Reward Money In Maxie Woodruff Slaying To Be Returned To Donors

It will be recalled that three years ago this month, Maxie Woodruff, clerk in Hurt's Haberdashery of this city, was killed by a hijacker. The thug held up the store and was pursued by young Woodruff, who overtook the holdup man about a block from the store. In the struggle Woodruff was shot and died a few minutes later.

Business firms of Lamesa made up a reward, totaling more than a thousand dollars to be paid for the capture and conviction of the desperado. Although officers over all West Texas entered into the at-

tempt to catch the criminal, and one man was tried and acquitted, charged with this crime, up until now the culprit has never been apprehended.

A reward is good for three years from the time it is posted, and as the three years have expired, all money donated will be returned to the donors, according to an announcement made this week.

Prospects For Business In 1941 Painted Very Bright By Lamesa CC President

Several Reasons Are Given By Sam Richardson As To Cause Upturn Of Business In 1941

In an effort to compare conditions of business, retail and wholesale buying, and the general outlook for 1941 with those of other years, the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce this week compiled through survey a few pertinent facts and figures which may prove interesting to the general public.

Babson, a widely-known commentator on economic affairs, says that the outlook for 1941 is brighter than it has been for any business year since 1929. Sam Richardson, president of the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce, says the following concerning the general outlook for the new year: "As I look over my calendar for 1941 and think about general conditions as predicted by Babson, I believe Dawson county and Lamesa will go forward and we may expect a good year for business. Our farmers may expect to receive the highest prices for their produce since 1929."

We already know that big cream producers of Dawson county are at present netting approximately 37 cents per

pound on their cream shipments. One produce-buying establishment in Lamesa during last year paid to farmers more than one million dollars for produce from the farm other than cotton. Another produce buying firm paid out almost a half million dollars for the same kinds of produce. With beef cattle a better price than in some time, it is estimated that the county's income from this source, from turkeys, other poultry, hogs, ducks, and miscellaneous other sources other than cotton, will be in the neighborhood of \$2,750,000 this year.

It is expected that some 10,000

Next Wednesday Is Final Date Which Contributions For Drive Will Be Taken

Several Hundred Pounds Of Pork Are Among The Things Donated To Care For Poor At Christmas

Money and other contributions were added this week to the annual accumulation by the Lamesa Goodfellows of means to provide the needy families of the city with Christmas Cheer. Funds were given on a voluntary basis entirely, no drive being made this year. Many checks have been mailed to Chief Goodfellow, Box 291, Lamesa, and the organization's central committee stated this week that the deadline for contributions will be Wednesday, December 18, when purchases will be made of such items as will fill the gift packages. The amount sent in by that date will determine the amount of aid that will go to the poor and needy on Monday, December 23, which has been set as distribution day.

Of the contributions made, ten

dollars were sent in by a Big Spring business firm, and \$250 was donated by a person living in Lubbock. Local cash donations amount to approximately \$59.50, portions being given by M. C. Lindsey, Collins Dry Goods, W. B. Collins, Audrey Cox, Lamesa Rotary Club, Lamesa Lions Club, G. M. Roberts, and \$5 from an unidentified source. Lee Bilingrey donated a hog, as have A. C. Woodward and C. C. Koger. H. H. Barron and J. W. Small to other contributors cash to purchase another hog. It is expected that between 400 and 500 pounds of hog meat will be distributed to the 20 to 30 needy families, totaling approximately 250 to 250 persons in number. Lamesa Meat Company has donated the butchering, cutting and wrapping of the hogs for distribution.

Rapid Battery Charger Installed By J. Lee Kelley

Civic Leader Points Out Advantages To County To Support Road Bond Issue

Cites Fact That Taxes In Dawson County Will Not Be Raised Single Penny To Pay Off Bond Issue

That the cost of operating one's automobile on dirt roads is approximately 7 cents per mile, on gravel roads 4 1/2 cents per mile, and on paved roads 3 1/2 cents per mile, and that the construction of more paved highways everywhere is essential to the future growth, development and prosperity of Lamesa, Dawson County, Texas, in fact these whole United States, are commonly known and universally accepted and appreciated facts, is beyond doubt or question on the part of the motoring public.

It is generally known also that a petition bearing the number of names certified by law, has been presented to the Honorable Commissioners' Court of Dawson County, calling for an election to decide whether the qualified voters of the County desire issuance of bonds in the amount of \$300,000 bearing interest not to exceed 3%, and maturing at such times as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially, or otherwise, not to exceed 20 years from the date thereof. May we commend the action of

the petitioners and of the Commissioners' Court in calling such an election for the following reasons: It is an opportunity under provisions of the Bond Assumption Bill to complete Dawson County's cross country road system entirely without cost to the taxpayers of the County. We mean by that assertion that there is a possibility that the Road Bond Assumption Act will secure passage in the on-coming session of the State Legislature, authorizing the Bond Assumption Board of Texas to assume all bonds voted prior to January 1, 1941, by counties, to build roads designated and approved by the State Highway Department.

We further learn upon asking authoritative sources that if the taxpayers of Dawson County vote these bonds, and something should occur causing the Bond Assumption Board not to assume them, the Commissioners' Court of Dawson County, both old and new, have agreed not to issue said bonds and the only expense will be that involved in holding the election on December 23. Some \$76,000 in road

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Women First - - And Then Children On Santa's List

While you are whizzing around on Christmas shopping tours, wondering what you are going to buy for John and Lela and Sue, most of Santa Claus' henchmen in the shops already know.

Santa's first line lieutenants in New York's largest department store checked up on more than 3,000,000 gifts sold last year, and as a result of their findings the clerks behind counters just about know who will get what and how much.

They know for instance, that if 1940 shoppers behave according to rule, women will receive 325 of every 1,000 gifts bought in department stores, while men will receive only 127. (It seems it's not always the woman who pays.) They also know that youngsters will draw 302 presents out of that 1,000 and that the balance will be divided between gifts for the house and gadgets too varied to fit into neat gift classifications.

Here are some more interesting gift facts based on the survey:

Lingerie First

Women get more lingerie than any other kind of Christmas present. Out of every 1,000 women who will open gaily wrapped packages on December 25, 121 will get slips and panties, 93 will get nightdresses and pajamas, and 39 will find house coats and negligees. Stockings will say "Merry Christmas" to 112 and handkerchiefs to 97. When the gifts shower down from lighted Christmas trees 68 women will receive gloves, 66 handbags, 83 slippers and 31 gay gilets or scarfs. Santa Claus and you are going to help give them, too. Perfume is going to 24, compacts to 29 and beautiful shimmering jewels to 10.

There must be something in that legend about the vanity of the male, for clothes are going to thousands of his sex. Out of every 1,000 men who rip open the wrappings of star-studded packages on Christmas, 272 will get shirts and 173 will have ties—and some of them will wear them. One hundred seventy-three more men will draw socks, 74 will find gloves, 87 will say "thank you" for slippers and 50 more will receive belts, garters or suspenders.

The Outdoor Influence

In case you think women have a monopoly on Christmas gift underwear, let this brighten up your Christmas shopping: 37 males of of 1,000 are to receive some variety of underwear—ranging all the way from violent Hawaiian shorts to firemen's red flannels.

The great out-of-doors will influence the choice of a lot more gifts for men. The packages of 25 will hold mufflers, as many more will contain sweaters and 15 will reveal suede jackets or windbreakers.

Thirty-seven more men are scheduled to receive razors and 32 wallets.

Saignelegier, Switzerland, (AP)—Swapping horses, once a favorite sport of Swiss peasants, is virtually a thing of the past, in Switzerland, because of new army regulation, forbidding such transfers without special permission.

The army considers every Swiss horse subject to call to service at any moment. Authorities want to know where the horses are and to make sure the number in each district remains constant.

The rest of the Christmas gifts will be a miscellaneous heap of books, games, writing paper, fountain pens, dog collars, phonograph records, cameras, fruit candy, luggage and umbrellas.

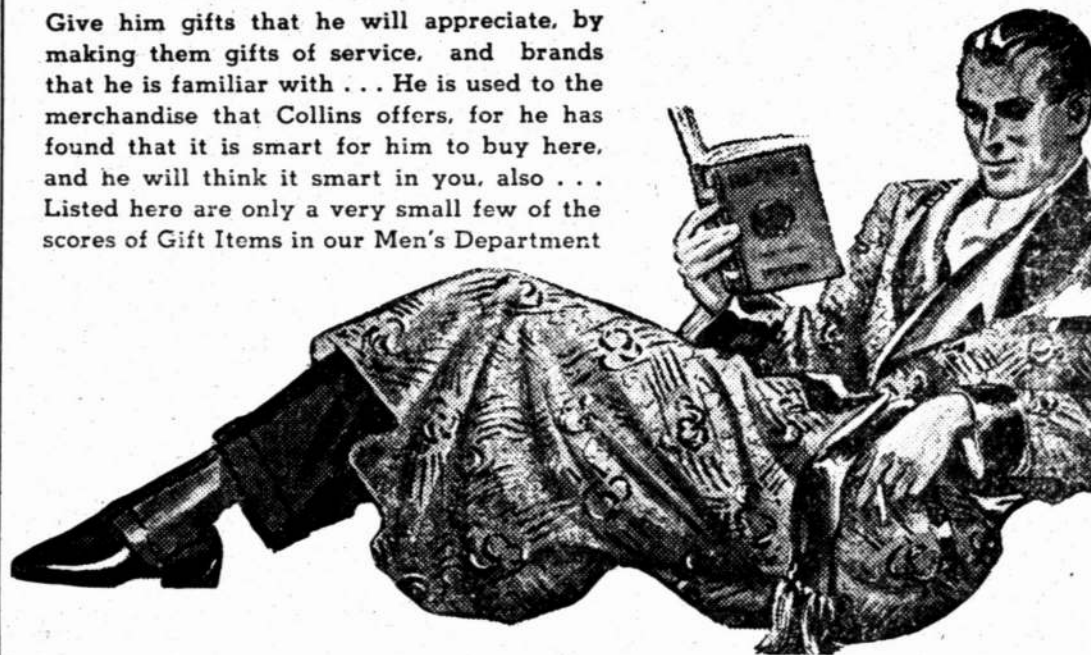

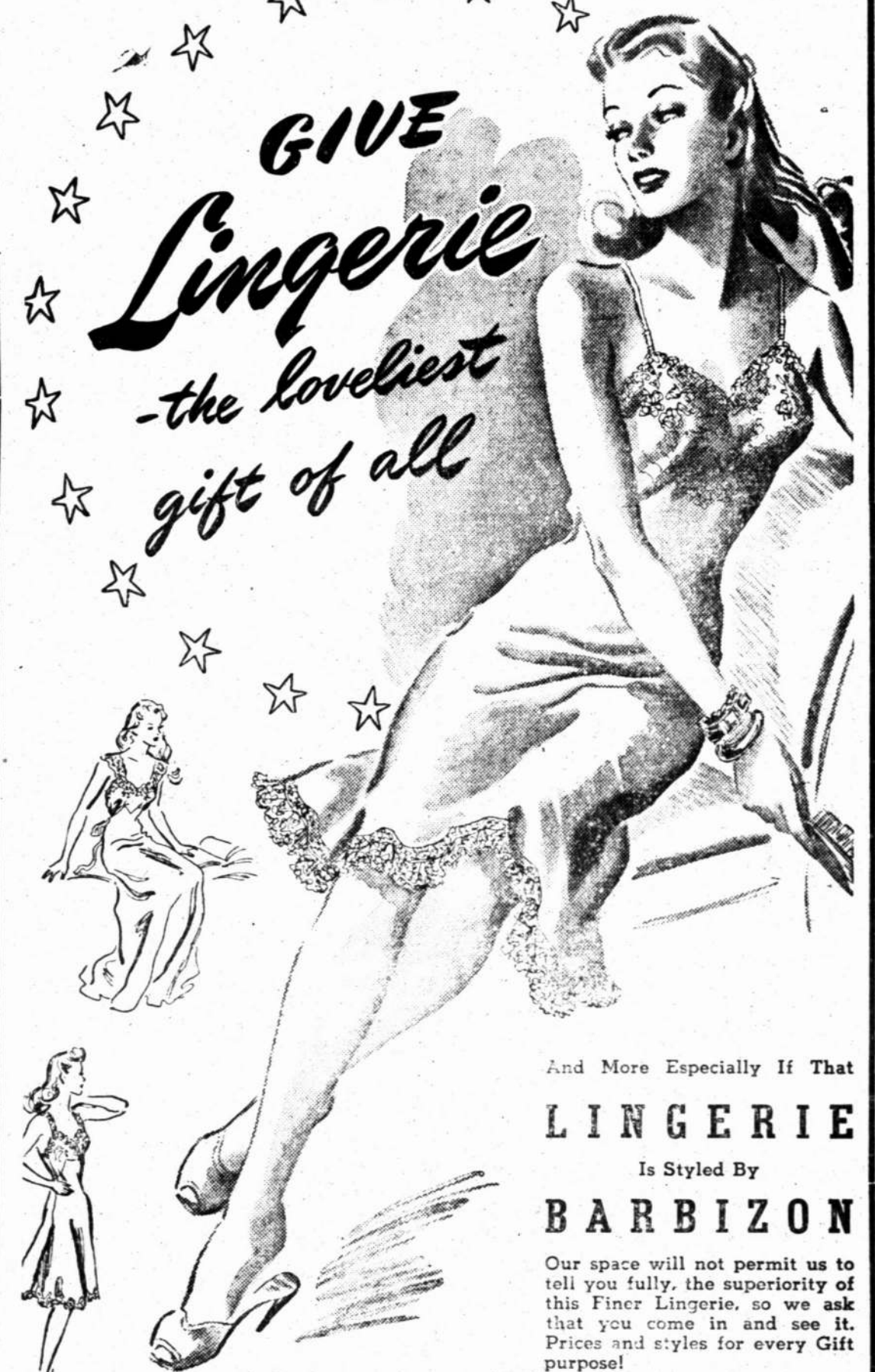

Several Changes Are Cited In 1941 Cotton Production Program Voted Saturday

Cotton Producers Are Urged To Read And Acquaint Themselves Fully With The Differences

Several minor changes have been made in the 1941 Agricultural Conservation Program. Perhaps the most important change is that relative to soil farms and cotton allotments for soil farms.

Only half as much cotton will be allowed for soil or new grower farms as for farms having an old grower cotton allotment. For example the county percentage factor being 33.06 percent, a soil farm can receive only one-half of this percentage which will be approximately 16 and one-half acres to the 100 acres broken out. No cotton payment will be made to a new grower or soil allotments in 1941, however, a small general allotment payment will be made on the total soil depleting allotment for the farm.

It is not permissible to plant white cane on government land in 1941. This crop will be classed as a soil depleting crop. Only the following varieties of cane may be used on government land or neutral land in 1941: red-top, black amber, orange, African mellee and seeded ribbon varieties or sweet sorghum. These crops cannot be harvested for grain seed or straw if they are to be classed as neutral crops. Sudan or millet may be used as a neutral crop on the government land in 1941. The seed from Sudan or millet may not be harvested for seed for a neutral classification.

In strip plantings, crops or strips of land must not be less than 10 feet in width, three rows may be used provided the rows are full 40 inches in width.

To Start Meteor Unearthing After First Of Year

ODESSA, Dec. 11 (Special)—The famed meteorite which struck near here thousands of years ago will some day be displayed in museum cases for the benefit of those interested in it on the very spot where it landed.

Thirty WPA workmen are daily uncovering new evidence of the body, peeling the rough rind that nature wrapped around one of her most prodigious specimens. Holes are being sunk around the body where the magnetometer, used in discovering the main body, has indicated there are other specimens.

In the tunnels thus excavated cases will be built around the fossil strata in which fragments of the meteorite run. The fragments, many of which are as large as the walls of the excavations.

A large shaft will be sunk to the main body of the meteorite, which has been definitely located at a depth of 164 feet in a depression eight miles west of Odessa. Scientists have estimated the meteorite is at least 50 feet wide at every point, probably larger. First estimates placed it at approximately 40 feet.

Work on the main shaft is expected to begin soon after the first of the year. Exploratory work is being done by the Works Progress Administration under the supervision of University of Texas Geologists.

Workers Should Be Sure They Have Social Security Numbers In Seeking Jobs

No doubt there will be a large number of individuals, especially students, heretofore not employed, and without social security account numbers, who will secure employment in shops and other business establishments during the holiday season, according to Robert M. Mayne, manager of the Big Spring office of the Social Security Board. He urged all persons who contemplated such employment to secure their account numbers before applying for jobs.

It was pointed out by Mr. Mayne that practically all employers now require social security account numbers before a worker enters the firm's employment. He also explained that individuals who have lost their original account cards may secure duplicates by requesting them through the Social Security Board office located at 206 in the Petroleum Building.

Seasonal employment and part-time work are covered by the Federal old-age and survivors insurance law, Mr. Mayne said, since the fact that workers are employed on a temporary basis in covered employment does not exclude them from participation in this social security program.

"Employers should request all employees to obtain account numbers promptly, and make a record of them since employers are required to report at the end of each three-month period the name of each worker, his account number, and the amount of wages paid him. Application for account number forms may be secured from the Social Security Board's office in Big Spring, and from post offices in other cities. Account number cards are forwarded for applications received by mail on the same day they arrive in the field office, provided the applications are properly executed."

A person who already has established a social security account should not apply for another account number. If he has lost his card, he can secure a duplicate of his original number by applying to his nearest Social Security Board field office. A worker should keep his one social security account number throughout his working lifetime, regardless of the number of firms which employ him, Mr. Mayne said.

VICTORIA, Canada — This quaint "old-world" capital of British Columbia will put a Christmas touch to the empire's current war cry. "There Will Always Be an England."

The mayor of Victoria will preside at a traditional christening of the Yule Log, with all the pageantry of Elizabethan days, while civilians and officers of the three armed services recess their war activities for a brief celebration of the holiday in the manner of their motherland.

The annual festival, staged in the rotunda and lounge of a large hotel which resemble the entrance hall of some baronial manor house, will reach its climax on Christmas night.

At the tea hour on Christmas Eve damsels in ruffs and mob caps will serve crumpets and scones before great log fires.

The next morning "waits" in ruffs will greet the merry-makers with carols and traditional chants.

And when the night falls, a procession of ruffled and rapiers "lords" and their ladies faire" will wind through the crowd singing old songs of "Merle England" while trumpeters blow and a jester tumbles ahead in cap and bells.

Then, to song and carol, the appointed seneschal will anoint the Great Log with "wine from Spain" and fat from the Christmas roasts, and the mayor will fire the log with ritual almost as old as England herself.

Box Of Home-Made Goodies Carries Cheer

Christmas wouldn't be complete without home-made candies and confections.

These holiday goodies are gifts highly prized by the little lady next door, the bachelor friend and members of the family near and far.

FRUITY BALLS are easy to make, moderate-priced confections that will keep fresh a month if stored in covered jars in a cool spot. They brighten up boxes of holiday treats.

Mix 2 cups of chopped dried apricots and prunes, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-4 teaspoon of nutmeg, mace and salt. Add a cup of coconut, 1-2 cup orange juice. Shape into inch balls and chill. Then flatten slightly and roll in confectioner's sugar. Top each with "holly leaves and berries." Make the leaves by cutting large green gum drops into thin slices and shaping with scissors. (Dip the scissors into warm water to prevent sticking.) Stick the leaves on top of the confections and add red cinnamon candies or tiny circles of red gum drops to represent berries.

NUT BRITTLE keeps fresh a long time and is a good traveler. Boil gently, without stirring, 1 cup sugar, 1-2 cup dark brown sugar, 1-4 cup light colored corn syrup and 1-2 cup water. When some of the candy "clicks" in cold water, remove the pan from the heat. Mix in 2 tablespoons butter, 2-3 cups chopped nuts and 1-8 teaspoon each of salt and soda. Beat well and quickly pour onto a buttered baking sheet or table top. Mark into squares and break apart when cool. Any nuts will do, but I suggest the mixture of shaved brazil nuts and pecans.

PANACHE, delicate in flavor and creamy in texture, makes many friends among holiday groups. Boil gently, stirring frequently, 2 cups dark brown sugar, 1 cup sugar, 3 tablespoons butter, 1-2 cups milk, and 1-8 teaspoon salt. When a soft ball forms in cold water, take the candy from the heat and let it stand 20 minutes. Add a teaspoon of vanilla and beat until thick and cool. Pour onto a buttered pan. Flatten the top and cover with chopped peanuts, filberts or black walnuts. Pack in a covered box and keep cool.

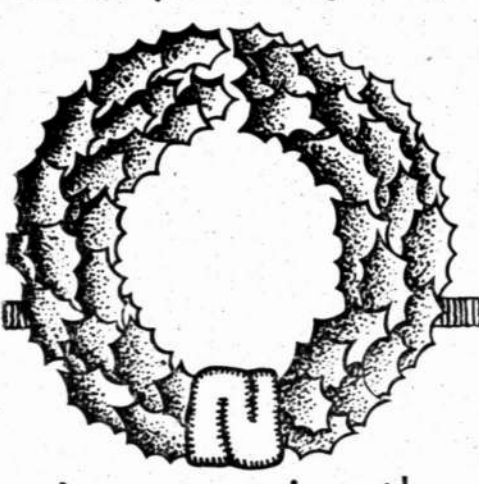

Regulations On 1941 Mattress Program Given

Beginning December 17th, applications for mattresses may be made in the office of the County Home Demonstration Agent, in the basement of the court house, Lamesa.

Rural families whose income is \$500 or less, including AAA payments may qualify for a mattress. In computing income, cash paid as standing rent or commodities paid as standing may be deducted from the gross income with an additional \$50 for each person in the family in excess of four persons. A family qualifying may receive a mattress for every two people in the family, but not to exceed three mattresses per family.

A family of four whose income was \$500 may qualify for two mattresses; a family of five with an income of \$500 or \$550, may qualify for two, but a family of 6 may qualify for 3.

Families may use their 1939 income up until January 1st. After that date, the income for 1940 must be stated. In some cases, the 1939 income may qualify a family whereas the 1940 income may not. In other cases, the 1940 income may qualify a family whereas the 1939 did not.

While applications will be taken for mattresses under the 1941 program, the 1940 program will be completed before the other mattresses are made. However, it will be some time before the mattress making will be resumed.

Every applicant who qualified for mattresses in the 1940 program and who still desire the mattress, will be given the opportunity to make it when the work is started again. Mattie Phenix, C. Home Demonstration Agent.

bonds, and warrant were assumed by Bond Assumption Board in 1939, reducing Dawson County taxpayers of the burden proceeds of said bonds having been used to construct State designated roads.

What roads, if built now, would complete our cross-country system? We have learned that the petitioners for the election had in mind the completion of Highway No. 137 from Pankin Center northwest to the Terry County line, building of a road south to the Martin County line, commonly known as the Midland road, and building of a road west from Welch to the Garza County line. The tentative Dawson County road construction program as outlined above has been designated by the State Highway Department, which body had advised the Commissioner's Court of Dawson County, and they will recommend that the proposed Bond Issue be assumed by the Bond Assumption Board of this State.

The above outlined roads, if approved by the bond election and the bonds are assumed, will be built under supervision of the State Highway Department, which has stipulated already their approximate cost, making necessary bonds in the amount of \$300,000. Roads now being constructed under supervision of the State Highway Department are wider than the old type roads, and have a thicker, more serviceable base. State supervision assures us of the latest and most scientific construction obtainable, and by getting these roads financed by the State out of the one-cent gasoline tax that goes for assumption of bonded indebtedness of districts and counties, with future maintenance cost also being borne by the State, we can reserve

our county road and bridge funds for local road construction concerning community centers, thereby benefiting all persons residing in Dawson County.

Do you know that likely no more highway funds will be available except for construction, maintenance of the roads, and improvement of military roads within the next two years? Do you know that Lamesa is located on only one road now considered of military importance, Federal Highway No. 87, and that this consideration is of third priority? For the above same military reasons it is generally believed also that no more money will be available within the next two years for construction of farm-to-market roads.

Did you know that East Texas is a foe to possible passage of the Road Bond Assumption Act? They in that section favored the bill during such periods as they were receiving benefit from it that caused their road bonds to be assumed. Now they want to stop West Texas from using this money that has already been raised from gasoline tax for benefit of all Texas counties rather than a select few. If the bill passes in the next session of the Legislature and our bonds are assumed, taxes will not be raised anywhere in the State of Texas because of this. If we vote our bonds and they are not assumed, as be stated, the bonds will not be issued. Taxes were lowered this year in Dawson County seven cents per hundred dollar valuation, placing the rate at 76 cents.

For benefit of some who may not know it the four-cent gasoline tax is divided as follows: Two cents for road construction and maintenance and upkeep of the State Highway Patrol, one cent for schools, and one cent for assumption of road bonds issued by counties for construction of roads designated and approved by the State Highway Department.

Voters of Dawson County, go to the polls on December 23 and vote for this important bond issue and help us complete it to designated highways in our county. By doing this you will help the Commissioner's Court and the Planning Board to get hard surfaced farm-to-market roads to each community center at an early date.

turkeys will be marketed from the county during 1940. There are more cattle, hogs and sheep on feed now in Dawson county than in several years. Not only are large producers in these fields feeding many head of stock, but smaller producers are feeding more extensively than ever before.

The cotton crop is expected to be 40,000 bales for 1940, which means that approximately \$1,600,000 will be derived from this source. Almost a half-million dollars have already been paid to farmers of the county in government checks. It is expected that this figure will surpass \$800,000. Bank deposits are about on a level with last year's, while some sources say that notes are being paid off as well if not better than during last fall and winter. Federal savings agencies say that 1940 has thus far been the best year in the history of their operations.

It is generally believed that prices other than cotton have been stimulated by war conditions in Europe, and that they will be further stimulated during 1941.

Quoting Mr. Richardson further, "Our road building program, which will go forward with the voting of the road bonds in the near future, will mean thousands of dollars for the laborer. The WPA projects for street and park developments will provide large payrolls for our county during 1941. I desire to join hands with all the citizenship of Dawson County in making this a prosperous year. We must go forward in the development of our great section on the Plains."

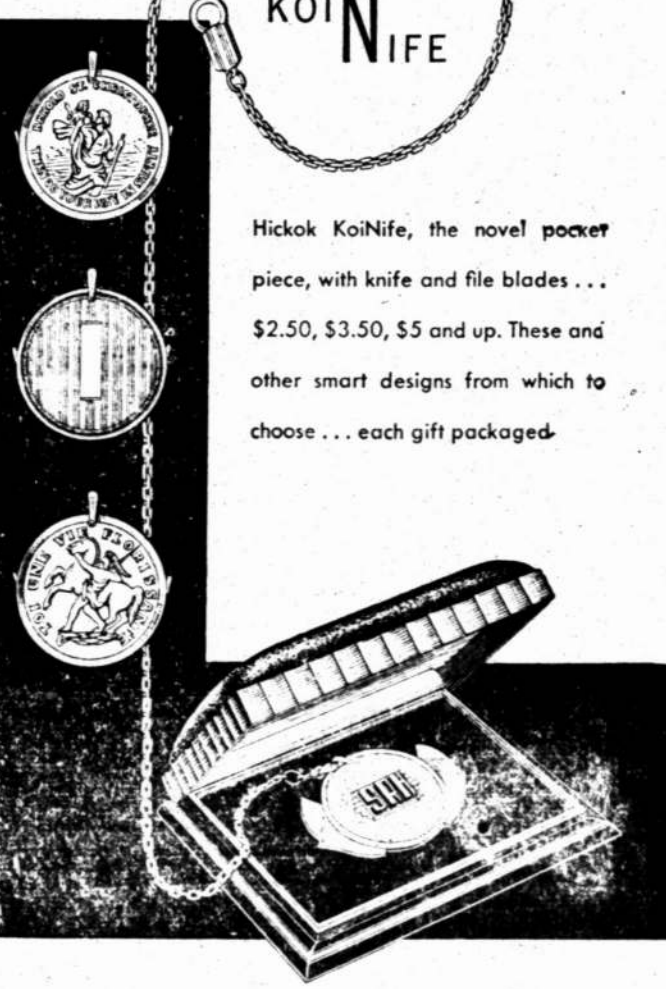

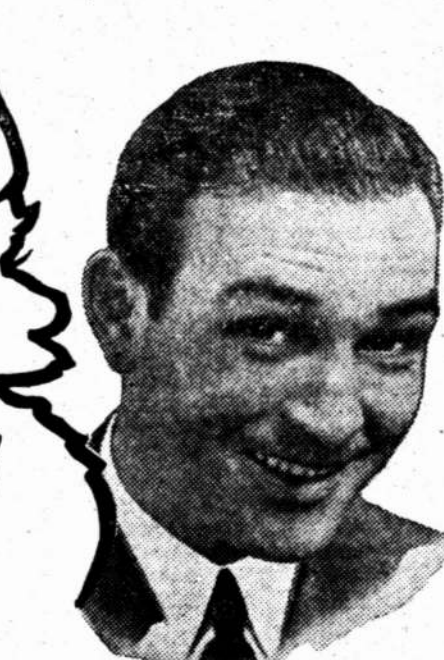
