New High School Building Said Needed; Valuation and Tax Rate To Remain The Same

Abernathy school board has ordered a bond election for \$64,000.00, after having been petitioned by taxpayers. The election will be held on June 20 in the Reid Chevrolet building. The proposed bonds will be used to construct a high school building, repair present building, and install facilities for a school lunch room.

It is the opinion of the Abernathy School board based on information expressed by school patrons that since our present school facilities are so overcrowded that it is advisable to build a high school building. The proposed building has seven classrooms, a combination study hall and library, toilets and offices.

Since 1936, \$23,000 in school improvements have been added to our school plant. These improvements were: completion of the gymnasium, home economics cottage, bus shed, and farm shop. The payment of these obligations was accomplished without raising school taxes.

For the last several years, approximately 25% of the school taxes has been used to pay off school bonds, and 75% placed in the local maintenance fund for current expenses. Since all of the 75% was not needed for current expenses, the balance was applied on the improvements listed above.

The school board will leave the school valuation and the tax rate as they are at present. The present 25% for bonds will be increased to 40% and the local maintenance decreased to 60%. The cost to each taxpayer will remain the same as at present.

BOND COMMITTEE MAKES PLANS FOR FIFTH WAR LOAN

The War Bond Committee for this area is making plans for a campaign to meet one of the largest quotas ever handed Abernathy in a War Loan Drive. Monday, June 12, is the opening date of the Fifth War Loan. Hale county has a quota of \$1,075,000.00, and the quota for Abernathy is expected to be about \$150,000.00.

Bond Chairman Makes Statement

"We are being called on this time for the largest amount of any drive yet. The government is asking for 16 billion dollars in bond purchases. Begin now to plan on a purchase in keeping with the increased asking. We might well call these INVASION BONDS. The war is not yet won. Only for the dead is it over. We are thankful that so far they are few. If on reaching the threshold of the invasion coast the boys refused to establish a beachhead and fight what would you think of them? If, in this great conquest we fail to do our small bit, what will they think of us? THEY GIVE THEIR LIVES—WE LEND OUR MONEY."

"We are having a FIFTH WAR LOAN RALLY at the high school auditorium on the evening of June 13th. Present at this rally will be two war-wounded heroes of this war—one is from the Pacific theatre of war and the other from the European theatre. These men both will relate such experiences as the war department will allow, and in addition to that, they will show moving pictures from the battle fronts. The picture is entitled "INVASION PUNCHES." There will be 50 minutes of this electrifying, patriotic stimulation. Be present at this meeting and bring your friends. There are no charges for this show.

Fifth War Loan Show Here Tuesday Night Features Talks By Vets and War Movies

PRAYERS ARE OFFERED AS INVASION STARTS

Plans Set For Another Mass Meet Here When Allies Defeat Hitler

A large crowd of citizens of this area gathered at the First Baptist church here Tuesday morning to offer prayers for the success of the Allied invasion of Nazi-held Europe and for the safety of our men. Although the invasion news came at about 2:32 a. m., CWT, it was not generally known here until radios were turned on after arising Tuesday morning. The community prayer service opened at about 8 a. m., and continued most of the morning with people joining and leaving the service at intervals.

Present and in charge of the meeting were the town's ministers, Rev. H. E. McClain, Nazarene, Rev. J. Frank Nix, Baptist, Rev. Frank Beauchamp, Methodist, and Oscar Henderson, Church of Christ. Members of all the churches and people without church affiliation were in the congregation to ask the aid of Almighty God in the crucial hour. Prayers by the ministers and laymen were interspersed with songs. Those having relatives and friends in the various theatres of war were asked to mention the fact.

A list of names of Abernathy men believed to be in England was read. It was so stated that the list might not include all of our men in that war theatre, but it was as complete as was possible to compile.

Thanksgiving Meet Set

Another mass community meeting is to be held to give thanks when the war in Europe ends in unconditional surrender of the Nazis. The date of this meeting: ? ? time: ? ? and place: Abernathy First Baptist church.

At this meeting, when the war in Europe ends, names of the Abernathy men who participated in the conflict will be read. Those who have relatives or friends who were in the invasion of Africa, Sicily, Italy and the one from England are requested to give their names to the Review immediately so a complete list will be available.

Remember Boys On Other Fronts

In the prayer service Tuesday morning our boys who are fighting at sea and on all the battle fronts of the world, and those who have returned from the various war theatres were remembered as well as those who are in the current invasion of Europe.

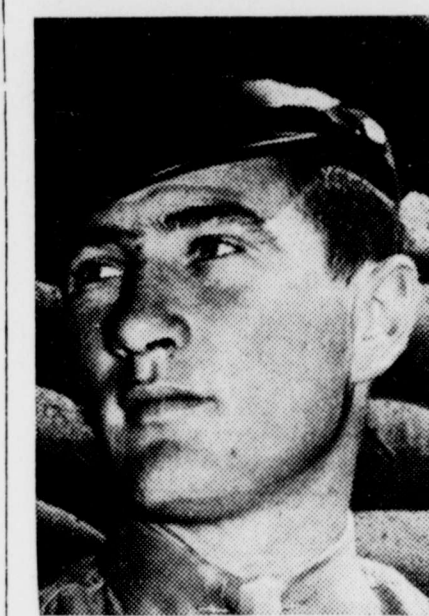

50-Minute Program To Open War Loan Drive In Abernathy

Two war-wounded heroes, veterans of World War II, are due to arrive in Abernathy Tuesday afternoon, June 13, from McCloskey General Hospital, Temple. They are to speak here that night on the program of the 5th War Loan Show, to open the War Loan drive in Abernathy. The program will be held in the school auditorium and is scheduled to begin at 8:30 p. m. No charge is to be made for admission.

The 50-minute program will include "Invasion Punches," from U. S. Army motion pictures. The battle front pictures, hitherto not shown to the general public, will be on the following subjects:

"German Channel Fortifications: the Germans' own film of their fortifications along the English channel — enslaved labor of Europe works under the Nazi yoke in old French seacoast towns — it shows lengths to which German preparations have gone. Taking of Cape Gloucester and Arawa: Yankee rope trick, unusual story of a B-24 Liberator flying to the rescue of a Liberty ship — a vivid record of taking of Cape Gloucester and Arawa — wear and tear of mud on our men and equipment — portable oil lines in Italy — Piper cubs in action. Hand to Hand Combat Training: a stark, jolting film which daringly reveals the gentle art of rugged hand to hand combat — the sneaking up from behind, the right thumb into the eye of the enemy and the slick art of bayonet maneuvering.

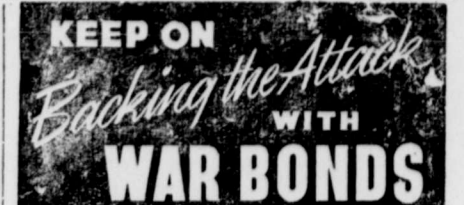
Dear Buford: I'm sorry I haven't written before now, but I've been pretty busy. I got out of the hospital a week ago and am back in train-

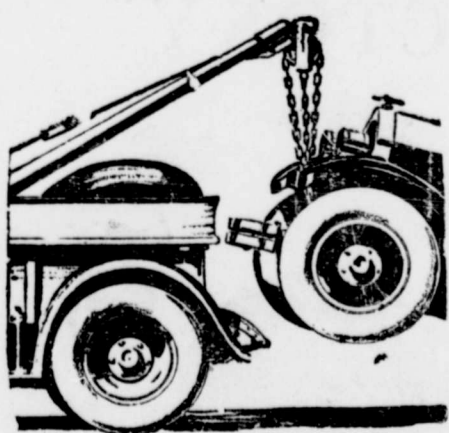
