Scaling Tariff Walls

Tariff walls are growing too high, state officials are gradually beginning to realize. The trouble is that the barriers work both ways. It's all right for a state to set up a formidable hurdle to make outsiders think twice before they try to mount it; but the walls are not only keeping outsiders from getting in—they are also keeping the natives from getting out.

The only conclusive and universally equitable way of removing ridiculous trade barriers that now pen in almost every state in the Union is to call a nationwide conference and to get the states to agree simultaneously on a new set of rules prescribed by authorized representatives. Ultimately, perhaps, that will come about.

In the meantime, however, the Public Administration Clearing House has noted a definite sectional trend to chop down the figurative fences that now bar the way for interstate commerce.

Two recent conferences helped untangle some of the snarls of liquor traffic. In Chicago representatives of Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan and Indiana talked over conflicting liquor control legislation. One immediate result was the promise of the Illinois Liquor Control Commission to check bottling of Illinois liquor in neighboring states. A similar meeting in Buffalo was attended by representatives of seven states.

At another midwestern conference, highway problems were ironed out and reciprocal agreements established between Iowa, Nebraska, and Minnesota. Other states represented at this meeting are still thinking the matter over.

An agreement to abolish license fees on trucks and trailers was recently reached between New York and Michigan. Trucks from either state may now move freely in the other.

Tariff conditions had reached a point where further complications were virtually impossible. Easing of some restrictions is almost inevitable. It is profitable for a state to restrict foreign vehicular travel or imports only so long as other states don't reciprocate. When the idea spreads, as it did, it brings chaos for everyone, offers no relief to the local business men whom it is designed to aid.

Constitutionally, a state may not impose a tariff. But the wall of restrictions that has been set up in almost every state is far more deadly than any tariff ever could be.

WILDLIFE

Dead Trees Valuable for Wildlife

I am sure that there are many people who never realized the great value that dead trees are to wildlife resources. It is true that these trees play a definite part in wildlife production on the farm. Most of the larger dead trees up

the farm have many hollows in them for which many species use for reproduction. One incident was related by the Game Department a few days ago when a Texas farmer cut down a big tree. He got three opossums, each weighing seven pounds, five fat squirrels and twenty pounds of honey out of the tree. These trees also serve as a means of wildlife resources to escape from their natural enemies.

Importance Of Soil Conservation To Be Explained

ARILENE, Tex.—The vital importance of soil conservation and proper water utilization, not only for the immediate future, but for countless generations to come will be explained and illustrated by Dr. W. C. Lowdermilk, assistant chief of the Soil Conservation Service Monday night, March 25, at 8 p. m. in an illustrated lecture at the Abilene High School Auditorium.

"Erosion control has reached its highest development in the United States at the present time," Dr. Lowdermilk said, "and the experiences of the past indicate that upon our success or failure in controlling erosion depends the salvation of the American way of life."

In gathering material for his talk, Dr. Lowdermilk made a 15

months' survey in Europe, North Africa, and the Near East. In this survey, he found evidence of attempts at soil conservation in ancient Phoenicia more than 40 centuries ago and many other evidences that failure to conserve the soil from erosion had contributed to the downfall of entire civilizations.

Dr. Lowdermilk will illustrate his lecture with more than 100 colored slides made during his survey.

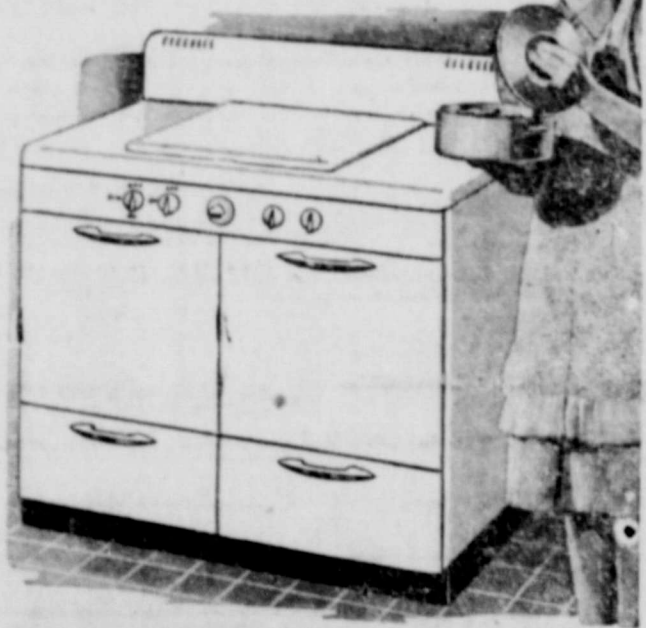

Weekly Payrolls In Manufacturing Show An Increase

AUSTIN, Tex.—Weekly payrolls in manufacturing industries of Texas were 7.6 per cent higher in the first month of this year than in the corresponding period in 1939. The weekly payroll for all

manufacturing industries in January was estimated at \$2,580,884, with 130,247 workers employed, according to statistics given today by the University Bureau of Business Research.

Petroleum refining was the largest manufacturing industry, the report revealed with 18,676 employees. Saw mills followed with 12,225 and foundries and machine shops were third with 10,098.

14 TEXAS FURNISHES

AUSTIN, Tex.—With 4.7 per cent of the population of the United States, Texas contributes 10 per cent of the total raw materials and only 1.6 per cent of values added by all manufacturing processes, Governor W. Lee O'Daniel pointed out in a statement issued today on the industrial potentialities of the State.

"It is estimated that Texas ships out of the State annually \$900,000,000 in raw products in excess of its own consumption needs," the Governor said, "and its net imports of manufactured goods amount to about \$900,000,000." Parenthetically, he pointed out that it is not necessary that these

figures balance, but it happens that they do, in this instance.

"No other state has as large excess production of crude materials over its own needs as has Texas," the Governor said. "With ideal climate, ample seaports, and an

abundance of fuel to supplement the supply of raw materials, the State offers the most promising opportunity to those who would invest their surplus funds in appropriate industries."
