Buxkemper was coaching here when Maynard was a three-letter man.

Brumbelow himself became famous to sports fans when he starred for TCU. He was named to the All Southwestern Conference teams of 1928 and 1929 and was captain of Texas Christian's first championship football team in 1929.

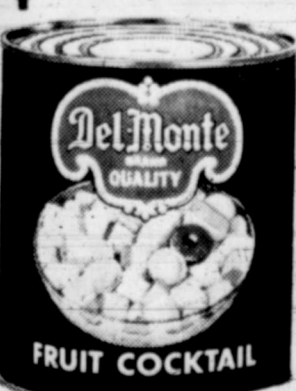

Drafting class prospective students are asked to note that an additional \$20 for instruments and equipment in that class will be required.</p>	<p>Speaker Praises Chamber Colorado City's 1969 version of the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet, Thursday evening in Civic House, proved to be one of the most enthusiastically applauded in the Chamber's history. Guest soloist and guest speaker each received open approval from the audience which filled the banquet hall. Tom J. Vandergriff, mayor of Arlington, made the chief address. Board Elects Teacher Sets 4-Month Budget Study

Colorado Independent School Board in its Monday night session accepted two teacher resignations and approved one new teacher appointment.

Miss Lou Hays, counselor since September for Colorado Junior High School and Hutchinson - Wallace Elementary Schools, submitted her resignation, effective Friday, Jan. 17. Miss Hays has accepted a position as elementary counselor in the Abilene Public Schools system.

Also resigning, effective Friday, was Mrs. Charles (Clorine) Kennedy teacher of fourth and fifth grade reading classes at Hutchinson Elementary School. Mrs. Kennedy is moving to Perryton where her husband has been transferred by Sun Oil Co.

On recommendation of James G. McMath, superintendent, the board appointed Mrs. Don (Mildred) Adair to teach reading at Hutchinson in Mrs. Kennedy's place. The elementary counselor post has yet to be filled. Mrs. Adair, wife of a member of the school coaching staff, holds her degree from North Texas State University.

Also on the school board agenda Monday night was a policy discussion. The board's policy concerning complaints was clarified.

The board shall not consider any complaint unless submitted in writing and signed by the informant. Such a complaint should be submitted not less than 7 days previous to the scheduled board meeting to provide board members with an opportunity to study and accumulate information on the case.
