J. Lee Ensor Walks Off with Top Honors at Angelo Show

J. Lee Ensor, local 4-H Club boy, just about stole the show exhibiting his Rambouillet at the San Angelo Fat Stock Show last weekend.

His outstanding work as a breeder and feeder of registered Rambouillet sheep was given double recognition at the show. He was selected as first recipient of the new Wallace Dameron Memorial Trophy and named premier junior Rambouillet exhibitor of this year's show. Several leading Texas Rambouillet breeders set up the annual rotating trophy in memory of the late Wallace Dameron, who was superintendent of the Sonora Experiment Station for several years. Mrs. Dameron made the presentation.

In addition to that, Ensor received the annual showmanship award for the junior breeding sheep division.

Young Ensor had the reserve champion ewe. It was bred by Ed Ratliff of Bronte. Others of Ensor's flock are of B. F. Bridges & Son breeding and of the boy's own breeding. J. Lee is a son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Ensor. Another local boy, Martin Lee, placed two of his Rambouillets in the show. He placed second and fifth with his ewe lambs.

J. Lee's winnings including the following: Ram lamb, second; ewe lamb, first; two tooth ewe lambs, third and tenth; pen of three, third; and reserve champion ewe lamb.

JOE THETFORD IS VICTIM OF CAR ACCIDENT

Funeral services for Joe Dennis Thetford, 22, will be held at Robert Lee today, Friday, at 3 p. m. from the Methodist church. Rev. Ray Lee, pastor, will officiate.

Interment will follow in the Paint Creek Cemetery at Edith under direction of Clift Funeral Home. High School classmates, will be pallbearers.

Thetford, who was reared at Edith, was enroute to the family home in McCamey from San Diego, Calif., on a navy leave. His auto was in collision with a truck and he was killed instantly. It is believed he went to sleep at the wheel of his car and pulled it back onto the highway in the path of the truck. The accident occurred near Lordsburg, New Mexico.

He was born Dec. 22, 1931 and was a 1949 graduate of Robert Lee High School. His parents moved to McCamey about a year and a half ago. He attended San Angelo College before enlisting in the navy about three years ago. He had been based at San Diego and was supposed to have gone to sea at the end of this leave.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Thetford; a brother, Jack, his grandmother, Mrs. T. M. Freeman of Edith and a number of uncles and aunts, one of them being Mrs. B. D. Snead of Bronte.

COKE COUNTY GIVES \$3,288 POLIO FUNDS

Emergency Loans Available Now From FHA Funds

In Nolan and Coke counties, farmers are now using funds from the emergency loan program of the Farmers Home Administrator, Paul C. Shillingburg, FHA county supervisor at Sweetwater, said today.

These loans are available to farmers who have suffered substantial losses due to unfavorable farming conditions brought on by the prolonged drought.

Nolan and Coke Counties have been designated by the Secretary of Agriculture as an area where the Farmers Home Administration can make loans of this type.

In addition, the agency's county office also makes production or farm adjustment loans and extends credit for the purchase or development of farms. It can also make special livestock loans to drought-stricken producers of cattle and sheep to help them maintain normal production.

Applications for any type of loan cannot be approved by the Farmers Home Administration if a farmer's needs can be adequately met with credit from private or cooperative lenders.

County Supervisor Paul C. Shillingburg is in the office at Robert Lee each Thursday from 10 until two o'clock. The office is in the Agricultural Annex.

Sombbrero Tamales— Quick and Flavorful Oven Dish

Really fine eating, pardner, is this wonderfully delicious casserole of satisfying food which all the "cow punchers" in your family will praise and praise.

This quick oven dish is put together in a matter of minutes. It is almost an "out-of-the-can-affair" because the rice cooks while you get out the cheese, the tamales and chili con carne and light the oven. This "savory favorite" from the southwest is different enough to make a big hit with company, too, and you'll find you won't need to "lasso" any compliments for it.

INGREDIENTS:

1—15 ounce can or jar of tamales and sauce
3 cups cooked rice

1—15½ ounce can chili con carne with beans

¾ cup water

¼ lb. American cheese, sliced
PREPARING THE FLUFFY WHITE RICE: To make 3 heaping cups of white, fluffy, perfectly cooked rice:

- Put 1 cup uncooked rice, 2 cups of cold water and 1 teaspoon of salt into a 2-quart saucepan and bring to a vigorous boil.
- Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover the saucepan with a lid. Do not remove lid nor stir rice while it is cooking.

- Leave saucepan over this low heat for 14 minutes. Remove from the heat. The rice is now ready to use.

For extra fluffy, tender, separate grains allow the rice to steam for an additional 10 minutes—with heat off, but without removing lid.

For extra convenience and economy of time and effort, cook 2 cups of rice, 4 cups of water and 2 teaspoons of salt—keeping the extra cups of unused ready-cooked rice in the refrigerator in a covered container.

Use this rice as needed in quick, delicious and inexpensive soups, salads, casserole dishes, hot breads and desserts.

METHOD: Place the tamales and sauce in the bottom of a greased 2-quart baking dish. Top with the cooked rice. Pour the chili con carne over the rice.

Add the water. Place the cheese slices over the top of the chili con carne. Place in a 350°F. oven for 30 minutes or until the cheese has melted and the tamales, rice and chili con carne mixture is heated through.

If desired, save out three of the tamales and arrange them on the top of the cheese in the shape of a sombrero. Do this about 10 minutes before the cooking time is over in order that these tamales may become hot.

This recipe makes 8 servings.

Bond Vote March 10 at Blackwell

Blackwell residents will vote March 10 on whether to issue \$44,000 in revenue bonds for a waterworks system.

If the issue carries Blackwell municipality will buy water from the City of Sweetwater under the Upper Colorado River Authority Bronte contract.

The residents of Blackwell several months ago formed what is known as the Nolan County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1—Townsite Sec. 251.

The bonds are 20-year series and will be income-tax free, according to T. A. Carlisle, Blackwell merchant and promoter of the new water supply.

The proposed system would take water from the main at the Oak Creek Lake about two miles south of Blackwell. The water will be pressure filtered and pumped into a 50-foot high tower to flow into the mains and laterals that will be laid when the project goes forward.

The system has 110 subscribers for water, Mr. Carlisle said. "All these have put up \$10 for meters."

Residents of Blackwell have always been dependent upon individuals wells and windmills for their water supply. An estimated 400 to 500 persons live in the neighboring town. It incorporated more than a year ago and later formed the water district.

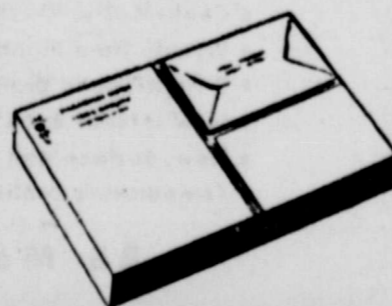

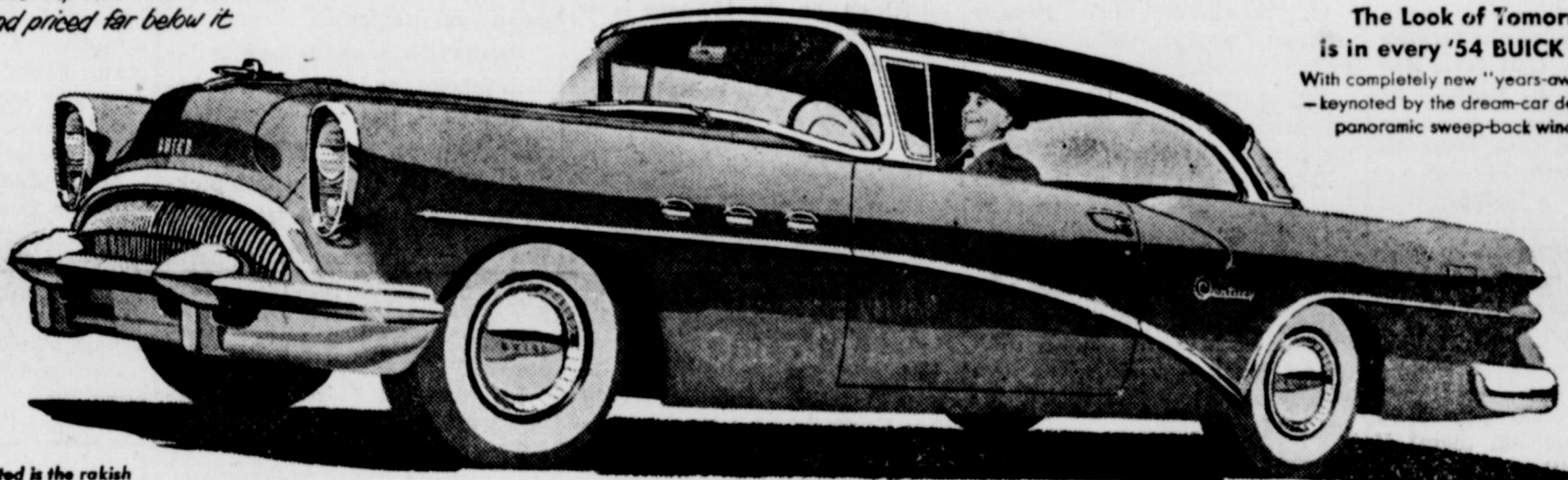

Oil News

Gore Drilling Co of Albany has filed application to drill a 6,009-foot rotary wildcat, its 1 Fred Conger, in southeastern Coke County, approximately 1/2-mile west of Tennyson.

Drilling, on the 160-acre lease, will begin at once.

Location is 467 from the north and 2,690 from the most easterly east lines of 1-J. W. Johnson survey.

The prospector is 1 7/8 miles northeast of Union 1 Webb, a dry hole, plugged and abandoned at 6,050 feet, June 6, 1953. The Caddo was topped at 5,305 feet and the Wilburns at 6,020 feet on elevation of 1,985 feet.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. staked location for No. 5 Olive May Keeney in the Bronte Cambrian Field two miles southwest of Bronte.

Having a proposed depth of 5,500 feet with rotary, it is located 760 feet from the south and 2,250 feet from the east lines of Section 453, Block 1-A, H&TC Survey.

The Wendkirk field of Coke County has gained its most prolific producer and a one-location southeast and northeast extension with the completion of Shamrock Oil & Gas Corp. 5 H. G. Wendland for a daily flowing potential of 557.56 barrels of 41 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 287-1.

Production was through a 1/4-inch choke and open hole between 3,661 feet where 5 1/2-inch casing was set, and 3,667 feet, the total depth. Top of pay was picked at 3,660 feet on derrick floor elevation of 1,811 feet. Completion was natural.

Flowing pressure was 175 pounds; casing pressure, 240 pounds.

Location is in 1-Thos. Hennessey survey.

The second largest producer is Shamrock's No. 4 Wendland, which was finished for a daily potential of 285.17 barrels of oil. The discovery well, F. Kirk Johnson 1 Wendland, was finished May 14, 1953, for a daily potential of 95.12 barrels of oil.

Guest speaker will be Leon Lane of Luling, state field representative of the Texas Farm Bureau. Every farm family in the county is cordially invited to attend these meetings.
