And she advanced with Wesley clutching at her neck like a young wild cat. When he saw how near were the white beard, the bushy eyebrows, bulbous nose and to him, altogether terrifying remembrance of the jolly saint, he let out a howl so agonizing that his mother turned pale and retreated hastily.

His mother was thoroughly distressed and ashamed. So was his father. So were his Grandpa and Grandpa and everyone else. Who ever heard of a three-year-old child being scared over Santa Claus?

Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST—Grape juice with lemon; cereal, cream, scrambled eggs with rice, bran muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Canned oysters with lemon butter, creamed potatoes, orange salad, toasted muffins, milk, tea.

DINNER—Pork tenderloin, Frenched, scalloped corn, apple fritters, mixed relishes, cranberry sponge, milk, coffee.

A tablespoonful of lemon juice added to a small glass of grape juice improves the taste for many persons. The lemon juice seems to break the cloying sweetness of grape juice.

Apple Fritters
Two cups thinly sliced apples, 2 eggs, 1-2 cup milk, 2 cups flour, 2 tablespoons baking powder, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons sugar, 2 tablespoons melted butter.

Beat eggs until very light. Beat in milk with egg beater. Mix and sift flour, baking powder and sugar. Add to first mixture and stir until smooth. Add melted butter and beat hard. Stir in apples and drop into deep hot fat. The fat should be 350 degrees Fahrenheit or hot enough to brown an inch cube of bread in 60 seconds. Allow ten minutes for the fritters to cook. Drain on brown-paper napkins with maple or brown sugar syrup.

Car Registration Has Big Rush Here

Thursday Finds Much Activity Around Tax Collector's Office; January 1 Is Time Limit On Plates

All the employees of the county tax collector's office were rushed every minute of the day Thursday, almost with the detail work of issuing automobile licenses and writing receipts for those and other taxes. Approximately 150 new 1929 licenses were issued during the day, in addition to more than a dozen truck licenses for next year.

To date there have been about 800 of the 1929 licenses issued, which is only about one-tenth of the total number of passenger automobiles registered in Lubbock county during this year. Thus it is easy to see there will be many more days of crowded business at the tax collector's windows and much waiting in line. Best thing to do is make it snappy and get in before the grand rush is on.

Another thing to remember is that after January 1 it is against the law to drive your car on streets and highways without 1929 license plates.

Bridge Holds Up Weight of Train

The Santa Fe railroad bridge on the Crosbyton branch, a mile and a half north of this city, which was damaged by fire Wednesday, was found to be strong enough to support traffic over it yesterday morning when the Crosbyton passenger train successfully made a crossing, witnessed by a small crowd of people who were almost breathless until the train had made the passage.

The bridge caught fire from burning grass along the railroad right-of-way Wednesday and burned for about two hours, the city fire department succeeding in extinguishing the blaze through pumping water from the canyon and from the water tank of a Santa Fe locomotive. Company employees following a thorough inspection after the fire pronounced the structure strong enough to support the passenger train, after testing its strength out by running a switch engine across it.

MEXICANS ARE JAILED

Three Youths Held In Jail Here For Riding Train

Three young Mexicans able to understand but little English and claiming to have been in this country for only a few months, are spending three or four days in the county jail here, following their arrest at El Paso Wednesday for riding a freight train on the Santa Fe railroad.

The Mexicans, through one of the trio who acted as interpreter, admitted riding the freight and being paid that they were broke and looking for work.

Man Is Held Here For Wilson Theft

Thursday afternoon a representative of the Wilson Mercantile company, of Wilson, identified a large number of articles of clothing, hardware and other goods that were stolen from their store last Saturday night, which had been found in Wheeler's possession.

PERMITS INCREASED

December Record Now Only \$1,800 Short To Mark

Permit to construct a frame lumber shed, in the Roberts & McWhorter addition, was issued Thursday to Ben Oglesby, cost of the building being stated as \$1,800.

This leaves only \$1,800 more in building permits for December's record to reach the \$100,000 mark, bringing the total to date for the month to \$98,200, and that for the year to \$2,168,712.

uary 7, with ninety new members in the total of 181 for the Senate and House. Soon after the legislature meets, Governor Dan Moody will be inaugurated for his second term of two years.

General laws will be enacted for a huge commonwealth of nearly 6,000,000 people and 265,896 square miles. The two year interim between regular sessions always produces a wealth of proposed legislation. The greater part of it never sees the light of day as far as the statute books are concerned for legislative calendars are too crowded. Two years ago, about 1,200 bills were introduced. Less than 30 per cent of them were enacted into laws. Many of them were not new laws, but merely amending existing laws.

It is generally agreed that the appropriation or "money" bills for support of state institutions and departments will be deferred until the regular 30-day special session. This usually is called to convene about 30 days after the two months regular session.

Appropriations Large

The coming legislature will be called upon to appropriate at least \$48,813,787 from the state's general revenue fund—more than ever before.

This is the net recommendation of the state board of control, and represents a slicing down of requests from state departments and institutions—totaling—\$64,328,240, the largest sum in the state's history. Institutions and departments grow with the state, which has just closed a prosperous biennium. The requests amount to new heights every biennium.

Highway legislation, of course, will be the main item of the general session. Following it closely in importance will be the prison reform laws. Some of them will call for centralization of the new scattered prison system in line with Governor Moody's ideas. There probably will be a bill to have cement for state highways manufactured by the state's convicts. Another may call for manufacture of automobile license plates by the prison system.

Water Rights to Come Up

Legislation regulating water rights is almost certain to be introduced. It will echo the famous Brownwood case, which involved the priority of rights on the Colorado river, and caused a long standing controversy. It will echo, no doubt, the civil appellate court decision holding unconstitutional the present law providing for creation of water control and improvement districts. It would not be surprising to see proposed laws ironing out the kinks hindering huge districts as the Brazos river district, embracing 38 counties, which is now in the process of organization.

An urgent subject of legislation will be the payment of justices of the peace in criminal cases. A recent ruling of the Court of Criminal Appeals held the present fee system of paying justices unconstitutional, because their pay is dependent on a verdict of guilty in criminal cases. Some new way of payment will be sought. On the other hand, the legislature may try to overthrow the entire county and district fee system and substitute it with some other method of payment.

A mass of recent litigation concerning Texas University and state school lands, mostly in the West Texas oil area, is expected to call for new legislation.

New methods of financing the state highway system will be sought. Governor Moody will submit to the legislature the report of his 21-member highway advisory committee, which calls for adoption of a proposed constitutional amendment providing a state bond issue of not to exceed \$20,000,000 at one time. This bond issue would be used primarily for state and motor traffic, including a state gasoline tax. Counties and road districts would be refunded the money they have spent on roads now a part of the highway system.

Attempts at highway legislation are sure to provoke fights. Proponents of highway legislation have many different ideas. The Moody committee are expected to present legislation of their own. The majority plan, in its present conception, is also opposed by several organizations. Differences also are expected to develop over the future state gas oil tax, now two cents. As high as five cents has been proposed.

Governor Moody has made known that he is not "wedded" to any particular plan of highway improvement. He wants to see the legislature consider all plans offered and work out the best scheme possible. Policies and practices of the highway department as present, because of restrictions, are freely described as "haphazard." Roads are built as the money becomes available, both to the state and to localities. The result is a "patchwork" road system. Yet the highway department spends more than \$20,000,000 a year.

Withdrawn Before

All highway legislation was withdrawn in the 40th legislature because of wide divergence of plans for improvement. Thus the coming legislature will be faced with problems doubly insistent of solution because of delay.

Another subject of proposed legislation is stricter regulation of weights and measures, particularly as applied to gasoline. At a recent session of the state weights and measures inspectors, it was reported that Texas motorists in one year paid for more than \$3,000,000 worth of gasoline withheld from them in short measurements. The state department of agriculture, which has supervision of weights and measures, probably will sponsor remedial legislation.

A wide range of state departmental legislation will be offered. Some of it will call for increased appropriations for additional help with the idea that the state will profit later by increased revenues and better administration of laws.

Series of Accidents In Houston Find Two Killed

HOUSTON, Dec. 27. (AP)—Two widely known oil men were killed here today in a series of accidents which also took a heavy toll of injured.

E. J. Overley, 70, oil man on whose lease the famous Blue Ridge Field first was brought in, was injured fatally when an automobile he was driving was in collision with a speeding fire department automobile.

The other fatality came when S. B. Forman, 55, oil operator of Beaumont and Houston died from injuries received when he was struck by a passing car on a busy downtown corner.

Among them is Charles Burke, 7, struck by a car driven by Mrs. Overley as the latter was rushing to the bedside of her husband.

SHREVEPORT, La., Dec. 27. (AP)—

"Death Crossing," near Rayville, took its eighth victim tonight when Mrs. Marion Mayo, of Shreveport, was killed in an automobile accident in which two other persons were injured.

BOSWELL, Va., Dec. 27. (AP)—

Miss Jennie May Nuckols, 14, of Longdale, and Miss Pearl Blunt, 14, of Boswell, were killed when their automobile was struck by a passenger train at a grade crossing near here today.

Jon East in the San Bernardino mountains and roaring down the eastern side at about 90 miles an hour. The train hit the spot where, officials say, a rail had been removed by the wreckers. A chair car and six pullmans went into the ditch, overturning. The engine and tender, although derailed, did not turn over.

Fans Seem Satisfied
Coach Alonzo Stagg of the University of Chicago, a member of the rules committee, was among the first to get in his comment on proposed changes.

"The fans seem to be satisfied with them now," was his terse comment.

The first session of the N. C. A. A. was held late today behind closed doors when the executive committee awarded the sixth annual swimming championship tournament to Washington University, St. Louis, for March 29-30 and the National Collegiate Track and Field Meet to Chicago for June 7-8.

Dr. S. V. Sanford of the University of Georgia, president and founder of the Southern Conference, has been mentioned freely by early arrivals as a possible nominee to oppose Dr. Palmer E. Pierce, for president of the athletic association.

Probably the only change in the personnel of the national rules committee, Coach Yost of Michigan, forecast, would be election of a successor to Dana X. Bible as representative of the sixth district.

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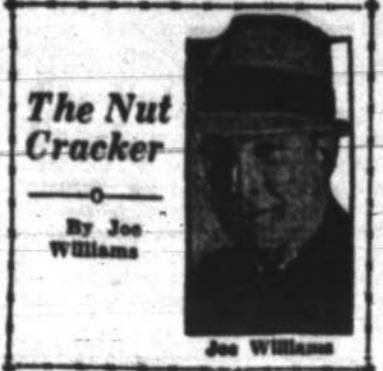

OUR LITIN NEIGHBORS

The people of the United States especially the majority of them are very unfamiliar with the ways and customs of South America. Only until recently have we really shown much interest in that part of the world, though they are right close to us, and should not be so foreign to our interests. War scares, Hoover's trip, increased trade and, above all else, the modern publicity system, have tended to create keener interest in South America. We are beginning to learn something about that continent and its people. It is high time. We have a lot in common with South America. We shall have more as time goes on. Geography and politics have combined to separate the New World from the Old. In spite of racial differences, all peoples of the New World have been trained to a different understanding of government and its relations. In the first place, they have been liberated from those traditions of pride, prejudice and provincialism which play such an important part in determining the attitude of older countries. In the second place, the task of reclaiming and taming a wilderness has taught them to think in terms of change and originality. With one notable exception, the people of the New World established republics when they acquired independence, and that, too, notwithstanding the fact that the Old World remained largely monarchial. The discovery one year afterward, that South America was settled nearly a year before North America. While our ancestors were still content to catch cod fish off the New England coast, Spanish conquerors were sending home shiploads of gold and silver from Peru. Buenos Aires was founded by Mendoza in 1535, or 14 years before Jamestown was established and 57 years before the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth. Vice royal governments had been set up in South America, palaces had been built, cathedrals erected and universities established before any English-speaking community had proved it could maintain itself in what is now the United States. The contrast revealed by such facts can be traced to two great differences. In the first place the native population of South America was not only much larger than that of North America, but had made vastly more progress. In the second, the Spaniards came to conquer and exploit, while our ancestors came to settle. The predominating English idea was to develop a new empire, the predominating Spanish idea was to create dependencies. Our forebears regarded the native population as an obstacle to be overcome. The Spaniards regarded it as a source of spoil. There was more exterminating in North America and more looting in South America.

With the exception of Mexico and Central America, which should be identified with South America as far as discovery and development are concerned, North America has been practically cleared of its native population, and to all intents and purposes is the product of immigration. South America, on the influence and traditions of native stock. Probably one-half of the people now living there are Indians, while at least a quarter are cross-breeds. South American countries have found it difficult to keep the native population under control, much less to civilize it. Vast areas of that continent are still in a primitive state. In some countries one-half the people still speak native tongues while the other half runs as high as 80 per cent. There are cities as modern, clean and well-governed as any of ours, but back of them there are jungles, unexplored regions and native communities with which we have nothing to compare.

Bolivia, a nation of more than two million people, has only 2,000 automobiles and 1,500 telephones, yet the Spaniards are said to have more than two million dollars in gold and silver from the Bolivian mines, and the country now supplies the world with about one-half its tin. Brazil, which is about as large as the United States and which is just as productive, has less than one-tenth of the railroad mileage. South America, as a whole, possesses almost as much water as North America, but has developed less than one-twentieth as much. Such facts are interesting not because they indicate how much has been done in North America, but because they indicate how much remains to be done in South America. South America is a land of opportunity. Its productivity and resources have scarcely been tapped. Acres for acres, it more than equals North America in fertility of soil, favorable climate and mineral resources. Measured by what has been accomplished in Europe, South America should be capable of supporting a population of at least 500,000,000 people. We have enough of the later to help, immigration and the natural growth of population can be depended on to supply the former. The bigger and richer South America becomes the better it will be for us.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—All the world is familiar with "Andy" Mellon, captain of industry, little giant of finance and a treasury secretary hailed as strikingly fitted by experience and proven ability for the post he holds.

VACCINES OF SLIGHT MERIT IN PREVENTION OF FLU

EDITOR'S NOTE: Vaccines and isolation in combating a flu epidemic are discussed in this treatise by Dr. Fishbein, the third of a series of four articles on influenza.

During the 1918 epidemic studies were made of the use of vaccines and serum in the prevention of influenza, but apparently none of the substances developed was sufficiently potent to warrant recommendation as a routine measure in prevention.

The epidemiologists have made numerous studies in an endeavor to find out just how this disease is passed from one person to another. The conclusion is that the disease is probably spread by coughing, sneezing or spitting, but that in occasional cases it may be transmitted by the hands or by sleeping contact.

Shun Crowds

The effects of crowding and close association on the spread of influenza are, therefore, of the greatest importance, and lead to the warning in times of epidemic to avoid crowds and to maintain a distance of at least six feet from other infected human beings is the only known method of certain protection against infection.

Unfortunately under modern conditions of civilization it is impossible for any human being to avoid contact with others for any considerable period of time. This Jordan states.

"It is quite safe to assert that perfect isolation of an individual or group during an influenza epidemic constitutes a complete protection against the disease. Indeed, it is possible to go further and to practically to avoid outside human contact altogether, reduction of such contact to a necessary minimum confers some degree of protection, although naturally this is never absolute.

"It is clear that a number of factors, some of them unknown, enter into the causation of epidemic influenza, but the evidence seems convincing that on the one side seclusion and detachment and on the other general mingling with others, especially if the mingling involves close personal association at meals or at working quarters, are very important determining influences.

The closing of schools to prevent the spread of infection has been out of favor with sanitarians for some time.

An opportunity is afforded in school for systematic inspection and supervision and makes the school ordinarily a safer place for the average child than the unsupervised playground or the street.

Authorities on school hygiene are generally agreed that unless under special circumstances, the schools should remain open even in times of epidemic prevalence of epidemic influenza.

Unusual Circumstances

Exceptional circumstances, of course, exist. For instance, the present epidemic is just preceding the period of the Christmas holidays and several schools have taken advantage of this fact to dismiss their classes one week earlier than usual.

The evidence accumulated during 1918 indicated that there was no convincing proof that the closing of schools had any effect on the spread of the disease. This naturally would apply also to the closing of theatres, churches, moving picture shows and similar places in which a number of persons assemble.

A BIT OF SENSATIONAL HUMOR

Senator Bruce of Maryland, a wet democrat whose amendment to the treasury-postoffice supply bill increasing the prohibition enforcement appropriation from \$13,500,000 to \$20,627,324, was passed by the senate, has qualified as one of the senate's foremost humorists.

Considering the sort of humor that usually characterizes senate debate, and the kind of joke Senator Bruce perpetrated, the distinction he has gained is hardly worth having. Senatorial dignity, or what is supposed to be senatorial dignity, sank to a low ebb when Senator Bruce's amendment was submitted and adopted.

Senator Bruce, the dispatches tell us, "laughed aloud" when his amendment was declared to be approved, and the bill passed. Chairman Warren of the senate appropriations committee, after reading the Bruce amendment, also laughed. The presiding officer who hastily declared the amendment adopted was that arch jester, Senator Moses of New Hampshire, member of the celebrated "smelling committee" which visited the White House to learn if Woodrow Wilson was still in complete possession of his mental faculties when that stricken leader lay on his bed partially paralyzed. The witlessness of Senator Moses did much to enliven the Hoover presidential campaign, which was at times quite dull and colorless.

Eminent members of the senate laughed over the Bruce amendment because they considered it a smart trick. They knew that an appropriation of more than a quarter of a billion dollars for prohibition enforcement in one year would never become a law, but an amendment proposing such an appropriation might embarrass the prohibitionists of the country and emphasize what the wets assert to be the impossibility of enforcing prohibition.

The wets reason that by making the cost of prohibition enforcement prohibitive and by setting up vexatious and complicated enforcement machinery with prohibition that the repeal or modification of the eighteenth amendment will be easy. Senator Bruce, by his preposterous amendment, merely indicated what he would like to do—not, by any means, what he expects to do. But he got a laugh out of it, and so did other members of the senate whose sense of humor is attuned to his own.

The Bruce amendment will be thrown out, of course, by conference of the senate and house, but it may be always considered by Senator Bruce as one of the high lights of a none too distinguished career in the senate.

FORT WORTH LIVESTOCK

PORT WORTH, Dec. 27.—(P)—U. S. D. A.—Only 800 cattle and 150 calves were posted for today's livestock trade at Fort Worth and prices paid for all classes represented in the day's short receipts, appeared steady. Demand for slaughter steers was a trifle backward, despite the fact that some of the best fat steers of the week were on display. Carlot sales of slaughter steers reported around 10.50 to 11.50, one load desirable cake fed at the latter price. A few good fat yearlings, light weights sold at 11.00 to 11.75, package lots of the plainer grades ranging on down the list. A part load of good fat cows brought 8.15 and one load sold at 7.50, plain butchers mostly under the \$7.00 level. A few low cutters changed hands at 4.00 to 4.75.

Two or three small lots of good-to-choice heavy calves were sold up to 10.00, but no straight loads of desirable fat calves were shown. Sales of weighty calves in medium and common grades scattered around 7.00 to 9.50, with occasional cull sorts at 5.00.

Hog prices registered a decline of about 150 in the rail division, with truck hogs on a generally steady basis. Carlot butchers made a top of \$8.50 and best truck hogs brought 8.45. Most of the desirable 210-220 pound rail hogs reported at 8.70 to 8.80, bulk of truck hogs 8.10 to 8.45, packing sows at 7.25 to 8.00, appeared steady, pigs very scarce.

Fat lambs scored an advance of a quarter to half dollar compared with a week ago, while other classes remained steady. A two deck shipment of good to choice woolled fat lambs brought 14.00 and fresh shorn fat lambs at 11.50. Shorn fat yearlings sold at 10.50 and desirable shorn fat wethers at 8.90.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 27.—(P)—U. S. D. A.—Fat lambs trade around the 11-market circuit was marked by moderate activity at prices unevenly steady to 25c higher. Aged stock was on a steady to stronger basis. Chicago realized 15.50 on best fat lambs and at Omaha 15.00 was scored on fed wool lambs. The supply approximated 41,750 as compared with 46,150 last Thursday and \$5.84 a year ago.

Hogs were featured an "uneven" price decline of 10 to 40c, the minimum loss shown at Chicago on the opening. The day's extreme top of 9.00 was paid for one load at Chicago. Total offerings were around 18,500 an increase of 40,700 over a week ago. And 21,500 more than the same day last year.

Aggregate receipts of cattle were estimated at 20,500 about the same as a week ago and 4,080 less than a year ago. With the exception of a draggy outlet for weighty short fed steers, trade on killing classes was more active than yesterday. Desirable light weight steers and yearlings at some points ruled slightly higher, while fat stock was generally strong to 25c higher; major receipts of cows this week resulted in a sharp advance on vealers and a moderate upturn on weighty cows. Chicago had a top of 17.00 on prime long yearlings and realized 16.75 on weighty steers of outstanding quality.

CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO, Dec. 26.—(P)—Corn scored fresh gains in price today, but the gains failed to stand up against a wave of selling to realize profits. In some cases, today's corn market came within 1-2c of equaling the topmost quotations this season. Meanwhile, corn receipts at Chicago lacked volume, and rural offerings to arrive were small, but deliveries here on December contracts were much larger, aggregating 720,000 bushels.

Closing quotations on corn were irregular at 1-2c net lower to 3-4c advance. Wheat finished 1-4c to 2c up, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 25c.

NEW YORK STOCKS

NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—(P)—The bull party held a celebration on the stock market today as the call money rate failed to go above 12 per cent, although that is the highest figure of the year, and the highest for any previous year since 1921. It was not long ago, however, that bankers were predicting that the rate might go above 20 per cent during the closing days of the year. The market was inclined to heaviness most of the season, as call money renewed at 10 per cent and

mounted to .12 when the banks called \$25,000,000.

Several issues, including rubbers, metals, oils, merchandising shares, and specialties, were sent up 3 to 18 points. Total sales, however, were but 3,560,000 shares, about 50,000 less than yesterday. The Associated Press average of 20 industrial mounts 3.65 points, leaving but approximately 6 1-2 points of break of early December, when call the 26-point loss suffered in the money touched 12 per cent for the first time this year.

The Federal Reserve bank reported a decrease of \$19,394,000 in brokers' loans, which brings the total down to \$5,091,427,000, which is more than \$300,000,000 under the record total established in the week ended Dec. 5, but about \$125,000,000 more than the aggregate borrowings of a year ago. Further increases in the time money rates today was regarded as indicating that real easy money can hardly be expected in the near future.

The day's news was marked by further excellent railroad earnings for November. The first 31 roads to report net operating income for the month showed an aggregate increase of more than 25 per cent over November, 1927. U. S. Industrial Alcohol raised its annual dividend rate from \$5 to \$6.

Radio fluctuated wildly, selling off 9 points to \$247 in the forenoon, then shooting up 23 points to \$370 at the close. National tea, Wright Aero, and Case Threshing mounted 11 to 18 points.

Goodrich Tire shot up 10 points to a new peak at \$140. Goodrich jumped 8 points to a new peak. Allis Chalmers soared about 15 points to a new top. General Electric touched a new peak at 212 1-2, while Montgomery Ward, Mohawk Carpet, and St. Joseph Lead were among other issues breaking into new high ground. American Can, U. S. Steel, New York Central and General Motors moved up about 2 points each.

De Pont dropped 10 points, but reduced its loss to 6. Keith Albee preferred, Stanley Co., Pere Marquette, and National Biscuit, were among issues losing from 2 to 5 points.

With the exception of the Canadian dollar, which again sagged, foreign exchanges remained firm.

Court Rules Payment Not Binding To Woman Who Desecrates Memory Of Her Soldier Husband

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Dec. 27.—Contention of the United States Veterans' Bureau, that a soldier's widow who is unfaithful to the memory of her husband is not entitled to his war risk insurance was upheld today by federal Judge James H. Wilkerson.

The case was that of Corinne Hanna, whose husband, Major Mark Hanna of Kansas City, was killed on Armistice day.

Mrs. Hanna was named beneficiary of the Major's \$10,000 war insurance policy, and the Major's father, Thomas M. Hanna, of Ruthven, Iowa, second beneficiary.

The widow received monthly installments from the government totaling \$245. The payments were stopped May 23 of this year after an investigation by the Veterans' Bureau, the father being substituted as beneficiary.

The Veterans' Bureau charged Mrs. Hanna had been living with Joe Wagner, now serving a term in the Iowa penitentiary for bank robbery.
