In return for his poppy, the Mayor made a generous contribution

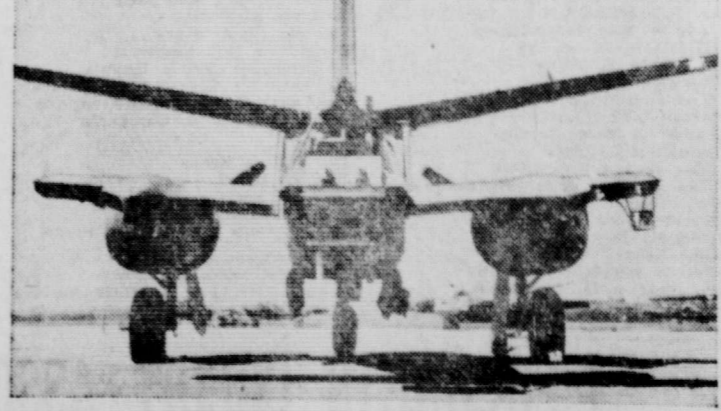
to the Legion Auxiliary rehabilitation and child welfare fund, expressing the hope that all citizens would do likewise.

A football game between the Cisco Junior College Wranglers and the North Texas State College Freshmen will be a feature of Cisco's Armistice Day program. Game time is 2 p. m., and clear, crisp autumn weather has been promised for the day.

A large part of the city's business firms planned to stay open for the benefit of holiday shoppers. The regular Appreciation Day program is scheduled to be held as usual at 3:30 p. m.

While many firms will be open, a substantial number will close for the holiday, including seven grocery stores, three lumber yards, the First National Bank, City of Cisco offices, the post office, local waterworks, and others.

A large crowd has been predicted for the holiday football game.

Coaches Scott Russell and Paul Mesley planned to complete their work for the game with a light workout this afternoon. They expect the North Texas team to be on the favored side, and the game promises to be interesting in all respects.

The Loboes of Cisco High School will play their final home football game of the 1950 season at Chesley Field at 8 p. m. Friday against undefeated Hamilton High's Bulldogs. And a record season's crowd is expected, despite weather that promised to be cold.

The Bulldogs, with only Cisco and Dublin between them and a perfect title race, will be out for a victory over the Loboes that would assure them at least a tie for the crown. A Cisco victory would leave the title race to be decided between Hamilton, Dublin and Ranger.

Coach Jack Everett's Loboes will be the underdogs but they had plenty of spirit today and were far from ready to give up. Most of the Loboes were in near-top shape for the game and a battle is in prospect.

The city of Hamilton planned to close its business firms at 4 p. m. today and bring a delegation of some 500 persons here for the game. The Bulldog Band and student rooting section will be here en masse.

The Hamilton team, with a perfect record in district play, has lost only one game this season, and that was a 13-7 decision to Coleman early in the year. The Loboes lost 20 to 0 to the Coleman eleven.

The Bulldogs are a versatile outfit with a good ground game as well as stellar passing attack. The probable starting lineup was given as follows: ends—Bullard and Gautier; guards—Johnson and Ar buckle; center—Douglas; backs—Barnett, Tennison, Brann and Winkles.

The Cisco eleven is expected to start Robert Jackson, Doug Johnson, David Pippen and Roy Evans in the backfield. Probable starting line will include Irvin Brunkenhoefer and Jimmy Webb at ends; Leo Farmer and Gene Voss, tackles; Doc Dawson or Herbert Coats and J. C. Suggs at guards, and Donald Watts at center.

EDITORIALS

On June 14, 1777, General George Washington presented to the Congress a flag made by an obscure Philadelphia woman, Mrs. Betsy Ross. It was simple in design; it had 13 red stripes on a white field and in the upper inside corner a square with 13 stars on a field of blue. This flag was held in reverence by the small, struggling 13 states who had just completed a war for independence. That flag was a symbol of the independence for which they fought.

Today the American flag flies over thousands of buildings in the United States. However, we seem to have lost our original reverence for this symbol of the United States. Could this mean that we have become less patriotic? In Cisco High School Colors are blown daily while the entire student body faces the flag pole. All students stand at attention where they are. Then, the pledge of allegiance is given. This tradition was started early in World War II when America was again defending her independence. Did that rope cutter mean by his act that he no longer wanted a flag flying as a symbol of "one nation, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all"?

Student Council And Pep Leaders Visit Abilene Schools Recently

The student council and pep leaders had the privilege last Friday of visiting a pep rally at Abilene High School and hearing a lecture at the Y. M. C. A. about the clubs, Hi-Y and Tri-Y, for the students.

We arrived at the Y. M. C. A. building a few minutes before ten and played ping-pong and various games until our speaker arrived. Mr. Wilson, the speaker, first told us that the clubs were started to discourage sororities and fraternities. Certain ones of these groups controlled almost every school activity. You had to be a member of a certain sorority or fraternity to be a pep leader or on the student council or any student activity. The students were fighting the football boys and they were against the band and vice versa. The school board passed a law that if you belonged to a sorority or fraternity, you could not be in any student activity of the school. This caused a lot of trouble with some of the parents, so some of the business men of the town bought the old U. S. O. building and grounds to replace the private clubs with a worthwhile organization.

The Hi-Y, for the boys and the Tri-Y, for the girls, was then formed in Abilene. Both are branches of the Y. M. C. A. The boys are in separate groups from the girls. The limit in each group is 25 and each group is given a national charter. The division into small groups gives more leadership training. The meetings of each group is conducted in a set pattern including worship, education, and entertainment.

The meetings are started with a call to worship (scripture) followed by a hymn. The business is next taken care of and then the program by several members of the club.

The whole club has a council very similar to our student council. Each group has a representative.

When a person wants to join, he must visit three different groups in succession and turn in a list of his first, second, and third choice. The group votes on the person's application until the vacancies of the group are filled. The application then goes to the next choice. If all of the clubs are filled up, a new club is formed.

We would like to congratulate the people of Abilene for building such an effective club for their youth.

Something admirable about the football squad is the fact that they make their own money to buy awards by selling pillows to sit on at the games. They also bought a washing machine which they use to launder their own suits.

The bell rang. Whoops and hollers sprang up and rose continually to a deafening sound as the students filed into the auditorium. The spirit of noise continued after all of the students were seated and girls with black and gold pompoms filed in and made an arch over the aisles. The football boys marched in on both sides to the front seats as the band, in uniform, played. They had two or three yells with the roof bouncing around and then drop curtain appeared with "Welcome Ex-its" on it. Three ex-its made pep talks in between yells stressing unity and their motto, "It takes the everlasting team work of every blooming soul." They were really ready for Sweetwater. They also had two comical skits showing how Sweetwater would be going home after the game. Incidentally, Abilene beat Sweetwater 14-12.

Everyone had a smile on his face and was yelling as loud as possible. They believe in showing their spirit.

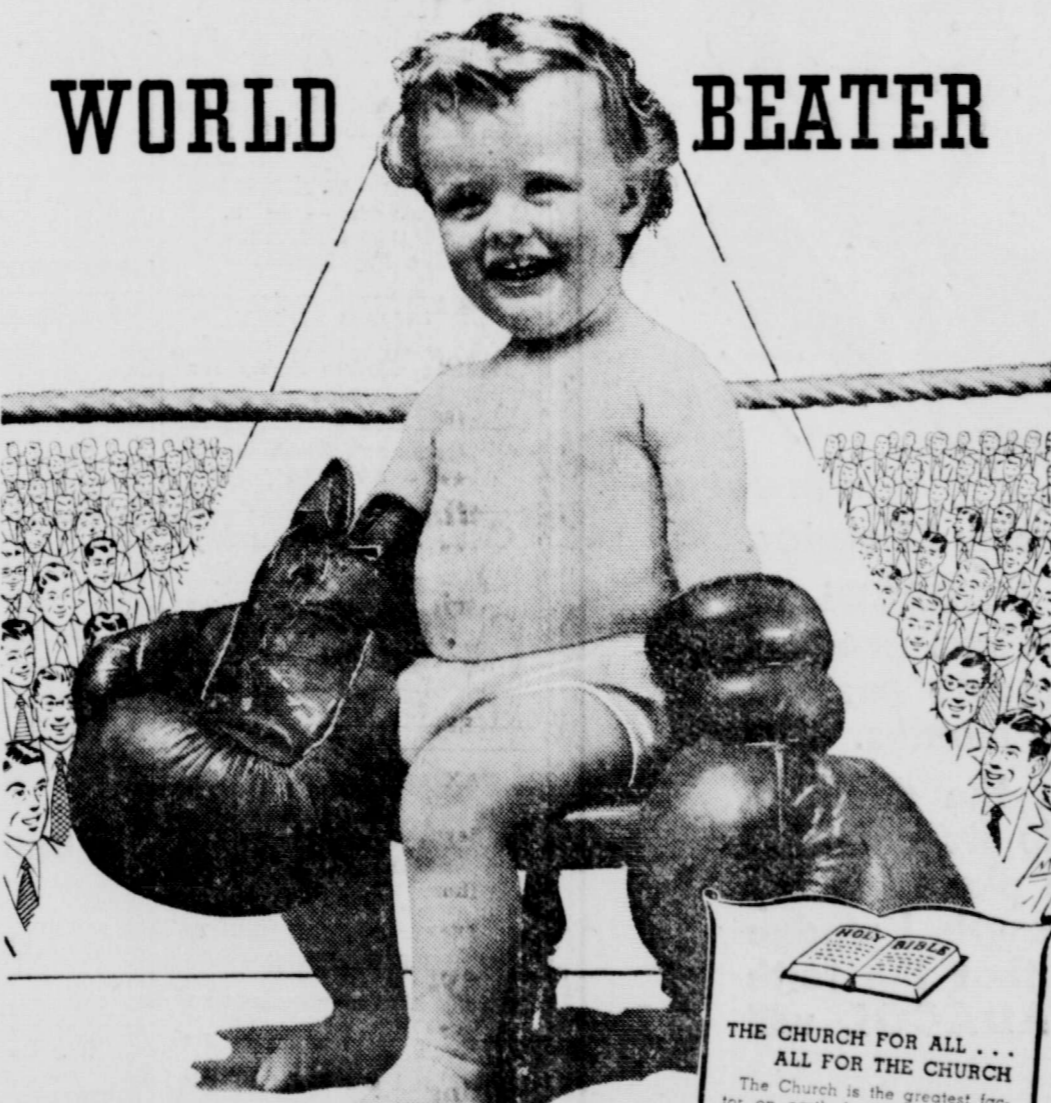

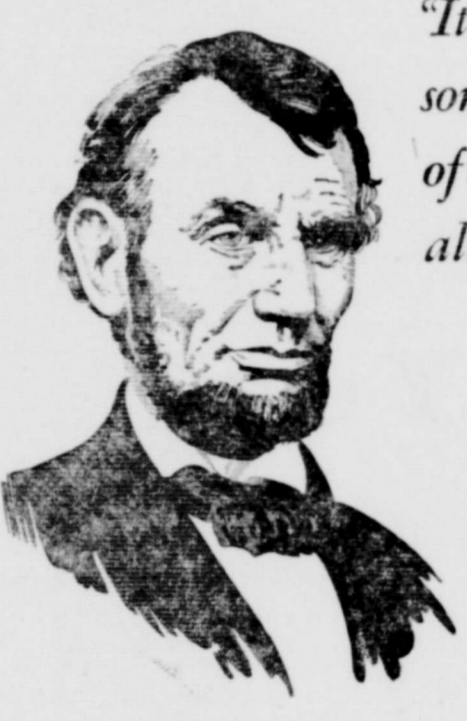
