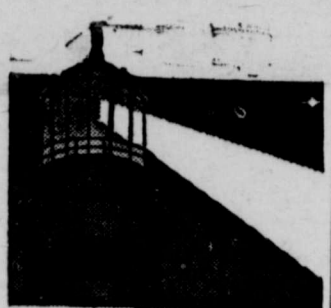
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On The BEAM

There are only five or six days left in which to pay your poll tax in order to vote in any election that may come up this year.

There will be one election other than city and school trustee that we know of now and that is the election for United States Senator. And there may be other elections during the year. The best thing is to be prepared with a poll tax in case something comes up that you want to vote on. Be sure that you pay your poll tax.

One thing is almost certain, we'll have a large number of candidates for United States Senator from which to make a selection. One Republican is in the race and in all probability there will be four or five Democrats.

If a large number of candidates announce on the Democratic ticket it will give the Republicans the change they have had in a long time to elect a Senator from Texas. I think the wise thing for all of us Democrats to do is to get behind one candidate and stay with him. That candidate is Ralph Yarborough. Yarborough is a Democrat and so far as I know is the only candidate for the office who has remained loyal to his party.

Texas Electric Service Company is planning to build a dam on Champion Creek to supplement their water supply at Lake Colorado on Morgan Creek. The water, we understand, will be pumped from the Champion Creek dam to the lake on Morgan when necessary.

Should a high dam be built on Champion in the vicinity of Seven Wells it would create another large body of water in Mitchell County for recreation as well as domestic and power use. In fact it will put Lorraine very near a lake. It would be well for Lorraine to look into possibility of using the lake as a future water supply.

Lorraine F. F. A Boys Take Major Prizes at County Livestock Show

Members of the Lorraine F. F. A. took four championship banners in the Mitchell County 4-H and F. F. A. Livestock Show held at the rodeo grounds in Colorado City Friday and Saturday, January 18-19.

In the fat steer show, the Lorraine F. F. A. chapter made a complete sweep of the championships. Gary Mathis, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. F. Mathis, had the first place heavyweight drylot steer and he went on to win the championship of the drylot steer show with a 900 pound calf bred by Samson Cattle Co. of Paint Rock.

Billy Cornutt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Willis Cornutt, had the first and second place lightweight milkfed steer. His first place steer, weighing only 700 pounds, went on to beat the heavyweight milkfed steer for the championship of the milkfed division.

Cornutt's champion milkfed steer, a Hereford bred by Roy Henderson of Colorado City, was also judged the "best bred calf in Mitchell County."

There were ten calves entered in the show, three of them entered by members of the Lorraine chapter.

The Lorraine chapter won two of the four classes in the fat lamb show.

In the fine wool class Maylon Beatty, son of Mr. and Mrs. Plez Beatty, won first and also had the champion fine wool lamb of the show with a lamb bred by the Boyd Ranch, Star Route, Sweetwater.

In the mutton cross class, Ronald Haley, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. B. Byrne, Jr., won first and also had the champion cross-bred lamb of the show. The lamb was bred by Hartgrave Ranch of San Angelo.

The local FFA chapter did not enter in the swine division of the show but Linton Ray Webb, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Webb, 4-H member from Lorraine showed a pen of three hogs to first place and also captured two other places in the show.

General Superintendent of the show was B. B. Byrne, Jr. Alfred Hackfeld was assistant general superintendent. Pat Maynard served as assistant sheep superintendent and Lester Webb as assistant swine superintendent. Superintendent of weights and tags was Tommy Mathis of Lorraine.

Members of the Lorraine chapter who served as junior superintendents were Gary Mathis in swine, Ronald Haley in calves and Billy Preston in weights and tags.

A packer sale was provided this year for the first time in order for the boys to more efficiently market their livestock. Working on the sales committee were Dick Gregory, B. B. Byrne.

Poll Tax Payment Lag In County Tax Assessor Says

Poll tax payments in Mitchell County are lagging badly according to a report made last week by Tax Collector Tom Glover.

Glover said that only 700 poll taxes had been paid up to the middle of last week. In 1955 tax receipts were issued to 3,039 people in Mitchell County. According to that more than 2,300 people have their poll tax yet to pay.

Glover stated that those who reached the age of 60 years before January 31, 1956, are exempt from paying poll tax and may vote in any election in which they are otherwise qualified. The same is true of those who became 21 years of age after January 31, 1956.

Glover also stated that it is not necessary for those who are over 60 years of age to get an exemption certificate in this county in order to vote. Only those who live in towns of 10,000 or more population are required to get such certificate.

Lorraine Seeks Water Rights From Champion Creek Lake

The City of Lorraine has been contemplating for some time the securing of water rights on Champion Creek in case it should ever become necessary to look to some source other than wells for a water supply.

Nothing definite had been done toward securing the rights. The recent announcement of Texas Electric Service Company of plans to build a dam on Champion Creek in the vicinity of Seven Wells brought the matter to a focus.

The Lorraine City Council held a call meeting Monday morning and planned to go ahead with plans to secure the water rights on Champion for municipal purposes.

It later developed that Texas Electric Service Company may enter into an agreement with the city to grant water rights from the proposed lake. Such a possibility will be investigated by the City Council.

David Leavell Heads Texas Heart Fund

David C. Leavell, Galveston newspaper executive and president of the Texas Press Association, has been appointed chairman of the public education committee of the 1957 Texas Heart Fund. It has been announced by Dr. D. D. Warren of Waco, Texas Heart Association president.

Mr. Leavell, whose committee will be in charge of public education work in Texas during the annual month-long Heart Fund Campaign in February, served as chairman of the Galveston Heart Association for four years and is well known in Galveston for his civic and community welfare activities.

Vice president and general manager of the News Publishing Company, publishers of the Galveston Daily News and the Galveston Tribune, Mr. Leavell also is a former president of the community's Chamber of Commerce and the Galveston Rotary Club as well as currently serving as a director of the Texas Daily News paper Association and of the Texas Tourist Association.

Prior to joining the Galveston newspapers in an executive capacity more than 10 years ago, Mr. Leavell was associated with a Fort Worth newspaper and formerly served as president of the Texas Christian University Ex-Students Association.

In accepting the post as public education chairman for the Texas Heart Fund, Mr. Leavell pointed out that "it is through the Heart Fund that every citizen of Texas is given an opportunity to support medical science in its fight against diseases of the heart and circulatory system, which now are responsible for more deaths than all other diseases combined."

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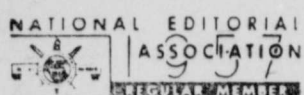

TAX—MAN SAM SEZ:

A lot of farmers have found out that it pays to pay self-employment tax, especially if they are 65 years old or nearly 65. The "1956 Farmer's Tax Guide" explains the self-employment tax to farmers. More than 60 cancer leaders from the half dozen counties comprising District 2 attended the meeting.

Delegates learned that if present rates continue, more than 40,000,000 Americans now living will die of cancer, Mr. Simpson stated.

Heavy emphasis was placed on intensifying volunteer efforts in the annual April education fund raising crusade. Miss Nancy James reported, since the need for funds to exploit new fields of research and implement present research are increasing.

Although primarily due to the American Cancer Society program of education, one-third of all persons developing cancer are being saved through early diagnosis and treatment, the ACS spokesman said, over one-half could be saved if they learned and followed the advice of the American Cancer Society. The other half who die from the disease must wait on the results of continued and sustained research—the only hope we have of finding the final answer to the riddle to cancer.

More than \$7,000,000 will be allocated during 1957, Mr. Simpson said.

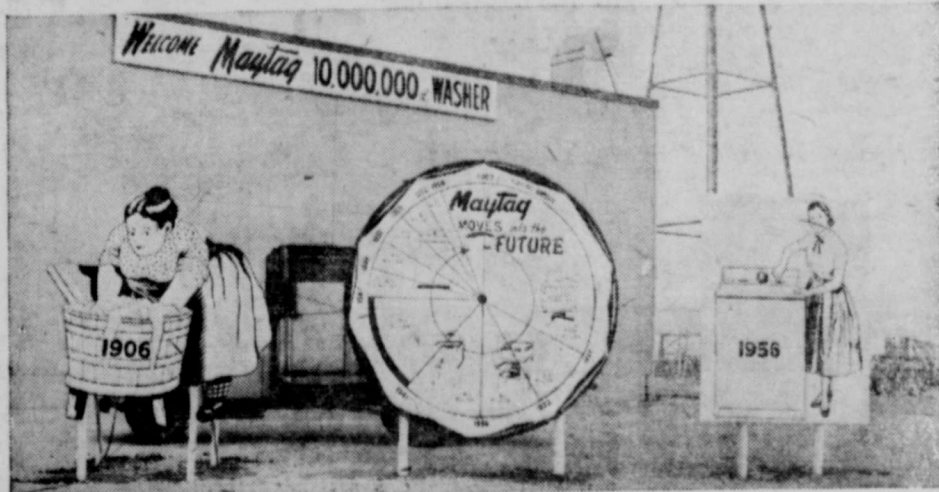

Two Important
Developments
Made By Ford

Two important farm machinery developments are being announced by Ford Motor Company, according to Warren Costin of Costin Bros. For the first time in Ford's 40-year history of tractor production, liquidified petroleum (LP) gas engines are being made available as a factory installed option in all tractor models, and three new optional front wheel arrangements for row crop tractors also are being introduced, Mr. Costin said.

Citing an announcement by Irving A. Duffy, Ford vice president and general manager of its Tractor and Implement Division, Mr. Costin said that the growth in demand for LP gas tractors has been very rapid and extensive. The low operating and maintenance costs of these units are the main reasons for their growing popularity, he said.

The three front end options for row crop tractors of single-wheel, dual-wheel, tri-axle or adjustable front axle four-wheel design are engineered to permit the farmer to select the equipment of greatest applicability to his operations, he said.

Mr. Costin invited residents of this area to see this new Ford equipment on display at his showroom at Colorado City.

In addition to these special options, the new Ford tractors have been equipped with numerous other improvements, he said. The all-purpose and row crop models have as standard equipment swinging drawbars and ASAE standard power take-off. Power adjusted rear wheels are now standard equipment on two row crop models and are available as extra-cost options on all other Ford tractors, he noted. Power steering continues as standard equipment at no extra cost on all row crop tractors.

The fuel system used by Ford on its LP gas-operated tractors is of the liquid withdrawal type for either propane or butane propane fuel. Tractors with the LP gas engine are distinctively styled with the fuel tank built into the tractor hood over the engine. Hooded controls are conveniently located at the rear of the 19.2 gallon tank to permit the operator to make all adjustments from the tractor seat. The system's compact design allows the operator full visibility forward and down and does not interfere with the mounting of Ford implements on the tractor.

The three optional front wheel arrangements on Ford row crop tractors give farmers in this area greater latitude in selection of equipment for specific operations, Mr. Costin said. For narrow-spaced crops and for most irrigated row crops, the single front wheel tricycle has been de-

signed. The adjustable front axle, permitting spacing of wheels from 52 to 76 inches apart and up to 80 inches with the wheels reversed, offers four-wheel stability and flotation. The dual front wheel tricycle affords proper crop clearance for normal space row crops. A unique feature of the single-wheel tricycle is its "C" axle support, a type widely used in aircraft, and much easier to service than the conventional "U" shaped support, he added.

The 11 Ford tractor models are available in two basic power series, Mr. Costin said. For "two three plow" performance, six models offer approximately 29 horsepower. The five "three-four plow" tractor models have an output of 40 drawbar horsepower. Three low-cost special utility models, five all-purpose four-wheel models, and three row crop models are offered by Ford, he said.

Features of the all-purpose and row crop models include ASAE standard power take-off and swinging drawbar, built-in hydraulic system and three-point implement linkage with implement position and draft control, headlights and taillight, and Ford's five-instruments-in-one "Proof Meter."

Veterans' News

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. My three-year deadline for starting Korean GI training is only a few weeks away. I am recovering from an operation and I won't be able to enter training in time. Could I possibly file an application before the deadline and actually start my studies afterwards?

A. This would not be possible under the law. The law requires veterans actually to begin GI training within three years from date of discharge. Filing an application alone is not enough.

Q. I am a Korea veteran and some day I plan to buy a house with a GI loan. Is my deadline the same as for veterans of World War 2, in July, 1958.

A. No. The GI deadline for Korea veterans is January 31, 1965. The July 25, 1958, deadline for applying for loans is only for World War 2 Veterans.

Q. I have been receiving payments from VA throughout 1956. Must I pay Federal income tax on these payments?

A. No. All VA benefit payments including disability compensation are exempt from taxation.

Q. How do I notify my VADistrict office that I have changed my address? I have a GI insurance policy.

A. On the inside flap of the VA space for filling in your new address. Print or type your new address and sign your name. VA will change its records accordingly.

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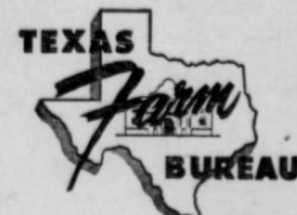
