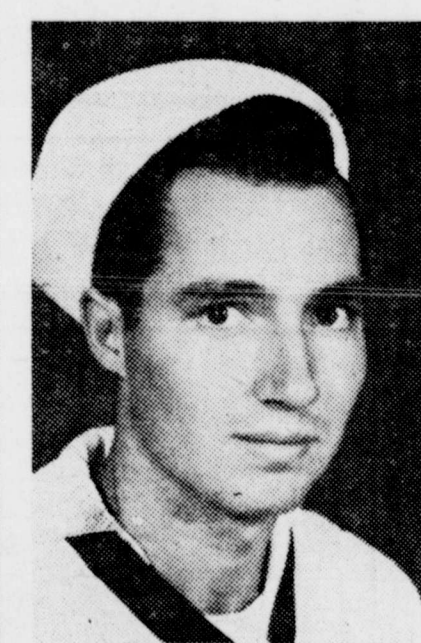
Sgt. Clausen was graduated from Royce City High school and attended T. C. U. at Ft. Worth.

Sgt. Donley Is Prisoner of Nazis



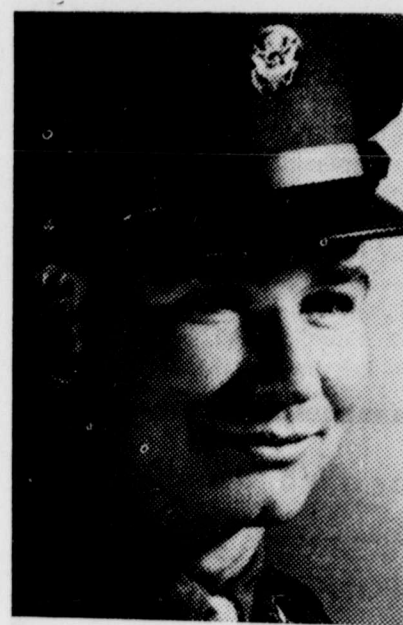

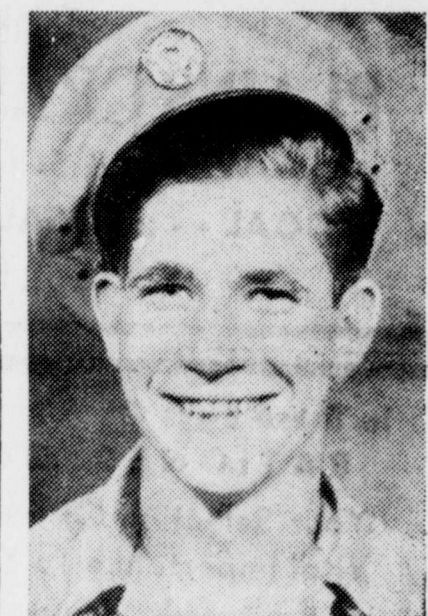

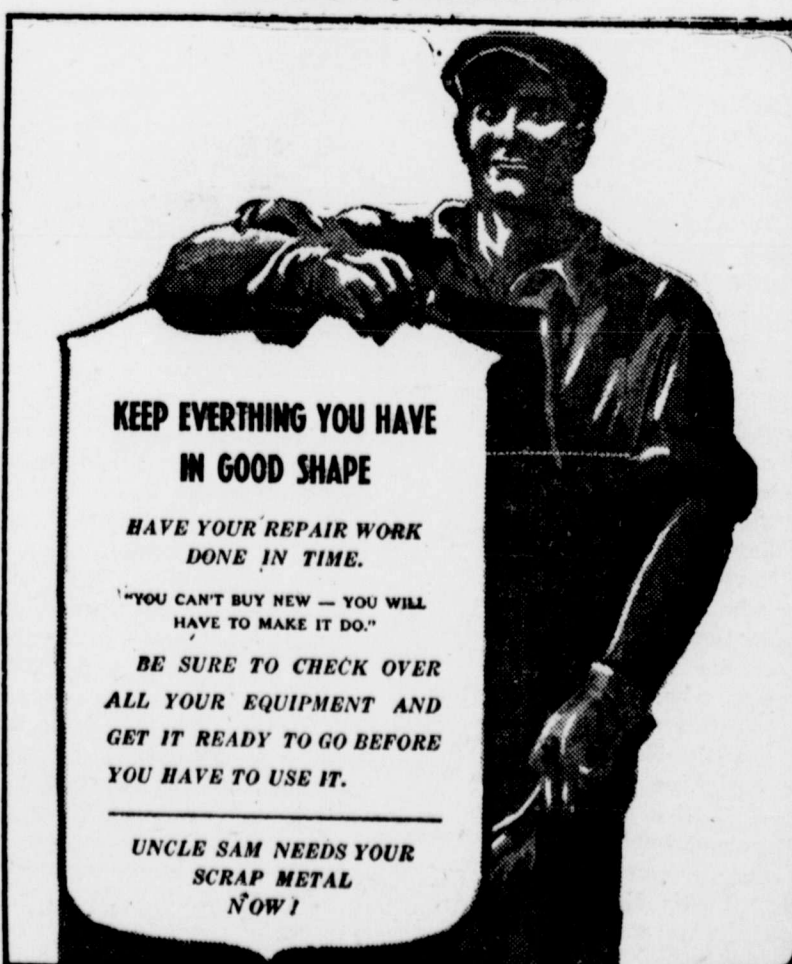

Dear Buford & Everybody: Back Home: Well, here it is Sunday morning and nearly everybody's still asleep. This is one morning we practically have to ourselves. Only on week-days are we up at 04:25 in the morning, when there isn't even any thought of the sun coming up. We are having to work on the line until a college opens up, and the discipline here is the equivalent of pre-flight. We have the gig system of discipline and the officer who has charge of all our training used to be in charge of officers in O. C. S., so you can imagine how rough it is. If we get over 8 gigs we spend one hour for each, walking on the ramp...

At the time we are assistant crew-chiefs on B-25's. They are very interesting and big planes. When we have nothing to do a couple of my buddies and I go down to the end of the ramp where there are some B-24's and we listen to the radio. They have a few remarkable pieces of radio equipment and they are built to stand up under the treatment they are given. This field is an advanced flying field and they have quite a few Chinese here. They are quite good fliers. Don't know how long we will stay here, but hope to get into college in about a month and a half. We are taking a basic mechanics course, so we will know what makes an airplane run when we finally do get to flying. Guess I'll close

now and go to the mess hall for chow. They should have some very good food today, so, until the day when we are all together again at home, remember there is always a place in my life for Abernathy. Regards, Dopey. My address is: AJS Lavern Cope, 311th Hd. & Hd. Sqdn., LJAAB, LaJunta, Colo.

Dear Buford: Just a few lines to let you know where to send the paper once again. I am taking an 8-weeks course in statistics and classification at Washington-Jefferson college. Upon completion of this course, I will return to my proper station, Lubbock Army Air Field. This is very pretty country here and the people here are very nice to the servicemen. The town of Washington is about the size of Lubbock. Washington is about 40 miles from Pittsburg. The college is very nice and has a lot of history behind it—however, there are only 80 civilian students in the college now. "W. J." is located right in the heart of the city. Our dormitory is just about 3 blocks from the business area of the city. As you probably have guessed, both the city and college are named after George Washington. All of this land around here once was owned by George Washington. One thousand acre block of land 6 miles from town is the block that Washington purchased, but was unable to get the people to move off the land. This case was finally carried to the U. S. Supreme court, and of course, Washington won. After winning the case, he offered the land back to the people at a smaller price than he had paid for it. The people living there now are direct descendants of those Washington sued. That community is the only known place that

advocates hatred of Washington. At the time all this was happening, the land was a part of Virginia. I learned all this from the first lecture of my course. This lecture was given by the president of the college. He told a lot more very interesting facts too numerous to mention in a letter. They say that we are to do a certain amount of studying, so I will close and attempt to do such. I remain, Sincerely, Gerald D. Horton, (Pfc.), Co. Dear Buford: I've often wanted to drop a line from my sunny California station and tell you how much I enjoyed the Review, but time slipped by. Now, quite suddenly, I find myself in Virginia and it has rained almost the entire time I have been here—which is all of five days. For the first time since I was inducted into the services about two years ago, I am doing work I really enjoy. I am now in the Technical Training and Service department here at Lee, and I do lettering and drawing, and poster designing. This is right "up my alley," since I have taught art in college for 13½ years! My length of stay here is very uncertain, but I hope it is for several months, at least. The Review brings news of many old friends and relatives. Of course I enjoy reading about the Struves, Fuchs, Goeths, Richters and Goebels, for they are all related to me some way.
