TEACHERS WILL GATHER HERE ON MONDAY

ANNUAL INSTITUTE TO BE HELD AT TECH; 1,200 COMING

With only three days remaining until opening of the 1933 South Plains teachers' institute, indications point to the fact that attendance at the three-day affair this year will far outdistance that of any former session, according to announcement today by officials in charge of arrangements for the event.

The institute will open at Texas Technological college next Monday morning at 9 o'clock to continue through Wednesday.

Local authorities have estimated that 1,200 teachers from 17 South Plains counties will be entertained in Lubbock during the three days. Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of Texas Tech, is conductor of the institute while Dr. A. M. Evans, head of the department of education at Tech, is associate conductor.

"We have outlined the most ambitious program in history of the organization," Dr. Evans said today, "and we feel that those who

Four Prisoners Break Vernon Jail

WALLS CUT BY QUARTET IN ESCAPE

ONE MAN WAS UNDER SENTENCES TOTALING NINETY YEARS

VERNON, Aug. 29.—Cutting a hole through the brick wall, four prisoners escaped from the Wilbarger county jail here early today. Officers said the break was engineered by Ernest Oglesby of Eastland, under sentences totaling 90 years assessed in various West Texas counties.

Others who escaped were George Allen, assessed a four-year sentence yesterday on two charges of burglary; Marion Sanders, under four-year sentence for burglary Bonham and awaiting trial here on a like charge, and Mon Coffey awaiting trial for burglary. They were Wilbarger county residents. The bars of a door between two cells had been sawed prior to the break.

Brooklyn Serves Notice On Gangs

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—Notice has been served on gangsters in Brooklyn to get out of the borough in 48 hours or take the consequences. Aroused by four gang killings within a week and seizure of two gangster arsenals, District Attorney George E. Broome of Kings county said he was determined to drive every gunman and racketeer from the borough. He ordered a general roundup of all suspicious characters at the expiration of the 48-hour ultimatum.

Corisicana Boy Is Drowned In Tank

CORISICANA, Aug. 29.—Arnold Newton Patterson, 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Patterson, drowned last night in the Texas company tank southwest of here. The lad fell from a post, striking a crosspiece of timber. The blow injured him so he could not swim.

WALKER FACES LIBEL SUIT

SUSPENDED MARSHAL IS OUT FOR REDRESS FROM MAYOR

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—Mayor James J. Walker was defendant today in a \$200,000 slander suit brought by a suspended city marshal who had told a federal grand jury he paid \$2,000 for his job.

Jacob Cash, the suspended marshal, objected to a statement by the mayor that he was removed for "preying upon the poor" and that 39 complaints were involved in his dismissal. He contends there was only one charge against him and that that was framed.

Served in Celebration
A summons in the suit was served on the mayor as he stood on the steps at city hall extending the city's greetings to the four German aviators who flew across the North Atlantic. He later termed the method used in serving the summons as "disrespectful not only to the mayor, but to the whole city of New York."

Other angles to the various state and federal investigations into charges of office-buying and corruption among the New York judiciary included the indictment of Martin J. Healy, Tammany district leader; reopening of an investigation into the death of a former city magistrate and charges involving two additional supreme court justices.

Healy, who is said to have received \$10,000 in 1927 from Mrs. Bertha E. Ewald a few days before her husband was appointed to the magistracy, was indicted for failure to declare a 1927 income tax.

A.D. PAYNE IS INDICTED

POTTER GRAND JURY BRINGS BILL TODAY

ENTIRE WEEK IS SPENT IN BOMBING CASE INVESTIGATION

AMARILLO, Aug. 29.—A. D. Payne, Amarillo attorney, today was indicted for murder in the bomb slaying of his wife June 27.

The indictment was returned just before the noon recess. The Potter county grand jury began investigating the case Monday morning but it had spent some time on other cases.

Payne, who had admitted the killing and had said he wanted to go to the electric chair, fretted early in the week because the grand jury did not return an indictment immediately.

Mrs. Payne was killed and her small son, A. D. Jr., injured when a bomb planted in the automobile exploded.

Fire Does Slight Damage To Store

Fire which started in the Piggy-Wiggy store No. 5, 1302 Avenue H, Thursday night about 11:15 o'clock, did negligible damage, according to reports this morning at the Lubbock Fire department.

Two engine companies of the department answered last night's alarm but found no blaze upon arrival. The store, however, was filled with smoke.

The fire was said to have started in a small motor, supposedly used for operation of an electric refrigeration system.

FAIR BOOTHS ARE SOUGHT

FIVE EXHIBITS SIGNED THUS FAR; WORKERS IN TERRITORY

Representatives of the Panhandle-South Plains fair association today are scouring the territory served by the exposition in an effort to contact chambers of commerce and county agents looking toward the contracting of county exhibit booths during the 1931 show.

To date only five counties have been definitely signed for exhibits but officials are expecting nearly a score before the closing date. Last year 17 counties had exhibits at the fair and an equal number is expected this year.

Five Signed
Those who have signified intentions of having representatives with booths here include Potter, Cochran, Lamb, Terry and Hockley counties.

D. F. Eaton, Lubbock county agent, is in charge of community exhibits and he is to start work in getting entrants in this division within a short while. A larger number of community displays are expected this year than last.

Advertising men today are working the territory adjacent to Lubbock.

Moody's "Buy A Bale" Movement Is Given Support Here; One Purchased

MILITARY AND POLITICAL UNREST IS ACTIVE IN FOUR AMERICAN REPUBLICS TODAY; TWO REVOLUTIONS IN ACTION

Military and political unrest showed its effects today in four American republics, Brazil, Argentina, Cuba and Peru.

Advices to the Associated Press from Montevideo said the Brazilian state of Rio Grande do Sul had been disturbed by a revolutionary movement headed by Juan Francisco de Souza and that all federal troops have been confined to barracks.

Havana reported the government in readiness to proclaim martial law in Matanzas, Matanzas, where rioting over political issues had not been quelled. The same dispatch said a score of politicians had been arrested at Cruces, Santa Clara, in a plot against the government.

Destroers Arrive
Arrival of three destroyers at Buenos Aires today strengthened the hand of the government of Argentina, threatened by insurgents.

President Hipolito Yrigoyen did not emerge from the heavy guard of troops yesterday thrown about the government house and his residence. Buenos Aires still was unable to explain the extreme measures and as a consequence there were many rumors regarding the seriousness of the situation.

Peru's revolution, which ousted President Leguia and installed Lieut. Col. Luis M. Sanchez Cerro as military dictator, today had completed its cycle with Sanchez sworn in as president and Lieutenant Colonel Ortega military governor of Lima, one year after the date they launched the revolt.

Cliff Edwards Must Pay Wife \$250 Week

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 29.—Cliff Edwards, known on stage and screen as "Ukelele Ike," was under court orders today to pay his estranged wife, Mrs. Irene Edwards, \$250 weekly alimony pending trial of his divorce action.

At a recent hearing Edwards told the court he had no money. Mrs. Edwards alleged he received \$1,500 a week and said she needed substantial alimony to uphold her social position.

Chicago Man Shot At Door Of Home

CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—Called to the door of his home by two men, John Krupke, 38, was assassinated early today. His killers escaped. Police said an early investigation indicated the man had been a beer runner for the Capone-Gusik gang.

Federal Officers Raid Near Marshall

MARSHALL, Aug. 29.—Raided here and over Harrison county yesterday climaxed a week of activity by federal officers. Ten persons were arrested and seventeen charges of prohibition law violation were filed.

The check has been signed by M. W. Dickinson, local game warden, who states that it is to be given the first producer who brings a receipt for a 500-pound bale to the local chamber of commerce office. Following deposit of the check, which is to be filled out to the amount of 15 cents per pound for the 500 pound bale, Mr. Dickinson wired Governor Moody stating that he is heartily in accord with the movement and advising him of the fact that he has purchased the first bale in this section.

ARMED POSSE IN SEARCH OF KILLER

TWO OTHER OFFICERS WOUNDED; BOY IS ARRESTED

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 29.—With two officers shot to death and two others wounded in a prolonged attempt to arrest a suspected moonshiner, a huge armed posse today invaded the dense woods at Marcola, near here in pursuit of Ray Sutherland, 67, the alleged killer.

Oscar Duley, Eugene policeman, was shot five times from ambush as he attempted to arrest Sutherland, 30, son of the fugitive at the Sutherland home last night. Duley died later in a hospital. Joe Saunders, deputy sheriff, was shot and instantly killed while stalking the elder Sutherland.

Boy Is Arrested
A trail of blood from the spot where Duley was shot led through the woods and possums to the Sutherland home and thence into the dense woods. Young Sutherland was found in the house and arrested. The shooting began last night when Duley and John Carlyn, another deputy sheriff, lay in wait for a delivery of liquor to the Sutherland home.

The officers said Duley was shot from ambush by Ray Sutherland as the son's automobile approached and they attempted to arrest him.

Body Tossed Aside
Deputies said Duley's body was tossed to the side of the highway and the Sutherlands fled. Carlyn spread the alarm. Lee Brown and Rodney Roach, deputies, rushed to the scene and were wounded. Sutherland as they trailed him Brown was shot through both leg and Roach was struck in both arm and one foot.

Following the bloody trail from the house to the woods the posse searched for the elder Sutherland, who was believed to be wounded.

YANKEE MATADOR HAS TOUGH TIME

MADRID (AP)—Sidney Franklin, Brooklyn bullfighter, the only North American who has ever tried to be a professional matador in Spain, is having hard sledding.

"El Americano" was a novelty in Spain last year, and got contracts without difficulty. Bull rings all over the peninsula wanted the curious spectacle of a "Yanqui" torreador.

But this summer, his second in the homeland of bullfighting, Franklin is "home folks" and must compete for contracts with the Spanish lads who grew up fighting bulls.

Sidney has so far had only half a dozen engagements this summer, but he is game. In the bullfight booking offices in Madrid and Sevilla he can be seen regularly, looking for chances to fight, and still hoping to stick long enough to get his "alternative"—a sort of "knighthood" of a bullfighter.

After that he may go to Mexico or Peru, where they like bullfighting.

Merchant Is Named Accessory To Death

CHICAGO, Aug. 28 (AP)—Peter Von Prantius, sporting goods dealer, today was named as an accessory before the fact in the slaying June 9 of Alfred Jake Lingle, Tribune reporter, in a warrant issued by Judge John H. Lyle.

Through a checkup of numbers on a pistol left beside the body of the slain reporter, Von Prantius was identified as the seller of the weapon. Police said he told of selling it with four others to Frank Foster, Moran-Zuta-Aello hoodlum who has been identified as the man who dashed from the subway under Michigan avenue, where Lingle was slain, eluded a policeman and escaped.

Police Asked To Aid In Jewel Hunt

TULSA, Okla., Aug. 29 (AP)—Tulsa police were asked today to aid in a search for diamonds and jewelry valued at \$19,480, which Mrs. Lillian Campbell, New York City, lost in a traveling bag while en route from New York to Oklahoma City. She reported some one exchanged bags with her.

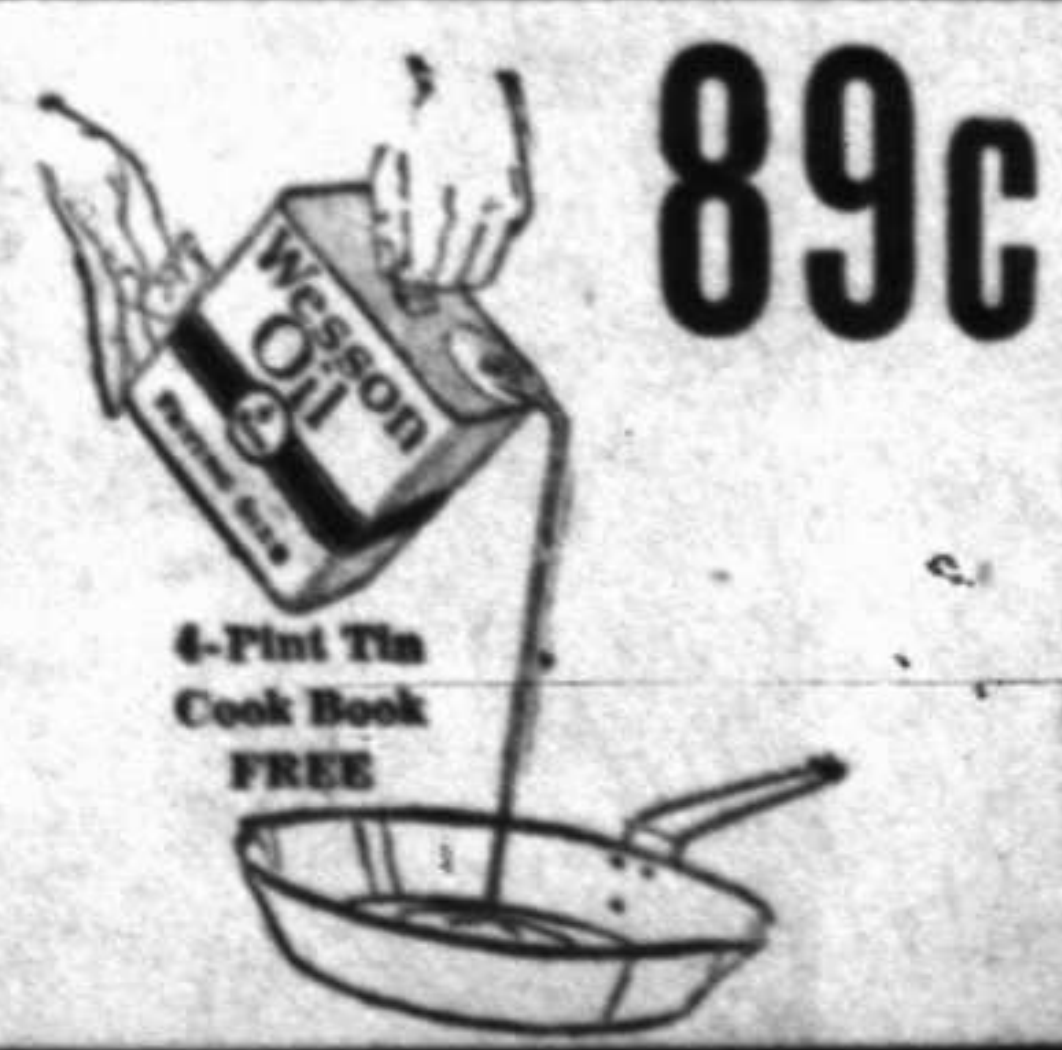

LABOR DAY TO BE OBSERVED QUIETLY

NO PARADE TO BE HELD BUT CELEBRATION AT RANCH SET

No program will be presented in this city Monday by individual labor organizations in observance of Labor Day, announcement Thursday night stated. Plans for a parade have also been abandoned.

P. O. Brock, head of the painters union committee, said a union parade had been contemplated but that preliminary plans had fallen through. Circumstances led labor officials to regard presentation of a parade successfully this year as very difficult, Mr. Brock said.

No Official Plans Made
The labor committeeman said that he knew of no Labor Day programs by individual unions and that the impression was that labor ranks here would not participate officially in any recognition of the day.

Lubbock's Labor Day sports calendar includes a doubleheader between two negro baseball clubs, Howell Black Sox and Amarillo Black Giants, slated to be played at the Lubbock ball park beginning at 2:30 o'clock Monday afternoon.

A South Plains league contest between Lubbock and Levelland also had been scheduled for the day at the park here.

A program of entertainment has been planned at Johnston's ranch, six miles southeast of the city, which will include broncho riding, motorcycle hill climbs and car junking. Dancing also will feature in the evening.

Amherst Prepares For Long Delivery

AMHERST, Aug. 28.—Amherst will have one of the longest rural routes in Texas if the recommendations for an increase in the present rural route made by Postmaster Hulbert Slate is approved by the department.

Six more miles may be added to the present route, which is 79 miles long. Mr. Slate has made a trip over the route and has filed his papers in the approval of the additional mileage.

"I understand the longest route in Texas is a little less than 90 miles long," Mr. Slate said. "Our route will be at least 85 miles long, maybe longer."

Amherst has only one rural route. J. LaGrange is the carrier. The route goes through Fieldton, a rural community east of town.

"AVERAGE COW"

AMES, Iowa, Aug. 28.—During June, using New York butter extras as a basis for prices, it would have taken about 200 average Iowa cows to have given a farmer a return of \$1,000 income per year above feed costs. But he would have had to milk but 29 producing an average of 350 pounds of butterfat a year.

TEXAS SETS TOADS AGAINST INSECTS; PORTO RICOAN 'HOPS' ARE IMPORTED

AUSTIN, Tex., Aug. 28.—No more sleeping in cornerstones for toads in Texas.

They're now expected to work toward prevention of millions of dollars in insect crop damage. Giant Surinam toads are being brought into the state from Porto Rico to rid the lower coastal regions of the mole cricket, one of the most destructive insects of the region.

The cricket does most of its damage underground in the daytime, but comes to the surface at night. The Surinam toads, which sleep little, are expected to catch the pests when they come out of their holes.

But crickets are not the only insects that Porto Rican toads threaten. The imported pest-catcher is expected to aid materially in extermination of May beetles, jolt weevils, white grubs, cockroaches, fleas, meadow beetles, leaf hoppers, millipedes, house fly pupae, centipedes, land snails and caterpillars.

The toad's appetite seems insatiable. Tests show it is fond of 83 different kinds of insects, most of them detrimental to crops. One toad has caught 128 flies in less than a half hour.

Experiments with the Surinam toads are being watched closely by the Texas state department of agriculture, and it is probable that a campaign will be started to introduce the toad into all parts of the state. Experiments so far have been confined to Jefferson county near Beaumont. J. F. Combs, agricultural extension agent, is in charge of the work.

First tests with the toads were made.

First tests with the toads were made. They showed great adaptability to American soils and climate. A dozen were kept under observation during the winter and they suffered little although slightly protected from the cold.

Recently a shipment of 25 was received, and this number is expected to care for the needs of the work.

The little vessel Bratvaag, which is hunting seals somewhere in the Arctic ocean, was the object of a search by four other sealers which have been chartered by news-gathering organizations in a dash to obtain the first-hand story of the bodies of Salomon August Andree and a companion, who perished in a balloon trip over the Arctic regions 33 years ago.

The sealer Heimen, carrying an Associated Press representative, left Tromsoe last night, while two other sealing vessels were ready to put to sea with other correspondents tonight. Still another is after the story.

The little Bratvaag does not carry now being paved. The surfacing is 76 feet wide and consists of a five or six inch base, an inch cushion of sand and four inches of brick.

a radio transmitter and with the body of Andree and one of his companions aboard since the discovery early this month has been pursuing its job of catching as many seals as possible before heavy winter weather sets in.

Meanwhile the four news boats will scour the Arctic sea for the Bratvaag. Captain Gustav Jensen of the sealer Terningen, who brought the first news that the bodies had been found by Doctor Gunnar Horn, is aboard the Heimen to assist in the search.

Littlefield's Tax Rate To Be Same

LITTLEFIELD, Aug. 29.—(Special)—Littlefield's tax rate for 1930 will be the same as last year, W. G. Street, city secretary, reported today.

"Our rate will be \$1.50 per \$100 valuation," Mr. Street said. "The valuation figures for this year have not been completed but I am expecting that there will be half a million dollars increase this year over last."

ATLANTA WRITER HAS MET LAST 16 PRESIDENTS OF THE UNITED STATES

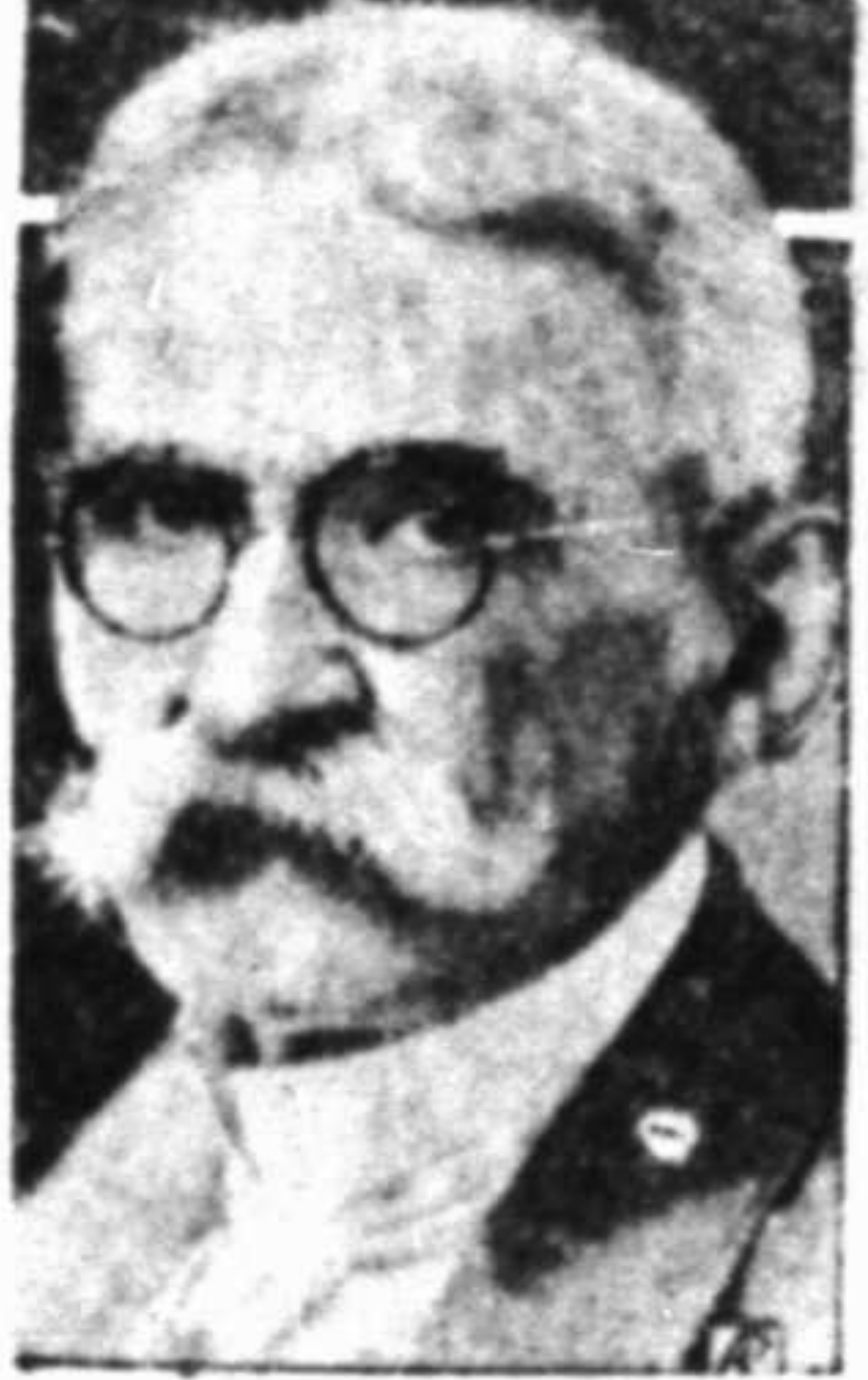
ATLANTA, Ga.—Sixteen Presidents of the United States—from James Buchanan to Herbert Hoover—have shook hands with the Rev. Sam W. Small.

A veteran of two wars and a newspaperman for more than half a century, Dr. Small recently brought his record up to date by meeting President Hoover.

He taught stenography to one President, Woodrow Wilson, attended the inaugurations of both Abraham Lincoln and Jefferson Davis, served as Andrew Johnson's secretary and sat in the senate press gallery for 12 years.

Said he is very enough to write a newspaper column every day. "Hoover told me he was pleased to take the hand that had had that of Lincoln," Dr. Small said.

Why don't you give your recom-

memorized he asked me and I just told him nobody would believe them if I did."

Dr. Small, 79 years old, writes his daily column for the Atlanta Constitution, which he has served since 1876. He was a familiar figure in the press gallery of the United States senate from 1877 to 1929.

When Woodrow Wilson began his law practice as a young man in Atlanta it was Sam Small who taught him stenography. Small then was a court reporter.

In 1877 he achieved distinction as a stenographer by taking down in shorthand every word spoken at the Georgia constitutional convention and transcribing his notes the next day—a feat never before or since accomplished by one man.

Dr. Small was only 10 years old when he met President Buchanan.

For the past several months Bill has been able to add new customers, something not every carrier is able to do in the summer time, with vacations, etc. "Bill has two more years at high school and then he will go to Tech," his mother says. "He says he wants to be a lawyer but I believe that he will wind up as a newspaperman. He seems to me to eat and sleep newspaper and to talk it all his working hours." Recently Bill started talking the special edition to some of his customers to line them up to buy 50 to 100 copies to mail out. He has interested several of his customers in the plan and has hopes of being able to make some sales.

ROGERS ACTING AGENT

Frank Rogers, of the Halsell Land offices in Amherst, is acting county agent of Lamb county, a good part of the time. When D. A. Adams, agent, has to go out on his trips, which generally comes four or five days a week, he leaves Frank in charge. The offices of the county agent are in Amherst and are in the Halsell land offices. There is always a good supply of federal and state bulletins and other information on farm matters and Frank, although not a graduate agent, knows how to handle the average case. But this past week he has had some new problems. Mr. Adams has been selling poison for worms in the cotton fields. Frank does not know the formula and directions. As a result he has to "sell his stock" blind. He says he will take some lessons some time on poisoning worms and then try and remember the several formulas.

"HOOSEGOW" USED
Even though the new city hall at

Littlefield is not completed, the "hoosegow" is being used. The other afternoon a deputy from Amherst brought in a man wanted up in Kansas. The man had the place all to himself, a nice clean looking jail, with floors, cells, etc. painted a battleship gray and as neat and clean as a pin. The city jail is on the second floor of the new city hall and looks to be as strong as any county jail need be.

CUTTING FEED EARLY—
Farmers in Lamb county are be-

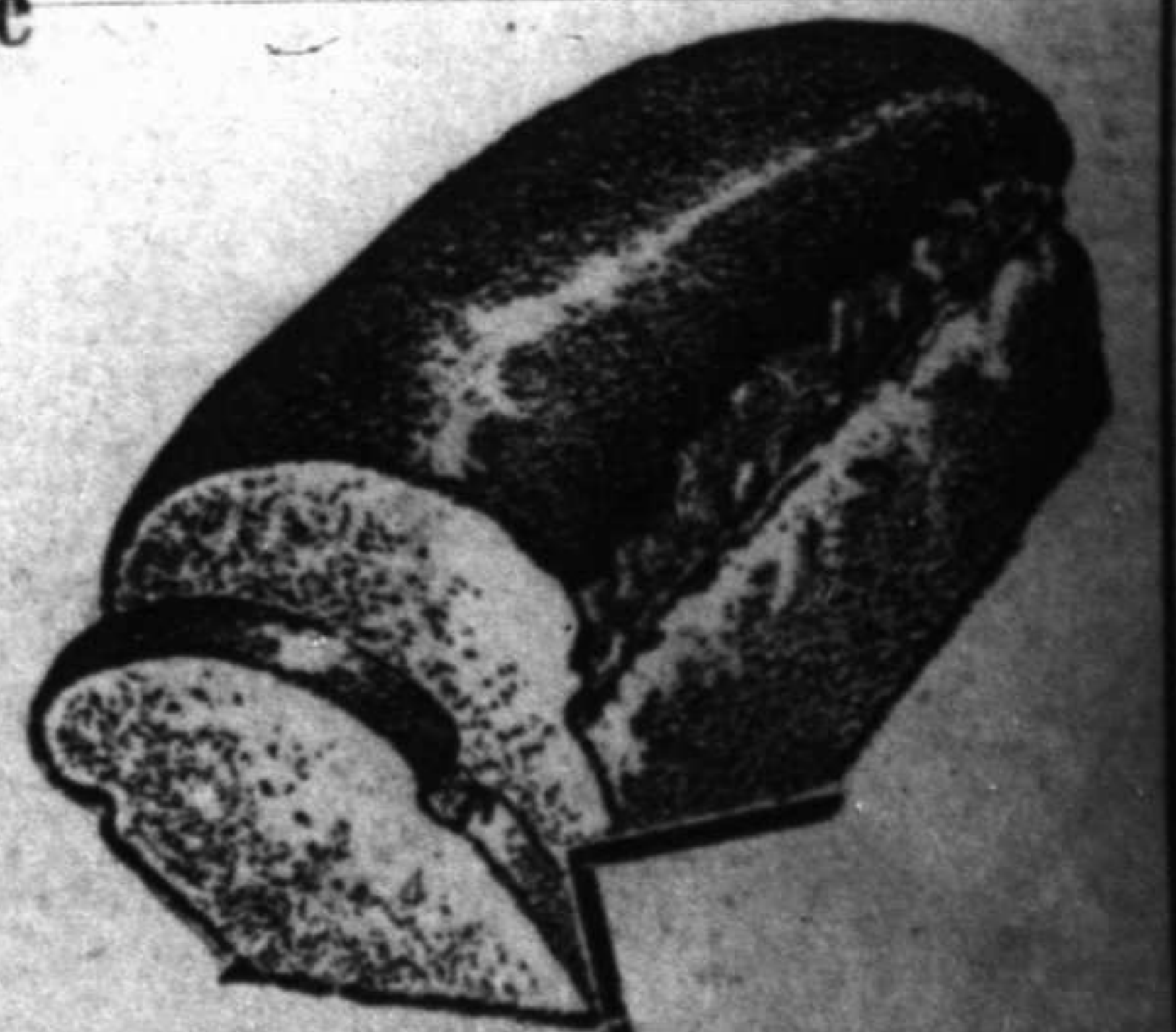

FEEDING WHEAT GAINS OVER PANHANDLE

STOCKMAN, FARMERS TURN TO LOW-PRICED FEED FOR STOCK

PLAINVIEW, Aug. 28.—(Special)—The feeding of wheat to livestock is gaining impetus all over the Panhandle-Plains of Texas according to information being collected on the subject by the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture at Plainview.

In Dallam and Hartley counties, according to County Agent E. R. Duke, wheat is being used as a feed for livestock, with every farmer who has wheat using it to feed hogs, poultry, and dairy cows. Duke says wheat is making up the bulk of the ration being fed to hogs and is used satisfactorily for dairy cows and beef cattle where it does not exceed one-fourth the grain ration. They have a few men in that section who plan to feed wheat this winter and expect to use about one-fourth wheat in their ration. The manager of the J. L. Bivins purebred Hereford herd says they are buying wheat to be used in fitting their herd and to carry some of their best breeding stock and young cattle through the winter.

Considerable wheat is being fed to hogs and dairy cows, especially hogs, in Randall county, according to County Agent W. H. Upchurch of Canyon. Many hog men are feeding it exclusively while the dairy farmers are using it to form from 10 to 30 per cent of the ration. More wheat bran is being used this summer. Farmers who are careful feeders are having no trouble with wheat. Some few have reported feeding wheat to hogs and poultry. He is making a study of the results.

Royal Marriage Is Complicated

BUDAPEST, Aug. 28.—(AP)—The marriage of Archduke Albert of Hungary to a commoner in England August 16 was complicated today by a statement from his parents, Archduke Friedrich and Archduchess Isabella. They said they had no previous knowledge of the marriage and did not recognize the bride as a member of the Hapsburg family since they did not grant their consent to the marriage.

The Archduke, who recently resigned his royal rights in favor of the young Archduke Otto, still is occupying his bachelor apartment here while his bride, the former Irene Rudnay, divorced wife of a Hungarian diplomat, is staying with relatives.

Albert said today he had decided not to emigrate to Brazil, as he first had planned, but would occupy himself with Hungarian social and national problems.

OCTOBER FETE TO MARK ANNIVERSARY OF HISTORIC KINGS MOUNTAIN BATTLE; PRESIDENT HOOVER IS TO TAKE PART

KINGS MOUNTAIN, N. C. (AP)—The sesquicentennial anniversary of a battle which history credits with turning the tide of the Revolutionary war will be celebrated this year. It was October 7, 1780, when a small, hardy band of mountaineers from Tennessee and Carolina put to rout British troops led by Maj. Patrick Ferguson in the battle of Kings Mountain.

One hundred thousand descendants of those American warriors are expected to gather on the same battleground this October 7 to celebrate that event of 150 years ago. President Hoover is expected to address the celebrants, and in a sense it will be a homecoming for him. His great-grandfather was a pioneer settler of North Carolina.

It was the loss of Major Ferguson and his men at Kings Mountain that prompted Lord Cornwallis, encamped 36 miles away at Charlotte, to order British troops to march at once. After an indecisive battle at Guilford Courthouse, N. C., he continued to Wilmington and thence to Yorktown, where he surrendered. Elaborate plans for this year's celebration include a luncheon on the battlefield for notables to be present. Sir Ronald Lindsay, British ambassador and his staff, and the Canadian prime minister, have been invited.

Visitors will see the historic grave of Major Ferguson, on which thousands of stones have been placed by tourists. The British leader was buried a short distance from where he fell.

During the celebration a monument erected in memory of Major Ferguson will be dedicated. It is the gift of R. E. Scoggins, of Charlotte, N. C.

The battle ground, contrary to popular belief, is not in North Carolina, but just over the line in South Carolina seven miles from the town of Kings Mountain.

The field is owned by the Daughters of the American Revolution. A \$30,000 obelisk, 66 feet tall, was erected by the federal government and dedicated in 1909.

CHLORINE FUMES PROSTRATE 26 IN DENVER; 23 ARE CAREFULLY WATCHED

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 28.—Chlorine fumes Wednesday prostrated 26 persons and 23 were in the Denver general hospital under constant watch, the condition a matter to be determined with the passing of time.

Two men and a woman, the only feminine employee of the Denver Fire Clay company, where the fumes escaped, were released as in no danger.

A tank car of 110 tons of liquid chlorine was being unloaded when a valve started leaking. As the liquid put the air, a thick yellow mist enveloped the plant. More than 110 employees reached safety.

Attending physicians said the victims had symptoms similar to gas-war veterans and there would be no way of knowing how serious their condition was until later. The physicians said pneumonia was usually the aftermath of chlorine gassing.

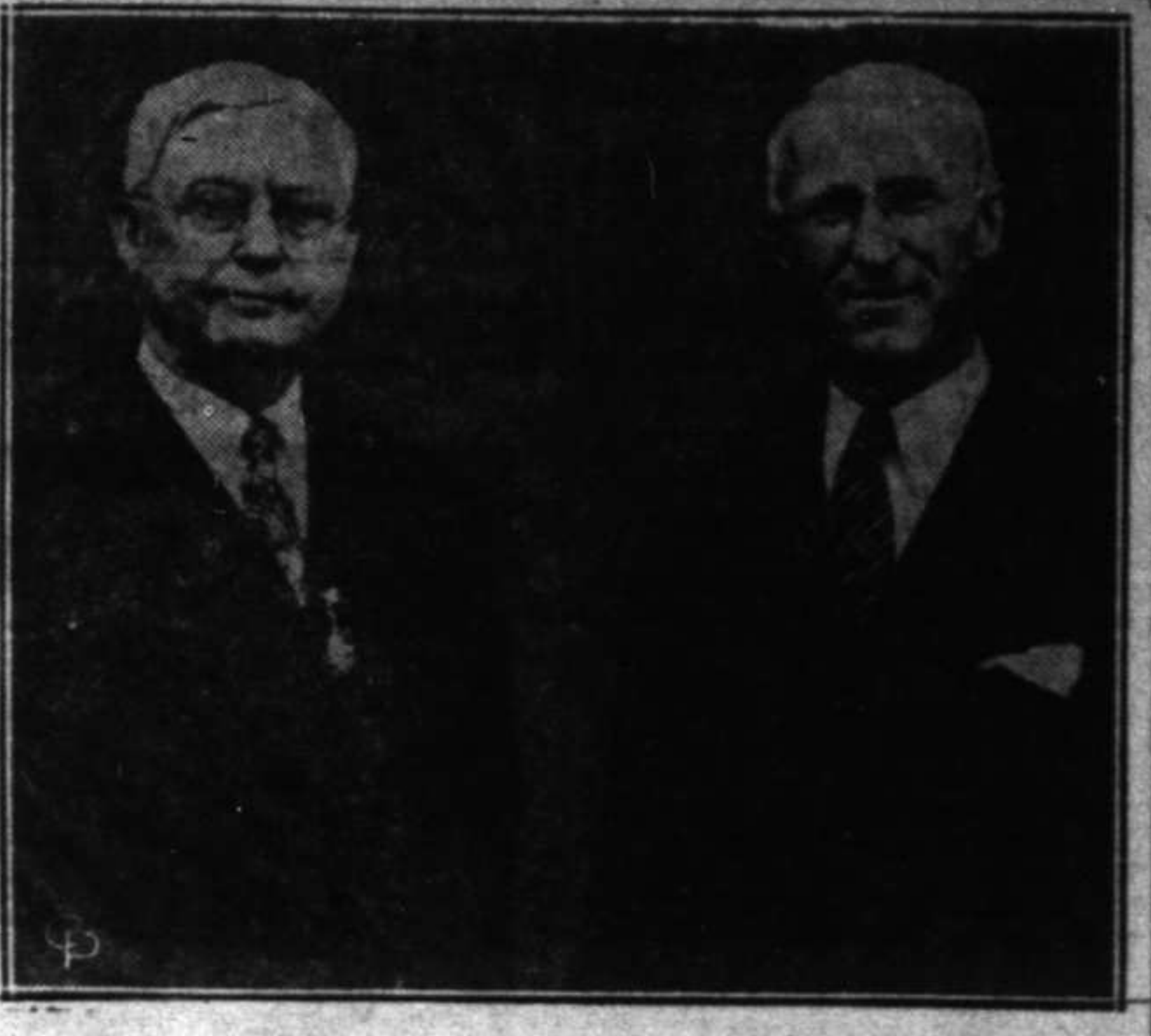
Radio Star To Appear Despite Husband's Death

SUPPORT IS VOTED BY
C. OF C. GROUP
WEDNESDAY

(By Associated Press)
FORT WORTH, Aug. 28. — The executive committee of the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce Wednesday voted its unqualified endorsement of the proposal of the Texas and Pacific railway to construct a new line from Big Spring northward into the Texas Panhandle and assured J. L. Lancaster, president of the road, of active support in the effort to obtain authority to build.
The proposed new line, extending from Big Spring to Vega, 232 miles to the north, and with branches to Lubbock and Amarillo, was described as a project mutually advantageous to the development of West Texas and Fort Worth. Its entire 332 miles of construction would traverse 13 counties, many of them now without direct rail connections to markets in this section.

CHICAGO, Aug. 28. (AP) — Today's Herald and Examiner said Terry Druggan, erstwhile beer baron ally of Frankie Lake, was barricaded with bodyguards in a downtown hotel after an attempt to kill him Sunday.
The newspaper said it learned a gunman was thwarted in the attempt by a hotel detective who appeared just as the man drew a gun outside the Druggan suite. The man escaped and police were not notified.
Terry's younger brother, George, was wounded several weeks ago in a gangland shooting at a Fox Lake Ill. roadhouse. Three of his companions were killed.

WARSAW, Poland, Aug. 28. — When Col. Miedvinski, chief editor of the official Goscia Polska asked Premier Piludski what his plans were for the future the marshal did not mince words replying.
"What is your program?" the editor queried.
"That is a parliamentary question—that is to say, a fool's query," the marshal retorted blithely.
Is Stupid Word
Premier Piludski declared he did not believe in the value of the so called parliamentarianism, but neither did he wish to be a maid of all work. "Anyway, the word, of foreign origin, is a stupid word," the marshal thundered, "and the people do not realize what labor is involved in governing Poland in accordance with the constitution and existing law."
The Polish constitution, he said, was a "rotten piece of work" and bound to produce chaotic conditions.
Conservatively translated, the marshal said the members of parliament had lost all sense of decency. They seemed to think, he continued, that the people should bow down before the parliamentarians. "These scoundrels don't work, but steal the taxpayers' money. Is the state to depend on such rascals?"
