School Opens With Larger Enrollment At Talco Monday

Talco school opened for the fall term on Monday with a public assembly in the school auditorium. There was a good attendance.

First day enrollment this year was 392 students, according to Supt. W. R. Young. This compared with 389 last year shows an increase of three.

Mrs. Sarah Nola Parish is the new history teacher, succeeding Wm. Upchurch, who resigned to become field representative for the American Cancer Society.

Mrs. Parish is the former Sarah Nola Oakes and has had 15 years teaching experience. She taught at Maple Springs seven years and at Wilkinson eight years. She holds BS and MED degrees from East Texas State; is a graduate of Talco High School, Paris Junior College and Southwestern College, Kansas.

Action Delayed In Local Postmaster Confirmations

Presidential appointments of postmaster for 62 Texas towns are bogged down in the Senate Post Office and Civil Service Committee, with no signs of early action on them.

On the list are the President's choice for postmasters at Bogata, Talco, Deport and Mt. Pleasant.

On February 16 of this year, President Eisenhower sent the name of Frank Stubblefield to the Senate for confirmation as postmaster. Stubblefield has been acting postmaster at Bogata since July 1, 1957, when he succeeded Walter King, who retired after 15½ years service. His assistants are Clerk James M. (Buddy) Lawson and Mrs. Paul Wilson.

At Talco, L. R. Miller has been nominated twice since he was sworn in as acting postmaster the last day of 1956. The last nomination was made in February.

Democrats are suspected of delaying action on some postmasters in hope the party will elect a president in 1960. But the positions are filled in most cases on a civil service basis, especially in the smaller towns. Most of the 62 positions in Texas awaiting action are in smaller communities. The Senate Post Office Committee staff insists all names are looked at from a civil service, not political standpoint.

Her late husband, Ernest Unsell, was an undertaker and grocery merchant at Talco.

Titus Will Hold \$300,000 Bond Election Sept. 15

Titus County tax payers will go to the polls on Tuesday, Sept. 15, to vote upon the proposal to issue \$300,000 in bonds to buy highway right of way, road improvements and make courthouse and jail repairs.

Notice of the election appears for the last time in this edition of The Talco Times. It is divided into two parts—\$200,000 to buy right of way and \$100,000 for courthouse, jail and county road repairs.

General American Testing at 3602

General American Oil Co., drilling a wildcat oil test in southern Red River County in the Puthuff survey, 4½ miles northeast of Talco, was coring at 3602 feet on Tuesday. Proposed depth is 5600 feet.

There was a report that quite a few feet of oil-cut mud had been encountered, but this could not be verified.

He is a graduate of Bogata High School and Texas University, receiving a BA degree from the latter in 1954. Dr. Reynolds holds a degree in chemistry and did pre-med work at the University of Texas.

Local Oil News About This Area

Second gauge has been reported on a Trix-Liz field dual completion 6½ miles east of Talco. Humble Oil No. 1 Humble-Holmes, J. F. Lund survey, pumped 31 barrels per day from the Lewisville "B" zone at 3,589-616 feet. The well was finished earlier from the "A" zone.

In Red River County shallow wildcat failure 4½ miles northeast of Bagwell was Restall Drilling Company No. - Fannie Riddle, P. D. Mitkiff survey. Hole went to 1,551 feet.

Application to drill in the Trix-Liz field has been filed by Humble Oil and Refining Company, operators, Margaret G. Timmons Well No. 5, B. Strunk survey. Regular permit. Proposed depth 4,100 feet.

Trespass Law Effective Oct. 14

A new trespass law will be effective in Texas Oct. 14. It provides penalties of up to 30 days in jail and a \$500 fine and forfeiture of hunting and fishing licenses for a period of three years, upon conviction. The law makes it illegal for any person to hunt, fish or camp on the enclosed property of another person without the consent of the owner or other person in authority. The new law is enforceable by any peace officer and arrests may be made without warrant.

NOTICE OF ROAD BOND ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS)
COUNTY OF TITUS)
TO THE RESIDENT QUALIFIED PROPERTY TAXPAYING VOTERS OF TITUS COUNTY, TEXAS:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 15th day of September, 1959, to determine if said County shall issue bonds and if an ad valorem tax shall be levied in payment thereof, in obedience to an order entered by the Commissioners' Court on the 12th day of August, 1959, which is as follows:

"On this the 12th day of August, 1959, the Commissioners' Court of Titus County, Texas, convened in regular session at a Regular Term thereof in the Courthouse at Mt. Pleasant, Texas, with the following members of the Court, to-wit:

HARRY TAYLOR, County Judge,

HOLLIE BANKS, Commissioner Precinct No. 1,

B. B. HUNNICUTT, Commissioner Precinct No. 2,

EUGENE MANKINS, Commissioner Precinct No. 3,

DAN BYNUM, Commissioner Precinct No. 4,

L. H. BOWDEN, County Clerk and Ex-Officio Clerk of the Commissioners' Court;

being present, and among other proceedings had by said Court were the following:

There came on to be considered the petition of W. L. MEANS and fifty-five (55) other persons praying that an election be ordered to determine whether or not the bonds of Titus County, Texas, shall be issued in the amount of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00), bearing interest at a rate not to exceed five per cent (5%) per annum, and maturing at such times as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, not to exceed thirty (30) years from the date thereof, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in said County; and whether or not an ad valorem tax shall be levied upon all the taxable property in Titus County for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity;

And it appearing to the Court that said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident property taxpayers voters of said Titus County, Texas, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation; and

It is further appearing that the amount of bonds to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Titus County;

IT IS THEREFORE CONSIDERED AND ORDERED by the Court that an election be held in said County on the 15th day of September, 1959, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not the bonds of said County shall be issued in the amount of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00), for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in said County; bearing interest at a rate not to exceed five per cent (5%) per annum, and maturing at such times as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, not to exceed thirty (30) years from the date thereof; and whether or not an ad valorem tax shall be levied upon all the taxable property in Titus County for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 3, Title 22, Revised Statutes, 1925, and only legally qualified voters of this State and of this County, who own taxable property within said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be allowed to vote.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT
FOR THE ISSUANCE OF THE BONDS AND FOR THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF, AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF

THE BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

ALCORN FAVORS PRICE STICKERS FOR EGGS, LIKE PUT ON AUTOS

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur, has another idea he won't get anywhere with this week.

Dear Editor: It's not that I'm in the market for a new car, I'm waiting for the new models, have been for years, though it doesn't seem to make much difference, as fast as they bring out a new model they turn around and start to work on an even newer one, never can seem to make up their minds, but what I started out to say does concern cars.

I read in a newspaper last night that a new law is now in effect requiring car manufacturers to put a sticker on every car showing the list price—what it ought to sell for, what the extras on it should cost, etc., and there's a \$1,000 fine if a car dealer removes the sticker.

As I understand it, this was done to keep some sharp dealers from running the price way up.

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allowing you a lot more for your trade-in, and still making a satisfactory profit. What they were doing was taking a \$50 cat in on a \$100 dog, still getting the \$56 they wanted in the first place for the dog, which is pretty high for a dog, but so are cars and everything else.

The new law is intended to put a stop to this.

Now there's an idea that ought to be carried over into farming, but sort of in reverse. While the car sticker law is aimed at keeping some dealers from hornswoggling the public, the farm sticker law would be aimed at keeping the farmer from hornswoggling himself.

For instance, say a farmer has a dozen eggs for sale, and the going price is 26 cents. The government ought to require the farmer to put a sticker on the eggs showing they cost him 36 cents to produce.

I'm not sure how this would keep a farmer from selling 30-cent eggs for 20 cents, but it at least would bring the thing out into the open. It just takes too many eggs these days to buy a new car or a new tractor, even one with a government-guaranteed price sticker on it.
