery surrounding the theft of a diamond ring and other valuables, estimated to be worth about \$600, from the apartment of Mr. and Mrs. Cliff C. Cooke, 15th Street and Avenue M, on the night of July 5 was thought to have been cleared last night with the arrest of Leonard Harvey, ex-convict.

Identification of a diamond ring on the hand of a local girl by Mrs. Cooke led to Harvey's arrest. He was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Verne L. Ford and Capt. More at Plainview last night. Mrs. Cooke was shopping in a downtown store when she recognized the ring on the hand of a clerk in the store. The matter was reported to sheriff's department. Information gained from the girl wearing the ring culminated in the arrest of Harvey. She said that he had given it to her.

Charges of burglary were filed against him this morning, but no bond has been set.

According to Sheriff Bud Johnston, Harvey is an ex-convict, having been pardoned by the former governor, "Ma" Ferguson. He has been convicted of theft at Abilene and Anson, and has other criminal records. Sheriff Johnston said.

A watch, dinner ring, and several other rings which were stolen at the same time have not been recovered. The identified ring was in the same mounting as when it was stolen.

The theft of the jewelry occurred the night of the 2nd of July between midnight and 5 a. m. The jewelry was taken from a table near the heads of Mr. and Mrs. Cooke who were sleeping and knew nothing of the robbery until the next morning. The Cooke occupy an upstairs apartment, leading officers to believe that the robber was familiar with the place.

Expense of a powerful crime ring is thought by Deputy Verne Ford to have resulted with Harvey's arrest. Ford stated that he believed Harvey connected with a number of thefts which have occurred here in the past several months. According to Deputy Ford, Harvey was pardoned in December, 1926, while serving a term for burglary.

NEGRO BOOTBLACK CONFESSES CRIME OF ROBBING AND SLAYING EVANSTON TEACHER; IS TRACED THROUGH WATCH

CHICAGO, Aug. 14.—Evanston police today wrote "solved" across the case of Jennie Meta Constance, slain near Northwestern university campus last Tuesday night.

David Shanks, young negro bootblack, was held as the slayer of the 42-year-old English teacher. Police said he had made a confession.

Robbery was the motive Shanks gave when police asked him why he had struck down Miss Constance shortly after she started down a dark street from the university library.

"Didn't Make Enough"
"All I get for shining shoes is five," he told officers, "and that's about \$5 a week. That ain't enough, and that's why I set out to rob some woman last Tuesday night. I guess it wasn't worth while for all I got was a wrist watch that I sold for \$1.19."

It was the watch that led the police to Shanks. A jeweler notified police a wrist watch had been brought to him for removal of the initials, "J. M. C." Officers were waiting last night when Lehart Bastian, a youth whose father operates an Evanston shoe shine parlor, called for the time piece. Bastian told of buying the watch for \$1.19 from Shanks, whom his father employed.

Shanks was arrested as he was polishing a customer's boots.

"Where did you get this watch?" one of the officers demanded, while others covered Shanks with revolvers.

"Don't shoot," the negro cried.

"I done it. I killed her."

Later, with a stenographer making a copy of his statements, Shanks went into details.

"The pipe I hit her with was in the gutter, and I picked it up," he said.

He hid in dark spot.

"I walked until I came to a dark spot in which to hide while waiting for some woman to come along alone."

"When she got opposite me I jumped out and struck her down. I grabbed her purse, but there wasn't even a cent in it. The only thing she had was the watch."

"Once she groaned, so I hit her again with the pipe."

Following the negro's arrest and statement, he was taken secretly from the north side suburb but later brought back after a strong guard had been placed about the Evanston jail. A threatening crowd of about 1,000 persons had gathered about the jail earlier in the evening.

Was Educated Woman

Miss Constance was head of the English department of Bradley Polytechnic Institute at Peoria, Ill. She had A. B. and A. M. degrees and was attending Northwestern university summer school seeking a degree of Doctor of Philosophy. On the night she was killed Miss Constance had gone to the library to study, remaining there until it closed at 10 o'clock. She started for home and was struck down less than a block from her home.

OHIO WILL BE SCENE OF WET AND DRY VOTE

PROHIBITION QUESTION OVERSHADOWS ALL OTHERS TODAY

(By Associated Press)
COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 14.—Wet and dry lines were sharply drawn as Ohio voters chose party candidates in the state's primary election today.

With interest centering on the republican gubernatorial and the short term democratic senatorial contests, predictions were the heaviest vote in many years, possibly reaching 900,000 would be cast.

The prohibition issue probably was most pronounced in the race between Senator Cyrus Locher and Graham F. Hunt, Cincinnati, for the short term democratic senatorial nomination. Locher, endorsed by the Ohio Anti-Saloon league, was expected to draw a heavy vote from the rural sections, while Hunt, opposed by the league for many years, anticipated support from the large cities.

One Fights Anti-Salooners

The republican gubernatorial fight, centering around three of the six candidates entered, also was dominated by the prohibition question. Myers Y. Cooper, Cincinnati, had the full endorsement of the Anti-Saloon league. Congressman James T. Begg, Sandusky, although not endorsed officially by the league, has had unofficial endorsement of a strong dry faction. Attorney Gen-

eral Edward C. Turner, Columbus, opposed the league at every turn, alleging it had dominated state legislation by combining with certain public utility interests.

In the short term republican senatorial race Congressman Theodore E. Burton, Cleveland, and Chief Justice Carrington T. Marshall of the Ohio supreme court were the favorites.

Arkansas Demos Voting Today

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 14.—Arkansas democrats went to the polls today in their biennial primary to select nominees for state, district and county offices for which the democratic nomination is equivalent to election.

They had to make a choice between seven candidates for governor.

OIL PRODUCTION OVER NATION IS DOWN, IS REPORT

TULSA, Aug. 14.—Seminole has stopped its decline and returned to the gain column and the St. Louis-Pearson fields of Oklahoma had a substantial gain during the week ending August 11. Losses in the West Texas, California and other fields offset these gains with the result that estimated daily average production of crude oil in the United States decreased 14,291 barrels during the week, according to the current services, with a well organized choir.

rent issue of the Oil and Gas Journal.

Total daily production in Oklahoma during the week increased from 592,160 barrels to 604,250 barrels. The bulk of this gain was in the St. Louis-Pearson area, which registered an increase of nearly 11,000 barrels. Seminole production increased about 3,000 barrels, but other state fields either suffered declines or remained steady.

Both the Hendricks and Yates areas, leading centers of production in the West Texas fields, slumped during the week. The total decline in this area was about 18,000 barrels.

Gulf coast production dropped off about 3,000 barrels and California production of light crude was off about 4,000 barrels. Most of the other fields of the nation remained practically steady, the production in a few of them varying more than a few hundred barrels either way.

RAILROAD MEN OF WEST VOTE ABOUT STRIKE

**BALLOTS HANDED OUT
TODAY; RESULTS
OUT SEPT. 2**

(By Associated Press)
CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 14.—Section meetings were held today to distribute strike ballots to approximately 70,000 employees of Western railroads. Wage disputes between the roads and the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and the Order of Railway Conductors precipitated the action.

A. F. Whitney, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, said the ballots would be distributed today by 90 general chairmen of the two Brotherhoods meeting with their committees throughout the West. The decision will be announced September 2.

About 80 railroads owning approximately 98 percent of the miles west of Chicago are involved. Wage differences have been settled by arbitration in the east and south.

Original Demands Held
As a result of failure of recent efforts to settle the wage question by arbitration in the western states the balloting will be on the original demands of the unions for increases ranging from 10 percent for trainmen to 15 percent for conductors and conductors, Whitney said.

The labor organizations recently rejected an offer of a 7 1/2 percent increase because the union insisted on retaining existing working rules which the Western roads wished to abolish. Among the rules in dispute were those governing the restrictions on the use of two locomotives and the number of cars to be pulled by two engines.

The 7 1/2 percent offer was made following conferences at Chicago between representatives of the union, the roads and John Williams of the Federal Board of Mediation. This increase was satisfactory to the labor organizations but they contended the working conditions were more important and negotiations were dropped.

SMITH ENDS WORK ON SPEECH; TALKS WITH FARM HEADS

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 14.—Gov. Smith had at least one important campaign task off his mind today—completion of his speech of acceptance to be delivered a week from tomorrow.

After winding up a long conference with Southern and Middle Western farm leaders, the Democratic presidential nominee last night put finishing touches on the address, and cleared the way for a series of conferences today with party leaders, two of whom were pre-convention opponents.

Aides Are Gathering
Senator Carter Glass, of Virginia, who had an important part in drawing up the law enforcement plank, heads the list of prominent Democrats. Smith has invited here to talk over the situation. He was due in Albany today. Josephus Daniels will arrive tomorrow, to be followed by Senator George, of Georgia, on Thursday and Senator Walsh of Montana, on Friday. All are avowed drys.

The governor's speech formally accepting the nomination will be about as long as Hoover's, one of his associates said. The word has been passed that Smith will discuss all issues and will treat exhaustively the prohibition and farm relief problems.

Farm Relief To Be For
One of those farm relief came forth to the front yesterday when the governor spent more than five hours listening to an outline of the question as they saw it from eleven farm group heads from the south and middlewest, headed by George N. Peek of Illinois who recently joined the Smith camp. Politics, both Smith and the farm leaders emphasized, did not enter into the discussion, it being pointed out that the nominee had invited the ten men and one woman to Albany to obtain their views on a subject considered economic, not political.

HOOVER RETICENT AND KEEPS PLANS MUCH TO HIMSELF

STANFORD, CALIF., Aug. 14.—Silence still is the rule of Herbert Hoover in his campaign for the presidency.

The Republican candidate himself has dispensed any thought that with the delivery of his acceptance address he would speak more or less freely on the recurring political incidents of the day. His utterances for publication will be confined to his public addresses and such written statements he may issue.

While Hoover occasionally has conferences with correspondents who are accompanying him on his first swing across the country, he has laid down a rule against quoting what he has to say. He appreciates the difficulties thus presented to the news writers, but insists upon adhering to his official policy.

Campaign Differs
This is one particular in which his campaign has differed from most of those that have gone before. He would make it different in another respect; that of sharply limiting the number of speeches to be made before election day. However, most of his advisors believe he will be unable to realize this desire because of the great pressure that will be brought to bear upon him by party leaders in various parts of the country as the campaign grows in intensity.

Before getting back to Washington on the afternoon of August 24 Hoover will make two fixed speeches, one at Los Angeles Friday, and the other at West Branch, Iowa, his birthplace, on August 21, and then he will remain silent until perhaps on Labor Day.

STORMS AGAIN SWEEP ACROSS DAMAGED AREA

**RED CROSS CALLED ON
TO AID IN CARE OF
UNFORTUNATES**

(By Associated Press)
JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Aug. 14.—The fourth tropical disturbance within a week was gathering force in the Caribbean today as it swept toward Cuba, while the Florida Peninsula grappled with the destruction and dangers left in the wake of its predecessors.

The west coast of the state was recovering from effects of a gale which swept by northward last night although the fate of two or more vessels whose distress flares were sighted at St. Petersburg was not determined.

On the East coast, the Lake Okechobee region, west of Palm Beach, was sending out calls to the National Red Cross for aid in caring for several hundred persons left destitute by the flood aftermath of the storm.

Emergency conditions in the Lake Okechobee region, which has been drenched almost ceaselessly by rains since the hurricane of last Tuesday, was recognized yesterday when Okechobee City, largest town in the area, called on the national Red cross for aid in feeding the homeless and destitute along the course of the Kalamoossee river to the north.

Meanwhile the river continued to rise, flooding thousands of fertile acres along a 30-mile stretch approaching the lake. Condition of the lake itself was undetermined. Sarasota, Tampa, St. Petersburg, and other towns were in darkness during the night, and damage was comparatively heavy from the winds.

Rain Falls Again
Last night the wind in that area reached a velocity of 30 miles an hour with a downpour of rain.

Pensacola, bureau officials said, had the next lowest barometer reading at 29.92 with a 12 mile wind from the north. The same wind was reported blowing at Mobile and Tampa.

In Jacksonville the blow had reached a 20 mile velocity early today.

WASHINGTON BUREAU MAKES ITS REPORT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—The Weather Bureau's general forecast today says:

"The tropical disturbance that was a short distance west of Tampa, Fla., last night is central this morning between Apalachicola and Cedar Keys and is of moderate intensity. The tropical disturbance that crossed the Windward Islands Sunday night is central some distance southwest of Porto Rico, probably moving west northwest and caution has been advised to vessels west and northwest of the center."

LOOKING 'INSIDE' THE CANDIDATES

MRS. MOSKOWITZ, SMITH'S ADVISOR, CALM, SERENE, HELPFUL; HOOVER IS BASHFUL

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Aug. 14 (AP).—Herbert Hoover dislikes the spotlight. He is uncomfortable when pointed out and stared at.

To those who stand near him in crowds, it is sometimes evident he is uncomfortable when the center of attention, and must some times make an effort to maintain his serenity of manner.

As he sat in the bow of a ferry boat crossing San Francisco bay recently, with a bank of faces turning with his every move, and the small irritating clicks of cameras on all sides, a quick little jerk of his big body occasionally would betray his annoyance or a sidelong flash from his keen blue eyes, his impatience.

It is on fishing trips, perhaps, that the inescapable reticence of the presidential candidate is most intense, since to him fishing is a real art and philosophy.

Cameras Spoil Fishing
On the trip to the sierras two weeks ago, he stood one day in his huge rubber boots, thigh deep in a favorite trout stream. A dramatic moment had arrived, semi-sacred to any true fisherman—when a trout in a deep pool was watching his bait. Almost nibble, when splash went tripping in the stream and the brittle click of cameras broke the forest stillness.

Not a word from the fisherman, but the lines deepened in his face as he stalked off downstream.

To the stranger the difficulty Hoover has in getting accustomed to the spotlight is at first glance surprising since ten years ago he was already a world-known name. His friends, however, find it readily comprehensible.

They explain that in every great enterprise he has engaged upon he has remained invariably in the background. He was "the chief" always, the ultimate authority whose hand and thought were felt by the least of his subordinates.

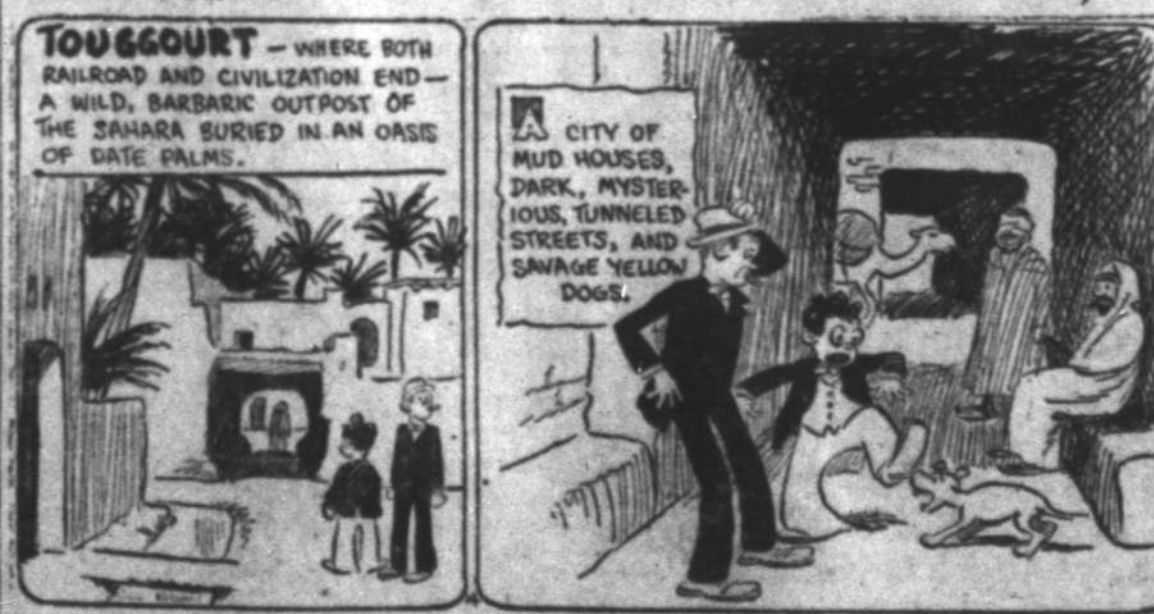

SMITH RAPPED BY ALABAMA SESSION OF HOOVER GROUP

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Aug. 14. (AP)—Resolutions asking that Democrats of Alabama vote against Governor Smith, Democratic presidential nominee, to preserve white supremacy in the South were adopted at an anti-Smith meeting here last night.

The resolution said that newspapers are trying "to mislead the Democrats of Alabama to vote for one whose record is or stands for racial equality. No man believing as Smith does regarding the liquor laws and the negro, need expect the vote of Alabama." They declared also that the purpose of the Alabama conference of anti-Smith Democrats is the "eternal elimination of Alfred E. Smith."

Dr. A. J. Barton, one of the leaders in the movement against Smith declared in an address that the New York governor is now on the defensive.

BLOODSHED IN JUGO POLITICS

STEFAN RADITCH WILL
'BE PRESIDENT' AL-
THOUGH DEAD

BELOGRADE, Yugoslavia, Aug. 14.—Two important incidents marked the past day's events in Yugoslavia.

Bloodshed followed the choosing of a successor to Stefan Raditch, noted Croat leader, and parliament accepted the Nettuno convention which in the past has been the occasion of "violent anti-Italian demonstrations."

Croatian deputies were absent when the Skupstina (parliament) ratified the Nettuno pact, having withdrawn after Raditch had received a bullet wound which contributed to his death. Raditch was a bitter opponent of the treaty.

Dead Man Is President
Meeting in Zagreb with their Democratic allies the Croats decided that Raditch would be continued as president of the party despite his death, with Dr. Vlado Matchek belongs to the school-favoring complete autonomy for Croatia and is an irreconcilable enemy of the recently formed government headed by Father Anton Koroschetz.

Anti-Serbian demonstrations marked the election of Dr. Matchek. A hostile mob wrecked Kloos where Belgrade newspapers were displayed for sale. A Russian named Ivanovitch was attacked and mortally wounded because Serbian papers were prominently displayed at his news stand.
